

Owl girls primed for another special season

OSCODA – They may be young, but for the Oscoda girls' basketball team that is really nothing new. What also isn't new is that the Lady Owls expect to be the best squad in this part of the state and hope to prove it with another North Star League Big Dipper championship and district title.

"We are very young, with only two seniors, but our younger ninth and 10th graders are extremely talented," eighth-year head coach Mark Toppi said. "I feel we can truly improve each game. It is going to take us half the season before we are starting to reach our potential."

Last year the Owls went 15-7 overall, winning the NSL Big Dipper championship the fourth straight time and they also won their third district crown in the last four years.

They'll welcome back seniors Mia Whipkey, a sharp shooting guard, and Elle Kellstrom, who brings an athletic presence in the post. Sophomore Kingsley Backstrom returns as well and should make a huge impact down low as well.

"All three players will play a big role in our success this season," Toppi said. "They all have logged a lot of varsity minutes."

Joining them will be Luella Whipkey (freshman, guard), Ava Gooch (sophomore, guard), Emma Michaud (freshman), Emily Smith (sophomore), Ashton Ehle (freshman, guard), Elyse Richards (junior) and Kyden Ehle (sophomore, guard, forward). Many of these players will alternate between the JV and varsity teams as a part of the fifth quarter rule.

"We are going to play a fast pace and shoot a ton of threes like we always do," Toppi said. "We have a lot of players that can play different guard positions. We have two talented post players and we are going to surround they with great outside shooting. We want our older players to set the tone for our younger core."

Oscoda has loaded up its non-conference schedule with some top-shelf teams. They open the season with Class 'A' schools Alpena, Bay City Central and Midland High. They'll also play other quality squads like Cedarville, Traverse City St. Francis, Flint Hamady and Standish-Sterling as

"We ramped up our non-conference schedule even more than last year," Toppi said. "I believe the only way we can improve is playing someone as good or better than you. Our players have embraced the idea of playing bigger schools to help prepare us for the end of the season and make a run past districts."

Oscoda may have won the last four NSL Big Dipper titles, but the other teams could pose a challenge. Alcona returns most of its team from a year ago and Rogers City has high expectations as well, and has one of the best post players in the league in Alivia Freel. Until someone proves otherwise, Oscoda is still the class of the league though.

"I believe we are the team to beat in our conference," Toppi said. "We split with Alcona last year and they have a solid team and are returning most of their players, but I still feel we are the favorites to win the league."

Oscoda has already played in four games this season and returns to action on Friday, when it hosts Posen.

"Our season goals are to be challenged by good non-conference competition," Toppi said. "Our focus is not on our record but on us getting better throughout the season. Our main focus is getting ready for the state tournament"



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

"I think that we have been so close to reaching the top in our (league) over the past two years that it has really lit a fire under these swimmers' bottoms and made them get it together and get after it and show dedication, show up to practice and do what needs to be done," fourth-year head coach Elyssa Steward said. "These boys have almost tasted winning the (league) and with 11 seniors, at this point, this is their last shot.'

"(Last week) we spent a lot of time preparing for our relay meet (at Swartz Creek), while getting in yardages," Steward said. "(This week) we are going to work on more distance and short access. We have a team of five coaches that come to practices to help out, so we are much more organized this year. We have two captains in Rush and Raybourn and they are in charge of helping mediate (other swimmers) during workouts as

"Overall, we have a lot more leadership all the way around. We are able to break each workout down into the individual needs of

the swimmer."

The Owls will have Taylor and Story compete in diving, and have received help from a conference rival to help them hone their skills.

'Ogemaw was nice enough to share their diving coach, they go Fridays to Ogemaw to practice diving with the three divers at Ogemaw," Steward said. "I think we are competitive, but we show good sportsmanship with other

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

"Brielle will be a leader for obvious reasons, but Anna and Torrie will (lead) as well," Gibson said. "Anna will be running the

point and Torrie picks up slack all over the court with that game chatter and calling cuts, etc.'

"In the short term, we need to make sure to rebound, we're all about fighting for the loose ball, but getting the right position initially is key to not having to battle every possession," Gibson said. "For the long term, the goal is to just keep that court sense building. We've got some really good moves to and under the basket, but we need everyone to be able to see that happening. We need to perfect that timing."
