

TRIP REPORT  
**SOUTHERN PERU 4/7 - 1/8 2002**

## INTRODUCTION

Looking for other options, when my plans for a birding trip to California hadn't materialised, I came upon an ad on the World Birding Discussion Board. Two Dutch birders were planning a trip to Southern Peru and wanted one or two companions in order to bring down costs. After some correspondence I decided to come along.

At this point the itinerary was already set and all the practical arrangements made - therefore this report is mainly a brief summary of my impressions of the places visited and of the arrangements made by Tanager Tours and Kolibri Expeditions.

The report consists of three parts; a diary, a summary of my impressions with a few recommendations and finally a trip list of all the birds recorded by me - all in all 519 species.

## 4-5/7 SWEDEN - LIMA

To get cheap flight tickets from Europe to Lima, you need to book very well in advance - preferably eight or nine months!

Being late I could only get a ticket to Santiago de Chile and had to fly from there to Lima - the journey from door to door ended up taking 42 hours!

## 6-7/7 LIMA

I had two days to pass before my travel companions, Dutch birders Dave van der Spoel and Hans Meijer, and for the first part of the trip Jay Lamb from the US, arrived. Since I knew we had a full schedule ahead I chose to take it easy staying in Lima.

I really didn't like the city at all but it does have a few nice colonial buildings in the old city centre and a couple of very interesting museums - like the Museum of Anthropology and the fabulous Gold Museum.

In the parks I acquainted myself with species like **Amazilia Hummingbird**, **Pacific Dove**, **Croaking Ground-Dove**, **Shiny Cowbird** and the local melanistic form of **Vermilion Flycatcher**.

## 8/7 LIMA - CUSCO - HUACARPAY LAKES - PAUCARTAMBO

This morning we took an early flight to Cusco where Wim ten Have, the owner of Tanager Tours and our guide for the next ten days, met us at the airport.

After a light meal we headed out towards Huacarpay Lakes, 30 km from Cusco - an easily accessible system of small lakes holding some 95 species, including three endemics.

Species recorded included **Cinereous Harrier**, **Yellow-billed Pintail**, **Andean Duck**, **Plumbeous Rail**, **Wren-like Rushbird**, **Many-coloured Rush-Tyrant**, **Andean Negrito**, **Yellow-winged Blackbird**, and in the dry hills surrounding the lakes a splendid **Bearded Mountaineer** and the sculky **Rusty-fronted Canastero**.

From Huacarpay we continued driving until after dark - spending the night at a rustic hotel in the small town of Paucartambo.

## 9/7 MANU ROAD (PAUCARTAMBO - PILLAHUATA)

The following three days were spent on the famed Manú Road going down the eastern slope of the Andes into Manú National Park.

What makes birding this particular stretch of road so fantastic is the fact that the road starts high up in the dry puna zone above 3,500 m, slowly winding down through the temperate, subtropical and upper tropical zones until it finally hits the humid tropical lowlands below 500 m.

The first day we descended through the puna and temperate zones to Pillahuata at 2,600 m, where we spent the night in sleeping bags on the floor of a small shed. Our original intention had been to camp out, but these days the weather was exceptionally wet and rainy for the dry season.

Birds recorded between the entrance to Manú National Park and Pillahuata included **Puna Thistletail**, **Golden-collared Tanager**, **Rufous-webbed Tyrant**, **Cusco Brush-Finch** (a split from Slaty Brush-Finch), and **Moustached**, **Masked** and **Black-throated Flowerpiercer**.

At Pillahuata we found e.g. **Yungas Pygmy-Owl**, **Gould's Inca**, **Azara's Spinetail**, **Streaked Tuftedcheek**, **Montane Woodcreeper** and **Grass-green Tanager**.

## 10/7 MANU ROAD (PILLAHUATA - SAN PEDRO)

The day started well with six **Rufous-bellied Nighthawks** flying around outside our humble abode. Before we headed on we took a walk in the surroundings and added e.g. **Fawn-breasted Tanager**, **Chestnut-bellied Mountain-Tanager**, **Citrine Warbler**, **Blue-banded Toucanet**, **Bolivian Tyrannulet** and, after some work with the tape-recorder, **Red-and-white Antpitta** to our list.

Continuing down through the subtropical zone towards San Pedro, at 1,500 m, the trees started growing higher and the climate became less harsh.

Some of the best birds along this particular stretch were **Maroon-chested Chat-Tyrant**, **Plush-capped Finch**, **Buff-thighed Puffleg**, **Versicoloured Barbet**, **Slaty Tanager**, **Black-eared Hemispingus** and **Tawny-rumped Tyrannulet**.

Well at San Pedro we found another ramshackle house to spend the night in (no complaints - just very basic). In the area we found our first **Highland Motmot**.

### 11/7 MANU ROAD (SAN PEDRO - PANTIACOLLA LODGE)

This morning we woke up to the far away call of a **Rufescent Screech-Owl**. Some km down the road we made a stop and walked a stretch that looked promising and stumbled over a very good flock containing some nice species like **Golden-bellied Warbler**, **Cinnamon-faced Tyrannulet** and **Olive Finch**\*

\*This very rare species were seen reasonably well only by me (Wim only caught a very brief glimpse). The bird was dark olive/grey with a finch-like beak and reddish on the front and top of the head. I only saw the bird for a few seconds and I never saw the back of the head, but there seem to be no confusion species in the area.

Our next stop we made at the village of Chuncachaca. In the dry grassy areas we found **Rufous-bellied Seedeater**, but also loads of chiggers that were to torment me for the next week or so. Beware!

We then continued down to the Alto Madre de Dios where a boat was waiting to take us to Pantiacolla Lodge. The birding along the river was rather good with species like **Drab Water-Tyrant**, **Large-billed Tern**, **Swallow-wing**, **White-banded Swallow** and lots of **Fasciated Tiger-Herons**.

### 12-17/7 PANTIACOLLA LODGE

Since Pantiacolla Lodge is one of the prime birding lodges in the Manú region, with 537 species recorded we stayed there for five nights - giving us time to explore large parts of the lodge's extensive and well-maintained trail system.

The trail system consists of six trails going through different habitats. The most productive trails are probably the Tinamou and Capybara trails going through lowland varzea forest spangled with bamboo stands. Here you could always see lots of birds. Typical species recorded in this habitat includes **Bluish-fronted Jacamar**, **Chestnut-capped Puffbird**, **Goeldi's Antbird**, **White-cheeked Tody-Tyrant**, **Flammulated Bamboo-Tyrant** and **Dusky-tailed Flatbill**.

The three drier terra firme trails; Oropendola, Arakari and Monk Saki are also very good. They all have a similar set of species and here you can expect birds like **Great Jacamar**, **Speckled Spinetail**, **Cinereous Mourner** and good tanager flocks.

Birds that can be found in both habitats include **Pale-winged Trumpeter**, **Cinnamon-throated Woodcreeper**, **Musician Wren**, **Gilded Barbet** and Army Ant-followers like **Black-spotted Bare-eye**.

The sixth trail is the Mirador trail working itself up through the terra firme up to a viewpoint at 1,100 m. This trail is often rather quiet and we didn't go all the way up to the viewpoint. If you have the time and the stamina it might be worthwhile though since birds like **Golden-collared Toucanet** and **Black Tinamou** have been found on the higher parts. The most interesting bird noted by us was a **Bartlett's Tinamou** running across the trail.

Down by the beach is also a nice spot and every evening loads of **Sand-coloured Nighthawks** come in to roost, and if you'd like to look out for over-flying **Macaws** or raptors this might be a good hang-out.

Along the river there's also a small clay-lick where **Blue-headed Macaw** can be seen in the morning.

Apart from the birds the lodge is a great place to spend some time at, with friendly service, good food and a lot of other animals - we recorded six different monkey species during our stay!

## **18/7 PANTIACOLLA LODGE - AMAZONIA LODGE**

After a last walk along the trails (where Hans managed to see Peruvian Recurvebill while I was standing just around the corner - dip of the trip) we took the boat back to Shintuya and then on to Amazonia Lodge.

While waiting for transportation in Shintuya we did some birding in the immediate surroundings and added **Rufous-breasted Piculet** and **Dark-breasted Spinetail** to the ever-growing trip list.

Arriving at Amazonia we got totally drenched by a heavy rainfall while walking the few km from the boat to the lodge. After a hot shower (very welcome after a week of freezing ones at Pantiacolla), and a change of clothes it was nice to end the day with a tasty Pisco Sour on the veranda.

## **19/7 AMAZONIA LODGE - COCK-OF-THE-ROCK LODGE**

After breakfast we spent some time watching eight species of hummingbird come in to feed on the Verbena plantations in the garden. My favourite was definitely the diminutive **Rufous-crested Coquette**.

The lodge also has a trail system. In the vicinities of the lodge **Hoatzin** and **Black-capped Donacobius** are easily encountered. By the nearby landslide we found our other two target species - **Dusky-headed Parakeet** and **Blackish Nightjar**.

After lunch we left for the Cock-of-the-rock lodge. Between Atalaya and Pilcopata, Dave spotted both **Swallow-tailed Kite** and **Long-tailed Tyrant** from the car.

The best bird of the day however was to be encountered by Hans - a **Lanceolated Monklet** (Yes!!) not many km before arriving at the lodge. I even managed to get a few blurry photos of the bird before it took off.

## 20/7 COCK-OF-THE-ROCK LODGE

The Cock-of-the-rock lodge only has a very short and badly maintained trail system, so you do most of the birding along the road. After the mandatory display of the **Andean Cock-of-the-rock** we birded in the vicinities ticking off **Bronze-green Euphonia**, **Yungas Manakin** and **Solitary Eagle**.

Back at the lodge we found **Long-tailed Sylph** and **Grey-mantled Wren**.

In the afternoon we ventured slightly higher up along the road and managed to see our only **Crested Quetzal**. Before dark we ended a successful day with **Band-winged Nightjar** and a pair of displaying **Lyre-tailed Nightjars** - a truly fantastic bird.

## 21/7 COCK-OF-THE-ROCK LODGE - CUSCO

Time to leave Cock-of-the-rock for our very last day on Manú road - a little sad but also filled with expectations for the rest of the trip.

A short stop near Esperanza yielded **Black-capped Hemispingus** and the highlight of the day - a superb **Black-throated Tody-Tyrant**.

Before the pass, we took a short break at 3,600 m. We were now back in the harsh, but exiting, puna zone enjoying species like **Great Sapphirewing** and **White-browed Conebill**.

Up at the pass a **Darwin's Nothura** crossed the road. We pulled over but the bird flew away before we could get a good view of it (the similar Andean Tinamou does not occur in the area) and we continued down to Cusco.

## 22/7 CUSCO - MACHU PICCHU - OLLANTAYTAMBO

This day we took a day trip to Machu Picchu to see the fantastic ruins. Being the peak tourist season the place was rather overcrowded, but it's still not to be missed.

Birding-wise the day was rather disappointing. We looked around for the Inca Wren but only found a **Rusty Flowerpiercer**.

Along the stream between the ruins and the town of Aguas Calientes **Torrent Ducks** were easily encountered, and we also saw a **Green-and-white Hummingbird**.

## 23/7 OLLANTAYTAMBO - HUARÁN - CANCHA CANCHA

After spending the night at a nice hotel in Ollantaytambo we headed off towards the nearby town of Huarán for the, in my opinion, most exciting part of the whole trip!

Huarán (at 2,800 m), a small town between Ollantaytambo and Cusco, is the starting point for the hike up to Cancha Cancha (at 3,800 m). What makes Cancha Cancha so special is that the place holds a well preserved Polylepis forest - a habitat that has been tragically destroyed in most other parts of Peru.

The village of Cancha Cancha is taking part in a programme to save Polylepis forest by receiving free Eucalyptus firewood, and we were the first birding group to visit the site. The two-day excursion was lead by Goyo from ECOAN (Asociación Ecosistemas Andinos).

At Huarán we met up with our local guides and horses to carry our equipment. Close to the town we encountered our first endemics - **Bearded Mountaineer**, **Chestnut-breasted Mountain-Finch** and **Rusty-fronted Canastero**.

The walk up to Cancha Cancha was rather pleasant - but still took us six hours since the birding along the trail was absolutely fabulous and the scenery very beautiful. Birds recorded included **Creamy-crested Spinetail**, **White-bellied Hummingbird**, **White-tufted Sunbeam**, **White-capped Dipper**, **Thick-billed Siskin**, **Blue-capped Tanager** and our first Polylepis species; several Tit-like **Dacnis** and the target **Giant Conebill**.

Well at Cancha Cancha, we made us at home on the floor of the local school. Remember to bring a warm sleeping bag since it's freezing cold during night!

### 24/7 CANCHA CANCHA - HUARÁN - CUSCO

The main patch of Polylepis is situated above the village and it's a quite steep and strenuous walk to get there - when we visited, Peru had experienced a period of unusually harsh weather and we had to walk through deep snow.

However - it was very well worth the effort. The forest was absolutely splendid and we could easily tick off sought-after species like **Ash-breasted Tit-Tyrant**, **Tawny Tit-Spinetail** and our main target - the rare and threatened **Royal Cinclodes**.

The forest holds a sizeable population of Royal Cinclodes and it's normally much easier to find here than at the traditional site of Abra Málaga. Most of the population is found in the higher part of the forest - by a scenic lake on a mountain plateau. When we visited the birds we saw were found lower down - they had probably descended due to the unusually cold weather.

In the afternoon it was a very content group of birders that walked down to Huarán for the short car ride back to Cusco.

### 25/7 CUSCO - LIMA (EXCURSION TO PANTANOS DE VILLA)

After a morning flight to Lima we had the rest of the day off. We decided to take a taxi to Pantanos de Villa - a wetland in the southern part of the town.

This is a very easily accessible site with several watchtowers and a small visitors centre, and a great place to see gulls and waterfowl and the impressive **Great Grebe**.

### 26/7 LIMA - SAN PEDRO DE CASTA

From now on the rest of the trip was arranged by Kolibri Expeditions - owned and managed by Swedish expatriate and renowned birder Gunnar Engblom.

For the tour to Marcopomacocha we were joined by British birders Trevor Feltham and Peter Nash and Tasmanian sea-bird expert Tim Reid.

Our problems soon began as one of our two cars broke down somewhere close to San Pedro de Casta - luckily we had intended to stop here anyway - just not the whole afternoon.

The dry hills proved to be an excellent spot and as the sun started warming the hillsides we enjoyed birds like **Peruvian Sheartail**, **Bronze-tailed Comet**, **Rusty-bellied Brush-Finch**, **Great Inca-Finch**, **Peruvian Pygmy-Owl**, several **Black-necked Woodpeckers** (According to Gunnar, birds seen more than three times

were trash-birds, so I guess this was a trash-bird!) and the star of the day - **Rufous-breasted Warbling-Finch**.

While birding, our driver drove down to the village of Chosica to get spare-parts, but when he finally came back they didn't fit. We made it up to San Pedro anyway and the driver went off once again so that we would have the second car repaired by the morning.

## 27/7 SAN PEDRO DE CASTA - MILLOC

This day we were heading up to nearly 5,000 m and we wanted to make sure we had two working cars in case anyone got altitude sickness.

Unfortunately the second car still wasn't repaired but after a small debate we decided to go ahead anyway with the bad car slowly following behind since it could still be driven on low gear - barely.

Our first stop was a small patch of Polylepis where we almost immediately found what we looked for - the endangered **White-cheeked Cotinga**. A bit further on we spotted an **Andean Condor** from the car. A promising beginning of the day!

By the Milloc dam, however, we run out of luck when our only good car broke down completely and we had no choice but to stay put and wait for backup.

We weren't too worried though since Gunnar had ordered a new car from Lima and the not so good one was joining - we should at least be able to get down safely.

The area of the breakdown was right by a large bog, so some of us decided to do some birding while waiting for assistance, especially since there was a chance for the almost mythical Diademed Sandpiper-Plover.

We didn't find any Plovers, but birding was still excellent with e.g. **Puna Snipe**, **Andean Swallow** and **Rufous-bellied** and **Grey-breasted Seedsnipe**.

In the bog was also a small lake, which turned out to hold several interesting species including **Giant Coot** and a couple of the rare **Southern Pochard**.

After some waiting we realised that our other car wasn't coming and there was no sign of the backup car from Lima. Gunnar tried to make radio contact but connections were bad. Finally he decided to run (!) the 20 km to nearest village (Cheque) to get help.

The mood in the group wasn't on top but some of us continued birding until the weather got worse and it started to snow. We then made ourselves at home in the power station's small guardhouse. Peter and Hans weren't feeling to good, but thanks to the very friendly guard we got some hot chocolate to drink and mattresses to sleep on.



By one a.m. Gunnar finally showed up - in an ambulance!! Including the drivers we were ten persons - not very comfortable in one vehicle.

We were still happy to get moving since we were supposed to join an early morning pelagic from Callao!

The plan was for the ambulance to take us to Cheque, where two new cars from Lima were waiting for us - they weren't - so the ambulance took us to a nearby village where we had to get on the local bus to Chosica. By this time we weren't expecting to make it in time for the pelagic.

After a few km on the bus we finally met up with our cars and we could get going with some speed.

### 28/7 MILLOC - LIMA (PELAGIC)

Since the pelagic was arranged by Kolibri Expeditions it had not departed without us and a few hours late we could finally head out to sea - tired but happy!

In spite of the late departure the pelagic turned out to be a hit. We got close views of goodies like **Waved** and **Salvin's Albatross** (a split from Shy Albatross), **Westland Petrel**, **Markham's Storm-Petrel**, **Peruvian Diving-Petrel** and **Humboldt Penguin**. The best record though was **Brown Skua** - a new species for Peru!

Apart from the birds it was also great fun to see a Bryde's Whale right by the boat.

The last three days we were supposed to head up north to Cordillera Blanca but due to our misfortunes Gunnar proposed a new itinerary in order to make up for the species we dipped the day before. We also agreed on a price reduction for the trip.

### 29/7 LIMA (EXCURSION TO LOMAS DE LACHAY AND PUCUSANA)

This day we decided to stay close to Lima and pick up some of the specialities of the dry coastal area.

First we headed up towards Reserva Nacional de Lachay. Along the highway we were pulled over by the police - when leaving the checkpoint the car (not the same car as before) wouldn't get started! After some help from a friendly police officer we finally managed to push start it!

The southern part of the reserve consists of dry cactus vegetation and is one of the very few places where you can find the endemic **Cactus Canastero**. It took some searching, but we all got great views of the bird. **Greyish Miner** and **Burrowing Owl** were nice bonuses.

Heading towards the main entrance we ticked off **Least Seedsnipe** and an impressive 74 **Peruvian Tick-knees**. Unfortunately the car had had it - the gearbox got stuck in third gear!

Gunnar took us as far as the turn-off for the reserve where we caught a taxi (Which we had to push start!!) to the park headquarters. Here the desert suddenly turns green - a strange fog sustained landscape called loma.

Our target bird here was the Thick-billed Miner, but due to the prevailing fog it was impossible to do any birding and we could do nothing but wait for Gunnar to pick us up with a repaired car.

After an hour or so we could continue down the coast to Pucusana where we managed to see our three targets - **Red-legged Cormorant**, **Blackish Oystercatcher** and **Seaside Cinclodes** - just before dark.

### 30/7 LIMA - MARCOPOMACocha - LA OROYA

This was the start of our newly planned two-day "compensation tour" to see the high altitude species we had dipped on a couple of days ago.

First we headed up towards Marcopomacocha again. En route we had lunch at Río Blanco - picking up a few very nice birds like **Striated Earthcreeper**, **Rusty-crowned Tit-Spintail** and **Black Metaltail**.

At the Yalicayu turnoff we saw **Plain-breasted Earthcreeper** and **Streak-throated Canastero**.

A bit further on (at 4,600 m) we found **Olivaceous Thornbill** and one of my absolute favourites - two splendid **White-bellied Cinclodes** - one of Peru's rarest birds.

Still no trace of the DSP though. Our last chance was the so called "Marcopomacocha-Milloc crossroad bog" - an extensive bog area at 4,800 m. We split up in order to cover as much ground as possible and after a while our efforts were finally rewarded - Tim had found three **Diademed Sandpiper-Plovers**! Finally!

While admiring the Plover the weather suddenly changed and it started to snow heavily, making our descent to La Oroya rather unpleasant.

### 31/7 LA OROYA - LAKE JUNÍN - LIMA

Our last day of birding, and Dave and Hans had to catch a flight to Amsterdam the same evening so we had decided to only make a quick morning stop at Lake Junín to have a look at the **Junín Grebe**.

One of the main threats to the Grebe is that the lake's water level is regulated by a hydroelectric power plant. When we visited the water level was unusually low and it was very difficult to reach the deeper parts of the lake by boat. What we had to do was to get in the freezing water and drag the boat to the edge of the reeds, at times with water and mud almost up to your waist. The whole procedure took us six hours! But we saw the bird!

People in the nearby village must have thought we were deranged. Not without reason...

Even worse, our car had broken down again and could not be driven at any speed. We slowly made it to Junín where we caught a taxi to Lima.

Junín - Lima is normally a four and a half-hour drive on winding mountain roads, but since it was only four hours until Dave and Hans' flight we paid the driver extra to take us there as quick as he could. He made in three hours - definitely most hazardous drive of my life!

## SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

As mentioned earlier I don't have full knowledge of all the practical arrangements but I'll try to summarise my impressions and try to give some advice anyway.

As a whole the trip fulfilled, or superseded, all the expectations I had. Going on a privately arranged trip with people you've never met before is always a risk but turned out to work very well.

**Tanager Tours** ([www.tanagertours.com](http://www.tanagertours.com)) excellently arranged the first part of the trip. We never had any incidents and Wim ten Have turned out to be a good birder and very caring guide. Apart from Wim guiding us we also had our own driver and a good cook.

Tanager Tours is specialised in Southern Peru, but is currently expanding and now also offers birding trips to other parts of the country.

**Kolibri Expeditions** ([www.netaccessperu.net/kolibri](http://www.netaccessperu.net/kolibri)) arranged the eventful second part of the trip.

As described we experienced a lot of logistical trouble. However, Gunnar Engblom is a very likeable guy and arguably one of the top two birders in Peru, and we did see a lot of great birds thanks to him.

After coming home we also received an apologetic letter from Gunnar explaining why these incidents could happen, assuring that it won't ever happen again with Kolibri Expeditions.

Another issue is the birding **literature** - we used Clement's and Shany's newly published **A Field Guide to the Birds of Peru** - the first and only guide to cover Peru.

The good thing is that you don't have to carry around a combination of heavy field guides that won't cover all the endemics anyway. However, the plates could be a lot better! Apart from the weird arrangement, some of them are very bad and painted by several artists with totally different styles - take a look at the two different drawings of Bluish-slate Antshrike (plates 70 and 71) and you'll see what I mean!

For a first time visitor to these parts of Peru I'm very happy with our **itinerary**. All the places visited had great birding.

**Manú Road** is a must and you could easily spend a couple of weeks along the road and still find new birds every day. Both **Amazonia** ([www.amazonialodge.com](http://www.amazonialodge.com)) and **Cock-of-the-Rock** ([naturelodges.com/cor.html](http://naturelodges.com/cor.html)) were good birding lodges and in retrospect it would have been nice to spend at least two nights in both places.

**Pantiacolla Lodge** ([www.pantiacolla.com](http://www.pantiacolla.com)) is a good choice for Manú and also one of the most accessible nature lodges in the reserve. I would recommend a first time visitor to spend about five nights here.

Since I've never visited Abra Málaga it's hard to make a direct comparison to **Huarán/Cancha Cancha** but my guess is that if you're up to the hike you should choose the latter. It's not as exploited as Abra Málaga is and there seem to be high densities of some of the most sought after Polylepis species here. It would also be a great experience even for non-birders. If you're interested in going here you can contact Tanager Tours ([info@tanagertours.com](mailto:info@tanagertours.com)) or Goyo ([goyofm@hotmail.com](mailto:goyofm@hotmail.com)) directly.

Another great experience was the **pelagic** - not to be missed! For information about the next scheduled tour check Kolibri Expeditions homepage.

To be sure to see all the speciality species close to **Lima** you should probably reserve at least five days. In the end we had to really rush it and didn't have time to make the most out of sites like Lomas de Lachay and Lake Junín. Even though Lake Junín in some ways was a rather unpleasant experience and a lot of birders don't go there at all you'll be rewarded with one of the best birds you can find in Peru.

A final word of advise would be that if you have a month or so to spend in Peru you should definitely concentrate your birding to just part of the country, not trying cover as much ground as possible. I for one am sure I'll come back some time in the future to experience other parts of this great country.
