Home-rule charter taking shape

Freeholders will deliver 'common sense reforms'

The 15-member Board of Freeholders writing a homerule charter to go before Clark County voters in November is walking unusual ground on the political landscape. They're actually cooperating and finding agreement on issues.

"There has been a lot of consensus on both the left and the right," said Freeholder Randy

other freeholder. "We've all remarked that it's been a surprisingly-productive process."

Chairwoman Nan Henriksen acknowledged the positive atmosphere, too, saying, "This group is so politically different from each other but has worked well together."

The members were elected on a nonpartisan basis from three districts in the county. They've met several times since November 2013 and are scheduled to vote on a final proposed charter in late May. Then, Clark County citizens will weigh in during November's general election, with adoption requir-

During an April 8 meeting in Camas, the Freeholders decided on a method to elect members of the county council, as the new governing board would be called. Voters would select four council members by district with the chair being elected by a county-wide vote. Henriksen said that decision is firm because other aspects of the charter are based on the

election method. Freeholders went into last week's meeting favoring an election setup that would nominate candidates by district in the primary election with election of all positions through a counelection. That was changed during the Camas session after an hour of discussion.

Freeholder Garry Lucas said he favored the original plan to elect all five councilors county-wide.

"Nominating and electing by district creates a disincentive for council members to listen to citizens outside of their district," he said. The draft charter includes

some major changes in the structure of Clark County government.

First, the charter calls for

Volunteers work to transform pile of wood, metal into BG Rose Float

This year marks 60 years for BG Float

It may not have any flowers or much color on it yet, but work on the 2014 Battle Ground Rose Float has been well underway since February. Anyone who visits the Flex Building off of Grace Avenue in Battle Ground on Monday and Wednesday evenings or Saturday morning will be met with the sound of chainsaws, laughter and a hardworking crew of volunteers.

Every year, construction on Battle Ground's Rose Float starts off pretty basic with the wooden platform and the bare essentials to give the float its shape. Construction quickly gets more difficult and tedious as welding needs to be done, wood needs to be cut and fitted and electrical issues need to be resolved.

During the beginning stages of construction, a group of roughly five to 10 volunteers gather a few times a week at the Flex Building to build the float that will eventually be adorned with flowers, color and props. The theme of this year's Portland Rose Festival Grand Floral Parade is *Making Memories* and Battle Ground's float will reflect that its the float's 60th anniversary.

Many of the volunteers who participate in the early part of construction on the rose float have been doing so for several years, while others have just started getting involved over the past couple of years. For 19-year-old Austin Alling, this year is his second year helping with construction on the float. Alling, who also volunteers at the North County Community Food Bank, said he knew some people from the food bank and some other people who had helped with the float and he decided to check it out last year and ended up enjoying the

"I did a lot of the metal work," Alling said. "I just enjoy seeing how it's put together. Basically, from watching different parades, I'm always wondering how some of the floats are put together and how they work.

Darrell McClellan, a Vancouver resident, has worked on the rose float for about 10 years. McClellan said his sister was in charge of the float for a few years and was the one who got him and his wife involved. His wife makes the dresses that the Battle Ground Rose Float Princesses wear during the Grand Floral Parade each year.

"I enjoy working on the float," McClellan said. "It is great to see the transformation from a metal nothing to a piece of art that the community can be proud of. The people who work on this project every year are great and it is a lot of fun."

Alex Reinhold, a Battle Ground resident and former Battle Ground City Council member, has worked on the Battle Ground Rose Float for the past 18 years and said his children have grown up helping with the project along the way. Reinhold said Battle Ground's float is really what Battle Ground is known for in the metro area and having done almost every job on the float, he said each part has its own challenges and rewards.

"It's (working on the float) a great way to meet your neighbors and best of all you start with a pile of wood and steel, and after a few months you have this beautiful float," Reinhold said. "The satisfaction helping to create this thing of art and beauty is immense."

Bill Tucker, a long-time member of the Battle Ground Rose Float Committee and long-time Battle Ground resident, began helping with the Battle Ground Rose Float when

Easter Services

Lentz said almost every government structure in the U.S. separates the legislative and executive powers, but Clark County has historically combined them.

A third significant change under the charter would allow for Clark County initiatives and referendums. Henriksen said work on that part of the document is all but finished.

Lentz noted there's no real political aspect to any of the three major reforms, which is why meetings have proceeded without fireworks or acrimony.

'Our goal is to write a good

charter proposal that goes before voters will be something most people can support.

"You aren't going to see a ton of sweeping reforms," he said. "I think at the end we'll have a few common sense reforms that almost everyone can agree with. It's going to be some very reasonable reforms."

In 2002, a proposed charter was placed on the general election ballot in Clark County. It included three provisions - increasing the number of county commissioners from three to five, adding the powers of referendum and initiative, and requring commissioners to be elected only by district. The charter proposal failed by 187



 Create a model program for dealing with mental health and addiction issues in the jail. "We need to have a more comprehensive program for dealing with these issues, to not only provide for greater care for those affected, but to reduce the recidivism rate in the jail," Graser said. "We can create a model program that addresses these issues from a humanitarian perspective as well as being pragmatic about the tax dollars being spent."

Graser and his wife, Jeannie, have lived in Clark County nearly all of their lives and have two children, Amie and Brandon, along with two grandchildren, Cole and Frankie. Graser is a graduate of Fort Vancouver High School and Clark College, where he received his Administration of Justice degree. He also attended the University of Portland and is a graduate of Washington State Basic Law Enforcement Academy.

Where will the marijuana retailers look next?

It likely won't come as a surprise to anyone in the area who has been following the establishment of the marijuana industry in Clark County, but last week's announcement in The Reflector that the Battle Ground Market Center won't be home to a retail marijuana store doesn't mean one won't open in Battle Ground.

Battle Ground City Manager John Williams confirmed that one of the two applicants for a marijuana retail store in Battle Ground called and spoke with city staff members about other possible sites around the city for the proposed store.

"We were contacted by one of the applicants and one of our staff members had a discussion with them about other potential locations," Williams said. "West Main (Street) is probably about the only option. They could go farther out Main as we continue to expand over time, but there are no buildings out there right now so they would have to build from the ground up."

There are two main factors in a site qualifying as a potential home for a marijuana retail store. First, I-502 requires that all marijuana facilities be located at least 1,000 feet from the nearest existing school, park, playground, daycare center, transit center, recreation center or library. And second, the property has to be zoned for retail use.

In Battle Ground, as Williams pointed out, that dramatically narrows the number of potential sites available in the city. The area along Main Street on the west end of town is limited in terms of existing sites. One property that would appear to meet the qualifications is a strip of retail space located at 1908 NW 1st Way. The listed owner of the property is Peoples Community Credit Union, which has a branch located next to the site.

I haven't been able to contact the owners or operators of that retail building at this point to ask them if they have been contacted by either of the two retail marijuana applicants in Battle Ground, or if they would be willing to lease to them.

Williams indicated the existing

property in the Battle Ground Village, known as Commerce South, would also meet the setback requirements of

I-502. However, it is not zoned for retail use so a zoning change would need to be completed in order for a marijuana retail facility to be located

"With the amount of industrial property there, it would be highly unlikely,' said Williams, referring to the chances of a zoning change at the Commerce South site in Battle Ground Village.

Williams pointed out several times that city officials have very little control over the marijuana process.

"It's all under the control of the state," Williams said.

On May 2, the Washington State Liquor Control Board (WSLCB) will announce the winners of its lottery system that will determine which marijuana retail applicants will be awarded the opportunity to conduct business. Each of the two Battle Ground applicants listed the Battle Ground Market Center as its location. However, if either is awarded the right to open a marijuana retail outlet, the applicant will be given an opportunity to amend their application.

"If the landlord submitted a written document that said he/she would work with the applicants if they were selected then retracted during the process, we would allow the selected applicant to find a new location within the same jurisdiction," said Brian Smith, communications director with the WSLCB.

So, last week's news that the two applicants would not be able to lease a site at their desired location doesn't mean that they will be denied the opportunity to open a marijuana retail store in Battle Ground. It does mean, however, their limited options are now even more limited.

Woodland water system gets upgrade

Improvements will increase available water this summer

Woodland residents won't have to worry about a water shortage this summer, thanks to improvements being made to the city's well system.

A \$1.3 million project to boost the amount of water collected each minute from under the Lewis River should be completed by the end of April, said Woodland Public Works Director Bart Stepp. The work will add three "laterals" to collect more water and keep the city's reserves plentiful during summer months, when de-

"Over the years, the well has become clogged and has required maintenance," Woodland Mayor Grover Laseke wrote in a blog on the city

Stepp explained that the laterals are 12-inch screened pipes that spread out horizontally under the river bed from a 7-foot-diameter cement caisson. The mesh allows water to collect and flow into the caisson, then be pumped from that spot – known as the Bryant pump house – to the city's water treatment plant on Scott Hill. After being treated, water drains by gravity to points throughout the city for use in homes and businesses.

The city now has just

three laterals to collect water. Eight other laterals have been abandoned over the years because they became clogged or weren't providing water of acceptable quality, Stepp said. He suggested that three more laterals be added, and the city secured a \$972,000 Public Works Trust Fund Loan from the State of Washington to pay for most of the equipment and work. The remainder of the cost is being paid with city water funds.

Residents who use city water in their homes or businesses won't see an increase in their monthly water bills as a direct result of the project. Stepp said that's because a Woodland ordinance automatically boosts the cost of city water by 7 percent each year to have money on hand for this type of work.

"It takes into account doing these kinds of capital projects," he said of the ordinance.

The city has water rights for 2,800 gallons per minute at the Lewis River well where additional laterals are being put in place. Stepp said the city's water plant can treat 2,100 gallons per minute. But last summer during the year's peak demand, when the area gets its least amount of water, only 700 gallons per minute could be taken, he said.

"When you can only pump 700, the treatment plant is running 24 hours a day to keep up," Stepp said. "There is no water for future growth under that scenario. If we could treat 2,100 then in the summer the plant would only run 10 hours a day.

"It would save electricity costs but you'd also have water for growth. And if the power goes down for a few hours it's not a big deal because the plant can be off for a few hours" and still provide water

The city's well is a Ranney variety. The work, which began March 1 is by Layne Heavy Civil, of Columbus, OH, a company specializing in Ranney well projects, according to Laseke. He wrote in his blog that many Woodland citizens have asked him what's going on at the Bryant pump house across from the Fat Moose and Hi-School Pharmacy because they've noticed a crane, pumps, pipes, lots of equipment and workers in hard hats near the pump build-

This project, and the sewer pipe re-lining conducted last year, is an example of necessary maintenance and improvements to our water-sew-er utilities," Laseke wrote. "These projects are expensive but make our system reliable and safe. At the same time, the rates we charge our citizens must be sufficient to cover the costs of the projects and the loan payments.'

Stepp said the state loan paying for most of the project's cost will be paid back over 20 years.

Wildfire season officially begins April 15, as specified by state law, and already the Washington State Department

during the spring when warmer, dryer weather occurs with increasing frequency. Wildfires can damage natural resources, destroy homes, and threaten the safety of the public and the firefighters who

protect forests and communi-

Last year, a total of 764 fires burned approximately 126,219 acres. In 2013, 94 percent of the wildfires that burned on DNR-protected lands were contained to less than 10 acres in size. Overall, 70 percent of the wildfires on DNR-protected lands in 2013 were hu-

Dry and unhealthy forests continue to be a fire hazard and will for many years. It takes only one spark to start a fire that can have catastrophic results. Prevention of human-caused wildfires can reduce the risk of

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expensive, disruptive wildfires that damage habitat for birds, fish, and wildlife. These fires destroy homes and threaten the safety of the public and firefighters who protect forests and communities at risk.

Washington's summer fire

Washington's "summer fire rules" are in effect April 15 through October 15. These rules apply to the 13 million acres of private and state forestlands protected from wildfire by DNR.

These regulations affect loggers, firewood cutters, land clearers, road builders, bulldozer operators, off-road motorcyclists, and others. During fire season, people using motorized equipment in the woods must have approved spark arresters and follow fire safety precautions. In addition, those working in the woods must have fire prevention and extinguishing equipment in good working order at the job site and workers trained in proper use.

The rules are intended to prevent forest fires and to ex-

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tinguish small fires before they spread. Those same rules restrict cigarette smoking in forested areas to roads, gravels pits, or other clearings. They also prohibit lighting fireworks on forestland.

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

Seton Catholic site search continues

School still considering Ridgefield location for new construction

Seton Catholic High School of Vancouver has a problem that many private schools would like to have. It's been more successful than anticipated.

When the educational facility opened in September 2009 with 30 freshmen and 12 sophomores, school officials expected the building at 811 NE 112th Ave. would be adequate for eight to 10 years, said Gordon Rodewald, chairman of the school's board of directors. But that wasn't the

"We grew faster than anticipated in our original business model so we need to move," Rodewald said.

A 38-acre parcel the school owns in Ridgefield has been discussed as the possible place for new construction. However, Rodewald said last week that other sites are under consideration He declined to name those op-

tions or say whether they are in North Clark County. The parcel the school owns is on North 65th Avenue near St. Mary of Gudalupe Church.

"We are walking through a thorough due diligence to make sure when we site (the new school) it will be in the best spot," Rodewald said, adding that school officials want to make a decision sooner rather than later.

Although Seton Catholic owns the Ridgefield land, Rodewald said "we aren't ruling out any-

thing else." The school with grades nine through 12 now has 150 students. Principal Ed Little said. Like Rodewald, he said the desire is to move quickly to find a new loca-

"I am hoping the board will make a decision within two to three months," Little said.

Seton Catholic is a preparatory school that focuses on the academic and spiritual development of its students. Traditionally, 100 percent of Seton graduates go on to higher education, according to the school's website.

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

County seeks public comment on updated stormwater code manual

Clark County has prepared draft language updating its stormwater manual and county code for stormwater and erosion control. The changes are needed to comply with Washington State Department of Ecology's stormwater requirements.

A public comment period on the draft language will be through Mon., May 5.

Public comments will be incorporated into drafts submitted to the Department of Ecology in June. Clark County is required to adopt the code updates by June 2015.

Two code sections require

• 40.385 Stormwater and Erosion Control - Provides protection of water quality through the application of best management practices for stormwater management and erosion control to development and redevelopment projects.

 13.26A Water Quality – Provides minimum requirements for controlling the discharge of contaminants and stormwater flows to county storm drains, streams and groundwater.

The Clark County Stormwater Manual prescribes how development and redevelopment projects in unincorporated areas must meet stormwater regula-

tions. The draft manual will be a county-specific document that meets all Ecology's permit requirements.

'Clark County continues to refine its stormwater rules to comply with state and federal regulations," said Don Benton, Environmental Services director. "This may seem like a cumbersome process, but it's an important part of what we do to protect our environment from the harmful effects of polluted storm runoff."

The vacant parcel previously was used for agriculture and fertilizer processing. The site is polluted with polychlorinated biphenyl, or PCB, but the extent of contamination and potential cleanup costs are unknown.

The Fleischer property is near the southwest portion of the closed Leichner Landfill. Clark County is in the early stages of developing a master plan to guide future redevelopment of the landfill and adjacent parcels. The master planning effort currently does not include the Fleisher property, but does encompass the Leichner Campus. The 35-acre parcel to the south of the Fleisher property is flat, has no buried garbage and is zoned for light-industrial de-

"It makes sense for the county to study the Fleischer property as we work with the community to chart a future course for other properties in the area," said Benton. "This grant provides the resources for the county to do that, but it does not obligate the county to purchase the property or pay for its cleanup."

The owners of the Fleischer property are not in a position to pay for contamination studies and cleanup.

The \$200,000 state grant does not require a county match. The grant agreement expires at the end of May 2015.

Ridgefield couple has operated the iconic restaurant for 52 years

At the end of May, a county landmark that created memories for generations of Southwest Washington residents and beyond will close its doors forever. After 52 years, Ridgefield residents Bob and Merilyn Condon have decided to sell Steakburger Restaurant & Golf-O-Rama in Hazel Dell and embark on full-time retirement.

At that time, Highway 99 was part of U.S. 99, which extended to the Canadian Border. When Mr. Sanders heard a new freeway system was scheduled to be built, he was sure that would take all the business from his burger restaurant, so he decided not to renew his lease.

Condon tried to convince Sanders that the road revamping wouldn't affect his business, but Sanders was unwavering in his decision. So, Condon did what any 22-year-old man in his position would do – he struck a deal with then-owner, Mrs. Ritty, to buy the place. As much as she liked him, she wasn't comfortable with a man

his age assuming a \$12,000 loan, so Merilyn's father, Harvey Johnson, agreed to co-sign.

"My father had always bought and sold businesses and sold them for a profit, so I said to my father, 'But dad, this one you can't sell. It's going to be our livelihood," Merilyn said.

Right away, the Condons had bigger plans for Steakburger. The first order of business, however, was to purchase some speakers. Initially, Merilyn and her mother would run out to the vehicles and take the second car's order, run back in to the restaurant with the order and go right back out again – come rain or snow. There was no indoor seating originally, so in the first five years a small dining area was added to accommodate 20 people in tables of four. Merilyn said that as the years went on they kept seeing things that could be done to grow the business. Eventually the building that stands now was erected.

'In three days time we made the move to where we are now and got rid of all the previous buildings," Bob said.

In the years that followed, the Condons acquired a total of seven stores under the Steakburger name, which were eventually sold off, save for the one

that started it all. There were three actual Steakburger restaurants, the second most wellknown in the area probably being on Fourth Plain Boulevard in Vancouver where the Silver Dragon Restaurant now stands. All the while, the Condons worked directly with the community in a variety of ways. As Bob explained it, they worked a great deal with schools, sports teams and people with an array of disabilities.

Merilyn's dad was the brainchild behind the 18-hole golf course whose Mount St. Helens hole has baffled even the best of putt-putt golfers. As she tells it,

the land was a horrible eyesore of cottontails. In his travels, Johnson (Merilyn's dad) would spot miniature golf courses and photograph them. He'd come home, measure out the property and start working up a design. Bob Condon, Johnson and a retired farmer by the name of John Mosebar constructed the course. To the Condons, one of the great things about a puttputt golf course is that everyone is equal. A child can make a hole-in-one as easily as the grandfather spending the afternoon with him.

When the Golf-O-Rama was opened, there were between six in business; May 24-29.

to eight courses from Longview to Portland. To promote them, an association was formed. Two players from each course were chosen to play different courses on a rotating basis. Channel 12 would even come out to film it on the Saturday these events were scheduled and air the broadcast on Sunday. Bob recalls that this went on for a couple of years. Steakburger would fund the restaurant in the winter months and Golf-O-Rama would take care of it in the

summertime. As much as the Condons have loved being a part of their community for more than five decades, they're ready for the next chapter in their lives. Bob has meticulously maintained the grounds all these years right down to pressure washing the rugs every spring and replacing them himself every seven years.

The first order of business is a much-deserved, 23-day cruise and a trip to Ireland to visit a very unique castle that has been in Bob's family since 1412. After that, they intend to spend the next one to two years traveling around the United States.

"I would say that we want to thank the public for enjoying what we wanted to be good for them; the food as well as the entertainment and as far as the young people who've worked for us, we've enjoyed all of them," Merilyn said. "Over all, it's been our pleasure to serve the counties.'

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
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




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

She also is active in her church, Highland Lutheran near Woodland, where she's a member of a prayer chain





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

Rep. Harris advocates Medicaid funding

Funding is for skilled nursing and assisted living facilities around **Washington state**

ManorCare Health Services-Salmon Creek celebrated Rep. Paul Harris, 17th District, on March 26, 2014, for his advocacy to increase Medicaid funding for skilled nursing facilities in the state of Washing-

ManorCare Health Services-Salmon Creek is a member of the Washington Health Care Association (WHCA), and Harris assisted in their efforts to advocate for increased funding for skilled nursing and assisted living facilities throughout the state of Washington during the past legislative session. The recently-approved Washington state budget included \$22 million to provide an update to Medicaid daily rates for skilled

nursing homes. The funding for this proposal is generated by increasing a provider-funded "safety net assessment." Current nursing home Medicaid rates fall short by \$120 million annually. This increase provides a down payment on quality for rates that haven't been updated since 2007.

"Representative Harris was instrumental in ensuring that the safety net assessment was included in the supplemental budget," said Ben Young, administrator at ManorCare Health Services-Salmon Creek. "We wanted to take the opportunity to give him a pat on the back for his dedication to seniors and introduce him to the people whose lives he has improved."

While at ManorCare Health Services-Salmon Creek, Rep. Harris toured the facility ending in the dining room where more than 30 seniors and fam-

WHCA is still working to address funding for assisted living, which the budget failed to address. Washington's assisted living Medicaid rates have not been updated since 2005. The average assisted living Medicaid reimbursement rate is \$65 a day. That equates to \$2.70 per hour for a comprehensive package that includes 24-hour registered nurse coverage, room, board, medication management, and personal care service assistance.

ManorCare Salmon Creek is a state-of-the-art Post-Acute Rehab Facility located in Vancouver. They offer physical, occupational and speech therapies to patients who have recently experienced a hospital stay. ManorCare Salmon Creek opened their facility in the summer of 2011 and has been building their program since. CMS has given ManorCare Salmon Creek an overall 5 Star rating based on their last survey through the State of Washington. ManorCare supports approximately 190 employees including nurses, care givers,

therapists, housekeeping staff and dietary staff. They are located two blocks east of Legacy Salmon Creek Hospital, next door to The Vancouver Clinic. ManorCare's mission is to provide the best rehabilitation program as well as nursing care to post-acute patients in the Clark County area.

BGHS band teacher stays busy Umtuch and Tukes Valley mid-

Greg McKelvey doing better after having some health scares

Back in 2012, Battle Ground High School Band Teacher Greg McKelvey started to notice that he was having trouble walking from the band room on the high school campus to the stadium without having shortness of breath.

"At first I thought it was cold related, but it persisted," McK-elvey said. "Then one day I woke up and felt like I couldn't breathe. I called my regular doctor and he told me to go to the ER. I was still thinking it was cold related, but they ended up keeping me there for like four hours and they ran all these tests and then told me, 'you have congestive heart failure."

After hearing his test results at the ER, McKelvey, who will be 60 this year, met with his regular doctor who referred him to a cardiologist. The cardiologist ran an echocardiogram test and found that he did indeed have congestive heart failure and found some damage that had already been done.

"They put me on a regimen," McKelvey said. "The first thing I had to do was change my diet. I mean, they basically said you either change your lifestyle or you die. I've never had it put to me that way before."

The one aspect about his new regimen that was the hardest for McKelvey was that he needed to stop working 16-hour days like he had been doing during much of the week.

"The doctors told me I needed to get more rest, that was the biggest thing," McKelvey said. "I don't smoke, I'm a real light drinker, the biggest thing they said I needed to do was get more rest and eliminate stress.'

Although teaching is definitely not a stress-free job, McKelvey said when his students found out about his health issues, they actually worked to make things easier on him.

"For example, this was during the beginning of basketball season and the kids decided I didn't need to be at every basketball game," McKelvey said. "When I went to basketball games, I wasn't getting home until 10:30 or 11 at night (because of living in Aloha, OR), and I get up at 4 a.m. everyday to go to work. The kids really stepped it up and made things easier for me, they helped reduce my stress.'

Eventually, McKelvey had an angiogram done and his doctor decided it would be best if he had a defibrillator/pacemaker put in just in case if something were to go wrong with his heart,

the device would "kick it back in." Doctors think that what may have caused McKelvey's heart condition is the fact that he has severe sleep apnea, a sleep disorder characterized by pauses in breathing or instances of shallow or infrequent breathing during sleep. Like most people who suffer from sleep apnea, McKelvey has to sleep hooked up to a Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP) machine every night. With the help from the machine, medication and stress reduction, McKelvey said he has been feeling better.

"I still have some shortness of breath occasionally, but I'm able to exercise and do more," McKelvey said. "At this time last year, I couldn't play my

For more than a decade, Ridgefield couple Billy and Willie Pollard have been delivering old-time gospel music and uplifting devotionals on their weekly television show, Strolling Down Memory Lane.

With the help of YouTube, this local ministry, which began in 1999, has reached 17.5 million viewers. Every Wednesday, a new one-hour program airs and then it's downloaded on the internet site to broadcast worldwide. They've appeared on the Velugu Television Network in India as well as United Kingdom stations and have aired on GBU and the Isaac Network in Pakistan. All total, Strolling Down Memory Lane has been seen in 151 countries and the inquiries continue to come in.

"Just this past week this guy got me out of bed (via a phone call) and said, 'We'd like to put you on our Faith channel in Waycross, GA. We have a network and I saw you on You-Tube." Billy said.

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


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Prairie grad helps build house in Mexico

Football standout spends spring break helping others

Jesse Zalk, a 2012 graduate of Prairie High School, helped build a house for three orphaned siblings in Baja, Mexico over spring break.

Zalk is the son of Todd and Teri Zalk of Battle Ground, and is a starting football player for the Central Washington University Wildcats.

Zalk was among 11 CWU students and recent grads to take the trip March 25-29 to Mexico. The group was led by James Avey, PhD, an associate professor in the Department of Management in CWU's College of Business. Avey has helped build homes in Mexico

in the past and he sees the trips as opportunities for students to learn outside the classroom.

"The primary principle of leadership is, 'It's not about you.' To go and change someone's life and come home \$1,000 poorer, you can't get that in a classroom," Avey said. "Hopefully it will open their eyes and help shape them."

The group flew from Seattle to San Diego. Then they drove a van across the border. When they arrived at the build site they were met with a small crew of Mexican builders and a blank canvas: a cement slab with anchor bolts. The rest was up to them.

The guys not only provided the labor, but they pitched in cash to pay for the house — about \$7,000. The new

two-bedroom house with a loft went to three siblings: Carlos, 19; Jessica, 17; and Victor, 16. Their father was killed in a house fire and their mother lost her battle with cancer last year.

Seeing the poverty in Mexico brought Zalk out of his comfort zone.

"At one point you feel like you're really far from home, and then at another point, it's kind of like I'm right at home because I'm just with people just like myself," Zalk said.

The communication major said one of the many things he learned from the trip is how difficult intercultural communication can be. He also learned that he really likes authentic Mexican food; in just three days the group ate 212 tacos.

Lilac Days on tap in Woodland

Lilac Gardens' 2014 theme is 'Sewing Time in Yesteryear'

Antique sewing machines and acceessories will be displayed along with four acres of blooming lilacs as the 2014 Lilac Days celebration begins Sat., April 19, at Hulda Klager Lilac Gardens in Woodland. The event continues through Mother's Day on Sun., May 11.

The antiques coincide with this year's theme of "Sewing Time in Yesteryear." The theme is appropriate because Hulda Klager Historic Home, an 1880s Victorian farmhouse design, is on the National Historic Register.

Besides being able to stroll among seemingly-endless lilacs, visitors may purchase several varieties of lilacs and a limited supply of perennials. The gardens are open daily from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. and admission is \$3 for adults with children admitted free when accompanied by an adult.

There are some new twists for this year's Lilac Days. Dwight Trahin, who is in his initial year as the first male president of the Hulda Klager Lilac Gardens Society, said some restoration has been completed on the house as well as partial restoration of rhododenrons on the property.

"It's a five-year project to work on the rhododendrons," Trahin said. "Phase one is completed. They were planted many years ago, probably in the 1920s, so they were seriously overgrown.'

project was finding the garden's original rock path that had been hidden by vegetation,

according to Trahin. "It's re-graveled and the rhodies are cut back," he said. "It's kind of an interesting thing. It was something Hulda had.

While visitors will be able to see the old path, updates to the house will be less visible. Restoration work to windows and other items probably won't be noticed by most people, Trahin

But it's the lilacs themselves that take center stage each spring. Trahin jokes that when the plants bloom "isn't up to me," but he said many flowers are already putting on

"Some are hanging back a little bit (although) Purple Royalty is darn near at full bloom. We have to guess so far in advance to schedule Lilac Days. I don't know of any year when we've completely missed it. We've stopped hoping. We pretty much deal with what we

He anticipates the usual 17,000 visitors during Lilac

"The place is crawling with people, especially on the weekends," Trahin said.

The grounds feature covered areas for visitors to have a picnic or a snack. The house is open, too, and there's a gift

Trahin noted that, because the house isn't accessible to those in wheelchairs, a video loop runs in the potting shed to give non-ambulatory visitors a virtual tour of the house.

Special Needs Fishing Event a big hit

Over 300 volunteers help give children the opportunity to fish

Vancouver's Klineline Pond and Salmon Creek Park may have been closed to the general public for three days last week but it was open for a very spe-

On April 11 & 12, Klineline Pond was home to the annual Special Needs Kids' Fishing Day, put on by the Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife (WDFW) with support of Clark Public Utilities.

The park was closed to public fishing from April 9 thru April 12. Fish raised by WDFW put into the nets in the pond on April 10. Special Needs Kids' Fishing began at 8 a.m. on April 11. Parents, caregivers, and children stood on the banks of Klineline Pond as fisherman mentors helped the children

Rojo and Smokey - therapy llamas from Mtn. Peaks Therapy Llamas & Alpacas visited with the kids during the event on April 11.

On April 12, the fishing event

began at 8 a.m. Each child between ages 5 and 14 received a fishing rod and reel and a Klineline Kids Fishing t-shirt. Kids fished in groups for 45 minutes. Two trout were allowed per child. One volunteer witnessed two fish caught that were each over five pounds, including one that was over seven pounds and about 14 inches long.

Trophies, tackle boxes, and bicycles with helmets were given out as prizes during both days. Helmets were supplied by Clark County Fire District 6. US Fish & Wildlife held an archery clinic in the back meadow and talked to the children about invasive species and other things.

The event also included face painting, and coloring stations. Home Depot employees provided little wooden kits for children to use to build things. "All day Saturday, their booth sounded like a bunch of busy little woodpeckers hammering away," said Cindy Morgan, an event volunteer.

Families of the Outside Prison Ministries provided hamburgers and hot dogs for a suggested donation. Umpqua Bank supplied free ice cream bars. Hot cocoa and coffee was provided free of charge by Riverview Savings Bank. Nearly 2,300 kids fished on April 12 and 300 special needs kids fished on April 11. An estimated 8,000 people visited the park over the two-day event, which featured nearly-perfect weather.

This fishing event began with 1,210 kids in 2000 as a program of the Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife (WDFW) and Go Play Outside Alliance of Washington (Go-PAW). Funds were cut in 2010 and the 2011 event was threatened with closure, but a group of volunteers gathered together to make it happen. Klineline Kids Fishing nonprofit became a 501 c 3 in late 2011. In 2012, the organization served 2,400 children, no child was turned away. The event is growing every year and 3,200 children are expected to participate in the near future.

Klineline Kids Fishing aims

to accomplishes two goals: It gives children the opportunity to experience the thrill of catching a fish and educational sessions, held by WDFW, Clark Public Utilities, Columbia Springs and others, help children learn more about our natural resources and the outdoors. This event also puts children in close connection to the county's first responders. Firemen, police, game warden, and medics are present and available to visit with the kids. Children also make a one-on-one connection to fishermen volunteers mentor them in fishing.



grees. Kozak is employing his sales and business sense to market the product to a myriad of industries. Fast Line Finishes was unveiled at the 58th Annual Portland Roadster Show and Kozak has been fielding inquiries from that appearance. In the sport of motocross racing, it can be used to customize parts such as exhaust pipes and bars. Kozak recently met with a group of people interested in using the finishes on golf clubs.

"The only option right now (for golf clubs) is chrome," Kozak said. "So, if somebody wants purple and gold to match their Husky patronage then we can do it."

Kozak went on to explain that no one else has ever approached the golf industry with an alternative color. Himself a golfer for the last 30 years, he's keenly aware that golf, like any sport, is full of athletes looking for the latest and greatest new gadget to improve their game or just help them look better while playing it.

That's where Fast Line Finishes comes in. Their full reflective finish is similar, visually, to chrome but with color. Kozak likened full reflective to looking through water in a stream to the rocks below it and then a mirror image comes back through the water. It can be used on virtually any material from aluminum to titanium to alloys and magnesium to steel. The only real limitation seems to be plastic due to the heat required in the process.

As one item, that person will end up with 10 slightly different shades of the same color. Fast Line Finishes can give a consistent color to any metal using their matte finish.

With 2,000 colors to choose from, the greatest challenge using Fast Line Finishes may be narrowing down the selection. Their ability to create custom blends further increases the options for clients.

Looking ahead, Fast Line Finishes would like to have an East Coast and West Coast production presence for shipping efficiency, but for now Haney is located in Atlanta where the facility is set up. Drawing from his extensive background in the automotive industry and automotive finishes, Haney's focus is on the technical side of Fast Line.

Kozak's passion for bikes can be traced back to his dad, Al, recounting stories from his own high school days.

"I remember my dad talking about a friend of his from high school named Mert Lawwill, who won the national No. 1 plate in 1969 as a factory Harley Davidson rider, and then taking my brother (Scott) and me to the movies to watch a movie called 'On Any Sunday,'

"On Any Sunday" is a documentary still considered by many to be the best movie about the sport of motorcycle racing ever made. Kozak explained that it basically focused on three men; actor Steve McQueen, Motorcycle Hall of Famer Malcolm Smith and American Motorcyclist Association Grand National Champion Mert Lawwill (aka Kozak's dad's close high school friend). In his youth, his dad also helped a Boise drag racer named Al Russell work on bikes.

Kozak says he's always wanted to bring something new to motor sports and he believes Fast Line Finishes does just that. As with all his past successes, he's shooting for the stars and holding on to a vision.

"I know Jeff and I have talked about how fulfilling it would be to see our finish on a factory team bike on the starting gate in Las Vegas for the World Championship Supercross event or on some NASCAR team's wheels at Daytona," Kozak said.

Three-row crossover SUVs, the new family car

Giant SUVs and minivans replaced by the crossover SUV

Decisions, decisions, decisions. When it comes to deciding on which new family vehicle is best, the choices have

become increasingly difficult.

The new family car is no longer the giant Suburban or minivan, but a three-row crossover SUV. Two options for 2014 have decidedly different approaches and styles offering a distinct choice.


The Honda Pilot, true to its nameplate history, has undergone few changes over the past years and has a more rugged exterior. The KIA Sorento, on the other hand, is a relative newcomer to the bigger Crossover family hauler market and has seen some dramatic changes over the past few years making it full of features today's buyer demand.

Here's a look at two of the top three-row crossover SUVs: Honda Pilot

Introduced in 2003, the Pilot was a game changer in the traditional SUV marketplace. It went away from the typical body on frame, 4-Wheel drive platform to a uni-body, all-wheel drive presentation. It gave up some of its off road capability for better road feel, performance and economy. It gave the buyer a little more car feel but could still seat eight

Honda is known for making few and slow changes to its vehicles. It wasn't until 2009 that it gave the Pilot an overhaul and it hasn't seen one since. Honda has typically not messed with its success. With that though, it risks not offering some of the features and styles that a rapidly-changing marketplace demands. The Pilot will definitely appeal to a buyer who wants a more rugged exterior look and with that, the interior storage area is bigger than the numbers would suggest. With both rear seats stowed away, it has 87 cubic feet available but the more square-like interior creates more nooks for the gear.

A 3.5-liter engine is on all four trim levels of the Pilot and generates 250 horsepower. It also gets a very respectable, for its class, 17 in town miles per gallon (MPG) and 24 highway. There isn't a 4-cylinder option. It shows its age when compared

to other similar vehicles when it comes to available features. Usually, common items that are not options on the Pilot include keyless ignition, and blind spot monitoring. With the likelihood of a rear seat are full of distractions, a 360 backup camera that's available in something like the Nissan Quest van would be a huge plus.

Overall, the Pilot is enhanced by the logo on its grill. It is another example of Honda's quality and reputation for reliable vehicles. The Manufacturer's Suggested Retail Price (MSRP) ranges from \$29,500 for the LX and up over \$41,000 for the fully-loaded Touring

KIA Sorento

Kia is rapidly becoming known for much more than just low cost vehicles with a great warranty. It's beautiful, modern styling and value added features are making the Korean carmaker a real legitimate choice in any vehicle category. The Sorento first debuted in 2002 with a traditional trucklike platform. In 2009, it adopted the car-like set up to become what was then being called a Crosssover vehicle. Kia is much more aggressive with its up grades. For 2014, it says that this year's vehicle is 80 percent new. It has a new chassis, new V-6 engine along with a new infotainment operating system.

The Sorento has a base 4-cylinder, 2.4-liter engine available for those not requiring much power or towing capability and needing a bit better fuel economy. The engine most buyers will go with is the new 3.3-liter, direct-injection V-6 that pumps out an impressive 290 horsepower with mpg numbers of 18/24 city/highway. Both engines come with a sixspeed automatic transmission. MSRP ranges from \$29,670 to \$41,420.

Photo courtesy of KIA Where the Kia shines besides its industry-leading warranty, is in technology and creature comforts. The engineers spent their energy on the interior to make it a more luxurious feel rather than some of the cheaper plastic material that it had in the past. features a buyer expects on a smart phone. Push button start, blind spot indicators, reverse parking sensors and an automatic tailgate are just some of the other "extras' available on the Sorento.

All wheel drive and the third row of seats are offered in all three models - the LX, EX and SX. While the 4-cylinder engine is an option, the V6 is, for the money, almost a mandatory upgrade. Both the V6 and the transmission run effortlessly.

The buyer really can't go wrong with either of these choices and it may just come down to how the bucket seat fits the buyer's "bucket." Test driving either one will provide an excellent opportunity to determine which matches the look and needs of the driver.

High gas prices no longer fueling a decline in driving

AAA survey shows Americans don't change habits based on current price of gas

Americans have grown significantly less likely to change their driving habits or lifestyle to offset gas prices, according to a new survey by AAA. Only half of U.S. adults (53 percent) are doing something to offset gas prices, which is about 15 percent less than in spring 2013.

This development comes as gas prices confinue to be relatively less expensive compared to previous years.
"Many people seem to be

feeling less pressure to make significant changes in their lives on account of high gas prices," said Bob Darbelnet, president and CEO of AAA. "Less expensive gasoline may encourage people to drive more and worry less about the financial burden of filling up their tanks."

Gasoline demand increased 1.1 percent in 2013, which was the largest annual increase since 2006, according to the Energy Information Administration. Vehicle miles travelled in 2013 similarly increased an estimated 18.1 billion miles, according to the Federal Highway Adminis-

remained less expensive than in previous years due to increased production and supplies. The national average price of gas may not even reach \$3.65 per gallon this spring, which would be nearly 15 cents less than the peak in 2013 and about 30 cents less than in 2012.

"People may be less likely to change their habits, but they do not seem any happier at the pumps," continued Darbelnet. "Many drivers grudgingly realize that paying more than \$3 per gallon for gasoline is the new normal, but they remain frustrated with the price."

Most people continue to be-

lieve that gas prices are too high with the results similar to a year ago. According to the survey:

- 40 percent believe gas is too high when the price reaches \$3.00 per gallon
- 50 percent believe gas is too high when the price reaches \$3.30 per gallon
- 65 percent believe gas is too high when the price reaches \$3.50 per gallon • 91 percent believe gas is too
- high when the price reaches \$4.00 per gallon Roughly half of Americans say

they are changing their driving habits or lifestyle to offset gas prices. Those doing so report:

- Combining errands or trips: 85
- Driving less: 84 percent
- · Reducing shopping or dining out: 68 percent
- Delaying major purchases: 52 percent
- · Driving a more fuel-efficient vehicle: 49 percent
- · Putting aside less money for savings: 42 percent
- Working closer to home: 41 percent
- Carpooling: 30 percent
- · Using public transportation
- more regularly: 17 percent • Other: 15 percent

Younger adults ages 18-34 were significantly more likely to offset prices than older adults by working closer to home (60 percent vs. 34 percent), carpooling (49 percent vs. 23 percent)

and using public transportation more regularly (32 percent vs. 11 percent). These results show a potential generational gap regarding gas prices and behavior. AAA conducted a telephone

survey among two national probability samples (landline only and cell phone), consisting of a combined total of 1,011 adults (508 men and 503 women), 18 years of age and older and living in the continental United States. Interviewing for this survey was conducted on March 6-9. The total included 610 interviews from the landline sample and 401 interviews from the cell phone sample. This study has a 95 percent margin of error of ± 3.7 percent.

City boasts a wellpreserved, easilyaccessible historic district

Ninety minutes north of Battle Ground lies Centralia. Popularly known by I-5 travelers as the home of Centralia Factory Outlet, the city also boasts a well-preserved historic district easily accessible by car or train.

Clark County residents can hop on Amtrak at the Vancouver station and, in less time than it takes to drive, passengers are dropped off at the 102-year-old train station in the heart of this walkable and welcoming town. Trains depart back to Vancouver five times daily or visitors can choose to stay overnight to take advantage of lodging options and an array of dinner

Santa Lucia Coffee, owned by Justin Page, is located at a logical starting point on the corner of Tower Avenue and Locust Street in Centralia. Santa Lucia recently celebrated its eighth anniversary and Page roasts a couple hundred pounds of the award-winning Finca Vista Hermosa each week in a roaster he built himself.

Tower Avenue is the main drag in Centralia and it's here that a plethora of antique stores and boutiques can be found. The Shabby Rose, owned by Lisa Blevins and Rella Harringston, is filled with refurbished thrift store and garage sale finds as well as furniture built by the owners' husbands and a few local vendors who make homemade soaps, lotions, clever signs and unique jewelry

Northwest Tub Company is the place to find pre-1940s pieces, salvaged and expertly restored. Shoppers often pause to admire the beautiful window displays of Abundance Vintage and are rewarded with the offerings of a dozen dealers once inside. Owner Susan Delaire keeps each nook and cranny of her shop fresh and inviting.

If sophisticated whimsy is on the list, HUBBUB is the place. Owner Rebecca Staebler is the visionary behind this shop that is so awash with color it's like stepping into the rabbit hole. Staebler defines her items as functional art and carries contemporary American handcraft pieces made by many local and Northwest artisans. The adjacent parking lot, also owned by Staebler, is a sculpture garden featuring works by Bill Wilson.

One street over on Pearl sits Centralia Square, home to 80 antique dealers in one and a half stories. The mall manager told this reporter that it was originally a regional Elks lodge and the top floors are being refurbished to offer 20 hotels rooms and an event center.

If all this shopping has stirred an appetite, options abound in the city. In the same building as Centralia Square sits Berry Fields Café, voted best breakfast and lunch, open from 7 a.m.-5 p.m. daily. Back on Tower Street, Dawn's Delectables is a dessert and sandwich shop serving paninis, soups from scratch, homemade desserts and gluten-free options.

The Centerville Café has good home-cooking fare like patty sausage and eggs for breakfast and grilled ham and Swiss for lunch. For some Mediterranean flavor, visitors can check out Boccata Deli & Market, which also serves dinner Wednesday through Satur-

Across the street from Boccata, The Compass Pub is more a tapas and wine bar with a very European feel and wines specifically chosen to stand up to the flavorful small plates available. Of note, the whites make regional sense like Chardonnay from Australia, Riesling from Germany and Pinot

Grigio from Italy. For wine lovers another distraction is Heymann Whinery, where seven tastings can be had for \$5 per person. According to the friendly server Breanne, grapes are sourced from Prosser and the Yakima Valley. Heymann doubles as a

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



Washington to participate in first-ever distracted driving crackdown

National campaign taking place during Distracted Driving **Awareness Month**

Law enforcement officers in Washington state will be cracking down on distracted drivers as part of a new national distracted driving enforcement campaign this month.

The high-visibility enforcement efforts will target motorists who are observed driving distracted - talking on handheld cell phones, sending text messages, and otherwise not paying attention to the road while driving.





In 2013, researchers at UW Medicine's Harborview Injury Prevention and Research Center conducted a study of drivers in Washington. They found that nearly one in 10 drivers was observed using a cell phone or texting behind the wheel. Among those driving distracted, nearly half (47 percent) were texting.

"We hear from citizens on a regular basis that they want stricter enforcement of distracted driving laws," said Washington Traffic Safety Commission Director Darrin Grondel. "This effort gives us the chance to provide funding to more than 100 law enforcement agencies throughout Washington to do just that."

The slogan of the national campaign is "U Drive. U Text. U Pay." and is being carried out during the month of April, which is National Distracted Driving Month. This effort is modeled after similar successful high visibility enforcement campaigns such as "Click It or



Not all limousine and party vehicle companies created equally

Sadly, one of the first lessons in consumerism to teach children has to be, "buyers beware."

That adage is certainly something teenagers and their parents need to keep in mind as prom season rolls around. Not all limousine and party vehicle companies are created equally. Besides the differences in vehicles, upkeep and safety, levels of performance and service vary widely in the industry as

"We're all parents here and understand how important it is to deliver a high level of service," said Chris Miller, owner of Silver Limousine Service in Ridgefield. "Anytime a vehicle leaves our shop, I'm confident in both the driver and the car. The driver has been well trained, is professional and tested and the vehicles are mechanically sound and look great."

That, unfortunately, can't be said for all transportation providers in the Vancouver and Portland area. There are a number of "rogue" companies that will pop up on Google searches or Craigslist that don't meet the strict guidelines established by the Washington or Oregon Department of Licensing. Both states require regular testing of vehicles as well as medical and drug tests for drivers. With transportation providers that don't adhere to these regulations, the passengers have no way of being sure the driver or vehicle is safe. Also, it's not uncommon for the ad or website to feature vehicles that are not what shows up on prom night.

Another common practice with the less than reputable companies is to offer low cost runs early in the process and book the run. When it gets closer to prom time, people who have waited to get a ride will offer more money. At that time, the people who secured the vehicle for the lower cost will get

Extreme temperatures affect electric vehicle driving range

Study shows range can be nearly 60 percent lower in extreme cold and 33 percent lower in extreme heat

Electric Vehicles (EVs) are energy efficient and environmentally-friendly with the added benefit of reducing fuel costs for motorists. But, just as motorists need to know how far the gas in their tank will take them, EV drivers need to be aware of how far their vehicle can travel on a single charge.

According to new AAA research conducted with the AAA Automotive Research Center in Southern California, electric vehicle range can be reduced by an average of 57 percent based on the temperature outside.

"Electric motors provide smooth operation, strong acceleration, require less maintenance than internal combustion engines, and for many motorists offer a cost effective option," said John Nielsen, managing director, AAA Automotive Engineering and Repair. "However, EV drivers need to carefully monitor driving range in hot and cold weather.

To better understand the impact of climate on electric vehicle batteries, AAA conducted a simulation to measure the driving range of three fully-electric vehicles in cold, moderate and hot weather. Temperature made a big difference in driving range for all three EVs.

Vehicles were tested for city driving to mimic stop-and-go traffic, and to better compare with EPA ratings listed on the window sticker. The average EV battery range in AAA's test

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was 105 miles at 75 degrees, but dropped 57 percent to 43 miles when the temperature was held steady at 20 degrees. Warm temperatures were less stressful on battery range, but still delivered a lower average of 69 miles per full charge at 95 degrees.

AAA performed testing between December 2013 and January 2014. Each vehicle completed a driving cycle for moderate, hot and cold climates

following standard EPA-DOE test procedures. The vehicles were fully charged and then "driven" on a dynamometer in a climate-controlled room until the battery was fully exhausted.

AAA has initiated several projects including mobile recharging units and EV charging stations to support members who drive electric vehicles. EVs provide owners with many benefits, but every motorist needs to be aware of conditions

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


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Is new car technology too complicated?

New intrusions to the driving experience are oppressive, but they're not going anywhere

It used to be new car buyers would ask about horsepower, miles per gallon numbers and other performance-related categories. It now seems as if the first questions being asked are about connectivity and what's the operating system with which the driver's phone will sync. It's about the inside ergonomics and technology. Long gone are the traditional AM/ FM/CD player stereo systems.

Say hello now to GM's My Link operating system that debuted in 2012, or Kia's UVO and Hyundai's Blue Link, which have had recent updates or Toyota's Entune system. These are just a few of the complex, sometimes overly complicated, yet amazing, information systems in the new cars today. These provide total connectivity between driver and car, driver and information and driver and his or her own cell phone. Car buyers now have a full computer in their car.

Apple, which until recently hasn't been a big player in the in-car systems game, has entered in a big way. The new 2015 Mercedes C Class will utilize CarPlay that will mirror the interface the driver has with his or her smartphone and the touch screen. It will mimic their current iPhone. If Apple is successful in turning the in-car operating system in to a seamless transition from phone to in-car screen, it will change the playing field. Too many of the current systems have become overly complicated. The Kia UVO system is one the easiest to use, but even still, a voice command can get translated in to all sorts of interesting op-

As the new car buyers shift to a younger, more tech-savvy base, it will also be all about speed and not the 0-60 kind. Audi, with its 2015 A-3 sedan, is stepping up the speed arms race. It will be the first vehicle with 4G LTE connectivity. A-3 owners will be able to stream video and audio and utilize apps that a 3G network can't accomplish. The 4G is just being offered on the entry level Audi but is sure to make it to the rest of the lineup.

Theoretically, besides the navigation and information applications, the streaming capability is for the passengers only. They will have the opportunity to have a seamless data connection. All this is great in theory but now that we have outlawed cell phone use with a hands free device, there may need to be an addition to those restrictions to include not being able to drive down the road with Game of Thrones playing through what is basically a high speed iPad in the dash.

Of course, the natural extension of all this technology and data information in cars is to remove the driver all together. The driverless car is not just a pipe dream from the Jetsons cartoon show from years ago. The future is now, or more specifically, a few years ago. In 2010, Google began its work on the driverless car. It is possible now for Google to have a greeter meet a guest at the airport, take them to the car and send them on the way with no driver at all. The car will find its way to the office and no tip is required. Many carmakers are jumping in to the game, including BMW, Ford, GM, Honda, Hyundai, Mercedes, Nissan, Toyota, VW and Volvo. Other technology companies, universities and suppliers are also getting in to the game.

The technology has been in the pipeline for over 50 years in some capacity with GM having shown off concept or dream cars with autopilot. While not exactly driverless, a number of the cars available in dealerships today have some sort of autopilot mode with accident avoidance, adaptive cruise control, which slows the car down
