#### An American in Paris and a Harpist in Tel Aviv

Theater critics are more frequently noticing theater productions outside of downtown Chicago and they like what they see. The musical *An American in Paris* is currently playing at the Drury Lane Oakbrook Theatre through March 29, 2020. Based on the Academy Award winner for Best Picture, the show brings breathtaking moments of dance and song to the stage. Often times, critics will write about a show, but fail to mention the hard working musicians providing the music. That's not true for this show. Catey Sullivan in her recent *Chicago Sun Times* review called Music director/conductor Chris Sargent "the production's unseen star, leading a seven-person orchestra that captures George Gershwin's vast musical palette.

In the review by Chris Jones of the *Chicago Tribune*, he said, "Drury Lane cannot fit a large orchestra, removing some of the pleasure of hearing this famous score, although the seven-piece pit band gives it a heck of a shot. I kept hearing so much of Carey Deadman, the only trumpeter, and Jim Gailloreto, the only woodwind player, that these two gentlemen must have gone home and collapsed."

It's a difficult task to play a score originally written for a large orchestra in a reduced orchestration. These musicians have proven that they can do it and get the attention of the critics. Well done.

Harpist Lynne Turner was one of seven harpists who participated in a gala concert to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the International Harp Contest in Israel. First-prize winners from across the decades and from around the globe gathered at the Opera House in Tel Aviv on December 12th, 2019 for this remarkable event. Lynne won first prize at the second competition, which was held in 1962, the same year she joined the CSO. Her colleague Susanna Mildonian, who won the inaugural contest in 1959, was unable to attend, so she was humbled to represent the early years of the competition.

She performed Maurice Ravel's *Introduction and Allegro* for Harp, Flute, Clarinet and Strings, accompanied by members of the Israel Philharmonic under the direction of conductor Eyal Ein-Habar. The audience gave the performers enthusiastic applause and Lynne was inspired by the younger artists who have won first prize in recent years — representing France, the Netherlands, Israel, Serbia and the United States — and who will serve as wonderful ambassadors of the harp long into the future.

#### From the Vice-President's Desk

It has been busy during January. Negotiations are ongoing with Porchlight Music Theatre. As you may remember we went through a successful NLRB card count for union representation in 2019. That process was helped through the efforts of the Chicago Area Chapter of TMA and we thank them for that great help. Negotiations have been going on since late 2019, proposals are still going back and forth as we strive to reach an agreement.

We are also in negotiations with Broadway in Chicago for a successor agreement. The committee has reviewed the data collected through their survey of the unit and put together their proposals. Our first meeting with management was in late January where we exchanged proposals and got some clarity on some issues. More meetings with management are scheduled throughout February.

We will be meeting with the musicians of the Lake Forest Symphony in mid-February to take a ratification vote on the Integrated Media Agreement (IMA). This is an AFM negotiated agreement governing capture and use of electronic media. It is a long agreement and covers use, wages, and work rules. Electronic media use is an important part of an orchestras' promotion in various ways. Orchestras and their management review the agreement and then go through a ratification vote to accept or reject its use by their orchestra.

With the *Intermezzo* moving toward fewer print issues, a committee from the Board has been established to review Bylaw changes (if needed) and suggest improvements to the *Intermezzo*. We are looking to see what additions would create better content and supply more information to members. The committee would welcome your thoughts and if you send them to me, I will pass them along. The month of December has a Membership Meeting only in election years and that meeting is on the first Monday of December. # **Proposed Bylaw Changes**

#### **Bylaw Proposal #1**

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors is striving to inform membership of issues as they arise, and

WHEREAS, the annual budget is an issue of importance to membership,

RESOLVED, to amend Section I, Duties of the President, paragraph I. as follows,

I. The President shall formulate and submit to the Board of Directors for approval, annualized department budgets, with total expenditures not to exceed projected income. The approved operating Budget, in each year, shall be <del>presented at</del> <u>posted to the CFM</u> website in January and presented the January General Membership Meeting in each year in the report of the President at the February General Membership Meeting. and printed in the February issue of the Intermezzo.

#### **Bylaw Proposal #2**

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors is striving to inform membership of issues as they arise, and

WHEREAS, the minutes of meetings are an issue of importance to all members,

RESOLVED, to amend Section IV, Duties of the Board of Directors, paragraph E., as follows:

E. Should a member of the Board of Directors be found guilty of violating the Constitution or Bylaws, after due process of law, their position on the Board shall be declared vacant. A member divulging any of the proceedings of the Board shall be declared in contempt, and unless cleared, shall be punished as the Board may direct. Should a member of the Board be absent from 4 consecutive meetings of the Board, without reasonable excuse, the seat shall be declared vacant. It shall be the duty of the Directors to attend the regular meetings of the Local whether there is a quorum or not. Upon failure to attend 2 consecutive meetings of the Local without reasonable excuse, a Board Member's seat shall be declared vacant by the President at the next Board or regular meeting, whichever comes first. The roll call of yeas and nays with the names of the voters on all questions shall be made a part of the minutes of the Board of Directors and posted on the Bulletin Board and published in the Intermezzo on the CFM website, except where the vote is unanimous.

#### **Bylaw Proposal #3**

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors is striving to inform membership of issues as they arise, and

WHEREAS, the announcement of upcoming Membership Meetings is an issue of importance to all members,

RESOLVED, to amend SECTION XVI, Meetings of the Local, paragraph A as follows:

A. The regular meetings of the Local shall take place on the Second Monday of each month at 6:00 P.M. with the exception that no regular meeting shall take place in the month of November in those years in which regular elections are held. In those years that elections are held, the October meeting will take place on the First Monday at 6:00 P.M. at which time nominations will be accepted. The agenda for all meetings of the Local will be published in the Intermezzo included within the emailed announcement of the meeting and posted on the Bulletin Board and on the CFM website <del>2 months in advance of the meeting</del>.

#### **Bylaw Proposal #4**

WHEREAS, Local 10-208 members desire to update Bylaws Sections IV, VIII, and XII, in congruence with current legal precedents and statutes, and

WHEREAS, the revisions of these sections will benefit Local 10-208 and its membership in the respect that, once adopted, they will serve to improve Local 10-208 members' working conditions by prohibiting all forms of workplace discrimination, harassment, and mistreatment.

Now, therefore be it RESOLVED to amend Section IV as follows:

New Subsection J: The Board of Directors shall appoint a "Fair Employment Practices Committee" which shall include one member from the CFM Board of Directors, no less than five rank and file CFM members representative of the various musicians and workplaces in the CFM's jurisdiction and musical community, and an external legal consultant whose budget and time shall be approved by the Board of Directors and compensated by the CFM. The committee shall be charged with researching education, training policies, and incident reporting platforms for CFM members and staff congruent with current

legal precedents and statutes that seek to eradicate or lessen instances of bullying, discrimination, and sexual harassment, and other adverse working conditions and issues. The committee shall meet as often as necessary, but no less than twice annually, with the first report due within 30 days of formation.

New Subsection K: The Board of Directors shall designate a "Fair Employment Liaison" who shall be an existing or future staff member, but who shall not be a CFM member. The Liaison shall receive annual compliance training in sexual harassment, discrimination, retaliation, and other applicable employment law; and the investigation thereof.

Be it further RESOLVED, to amend Section VIII, Subsection D.2 as follows:

- 2. Discriminating or causing others to discriminate against any member of the Local because of ethnicity, creed, gender, age, disability, citizenship, sexual orientation, marital status, family status or national origin shall result in a fine of not less than \$250.00. A second conviction thereof shall result in expulsion from the Local.
- a. Directly or indirectly practicing discrimination or harassment in the workplace or in a work-related setting outside of the workplace in any form on the basis of race, religion, age, political affiliation or persuasion, disability, ancestry, pregnancy, national origin or ethnic background, color, sex, gender, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation or preference, citizenship status, marital/partnership status and genetic predisposition, or against any other protected class under Federal, State, or Municipal law, including but not limited to contracting, hiring, booking, securing engagements, terms of employment or working conditions; or b. Engaging in retaliatory behavior, including adverse employment action, against any individual who reports discrimination or

harassment, or who participates in an investigation of such reports;

c. Engaging in mistreatment or unwelcome conduct in the workplace or in a work-related setting outside the workplace, that is persistent and severe, whether verbal, physical, or communicated through electronic means, digital devices or otherwise, that i. harms, intimidates, threatens, degrades or humiliates a member, or

ii. has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with another member's work performance; or

- d. Engaging in retaliatory behavior, including adverse employment action, against any individual who reports mistreatment or unwelcome conduct that is persistent and severe, or who participates in an investigation of such reports.
- e. It shall be a violation of these bylaws for a member to misrepresent the evidence that is claimed to be the basis for charges against any member. A charge shall be considered improper and shall not be processed if it is found by the Board of Directors that: i. The charge(s) does/do not state the exact nature of the alleged offense;

ii. The charge(s) is/are untimely; or

iii. The charge(s) involve(s) a question which should be decided by a judicial or administrative body outside the local.

Be it further RESOLVED, to amend Section XII, Subsection C as follows:

C. A Except in allegations described in VIII D.2, a member filing charges against another member and who fails to appear to prosecute same, without reasons satisfactory to the Board of Directors, shall be adjudged in contempt and fined. Defendants or witnesses who fail to appear after legal notice are in contempt and shall be fined at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

#### **Bylaw Proposal #5**

WHEREAS, it is important for musicians to be represented at the bargaining table during negotiations for Collective Bargaining Agreements under which they may perform; and

WHEREAS, new, expired, or infrequently used agreements may not have an active or identifiable bargaining unit from which to elect a negotiating committee; and

WHEREAS, Section IG of the Chicago Federation of Musicians Bylaws empowers the President to appoint all committees that may be deemed necessary: now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that Section VIII F of the Bylaws be amended as follows:

New Subsection 7: In the event that the CFM is preparing to negotiate a new or successor collective bargaining agreement and a negotiating committee cannot be elected, the President shall appoint a committee of no fewer than 3 members in good standing, making best efforts to include a representative from the appropriate AFM player conference where applicable, in addition to titled officers of the Chicago Federation of Musicians.

# By Leo Murphy

"Why should I join (or stay in) the union?" is a question that is asked often. Actually, I have heard it during all my time as a union musician. And of course, it is a fair question to ask, so let me address a few items that often come up when I am asked.

"Does the union get me a job?" The union has never functioned as a hiring hall in the traditional sense as some unions. Calls to the Local for referrals do occur, someone will call in and ask for a violinist or some other instrument and the Local will supply at least 4 names of members and their contact info as listed in our database. Once in a while someone may ask for the name of a band for an event and the CFM will give at least 4 names of groups. However, the Local does not disclose wages to non-members so members are able to negotiate wages over scale. But the "hiring hall" concept does not exist in our union.

This view of "what does the union do for me" is a transactional (what do I get out of it) view of membership and that is one way to look at it. Looking at it in those terms, below are some of the items that come to my mind.

Defending your filed contract with legal services paid by the CFM. If there is a dispute involving your filed contract, the CFM provides legal services to pursue payment. That has always been a service we offer members. In actuality, having the union contact the purchaser sometimes resolves the issue without litigation. But if your AFM/CFM contract is violated, we will go to court on your behalf and we pay the legal expenses.

Another service is our free liability coverage for casual work (weddings, private parties, jobs in building lobbies, etc.). More and more venues are requesting proof of liability or additionally insured coverage. Often these are in the downtown area and are higher wage venues. By filling out the liability request form and filing a contract (both of these are available on the members only side of the CFM website) you can request coverage. There are a few exceptions to what can be covered, so if you want to find out more contact Dean Rolando or Leo Murphy and we will answer your questions.

The AFM offers members instrument insurance at reasonable rates through an AFM endorsed provider, York Insurance. https://www.afminsurance.com/business-insurance/business-owners-insurance/special-risk-insurance/musical-instrument-equipment-insurance.html. Currently, the annual premium is approximately \$2.20 per \$100 for the first \$1,500 of replacement value, and only \$1.00 per \$100 for additional replacement value.

The AFM also offers members home owner and auto insurance through MetLife Choice, an AFM endorsed provider found at https://metlifechoice.com/?MDRefCode=metlife-snapquote-EAL&tracking\_codes=metlife-snapquote-EAL. All of these AFM offerings can be researched from the comfort of your sofa. You don't even need to get out of your pajamas.

The Illinois Advocates, Attorneys at Law, offer discounts to CFM members. Their ad is in the *Intermezzo* and you will see that they are a "dedicated law firm for union members and their families". They cover a wide variety of legal issues. You can contact their offices at 312-818-6700. I recently reached out to them to get a will put together and they have been very helpful.

The CFM Scholarship is awarded each year to young musicians attending colleges/universities to pursue music, either in performance or education. Children of CFM members are eligible and may apply for the scholarship. A recipient can only get the scholarship once

in their lifetime, but this scholarship helps cover the cost of school and supplies. While the limit is usually about \$1,000.00, the help with tuition costs is always helpful.

The CFM-EW Fund administers the health plans at the CFM. The plans offered are group plans and offer a wide range of coverage. Eligibility requirements are that you be a member in good standing and be either vested in the AFM-EP Pension or show \$3,000.00 in covered wages for the current or past calendar year. The Fund also offers a vision and dental plan and has secured discounts to the Chicago Athletic Club. If you want to find out more about any of these offerings, contact Nick Moran at the Local.


The Ed Ward Hall is a valuable rehearsal option. Members and employers take advantage of this resource to hold their ensemble rehearsals. The hall is equipped with a piano, a sound system, a drum-set (no cymbals) and a bass amp. Information regarding rental rates and availability by contacting BJ Levy at the CFM. Rates are very reasonable for CFM members if use of the hall is scheduled during the day.

All of the items mentioned above are transactional, but there is another side to the value of membership in the union, there is an aspirational/transformative side. The union is really the only organization that advocates for musicians; for fair wages, fair working conditions and respect for our work. The idea of a fair wage and fair working conditions for all musicians does not get championed by any other organization, but our union does that. The contracts negotiated for electronic media, for symphonic ensembles, for theaters or the wage scales we adopt through a committee process are all about fair wages and working conditions. Through these efforts, the AFM/CFM serves as an advocate to employers about the issues of fair wages, fair working conditions and dignity for our work.

Another form of this advocacy is practiced through the CFM outreach programs to musicians at universities and colleges. Several of us regularly attend music business classes at colleges and universities in the Chicago area. These young musicians are headed toward careers in performance, arts administration or arts management and for many of them this is their first encounter with a union. It is always interesting to hear the questions that come from those discussions and address those questions. And while most are interested in getting a job and get their loans paid-off, they are also very interested in what other professional musicians (musicians who have made a living and supported their families) have found support for their careers from the union.

As an example, in 2019 the CFM brought Norman Ludwin in for lectures on orchestration and film scoring. Those lectures were presented at the CFM but also at 3 colleges in the area. We wanted the membership to be able to hear and network with a musician working successfully in this area. The college events were free for the students and they were well attended. The college presentations were to show those students more about this area of work that is so interesting to them, but also how working under AFM agreements benefits musicians and their families. Attendance and participation at the colleges was very good and we are looking forward to more of these outreach presentations.

The CFM is always looking to find more ways to support membership. The development of the liability insurance is an outgrowth of the need that existed for such coverage. Your thoughts are always welcome. I know that some of you have talked to us about your ideas and I thank you for that. We are always looking for your input.

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


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
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
