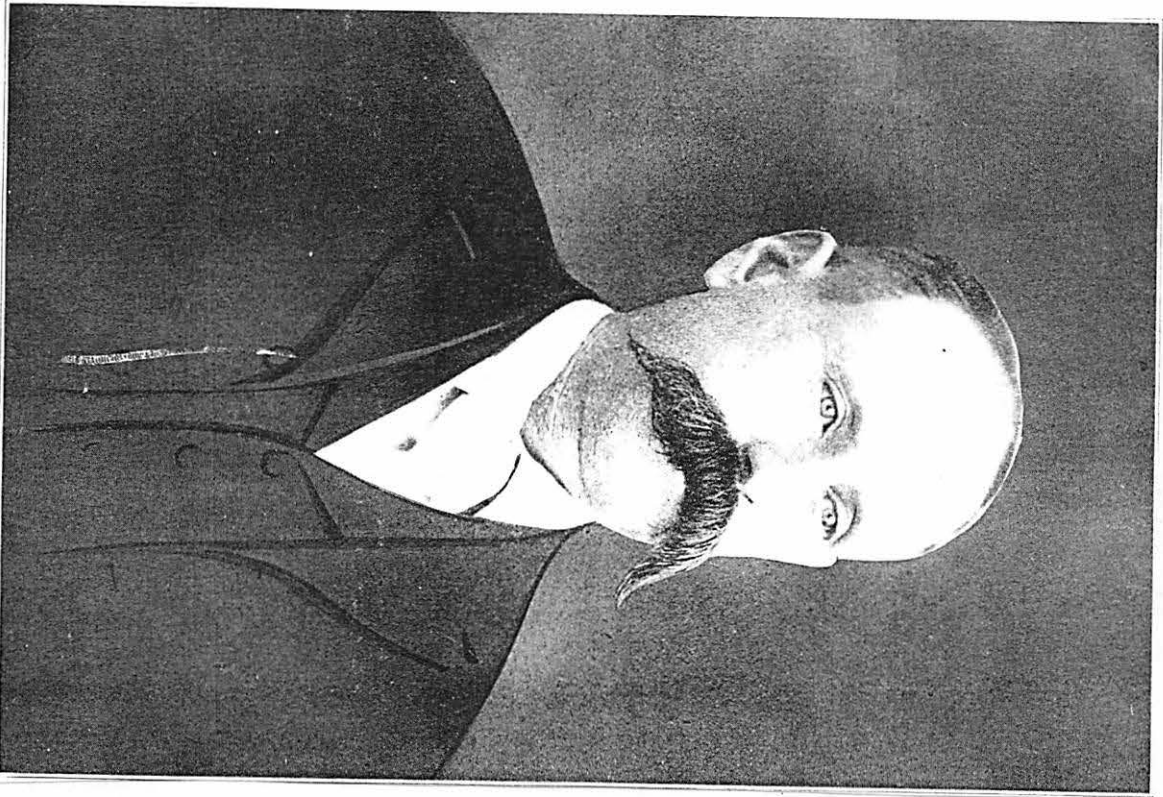

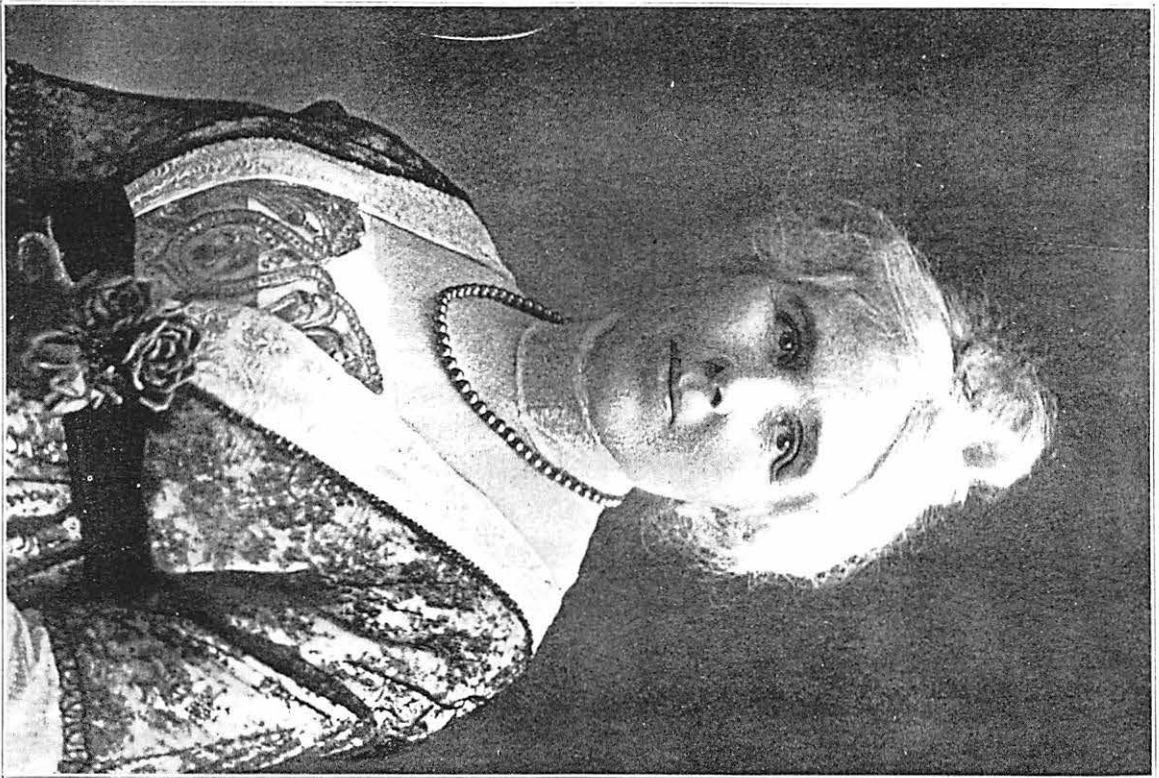

HENRY A. JOHNSON.

Henry A. Johnson, a well known stock raiser of Columbia county, has been a resident of Washington for forty years and has therefore been a witness of much of the growth and development of this section of the state. A native of Ontario, Canada, he was born in Lincoln county, August 18, 1844, a son of W. G. D. and Catherine (Miller) Johnson, who were also natives of Canada, where

they spent their entire lives. They had a family of ten children, eight of whom are now living.

Henry A. Johnson spent his youthful days in Canada and acquired his education as a public school pupil there. In 1865 he removed to the middle west, settling in Champaign county, Illinois, where he resided for a decade. In 1875 he made his way to the Pacific coast and located in California, where he spent two and a half years upon a farm. In 1877 he arrived in Walla Walla and in May, 1878, he purchased a herd of cattle and came to Starbuck. He rented a farm for several years but during that period carefully saved his earnings until his industry and economy had brought to him a capital sufficient to enable him to purchase land. He then invested in property which he owned for a time but afterward sold that farm. His wife, however, owns eleven hundred and twenty acres near Starbuck, which is excellent valley land, devoted to the cultivation of hay, fruit and vegetables.

In August, 1909, Mr. Johnson was united in marriage to Mrs. Nancy A. Pearson, a native of Restigouche county, New Brunswick, and a daughter of Robert and Mary Ann (Reid) Watson. Her father was born in Scotland, but her mother was a native of New Brunswick, where they were married. To them were born eight children in New Brunswick and two others were added to the family after their removal to California, Mrs. Johnson being the oldest. It was in 1868 that they came to the Pacific coast and settled in Rio Vista, California, where Mr. Watson owned and operated a ranch and where both he and his wife died. They have three sons still living: William, of San Jose, California; and R. W. and Alex M., both of Great Falls, Montana. Their daughter, Nancy A., was married in Rio Vista to J. S. Pearson and in 1878 they came to Dayton, Washington, being among the pioneers of that locality. Two years later they became residents of Starbuck. Mr. Pearson died at Spokane in 1908. The children born of that union were: Charles W., now an extensive wheat farmer of Eureka flats, Walla Walla county; Margaret J., deceased; Sadie M., the wife of a prominent physician of Sacramento, California; Marian E., whose husband is a prominent railroad man of Spokane; Florence P., the wife of an eminent physician of Sacramento; Robert G., also a prominent physician of that city; and Joseph N., a rancher of Marysville, California. All of the children were given excellent educational advantages, attending colleges in this state and finishing their course at the University of Washington. Charles was one of the first children to attend public school in Starbuck, Mr. and Mrs. Pearson with one or two others having organized the first school district in 1880, before the village of Starbuck had been started. Mr. and Mrs. Johnson now spend their winters in California but during the summer months occupy the ranch at Starbuck, where they have a beautiful and attractive home located on a knoll overlooking the Tucanon river which is modern in every respect, being lighted by electricity and supplied with all conveniences.

Mr. Johnson is prominent in Masonic circles, belonging to Starbuck Lodge No. 106, F. & A. M., in which he has filled all of the chairs, and both he and his wife are connected with the Order of the Eastern Star. In politics he is a stalwart republican and has served as justice of the peace and as mayor of Starbuck, while for several years he has been a member of the school board. His public duties have been discharged with promptness and fidelity and he has manifested marked capability in the performance of every task that has devolved upon him. During the long years of his residence in Washington he has contributed much to the upbuilding and progress of his section of the state and has always stood for advancement, reform and improvement.

JOHNSON, H. A., of Starbuck, Wash., was born in Canada in 1844. His father, W. G. D. Johnson, was a Canadian farmer, and his mother, Catherine

(Miller) Johnson, was a native of the same section. Educated in Canada, he located, on the completion of his studies, in Chicago, where he engaged in rail-roading and building. In 1875 he removed to California and settled in Sonoma County, where he became an engineer. His next migration was to Washington Territory, locating first at Walla Walla, and removing thence to his present place of residence at Starbuck, where he devoted himself to farming and stock-raising until four years ago, when he sold out and returned to Canada, after an absence of twenty years from his native province. Returning to Starbuck, he established himself in the butchering business, which he still continues. He is the owner of a large farm and stock ranch within half a mile of Starbuck, which bids fair, with the increase of the city, to become very valuable property. He is a Mason and a Republican. He is one of the pioneer settlers of Starbuck and one of its most enterprising citizens.

HENRY H. JOHNSON is a pioneer of the west and for twenty-five years has dwelt on the place where we find him today, nine miles northeast from Prescott, near the Colville springs. He is a man of industry and has shown good staying qualities in his labors here as well as elsewhere. He was one of the number who pressed forward to defend the stars and stripes from insult, but his command was not called into active duty. He was born in Luzerne county, Pennsylvania and was taken by his parents to Wisconsin when a child and there was reared and educated. He enlisted in the Fourteenth Wisconsin and was honorably discharged at the close of the war. At the present time, Mr. Johnson is a member of the G. A. R. and a stanch supporter of the government. His father settled in the vicinity of Oshkosh, Wisconsin, and from that place our subject came to California in 1876. He searched the country for some months and then went to Puget Sound in 1877. Later he went to Walla Walla country and finally in 1880, he came here and secured the estate where he dwells at the present time. He has given attention to farming and stock raising here since those days and has shown himself one of the substantial men of the county.

In 1860, Mr. Johnson married Miss Sophia Fisher, a native of Vermont. To this couple the following named children have been born: Horton, in Wisconsin, who moved with his father to this country, married in 1902 to Carrie Staples and is now engaged in the stock business in Idaho county, Idaho; Jerome M., a native of Sauk Center, Wisconsin, who also came with his father to this country, and was married in 1901 to Alice Staples; Isaac; Frank; William W.; Alvin; Charlie; and Henry. Mr. Johnson has been on the frontier almost all his life, as Wisconsin was a new country when he was taken thither.

He and his faithful wife have reared a fine family, and have constantly sought to instill in them the principles which make first class American citizens. They are worthy young people and possess a sense of honor that is gratifying. To Jerome M. and his wife, one child has been born, Mary V.

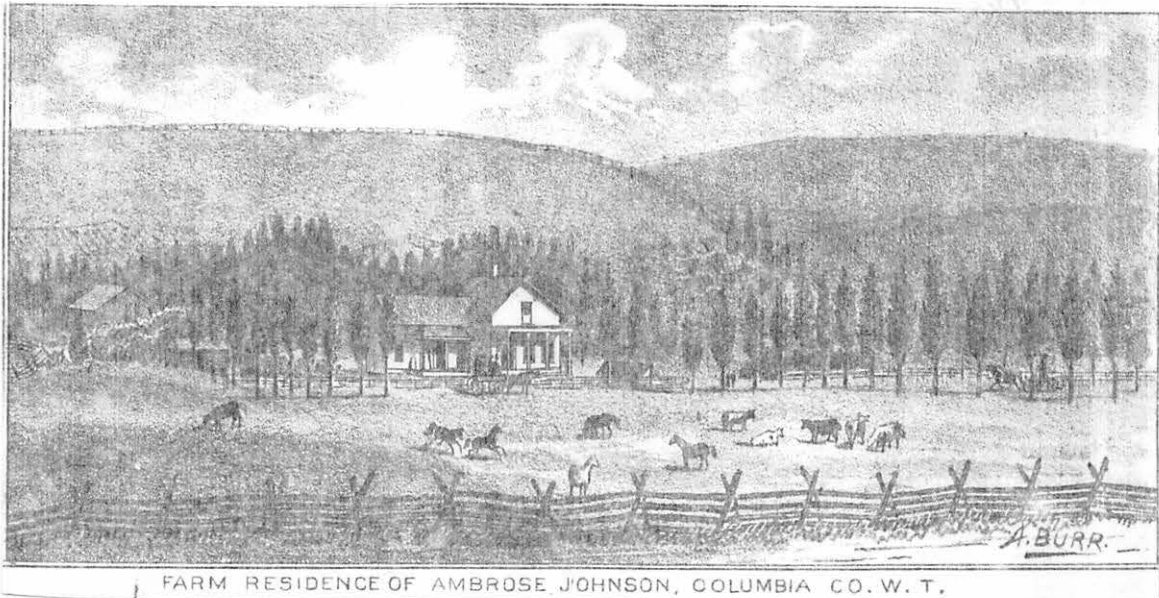

AMBROSE JOHNSON.—James Johnson was born in East Tennessee and moved to Monroe Co., Illinois, where he married Martha Allen, and reared a family of two sons and six daughters. One of the former, subject of this sketch, was born in Greene county, Illinois, near Carrolton, December 26, 1824. The family moved to Macoupin county in the same states and there Ambrose attended school and grew to manhood. In 1847 the family moved to Iowa, and March 27, 1851, Ambrose married Martha Simpson, daughter of James and Peggy Simpson. He then settled down on a farm in Keokuk county, Iowa. Having lost his first three children, two boys and a girl, he abandoned that country in 1862, and crossed the plains and mountains, arriving in Walla Walla valley September 15, 1862. The next month he settled on the land he now occupies, four and one-half miles from Dayton. It was three years before he realized the agricultural value of this region, and began in earnest to make a home here. On the eleventh of October, 1868, his wife died, leaving five children, two boys (twins) and three girls. He was again married, October 27, 1872, to Tabitha Johnson, who has borne him three daughters and one son. Mr. Johnson's place is ornamented with a fine growth of large and stately poplars, which with other shade trees give it the appearance of coolness and comfort very pleasant to see. A view of his place is given on another page, but on account of their location, does not show all of the many improvements standing on the farm. Mr. Johnson was brought up in the Christian, or Campbellite faith, but, in 1876 he became convinced of the truth of the doctrines proclaimed by the Seventh Day Adventist denomination, and has since been a member of that church. He has been elder of the church in Dayton since its foundation.

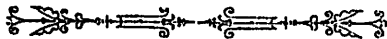

AMBROSE JOHNSON, one of the most prominent residents of Columbia county, and a pioneer, was born in Greene county, Illinois, December 26, 1824, a son of James and Martha (Allen) Johnson, natives respectively of Tennessee and Virginia. When our subject was a mere child his parents moved to Macoupin county, same State (Illinois), where they lived many years. Afterward they removed to Monroe county, same State, and later to Keokuk, Iowa, where both spent the remainder of their days.

Ambrose Johnson, the subject of this sketch, was reared principally in Macoupin county, but accompanied his parents in their removal to

Iowa. In the spring of 1862 he left that State for the far West, crossing the plains at a time when the Indians were quite troublesome. However, the party with which he came lost none of its members from this source, but the trains immediately before and after them were not so fortunate. Mr. Johnson arrived in Walla Walla, Washington, September 16, 1862, and immediately came to his present location, on what is now the Telegraph road, in Columbia county, where he took up a homestead of 160 acres. As he was the first settler in this locality, the neighborhood has since borne the name of Johnson hollow. He now has 235 acres in his ranch, of which he cultivates all but sixty acres, having all kinds of the most approved machinery, including a traction engine, which he uses in his farming operations. Everything about the ranch is in perfect order, and a splendid appearance is presented by the building improvements and trees. An avenue shaded by stately poplars leads from the highway to the buildings, and the house is embowered in shade furnished by trees of his own planting. In addition to his home place, Mr. Johnson also has property at Milton, Oregon, which contains an orchard, vineyard and nursery.

Our subject was married, in Iowa, to Miss Martha Simpson, who died in this county. They had five children, who are living, namely: Morgan and Lewis, twins; Laura, wife of Joseph Abel, of Nez Perces county, Idaho; Lydia Maria, wife of William Young; and Sarah Isabel, wife of Daniel Black, of Columbia county, Washington. Mr. Johnson afterward married Mrs. Tabitha Johnson, *nee* Holly, a native of Missouri. They have four children: Marshall Allen, Dora Ann, Ada Jane, and Myra. Mr. Johnson affiliates with the Democratic party. While a resident of Iowa he served as Township Clerk in Keokuk county, also as Constable, and in Columbia county he has served as Trustee of Johnson school district, No. 33.

From a youth Mr. Johnson was religiously inclined, and early in life joined the Christian (known as the Campbellite) Church, but since the year of 1876 has embraced the Seventh-Day Adventist faith, believing that the ten commandments are still binding upon all and that the seventh day is the holy Sabbath day of the Lord—Ex. 20:8, 10; Isa. 58:13; Mark 2:28; Mat. 12:8, etc.; that the dead are not in heaven or hell, but that they are asleep in the dust of the earth—Isa. 26:19, 20; Job 14:12;

Died, in this county, Saturday, July 8, 1900, at the age of 75 years, Ambrose Johnson. Mr. Johnson was an old timer of this county, after whom Johnson Hollow was named. The funeral took place from the family residence at 1 o'clock Monday.

Lewis Johnson Was An Early Columbia Pioneer

Lewis Johnson, who passed away recently in Bellingham, and was buried in the Dayton cemetery Friday, March 14, was one of the early settlers in Columbia county, spending the greater part of his life here. He was born in Iowa December 6, 1858, and crossed the plains by ox team, with his parents, when he was but three years old, coming direct to eastern Washington.

Mr. Johnson was united in marriage with Miss Reta Abel and to this union three children were born, of which two are living. Mrs. Reta Johnson passed away some 23 years ago and Mr. Johnson later married Mrs. Tena Dunick, who survives him. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Albert Anderson, of Bellingham and a son, Charles Johnson, of Seattle. He is also survived by two sisters, Mrs. Laura Abel of Bellingham and Mrs. H. W. Young of Dayton and two half sisters, Mrs. Jack Macey of Dayton and Mrs. Sam Watson of Portland, and one half brother, Marshall Johnson.

The funeral service at this place was conducted by the Rev. W. C. Gilmore.

Mrs. H. W. Young, Lifetime Resident, Heeds Call

Mrs. H. W. Young, lifetime resident of Columbia county, died at her home on Washington avenue Saturday evening at about 6:30 o'clock after many months of illness.

Funeral services were held from the Methodist Episcopal church Monday afternoon at two o'clock with the Rev. H. E. Bashor in charge. Beautiful music was provided by a quartet made up of Mrs. E. Thompson, Mrs. W. F. Eslick, Harve Davis and John Munroe, and the pallbearers were: Fred Rennewanz, Grant Armstrong, Clark Israel, Carl Bauers, J. A. Hanger and William Rennewanz.

May L. Young, daughter of the late Ambrose Johnson, was born at the Johnson homestead on Johnson hollow in this county, January 5, 1864. She was among the first white children born here, and for many years she had held the distinction of being the oldest native resident of the community. She was married to H. W. Young, November 12, 1893, and she had made Dayton her home continuously since that time.

Mrs. Young was a faithful member of the M. E. church, and a worker in the Ladies' Aid until her health failed. Her friends were numerous throughout the county, and all who knew her held her in the greatest regard. She is survived by her husband, H. W. Young, one daughter, Miss Lella Young of Yakima, three sisters, Mrs. Laura Abel, Bellingham, Mrs. Sam Watson, Portland, and Mrs. Jack Macy, Dayton, and one brother, Marshall Johnson of this city. Several sisters and brothers preceded her in death.

Death of Mrs. Marie Longhi.

Last Monday Mrs. Marie Longhi was taken to Walla Walla suffering from severe intestinal trouble, and an operation was performed the same evening. Her condition was such that no hope for her recovery was held by the physicians, and she passed away about 6 p. m. Tuesday, aged 33 years. The body was brought here yesterday by

Hubbard & Rogg's auto hearse, and the funeral will be held from the residence of her mother, Mrs. Ambrose Johnson, at 5 p. m. today, Rev. J. K. Luther officiating. Besides her mother she is survived by six sisters and two brothers. She was a member of one of the oldest pioneer families of this county, and was born and brought up here.

Long III, An Oldtimer Dies

Funeral services will be held 2:30 Friday, Hubbard-Rogg chapel for Marshall Allen Johnson, long-time resident of Dayton, who died Sunday in a Wenatchee hospital following an operation. He had been in poor health for some time and had recently been staying at Soap Lake.

He was born March 12, 1874, the son of Tabitha and Ambrose Johnson. Johnson hollow was named for his father. He attended the Milton Academy and Walla Walla college.

Most of his life was spent as a farmer, but there was a period when he engaged in the real estate business at American Falls, Idaho. Since his retirement ten years ago, he has made Dayton again his home.

Surviving are two children, a son, Clark Johnson of Armstead, Utah, and a daughter, Mrs. John Solinsky of Seattle; two sisters, Mrs. Ada Watson of Portland and Mrs. Jack Macey of Dayton; and a granddaughter.

She was married in 1911 to John C. Macy at Pendleton, Oregon.

Mrs. Macy received her education in Dayton schools, Milton Academy and at Walla Walla college.

Except for a few years, she has been a resident of Dayton or the immediate vicinity all her life. She was active in the Pioneer Society, serving as president and was secretary of the group at her death. She was also a charter member of the Johnson Hollow club.

She is survived by her husband at the family home, by one sister, Mrs. Ada Watson, Portland, Oregon, and several nieces and nephews. A brother, Marshall Johnson, preceded her in death about five years ago.

Have you ever thought that being 89 years old is really old? Not at all—for Aunt Teena, as she is known to her friends, was 89 years young August 3, and she is young in heart, young in thought and young in spirit, and that is where the years really count.

She is far better posted on the happenings of every day events and in world affairs than anyone I know. She sits in her rocking chair and the news comes to her. The local news is brought by friends and the world events by newspapers and by her radio, her most constant companion.

Aunt Teena was born Christine Hatfield in Kesciusko, Indiana, August 3, 1859, when Indiana was the far west. As a child she remembers all of the talk of the gold rush days in California. She remembers the Civil War days very well as her father and two brothers fought for the freedom of the negroes and for the North.

Her father died just three weeks after returning from the war from an illness contracted during his service. This left her mother with six children to raise, and in those days especially, that was work. Her mother helped her neighbors shear sheep, plant corn and do their chores to provide for her little family. Aunt Teena remembers her mother leav-

ing in the early morning to walk through the woods to help the neighbors work all day, and when the children could hear her singing on the way home in the evenings, they would all run to meet her.

Her mother sheared the wool for their clothing and Aunt Teena helped her card it and spin and twist the yarn and wrap it on the spindles, turning the old spinning wheel. The wool was then taken to the weavers and after it was woven into cloth, Aunt Teena helped her mother dye the material. They boiled black walnut hulls to make the black color. Brown colors were created by boiling butternut hulls. For the blue color they bought a chunk of indigo at the store and they would

boil the material in this. Red was created by boiling a red powder called cochopid. All of this Aunt Teena remembers vividly.

She remembers, too, that the only light they enjoyed at night was from the huge fireplace, which was filled with logs in the evening to give them enough light to work and to study by.

As she grew older, she helped her mother make candles. Next for lighting purposes they used the grease lamp. This lamp was fashioned like a gravy boat with a spout at one end. White rags were braided and run through the spout and this end was lighted while the other end of the braided rag was nestled down in the grease. She tells of how thrilled they were at the sight of the first kerosene lamp, and how afraid they were of it, they were afraid that such a contraption would blow up in their faces. Then came the Aladdin lamp with its increased lighting power, and more wonderful still, the electric lights.

She tells of how thrilled she has been by each new invention, the grease lamps, the kerosene lamps, the electric lights, bath tubs, telephones, telegraph, cars, steam engines, airplanes and radios, and she rocks in her chair and wonders "what they will invent next." She is hoping that an invention will come along much like the helicopter that can be fastened to her rocking chair and that by pressing a button, she can take off and up, just high enough to escape all of the cars, and when she comes to a beautiful scene she wants to enjoy, she can just press another button and settle down and look to her heart's content.

She thinks that the men of tomorrow will all be bachelors, if someone will just come along and make a mechanical woman to wait on him.

Aunt Teena has watched the different steps in preparing the family dinner from the oldest way of cooking over the open fireplace, to the old-fashioned flat top iron stoves, to

the handier stoves with their warming ovens and then to the gas and electric ranges.

At the age of 16, Aunt Teena was married to Marion Dunnick and to this union five children were born. Two of these passed on at the ages of 4 and 18 years. Remaining are Claude Dunnick and Maude Dunnick Tucker of San Mateo, California. (Maude Tucker will be remembered by many as former superintendent of schools for Columbia county), and May Dunnick Merry of Everett, Wash. Mr. Dunnick died in 1900.

Aunt Teena made five trips back and forth across the United States to visit her brothers, Leet and Phil Hatfield, who had settled in Dayton. On one of these trips she became acquainted with Lewis Johnson, whom she married in 1907. They moved to Bellingham where they lived for 10 years. Mr. Johnson died in 1931.

In spite of handicaps Aunt Teena enjoys her little home which she has taken care of herself up until the last few months when others have come in to help her for a part of each day. She is mentally alert and interested in everything around her. She has a wonderful sense of humor and enjoys talking on any and every subject and reads the numerous magazines and books and papers which her daughters and friends send to her. Her Bible is always near at hand and she knows the contents from cover to cover. She is always cheerful and a willing listener, and from her store of knowledge gives helpful advice to those who ask it of her.

It has been more than three years since she has been able to leave her little home even to step out of doors, since it is increasingly hard for her to get around, but in spite of this she is the most cheerful, helpful, interesting person to know, and to know her and to enjoy her company is to love her.

Mrs. Johnson was born in Warsaw, Indiana, August 3, 1859. Funeral services will be held today at the local chapel at 11 a. m.

Mrs. Johnson is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Mabel Marry, Everett, Mrs. Maude Tucker of San Mateo, California. Two step-children, Charlie Johnson of Seattle, Mrs. A. A. Anderson of Tacoma, two grandchildren, five great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren. Also numerous nieces and nephews in Columbia county area.



Age is no handicap to Marshall Johnson.

Born in 1874 on land now bearing his name, Mr. Johnson is still a very active man. He loves to work in his flower garden, but last week felt the need of more strenuous work so spent an afternoon shearing two big sheep for Dr. Wilson.

Seventy-seven years ago, in Johnson hollow, near Dayton, Marshall was born. He lived in Dayton for 34 years, moving to Sumpter, Oregon, and from there to American Falls in Idaho where he farmed and sold real estate, before he returned to his home town.

In his younger days Mr. Johnson loved to square dance and waltz, and did much of the calling at the dances.

Dayton at that time, according to Mr. Johnson was more populated and prices were much lower, too. There were a good many saloons along Main street, and Syndicate hill was the site of the dance hall and skating rink. "Everybody turned out for the Saturday night dance."

Marshall recalls working in harvest, threshing from the second of July to the twentieth of November when there would be twenty inches of snow on the frozen ground.

In barley harvest, Mr. Johnson and the late Pete Hawkins in one day set a record by "sewing and bucking" 2180 sacks.

Now, retired and living in his small house on West Main street, Marshall Johnson can rest and remember the colorful life he has led. But resting is not in an active man's blood, and for that reason more than anything else, Marshall spends his time helping other people, like shearing the sheep for Dr. Wilson, or working in his own garden and home.

**Mrs. Fannie Sparks
Pioneer of 1870, Dies**

Oct. 1931

Mrs. Fannie G. Sparks, long a resident of Dayton, died at her home in Walla Walla Sunday morning at the age of 72. Funeral services were held from the Congregational church of this city Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock with the Rev. W. C. Gilmore in charge, and interment was made at the family plot in the Dayton cemetery.

Fannie Greene Surber was born in Macon county, Missouri April 20, 1859, and crossed the plains with her parents in 1868. They first settled in the Grande Ronde valley and lived there until 1870 when they moved to Walla Walla. They came to Dayton the same year and settled in the part of the county now known as Johnson hollow, which was named for her step-father, the late Ambrose Johnson. Following her marriage, Mrs. Sparks continued to live here, and Dayton was her home continuously until about three years ago when her health failed and she moved to Walla Walla to be near her son, Fred Sparks. She was a member of the Congregational church for a number of years.

Mrs. Sparks was the mother of four children, three whom survive, Mrs. Ethel Roberts of Rylestone, Australia, Mrs. Maude Dunham, Pendleton, Oregon, and Fred Sparks, Walla Walla. She also leaves two grandchildren, Eugene Sparks, Walla Walla, and Howard Dunham, Pendleton, two sisters, Mrs. Dorris Macy, Dayton, and Mrs. Addie Watson, Portland, and one brother, Marshall Johnson, Dayton.

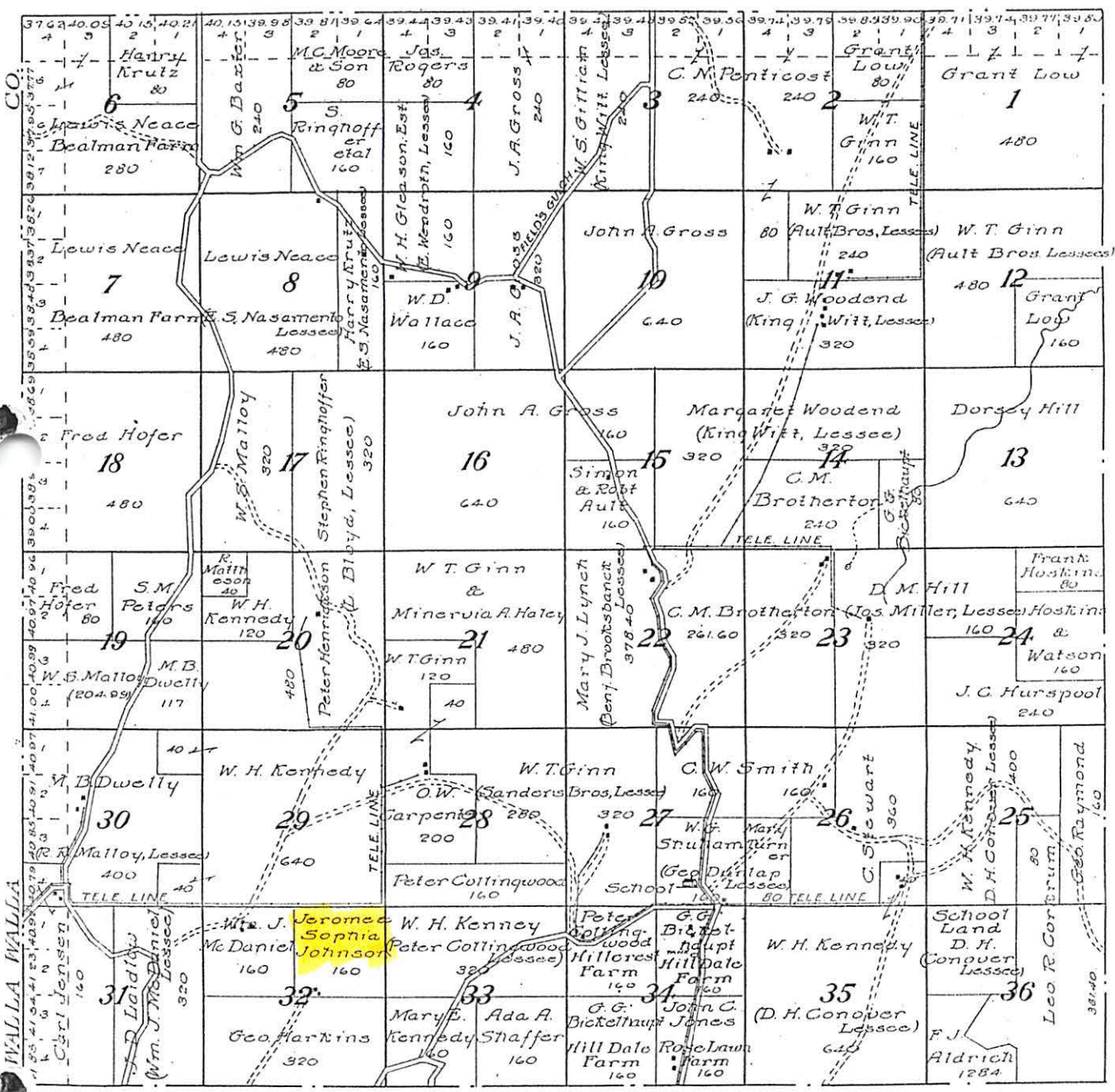
MAP OF

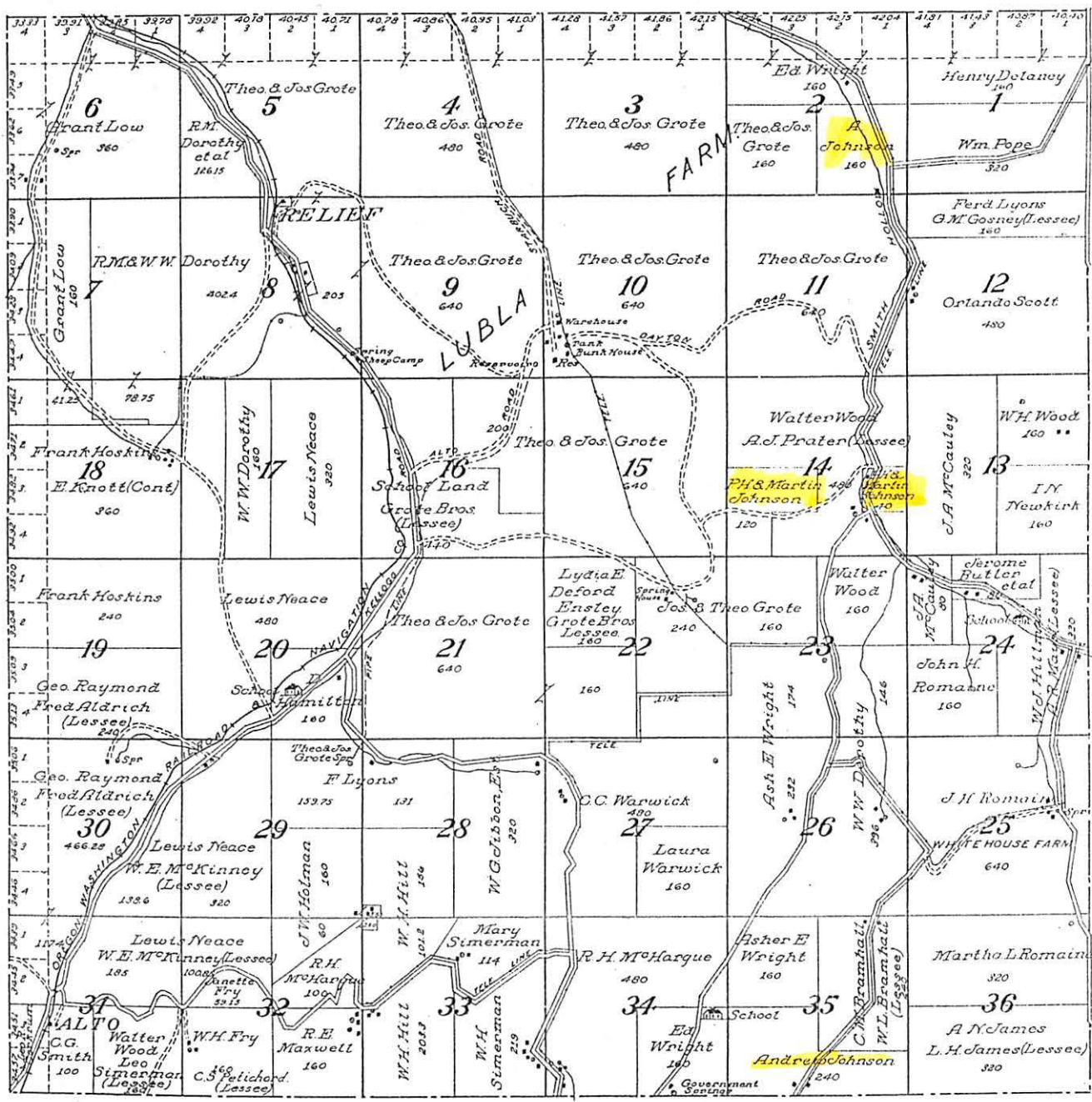

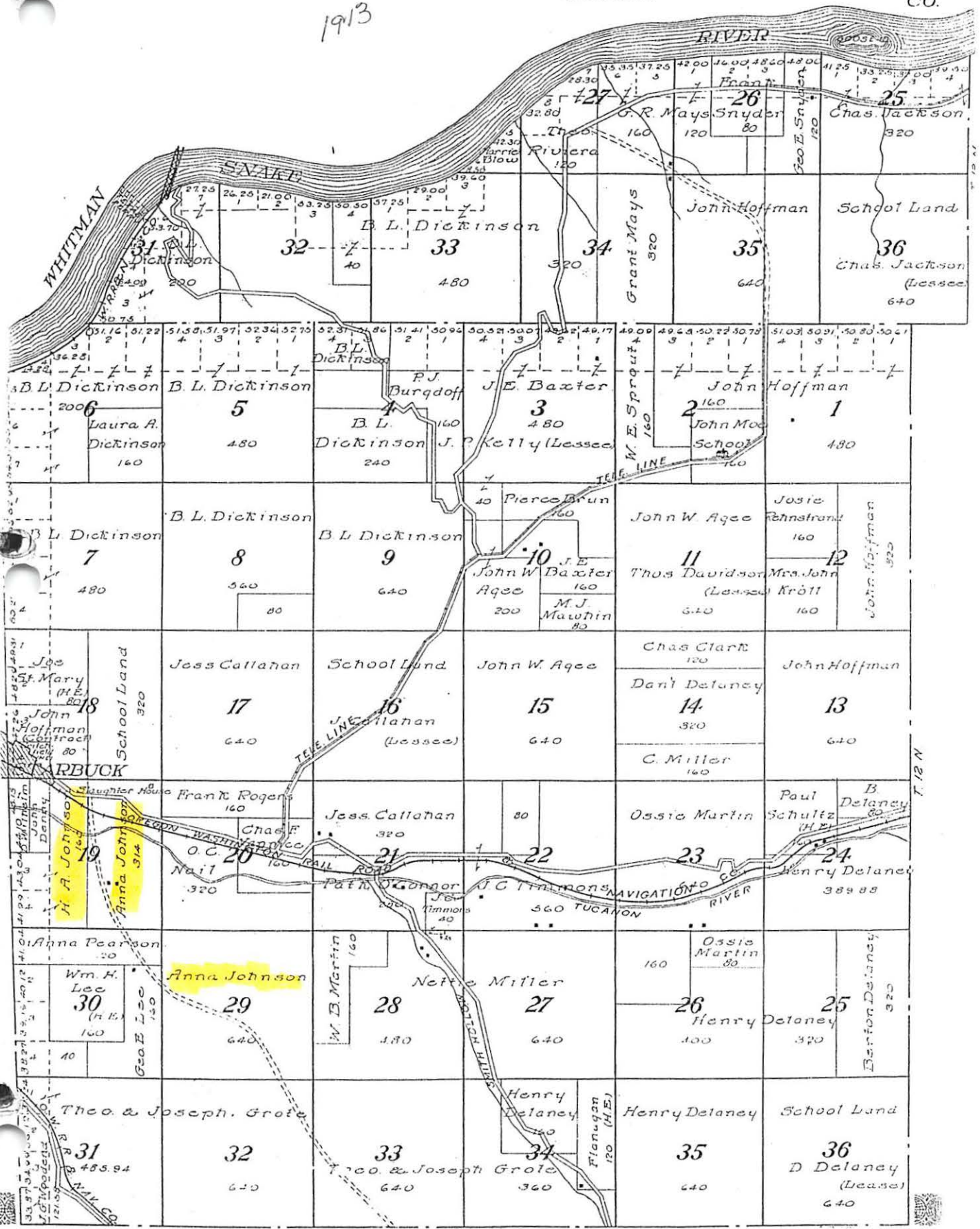




PART OF TOWNSHIPS 12 and 13 N.,

ANNA (JOHNSON) RAYBURN

(Article for booklet "Time Was: told by Beth (Hatfield) Carson 1976)

Anna was such a gentle, little lady. We asked her to tell about her early life and she demurred saying, "Nothing much happened to me."

But then we found out that when she was born her mother died from a tumor on her brain. (1)

The father couldn't take care of such a small child, so she was put into a couple of foster homes which didn't work out. When she was three, John and Ellen Knox took her in and raised her. They had seven children of their own, and Anna was much younger. She said "I guess I learned when young to keep quiet and stay out of the way."

Anna was the 6th child of John August and Sarah (Wheeler) Johnson. Nina Marll and Vina Randolph, McGlothlin were her older sisters (2)

When Delos Rayburn courted her, they had to take along an aunt for a chaperon. When they were married and Delos would be gone, Anna would lie down on the grass and put her ear to the ground. She could hear the wagon coming up the Pettyjohn grade she would hurry to get the fire going and dinner ready.

Anna loved to paint with water colors. Mostly she painted the wild flowers and wild roses. She would sell home-made pies, coffee and chili to the hunters who came to the mountain and this would pay for her art needs and classes. Her cooking became so popular the hunters came from long distances and one Seattle newsman wrote it up in his paper about her mountain home and the marvelous pies which came out of the wood-stove oven. But the State checked on her and made her stop. (3)

Anna's granddaughter, Beth Carson, said that the greatest thrill of her life was on their 50th wedding anniversary when she got to wear her grandmother's wedding dress.

There were no toys when the grandchildren came to visit the mountain. But Anna taught them how to make pretty dolls out of poppies in bloom, with rose-hips for heads. They were put in a pan of water, and as they floated around, they looked like they were dancing. She also taught them to make long chains out of pine tree needles. They were taken into the woods to pick black caps. When they came home, Anna would make a pie or a cobbler. She taught them all the names of wild flowers and would never let them pick a land-slipper unless there were two or three around.

(1)-Anna's mother was sent to Medical Lake when she was very young. She didn't die of a brain tumor but died in the 1920's at Medical Lake of old age. The sad thing is grandmother had always been told she died of a brain tumor. When I sent for her death certificate I discovered this. It's too bad she never got to see her.

Some of the family told me that the hospital had at one time contacted John, Anna's father, to tell him his wife Sarah was well enough to go home but he refused to go for her.

Anna had always said her name was Anna B. but when she applied for social security benefits they sent her birth certificate and she found her name was really Anna Rhoda Johnson. This really shocked her.

(2)-Actually grandmother was the 9th child of John Augusta and Sarah Jane (Wheeler) Johnson. She was born 15 Mar 1896 in Dayton. Her brothers and sisters were raised on Eckler Mt but grandmother was raised by the Knox's on the Whetstone

One day when grt-grandfather, Logan Rayburn, went to town he got acquainted with John Knox and invited him to come for a visit on Jasper Mt. where he lived. This is how my grandfather Delos and my grandmother Anna met. They were married 10 June 1917 in Dayton. They farmed on Jasper on a place below where his parents lived. When Logan and wife passed on they moved to the homestead and continued farming.

(3)-One day about 1924-25 grandmother decided to pick up a beginner's water color paint tin and some paper and this began her hobby of painting. Her son Jay says she would sit on the front porch and paint the mountains, or a grove of trees or flowers. She soon became very engrossed in painting. I've been told she brought a painting to the fair one year. And the next year a few more began to enter their paintings and this started the paint booth in the building. She was always there every day the fair was on, visiting and admiring the entries until her health wouldn't let her attend any more. She began to take oil painting classes and pretty much dropped her painting in water colors. In later years she conducted oil painting classes.

(4)-Anna passed away 21 July 1975 in Dayton. I might say here that she and Delos had 3 children. Ruth Married Dale Hatfield Jay Rayburn and Lawrence Rayburn, who died when he was (I think between 5-8 yrs. old.)

(5)-While they lived on Mt. Pleasant and the children were in school, they at times had the school teacher living in their home, which was just down the hill from the school.

(6)-Before Grandma married she taught piano lessons to students out in the Whetstone area. Later when her kids had grown, she and her son Jay played the music for dances at Columbia School. She would cord on the piano for Uncle Jay as he played his guitar and harp.

And she said nothing much happened to me. Cute!!!

**DEATH OF ECKLER MT.
PIONEER OCCURS
(11 July 1929)**

The funeral of John August Johnson, pioneer farmer of Eckler mountain was held Tuesday at, 2 p. m. from the Hubbard-Rogg chapel, services being conducted by Rev. W. C. Gilmore. The death occurred Saturday at 11:15 p.m. Mr. Johnson had been ill for some time.

The deceased was born in Norway, August 16, 1848. He came to America when he was 16 years old, and worked his way through school, mastering the English language and two others during this time. About 6 years after coming to this country, he went to Milan Missouri, where he married Mrs. Sarah J. Wheeler. He came to this county almost a half-century ago, living on Eckler mountain for 49 years. His wife died many years ago.

Mr. Johnson leaves no brothers or sister, but 6 children survive him. They are John R. Johnson, Roy Johnson, Mrs. R.A. Marll, Mrs. John Randolph and Mrs. Delos Rayburn of Dayton and Charles Johnson of Falls City, Oregon. He also leaves 12 grandchildren.



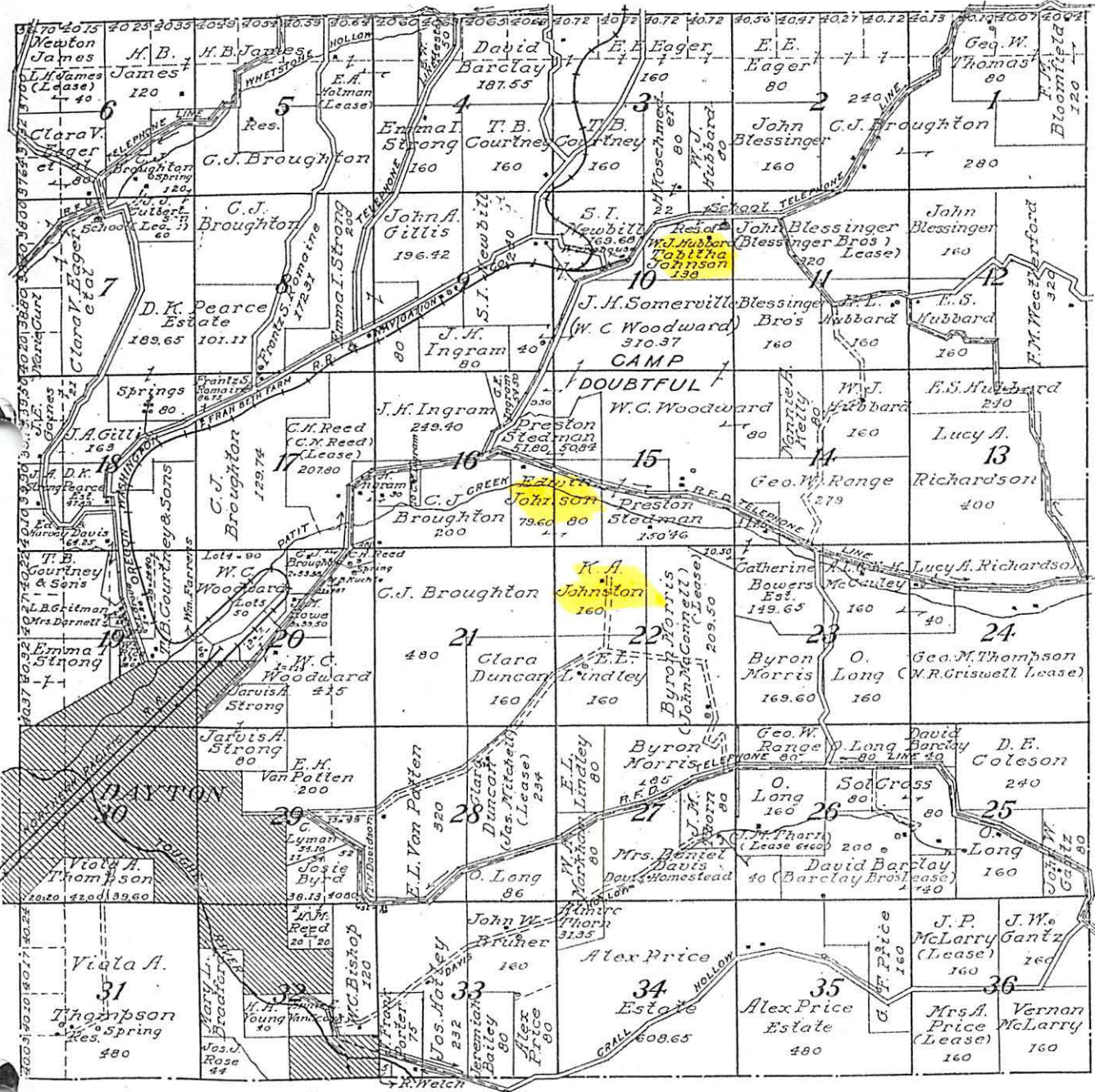
MAP OF

Danish family active in county's early development

Sue Dickinson presents the following story.

The adventurous Rasmus Christian was the first of the Jensens to arrive in America. He was the second youngest son of John and Anne Marie Jensen, who lived in the village of Orsted, Denmark. John Jensen, a tailor, hoped all six of his sons would follow in his footsteps and become tailors, as well.

At the time Rasmus Christian made the decision to leave Denmark he had just completed his apprenticeship as a blacksmith and was about to begin serving his compulsory time in the Danish army. He and his brothers had heard a lot about America, about the Dakotas, Iowa and Minnesota, and they agreed someone from the Jensen family should go. The older brothers and their sister were married: only Andreas, Rasmus and Jens were still single. Andreas was serving his time in the army. Rasmus eagerly volunteered to be the first to go.

In March of 1879 he paid \$75 for a ticket and set sail for America,

promising to send for Andreas and Jens as soon as he had made his fortune.

The young Dane landed in New York with little money, but with the spirit of a pioneer. Working for the railroad, he made his way to the Midwest, settled, and sent for his brother, Andreas. Because of the severe winters there, they traveled on and chose Dayton to make their start in 1886. Rasmus "Chris" hired himself out to a man named Burkhart, working in his blacksmith shop. Andreas, who had changed his name to Andrew, worked on the railroad and later for Weinhard Brewery.

As they earned money, they sent tickets for friends and relatives, including their younger brother, Jens, to join them in Washington Territory. All the Jensens, when they arrived in America, became Johnsons. Three of the boys later sent tickets for their sweethearts back in Orsted, Denmark. At the last minute one of the girls got cold feet. This was Clara Warren's golden opportunity.

A Swedish girl, Clara had mov-

ed to Denmark when she was fifteen to be with her sister. When the chance came to join the other girls on the boat, she took it, answering the other young woman's boarding call. On June 7, 1888 they arrived at the train depot in Dayton, where they were met by the Johnsons, brothers and cousins. Andrew and Clara, who met for the first time that day, were married two years later in the tiny Congregational Church.

They built a house on West Patit street, where they lived until 1897, when they bought a farm on the Whetstone. That farm is now owned by the Bramhall family. Andrew and Clara had four children, Charles, Jennie, Hazel and Lenora. Jennie was destined to marry the son of another pioneer family.

The Johnsons (Jensens), by their sheer numbers if nothing more, had an impact on early Dayton life. Rasmus "Chris" found local jobs for his brothers Andrew and Jens and his cousin Nels, but left the area when yet another adventure beckoned, homesteading in the Big Bend country. Jens "Jim" was 21 when he left Orsted on a ship that had both sails and a steam engine. He worked for local farmers until he had saved enough to buy land near Starbuck. He and his wife Mette returned to Denmark for the births of all three of their children.

The only one of John and Anne Marie's sons to become a tailor was Therkind Jensen. He remained in Denmark, choosing not to follow his brothers to America, but several of his sons came to Dayton. Peder "Peter" was nineteen when he came in 1900 carrying with him a diploma proving he was a finished suit maker. He recalled that the trip across the ocean took 21 days. He worked on ranches during the summers and tailored in the winters, finally going to work for a "Scotchman," Mr. Nichol森, who owned the only tailor shop in Dayton. Eventually Pete bought out Mr. Nichol森 and later turned to farming when he purchased 160 acres on Smith Hollow, where he said it was "so dusty and dirty hardly anything would grow there."

John Johnson, another son of Therkind, came to Dayton in 1906; he worked at the Dayton Flour Mill for 46 years. His great interest, though, was music. He founded the Pioneer Orchestra in Dayton,

played violin, and made several of the instruments for his family and friends. His brothers Martin and Anders came to Dayton later. Robert Johnson, Laura Harris, and Paul Johnson, offspring of these brothers, still live in Dayton.

Clara (Mrs. Andrew) Warren Johnson's sister Marie Peterson settled in Smith Hollow. Her grandsons Leo and Leslie Peterson and families are still Dayton residents. Clara's brother Robert Warren settled into farming near Pomeroy. His son Robert and daughter Amelia Talbott now reside in our county. All these grandsons of the Swede Robert Warren are local farmers: Warren Talbott, and Gene, Glen and Bill Warren.

Some spell the last syllable with an "o" and others spell it with an "e," but the Johnsons, as many of them are known here, are very closely related in blood and spirit and are a very hospitable lot as the guests at their parties will agree.

They met for their sixth annual re-union at the Dayton city park Sunday, but they do not always favor Dayton with their picnic, and will meet at Clarkston next summer, and probably at Colfax the succeeding June.

Following the dinner, which was notable for the fragrant coffee and delicious cakes, as well as all of the other good things that the Johnson women folk can prepare second to no one in the county, the meeting was called to order, and these officers were elected for the coming year: Matt Johnson, Clarkston, president; John Johnson, Dayton, vice president; Dean Johnson, Farmington, treasurer; Mrs. Hazel Holmes, Spokane, secretary, and Mrs. Jennie Zink, Starbuck, historian.

A program of entertainment was given which included; accordian music, Pete Johnson; vocal solos by Albert Johnson and Mary Peterson, instrumental music by Keith Grim, Ronald and Maren Johnson, and a reading by Freda Peterson.

Andrew Johnson of Dayton was honored as the eldest member of the family present, and he felt twice honored when his grandson, Kyle Pugh of Cheney, was distinguished for having the largest family present, seven members, and very proud of this nice family was everyone.

CHARLIE JOHNSON KILLED

Telephone Message Tells of Death but No Particulars of Accident.

Friday at about noon Frank Maxwell received a phone message from his son Golby saying that Charlie Johnson had accidentally shot and killed himself that morning. The sheriff, the coroner and a group of Charlie's friends left immediately for the scene of the tragedy, but had not returned last night at press time, so but very meagre details of the sad accident were available.

Thursday, Lige Walker, John Hawthorne, Golby Maxwell, and Charlie Johnson left for a hunting trip and were on the Starveout ridge, near the Morgan Woods cabin, when Charlie met his death. It is not known whether his gun exploded while he was cleaning it or just what happened and his family suffered hours of suspense, hoping against hope that he might still be alive, before any definite news was received.

Charlie Johnson, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Johnson of this city, was born and reared here and graduated from the Dayton high school in 1911. He early became interested in farming and was always very successful at it. He entered military service early in the war but did not see service in France as the ship upon which he sailed did not get across before the signing of the armistice, and was called back by wireless. Charlie Johnson was one of the finest young men this county has ever produced, and he was respected and admired for his sterling qualities by all who knew him. There were expressions of deep sorrow everywhere his name was mentioned yesterday. Besides his parents, the young man is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Will Dickinson, of Starbuck, and Misses Hazel and Lenore Johnson of this city, and friends without number who feel a very personal loss in his sudden and tragic death.

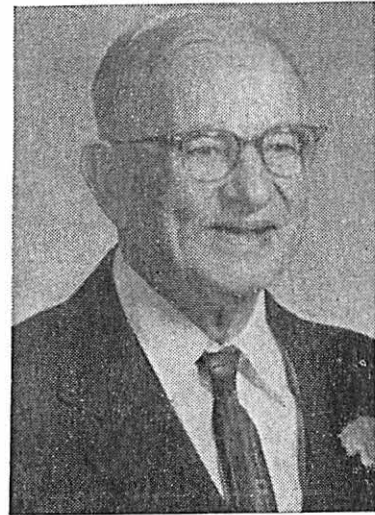

To Dayton in 1900

Pete came to Dayton from Orsted, Denmark in 1900 and revisited his homeland several times during the 40 years he lived here. He was persuaded to come to America by his uncles who settled in Dayton and the Palouse country. His uncles were Andrew Johnsen of Dayton and James and Rasmus Johnsen of the Palouse country.

He has one sister, Elsie Marie (Brown) Gutschmidt of Seattle and two sisters, Ane Marie Jensen and Therssa Kerstine Andersen, living in Denmark. Three brothers, now deceased, who lived in Dayton were Martin, John and Anders Peder (Ed) Johnsen.

When Pete first came to Day-

ton he worked at the tailoring trade, which he had learned from his father and grandfather, in the winter months and worked on wheat ranches around Dayton in the summer. Johnsen married Kristine Marie Sorensen in Ebeltoft, Denmark, in February, 1915. She died in February, 1973.

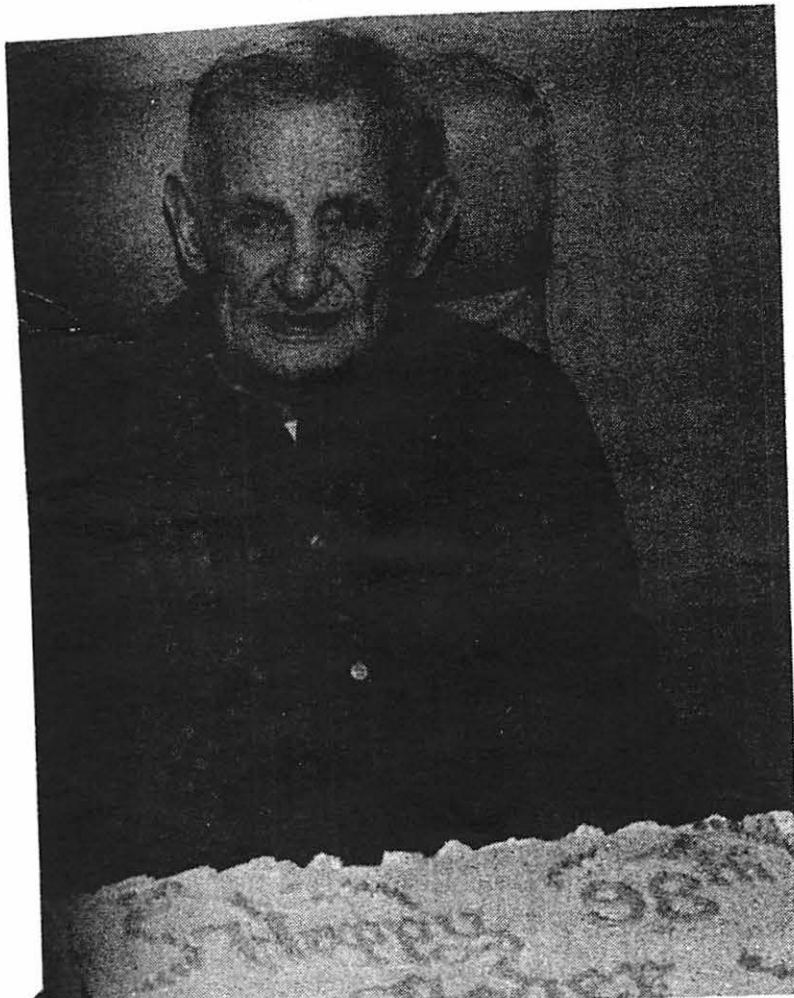

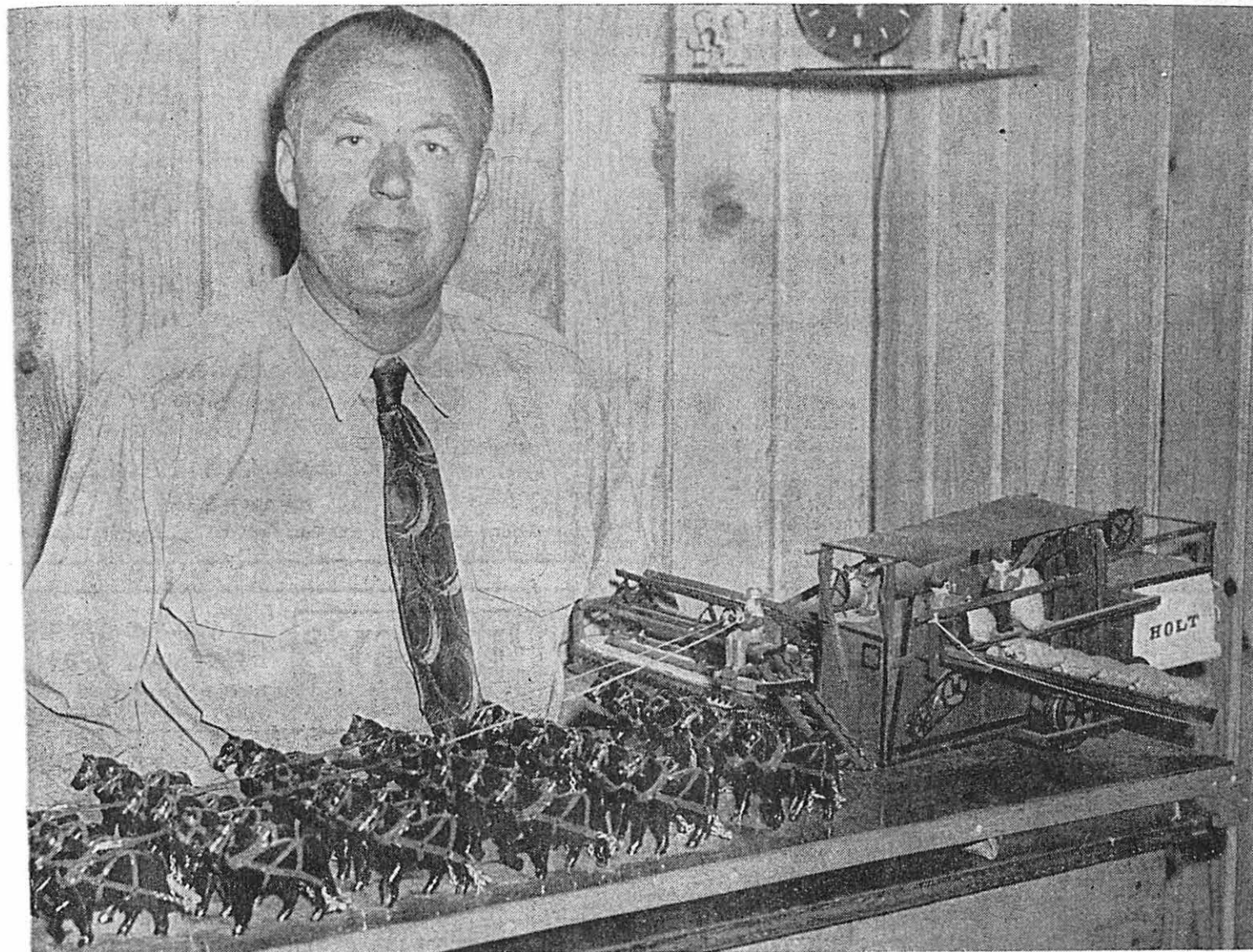

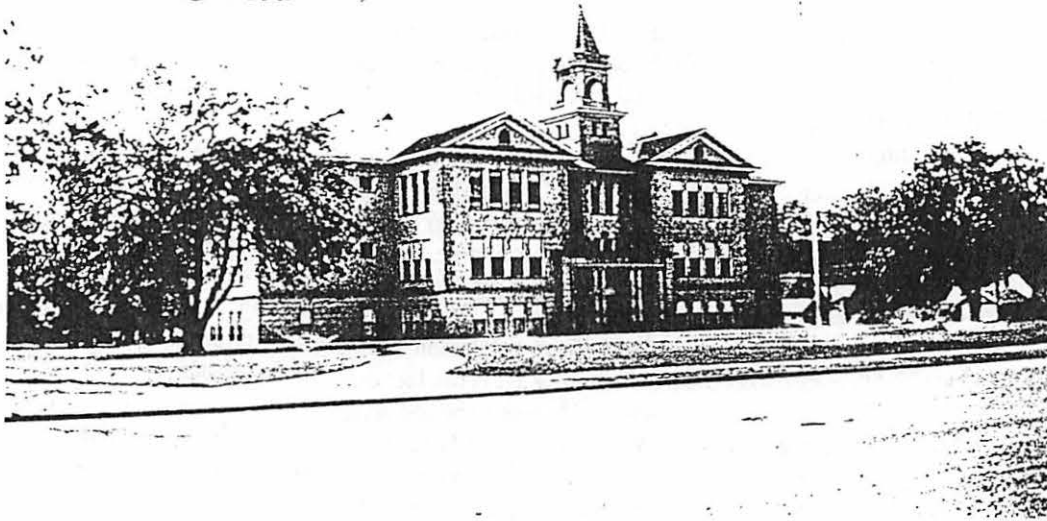

Jack Resigns School Job

From the *Chronicle Dispatch* - May 20, 1948

I. F. (Jackie) Johnson has resigned his position as building superintendent of the city schools, effective July 1, the beginning of the new school year.

"Jackie" has held his present position since 1907, 41 years, starting with the first year of his residence in Columbia county. In August he will be 73 years old, and came to Washington in 1890 from Kansas.

Many are the folks who got their schooling more or less under the watchful eye of Jackie, and so far as is known, none ever left the school with any but kind words for the man who looked after the buildings and the furnaces. When Jackie first started with the district he was the janitor, but in the passing of the years the job grew into building superintendent.

R. C. Hatley has been selected by the board of directors to replace Mr. Johnson.

Old School Building Being Razed;

Sentimental Landmark Soon Gone - 7-16-54

The contractor was scheduled to start razing the old central school building yesterday. You readers who received your education in that building had better be taking your last look, but quick, for soon there will be naught to look at or to bring back fond memories of when you and Maggie were young.

The building was built in 1903, according to information supplied by Supt. Carl A. Nelson and cost \$55,000. It was built stout and with the idea that it would last indefinitely; even the partitions are of brick.

In 1903, according to Mr. Nelson's figures, the Dayton high school had an enrollment of 96 pupils. These had their class rooms in the upper story. The two lower floors held part of the city's elementary school pupils. Others attended classes in the Upper Primary, Brooklyn school and Railroad school, with a total for the four of 724.

Last year the local high school had an enrollment on October 1, of 218. The elementary school had an enrollment of 570, for a total of 788. The total enrollment of all schools in Dayton in 1903 was 820.

There is quite a difference in the county-wide enrollment in the schools. In 1903 there were 49 school districts in the county and these had a total enrollment of 2,085. On October 1 last year the county had a total enrollment of 892, and the districts had dropped to four. The reduction in the number of districts was the result of consolidation by reason of the reduced enrollment.

Other things have changed, too, in that time span. The average salary of men teachers in 1905 was \$500 a year; for women teachers, \$450. Today the teachers in Dayton's high school receive \$4205 per year and in the elementary school, \$3947.

The old building, substantial as it is, is costing \$9000 and the salvage for razing. The school district salvaged everything "that was loose," but everything that was "fastened down" belongs to the contractor.

The district had an advertisement the first of the week for teachers and pupils desks and some chairs, and Tuesday the teachers desks and chairs were going like hotcakes at a cowboy breakfast.

Retired Dayton Janitor Had Many Bosses Over 41 Years - Nov. 7, 1948

Dayton is the home of a man who bears a unique, if not extra-ordinary, distinction in that he has a record of 41 years on a job where the identity of his employers has changed many times.

I. F. Johnson is that man, and his job was

that of school janitor. He assumed retired status at the close of school last spring, a few weeks before he celebrated his 73rd birthday. He came to Dayton in 1907.

In latter years the word "school janitor" has been changed to "custodian" but in an interview with Johnson a few days ago, the oldster insisted that he started out as a janitor and he finished under the same title. "I didn't graduate to the custodian level," he chuckled.

Another slant about this man Johnson, and it emphasizes the man's popularity, is the fact that he has two nicknames. He was baptized Irvin Farmer Johnson. While living in Walla Walla he acquired the name "Irve" and more recently in Dayton he is spoken of as "Jack." Even the first graders call "Hello, Jack" when they meet him on the street or school grounds.

Said Johnson: "The present central grade school building housed the high school on its top floor, the third to eight grades on the two lower floors. During my first year here there were three separate small buildings in various parts of town where the first and second grades were taught. The present high school building was not used until 1923."

The old-timer recalled that while Dayton had football, baseball and basketball teams during the early period of his service, basketball games were staged over a period of years in an old church building on Syndicate hill, known as the band hall. There was no attempt at teaching music.

It has been a town topic around Dayton for years that "Jack" Johnson had the warm friendship of the great number of children who have gone through the scholastic mill there. "I thought many times that Dayton must have a more orderly class of youngsters than many places you hear of," Johnson said when questioned on that point. "I never had any trouble with them."

Probably a prime reason for this was Johnson's affable personality and his understanding of youngsters.

In numerous instances, three generation of the same family have been students while Johnson was janitor.

One thing that Johnson is very proud of is the fact that in all his 41 years there have been no fires in school buildings.

About the last - but far from the least important - subject under discussion during the interview was a fine arm-chair rocker that was presented to Johnson by the school children and teachers of the Dayton schools when he called it a day and turned his job over to his successor, R. C. Hatley.

"Maybe you think I don't value that chair very highly," Johnson declared. "If you do, you are dead wrong."

SCHOOL SUPT. CARL NELSON ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT FROM EDUCATION CAREER Retirement Effective At Close Of Present School Year of 1962

Carl A. Nelson of Dayton, dean of school superintendents in the state of Washington, announced his retirement from the education profession, effective at the close of the present school term, yesterday evening, January 10, during the regular meeting of the directors of Dayton School District No. 2.

Superintendent Nelson revealed his retirement plans last night to climax a teaching career which has spanned a total of 39 years, with 36 years spent as superintendent of the Dayton district.

He came to Dayton in the fall of 1923 as science and mathematics teacher and baseball coach. The following year he was named principal of Dayton High School, and on April 1, 1926, was chosen superintendent of schools.

Superintendent Nelson, a member of Dayton Kiwanis club since 1926, was named Kiwanian of the Year for 1961 last Thursday evening, January 4, at the annual Ladies' Night program.

He served the club as president in 1935 and was lieutenant governor of Division 16 in 1940. He was district attendance committee chairman in 1941 and was a member of the Kiwanis International attendance committee in 1942. His latest service to the club was as a member of the board of directors during the past year.

(Ed. Note: When Mr. Nelson served as a member of the board of directors, which was 1961, I was playing piano for Kiwanis and I am still doing that. I started in 1960. I am very proud of this fact SO I just had to tell the world about it.)

The fire department was busy for two hours after the fire was under control putting out smouldering hay. A lucky east wind kept the blaze from getting at several buildings and houses clustered near the barn. Jackie was able to get his car out of the barn, and said he had insurance on both the barn and hen house. Cause of the fire has not been determined.

With her at the time of her death were her four children: Ray Johnson, Oakland, Calif.; Mrs. H. H. Haynes, Dayton; Mrs. Rosemary E. Dolin; and Clyde C. Johnson, National City. Three other children, Carl, Edmund and Lester, preceded their mother in death. Also left are these grandchildren: Howard, Hubert and Robert Torrance, and Roberta, Loree and Carol Johnson; four brothers: Walter H. Bartges, Portland, Oregon; Wm. J. Bartges, Sacramento, Calif.; and Warren E. Barges, Long Beach, Calif.; and a sister, Mrs. Roy M. McClary, Portland, Ore. The late Mrs. Rómetta Wood, a well known pioneer of Columbia county, was Mrs. Johnson's oldest sister.

Mary Temperance Bartges was born in Albany, Oregon, October 20, 1866. She, with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. George H. Bartges, moved to a wheat and stock ranch on the Whetstone in October, 1872, and this is known to this day as the Bartges place. They made the trip by wagon, carrying provisions and equipment, and a carriage to accommodate the mother and children. Mr. Bartges stopped in Salem, Oregon, to take his family to the

Oregon State Fair, then in full swing. It proved a novel and exciting experience which was remembered throughout the lives of those attending.

Winter had set in when the Bartges family reached the ranch on the Whetstone, but nothing daunted they made the best of conditions and Mrs. Johnson often recounted the days of the happy childhood spent on the ranch. She and her brothers and sisters attended nearby schools until Mr. Bartges moved the family to Dayton in 1883 to give the children the advantages of city schools. There the family home was maintained until after the death of Mr. and Mrs. Bartges.

In 1885 Mary Bartges married Wilson B. Johnson, a neighbor's son, and lived in or near Dayton until 1909. A FATAL ACCIDENT.

Death of Carl Johnson By Accidental Discharge of a Shotgun.

Last Saturday afternoon Carl, the 10-year-old son of Wilson Johnson lost his life by the accidental discharge of a shotgun at the ranch 12 miles up the Touchet. The young boy and his older brother, 14 years of age, were in the hay field, where the gun had been taken to kill rattlesnakes, which had been quite troublesome this year, several calves having been bitten. The gun was left empty, but the boy Carl always had a desire to shoot the gun, and had often been refused permission to do so, and was warned not to touch the gun, which had been left near the water jug. The boy went for the water jug and shortly afterward the brother heard a shot. He feared something had happened and when he arrived at the spot found his little brother dead, with the flesh blown from the upper left arm as well as the flesh from the left side of the face and both eyes blown out. Death must have been instantaneous. The dead boy had evidently previously procured two cartridges, one of which he inserted in the gun and the other was found in his pocket. The funeral took place from his grandfather's residence on Fourth street, in this city, Sunday at noon.

FACES A SERIOUS CHARGE

Old Man Arrested for Misconduct With Young Girl.

OUR LANDS IN GREAT DEMAND.

Half Million Dollars Worth of Land Changed Hands.

Richard Johnson, an old man 72 years of age, and a resident of this county for many years, lies in a cell in the county jail, charged with the crime of rape upon the person of Maude Fanno, a nine-year-old girl.

Johnson was arrested late Monday afternoon on the Tucanon by Deputy Sheriff Frank Bauers, and brought to this city Tuesday morning.

The specific date of the crime charged was committed Sunday afternoon, when the prisoner and the little girl were caught in their unlawful act by the girl's mother, Mrs. John Smith. The Smiths reside on the Upper Tucanon and have been providing a home for Johnson for more than a year.

The mother, who swore to the complaint is said to have wrung a confession from her daughter that the undue intimacy between her and Johnson had been going on for some time.

The prisoner refuses to make any statement as to his guilt or innocence until his preliminary hearing which will probably be held before Justice J. W. Holman some time this week.

LEONARD JOHNSON DROPS DEAD ON THEATRE STAGE

Leonard C. Johnson, a former resident of Dayton, died suddenly at Ririe, Idaho, last Tuesday evening, while enacting his role in the last act of a play at the Ririe theatre, according to newspaper advices received here. He was a member of the Lanham Players, who were touring south Idaho. Death was due to acute heart trouble. Johnson, who was 21 years of age, had not been well for several days before his death, complaining of pains in the region of the heart.

FRANK JOHNSON DROWNED.

Frank Johnson, son of H. H., better known as "Cayuse" Johnson, was drowned in Dry Creek, several miles above Dixie, sometime since the 29th of May, when he was last seen alive. Johnson was living on a homestead up there and it is supposed that sometime during the high water he accidentally fell into the raging creek and was drowned. His father and several brothers reside on a farm north of Prescott, and the whole family are well known hereabouts. The deceased was about 45 years of age and a bachelor. The coroner examined into the case thoroughly and decided that there was no occasion for an inquest.—Prescott Spectator.

24 July 1915

Aged Lady Lost for 24 Hours.
Mrs. Johnson, who lives on Starve-out Ridge, wandered away from her home Thursday morning and could not be found for 24 hours. She became famished for water and when found was beside a water hole so small that she could not get her face down to it. She would thrust her hand into the water and then lap it off. There were about 10 neighbors hunting for her all night. Finally Sheriff Wooten was called Friday morning. Accompanied by Jim Stevens, Timothy Newell and a man named Smith the sheriff went to the scene. The sheriff and Mr. Smith hunted together and found the old lady in the canyon by the little spring. She had evidently slid down a very steep mountain side in search of water. She is the mother of Cayuse Johnson and is 80 years old. The sheriff took her to the county farm.

Johnson, died about 13 years ago, and Mrs. Johnson leaves ten children, all but two of whom, J. L. Johnson, of Huntsville, and B. G. Johnson, of Weston, Oregon, live in the middle west. The late Mr. and Mrs. Johnson visited their children in this part of the country in 1920.

Aged Matron Passes After Lingerin' Illness

Mrs. John H. Johnson died at her home on Patit and Front Street, Friday night at about ten o'clock after a long period of falling health. Funeral services were held at the Methodist Episcopal church Monday afternoon at two o'clock under the auspices of the Rebekah lodge with the Rev. H. E. Bashor officiating.

Robert D. Johnson, 49, Suffers Fatal Injuries In Afternoon Crash

Robert Douglas Johnson, 49, 2700 Naches Highway, Yakima, maintenance foreman for the electrical sub-contractor at Little Goose dam, became the first traffic fatality of 1967 in Columbia county Thursday afternoon, January 26, as he died from injuries suffered in a two-collision.

The near head-on collision took place between 3:30 and 4 p.m. Thursday two miles west of Dayton on Highway 410 near the intersection of the Payne Hollow road.

Johnson, driving toward Dayton, was trapped in his smashed 1966 Mercedes Benz auto. He was freed from the twisted metal by Art Whitmore and Walter Grubb, volunteer drivers for Columbia County Ambulance Service, and by Bob Ellis and Al Durfee, mechanics from George Mashek Ford.

DOA at Hospital

The severely injured man was freed from the vehicle and placed in the ambulance about 4:30 p.m. He died enroute to Dayton General Hospital. Dr. E. J. Harri was called to the accident scene and administered to the injured man.

Lohman Catron, 28, 748 6th Street North, Havre, Montana, was driver of the other vehicle involved in the crash. Catron, employee of Field Enterprises, Inc. was westbound driving a 1955 Oldsmobile.

Catron escaped the head-on crash with lacerations of both knees, a cut across his left eye and numerous scrapes and bruises. He was treated at Dayton General Hospital and was released Friday.

A. W. McLain of Dayton, who came upon the accident scene, volunteered use of his auto to bring Catron to the hospital while the ambulance drivers were attempting to free Johnson from the wreckage.

The fatal accident was investigated by Trooper Tom D. McRae and Sgt. E. L. Larson of the Washington State Patrol of Walla Walla. Deputy Sheriff L. G. Payne of Dayton was at the accident scene to direct traffic and assist.

Said Over Centerline

The preliminary report filed by the investigating trooper indicated that the Johnson auto was over the centerline of the highway at the time of the collision.

Johnson, a journeyman electrician, was employed as maintenance foreman on the graveyard shift by Don W. Close Co. of Seattle, electrical sub-contractor at Little Goose Lock and Dam. He had been employed at the dam site for the past year. During the week, Johnson lived at a trailer at Steve's Trailer Court in Dayton and traveled to his home in Yakima on weekends.

He is survived by his wife, Eileen N. Johnson, and several sons, one of whom left for duty in Viet Nam in December.

The wreckage of the Catron automobile was cleared from the roadside ditch near the Ed Mock home on Route 1 by Bill's Wrecker Service of Dayton. The Johnson vehicle was towed to Dayton by the Mashek Ford wrecker.

Bobbie Lee Johnson First Highway Death In County for 1973

Bobbie Lee Johnson, 43, 519 Coppei, Waitsburg, became Columbia county's first traffic fatality as he was killed in a one-car accident at 11:53 p.m. Tuesday, March 6, about 4½ miles west of Dayton on Highway 12.

Johnson, driving a 1969 Plymouth Fury, was westbound at an extremely high rate of speed, according to investigating officers. He failed to negotiate the corner just west of Lewis & Clark Trail State Park and traveled along the shoulder and ditch out of control for 490 feet.

The auto bounced at an under-the-highway cattle crossing and traveled another 44 feet before shearing off a telephone pole. The driver was thrown from the vehicle at about this point and skidded down the highway. His body came to rest near the centerline in the eastbound traffic lane.

The auto continued another 148 feet before it came to rest on its wheels in the ditch just off the right hand shoulder.

The body and vehicle were both located nearly in front of the rural home of Mrs. S. L. Mays.

Johnson's son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Charter (Linda) Doyle of Waitsburg were following and witnessed the fatal accident. Mrs. Mays placed the emergency calls when awakened by the crash.

The vehicle was demolished with parts from the vehicle strewn along the highway and shoulder.

Trucker Assists

An eastbound Garrett Freightlines truck, driven by Robert Divin of Lewiston, Idaho, came upon the scene shortly after it happened. Divan guided his truck around the body in the highway, stopped and used his truck fire extinguisher to put out a fire which had broken out in the engine compartment. The trucker then placed flares and directed traffic until law enforcement officers arrived.

Rural Fire District No. 3 was alerted to the possible fire but the truck was not put into use.
