Eban At The UN For some time, there have been half

movements from various directions which indicate that, in the midst of much world turmoil everywhere else, an unusual amount of serious thought is still being devoted to the possibility of a permanent and stable peace settlement in the Near East.

The address by Israel's Foreign Minister Abba Eban before the United Nations General Assembly the other day did two things. One thing it did was recognize the existence of such an atmosphere of po-

stive possibilities. He spoke directly of this in the concluding paragraphs of his address. "Lest Arab Governments," he said,

"be tempted out of sheer routine to rush into impulsive rejection, let me suggest hat tragedy is not what men suffer but what they miss. Time and again these Governments have rejected proposals today - and longed for them tomorrow The fatal pattern is drawn across the

whole period since 1947 - and before. "It may seem ambitious to talk of a peaceful Middle Eastern design at this oment of tension and rancor. But there is such a thing as fusion at high temperatures. Diplomats noticed in his language an apparent disposition to accept ndirect negotiation, perhaps through the offices of the Jarring mission, in place of the direct negotiation with the Arab states which has hitherto been one of the basic demands of Israeli policy. Foreign Minister Eban himself gave the torturesome problem of refugees what seemed a more direct discussion than

usually comes from Israel. These touches and hints of amelioration of some of Israel's hard positions come in a time when there have been fitful indications of similar explorations from the Arab side, and a time when an outside power like Russia has suddenly seemed ready for unusual diplomacy in behalf of some settlement of the Near

Eastern question. The one thing Israel and Foreign Minister Eban most soundly reject is the prospect of any settlement which is based on any guarantee from big powers or any combination of big powers. A true peace in the Near East must eventually be made in the Near East by the peoples of the Near East, and it cannot be decreed from Moscow or London or Paris or Washington, or from all four of these capitals acting in unison. The United Nations, on the other hand, can help, as the continued absence of any final, conclusive failure on the part of the Jarring Mission has been indicat ing for many months past. The continued existence and operation of that Mission is welcome. The signs of slight diplomatic movement from both the Israeli and he Arab side are welcome.

achieved a certain degree of victory and vindication, attracting to his standard people who might otherwise have been merciy inclined to revolt against politics altogether.

Now, with all that in his experience and on the record, Senator McCarthy finds himself expected to decide that, for the purposes of the present political campaign, he really wasn't totally serious about his beliefs, he didn't really think principle had to be fought for down the line, he wasn't really leading a crusade, but merely a mild, tactical maneuver.

The Senator may wind up doing what is expected of him, and endorse a candidate, a platform, and a party whose stands have not yet satisfied the principles for which he campaigned last winter and spring. But if he does stand firm for his beliefs, and remain difficult for his party, we suspect it will be because he himself realizes something that does not seem to suggest itself to the party - that any contrived, hollow endorsement from him would not be worth much to anybody.

Roads Of Their Own

Those trucks which now infest the nation's highways get there under the blessing of federal law which allows them a minimum weight of 73,280 pounds, and a maximum width of 96 inches.

President Will Make Gun Control Bill Law

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson indicated today he will sign the strongest gun control legislation in the nation's, and history but called for cotinued efforts for registration of guns and licensing of gun owners.

A bill outlawing mail order sales of rifles, shotguns, and ammunition passed Congress Thursday. Without waiting for it to reach the White House, Johnson said he was glad the public would be protected now against indiscriminate mail order sales.
