Comma Splice, Comma Fault, Fused Sentence, Sentence Fragment A comma splice is the incorrect joining of two independent clauses with a comma rather than a conjunction or semicolon. Ex. The day was hot, it made me sluggish. (incorrect) The day was hot; it made me sluggish. (correct) HINT: A semicolon acts like a period; it separates independent ideas.

A comma fault is the incorrect use of a comma.

Ex. The dog came barking to me, and, I gave her a bone. (incorrect) The dog came barking to me, and I gave her a bone. (correct) A fused sentence (also called a <u>run-on</u> or <u>run</u> <u>together</u> sentence) is the <u>incorrect</u> joining of independent clauses with <u>no</u> conjunction or punctuation.

Ex. The day was hot it made me sluggish.

A sentence fragment is a piece of a sentence, such as a phrase or dependent sentence, incorrectly punctuated as if it were a complete sentence.

Ex. On the second floor of the building.
