CLEVELAND (UPI) - Trying desperately to prevent municipal bankruptey and a state takeover of Cleveland's finances, Mayor Dennis Kucinich prepared plans today to lay off 3,500 municipal employees - including half the city's police and firefighting

City union leaders said they would seek court action to stop the mayor's emergency austerity program. They said the proposed layoffs of 1,000 police officers and 500 firefighters would endanger the public's health and safety. City Council President George

Forbes also said he plans to per sonally meet with Cleveland business leaders hoday and ask them to pay their real and personal property taxes early to ward off layoffs.

# Assassin Try

TOKYO (UPI) - A knifeweilding man posing as a reporter today tried to assassinate Prime Minister Masayoshi Ohira as the conservative politician was about to leave his official residence, police reported

Police officials said Ohira narrowly escaped injuries but that two private guards who subdued the suspect, identified as Sumio Hirose, 21, suffered minor

Hirose was placed under arrest and taken into custody.

Reporters assigned to cover Ohira, who became Japan's prime minister Dec. 7, reported that Hirose had been in the press room of the prime minister's residence since earlier in the day.

By United Press International Americans will start feeling the first effects of the latest OPEC price increase almost immediately.

That was the initial reaction of the utilities, the transportation industry and countless other oil-dependent businesses who were attempting today to assess the impact of OPEC's decision to increase the price of cruide oil by a total of 14.5 percent next year.

The price increases, announced Sunday by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries will take effect in four stages, with the first one, of 5 percent, slated for Jan.

The response was almost immediate: a spokesman for Standard Oil Co. of Indiana, for example, said 2 cents will be added to the price of gasoline within the next two weeks.

Consolidated Edison Co., which provides electrity for about 3 million customers in New York City and Westchester County, predicted the full price increase for oil to run its power generating plants would boost its own rates by 4 percent. Con Ed also has 2,400 steam

customers in Manhattan, all owners of large buildings, and their rates were expected to shoot up 10 percent. In Washington, Energy Secretary James Schlesinger predicted an overall increase of 5 to 6 cents a gallon at the gasoline pump next year because of the OPEC hike and

because of an expected shortage in unleaded gasoline.

"You don't necessarily prosper by impoverishing your customers," said Alfred Kahn, the administration's top inflation fighter. "We are terribly disappointed. It can only enormously complicate our job of holding inflation in check."

Herb Hugo, senior editor of Platts Oilgram, said the 14.5 percent figure came as a surprise.

"Things had been looking rosy," he said. "Saudi Arabia had been trying to hold the price at 5 percent and everyone thought that the price would not go higher than 10 percent." For some companies, the effect was

not expected to be dramatic. Stanley Ragone, president of Virginia Electric and Power Co., said his utility's consumption of oil, which has been declining steadily, will drop once again next year with the opening of a fourth nuclear power plant.

And Charles Boyd, a spokesman for Arizona Public Service Co., the electric utility serving Phoenix, said, "We don't use much oil for generation - only a small amount - and most of the oil we do buy is the other three-quarters of the year

HONG KONG (UPI) - In a flush of oodwill between China and the United States, Americans visiting Shanghai were cheered by their hosts and Radio Peking announced today two peace envoys would be dispatched to Taiwan.

Leonard Woodcock, chief of the U.S. liaison office to Peking, said Americans favor normalization of relations with Peking and predicted it would lead to expanded economic and cultural contacts qpth the two

nations. Woodcock also announced Sunday that Vice Premier Teng Hsiaoping. will visit the United States Jan. 29. American tourists sang "God Bless America" and "Home on the Range" to the applause of Chinese at a banquet in Shanghai shortly after President Carter's announcement Friday night that relations would be

The Chinese responded by singing their national anthem and clapping merrily as American visitors toured the streets of Shanghai.

Americans in Peking joined Chinese at newspaper stands to buy a special edition of the People's Daily, the official Communist Party newspaper, bordered in red to mark the historic occasion.

Woodcock, former president of the United Auto Workers, was widely quoted by the official New China News Agency.

There will be a substantial additional improvement in our relationship, commercially, culturally and in areas particularly of science and technology," Woodcock told a news conference in Peking.

Citing earlier agreements on an exchange of scholars, students and delegations, Woodcock said, "There are many things that possibly will be speeded up somewhat by virtue of our new relationship.

"The American people have been substantially in favor of the nor-malization with the People's Republic of China for some time and I am sure the action is met gith wide support," Woodcock said.

# Israel Won't Talk With U.S. Proposal

By United Press International Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan said today Israel will not resume peace talks with Egypt unless Cairo drops recent treaty proposals en-dorsed by the United States. Egypt accused Israel of obstruction and prevarication.'

The exchange came after the deadline for signing an Israeli-Egyptian peace treaty passed. The deadline Sunday was marked by a terrorist bombing in Jerusalem and an Egyptian columnist predicted today the United States will soon sacrifice Israel as it did Taiwan.



# Fires Kill Seven In Massachusetts

BOSTON (UPI) - State fire marshals today begin in vestigating the causes of two separate house fires tha claimed seven lives Sunday in eastern Massachusetts.

A Christmas party ended in tragedy when fire ripped through the two-story home of Philip Martin, 56; his wife, Ellen, 52 in the Boston suburb of Natick. The couple and their son, Stephen, 22, died in the blaze. Firefighters said they found three new smoke detectors

among Christmas gifts. The cape-style home was destroyed and officials were trying to determine whether the fire, that struck at 4:54 a.m. ignited from smoking materials. Fire Chief Richard Fahey said it appeared the victims died from smoke inhalation and autopsies were

Special police officer Robert Moller was on his way home from work when he spotted the second fire about 4:40 a.m. in Middleboro, about 35 miles south of Boston. Police said the officer tried to break into the Cape Cod style house to rescue Robert and Betsy Dunham and the wo teen-age daughters, but was driven back by the fire and smoke.

He ran to a neighbor's house and called for help, but Fire Chief Joseph Oliver said the interior of the house was ablaze by the time firemen arrived The Dunhams, both 40, and their daughters, Deborah, 5, and Denise, 13, were pronounced dead at the scene.

The fire followed an engagement party that had been given for Dunhams' son, Michael, 21, who was away from home Saturday night, police said. Fire officials said the house fire appeared to have been tarted by a wood stove, but further investigation was

# Costly Oil To Come Later

HARTFORD (UPI) - Connecticut takes effect Jan. 1. # Council To Hear **About Road Post**

COVENTRY — Town Manager Frank Connolly will tell the Town Council, at its meeting tonight at 7:30 at the Town Hall, that Dean Wiley has resigned as superintendent of streets. Wiley is the fourth highway department head to quit the post in shortly over two years.

"Wiley resigned for personal reasons," Connolly said in a memo to the council. "The resignation was effective mmediately. In his absence, I have appointed Bill

Goodale will be responsible for the overall operation of the department, except for hiring and firing, which Connolly will control. The manager has given Goodale a pay adjustment for the additional workload. Connolly will recommend that the council not advertise

the position immediately. In the past he has maintained that the responsibility and duties of the job were heavy for one individual. Under a reorganization of the department several years ago, the position of road supervisor was omitted, leaving the superintendent in full charge. Also on the council agenda is a meeting with State tepresentative Robert Walsh (Democrat, 53rd District) to discuss the upcoming session of the General Assembly Walsh has been meeting with town agencies this month to hear their legislative concerns.

The council will also meet with Leonard Benjamin to review and finalize the town's additional insurance costs. At 8:30 the council will discuss a revised budget format with financial consultant Gerald Dubois and with George Hill of the Institute for Public Service.

At the close of the meeting, an executive session is scheduled to consider negotiations between the town and the Salvation Army in a proposed purchase of Army owned land in Coventry.

PZC Meeting Tonight The Planning and Zoning Commission will hold its second regular monthly meeting tonight instead of next Monday because of the Christmas holiday. The group will convene at 7:30 in the Planning Office at the Town Hall.

At 8 p.m. a public hearing will consider a resubdivision application by Laurier DeMars for property in Trowbridge Road. Another session at 8:30 involves a subdivi sion on Cross Street for land owned by Eloise Weeks. A review of the town's seasonal dwelling policy is cheduled under old business. Town Planner Gregory Padick said he recently discussed Coventry's tangled regulations, on approving such cottages for year-round use, with Town Attorney Abbot Schwebel.

About 50 to 70 percent of the cottages in the lake area are being lived in year-round," Padick told the commis sion. "Revaluations of the homes were done in 1960 and in 1970, and the assessors accepted the word of the people living there as to whether they were seasonal or year-

He asked the PZC if the town could ask people to leave their homes off-season because they have no documentation to show year-round suitability when these people have been paying taxes for year-round homes. H suggested that a "relief mechanism" such as a special permit or exemption be allowed if the house in question meets certain health and housing code criteria.




