


#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT



## AFFILIATE REPORT FROM NSW CAMELLIA RESEARCH SOCIETY TO NATIONAL CONGRESS 2020

#### Impact of Disasters and CV19

This Year's report will be somewhat affected by the impact that CV19 and the environmental crises have had on our Society. Many of our members are in the age and health categories that prevent them meeting in numbers. Our meeting and Show venues also cannot cope with the numbers of people who would attend and which were both closed during the crisis/pandemic. Over the past year material from our newsletter has featured in the Camellias Australia Journal as well as being distributed to the National President in the USA who then passes it to their affiliates. This has led to a friendly association with the Camellia Society of Oregon.

Our Society has had to resort to Committee Meetings via "Zoom" and our monthly Bloom Competition has now taken an Online Format. Entries to the competition now come from a number of members who cannot normally attend our meeting due to their homes' locations. The upgraded Newsletter has been our way of keeping in touch with all of our members as well as all of the other states' societies who have a newsletter themselves.

One aspect of the CV19 restrictions has been that the general public have spent more time in their own gardens and to keep them in good order some are purchasing product from our sponsor. This will enable us to make up the financial shortfall of the **Cancelled Annual Show**.

#### How Have Members' Gardens Coped with the Extremes of Weather?

Some of our members in the Blue Mountains had their homes and gardens in real danger and were damaged during the extreme bushfire season. A number of members have seen specimens bloom for the first time this year following the drought and the substantial rains in March. This has certainly been the case in our garden where the sheer number of flowers on some shrubs has made a magnificent visual impact.

#### **Related Garden Reports**

As our Society is bound to "Eryldene" the home of Professor Waterhouse, we have noted the extreme impact of a major storm event last November. This brought down a number of significant trees and large branches of others, some of which caused damage to the house and study as well as a number of camellias. Some parts of the gardens and street frontage were declared unsafe and were fenced off from the public. Then CV19 struck and the whole precinct was locked down. Professionals were engaged to remedy some of the arboreal problems and the house is slowly returning to normal. Within the house, a program of restoration, including painting, has continued and the results are very pleasing.

Our Society has had a long-standing relationship with **Lisgar Garden**, in Hornsby Shire (upper north shore of Sydney). This year the garden was nominated for the award of An International Camellia Garden of Excellence. Towards this end ICS nominated Tony Curry, from our Society and Anke Koschitz the ICS Director for Germany and Austria to inspect the garden for the possibility of the award being granted. Dr Stephen Utick has worked tirelessly on the project (by the way he is also a member of our Society) and it was a pleasure to see it all come to fruition recently. A number of our members and those from other societies made the trip of the Delegates and their partner/s a much fuller program while in Australia.

#### Bereavements Since our Last Congress

A number of our past and present members and friends passed away earlier this year. They were: Dr Barbara Walker, Richard Fischer, Jim Lykos, Wai Davidson and one of the real personalities of the gardening world—Ben Swaine.

#### .. THEN TO WAHROONGA



If you visit Margaret Levick's garden at Wahroonga it is well to remember that when she and Peter bought the property it was a "Bushland Block". There were numerous Turpentines (some of which still stand), Sydney Red Gums and two Sydney Blue Gums. These were cleared by hand with a  $180 \text{cm} \times 25 \text{cm}$  two-man handsaw. Today their lovely home is surrounded by garden beds and in them are perhaps 300 different Camellias. Peter propagated and named two new Camellias for his children: 'Sally Ann'; for Sally Ann (reg.1983) and 'Fluffy Buttocks'; for David (unregistered).

From a start at the Ku-Ring-Gai Horticultural Society in 1956, they were advised to join the youthful and vigorous Camellia Society in the hands of Professor E. G. Waterhouse.

At Margaret's wish, this will mainly be a pictorial essay highlighting some of the interesting varieties in their garden. While on our stroll, Margaret explained the *C. rosiflora* (which was in full bloom) is much favoured in Japan because, "The blooms fall face up, making a carpet of beautiful little flowers and the Japanese have water under the trees for them to float in".



Another interesting flower was found on a seedling of 'Henry Turnbull' (pure white), an unnamed scarlet red copy. Margaret has a small plant of 'Roger Hall Variegated', which was in bloom and is one of Carolyn's favourites. Another beautiful bloom is the soft pink, informal double, 'Cara Mia'. Little red and white flowers are seen in 'Tama–No-Ura' and 'Bokuhan'




