



TO present the thousands of flowers we offer for your gardens this year, the buyers of Vaughan's Seed Store have searched the world.

The day of romantic plant explorers, wresting from forest and plain hitherto unknown species, is almost over. But in every civilized country are breeders whose explorations are quite as exciting. Science has taught new ways to seek new flowers, and none can tell when or where a notable find may be made.

So the seedsman who insists that his list be comprehensive, must cover the world in his search for new varieties.

FIFTY-SIX YEARS OF PROGRESS

But to Vaughan's, this is no new problem. Since 1884 we have kept intimate contact with flower breeders everywhere. Carl Cropp, vice president, who came with a thorough European training to take charge of the flower seed department in that year, has directed this department through the amazing progress in flower production and ornamental gardening of more than half a century.

Periodical trips abroad have been made through this half century, and since flower

seed breeding developed on a large scale in our country, centering in California, trips of inspection to the growing fields have been made several times each year.

FINAL TEST OF QUALITY

But this alone does not suffice. The merit of seeds cannot be finally ascertained in the laboratory or by inspection. The merchant, as well as his customer, must rely upon the skill and honesty of the grower, and accept his representations as to the most important matters of inheritance and trueness to type. Not until they have grown, can their quality in these respects be determined.

To make this final test, and keep a constant check on the reliability of our growers, we plant samples of their seeds in our test garden, or

Midget Blue is a delightful little plant for edging, being uniformly dwarf and true to color from seed. The delicate fine foliage is practically smothered with small true ageratum blue flowers. 2 to 3 inches. Where ageratums are used for ribbon planting, or edging, the most important qualities are compact growth, uniformity of size, habit and flowering season, and a production of flowers so abundant that the foliage is almost hidden. Golden Spider Flowers On 8-foot Plants

Culture: D or E (Feb.-March)

1802 The Golden Cleome. ☐ A new color in the spider flower. Blossoms resemble Cleome Pungens in form, but are of a rich gold, approaching orange, carried in abundance on stems which will grow eight feet. To keep them lower, crowd the plants. Like Cleome Pungens, its rose colored cousin, the flowers of this plant are attractive to bees. This is one of the most vigorously growing annuals, and can be used to fill up large gaps in the border. The plants grow with a single stem, which develops wide spreading branches, each of which terminates in a profuse raceme of golden blossoms. It is a tender perennial which we grow as an annual. It prefers a location in the full sun, and likes sandy soil. The flowering season lasts from mid-July until killing frosts arrive. Pkt., 25c.

CULTURE OF WATER LILIES

SOIL: Any good garden loam is satisfactory, but where soil must be brought in, the best type is a heavy clay loam of the type used for roses. Do not use gravel, sand, peat or leaf mould.

FERTILIZER: To ten parts of soil, add one part of Vaughan's Balanced Plant Ration, and mix well. Or one part of shredded cattle manure or pulverized sheep manure may be added to four parts of soil.

BOXES: In small pools, the plants are best set in boxes, which, if made of pine or cypress and kept under water, will last for 20 years. Boxes should be at least 12" deep and 18" by 18" in surface area. While certain varieties can be grown in smaller boxes or tubs, these do better in the larger container.

PLANTING: Fill the boxes within two inches of the top, and pack well. Set the tuber upright, leaving about two inches of the crown above the surface of the soil. Then fill to within half an inch of the top with coarse sand. If large gold fish are kept in the pool, a thin layer of coarse gravel will keep them from disturbing the soil.







Asparagus

A SPARAGUS from the home garden is one of the most delicious and earliest of crops. It may be grown in any deep, rich soil, either from seed or roots. SEED PLANTING — Asparagus may be raised from seed and a crop obtained in three years. In early spring sow the seed, after soaking it twenty-four hours in warm water, in drills about one foot apart and one inch deep. The following spring, select the best of the roots and place in the permanent bed. One ounce of seed will sow 100 feet of row, producing 300 plans.



Pea Cultural Notes

Peas are a cool-weather crop. They should be sown when the ground is ready to work, without delay. The smooth seeded sorts will stand cold and freezing weather without rotting in the ground, but they are not so tender or sweet on the table as the wrinkled kinds, which are more risky in the wet soil, but still worth taking a chance to get early. Dwarf peas are best suited for the garden where space is scarce. They are early and bear well. It is important to have rich soil, somewhat light, and to give plenty of water if a full crop is to be produced. It will pay to use a balanced commercial fertilizer in the row when the seeds are sown. Do not crowd the seed. It is better to sow in single rows, with two inches between the seeds, or in double rows, the rows six inches apart, and seeds two inches apart. Closer sowing will produce no greater crop.





How to Sow Flower Seeds

N FIVE paragraphs below, designated A, B, C, D and E, we cover in considerable detail the methods of starting flower seeds which are available to the amateur without a greenhouse, and which cover well the needs of an outdoor garden. In the flower seed section in the case of each flower listed, information is given as to the cultural methods which can be used for that subject, together with the most

favorable time for propagating. While our cultural instructions are thorough, they should be supplemented by reading in good gardening books and by obtaining at first hand advice from successful gardeners in your neighborhood. Success in gardening requires study, and the opportunity for enlarging one's information and trying out new things is one of the most fascinating features of gardening.

Sow in the bed, border or row where the plants are to grow. The soil should be loamy, with well pulverized surface. With heavy soil inclined to cake and crack, it is usually best to grow plants in a seed bed (B) and transplant to the permanent place. Loosen the soil where seeds are to be sown, with the trowel, or hoe, several inches deep. Rake smooth. Broadcast small seeds and cover them lightly four or five times their diameter. Very small seeds may be merely pressed in. Larger seeds may be planted singly, well covered, but more thickly than plants are wanted. Firm the soil well over the seed. Watering now becomes of great importance. At no time should the soil be allowed to become hard and dry, yet excessive watering may cause the seeds to rot, sour the soil, or cause "damping off." When the plants appear, thin them out, allowing each to grow singly, without crowding. The distance between them is governed by their ultimate size and spread. Excess plants may usually be moved to a new location.

Sow in outdoor seed bed, to be transplanted. The seed bed in the open should be of loose, mellow loam, raised slightly above the surrounding surface, and preferably surrounded by a wooden curb, to prevent rain washing across it. It should not be wider than four feet, so it can be worked easily. Shelter from high winds is valuable, but damp and shady corners are not desirable. Full sun is advisable when seedlings are up, while shade when needed, as in mid-summer for perennial seedlings, is best supplied by a lath or cloth canopy, which can be removed in damp and cloudy weather. Sow the seeds in rows which may be as close as five inches. Sowing and water-ing are the same as described in "A" above. Seedlings may be transplanted when they make true leaves, the second pair of leaves to appear; or they may be left until larger before being moved to their permanent location. Perennials should be moved from the seed bed to a nursery row, to grow until fall before being moved to the border.

Sow in flat, pot or pan outdoors or in a cold frame. This method is applicable to slow germinating subjects, some of which may take a year to germinate. Fill the receptacle with potting soil as described in "D," firm the soil and broadcast the seed, covering four or five times their diameter. Place the receptacle in a shaded location, where there is free air circulation. During the spring, summer and fall, water often enough to prevent soil from drying out.

A mulch of peat moss will help retain moisture. In winter, place in a protected place outdoors and cover with leaves. Have patience with slow germinating subjects; do not disturb too quickly. Any live seed will eventually grow if given time enough, provided soil, moisture supply, etc., are right. When seedlings appear and make true leaves, transplant to pots, nursery row or permanent location. If moss forms on soil surface, sprinkle fresh earth over top.

Sow indoors in a box, pot or pan. This method may be followed where there is a window facing south, enjoying sunlight most of the day. Use a standard florists pot or pan (shallow pot) or a "flat", which is a shallow box, with holes bored in the bottom for drainage. Cover the drainage holes in pot or box with broken pottery; fill with potting soil. This is a mixture of half sand and half black loam. It may be obtained from florists. Firm the soil, and sow the seeds in rows, marking each row to identify the sowing. Water by setting the box or pot in water, so that it soaks up from below, or use a fine spray which does not wash the soil. Place in a dark place, covered with a wet newspaper blanket until the seeds sprout. As soon as sprouts appear bring into full light. Cover the box or pot with glass to check evaporation, but when moisture collects on glass wipe it off, and prop up one end of the glass to allow air to circulate during the sunny part of the day. A temperature not below 50 degrees at night, or 75 degrees by day, is best. Do not allow the soil to dry out. When the seedlings have made true leaves (the second set), they should be transplanted to other flats, giving at least two inches of space apart; or they may be moved to small pots or to an outdoor seed bed or border.

Sow in a hot bed or cold frame. A cold frame or a hot bed heated by manure or other means may be used. The best method with flower seeds is to sow seeds in flats, which are placed in the frame. With manure heated beds, seeds should not be sown until the temperature of the newly made bed has dropped to 90 degrees. Watering and ventilation are important. On sunny spring days, always prop up one end of the sash to prevent overheating, which may occur quickly and cause spindly growth. Do not allow the soil to dry out. When the seedlings have made true leaves, they should be transplanted to other flats, spaced two inches apart each way; or to the soil in the hot-bed, or to an outdoor location, if late enough.

PROLONGING THE LIFE OF CUT DAHLIAS

Many plans have been tried to make Dahlias look well when cut. We have found that the hot water treatment is the most effective. After the Dahlias have been cut, strip the foliage from the stem except at the top; recut the stem and immerse in water as hot as the hand can bear, being sure that hone of the foliage gets in the water. When the water cools the Dahlias are transferred to a pail of cold water and left in the cellar over night. We have found that they keep several days and increase in size.



Hardy Lilies for Spring Planting

HARDY lily bulbs, of 1939 crop, carried over the winter in cold storage, may be planted in the spring, and will blossom in midsummer, when the garden needs their glory.

Lilies are truly among the most beautiful of all bulbous plants. They are especially suitable for planting in herbaceous borders, and enjoy a position where they are protected by the shade of surrounding plants. Light, well-drained soil is recommended. Bulbs should be planted 5 to 6 inches below the surface, and to prevent the accumulation of excessive moisture, surround the bulb with coarse sand and fill in with a mixture of fibrous loam and leaf-mold.

Many varieties are termed "stem-rooters"—that is, they develop roots on the stem up to two or three inches from the ground. These roots are voracious feeders, and on them depend greatly the number and size of flowers. When they appear, the plant should receive a top dressing of good rich soil on which they can feed freely.

For the smaller varieties, plant in clumps, the bulbs about 6 inches apart, leaving more space for the strong and larger species. The most striking mode of planting is in groups of 3 to 9 bulbs in a mass.
