### Finance Issues Put on Agenda

The board of directors on Feb. 1 will conduct public hearings on four proposed additional appropriations, only one of which would require the use of town funds.

The other three proposals would be financed by outside contributions.

The appropriation which would be financed by town funds is a \$4,000 item to the Elections Budget, part of which will pay the unforeseen costs of the Feb. 17 special election to elect a new senator from the 4th District. Another part of the additional appropriation will be needed if the town's five voting districts, as proposed, are increased to six or nine, for the October and November elections.

The other three proposed appropriations are:

1. To the Library Board, \$1,605, for the purchase of books. It would be financed by a grant from the state in the same amount.
2. Board of Education, \$43,300, for the "Aid to Disadvantaged Children" program. It would be financed from a \$41,300 grant from the federal government, plus a \$2,000 grant from the state.
3. Public Works Department, \$8,700, for the cost of engineering work for relocating the Thompson Rd. sanitary sewer system. It would be financed by an equal contribution by the Hartford Electric Light Co., which will benefit by the relocation.

The actor made the switch from private to federal detective with his usual suavity. While he's not enjoying the same high ratings of "77," the new series is doing passably well.

"Damn well considering what we're up against — Ed Sullivan and Walt Disney!" he said on the Warner Bros. set. "It's almost inhuman to put a show against powerhouses like those two."

"But our producer, Quinn Martin, says that last week we passed the number of viewers we were aiming for this season, so I think we might survive. I think ABC should just be happy we kept the time slot alive."

"The FBI" did not fulfill its preseason promise, considering

the high caliber of its elements: J. Edgar Hoover, Quinn Martin and Zimbalist. But the latter, at least, is content with the way the series has progressed.

"When I was doing '77,' the sameness of it was deadening,"

he said. "The FBI" is changing all the time. And even when I have a script which I think is pretty bad, I come to work and find myself acting with people like Ed Begley and Margaret Leighton. That makes it all worth it."

The work load has been enormous. Last week, he found himself working in two segments at the same time, moving back and forth between sets.

One location called for him to report to Los Angeles International Airport at midnight and work until 3:30 the following afternoon.

Will "The FBI" make it to next season? Zimbalist thinks so. That's all right with him, even though it may mean only a week's vacation between seasons.

"But I don't think it will go more than two or three years," he said. "Television series nowadays don't last as long as '77,' which went for seven years. Take 'Ben Casey,' it was a big hit two years ago; he's going off the air now."

## 'Movies Are Better' But They're on TV

NEW YORK (AP) — There was a time, only a couple of years back, when the CBS network adopted a slightly superior attitude toward the other two because they were using good prime television time for re-running old movies.

It just wasn't real television, was the network attitude, grandly pointing to "The Defenders" and "CBS Reports," which presumably were.

Well, this season CBS leaped into the old movie business, joining NBC and ABC in the conviction that prime-time fea-

tures are an easy way to high Nielsen ratings. Thus this year we have Sunday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday movies, totalling eight hours a week — four of them on NBC.

CBS did so well with its Thursday evening film spot that next season it will convert the last two hours of Friday night to movies too, the network has announced.

But even vintage feature movies which have been gathering dust in studio vaults are expensive acquisitions. ABC-TV announced Tuesday that it had acquired a batch of feature films for broadcast next season — and the price for the lot was \$10,000,000 for use over a two-year period. Among them are "Cas Cas" with Frank Sinatra, "Olympic" with Kirk Douglas, "The Young Lions" with Marlon Brando and "Move Over, Darling" with Doris Day.

Television is gobbling up old movies for local daytime shows, late shows and now, prime-time network shows at such a rate there is concern about exhausting the supply. Several studios and all networks are interested in projects involving feature-length motion pictures for television, after which they would be used as theater entertainment.

NBC was involved in a discouraging experiment along those lines two seasons ago. One show was deemed unsuitable for broadcast and another was just not a very good movie — or even a good two-hour television show. They also were expensive.

## Judge Upholds TV Film Cutting

NEW YORK (AP) — Producer Otto Preminger can't keep his film "Anatomy of a Murder" from getting under the knife of television's surgeons.

A State Supreme Court justice ruled this week that the right of a producer to final cutting and editing is limited to the original or theatrical production and not to television showings.

But Justice Arthur G. Klein said the right to interrupt motion picture showings on television for commercials and to make "minor deletions" to fit the time requirements has been considered a "normal and essential part of the exhibition of motion pictures on television."

# Youthful Millionaire Defends Teens' Rights

"The grown-ups are saying, 'The just like us, and the kids are saying, 'Why?'"

This is a summing up of the teen-age position by Phil Spector, the soft-spoken millionaire who is the musical director of ABC-TV's "Swing Ding Night With The Dave Clark Five at T. J.'s," the color musical special on ABC-TV, Friday, Jan. 29 (7:30-8 p.m., EST).

As a Very Big Man in disco, Spector made his first million at 21 by writing, arranging and supervising the recording of songs that almost uniformly hit the million-plus mark in sales, primarily to the teen population. He not only writes their songs, but talks their language, wears their kind of clothes, expresses their thoughts, and — if no other defender is around — fights their battles.

"Sure, they dress wild," says Spector. "But why not? You take 10 million junior execs climbing into their round-shouldered dark suits every morning. Is that fun? Is that freedom? It's howling down to some kind of faceless authority. There's too much of that kind of authority. Why not crack the mold, let in some fresh air?"

"And the people who turn green when they see a kid wearing his hair long, so did George Washington and Shakespeare. These people should get

so excited over bigger problems.

"The kids are groping, searching for values. But who isn't? I think good will come out of it."

But, Spector was asked, will those who people the adult world ever take to rock 'n' roll with the same enthusiasm as teen-agers?

"First of all," he explained, "I don't call it rock 'n' roll any more. There's been a change in the music. More variety — in tempo or beat, in themes, everything. I just call it popular music. Because that's what it is."

"As for when the adults will go for it. Like now. All these discotheques. Those people out on the dance floor aren't kids. What do most radio stations play all day when the kids are at school? The big beat. They wouldn't be playing it if nobody was listening. You go to parties, that's the music they're dancing to."

Spector was asked to make a comparison between the contemporary pop music scene and that of the big band era of the '30s and '40s.

"It's like comparing a jet with a prop plane," he said. "Billington, Basie, Glen Miller — that had great musicianship. I like that music, mildly. But I don't know, it's kind of bland."

# Clarinetist Plans Duet With Long-Dead Pianist

Twenty-three-year-old Sammy Rimington plays a duet with a pianist who's been dead for more than 25 years on WTC-TV's PERCEPTION Sunday.

Rimington, an English clarinetist now living in Bridgeport, will perform with a piano roll made in 1934 by the late Ferdinand "Jolly Roll" Mocton. He will follow a performance of "King Porter Stomp" with Mocton by playing an encore with the late Scott Joplin, the father of ragtime. The piano roll selected for the encore is Joplin's immortal "Maple Leaf Rag," which is reputed to be the first of all ragtime compositions.
