Author's Introduction

W. Mark Durley, Jr. had the gigantic task of researching and recording the earlier period from the founding of our Club in 1922 to the 1979-80 Rotary year. He did a magnificent job piecing together some past events and names that were almost lost in time. His masterpiece is being republished for the benefit of our new and future members.

We are grateful for Mark's work. This document is our effort to supplement and continue the recording of people and events that Mark started 17 years ago.

Each past president was asked to record his year in office, what transpired and related this in his own words. Ben Russell was seriously ill when interviewed, but his mind was clear and notes were taken and then written to best reflect his year as president. Ben died a few days after the interview.

We lost another president - Peter Donohue - in office and his presidency was taken from the few board meetings he conducted. His loss was sudden and unexpected.

A few past presidents chose not to submit details of their year in office and thus their years were left blank.

Besides listing members by Rotary year (fraught with inaccuracies) we wanted to reflect trends and changes in our Club. A person who joins Rotary in 15 to 20 years from now may believe that women have always been members of Rotary. Not true. We used to have a very active Rotary Ann organization

but no more. There were other important changes that must be recorded and we did our best to be accurate and forthright.



The Object of Rotary

The basic principle upon which Rotary International performs its work is known as the Object of Rotary. There were six Objects, or goals, until 1935, when the Mexico City convention of RI adopted four. In 1951, at the convention in Atlantic City, New Jersey, U.S.A., the stated purpose of the organization was streamlined by adopting a single Object with four parts.

Rotary's Object is: "To encourage and foster the Ideal of Service as a basis of worthy enterprise."

In particular, Rotarians are asked to encourage and foster:

- FIRST: the development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service.
- SECOND: high ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society.
- THIRD: the application of the ideal of Service in each Rotarian's personal, business and community life;
- FOURTH: the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of Service.

The Four Way Test

As stated in the Object of Rotary, Rotarians urge and support “high ethical standards in business and the professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying by each Rotarian of his occupation as an opportunity to serve.” In addition to developing codes for trade associations and sponsoring conferences on business relations and ethics, many Rotarians believe that one way to implement the Object in their daily working lives is to apply the 4-Way Test. It was conceived in 1932 by Herbert J. Taylor (who became RI President in 1954-1955), and it was adopted by RI in 1943.

The 4-Way Test is a simple but profound statement of 25 words:

1. Is it the **TRUTH**?
2. Is it **FAIR** to all concerned?
3. Will it build **GOOD WILL** and **BETTER FRIENDSHIP**?
4. Will it be **BENEFICIAL** to all concerned?

The Avenues of Service

There are four basic approaches through which Rotarians express the Object of Rotary. Developed by two English Rotarians, the “channels” of service were adopted at RI’s 1927 Convention in Oostende, Belgium. Known today as the *Avenues of Service*, they are:

1. **Club Service** - providing service to the Rotary Club to enable it to run efficiently in the spirit of fellowship, thus ensuring the success and effectiveness of the other three Avenues.
2. **Vocational service** - putting high standards of conduct into practice in Rotarian’s business and professional lives.
3. **Community service** - identifying needs in the Rotary Club’s community and then acting upon them, often in cooperation with local agencies.
4. **International service** - helping fulfill educational and humanitarian needs beyond the boundaries of their own countries, usually by participating in the many international programs of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation.

Thus, Rotary has but one general rule - one Object - which is the acceptance by all its members of the Ideal of Service.

THE ROTARY MOTTOES

At Rotary's first convention in 1910 - five years after the organization's founding - a Rotarian and teacher of salesmanship proposed that, "He Profits Most Who Serves His Fellows Best."

During the following year, another Rotary leader advanced the idea that a Club should be organized on the principle, "Service, Not self."

The two sayings were modified to "He Profits Most Who Serves Best" and "Service Above Self," and were quickly embraced by all Rotarians. Yet, 40 years passed before they were officially designated as Rotary Mottoes - at the 1950 convention in Detroit, Michigan, U.S.A.

In recent years, "Service Above Self" has enjoyed wider usage and is considered by many to be the prevailing motto.

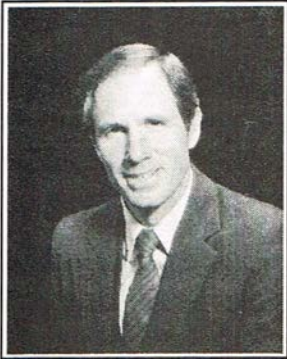
The Annual R.I. Convention in June 1982 was held in San Paulo, Brazil. I did attend. The convention was a disaster as the convention center was

not completed by the time the convention started and none of the speaker systems or translators were working. The ceiling of the banquet hall was propped up with railroad ties and the buildings were surrounded by acres of mud.

Our Santa Maria meetings were held at Joe Sesto's "Alexander's Harvest" restaurant, where the food was wonderful, but the meeting room should have accommodated about fifty people, and we have 125 members at the time. The Santa Maria Inn was under construction with the new "Tower" at the time.

The District Governor was a gentleman from Ventura and his project for the year was the Tinitac Indian Tribe in Mexico.

Following on the heels of an overwhelmingly successful International Convention in Dallas, Texas, our President, Tom Allen, charged his 1982-83 Club with the torch ignited by the Rotary Four Way Test. Tom's presidency was characterized by efficiency, integrity, compassion, and unparalleled service to the Club, community, and the international community. Despite this, Tom was able to maintain his sense of humor and direction.

The Club experienced one of its saddest moments in the passing of its long-time Secretary, ADRIAN (AD) JENSEN.

President Tom always tried to keep the weekly meetings lively, interesting, provocative, and directed. He tried, on numerous occasions, in soliciting the assistance of song master, CLARK MILLER, to lead the Club in song at the beginning of each meeting after the invocation. Truthfully, the Club had a “choir like” quality.

Because President Tom liked to mingle with the members and didn't want to disturb the fraternizing that took place at the meetings, the meetings would not necessarily start at the precise 12:10 p.m. Tuesday time. However, this was the ROTARY CLUB OF SANTA MARIA and not one of the satellite Clubs -- there was a certain dignity and decorum that was present at each meeting.

Though well thought out, the weekly agenda took on the appearance of being somewhat extemporaneous. However, whenever the challenge was presented, it was evident that President Tom was sharp as a tack and on top of everything. This was most evident during the fining portion of the meeting when President Tom felt it was important to overlook the “exemption badge” and allow himself to pay the fine instead of the intended target. This cost President Tom greatly but did increase the Club revenue.

The Club had many highlights for the year, despite the fact it was “transient,” moving from the Santa Maria Club to the Santa Maria Inn. Some of the more notable accomplishments were: the establishment of Interact Club at Santa Maria High School in February 1983; co-hosting a Valentine's Party with the Lompoc Club at Vandenberg Air Force Base for the members and spouses; hosting numerous “disadvantaged” children, assisted by the Salvation Army, from throughout the community for our annual Christmas Party with our beloved BILL PERRY assuming the role of Santa Claus and Burt Parson so generously giving of age appropriate gifts for the children; squeaking out a victory over the Kiwanis Club of Santa Maria in the annual competition highlighted by LOUIE LUCAS hitting a home run in the softball game and BILL HOLMAN winning at mumblepeg; competitive Bell Ringing for the Salvation Anny at Christmas time at various locations throughout Santa Maria (best team: President Tom and Bill Perry) and, finally, the awarding of scholarships, Paul Harris Fellowships, and contributions to many community organizations.

President Tom's scheduling of Senator Ken Maddy's (Republican Gubernatorial Candidate) Club appearance to coincide with the annual District Governor's appearance (some tense moments), was a major accomplishment. This was overshadowed only by CAROL DONATI'S (Director Fred Donati's wife) birthday party for President Tom at the noon meeting wherein she secured the services for Belly Dancer Aisha, of the Oriental Express for undulating, gyrating and other anatomical movements for the delight of President Tom and the Club.

Finally, the year was marked with successes in each of the Rotary International Endeavors, namely: Focus on Rotary; Club Service; Vocational Service; Community Service; International Service; Youth Activities; and, The Rotary Foundation. (None of us were capable of composing Tom Allen's year in office except Tom Allen!)

IN MEMORY OF ROTARIAN ADRIAN J. JENSEN

The occasion was the preparation of a Rotary Float that was to be entered in the Elks Club Annual Rodeo Parade in Santa Maria. Several members of our Rotary Club had gathered for the purpose, but there was one other in attendance. That was the first time I was privileged to meet Adrian J. Jensen, a Past President and member of the Rotary Club of Santa Cruz, California. Ad, as he liked to be called, and his lovely wife Riva, were visiting their daughter and son-in-law, Rotarian Donald and Joyce Melby, who, incidentally, were also helping on the float project. Gentlemen, at the time I did not know that the desire to serve and help others was a way of life for Ad Jensen, and little did he know, nor any of us for that matter, that the service he was offering our Rotary Club that evening on a Rotary float project was only the beginning of a far greater service he was destined to render the Rotary Club of Santa Maria, and one that would continue for the rest of his life.

For thirty years Ad Jensen was employed by the J.C. Penney Co., and upon reaching the age of sixty, he was retired as Manager of the Santa Cruz store in 1956. Following his retirement, Ad continued as a past-service member of the Rotary Club of Santa Cruz and became actively involved in the administration of that city and served as its Mayor from 1954 to 1958. Shortly thereafter, Ad and Reva Jensen moved to Santa Maria

to be near members of their family. Ad was a dedicated family man. He dearly loved all the children of his neighborhood, and they him. And many of those children, now grown, still call him “Gramps”.

Adrian J. Jensen joined the Rotary Club of Santa Maria in 1959. It was in June of 1960, after the resignation of our club secretary, that Ad accepted the appointment to that office, one which he held for the next twenty-two years.

1972 was the Golden Anniversary Year of the Rotary club of Santa Maria. It was also the year Ad Jensen celebrated his seventy-fifth birthday. In token appreciation for the twelve years of “Service above self” that Ad Jensen had given to our Rotary Club as Secretary, Club President Bill Ward, with unanimous approval of the Club’s membership, extended to Adrian J. Jensen, Honorary Life Membership in the Rotary Club of Santa Maria. And ten years later, 1982, in further appreciation of his dedicated service, the Rotary Club of Santa Maria presented him a Paul Harris Fellowship in the name of Adrian J. Jensen.

Adrian Jensen believed in Rotary. He exemplified Rotary’s highest standards. His knowledge of Rotary was of inestimable value to twenty two Santa Maria Club administrations he so ably served. How very fortunate for all of us that a man of such high principles of rotary. As it was with Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary, Adrian Jensen loved his fellow man and extended true rotary Fellowship and Understanding to all with whom he came in contact. Initiated into Rotary in 1933. Ad stood on the threshold of the Golden Anniversary of his career in Rotary when called in death.

Gentlemen, in tribute to the memory of Adrian Jensen, the membership of this Club could extend no greater compliment than to dedicate ourselves to furthering the object of Rotary and pledge that we will not let fall the reins of Rotary he has now released nor let dim the bright torch of Rotary he held so high.

The opportunity to be in a leadership role of an organization whose members are representatives of the power structure of the community, was an honor. I knew it would be rewarding! But the prospect of spending a year as the President of the Rotary Club of Santa Maria was challenging, exciting, a little daunting - and a lot frightening!! Many good times, some significant contributions to Rotary International, as well as to the community and getting better acquainted with some of the best people in the world were some of the things that were in store for me.

One of the primary goals set by the 1983-84 Rotary Board was to establish a breakfast Club. Rotarians would then have three local opportunities during the week for their "make-ups". Under the leadership of Tony Cossa, on May 24, 1983, the Rotary Breakfast Club of Santa Maria was chartered.

Serious consideration, time and energy were spent investigating the possibility of re-instituting the Rotary Club of Guadalupe. Rotary International rules require a specific time period prior to re-instituting a Club that abandoned its charter. Unfortunately, we were unable to pursue the matter further.

Wayne Schwammel, the then-City Manager, and I met with the Rotary Board and expressed our concerns regarding a growing segment of our youth that were being battered and abused. It was determined that a fund raiser would be appropriate to generate funds. A respected local caterer, Rick Brown, donated his time, his talents and the talents of his staff in serving the dinner for the event. This made it possible for an even greater donation by the Club to assist organizations that help children facing this kind of problem.

Some of the other events occurring during the course of the year included: November 23, 1983, under the direction of Hans Kardel, the Interact Club of Santa Maria was inaugurated; January 30, 1983, and February 6, 1984, the Rotary Club of Santa Maria hosted the regional Rotary International Speak-off.

The year for this president ended at the Step-down dinner on June 26, 1984. What a great year!! What a great finale!!

Thanks to an outstanding group of truly fine people for a sure-fire REWARDING year.

ROTARY POLIO PLUS

The ROTARY CLUB OF SANTA MARIA has proven again and again that SERVICE ABOVE SELF is not some hollow phrase that can be found on a banner in the room while the Club meets. Hundreds of examples, not only at the local level but nationally and internationally, can be found that THE ROTARY CLUB OF SANTA MARIA lives the motto.

The fact that each year 60 million children were either dying or being crippled by poliomyelitis was at the heart of a challenge taken up by ROTARY INTERNATIONAL. Also contained in that challenge were other preventable childhood diseases that have been crippling and killing children throughout the world for years. Only an organization with the vision, commitment and world-wide strength of Rotary could consider

making such a massive commitment to international organizations to provide them with the money to purchase the vaccines necessary to fight these diseases.

Catching the spirit, Club President, Dr. Bill Tibbs, appointed Mark Durley as chairperson of the Polio Plus committee. Under Mark's leadership the membership of the Rotary Club of Santa Maria took up the challenge. A tremendous effort would be necessary if we were to meet the goal of \$53,000.00. This meant an average of \$465.00 per member would have to be raised.

Five committees were established to take on the fundraising efforts; "In-Club Gifts" headed by Ernie Cohn and Bob Miller, "Major Gifts" under the leadership of Hans Kardel and Roger Nabers, "Corporate Gifts" supervised by Elmer Bonetti and Tom Brockway, "Out of Club Gifts" directed by Fred Donati and Don Lahr, "Special Events" activities took the special skills of Ben Russell and Kem Weber.

When the dust settled THE ROTARY CLUB OF SANTA MARIA had not only met their goal of \$53,500, an additional \$23,340 had been raised, making the total cash value of all donations to the Polio Plus Fund \$76,500.00.

The dedication of ten co-chairs, the willingness of 168 concerned people to accept the challenge of ROTARY INTERNATIONAL and be a part of eliminating the scourge of polio and other preventable childhood diseases, is a real example of how THE ROTARY CLUB OF SANTA MARIA is committed to the motto SERVICE ABOVE SELF.

- Clark Miller chaired RYLA and two Interact students attended the leadership camp at the Rancho La Sherpe Presbyterian Center in the Santa Ynez Mountains above Refugio Canyon.
- Enjoyed a spring Barbeque for Rotarian families at Mussell Fort.
- Contributed to a float for the Rose Bowl parade.
- Boys' Club, Marian Hospital and scholarship donations.
- Participated in a Group Study Exchange for six Italian visitors.
- Arbor Day project organized by Roger Nabors for tree plantings at several Santa Maria Elementary Schools.
- Paul Harris Sustaining members totaled 19 as chaired by Bill Stillwell.
- A special Paul Harris presentation to Perky Lyon, wife of Ezra Lyon. Perky organized the Rotary Anns in 1959 and was seriously ill and well deserved the recognition.
- Totonac 3-H project donation of \$1,000 for these Indians located in Mexico.
- Santa Maria Breakfast Rotary Club opened their doors and had a grand opening with wives attending. Some of our members transferred to this new club, but not because of the person holding our presidency slot. We sponsored this Club the year before.
- District 524 Billy Watson Scholarship Fund donation and the first recipient was a very talented local musician Philip Young.
- Changed to a buffet lunch to control costs and to expand the menu.
- Solvang Breakfast Club Charter Night was attended, and a 4-Way Test Banner was presented on behalf of our Club.
- Food donations to Shelter Services For Women.
- Guadalupe Wrestling Club given financial support as proposed by Royce Lewellen. Young Guadalupe kids won many wrestling honors in the state and nationally.
- Field Day with Kiwanis was a success, thanks to Ken Watts.
- Rotary Exchange Students chaired by Mike Welch.
- Christmas Party chaired by Burt Parsons.
- Rotary Anns met every quarter in a Rotarian home for a program and fellowship. My wife Jean enjoyed great support and success in this activity.

One of my objectives was to have a meaningful weekly bulletin that focused on Rotary and not with a bunch of “dribble”. Glen Owens and John Raaberg wrote the bulletins for the year and did an outstanding job.

Fining was an integral part of the fun and fellowship of our Club. The average fine was \$75 for the year with some like Louis Lucas and Bill Holman not satisfied unless their fines were over \$200. A few members were fined very little since each year’s president knew who could and could not afford fines.

Liberal use was made of Past Presidents for their input of very for their input of very valuable past experiences, particularly Dennis Dallaston and Winston Wickendon!

For the second time in the history of our Club a member was charged with serious crime and incarcerated. This was a very sad day for our Club.

To welcome incoming board, we had wine and hors d’oeuvres at the Santa Maria Inn and to offer our assistance for the forthcoming year.

We focused on some international projects as shown above because we are a part of a world-wide organization.

INTERACT

Internet’s goals are modeled after its Rotary sponsoring organization and is a club for young people (boys and girls) age 14-18, dedicated to community service and international understanding. The first club started on November 1962 in Melbourne High School in Florida.

Our Club received it’s Interact Charter in 1982 with Vic Marzorati as its proponent. Then in 1983, it really came alive with students at Santa Maria High School as its members.

Clark Miller and Hans Kardel represented our Club at the noon meetings at Santa Maria High. To raise money, the Interact Club held bake sales at our noon meetings and raised large sums of money. House of Ruth donations of food were given at Christmas, money was sent to India for a school and visits were made to some local convalescent hospitals.

One exciting event was “speakoff” debate in February 1984 for a number of District 524 Interact Clubs. Our representative, Jackie Yerby, captured first place and pocketed \$50.

Our Interact Club ceased to function in about 1992.

RYLA

Also known as Rotary Youth Leadership Awards was a part of our Interact Club. RYLA began in 1985 and the high point was to attend a super-charged conference over four days at the Rancho La Sherpa Presbyterian Conference Center atop the Santa Ynez Mountains. There were outstanding speakers and very exciting discussion sessions. It was indeed an honor to be selected to attend.

Our Club selected two Interact Club members to attend, and we would foot the bill of \$400 (later more) to attend.

Since our Club failed to support Interact in about 1992, RYLA also went away.

Early history of the Santa Maria Rotary Club meetings had faded with the passage of time. Membership was limited in the beginning to a single defined classification and jealously guarded. Jesse Chambers comes to mind as one of the founders.

Union Oil Company provided several prominent members, and this led to Barbecues on the Orcutt Hill at the schoolhouse.

For many years a Union Oil engineer namely, Russ Griffith wrote and delivered free of charge a three or four page weekly Rotary bulletin. Finally, that job was turned over to me. I calculate that it used to take a full day of time to produce such a bulletin.

Past President, Carl Engle, used to arrange transportation by truck to the barbecues on the Orcutt Hill. Rotary bulletins disclosed that in 1971 three drinks cost \$1 and barbecue cost \$3.50. The gatherings were not always Santa Maria Rotary Club members but sometimes jointly held with Guadalupe Rotary Club and in 1980 with the Kiwanis.

Unfortunately, in the mid-1990's Union Oil sold their Orcutt Hill holdings and our wonderful outings to the Orcutt Hill Schoolhouse were over. This function was undoubtedly the longest lasting fun time our Club ever enjoyed. The daytime and nighttime views of Santa Maria Valley and coast were spectacular. Poker usually ended the afternoon and night of spirited fellowship. However, it lasted all night for one Rotarian who couldn't find his way down the hill (many small, winding and crossing roads) until the next morning!

MUSSELL FORT

Doug Mussell helped his father build an old western style town west of Santa Maria in the Tepesquet area. Our Rotary made liberal use of this place for family outings. There was a saloon (of course), jail, blacksmith shop plus other very interesting buildings. A Santa Maria style Barbecue ended the day's activities. The last known use of Doug's western town was in the early 1990's. However, it continues to be available.

The first woman to join our Club was sponsored by Gerry Bartell and that woman was born and raised in Santa Maria and was Joni Gray. A major goal was to have a lot of fun and levity-so much levity that I frequently forgot who was in the Century Club and ended up paying a lot of unnecessary fines!

We did a lot of community service work, including sponsoring a basketball tournament headed by Rob Buchanan. Hans Kardel brought the Interact Club from Santa Maria High to auction baked goods and the highest price was bid by Bill Holman for a \$300 cake. The Interact Club left with a lot of money for their own projects.

I set up a fine for \$1/year for anniversaries and left the Club \$9,000 richer for next year's president. The step-down was full of fun with the Nighthawks Jazz Band (I played clarinet). I also became a Paul Harris Fellow that year.

An unfortunate note was the death of my treasurer, John Raaberg, as he was returning from our Club outing - in Morro Bay on the Tiger's Folly.

WOMEN IN ROTARY

1990 was the year that the Rotary Club of Santa Maria initiated Joni Gray, as its first woman member.

There have since been a number of additional women who have become active and valued members of the Club, including Judge Barbara Beck, Kathy Chormicle, Vicky Clift, Bertice Card, Tami Dotson, Ann Foxworthy, Alisa Hunt, Pamela Johnston, Jan Leaverton, Jane Norman, Alice Patino, Bonnie Royster, Virginia Souza, and Kathleen Williams-Turk. These women have helped Rotary carry out its mission of service. It is thus appropriate to briefly sketch the history of women in Rotary.

Rotary was founded by attorney Paul Harris and three other businessmen in Chicago in 1905. The original basic purpose was to better serve their customers and clients and thus better serve the

community. The idea was to meet each week at each member's place of business so as to interchange ideas as to how to improve each individual business as well as discuss community affairs. This would enable each member to better serve his customers or clients, thereby better serving the community. One of the early mottos of Rotary was "He Profits Most Who Serves Best."

The idea of serving the community by better serving ones' customers and clients quickly grew and expanded into direct community service and international service. Rotary soon expanded throughout the world and became an international organization

Prior to World War II, business, community and public affairs were primarily and overwhelming conducted by men. Rotary, together with other service clubs, were founded and continued to be men's organizations. However, the role of women in business, commerce and public affairs was substantially expanded after World War II. Women such as Golda Meir, Indira Gandhi, and Margaret Thatcher became world leaders. Many women entered and became leaders in the professions and business. It became obvious to many, particularly in the United States, that women in business, the professions and public service could aid Rotary in serving the community. The pressure to admit women in Rotary increased in the 1980's. However, the charter of Rotary International limited membership to men only.

Rotary undoubtedly would have eventually changed to reflect the changing times. However, a large international organization such as Rotary International must carefully consider the needs and desires of all its members, not just members in large, industrialized nations.

The male only requirement reflected many different cultures throughout the world and was then supported by a majority of Rotarians worldwide. Rotary's primary purpose was to encourage a fellowship among business and professional men representing a diverse cross-section of business and professional activities within the community worldwide. Rotary International was thus slow to act.

Resolution of the issue was forced by the Rotary Club of Duarte, California. Membership of the Club had declined. In an effort to increase membership, the Club admitted three women in 1977, resulting in a forfeiture of the charter by Rotary International for violation of the international rules concerning membership. The Duarte Club sued Rotary on the ground that the men only requirement violated California civil rights laws, which applied to business establishments, or organizations providing goods, services, and facilities to its members, commonly referred to as “public accommodation”. The California trial court ruled that Rotary was a private association, not subject to the California civil rights laws. A California Appellate Court overruled the trial court, and held that Rotary in California was a “public accommodation” in that it provided services to its members in being a substantial source of business contacts. The court ruled that Rotary was thus subject to California’s laws prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sex, race, religion, ancestry or national origin. The Appellate Court’s rationale, among other things, was that Rotary membership, limited to business, professional and governmental leaders, gave its members business advantages over non-members.

Rotary appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court on the grounds that the California decision violated Rotary’s “freedom of association” guaranteed by the federal Constitution. The U.S. Supreme Court held the Rotary membership was not such a freedom guaranteed by the Constitution.

The California decision only required reinstatement of the Duarte Club and enjoined Rotary International from enforcing its male only membership rule against the Duarte Club. However, it was obvious that the same result would apply to any other California Rotary Clubs. Rotary then revoked the male only rule worldwide as to have uniform membership policy.

It is now obvious to all that Rotary should include both men and women who can aid in better serving the community as to foster international cooperation and fellowship. It would have been better for Rotary if it had been allowed to voluntarily change rather than to be forced to change its rules.

THE PAST PRESIDENTS CLUB

The Rotary Club of Santa Maria is unique in having a Past Presidents Club. As far as we know and as Rotary International is concerned, there is no other Rotary Past Presidents Club anywhere in the world.

The Santa Maria Rotary Past President Club was founded in the 1930's by Jess H. Chambers, one of the founding members of the Santa Maria Rotary Club. He was the first President of the Club, and the only president to serve more than one term. As the first president, he served from the founding of the Club on December 5, 1922, until the end of the Rotary year on June 3, 1923. He was elected to serve a full term during the 1923-24 Rotary year. Jesse Chambers was a dynamic individual who got things done. He served as an early manager of the Santa Maria Chamber of Commerce, and later as secretary/manager of the Santa Barbara County Fair, held annually in Santa Maria. As a founding member and first president of the Santa Maria Rotary Club, it was only natural that he would establish a Past Presidents Club to foster Rotary fellowship.

The last sixty years or so, the past presidents have gathered for a summer weekend of Rotary fellowship. Initially, the festivities would last from Friday night through Sunday morning. The initial meetings were at Herschel Scot's cabin on the Santa Ynez River near Paradise Camp. The annual gatherings have since been held at Winston Wickenden's ranch house in Foxen Canyon, and at Leonard "Red" Peterson's cabin on Lopez Creek (upstream from Lopez Dam), and currently at Bobby Acquistapace's ranch in Tepusquet Canyon.

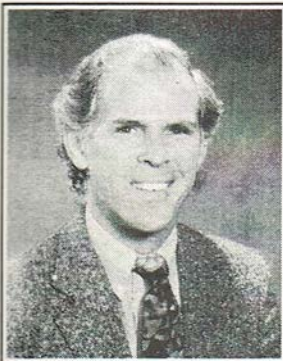
The late Red Peterson was never a president of Rotary, but included in the annual past presidents' meetings as the gracious host at his rustic and beautiful cabin. The group is otherwise limited to past presidents of the Santa Maria Rotary Club, and past presidents of other Rotary Clubs who are current members of the noontime Rotary Club of Santa Maria.

In addition to emphasizing Rotary style fellowship, the group engages in an inspirational and intellectually challenging initiation ritual for the incoming immediate past president invited to membership and engages in such other intellectually and physically challenging endeavors such as poker, gin rummy, horseshoes, skeet shooting, hiking, carping about the results, and general mendacity about a variety of subjects. The state and general health of Rotary is occasionally mentioned.

The festivities culminate in a traditional Saturday night Santa Maria barbecue.

On May 23, 1993, we celebrated Rotary Family Day at Mussell Fort and on June 22, 1993 the Rotary Exchange Students Western Tour with 90 students from 27 countries visited us for their annual stay. 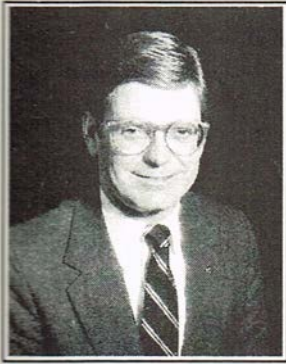
We also sponsored Larry Alcocer of Santa Maria High as an exchange student to Spain.

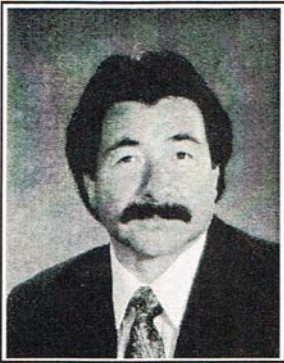
