Diverse businesses bloom in Mentor

hen Mentor Lumber started a century ago, the community surrounding it was beginning its own transformation.

Lake County was the "nursery capital of the world" with more than 200 nurseries growing plants that would leave their native soil and beautify the world. And the village of Mentor – it wasn't yet a city - specialized in roses.

The abundant water, variety of soils, and lake effect climate combined to create the "rose capital of the nation." More than a dozen growers produced about five million plants a year.

Mentor Lumber sprang from this fertile soil. In 1922, they primarily sold coal, drainpipes, and septic tanks, explained President Tom Kirk.

Now, they offer lumber, window, door, trim and millwork sales. They can fabricate everything from cupolas to columns to custom doors.

Mentor Lumber has produced its own growth rings over the decades. It acquired Chardon Lumber in 1965, added Mentor Door & Millwork in 1988, Mentor Installed Services in 1992, and its showroom and design center opened in 1998. Its campus at the corner of Center Street and the aptly named Carpenter Drive now

extends to 25 acres.

Meanwhile, a city flourished around it. Paved streets replaced country roads, and interstates connected Mentor to the wider world, expanding business opportunities.

"I'm only 54 years old but I've lived here for 35-plus years, and I've watched the nurseries turn into neighborhoods and local retail establishments," Kirk said. "Mentor Lumber has had a large part to do with providing the material that has gone into these buildings and homes, and it's pretty exciting to see. I could drive through Mentor and count thousands of homes that were built with materials from Mentor Lumber."

Mentor Lumber is locally owned and has provided more than building materials to the community. The business sponsors Little League teams and scout troops, supports Habitat for Humanity projects, and runs a food drive every year for Hannah's Home a nonprofit maternity home that cares for single young women and their infants.

"Community is why we exist and why Mentor Lumber has been successful for 100 years. It is everything to us!" Kirk said.

The city of Mentor has blossomed since the days of Mentor Lumber's origin. It now contains about 1,700 different businesses and has transformed from a monoculture into a thriving and diverse business scene. The botanicals have been supplemented by retail, biotech, and brunch spots.

Discover how this diversified garden has grown.

Made in Mentor

Mentor manufacturers make personal protection equipment, pistons and performance products, and plastic strapping systems. They make custom watches, lenses, lighting, aerospace components, scented bait tabs and more.

They also make jobs. And while all

of the more than 300 Mentor manufacturers make something invaluable, none has created more careers than STERIS.

Founded in 1985, STERIS is a leading provider of products and services that support patient care with an emphasis on infection prevention. It has flourished with 16,000 associates worldwide and operates in more than 100 countries.

You can find STERIS products in operating rooms and endoscopy departments, medical device and pharmaceutical manufacturers, biopharma and vaccine manufacturers, and dental offices and dental schools throughout the world.

And after nearly 40 years of spectacular growth, it's still headquartered in Mentor.

Maria Kula, director of corporate communications at STERIS, said growing in Mentor and being adjacent to other similarly strong communities in northeast Ohio provided STERIS with a skillful workforce, critical infrastructure, robust communities for its employees to live in, and other

important components for a successful business.

"It has been an honor to grow here in the city as Mentor has also grown," Kula said. "Today, while we manufacture our products at facilities across the world and service customers across 100 countries, Mentor remains our U.S. operational headquarters and home to several manufacturing facilities."

STERIS has repeatedly invested in its Mentor operations. They've made local acquisitions like U.S. Endoscopy, now known as STERIS Endoscopy. It has insourced third-party production of many of its components at its Mentor headquarters. And most recently, STERIS has added a large extension to its main administrative building, which created much needed space for several hundred associates.

"We have thousands of associates who live in Mentor and surrounding communities," Kula said. "They support local businesses. Their children go to our community's schools. In that way, we are pleased to be part of the fabric that makes up Mentor."

Lüm-Tec

Lüm-Tec Watches may not operate on the same scale as STERIS (yet), but the manufacturers have something in common—their products are made in Mentor and sold globally.

Chris Wiegand is the owner of Wiegand Custom Watch and its showcase brand, Lüm-Tec. His watches have adorned the wrists of Jay Leno, Jerry Seinfeld, and other discerning celeb-

He founded Lüm-Tec nearly 15 years ago. Its popularity detonated around 2010 and demand has remained steady since then. Their customer base is filled with watch collectors who know and appreciate quality, Wiegand explained.

"Everyone who works for me is a watch collector," he said. "We know those little details. Even the steel is hand-selected. We forge the cases instead of casting or machining them. Just a lot of little details that get missed by a lot of the companies."

In addition to Lüm-Tec, his company makes watches for almost 100 different brands.

"Most of our competition, we make their watches for them," Wiegand said.

Most of Lüm-Tec's watches are made in small batches. Wiegand has little interest in repeating past successes. When asked what's next for Lüm-Tec, he replied, "Always growing, always improving every aspect of the engineering we can."

Still blooming

Vestiges remain of Mentor's rosy past. Street names like Tea Rose, Wyant, and Rosebud attest to the blossoms that populated what are now neighborhoods, stores and parks.

You can find one more legacy of the city's green history in gardens across the nation. Wayside Gardens was founded in Mentor in 1920 by plantsman Jan Jacob Grullemans and nurseryman Elmer Schultz.

Their goal was to grow and sell exciting, unusual, and high-quality plants. Under their guidance, Wayside became one of the most celebrated mail-order nurseries in the country.

After Grullemans died, Wayside was bought by the Park Seed Company and moved to South Carolina. However, Wayside Drive in Mentor and many gorgeous flowers, shrubs, and trees that still grow in the city maintain Wayside Gardens' local legacy.

Unlike its nursery heyday, the city of Mentor now has a diversified business base that's divided almost evenly between retail, manufacturing and service. It also attracts foreign direct investment and helps Mentor-based businesses tap into foreign markets with the Mentor International Trade Initiative.

"Diversity is the key," said Ante Logarusic, the city of Mentor's communications officer. "Having a diverse business mix helps protect our local economy from the ups and downs of recession cycles, as well as other factors."

Ironically, few people know more about life in Mentor than Nancy Brunner Sanden, funeral director and partner at Brunner Sanden Deitrick Funeral Home & Cremation Center. Her parents, Raymond and Helen Brunner, established Brunner Funeral Home in 1949. It has remained a family business, now on its third generation.

While the business has adapted over the decades, the vocation has not.

"We care for the dead and serve the living," Sanden explained.

In her father's time, that would mean driving someone down to Cleveland to pick out a casket. Sanden learned early that families needed a gentle but experienced hand to help them during some of the most difficult times of their lives.

And the Brunners offered services beyond those of a funeral home. Raymond even drove the ambulance in Mentor before that became the bailiwick of emergency medical services.

"He needed to sustain the business." so he offered ambulance services," Sanden said. "We'd get the call instead of 911 because there was no 911."

Despite having seven children, Raymond Brunner was always on call.

"His nights were never his own," she

Sanden and her partners have inherited her father's work ethic and adaptability. They added an arrangement center in 1998 so families could make potentially difficult decisions in as comfortable and familiar an atmosphere as possible — no more driving to Cleveland for caskets.

Sanden and her team know they're

making more than arrangements for grieving families. They're providing warmth, welcoming, and rapport; convenience, consideration and comfort. That ethos extends to the details: making sure the lights are on, doors are open, and the sidewalks are salted.

That attitude also explains the funeral home and cremation center's approach to philanthropy. You can find the names Brunner, Sanden and Deitrick throughout the community. They sponsored the University Health wellness center in Mentor and donated all the funds needed for the city's Mentor Safety Forces Memorial.

"The community has supported us. We are because of them. We've been in business 73 years because of them," Sanden said.

The city of Mentor is no longer a village lined with rose nurseries, but Sanden still remembers and feels the closeness of a small town.

"I know the community. I know funeral service. And that's my name on the sign. That's a tall order to dance to every day," she said.

That is a big responsibility. But that sort of attitude from the hundreds of businesses in Mentor will ensure that the city keeps blossoming.

Commonly Asked Questions



The city of Mentor's property and zoning codes are designed to protect the public health, safety and welfare by the established minimum standards that govern the maintenance, appearance and conditions of all residential and nonresidential premises that ensure the continued preservation and improvement of our community. Here are answers to some commonly asked questions.

Can we keep chickens in the city of Mentor?

Yes, but only if you have two or more acres and the coop must be located at least 75 feet from the nearest home. Chicken or fowl complaints should be directed to the Mentor Police Department at (440) 255-1234.

Does the City have an ordinance for overgrown grass?

Lawns must be mowed to a height of under 8". Property owners with excessively high grass or weeds will be given 48 hours from receipt of notice to cut the high grass or remove the weeds. If notices are ignored, legal action will be pursued for city crews to cut the grass at the owner's expense.

My neighbor's tree is hanging over my house and I'm concerned that it might fall and cause damage. What can I do?

If the tree is alive, you can legally trim anything from the property line "up to the sky." We recommend discussing the situation with your neighbor to ensure the proper technique for trimming and maintaining the health of the tree. If the tree is dead or dying, contact the code enforcement office.

What about trees on the tree lawn?

Property owners are required to maintain trees on their tree lawn. Trees must be trimmed so that pedestrians and motorists can pass without obstruction. Branches that hang over the sidewalk should be kept at seven feet about the sidewalk, and 14 feet above the roadway. Branches also should not interfere with visibility of street or traffic signs. The city of Mentor has specific ordinances that property owners must follow when trimming, removing, and planting trees located in the right-of-way or on the tree lawn.

Can I park an RV in my driveway?

No, all RVs and trailers must be parked behind the front setback of the house on an improved surface of concrete or asphalt. A permit is required for any driveway expansion or pad construction. Contact the Planning and Development Department for a permit.

Is it legal for solicitors to go door to door in Mentor?

It is unlawful to solicit within the city without first obtaining a solicitor's permit from the police department. Those who have obtained a solicitor's permit may solicit within the city of Mentor between the hours of 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. It is unlawful to solicit at any premise at which a "no solicitors" sign is displayed. "No solicitors" signs are available at the Mentor Police Department, from the receptionist desk at city hall, or can be downloaded from the ordinances page on the city website. Those with questions or concerns regarding a solicitor should call the Mentor Police Department at (440) 255-1234.

Can I burn my leaves in the fall?

Burning trash, brush, or leaves is not permitted in the city of Mentor. Small, attended campfires for cooking purposes are permitted during favorable weather conditions without prior approval. Bonfires require prior approval of the Fire Prevention Bureau by calling (440) 974-5768.

Are my neighbors allowed to park their vehicles in the front yard?

No, all vehicles must be licensed and parked on an improved surface of concrete or asphalt. Existing gravel surfaces are acceptable, but gravel parking surfaces cannot be expanded.

My neighbor leaves their trash bins and yard waste at the curb four days before our regular trash pickup? Is that okay?

No. Trash receptacles and yard waste should not be placed at the curb before 3 p.m. the day before pickup. Receptacles should be removed from the curb no later than 7 a.m. the day after trash pickup.

Can I put a garage sale sign at the end of my street?

No. Garage sale signs are only permitted on the property where the sale is taking place. Signs that are illegally posted in the right of way (tree lawn, public property, or off site), may be confiscated and disposed of by city staff. We recommend using the various online garage sale advertising tools available.

Do I need a permit to install a fence?

A permit is required if you are planning on installing, altering, or relocating a fence. Fences in the rear yard may not exceed six feet in height. Fences in the front yard or on a corner facing a side street may not exceed three feet in height and must be decorative. Contact the Planning and Development Department at (440) 974-5740.

Mentor Marsh is for the birds

One of the premier birding sites in northeast Ohio, Mentor Lagoons Nature Preserve includes 1.5 miles of shoreline with rare dune plants, a riverine marsh, and mature oak bluff. It is located on the western boundary of the Mentor Marsh State Nature Preserve, which is also one of the best birding sites in the state. Here you'll find diverse wetland communities and habitat types that serve as important breeding and nursery areas for fish and waterfowl, as well as a 'stopover' resting site for neotropical birds and butterflies as they migrate up to several thousand miles in the spring and fall.

Over 260 bird species have been recorded within or offshore of the Mentor Lagoons Nature Preserve and Mentor Marsh. The large-scale removal of invasive phragmites, led by the Cleveland Museum of Natural History, has increased occurrences of highly sought-after marsh birds. The potential for rare bird sightings and new breeding species continues to increase.

Along the east portion and south side of the Preserve, you can overlook the marsh and several mudflats, which are excellent spots for shorebirds and waterfowl in migration. The overlook trail begins by cutting through deciduous forest, full of warblers, vireos, and flycatchers from spring to fall, and hosts a diversity of species year-round. The trail continues to the bluffs, which offer excellent scoping opportunities for mergansers, gulls, scoters, and many species that overwinter on Lake Erie.

Cleveland Clinic Hospital coming to Mentor

New, state-of-the-art facility plans to open by mid-2023

he future of healthcare for Mentor residents is looking bright and gaining ground in the form of a new hospital in Lake County's biggest city, offering greater access to one of the nation's leading healthcare systems, the Cleveland Clinic.

The construction was delayed for a time due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but now is full steam ahead. In September 2021, a groundbreaking ceremony took place to mark the start of the new facility, which is set to be completed by the first half of 2023.

"We are extremely excited about this stage," says Mentor city manager, Kenneth J. Filipiak. "We've been working towards this for a good 10 years and it's been one of the biggest goals for our citv."

Initially, the Cleveland Clinic had been simply looking for medical office space when Filipiak and Ron Traub, then director of economic & community development, suggested a bigger, more beneficial opportunity — a full-service hospital.

"We are a booming metropolitan area and the economic center of business and retail in Lake County, so the demand is there for a top hospital within our borders that provides the highest quality community-based care," says Filipiak.

Mentor officials already had the ideal spot for this ambitious undertaking. "We knew that one of the things the Cleveland Clinic looks for is a holistic environment," Filipiak says. "We brought their team out and showed them what we knew to be the perfect place. A natural landscape, yet adjacent to a major highway." Cleveland Clinic soon purchased 47 acres, the plot of land just north of the intersection of I-90 and SR-615.

There was more work, however, to be done before the process got underway. "Kathy Mitchell, Mentor planning director, and I worked to make sure the campus met the highest architectural standards and complemented one of our most vibrant economic corridors," says Kevin D. Malecek,

director of economic development and international trade for Mentor. Malecek replaced Traub, who retired after 29 years of service, in 2018. "Having a world class, state-of-the-art medical facility in our city will be a game changer that will spur growth and serve as prominent recognition of what is already an important economic hub."

Malecek adds that the new development will help generate a nice blend of prospective residential and commercial assets, enhancing the community as a whole.

At the ground-breaking event, Filipiak said, "We have no doubt this project will have a major impact on community health, job opportunities, investment, extended learning opportunities and so much more for our city."

Currently, Lake County is served by two hospitals, UH Lake West Medical Center in Willoughby, and University Hospitals TriPoint Medical Center in Concord Township. Cleveland Clinic

officials are eager to see their presence grow further east, as noted by spokeswoman Kate McLain. "This will not just be a benefit for Lake County," Filipiak says, "but its impact will be as far reaching as Ashtabula and western Pennsylvania."

The Cleveland Clinic's website also confirms that there will be opportunity for growth. "The innovative modular design of the hospital will allow for flexibility to meet the healthcare demands of today and tomorrow." This means that there will be room for expansion in the future.

The Mentor hospital will focus on digestive disease, general surgery, urology, heart and vascular care, as well as orthopedics and pulmonary care. There will be four operating rooms, 34 inpatient rooms, 22 outpatient rooms, and 19 emergency room bays.

Matthew Donovan, president of city council, has lived in Mentor's ward 2 for the past 58 years. "I've spent my whole life here and it just keeps getting better," he says. "I have a personal perspective on why the Cleveland Clinic chose Mentor, and the ultimate positive impact it will have. When someone visits Mentor, they immediately see how proud the people are here and how professional our council, administration, department heads, police and fire departments are. People see almost immediately that they can try their hand at starting a new business here, or expand and relocate here. And everything you need is in close vicinity, which I personally appreciate. You can go to a dinner, movie, take a walk in a park, go shopping . . . it's all conveniently just a short drive away."

"This will be truly transformative for the community," Filipiak concludes. "We already have an impressive biomedical business sector, and this will greatly enhance both our domestic and international recruitment efforts. Having the highest quality health facility in all the world right here in Mentor will assuredly bring more interest from other companies pursuing research and clinical trials."

"This is a win-win for everyone."

The new Mentor Civic Recreation Center

long-standing goal of the City has been to provide flexible indoor space to expand and enhance health, wellness, and recreational opportunities for residents of all ages. That goal was realized late last year when Mentor City Council approved the purchase of the Mentor Heisley Racquet & Fitness Club for \$5.15 million which included the building, equipment, and approximately eight acres of property.

The 128,297 square foot complex is one of the largest of its kind in northeast Ohio and features an indoor soccer field, basketball, tennis, racquetball, and pickleball courts, indoor and outdoor swimming pools, cardiovascular and weight training areas, group exercise rooms, a childcare room, and other amenities.

The facility remained open over the winter months to accommodate programming that was already taking place but was closed on May 1, 2022 so that renovations and other improvements could be safely implemented.

While most of the amenities will remain—including the pools, indoor soccer field and sports courts—there will be some reconfiguration and re-purposing of space to offer even more recreational opportunities to members. Some of the tennis courts will be resurfaced for multi-sports activities and a multi-purpose activity room is being created for classes and rental opportunities.

Affordable memberships to the new Mentor Civic Recre-



ation Center will be available to both residents and nonresidents upon reopening in the fall of 2022.

Members will be able to take advantage of over 1,000 programs across eight categories ranging from swim lessons to tennis, yoga to free weights, and pickleball to water exercise. The goal is to provide programs that appeal to members of all ages and activity levels—from toddlers to seniors.

In short, the new Mentor Civic Recreation Center will offer everything necessary to keep you fit, healthy, and having fun!

10 things about Mentor you probably didn't know!

- Former Ohio State football coach, Jim Tressel, was born in Mentor, Ohio in 1952. His father, Lee, coached at Mentor High School from 1950 to 1955 during which time he put together a 34game winning streak before moving on to Massillon High School and then Baldwin Wallace.
- 2 James A. Garfield bought the Dickey Farm in 1876 because he wanted his sons to learn how to farm. Somewhat ironic as he despised farming as a child and yearned to become a sailor. That dream was soaked when he fell into the Ohio Canal and was nearly drowned. It was then that he decided to use his brains instead of his brawn and eventually worked his way from poverty to Pennsylvania Avenue.
- 3 What is known as the Matchworks Building was built in 1868 for the Hart Nut and Washer Company. Since then, it also housed the Mentor Knitting Mills, the Columbia Match Company, the Production Machinery Company, as well as a number of other businesses. Currently, nearly two-dozen businesses occupy the space.
- 4 Charles Parker, a member of Moses Cleaveland's survey party, platted lands for the Connecticut Land Company and established the "Marsh Settlement" in 1797, the first in what later became Lake County. His home was located in the Headlands area near the corner of Forest & Woodridge Roads.

- 5 As early as the 1870s, there were plans to dredge out the Mentor Marsh basin and construct a large inland harbor. By the turn of the 20th century, there even was talk of creating a steel manufacturing complex at this location. Major players in the steel, coal, and rail industries were involved, and those plans might have been realized had Peter Hitchcock not put a stop to them. For reasons unknown, he wouldn't sell his 52-acres of property. His decision became known as "Hitchcock's Holdup" and as a result, the steel plant was built in Lorain instead.
- 6 The Great Lakes Mall was the first mall built by the DeBartolo family of Youngstown, Ohio. When it opened in 1961, it consisted of an enclosed center section with two open walkways. Several expansions took place in the '60s and the mall was fully enclosed by 1971. The mall continues to evolve with new offerings to appeal to everchanging consumer tastes.
- In 1895, the Cleveland, Painesville & Eastern (CP&E) was established and served as the primary interurban line carrying passengers east from Cleveland to Painesville and beyond. At the time, Mentor had a handful of stops serving its population of a little over 500 residents.
- You probably knew that Mentor was once considered the Rose Capital of the Nation and chances are good that you've heard of

- the Bosley Nursery, but did you know Mentor was also home to a renowned automotive designer? The innovative Bosley GT Mark 1 was hand-built by Richard Bosley in 1953 in the garage at the family's nursery located on Mentor Avenue at Stop 68 of the interurban line. The car is now on permanent display at the Petersen Automotive Museum in LA.
- 9 Eleanor Garfield, the First Lady of Mentor, offered her two cents to car design at a country club function with Ned Jordan, owner of the Jordan Motor Company. While sharing a dance she related to him the kind of car that she would like to drive. He thanked her for the million dollar idea and the Jordan Playboy Roadster debuted in 1919. In case you're wondering, yes...she owned one.
- The name Mentor originated in Greek literature. Mentor was the tutor of Telemachus, the son of Odysseus. Other place names in the Western Reserve, including Solon, Euclid and Macedonia, were also inspired by the early Americans' fascination with the ancient world.

BONUS FACT!

Over 15,000 souls are interred at the Mentor Cemetery including veterans of the Revolutionary War, War of 1812, and the Civil War. The original Mentor Cemetery was located at the northwest corner of Mentor Avenue and Center Street and was relocated in 1854.





Protect your car and yourself!

s you are probably aware, there has been a pretty dramatic increase in automobile thefts throughout northeast Ohio over the past several years. Theft rings have been targeting neighborhoods by traveling in a transport vehicle and then canvassing the area for unlocked cars. In addition to the car and any valuables inside, they also look for garage door openers left inside vehicles to gain access to garages for additional vehicles or other valuables.

The common thread in all of these thefts is that they target unlocked vehicles, and these incidents occur overnight.

Although Mentor is a very safe community to live in, we all should stay alert and take the following steps to protect ourselves and our property.

• Lock your car doors: The easiest thing you can do is lock your car door. Automobile theft is a crime of opportunity. If a thief finds that your car has been secured, they will likely move along to an easier target.

- Don't leave your keys in your car: Leaving keys and key fobs in your car not only make it easier to steal, but also provides an opportunity for thieves to access your home and other vehicles. Never leave your keys in your car.
- Secure your valuables: Bring your valuables inside with you. If you leave them in your car, then place them out of view so that they don't make attractive targets.
- Lock your garage entry door: Thieves that gain access to your car can gain easy access to your garage and your home by utilizing your garage door opener. Be sure to lock the garage entrance to your home. While you're at it, also make sure all of your first floor entry doors and windows are secured.

The Mentor Police Department and law enforcement agencies across the region are working together to break



these rings - and they're making progress. In the meantime, let's do what we can to discourage this type of activity in our community by remaining aware and by locking our vehicles.

"Cardinal Go" program to improve access for students

Mentor Public Schools and Laketran partner to provide free rides for Mentor High School students

entor Public Schools was recently awarded a grant that will fully fund a two-year pilot of a new student transit benefit program with Laketran. Cardinal Go is an innovative partnership that will allow Mentor High School students, grades 9-12, to ride Laketran's Local Routes 1–9 free of charge wherever they are traveling — be it to campus, internships, activities, local resources, or after school jobs.

"There is a transportation paradox for many individuals in northeast Ohio. Individuals are unable to secure a job because they do not have a car and they are unable to secure a car because they do not have a job," shared Dr. Joe Glavan, CTE coordinator, Mentor High School. "Students are not immune to this same paradox and can often face similar situations with access to employment and community resources."

In order to address this, Mentor



Schools partnered with Laketran to provide an additional transportation opportunity for high school students to increase access to real world learning opportunities and community resources in northeast Ohio.

The program will be available to students starting fall 2022. Parents and guardians will need to give permission for their students to participate in the program. Mentor Schools will reach out with information on how to do that via the parent portal soon.

"We are very excited to be launching Cardinal Go with Mentor Public Schools," shared Laketran CEO Ben Capelle. "This program will provide a reliable and affordable way for students to access educational and economic opportunities, as well as bring awareness to public transportation."

"We have many parents contact us about transportation options so students can take advantage of programs off campus including internships, College Plus, and career development programs," continued Capelle. "Neither Mentor Schools nor Laketran want transportation to be a barrier for students to participate in these programs. Cardinal Go guarantees students can access these programs and get jobs that will help them now and into the future."

In 2020, Laketran launched Route 8, its first new bus route in 20 years, which connects Mentor High School directly to Tyler Boulevard, Lakeland Community College, Mentor-on-the-Lake and Mentor Headlands. Laketran plans to extend the program to other interested Lake County high schools.

Additionally, a lowcost wellness clinic is open by appointment the second Saturday each month where pets are seen by a veterinarian and can receive vaccinations, flea and tick treatments, microchips, ear cleaning and heart worm and FIV/FELV testing. To support local veterans, LHS works with Veteran Canine Connection to place shelter dogs into veteran homes through their Cpl Joshua Harmon Pets to Vets program.

"It is important that the community knows we are here to help them. We never want someone to feel they have to give up their pet because they

cannot afford to care for them. We have many services available supporting pets in the community to help them live long, healthy lives," said Lori Caszatt, executive director.

To prevent animal cruelty and neglect, Lake Humane Society provides protection to the animals of Lake County through the Humane Investigations Department. Humane Society agents, who are appointed by the Lake County Probate Court, work together with local law enforcement to fight animal cruelty and neglect across all of Lake County. In the state of Ohio, a humane agent is empowered to enforce state laws regarding animal cruelty.

Introduces new drop-off site open Mondays through Saturdays for safe and smart recycling

■ he Solid Waste District has partnered with the Department of Utilities to repurpose an area at the Landfill and Recycling Center into a drop-off site. This repurposed location at 2039 Blase Nemeth Road in Painesville Township, will be a onestop-shop allowing residents to bring recyclable items AND household waste materials to one location, in one trip.

This brings welcomed improvements like expanded hours and days, the added convenience of credit card payments and expanded space for trailers to be utilized for hauling multiple items to the facility.

This recycling drop-off area will be open to residents through August 31, 2022. Hours are Monday through Friday 7:00 am. to 3:30 pm. and Saturdays 9:00 am. to 1:00 pm. Residents will be required to enter through the scale house entrance that can accept cash,

check, and credit card payments for any fees associated with this drop-off. Please be advised, that materials in an open truck bed or open trailer need to be tarped during transportation to the drop-off in order to be accepted.

Residents will unload their recyclable items and take them into the building to be stacked and sorted by the drop-off team. Accepted items will be appliances, household electronics, computer-related devices, televisions, and tires. Be assured all memory components on computer-related devices will be professionally erased or destroyed in prior to being recycled. Residents may only bring up to six tires per day.

The hazardous waste collection event will remain at the Lake County Fairgrounds (located at 1301 Mentor Avenue) and is scheduled for September 24, 2022 from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

This ongoing relationship provides a sense of security to seniors, knowing someone is checking on them. Volunteers are trained to report concerns and if a senior does not answer the door for delivery. Concerns are shared with the senior's case manager, so that assistance can be offered. Unexpected missed meals are immediately addressed by getting in touch with their emergency contact person and even calling the Mentor Police Department for a well check. The meal delivery serves as the

catalyst for lifesaving intervention and offers families peace of mind.

The Council on Aging also offers Pet Meals on Wheels to supplement and offset pet food cost so that grocery dollars go further, blizzard bags with emergency shelf-stable food, and federal produce and commodity boxes delivered to Mentor Meals on Wheels seniors who meet income eligibility.

Western Reserve Community Development Corporation (WRCDC) has been hard at work in the Lake, Geauga and Ashtabula county communities since 1992 aiding homeowners with emergency and necessary repairs and modifications to their homes.

WRCDC administers the Mentor Single Family Rehabilitation Program which is designed to assist qualified, low-to-moderate-income Mentor residents to have eligible repairs made to their owner-occupied residential property and upgrade their living conditions. Up to \$10,000 per property is available for those who qualify.

Qualifying improvements would generally be those that will bring the structure into greater compliance with local codes and can include:

- Any energy conservation improvements which, when made in conjunction with other code improvements, result in substantial weatherization.
- Site improvements to ensure proper building and yard drainage.
- Repair or replace existing sidewalks.
- Handicapped accessibility improvements.
- Exterior painting.
- Electric and electrical panel updates.
- Foundation repair and waterproofing.



Community partnerships build strong schools

Mentor Public Schools prepares students for jobs

ike many local districts, Mentor Public Schools has long offered like criminal justice, culinary arts, HVAC and welding as potential career paths. What sets Mentor High School's program apart, however, is local partnerships that provide expertise and resources to prepare students for available jobs that meet pressing needs in their community.

One such program is the Fire EMT Academy, which launched in 2021. Like many surrounding communities, the city of Mentor has a shortage of applicants for firefighters and EMT positions. This new initiative assists students in exploring health and safety careers.

Developed as a collaboration between the Mentor Public Schools and the Mentor Fire Department, this cutting-edge program takes place at the Mentor Regional Response Facility.

Through the course, students learn to use medical and diagnostic equipment to perform detailed patient assessments. The course gives students the opportunity to earn EMT basic certification and credentials that are necessary to fill open jobs at the Mentor Fire Department. The fledgling program accepted 10 students this year —16 are enrolled in the fall of 2022 with a waiting list of potential participants. Like other career technical education programs, the EMT course is open to seniors only.

Another retooled offering, the Auto

Service Technology Program, provides hands-on job training. Located at the Classic Automotive Training Center, students learn to repair engines, automatic transmission and transaxles, manual transmissions, drive trains, axles, brakes, electrical systems, heating, and air conditioning. The school district provides an instructor while the Classic Auto Group provides the facility and equipment in this collaborative effort. The course also offers student internships and work-related experiences in the automotive industry.

"Many of our programs are being developed to meet actual needs in the local workforce," noted Kristen Kirby, director of community relations at Mentor Public Schools. "It allows students to find meaningful jobs after graduation — jobs that are available today, and do not necessarily require a four-year college degree."

Mentor's career technical educational programs offer 23 hands-on paths — many are two-year courses where students gain valuable work experience in a field they can pursue as a career. In some instances, students can also earn college credit. In 2021, roughly 25% of Mentor 's nearly 600 graduates participated in career tech classes.

To help them take advantage of these wonderful opportunities, students in grades 9-12 have access to free public transportation through Laketran. Whether traveling from campus to jobs, internships, or home after extracurricular activities, this partnership fills a transportation need for local families while bringing awareness to public transportation services.

In addition, the Mentor Public Library has partnered with the school district to operate The HUB at Mentor High School. Library staff operate the branch, providing library card holders with access to materials and resources after school hours. The location includes a Makerspace, giving students, businesses and community members access to a Cricut maker, large format printer, green screen studio, T-shirt press, and other tools.

"Each of these partnerships helps expand opportunities for our students and the community as well," Kirby explained. "It's a win-win for our schools and for the city of Mentor!"

What sparks your creativity?


A good book, sure. Mentor Public Library can give you those, and its librarians are always happy to make a recommendation.

Emergency

For help in an emergency – including police, fire, or emergency ambulance - dial 9-1-1.

When you dial 9-1-1, the call is answered at the Mentor Dispatch Center, where the address and phone number from where the call originates will automatically appear on the dispatcher's screen.

A dispatcher answers the call by saying "9-1-1, what is your emergency?" State the problem or emergency first, and then give the location of the incident.

The dispatcher will start the fire and/or police departments en route while obtaining additional information from the caller.

Stay on the line until the dispatcher tells you to hang up.

ORDINANCES & PROGRAMS

This summary of selected Mentor city ordinances and programs includes those areas and issues that are most commonly encountered by citizens. The complete Mentor Code of Ordinances can be viewed at cityofmentor.com; click on Ordinances under the "About Mentor" tab.

Animals

Households in residential districts may not have any more than three dogs over the age of four months. Dogs should be leashed at all times when outside. Owners must not permit their dog to bark or howl so that it disturbs the peace. All dogs over three months must be registered with the Lake County Auditor and wear a valid registration tag. Animal bites should be reported to the police department within 24 hours. Owners of both dogs and cats are responsible for picking up after their pets, both on public and private property. Contact the

warden's office at 440-350-2640 to report stray dogs. Hunting is prohibited within city limits.

Dead Animals

Contact Public Works at 440-974-5781 weekdays between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m.; other times, call the Police Department at 440-974-5789.

Exotic and Wild Animals

Keeping any undomesticated animals, including primates other than monkeys, poisonous reptiles. alligators, lizards over two feet long, etc. is restricted. A complete list of wild and exotic animals is available at cityofmentor.com, click on Ordinances under the About Mentor tab.

Farm Animals

Farm animals are not permitted on premises less than two acres in size. These include horses, goats, cows, chickens, ducks and similar animals. Additional zoning requirements may apply. Call 440-974-5740 for specifics.

Nuisance Health Risk Animals

Feeding or harboring of deer, rats, raccoons or skunks is prohibited.

Vicious Animals

Keeping dangerous or vicious animals is prohibited.

Bicycles

The Mentor Police Department offers citizens a no cost bicycle registration program that helps to identify a bike's rightful owner if the bike becomes lost or stolen. When riding on a road, cyclists must follow the traffic laws and ride WITH traffic. Bike paths are to be shared by pedestrians and bicyclists. Bike lanes are exclusively for bicycles, unless there is no sidewalk or shoulder.

Building Permits

Building permits are required for all construction including decks, pools, sheds, porches, enclosures, etc., and must be obtained through Mentor's Engineering & Building Department. Applicants for accessory-type structures need to provide two copies of the construction drawings, consisting of a site plan showing where the structure will be situated on the property, and the distance from all property lines. Plans must also show how the structure will be built, materials used, etc.

Once submitted, the plan review process takes about five working days (permits for sheds built from a kit can be obtained at the time of submission). A permit fee is charged, along with a refundable construction deposit, which can be returned if the structure passes all inspections.

Both building permit and zoning permit applications are required for all construction projects including (but not limited to): additions, decks, garages, pools, fences, siding, sheds, porches, driveways and enclosures.

For accessory buildings 200 square feet or less, only a zoning permit is required for review and approval by the Department of Planning and Development. If the accessory building is larger than 200 square feet, a review by both the Building Department and the Planning Department will be required. Applications for any new building or structure include two copies of the construction drawings and a site

plan that indicates where the structure will be located on the property. the size and height of the structure, and the distance from all property lines. Plans must also show how the structure will be built (materials used, etc.). Once submitted, the review process takes approximately 7 to 10 working days. A permit fee is charged, along with a construction deposit, which will be refunded if the structure passes all inspections. When a permit is issued, work on the project may begin.

Cars for Sale

Vehicles that are for sale in residential districts must be titled to the current resident, properly licensed, operable, displayed for a maximum of two weeks and parked on an improved parking surface (not on the lawn). The number of vehicles for sale is limited to two per year.

Curfew

Children under 12 are prohibited from being outside between 9:30 pm and 5 am; children 12 to 16 years old between 11 pm and 5 am, and 16 to 18 years old from midnight to 5 am. A new daytime curfew restricts school-aged children from being out of school during regularly scheduled school hours, unless accompanied by a parent or legal quardian, or the child has an authorized written excuse.

Drainage Ditches

All premises shall be graded and maintained to prevent the accumulation of standing water. No owner or occupant of any premises shall cause or permit any natural watercourse, drainage ditch, creek, brook, culvert, or drain located upon the premises to become obstructed with leaves or other debris so that water flow is hindered. Call 440-974-5785 with questions.

Fences

A permit is required if you plan on installing, altering, or relocating a fence. Fences in the rear yard of a residence must not exceed six feet in height. Fences in the front yard or on a corner lot facing a side street may not exceed three feet in height and must be decorative and at least 50 percent open.

Garage Sales

A permit is not required; however, sales are limited to three per year and no sale shall exceed four consecutive days. Garage sale signs are permitted only on the property where the sale is being held. Signs may NOT be posted at any street corner or on tree lawns or utility poles. Illegally posted signs will be confiscated by the City without notice.

Garbage & Recycling

Garbage cans, recycling containers, bulk items, and yard waste may only be placed at the curb after 3 pm the day before the items are to be collected.

After collection, garbage cans, recycling bins, and yard waste containers must be retrieved from the curb by 7 am the day after your collection.

During the fall, the yard waste restriction does not apply begin-

ning on the weekend immediately preceding the fourth Monday in October through Friday of the second full week in December in any year of city-sponsored yard waste collection.

Grass and Weed Control

Generally, grass in residential neighborhoods must be controlled in height and kept less than eight inches. Weeds (such as goldenrod, ragweed, and thistle) that cause skin reactions and respiratory problems are not permitted to grow on any premises. No owner or occupant shall permit vegetation to create a safety hazard.

Property owners with excessively high grass or weeds will be given 48 hours from receipt of notice to comply with the ordinance. If compliance is not met, a city crew will be sent to cut the grass or weeds of any unoccupied properties and the property owner will be billed. Occupied properties in violation will be prosecuted in the Mentor court. Call 440-974-5792 with questions.





Home Occupations

Any business conducted out of a residence requires one of two types of permits. One permit is administratively approved, while the other requires approval by the Municipal Planning Commission. Call 440-974-5740 with questions.

House Numbers

House numbers must be displayed in a conspicuous location in order to ensure efficient police, fire, and postal services. Numbers, no less than four inches tall, are to be displayed on houses less than 61 feet from the road right-of-way. Numbers at least six inches tall are to be displayed on houses located between 61 feet to 100 feet from the road right-of-way.

Income Tax

All persons earning income in the city are subject to a two percent municipal income tax. Mentor residents must file an annual municipal income tax return with the Regional Income Tax Agency (RITA); retired

persons can file an exemption to show no earned wages. Residents are granted 100 percent credit for city income tax paid to other communities. If you have questions, call 800-860-RITA.

Jogging

Joggers are encouraged to pursue their recreational activity of choice in a safe and responsible manner, and to follow these rules:

- Jogging upon a roadway is illegal if an accessible, adjacent sidewalk is provided.
- Where a sidewalk is not provided, iog only on the shoulder of the roadway, as far as possible from the edge of the roadway.
- Where neither a sidewalk nor a shoulder is available, jog as near as possible to the outside edge of the road; if it's a two-way road, jog ONLY on the left side. Any joggers on a roadway shall yield the right of way to ALL vehicles.

Light Trespass

High intensity density (HID) lighting must have full cut-off fixtures or be shielded to prevent trespass or glare. All spot or flood lighting must be shielded or aimed to prevent light trespass. Call 440-974-5792 with questions.

Mosquito Control

The Lake County General Health District oversees mosquito control during the summer months. Spraying schedules are posted on The Mentor Channel as they become available. If you have concerns about the spraying, call the Health District at 440-350-2543.

Noise

No person shall unreasonably create a noise disturbance within the city. Any noise that annoys or disturbs a reasonable person, or causes adverse effects on humans, is prohibited before 7 am or after 9 pm weekdays, and before 8:30 am or after 9 pm on Saturdays and Sundays. Call the Mentor Police De-

Open Burning

The burning of trash, brush, or leaves is not permitted. Small, attended cooking campfires are permitted during favorable weather conditions without prior approval. Bonfires require prior approval of the Fire Prevention Bureau by calling 440-974-5768.

Parking

Overnight street parking between the hours of 2 to 6 a.m. is prohibited. Parking on the fire hydrant side of the street is prohibited. Parking on any city street whenever there is more than a two-inch accumulation of snow or ice is prohibited.

• Motor Vehicles - In residential districts, motor vehicles must be parked on an improved surface. Improved surfaces are those constructed of concrete, asphalt or permeable pavers, without excess weeds or grass.

- · RVs, Boats, and Dual-Axle Trailers - RVs, boats, and dual axle trailers may not be parked in front of the main structure. A minimum three-foot set back is required from side property lines. On corner lots, no RV, boat, or dual axle trailer parking is permitted between the right-of-way and side of the main structure. Parking must be on an improved surface of concrete, asphalt or permeable pavers.
- Commercial Vehicles No more than one commercial vehicle per dwelling unit may be parked on a residential property. No vehicle, having a net total weight of greater than 10,000 pounds, shall be parked on a residential property. Parking must be on an improved surface of concrete, asphalt or permeable pavers. No construction equipment or vehicle (including, but not limited to, backhoes, bulldozers, trenchers) shall be parked in residential districts for more than 30 days.

Property Maintenance

Property owners are required to maintain the exterior of their premises so that its appearance does not negatively impact the immediate neighborhood. All residential rental properties must be inspected every two years. If you are renting an apartment or house, and you feel the property is not properly maintained, call the Code Enforcement Office at 440-974-5792.

Refuse Collection (Commercial & Industrial)

Commercial and industrial rubbish haulers collecting in the city of Mentor are required to obtain a contractor's license and vehicle permit.

Satellite Dishes

Satellite dishes are permitted in rear yards only and must be at least 10 feet from the side and rear property lines. The maximum height permitted is 12 feet; the maximum diameter is 10 feet. A permit is reguired. Dishes less than one meter in diameter (39.37 inches) do not

require a permit. It is recommended that the smaller dishes be located in the rear yard. DIRECTV and DISH residential units are exempt.

Sidewalks and Driveways

Property owners are required to keep their sidewalks and driveway aprons within the public right-ofway in a proper state of repair. If cracked, defective, or uneven, they must be repaired or replaced. An annual sidewalk inspection and maintenance program is ongoing. Property owners or persons responsible for the premises shall keep the sidewalk(s) adjacent to such building in a clean condition at all times (this includes clearing the property's sidewalks of snow and ice, per Ord. 521.06).

Signs

"Garage Sale" signs are permitted only on the actual property where the sale is taking place and only when posted behind the tree lawn. Similar signs are not permitted off-premises and will be confiscated, without prior notice, when observed by the city. (See "garage sales.")

Snow and Ice Control

- Clearing of City Streets Arterial and major collector streets are given first priority for snow and ice control. All major intersections on the major arterial highway system are salted and/ or cindered, along with certain hills and bridges. Residential neighborhoods are cleared when conditions warrant. Call 440-974-5781 with routine snow and ice control inquiries.
- · No Parking During Snow Emergency – A snow emergency is when there has been an accumulation of more than two inches of snow, sleet, hail, or ice on any streets/roads. No parking is permitted on city streets during a snow emergency.
- Depositing Snow & Ice on Public Sidewalks or Roadways - Depositing snow or ice onto any public

- sidewalk, street, road, or highway is not permitted.
- Access to Fire Hydrants Property owners are urged to adopt the fire hydrant closest to their property to keep the hydrant clear from snow during the winter months.

Solicitation

It is unlawful to solicit without first obtaining a solicitor's permit from the Mentor Police Department. It is unlawful to solicit at any premise at which a "No Solicitors" sign is displayed. "No Solicitors" signs are available from the Mentor Police Department.

Streetlights

Streetlights within the city of Mentor are paid through assessment of the benefiting property owners. If you observe a streetlight in need of repair, please call 440-974-5781.

Trees on Right-of-Way/ **Tree Lawn**

- Dead Trees No owner or occupant of any premises shall permit a dead tree to stand near to a public sidewalk or roadway as to endanger users should all or part of it fall. No owner or occupant shall permit a dead branch to overhang a public sidewalk or roadwav.
- Planting & Removing of Trees -The city of Mentor has specific ordinances which property owners are required to follow when trimming, removing and planting trees within the right-of-way or tree lawn. Call Public Works at 440-974-5781 for details.

Traffic Signals/Signs

Traffic signals and signs are installed and maintained by the Public Works Department. For service requests, including repair or replacement of these devices, call 440-974-5781. Emergency or weekend repairs should be reported to the Mentor Police Department at 440-974-5789.



CITY DEPARTMENTS Office of the City Manager

The city manager serves as the chief executive officer and safety director and is responsible for planning, organizing, and directing the activities of all municipal operations.

The city manager appoints all department heads and employees; ensures that laws and ordinances governing the city are faithfully enforced; recommends to the city council measures or actions which appear necessary or desirable: recommends municipal ordinances and regulations; implements policies established by city council; prepares and submits to council the administrative budget and capital improvement program; and performs other activities as provided for in the city charter.

The city manager is appointed by city council for his expertise, education, and prior managerial experience. The following divisions are part of the city manager's office:

- Human Resources Oversees employee recruitment, selection and testing; employee safety, training and development; labor relations; employee compensation and equal employment opportunity; and processing of accident and injury reports.
- Information Technology Provides technical support services to city departments including application design and development, post implementation support and training, process analysis, technical consulting and project management.
- Public Information Responsible for disseminating information to the general public related to city projects, events, activities, and services through various means including press releases, newsletters, publications, city website, social media, apps. advertising. The Mentor Channel, and Mentor Radio 1620.

Clerk of Council

The clerk of council is appointed by city council members to keep its records and perform all duties as prescribed by the council.

Planning & Development

Responsible for establishing a diversified economic base with an emphasis on retention and expansion of existing firms, while attracting growth-oriented industries.

Provides staff to the International Trade Program. Oversees day-to-day development concerns and long-range land-use planning issues.

The department assists in administering the Federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, provides staff support to the Municipal Planning Commission and the Board of Building & Zoning Appeals, issues sign and fence permits, and prepares reports and studies dealing with land use, rezoning, subdivision and site plans, conditional use permits, signage, etc.

The department is also responsible for addressing property maintenance issues and administration of the multi-family and single-family rental inspection programs.

Engineering & Building

The department engineers and administers the city's capital improvements, regulates private utility work within the public right-of-way, and inspects building construction for community standards to promote the safety of homes and buildings. The department has two divisions:

- Engineering Directly involved with all utility and publicly or privately funded roadway construction in Mentor, both in reviewing and approving the construction plans, and inspecting the construction work performed. It is also involved with planning future public improvement projects, storm drainage assistance, municipal architectural design, and traffic control.
- Building Involved in all activities associated with residential and commercial building construction, including reviewing plans for conformance with building codes and performing on-site inspections to monitor building-code compliance. Helps with building-related concerns.

Finance Department

The finance department keeps accounts of all city financial transactions. This involves day-to-day budget administration, payment of accounts, payroll preparation, and maintenance of fixed asset records. receipt and investment of monies, municipal income tax enforcement, auditing, debt administration, city insurance, and reporting the city's financial condition.

Fire Department

The fire chief organizes, directs and coordinates all fire resources. to accomplish the mission of saving lives and community property.

• Fire and Rescue Division -Provides lifesaving and property protection including: the handling of fires, rescues, medical and sudden mechanical emergencies, hazardous materials and natural disasters. Services are provided from five fire stations staffed 24 hours a day.

- Fire Prevention Bureau –
- Enforces the fire safety code and the ordinances of the city through routine inspections of businesses, industries, schools and shopping centers for the purpose of reducing the chance of fires. Also reviews all plans for new construction and investigates the causes of fires.
- Training and Public Education The training division provides continuous in-service and specialized training for members of the fire department as well as conducting home exit drills, evacuation planning, accident prevention, first aid, CPR and fire extinguisher training. The division also provides educational programs through schools, businesses, community organizations and civic groups, and works with the Fire Prevention Bureau on juvenile fire setter counseling programs.

Law Department

The law director is the adviser to, and the attorney and counsel for, the city of Mentor, its officers and divisions. The director and his staff represent the city for prosecutions for offenses against the ordinances of Mentor and the relevant Ohio laws. The law director is appointed by city council and is an attorney-at-law, admitted to the practice of law in the state of Ohio.

Municipal Court

The Mentor municipal judge tries all misdemeanors and ordinance violations occurring within the cities of Mentor and Mentor-on-the-Lake. Mentor Municipal Court hears traffic citation cases, civil cases valued up to \$15,000, landlord/tenant cases and all small claims complaints valued up to \$3,000. All felony cases are heard to determine probable cause and then bound over to the Lake County Common Pleas Court. The Court Probation Department oversees all persons placed on probation by the court for any offense.

Parks, Recreation and Public Facilities

This department enhances the quality of life for residents through the development and maintenance of a diverse and comprehensive system of parks and recreational facilities. The department's areas of responsibility include: recreation for youth, teens, and adults; operating and maintaining municipal pools, ice arena, Black Brook Golf Course and Practice Center, senior citizens center, Mentor Lagoons Nature Preserve & Marina, Wildwood Cultural Center several community centers; cemetery operations; facility rentals; and maintaining city facilities and parks.

Police Department

The chief of police organizes, directs and coordinates all police resources to serve Mentor citizens.

- Communications Center Receives information and requests from the public and dispatches calls to police and fire personnel.
- Community Services Officers maintain a strong and effective

working relationship with citizens.

- Corrections Provides for the safety and security of the Mentor jail and the care of inmates.
- Detective/Juvenile Bureau Responsible for follow-up investigations of all major felony crimes that occur in the school district. Lake County Juvenile Court and other youth service organizations in the community.
- Patrol Services Bureau Responsible for the protection of life and property, the preservation of peace, repression of crime, apprehension of criminal suspects, prevention of delinquency, traffic direction and control, accident investigation, and traffic law enforcement.
- Records Bureau Provides information to support the police department and assist the general public.
- · Victim Assistance Program -Serves victims of crime through information, crisis intervention. referrals and court advocacy.

Public Works

Responsible for the construction and maintenance of city streets; the maintenance and operation of the storm water infrastructure system and the city's traffic signal system; the management of the city's fleet of vehicles and equipment: the city's waste collection programs, and the maintenance and improvements of all municipal public lands, urban forestry and street trees.

More than 50 residents volunteer their expertise and input to city officials through their participation on city boards and commissions.

These citizens are appointed by city council and represent a valuable resource by making recommendations on various municipal issues.

Board of Building & Zoning Appeals (BZA)

The seven-member board hears and determines appeals for exceptions to and variations from the city's zoning and building codes to ensure that they remain in harmony with municipal ordinances and regulations. Members serve four-year terms. Members meet the second Tuesday of each month at 7 pm at the municipal center. Agendas are posted at cityofmentor.com.

Civil Service Commission

Ensures that consideration for appointments and promotions within the police and fire department's classified service are made according to merit and fitness, based on competitive examination. Three residents serve four-year terms.

Community Arts Commission

Fourteen members provide direction and assistance to the Parks, Recreation, & Public Facilities Department in developing cultural programs to suit the needs of the

community. Members serve threeyear terms.

Fair Housing Board

Members serve three-year terms to review and oversee fair housing concerns.

Lake County Combined General Health Board

Two residents are appointed to serve on this board to oversee the operations and programs of the Lake County Health Department.

Municipal Planning Commission

Members review all new industrial and commercial buildings, subdivisions, rezoning requests, and conditional use permits. Seven members each serve four-vear terms and meet every three weeks on Thursdays at 7 pm at the municipal center. Meetings are carried live on The Mentor Channel (Spectrum 1024 and AT&T's channel 99). The meetings are also streamed live at TheMentorChannel.com. Meeting

Tree Commission

Four members establish and administer Mentor's Master Street Tree Plan. Each serves a four-year term.
