"Tell the truth and don't be afraid"

Only 200 faculty vote in elections

Ballots from last week's two-day special election to elect faculty representatives to the advisory committee for Eastern's presidential search will be tallied Monday afternoon, said Bill Addison, Faculty Senate elections committee chair.

Special faculty elections were held Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Martin Luther King Jr. University Union to determine six representatives and six alternates — one each from the six university colleges — who will sit on the advisory committee for the search for the new president.

According to David Carpenter, Faculty Senate chair, only about 200 ballots were cast in the special election.

"A little less than a third of all faculty voted in this election," Carpenter said.

But Linda Leal, elections committee member, pointed out that several groups of faculty members were eliminated from this election.

"In a way, that number (200 voting) seems kind of low, but in a way it doesn't. Several groups of faculty members were eliminated from the election," Leal said.

Addison said because only full-time tenure and tenure track faculty members were allowed to vote, the number of eligible faculty was narrowed to below 500.

Department chairs were not eligible to vote and faculty members from academic advising, Booth Library and the counseling center had their own election, Leal said.

'Natural High' theme of drug awareness

National Collegiate Drug Awareness Week 1992 kicked off Sunday with a party at the campus pond including live entertainment provided by "The Groove," who performed classic rock music to a crowd of about 50 people.

"Take a Ride on a Natural High" is the theme for the drug awareness campaign.

"Drug awareness includes things like caffeine, tobacco and steroids — not just crack, heroin and cocaine," said Lynette Drake, director of orientation and coordinator of AIDS, Alcohol and Drug information on campus. "Drug Awareness Week is an attempt to heighten awareness of the fact that you don't need drugs, caffeine or cigarettes to feel high.

"Being high on life is the whole idea," she added.

Events are scheduled throughout the week in promotion of drug awareness, drug education and the development of positive peer influence, according to a release from University Relations office. Various workshops, displays and activities aimed at drug abuse prevention through education and individual responsibility are planned, the release stated.

Residence halls are holding a drug awareness bulletin board contest as part of the week, and judging of the posters will take place Monday.

Another activity planned for Monday includes a flower memorial, sponsored by Delta Sigma Theta sorority. The memorial will take place in the Bridge Lounge of the Martin Luther King Jr. University Union, the release stated.

Not enough Blood drive misses the mark

Friday was the only day last week the American Red Cross blood drive on campus met its daily goal as around 200 pints of blood were collected, said Shannon McFarlane, co-coordinator of the blood drive.

McFarlane said she was unsure of the exact total for Friday's donations, and officials with the totals could not be reached Sunday.

Totals for the week's blood drive fell well short of the anticipated goal of 1,500 pints of blood collected.

On Thursday a total of 908 pints had been collected; with the 200 collected on Friday, only about 1,108 pints were collected.

The low turnout was probably connected with the meningitis-related death of Eastern student



Peter Giese less than two weeks ago, McFarlane said. Giese's death sparked a panic on campus, and thousands of students flocked to Health Service to receive the preventative antibiotic drug, Rifampin, to keep

from getting the disease.

After taking the medication, students were not allowed to donate blood until 48 hours after their last dosage.

"It was kind of a bad time (to hold the blood drive) because of the meningitis-scare," McFarlane said. "I'm sure we would have had a lot more people come out if they hadn't been taking medication."

Each of the first four days of last week's blood drive fell short of its set goal, but McFarlane said there was a bigger turnout of donors Friday than what had been anticipated.

"On Friday we got a lot more people than we expected," McFarlane said. "We were surprised at how many came in."

The next campus blood drive will be held this summer.

"It'll be July 9," McFarlane said. "It's for one day and I think the goal is 500 pints."

Students may purchase textbooks until March 31

The Textbook Rental Service is again offering an annual textbook sale to students who wish to purchase books they currently have checked out to use for classes.

The sale, which began Feb. 17, allows students the chance to purchase textbooks they are currently renting, said Laurie Neese, an employee at the Textbook Rental Service.

"The majority of (students) buy (books) to build their own personal library," Neese said, "especially if it's a book that pertains to their major."

The Textbook Rental Service is located at the south end of Pemberton Hall and this year's sale will continue until March 31.

Neese said students may purchase textbooks at replacement costs — meaning students pay

whatever it will cost to replace that particular textbook.

Books that are sold in poor condition — such as those which contain highlighting or torn pages — will be exchangeable for a better book if there is one available, Neese said.

The rental service makes no money from the book sale, Neese said, as any revenue collected from the sales is put toward buying newer books. Basically, she added, the money just goes back into inventory.

Neese said sales so far are "slow," but she pointed out many students wait until the last days of the sale to purchase textbooks.

Books sold better years ago than they do now, she added.

The Textbook Rental Service is open from 8 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Students must bring any textbooks with them that they wish to purchase when they go to buy, Neese said.

Carpenter, who is serving as chair of the advisory committee, said he would like to get the committee together as soon as possible, but he said he will have to work around people's schedules and wait for the student and civil service elections before the committee can meet.

Civil service elections are scheduled for March 5, and student elections will be March 11. Elections for faculty from academic advising, the counseling center and Booth Library were held Wednesday.

"I'd like to meet with the committee before spring break, but that would largely depend on when the members can meet," Carpenter said.

Although applications for the presidency are due March 16, Carpenter said he doesn't believe candidates will be on campus for interviews until August. President Stan Rives announced his resignation in December and is leaving the university July 31.

Carpenter said because the state legislature is in full session and because so many families plan vacations during the summer months, it will be unrealistic to plan all interviews during July.

He also said the committee probably won't receive any applications from Thomas Layzell, chancellor of the Board of Governors, until April. Layzell is pre-screening the expected 100 or more applications for Rives' replacement before sending them on to the advisory committee.

"Any kind of awareness act will make some impact - though it may not be a huge impact - it will be on an individual basis," Drake said.

Throughout Monday discussions related to the campaign are scheduled, she added. "Tragedy of Steroids" is the topic of a speech by Scott Waddells will begin at noon in the Union bridge lounge.

The week goes along with the Alcohol Awareness Week, held in the fall, therefore providing a year-round emphasis according to the AIDS, Alcohol and Drug Information office, she added.

Other activities taking place this week will include a poster contest, a poetry contest and summons for sober drivers.

On Tuesday, theatrical presentations as part of the week include "Prevention Theater" at 6:30 p.m., sponsored by local high schools, and a comedy act "A One-Act Comedy About Sex, Alcohol and Drugs" at 8 p.m. Both performances are in the Fine Arts building, Drake said.

75 years ago, Normal School News
March 6, 1917

The students and people of Charleston and vicinity were offered a rare treat last Thursday evening. One of the largest audiences of the year heard Mr. Leland T. Powers give the dramatic comedy, Lord Chumley.

Basket ball being over now, attention is turned to base ball and our prospects for the season. We have with us this year Captain Hampton, who will catch for the team. Turner, who is well known for his ability to handle the short hot ones, will "tag 'em out" at second if the prophesies come true ... and "Bunn" Moran, the well known center on last year's foot ball team, will be out if he can get a pair of shoes large enough.

REX THEATRE THURSDAY - The greatest sensation since The Birth of a Nation, "The Battle Cry of Peace," in 10 mighty parts, featuring Norma Talmadge, Charles Richman, Mary Maurice and James Morrison. All seats \$0.25.

50 years ago, Eastern Teachers News
March 18, 1942

According to Registrar Blanche Thomas, enrollment for the spring term at Eastern stands at 742. This figure is the lowest for any term during the school year 1941-42.

At the start of the current year, there were 917 students enrolled at Eastern. The winter quarter opened with 853 college men and women.

The present total of 742 is in contrast with the spring enrollment figure of one year ago. At that time enrollment stood at 1,027 students. Many men and women have left school to join the various branches of the military service and others have taken jobs in growing war industries.

A circular received by college officials from the Navy department early this week, explains in detail the Navy's accredited college program (Class V-1).

Through this program, young men between the ages of 17-19, who are enrolled in accredited colleges may enlist in the Naval reserve and continue their college training.

Eastern Teachers News added another sparkling chapter to its unusual record Friday when it became the only teachers college newspaper in the United States to receive Medalist ranking at the annual convention of the Columbia Scholastic Press association held at Columbia University, New York City.

Members of the geography club are joining the nationwide stamp collecting drive to put over a plan for war-work in England where hospital needs are in great demand.

25 years ago, Eastern News
March 15, 1967

Michael J. Handley, a former Eastern student, has been awarded the Bronze Star medal for heroism at An Khe, Vietnam. Handley, a specialist fourth class with the 1st Calvary Division, earned the medal while serving as a medic last October.

Michael Milken says he's misunderstood

NEW YORK (AP) — Michael Milken insisted in his first jailhouse interview that moneymaking never motivated him and that he's been misinterpreted by critics as the epitome of 1980s greed.

The wealthy junk-bond financier told Forbes magazine that he had sounded an early alarm about high corporate debt and hostile takeovers, and never traded on inside information, as alleged in the best-selling book "Den of Thieves." "I know this will sound Pollyannaish to you, but I wasn't basically focused on making money," he said.

Milken, 45, said he regretted dealing with Ivan F. Boesky, the disgraced stock speculator whose squealing led to Milken's prosecution for securities fraud in the biggest Wall Street scandal of all time.

"It was obviously a terrible mistake ever doing a single trade with him," Milken said in the magazine's March 16 edition, which hits newsstands Monday.

The 15-page interview is the first time Milken has spoken to the media since he was sentenced to a 10-year federal prison term in November 1990.

Candidate hits campus Tuesday

Decatur attorney Douglas Lee, a candidate for the 19th Congressional District, will speak on campus about his campaign agenda at 6 p.m. Tuesday in room 122 of Lumpkin Hall.

He faces Republican Paul Jergens in the March 17 primary. The winner of the primary will run against one of two Democratic incumbents in November.

Lee's appearance, sponsored by Eastern's chapter of the College Republicans, will detail his campaign plans and his views on several election-year issues, including education, economic growth and health care.

Lee said he will start the speech with biographical information and then discuss the goals he will pursue if elected to Congress. After opening remarks Lee said he will open the floor to questions from the audience.

On the educational front Lee said he would like to see fewer student loans in favor of more student grants. He noted many students are prohibited from pursuing higher education degrees because, even after graduation, they will be unable to repay loans.

"Some salaries are going down, loans are going up," Lee said. "This can stop people from going to school."

In regards to the ailing economy, Lee said he will talk about what he feels is the need for the United States to open new markets and break back into old markets like the former Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. He added that along with new markets, Central Illinois needs to use its own energy resources and decrease dependence on foreign oil.

Lee cited Illinois ethanol production as one growth opportunity, saying that technology and local corn production make 100 percent ethanol-powered cars a definite possibility.

"It's not unreasonable to believe that we could become one of the most productive districts in the world," he said.

Lee added that improvements in transportation for business throughout the district would add to any economic growth efforts. He said his Democratic opponents have talked about little in the way of practical solutions.

Terry Bruce, D-Olney, and

Glenn Poshard, D-Carterville, are vying for the Democratic ballot in November's general election. The race is unique because both men are Democratic incumbents. Bruce currently represents the 19th District but must defeat Poshard in the race because Poshard's 22nd District was eliminated in last year's legislative redistricting.

Bruce's district absorbed all of what was Poshard's constituency to become the largest legislative district east of the Mississippi with 27 counties — nearly one-fourth of the state.

"Poshard says 'spend, spend, spend;' he keeps budgeting and says 'pay as you go,'" Lee said. "Bruce keeps Japanese-bashing and hasn't offered any specifics on his plan (to rebuild the economy)."

"I am as mad as anyone about the comments made (by a Japanese official) about the American worker, but let's increase our own productivity," he added.

Lee said he supports a national health care plan with tax incentives for businesses that will make a plan worthwhile. He said any proposal should have a "safety net" that would not ignore the unemployed, elderly or veterans.

Lee has promised to return half of his \$129,500 Congressional salary to the district if he is elected as a demonstration of his commitment to public service.

Lee added his campaign has placed networks of supporters in each county within the district. He said he remains optimistic that, after a primary win, he can defeat a Democratic incumbent with a sizable campaign fund.

Newsers win awards at media conference in Chicago

Staff members of *The Daily Eastern News* had a chance to test their mettle against the state's other daily and non-daily university newspapers at the Illinois Collegiate Press Association convention Friday and Saturday.

ICPA has 26 member schools, and more than 260 college journalists from 25 of those schools attended the event, including Illinois Wesleyan, Bradley, Northwestern, the University of Illinois, Illinois State and Western Illinois universities.

Overall, Eastern placed 10 times and received four newsworthy mentions in 13 of the 28 categories in the daily newspaper and open categories.

The advertising department brought home two of *The News'* three first-place finishes, with seniors Kathi Gaddis and Jane Grandel winning the classified page and advertising campaign categories, respectively.

The News had a pair of two-time winners, with art director Rich Bird taking first-place in the review (other than film)

category and earning an honorable mention in editorial cartooning. Laura Durnell, *Warbler* news editor, placed third in both feature writing and in-depth reporting.

Bird's winning review was on the Stephen King novel "Needful Things," which appeared in the *Verge*.

"I think the contest shows that we have strengths in certain areas," said Stuart Tart, *News* editor in chief. "I think it also points out areas where we can do better. For example, I think that we can still work towards improving our news coverage and our in-depth reporting."

Advertising representative John Alberts took second in full-page advertisement, and Jim Knoblich won an honorable mention in advertising campaign. Former sports editor R.J. Gerber claimed third place in sports page design, while *Verge* editor Tim Shellberg took second place in feature page layout.

Former edit page editor Matt Mansfield gained an honorable mention in the opinion page category; Mike Chambers took an honorable mention in column writing and Sports editor Don O'Brien took an honorable mention in sports columns. Tart won a third-place finish in editorial writing.

The News took both a second place and an honorable mention in front page design. Mansfield and Shellberg won second place for their designs, while Penny Weaver, Sue Oliver and Debbie Carlson received an honorable mention.

The News did not earn an honorable mention or place in the general excellence category. In this category, each competing newspaper sent in three issues from dates preselected by ICPA for judging. The last time the paper won in the general excellence category was in 1991 when it tied with Northwestern University.

"I was disappointed, but I don't think it necessarily reflects badly for *The News*," Tart said. "We were competing against six other daily newspapers who worked just as hard to put out a quality product."

The Daily Northwestern, Northwestern University's newspaper, won the first place award in the general excellence category.

Workshops on "The ins and outs of column writing," "How to prepare an effective resume" and "Getting the most out of a story" were some of the more than 20 workshops available at the convention.

Scholarships easy to find with new service

The financial aid office has made it a little easier for students to locate scholarships to help them fund their education.

The office now offers students access to a computer software package that checks their eligibility for more than 2,000 scholarships.

And the best part of the service is that it is free.

The College Aid Sources for Higher Education system was made available to students by the office last month and

Editorial approximately 75 individuals had taken advantage of it as of last week, said Betty Armstrong, assistant director of financial aid.

In order to use the system, high school and university students simply must fill out a one-page form, available at the financial aid office in the Student Services Building. The form asks for standard information, such as students' majors, career interests and involvement in extracurricular activities, which will help the computer check a student's eligibility for individual scholarships, according to Armstrong.

"The computer tries to match a student with a scholarship based on major, ACT and SAT scores, military service of parents and possible county and high school scholarships," Armstrong said.

Once a student turns the completed form back into the office, students will receive a list of scholarships they are eligible for in approximately two weeks or more, she added.

During these times of rising tuition and decreasing financial aid, the financial aid office's introduction of a free scholarship search system displayed foresight and a real concern for the needs of students.

For students having trouble funding their education, the system essentially could represent cash for the taking.

We hope that students will take advantage of this service.

The process is simple and it's free.

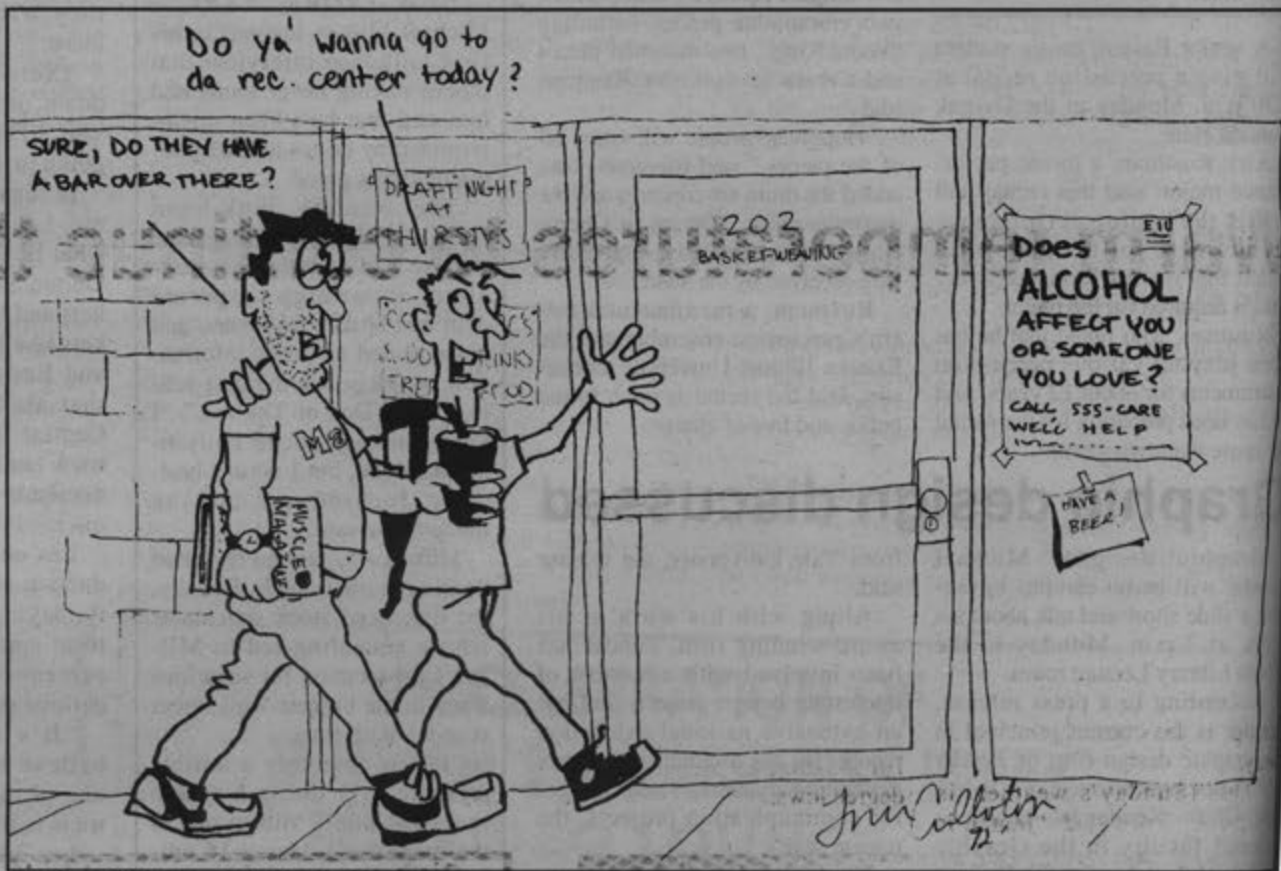
Okay, okay, I was a little gullible, but you know, this is my livelihood on the line.

Warm temperatures to continue through the week

Near-record temperatures and mild conditions over the weekend promise to continue for the remainder of the week, according to local weather observer Dalias Price.

Price said Sunday above average conditions will prevail this first week in March and noted that the March 21 spring equinox, the astronomical beginning of spring, is less than three weeks away.

"This (Sunday's weather) is delightful," Price said. "March is

definitely in like a lamb."

Price said a high pressure system hovering over the central plains brought Charleston and most of the Midwest the weekend's warm conditions. He said southern Illinois had Sunday temperatures well into the 70s and Chicago passed the 60-degree mark.

Sunday's high was about 68 degrees but didn't feel quite that warm because of relatively high winds, Price added. Normal temperatures for this time of year call for 45-degree highs and 26-degree lows.

Saturday's low was around 27 degrees but Sunday's low didn't sink below 38 degrees, Price said.

However, Price warned winter could return before the month is over. He said weather like this weekend's can continue for more than a week and then temperatures can plunge back into dramatically colder conditions.

"March is a month that dashes your hopes," Price said. "It's a battle ground between winter and spring."

Price said he expects spring to come early this year but added that Charleston residents should

not put winter behind then and expect consistently warm conditions until April 1 or even later.

He said he plans to compile his weather records from February and most of winter into a report on what he thinks has been a markedly above average warm winter. February and January, Price added, have both been much warmer than they usually are.

He said he will look back into cumulative winter records from past decades and try to determine how this winter compares. However, Price noted it's unlikely he'll be able to assign one causal

factor to the change.

"It's been a strange winter - very mild," Price said. "It's very difficult to find out what started this whole process."

Price said although there are a number of possible geographic and meteorological reasons for the warmer weather, scientists cannot agree on one specific idea or combination of ideas as to why temperatures have risen.

"Whether it (the reason) is volcanic activity or a hole in the ozone layer, nobody knows," he said.

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University electrical power to be temporarily shut down

A total of 12 on-campus buildings will have their electrical power shut off from March 21 to 25 and May 12 and 13.

Power outages will be experienced throughout that time so the transformers can be checked for routine preventative maintenance to make sure there are no problems with the equipment, said Carol Strode, acting associate vice president for facilities.

The dates for the scheduled outages are the same as Eastern's spring break and the end of the spring semester.

Strode said the reason the shut down is set for those times is because most students will be off campus, causing less inconvenience and fewer problems for the university.

Booth Library, the Gregg

Triad - including Ford, Weller and McKinney - and the Vivarium will be shut down March 21, while the entire campus power will be shut off on March 22, Strode said.

The original portion of the Martin Luther King Jr. University Union, McAfee Gymnasium and Stevenson Tower will shut down March 23, and Lantz Fieldhouse and Stadium, Lincoln and Douglas residence halls and the Student Recreation Center will have power cut March 24, Strode said. The Union's newer section will have its electricity temporarily shut off on March 25, she added.

In addition, the power in all university apartments will be shut down May 12, and Carman Hall North and South will power down May 13, she said. Both buildings are located on Ninth Street, beyond the entrance of Greek Court.

Kevorkian bound on trial for two murder counts

ROCHESTER HILLS, Mich. (AP) - Dr. Jack Kevorkian was ordered Friday to stand trial for first-degree murder for helping two women commit suicide last October in a secluded state park cabin.

District Judge James Sheehy dismissed a drug trafficking charge against the 63-year-old suicide machine inventor, but scheduled a March 12 arraignment for him on the two murder counts. He remains free on a \$10,000 personal bond.

Kevorkian and his attorney, Geoffrey Fieger, said they weren't surprised by Sheehy's ruling. Fieger said after the judge's ruling that he anticipated a victory at trial.

"I am a physician, unconditionally dedicated to the honorable and ethical practice of alleviating hopelessly irremediable physical suffering," Kevorkian said in a statement.

A prosecutor said the Michigan Legislature needed to give some guidance in physician-assisted suicide cases. The state has no law against assisted suicide.

If convicted, Kevorkian faces a mandatory life prison term without parole.

Kevorkian, a retired pathologist, gained nationwide attention after a Portland, Ore., woman with Alzheimer's disease killed herself in 1990 using his suicide machine.

A judge later dismissed a first-degree murder charge against him in that case because assisted suicide isn't illegal in Michigan.

But Kevorkian was ordered not to assist any more suicides.

Sheehy acknowledged the lack of a law, but said some serious questions have been raised in the Oct. 23 deaths of Marjorie Wantz, 58, of Sodus and Sherry Miller, 43, of Roseville. Both women were painfully but not terminally ill.

Kevorkian called the sheriff's department to report their deaths and acknowledged to police they were doctor-assisted suicides.

"Causation (of the deaths) has become a question of fact, and questions of fact are decided by jury trial," the judge said.

Miller's death was caused by carbon monoxide poisoning. Wantz died from a lethal injection of drugs, which led to the drug trafficking charge that Sheehy dismissed.

Opponents say airport site is for the birds

CHICAGO (AP) - Environmentalists have taken a look at the proposed site for a third Chicago-area airport, and they say it's for the birds.

And if nature groups have any say, the only wings over Lake Calumet will continue to have feathers on them.

The groups say they intend to put pressure on both Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley and Gov. James Edgar about plans to build the airport on the southeast side site.

"I can't imagine a more terrible location for an airport than Lake Calumet," said William Beecher, an expert on birds and former director of the Chicago Academy of Sciences.

Hundreds of thousands of birds - both common and endangered - nest in the area, and millions of others pass through each year on a major migratory flyway.

Beecher and other conservationists say they are not only worried of the effect an airport might have on the birds that now inhabit the marshy site, they're also worried about the impact the birds might have on landing or departing jetliners.

The city's Lake Calumet airport plan acknowledges that about 1,000 collisions between birds and commercial aircraft result in significant damage each year.

The Federal Aviation Administration says about 43 percent of aircraft-bird collisions involve gulls, and Alan Anderson of the Chicago Audubon Society says a small island just outside the proposed airport boundary has the largest gull colony in the interior United States - more than 43,000 at the end of the breeding season.

Conservationists also note that many of the birds at the site are quite a bit larger than gulls. The Lake Calumet area is home to many geese, swans, herons and even sandhill cranes, which have wing spans approaching eight feet.

Steve Sedam pointed out that conservationists, too, sometimes fly on commercial airliners.

"The survival of sandhill cranes is important to Audubon members, but their own survival is even more important," Sedam said.

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Tsongas under fire at forum

ATLANTA (AP) — Paul Tsongas' economic policies drew repeated fire from rivals Sunday in a Democratic presidential debate that included spirited disagreements over health care but far fewer personal attacks than the wild free-for-all of the night before.

The Georgia forum was the first of two debates Sunday leading into Tuesday's eight primaries and caucuses.

Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton opened fire on Tsongas early, contrasting his plan for a middle-class tax cut by raising taxes on the wealthy with Tsongas' proposal to raise taxes on the rich but use that money for a capital-gains tax break.

"The question is not whether the middle class gets a tax cut," Clinton said. "It's whether you want to give it to the middle class or people who buy stocks." Tsongas answered that businesses needed help to repair the economy. "We have to take our money, the precious resources that we have and put it into venture capital," the former Massachusetts senator said.

Former California Gov. Jerry Brown, in another colorful debate performance, poked fun at Tsongas' theme that he's "no Santa Claus" ready to offer politically popular giveaways.

"I'd say you're Santa Claus sack is pretty empty," Brown said.

"Lollipops for business are no better than lollipops for the middle class." Brown renewed his call for a universal flat tax, saying the current tax code was a "4,000-page tax morass that feeds on the corruption of selling loopholes for campaign contributions." Each of the candidates talked tough on crime and promised help to Georgia's defense workers worried that military cuts will cost them their jobs.

The most colorful exchanges came when the candidates were allowed to ask questions of a rival. Nebraska Sen. Bob Kerrey asked Clinton how he could promote a program that would allow for public service to pay back college loans when he didn't serve his country in Vietnam.

"I opposed that war. I thought it



was a terrible mistake," Clinton said, repeating that he gave up a deferment and made himself available for the draft, but was never called.

Kerrey came after Clinton again later, during a lengthy debate discussion on national health care and how to get the care to rural residents in states like Georgia.

"That was a baloney answer," Kerrey said when Clinton said his plan would provide the preventative care needed to slash the rate of infant mortality and low-birth weight babies. "Your proposal, Bill, does not solve the problem and in fact may make it worse." Clinton retorted that Kerrey's government-run plan included "nine separate tax increases" and advocated his plan to require employers to either pay for workers' health care or pay into a government insurance fund.

Bush, Buchanan battle heats up

WASHINGTON (AP) — The sizzling battle within the Republican party heated up Sunday with one of President Bush's prominent supporters accusing challenger Patrick Buchanan of flirting with fascism.

The charge by former Education Secretary William J. Bennett came as Bush and Buchanan campaigned in Georgia for that state's critical primary on Tuesday.

The campaign became more vitriolic during the past week as Buchanan accused the administration of investing in pornography and Bush called his challenger "a disappointment to all Americans" for opposing the Persian Gulf war.

Bush supporters insist the president will be the party's nominee and many of Buchanan's conservative backers have conceded he has little chance of wresting the nomination from the incumbent.

But these conservatives see the race as a battle for the future of the Republican party, with Buchanan forcing Bush to move to the right and then emerging as leader of a resurgent conservative movement.

Bennett, appearing on ABC-TV's "This Week with David Brinkley," was asked whether he agreed with commentators who have suggested that Buchanan's restrictive immigration views are a kind of fascism.

"I think that Pat certainly flirts with it ... it being fascism," Bennett replied.

"Pat has a mighty heart ... but I am very disappointed with the character and quality of the approach he is making," said Bennett, who served with Buchanan in the Reagan administration and went to the same high school in Washington, D.C.

But he added Bush "has to stand up and fight for conservatives" and that some of the president's advisers have unwisely conceded conservative votes to Buchanan.

White House Chief of Staff Samuel Skinner, interviewed on NBC-TV's "Meet the Press," said he believed many Buchanan supporters were "expressing some kind of frustration" and were "not really serious Buchanan voters." "When conservatives look at the record of George Bush, they will see a very conservative record," Skinner said. "It might not be quite as conservative as they would like in some areas, but it is a very conservative record."

South Carolina Gov. Carroll Campbell Jr., in Atlanta to campaign for Bush, appeared on CBS-TV's "Face the Nation" and said Buchanan, in his appeal for votes, was inaccurately portraying the South as reactionary and isolationist.

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Adams drops bid after charges

SEATTLE (AP) - U.S. Sen. Brock Adams abandoned his re-election campaign Sunday after a news report surfaced with claims from eight unidentified women that he sexually abused and harassed them.

State Democratic leaders had urged Adams to resign his Senate seat after The Seattle Times report appeared, but he refused to step down.

"This is the saddest day of my life," Adams said at a news conference.

"I care for people and I have never harmed anyone," he said.

"But I find now that it is not worth it to continue this campaign." Because of an earlier sexual misconduct accusation, Adams already was rated among the most vulnerable of senators whose terms expire this year.

State party leaders said the articles, which covered half the front page and three full inside pages Sunday, were ruinous regardless of whether the women were telling the truth.

The Times is the largest-circulation newspaper in the state.

"It's devastating. It was bad before, but now I think Brock's position is untenable," state Democratic Party Chairwoman Karen Marchioro said. "This is a very, very serious hit on a person who was not in that strong a position anyway."

Marchioro said dropping his re-election bid was the least Adams should do. She said there was no indication any Republican opponent was involved with bringing forth the story accusing the first-term, liberal Democrat.

Former U.S. Rep. Mike Lowry, who had all but formally announced he'd oppose Adams for the Democratic nomination, didn't immediately return telephone calls to his newly opened campaign headquarters or his office.

Gov. Booth Gardner, who is not seeking re-election and reportedly is interested in the Senate seat, could not be reached Sunday.

State Sen. Patty Murray, the only Democrat now campaigning for Adams' seat, said she wouldn't alter her campaign strategy.

The Times story said reporters began hearing accusations of sexual misconduct against Adams in the 3½ years since Kari Tupper, a former congressional aide and family friend of Adams, claimed he drugged her and molested her at his Washington, D.C., home in 1987.

No criminal charges were ever filed, and the U.S. attorney for the District of Columbia said the accusation was without merit.

Adams insisted it was a fabrication designed to extort money from him.

Staff fired over condom parodies

LA CROSSE, Wis. (AP) - A Roman Catholic college fired the 33-member staff of its student newspaper after the biweekly ran parodies about using condoms.

Viterbo College President William Medland said the Lumen newspaper "shocked the sensibilities of many students, faculty, staff and administrators. Such journalism will not be tolerated," Medland said in a statement Saturday.

"It holds up to ridicule the Catholic, Franciscan, liberal arts nature of this institution," he said of the 102-year-old school whose enrollment is about 1,500.

Medland said he objected to the content of parodies about condoms, including a suggestion people wear them on their heads to ward off the flu.

"I am really disappointed," said the newspaper's editor, Stephanie Klitzkie, who is a Methodist. "When I first came to school here, I was concerned about not being Catholic but I was told that beliefs were not imposed."

Appellate court sides with Peoria reporter

SPRINGFIELD (AP) - An Illinois appellate court on Friday said a Peoria television reporter threatened with arrest does not have to turn over tapes and notes that authorities want for a murder investigation.

The 4th District Court of Appeals in a 2-1 vote overturned a lower court decision, saving WHOI-TV reporter Bob Arya from going to jail, said station attorney Don Craven.

"We felt from the beginning that the prosecutors and the police have been using us a little bit more than we really feel appropriate for something like this," station news director Sheldon Ripson said after the ruling.

"It would appear they've been using a reporter to do investigative work for them," he added.

McLean County State's Attorney Charles Reynard declined comment, saying he hadn't yet read the 30-page ruling.

McLean County prosecutors had said Arya's materials could help them build a case against a third suspect in a 1988 triple-

murder case arising from the robbery of a Bloomington liquor store.

Alvin Alexander and Glen Wilson await trial on charges of armed robbery and murder.

Arya interviewed an anonymous source for a piece that ran Aug. 22, 1991, about the armed robbery and subsequent murders.

Another taped interview of an anonymous source, which hasn't been aired, implicates a third person in the crimes, Ripson said Friday.

The tape hasn't been broadcast because of the legal proceedings and because the implicated person hasn't been charged, he said.

Arya had been found in contempt of court by McLean County Judge Charles White after he failed to turn over his materials, Craven said. WHOI appealed, citing a state law that protects reporters from disclosing information about confidential sources, Craven said.

The appeals court ruled that prosecutors failed to show Arya's information could not be gotten from other sources.



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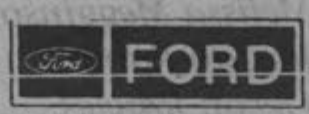


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Saudi king may share power

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Saudi Arabia's absolute ruler, King Fahd, took a tentative first step toward sharing power Sunday by announcing the long-promised creation of an advisory body and spelling out a constitution based on Islamic law.

The 61-member Majlis al-Shura, or Consultative Council, was set up to make recommendations to the king and the prime minister, although it would have no ability to make laws on its own.

Its creation by royal decree was seen as a step toward politi-

cal pluralism in the Islamic kingdom ruled by the Al-Saud family since 1932.

Fahd said in a statement that council members would be Saudi nationals aged 30 or older, apparently to be drawn from the kingdom's oil, religious and academic communities. If so, this would be the first time non-royals were allowed to participate in the kingdom's decision-making.

The country's monarchs have been promising political reforms for three decades. Pressure for change accelerated after Iraq

invaded Kuwait in August 1990, leading to the deployment of hundreds of thousands of non-Muslim troops into this traditionally closed society.

Sunday's reforms, contained in three decrees, were the most profound in Saudi history.

"Decisions of the council go to the prime minister, who turns them over to the Cabinet to consider. If the two bodies concur, the king may approve them. If they differ, then the king has the right to decide what he sees fit," one decree said.

Gorbachev's think tank faces trouble

MOSCOW (AP) — Mikhail Gorbachev's new think tank has a lot going for it: a handsome complex of buildings, wealthy would-be Western contributors, a noble mission and, of course, its famous boss.

But the Gorbachev Foundation, which officially opens Tuesday, also has a host of troubles.

The government of Russian President Boris Yeltsin apparently views it with some suspicion. Russian media have mostly ignored it.

New tax laws are strangling it. And some researchers invited to join its staff are wary.

Gorbachev says he has no plans to use the non-profit, non-government organization to challenge Yeltsin — although he said the Russian president had

asked him pointblank whether he was creating an opposition movement.

The foundation "is not a shadow cabinet," Gorbachev told the newspaper Komsomolskaya Pravda on Saturday. "I personally am not going to become an opposition figure as long as the government is implementing reforms." The stated goals of the foundation — formally named the International Foundation for Socio-Economic and Political Studies — are to produce research papers, books, lectures and conferences that strengthen democracy and civil rights, plan market reforms, encourage disarmament and foster peace.

Those aims reflect Gorbachev's achievements as Soviet leader from 1985 to 1991.

Lost articles by Hemingway emerge

TORONTO (AP) — Ernest Hemingway, the most famous reporter the *Toronto Star* ever had, re-emerged on the newspaper's pages Sunday in a batch of "lost" articles written by the budding novelist in the 1920s.

The two dozen stories — missed in previous collections of Hemingway's early work, rejected by the *Star*'s editors at the time, written under a pen name or published without a byline — were unearthed as part of preparations for the newspaper's centennial this year.

William Burrill, a writer and editor, discovered them while researching Hemingway's years with the *Star* in the newspaper's archives, the JFK Library in Boston, at Princeton University and in Paris.

James D. Brasch, a professor at McMaster University and an expert on Hemingway, said the newly discovered material sheds new light on the writer's development. In a letter to the *Star*, he said the stories "will have consequences far beyond the mere increase in the text." Hemingway, the author of "The

Sun Also Rises" and "For Whom the Bell Tolls," worked for the *Toronto Star* as a freelancer, staff reporter and foreign correspondent from 1920 to 1923.

He went on to fame as a novelist and short-story writer before committing suicide in Ketchum, Idaho in 1961 at the age of 61.

The new collection of stories includes 13 articles not included in "Ernest Hemingway — Dateline: Toronto," published by Charles Scribner's Sons. They include nine unbylined stories and one signed with the pen name Peter Jackson.

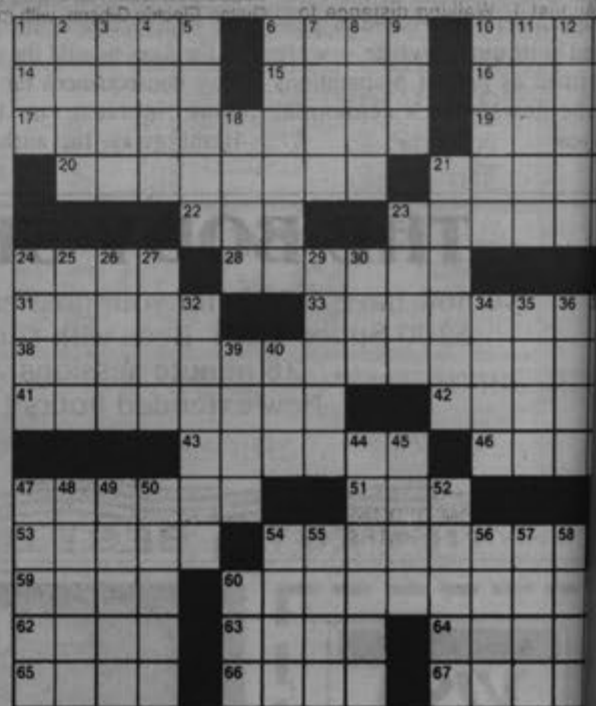
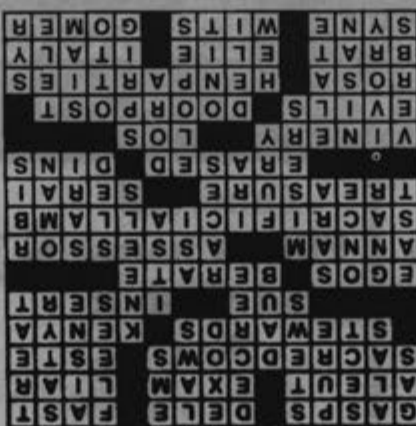

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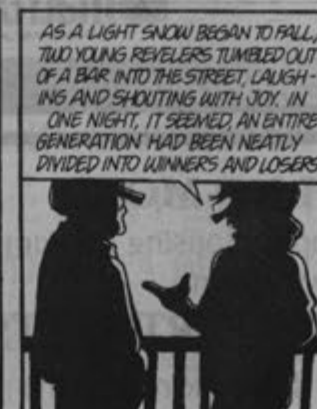

score 48-47.

Western Illinois, which dropped to 4-12 in the conference and 8-17 overall, kept the game close for the next two minutes, but a scoring drought, along with solid Eastern defense, plagued the Westerwinds.

Western Illinois only scored two points in the next five minutes in the second half.

Roller hit a layup to give Eastern its biggest lead of the game with 5:41 left in regulation to extend the Lady Panther lead to 67-53.

The Westerwinds cut the lead to six points with 54 seconds left, but the the Lady Panthers hit 5-7 free throws down the stretch to secure the win.

Down the stretch, Hilke was pleased with how the team kept its composure.

"We held the ball and we really seemed a whole lot more mature," Hilke said. "I thought Heather and Tracy got us slowed down when we had about four minutes left and a lead to hang on to. And Nicky got in the right mode as far as how to push the ball and what time we need to

score."

In the opening five minutes of the game, both teams played neck and neck before Hagerty scored on a lay up to give the Lady Panthers a 12-10 lead. Eastern held the lead for the rest of the half.

In the last three games, Roller has been held to below her season scoring average.

Roller, who leads the team in scoring, averaging nearly 15 points per game, put up good stats

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Swimmers fare poorly at Chicago

Ray Padovan took six men and seven women to the University of Illinois at Chicago during the weekend to compete in the Midwest Independent Invitational swimming and diving championships.

"We knew we were in for a very tough three days and realized the competition was a cut above what we faced last weekend in Indianapolis," the 26-year coach said. "We had a couple of good performances, but overall, our team was knocked down a notch when we found what we were up against. It's not that we swam poorly... it's the frustration that surfaced when we knew we did our best but still weren't nearly good enough. I couldn't expect more of our people, though. As a team we were keying on last weekend and I was very satisfied with what we accomplished."

The meet ran Thursday through Saturday night and the Eastern women were in 11th place out of twelve teams after

Friday night while the men were in 8th place out of nine teams.

Some of the events in which the men and women competed in included the 200 yard medley relay, 400-yard individual medley, 100-yard butterfly, 200-yard freestyle, 100-yard breast and backstroke and 800-yard freestyle relay.

For the women, Lee Singer, Heather Hoffman, Kim Beasey and Annell Metzger teamed up in the 200-yard medley relay and finished in 1:59:19, good for 11th place. Beasey also swam in the consolation final of the 400-yard individual medley and finished in 6th place. Heather Hoffman was in the consolation final of the 100-yard breaststroke and finished with a time of :33.87. Putting the trial and final swim together, she finished with a composite time of 1:12.30. Wright State won the mens competition and Illinois State and Southern Illinois were in the running for first for the women. 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Duke pulls out win against UCLA, 75-65

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Top-ranked Duke outscored fourth-ranked UCLA 14-4 over the game's final three minutes Sunday to win the much-anticipated, less-than-expected showdown 75-65.

The Blue Devils (23-2) have been No. 1 throughout the season and will hold that spot by sending the Bruins (21-4) to their third straight loss.

Christian Laettner, who led all scorers with 29 points, made two free throws with 3:06 to play to bring Duke into the game's final tie, 61-61.

That was it for the Bruins as they managed to make two of seven shots while committing three turnovers in the final three minutes.

Laettner broke that last tie with a 3-pointer with 2:32 left.

Antonio Lang scored on a long layup after a UCLA turnover to make it a five-point lead for the defending national champions.

Don MacLean brought UCLA within three with 1:56 left on a driving jumper, but Duke scored the next six points for a 72-63 lead with 57 seconds to play.

The game was the most anticipated of the season as UCLA had never been below its current ranking during the regular season and had been No. 2 for most of the year.

Brian Davis added 19 points for Duke, while Bobby Hurley, playing just his second game since returning from a broken foot, had 11 including two big 3-pointers in the final seven minutes.

Tracy Murray led UCLA with 22 points, while MacLean had 20.

Hoosiers topple Illini in Big Ten battle, hold first place

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — Damon Bailey made three free throws in the final 28 seconds Sunday as No. 2 Indiana held off Illinois 76-70 and remained in first place in the Big Ten.

The Hoosiers (21-4, 12-2) led 67-45 with 6:45 to play, but the Illini (12-13, 6-9), led by Deon Thomas and Brooks Taylor, closed to 73-67 with 50 seconds remaining.

Bailey then missed the front end of a one-and-one with 45 seconds left. But Thomas lost the ball out of bounds attempting a shot, and Bailey made the front end of another one-and-one with 28 seconds to go.

Rennie Clemons of Illinois traveled, Bailey was fouled and made two free throws with 12

seconds left for a 76-67 lead. Taylor then made a 3-pointer with three seconds to go.

Indiana, which leads Ohio State by one game with four left, trailed 20-18 but took the lead for good as Alan Henderson scored eight points during a 15-2 run.

Chris Reynolds tied the score for the last time with 3:08 remaining in the half, and Henderson scored the final six points of the half as Indiana went ahead 29-22. Henderson had another basket as Indiana took a 33-22 lead at the start of the second half.

Calbert Cheaney, who had 19 of his 21 points in the second half, scored six straight as the Hoosiers used a 7-2 run for a 40-26 lead with 17:06 to play.

The women's track team ended season in disappointing fashion weekend, as they finished in place out of ten teams at the Gateway Conference Indoor Track Field Championship.

Although the teams performance was not as good as head coach John Craft would have liked, some individuals still managed to run their best times at the meet.

"I was disappointed," Craft said. "Although we could have done a little better, but we did had some runners that ran personal best times. They just kept coming up shy of being. It was a tough meet."

Some of the runners with personal best times included; Aislinn Wiley, Amy Bersig and T.J. Rhudy. Wiley broke her best time in the 1,000-meter run. She recorded a time of 10:24, almost eight seconds faster than her previous best.

Bulls romp on Trail Blazers, 111-91

CHICAGO (AP) - It was a competitive flop.

"I don't think that's what NBC had in mind when they scheduled the game," Chicago coach Phil Jackson said Sunday after the Bulls romped to a 111-91 victory over the Portland Trail Blazers in a game between two of the NBA's best teams.

"Our defense was terrific and their shooting was poor. We just caught them on an off day." Michael Jordan with 31 points and Scottie Pippen with 20 led the rout.

"They contributed to our success by turning over the ball," Jordan said of Portland's 23 turnovers. "You guys made it like it was the NBA finals and that gave us more incentive. We were very aggressive."

"It was very discouraging the way we played," said Clyde Drexler, who led Portland with 26 points. "It's very disappointing to go on national TV with a visible championship matchup and not play better than we did."

Were the Bulls sending a message to the rest of the league? "Hopefully it was a statement," Pippen said. "But it wasn't that easy. We took an early lead and they came back. The intensity was there. We took

advantage of the turnovers and that was the difference." Portland coach Rick Adelman said things would be different in the playoffs.

"We wanted to come here and play well," Adelman said. "I'm disappointed we didn't do better but come April and May, it's a totally new and different situation." It was the second and last regular-season meeting between the teams. The Bulls also won at Portland 116-114 in double overtime.

The Bulls outscored Portland 35-17 in the second quarter, then blew it open with an 11-2 run early in the third quarter.

The Bulls led 16-7, but two baskets by Drexler and a 3-pointer and two free throws by Terry Porter gave the Trail Blazers their first lead 18-16. Portland led 23-20 after the first quarter.

Then Portland went into a second-quarter funk, going 6:14 without a basket. A 3-pointer by Craig Hodges tied it at 25, as the Bulls went on a 13-3 run to take a 35-28 lead. During that stretch, the Trail Blazers missed four straight shots and had four turnovers.

Portland was guilty of eight turnovers in the period when the Bulls took a 55-40 lead.

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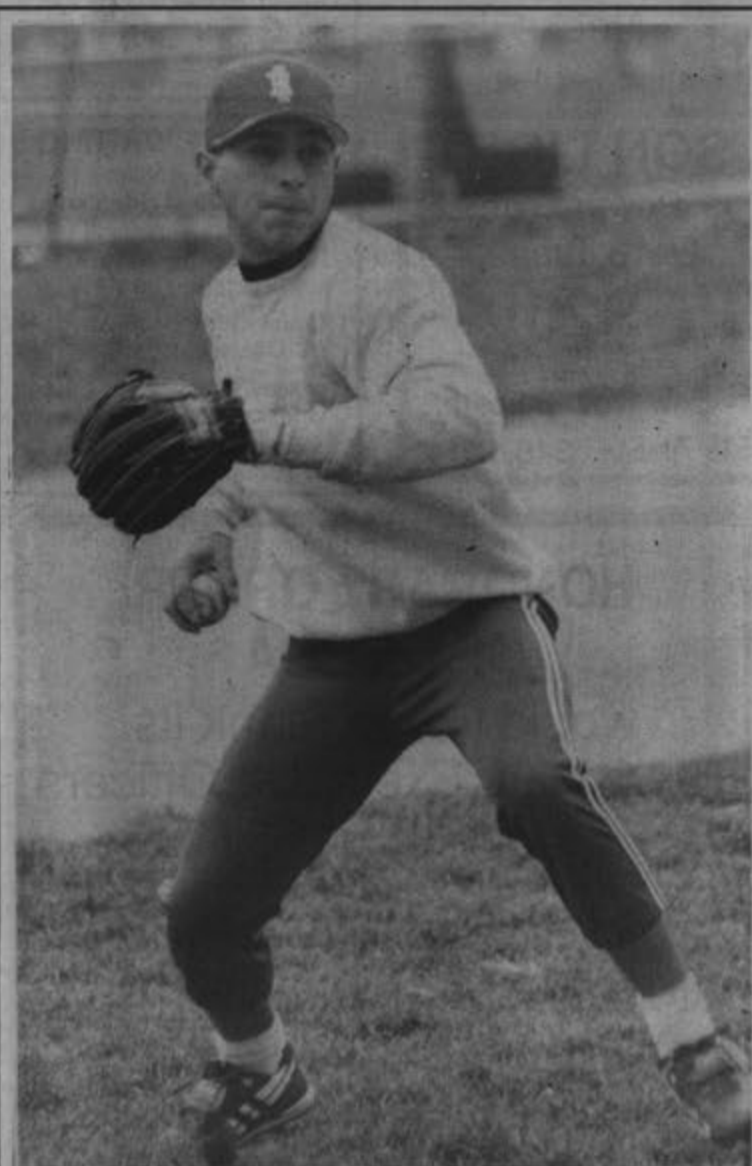

Popeye pounds Panthers

Murray State center leads Racers to win

The final five minutes of the game has been make or break time for Eastern's men's basketball team throughout the season. Saturday at Murray State those final minutes proved to be fatal as the Panthers were outscored 18-5 over the final six minutes of the game and went home 86-74 losers.

The Panthers, who were down by 10 at the half, came back from a 15-point second half deficit and took a 69-68 lead with 6:02 remaining on a free throw by sophomore center Curtis Leib.

"We played a really good stretch of seven, eight to maybe 10 minutes where we came back from a 15 point deficit," said Panther head coach Rick Samuels. "It was hard to maintain (the pace) because they made some adjustments defensively and we missed some plays. In the meantime they were scoring well from the free throw line and were converting the free throws at the time."

With the loss, Eastern, which is currently fifth in the Mid-Continent Conference at 8-7, fell to the .500 mark at 13-13 overall. The Racers, who with the win, finished their regular season after taking the Ohio Valley Conference regular season title, boosted their overall record to 15-12 and finished a two-game sweep of the Panthers in a pair of games this season.

The Racers' senior All-American candidate Popeye Jones, who was playing his final home game and was honored before the game, scored 28 points and pulled down 12 rebounds in front of the sellout crowd of 5,550 at Racer Arena. He shot 10 of 16 from the field, eight of nine from the free throw line and had one blocked shot.

"It was a very emotional night

for him," said Samuels of Jones. "He had 400 plus people from his hometown (Dresden, Tenn.) come to the game and the mayor read a proclamation declaring it Popeye Jones Day in his hometown."

Also providing some scoring spark for Murray State were Scott Adams and Frank Allen. Adams, a senior who was also honored before his last home game, scored 11 points over his regular season average of three points per game with a 14-point performance. Allen, whose three pointer with 25 seconds left in the game on Feb. 3 in the Racer 77-73 win against the Panthers at Lantz Gym doomed Eastern in the teams' first battle, scored 20 points and hit three 3-pointers.

"I thought we handled Jones OK, but we didn't handle the team very well," Samuels said. "Some other people really hurt us. Allen played well and their other senior, Scott Adams, had good night and was well above his season averages."

Eastern shot poorly from the field, 24 of 63 for 38 percent, but did shoot well as a team from the free throw line connecting on 21 of 28, a 78 percent accuracy mark. Leading the way for the Panthers at the stripe was senior guard Steve Rowe. Rowe, who shot two of eight from the floor, made good on 11 of 14 attempts as he finished with 15 points.

"That (the free throw shooting) was probably our bright spot," said Samuels. "We shot poorly from the field though. We forced some shots and took some shots when we weren't balanced. Then there were some shots that we needed to hit that we didn't and missed some wide open shots we needed to be able to maintain consistent play."

The Panthers close out their Mid-Continent schedule and their regular season when they host Western Illinois Thursday at Lantz Gym.

Tourney set: Eastern meets Wright State

Eastern will face Wright State in the first round of the Mid-Continent Conference Postseason Tournament Sunday at Cleveland State.

Western Illinois' upset victory over the Raiders - coupled with the Flames' 86-77 win over Valparaiso Saturday - dropped Wright State (9-7) into fourth place in the league.

Illinois-Chicago and Akron tied for second place in the league at 10-6, but the Zips earned the second seed via their win over conference champion Wisconsin-Green Bay earlier this year. Akron and Illinois-Chicago split their two regular season contests.

With a win over Western Illinois Thursday, Eastern could tie the Raiders for fourth place in the conference standings. Each team won a game in the two season matchups, but the Raiders defeated Green Bay, giving them the No. 4 seed in the tournament.

In their two matchups earlier this year, Wright State topped Eastern 72-65 in Dayton, but the Panthers bounced back with a 79-70 victory in Lantz Gym.

In other tournament pairings, the first-seeded Phoenix take on Western, which clinched the No.

8 seed with its win over the Raiders. Eastern the No. 2 seed and will face off with the newly hosted Cleveland State, the No. 7 seed. Chicago takes on sixth-seeded Northern Illinois (7-9).

Cleveland State and Akron will tip off at noon, 2:15 p.m. and 7:15 p.m. time slots to be announced until Friday morning.

Valparaiso's loss to UIC ended any hopes of a Crusader appearance in the postseason conference tournament. Valpo's second consecutive non-conference finish leaves them out of the eight-team tournament.

The winner of the Green Bay-Western matchup takes on the Eastern-Wright State winner in the semifinals the following day. In the other semifinal, the Akron-Cleveland State victor faces the Northern Illinois winner. Both semifinal games will be televised live on SportsChannel.

Each of the final four winners will meet in the championship game on March 10 at the new Convocation Center in Cleveland. ESPN will carry that contest at 8:30 p.m.

TEXTBOOK RENTAL SERVICE HOURS

A student currently enrolled in Continuing Education courses AND who was NOT admitted as a guest student is eligible for the approaching term.

Additional information can be obtained from the E.I.U. undergraduate or graduate catalog and/or from the appropriate admitting office.

REFUNDS

See the calendar for refund deadlines.

REGISTRATION LATE FEE

A late fee of \$25 will be assessed any student who registers late. A late fee will not be charged for students registering ONLY for workshops.

REGISTER ON OR BEFORE JULY 31 TO AVOID BEING CHARGED THE LATE FEE.

OVERLOAD FEES

You will be assessed for EACH HOUR OVER 18 SEMESTER HOURS remaining on your Fall class schedule after the last day to drop without being charged. See calendar for the deadline.

STUDENT INSURANCE REFUND

Students who can provide evidence of having health insurance equal to or better than the EIU Student Sickness and Accident Insurance may request "Petition for Insurance Refund" forms from Student Health Insurance, Student Services Building, East Wing. A copy of your insurance company's outline of coverage or a copy of your medical I.D. card must be attached to the completed "Petition for Insurance Refund" forms. See calendar for deadline to request refund.

CLEAR YOUR RECORD OR LOSE YOUR CLASSES

If you register and do not have a CLEAR RECORD with ALL UNIVERSITY OFFICES BY AUGUST 14, your FALL CLASSES WILL BE CANCELLED.

FA92 PAYMENT OF TUITION AND FEES

A bill and an unofficial schedule will be mailed to the home address of any student who registers no later than July 31. The University must receive payment by AUG. 14.

A student who registers LATE (after July 31) will be required to pay the total of tuition/fees and the \$25 late fee immediately. If payment is not made by Aug. 28, we will send a bill to your home address, and payment must be made no later than Sept. 8.

If you do not pay your bill by the due date on the bill, your classes will be cancelled. EVEN IF THE AMOUNT DUE ON YOUR BILL IS "\$0.00," you MUST RETURN THE BILL BY THE DUE DATE or your classes will be cancelled. EVEN IF you think the amount due on your bill SHOULD BE "\$0.00," you must return the bill with an explanation BY THE DUE DATE or your CLASSES WILL BE CANCELLED.

You must register by JULY 31 to avoid being charged the \$25 late fee.

ALL STUDENTS: Be sure the Housing Office has correct address and telephone information in the computer so you will receive your bill in time to pay before the deadline.

ADVANCE DEPOSIT

Each student must pay an advance deposit before being allowed to register by touch-tone telephone. The amount of the advance deposit is \$100 for Fall. The advance deposit is applied to what the student owes for Fall tuition and fees. Students who are on FULL-PAY scholarship (a full-pay scholarship pays ALL tuition and fees) or waiver must contact the Registration Office (581-3831) regarding the advance deposit. A graduate student using cooperating teacher waivers must contact the Student Teaching Office (581-2620).

An advance deposit is required so that "frivolous registration" will not tie up needed seats. The advance deposit also guarantees that you have space in the class when you schedule by phone. The advance deposit is applied toward your total tuition and fees for the term—it is not an additional cost.

A student who is interested in one particular course only is encouraged to use option 2# on touch-tone to determine seat availability BEFORE PAYING THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT.

The advance deposit is refundable if you notify the Registration Office in writing by the cutoff date. See calendar.

INSTALLMENT BILLING

EIU offers installment billing for tuition/fees. If you choose to use installment billing when you pay your initial bill for the term, you will be charged an additional non-refundable \$20 service charge, and the balance owed will be billed to your local address about the sixth week of the Fall semester. Instructions regarding installment billing will be sent to you with your initial fee bill.

PREREQUISITES

Check the catalog for information about prerequisites. Also be aware of the general conditions:

1. Before registering for UPPER-LEVEL (3000- and 4000-level) courses in the COLLEGE OF BUSINESS (COB), a student must be admitted to the College of Business. Beginning shortly before classes begin, a student NOT admitted to the COB may request these courses. (See calendar.)
2. ONLY HONORS STUDENTS may request honors sections of courses.
3. UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS may not register in GRADUATE-LEVEL COURSES, except that seniors may, under certain conditions—see catalog for details.

All courses which have prerequisites have been identified in the schedule booklet with an asterisk (*). Please check the course listings in the general catalog or consult with your adviser to be sure you meet all prerequisites for any course in which you enroll.

ACADEMIC LOAD

When registering, please observe the credit-hour limits as specified in the University catalog under the heading "Academic Load." Exceptions to the specific limits must be in the form of an approved waiver from the dean of the appropriate college and should be presented to the Dean, Student Academic Services, 116 Old Main, PRIOR to the beginning of the term for which the exception is to be granted. Waiver requests to exceed the 15-semester-hour limit for students on Academic Warning or Academic Probation will NOT be approved.

In the event of concurrent enrollment, students are cautioned that they must include all work at Eastern plus all work in which they are enrolled at other colleges or universities in determining class load. The total semester hours must not exceed the limits allowed at Eastern. Failure to abide by this regulation will result in the denial of credit for the transfer course or courses which, when added to the Eastern academic load, violate the prescribed load limits.

COURSE-LEVEL REQUIREMENTS

Generally, courses numbered 1000-1999 are freshman courses; 2000-2999, sophomore courses; 3000-3999, junior courses; 4000-4999, senior courses; and 5000-6999, graduate courses. However, if prerequisites are met, students may enroll according to the following schedule:

a. Courses numbered 3000-4999 in chemistry, foreign languages, mathematics, and military science may be taken by students who have prerequisites and permission of the department chairperson.

SENIORS IN EIU GRADUATE COURSES

Seniors at EIU wishing to enroll in courses numbered 5000 through 5499 for undergraduate credit must apply for permission at the Graduate School Office prior to enrollment. To be eligible, the student must have a cumulative EIU GPA of at least 2.75. During the final semester of residence in undergraduate work, or the penultimate semester of residence in undergraduate work if the final semester is to be spent in student teaching or internship, a senior with a cumulative EIU GPA of at least 2.75 may apply for permission to take graduate level courses numbered 4750 through 5499 for reserve graduate credit. Students wishing to elect this option must apply for permission at the Graduate School Office prior to enrollment. No undergraduate may enroll in courses numbered 5500 or above. Complete regulations governing reserve graduate credit may be found in the Graduate Catalog.

INDEPENDENT STUDY AND OTHER ARRANGED COURSES

A student registering for independent study, internship, field experience, problems courses, or thesis must contact the chairperson of the department offering the course in order to obtain approval from the appropriate Dean. IN ADDITION, the student must register for the course by touch-tone telephone, making sure to request the correct section for the number of credit hours to be earned.

ARRANGED COURSES

Students registering for courses with "Arranged" meeting times should contact the appropriate Department Chair during the first week of classes regarding class meeting times.

CREDIT/NO CREDIT GRADING STATUS

See catalog for full description of Credit/No Credit option regulations.

ABBREVIATED CONDITIONS FOR CREDIT/NO CREDIT ELIGIBILITY: Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors.

COURSES EXCLUDED: General Education courses, required professional education courses (including teaching methods), senior seminars, and any courses which may count toward fulfillment of the major or minor, whether required or optional, may not be taken Credit/No Credit.

LIMIT OF COURSES: A maximum of 12 semester hours with no more than one course in any single subject title and no more than one course in any single semester or term. For purposes of these regulations, Summer Intersession and regular Summer Term are considered a single term. Courses offered on Credit/No Credit option only and one one-hour PE service course per semester or term are not counted against the 12-semester-hour limit.

AUDIT GRADING STATUS

A student wanting to audit a course (in which the student is already enrolled) must obtain an audit card in the Registration Office, complete it AND have it signed by the instructor of the class. The completed audit card must be returned to the Registration Office by the deadline. See the calendar.

REGISTRATION = ADDS

Under touch-tone, registering = adding; to register, just add the classes.

REGULAR CLASSES may be added through the third class day; drops may be made for these classes as indicated on the calendar. WORKSHOPS may be added until they begin; if you drop a workshop before it begins, the class will not appear on your permanent record; if you drop a workshop after it begins but before it ends, the course will show on your record with a "W."

SECOND-HALF-TERM courses may be added until they begin; if you drop one of these classes before it begins, the class will not appear on your permanent record; if you drop after it begins but by the deadline, the course will show on your record with a "W."

SCHEDULE CHANGES (ADDS/DROPS)

Try to make all changes to your schedule before classes begin. You may call back any time after you initially register to make any change to your schedule, except during the published dormant periods. (See calendar.) If your record is unclear, you will not be able to add classes; you will, however, be able to drop classes.

REQUIREMENTS FOR REGISTERING BY TOUCH-TONE TELEPHONE

1. Must be a continuing student OR admitted or re-admitted to the University.
2. Must have paid at the Cashier Office, Old Main, OR mailed in the advance deposit of \$100 for Fall, accompanied by an advance deposit coupon; OR have submitted proof to the Registration Office of a FULL-PAY scholarship (a full-pay scholarship pays ALL tuition and fees); OR, if using co-op teacher waivers (graduate students only), have contacted the Student Teaching Office; OR, if faculty or staff at E.I.U., have contacted the Registration Office.
3. Must have seen adviser (if undergraduate student), and adviser must have set indicator in computer that student has been advised.
4. Must have a clear record with the University.
5. Must complete schedule worksheet, and have acceptable alternates readily available.
6. Must use a touch-tone telephone and E.I.U. instructions to register.
7. Must terminate registration call in prescribed manner.

ORAL ENGLISH PROFICIENCY

Eastern Illinois University has adopted a program of Oral English Proficiency Assessment for all instructional staff. Students who have difficulty understanding an instructor should, if possible, first consult with the instructor. In the event that the difficulties are not resolved, the student should address his/her concerns to the Chair of the department in which the instructor is teaching. Subsequent appeals may also be possible through the Dean and then to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs.

CANCELLATION OF SMALL CLASSES

Classes with small enrollments are subject to cancellation.

ALL STUDENTS

Be sure your name appears on the official tenth-day class roster for any class you attend. If your name does not appear on the tenth-day class roster, contact the Registration Office IMMEDIATELY.

OFFICIAL NOTICES

Read the "Official Notices" in THE DAILY EASTERN NEWS for important information throughout the term.

REGISTRATION OFFICE

The Registration Office is located in the south basement of McAfee. Office hours are 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. The telephone number is (217) 581-3831.

PERSONAL ACCESS CODE (PAC)

When you register by touch-tone phone, you will need to create your own special 4-digit code (PERSONAL ACCESS CODE). Make this a number you will easily remember, and tell no one what it is. If the need arises to CHANGE your PAC, go to the Registration Office to do so. Your PAC is your security code. You establish your PAC on the first call you make for each term. You may use the same PAC every term, or you may use a different PAC every term—just be sure you can remember what PAC you use for a given term.

ACCURACY IN CALL NUMBERS

Be very careful to register for correct call numbers because the call number determines exactly which course/section you are in and whether the course is a course which continues all term, or is a half-term course.

**TO CALL IN
YOUR REGISTRATION**

Only a touch-tone telephone can be used to make entries. A touch-tone telephone makes a different sound after each button is pressed.

A voice prompt will guide you after each entry. EACH ENTRY IS COMPLETED BY PUSHING THE # BUTTON. YOU MUST PAY THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT BEFORE CALLING. If you are an UNDERGRADUATE, your ADVISER must SET the INDICATOR in the COMPUTER

The system will be available from Monday through Thursday from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. - 10:00 p.m.; Friday from 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. - 8:00 p.m.; and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.
2. After the prompt, enter the appropriate term number followed by the appropriate year and the # sign:

Use three digits to enter this information: Fall 1992 = 192.
For Fall 1992, enter 192#.

3. Select EITHER the option to make changes to your schedule (register) OR the option to inquire about course information only.

4. After the prompt, enter your social security number followed by the # sign: xxx xx xxxx #
5. On the first call for a term, enter your birth date as MMDDYY#—six digits, using two digits each for month, date, and year—followed by the # sign.
6. After the prompt, enter your secret Personal Access Code (PAC) followed by the # sign: xxxx #. If you do not already have a PAC in the computer, you need to provide one. Make it a special number so you will remember it; and remember to keep your PAC SECRET. HELPFUL HINTS**CLOSED COURSES**

When seats are unavailable due to course closures, the student should use the "1 nnnn#" code to locate open sections of the class before trying to build a schedule over Touch-Tone. This will save much frustration when scheduling classes.

WAIT-LISTING

Juniors and above who need 3000-level (or higher) courses that are closed should use the wait-list function. This provides a means of telling the department chairperson exactly who and how many students need the course.

Be sure to follow the schedule listed at the front of this bulletin for calling to confirm your wait-listed course. If by the last date for confirming a wait listed class you are not actually scheduled into the class, you then have two alternatives: (1) contact the department chairperson, or (2) choose another course.

CALL NUMBERS FOR COURSE/SECTION

Check carefully that you are entering the CALL NUMBER and NOT the COURSE NUMBER when entering information on Touch-Tone. These are two different numbers.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT NUMBERS

When using the "N ddd#" function to find courses added after schedule was printed, use the 3-digit NUMBER—not the department alphabetical abbreviation.

INQUIRY WITHOUT REGISTERING

A student who is interested in one particular course only is encouraged to use option 2# on touch-tone to determine seat availability BEFORE PAYING THE ADVANCE DEPOSIT.

PAYMENT OF FEES

You must RETURN the FEE PORTION of your unofficial schedule form to the cashier by the due date EVEN IF IT SHOWS "\$0.00" AMOUNT DUE. If you fail to return this to the cashier, your CLASSES WILL BE CANCELLED.

TOUCH-TONE PROBLEMS

If you have problems with a specific request code, see the detailed explanation of that function.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST CODES**1. A nnnn# — ADD a course (register).**

This function adds a course to your schedule, provided that there are seats available; that it does not conflict with another course; and that you meet ANY specified course requirements (such as being admitted to the College of Business, being admitted to the Honors program, being admitted to the Graduate School, being admitted to Teacher Education).

If the requested class is closed, the computer will search for an open section that will fit your schedule, and then suggest this section to you. To add the suggested section, enter A#.

2. D nnnn# — DROP a course.

This function allows you to drop a course from your schedule. Be sure you are aware of the different deadlines for different kinds of drops. (See calendar.)

3. W nnnn# — WAIT-LIST a course.

This function is available ONLY to students with classification of JUNIOR or HIGHER who are requesting 3000-level courses or higher. A student may wait-list ONLY ONE SECTION OF A PARTICULAR COURSE.

Wait-listing a class will cause that time-frame to be reserved in your schedule AND will add the credit hours into the total number of hours scheduled.

Each department will have the option of re-arranging priority of students on a wait-list. A department can also remove a name from the wait-list if the department determines that the student's need is not critical.

Periodically the computer will match the wait-list against available seats, and schedule students where possible, based on FI/FO (first in, first out—in other words, first-come, first-served)—unless the department re-arranges priority based on need.

The department MAY designate other sections to satisfy a given wait-list. A student waiting for a particular section may be placed in the newly-designated section, provided there is no time conflict with other scheduled classes.

It is suggested that a student waiting for a particular class call back using the "W#" transaction of TTR System to determine the result of the wait-list processing. There is a schedule of wait-list processing dates included in this schedule bulletin. Enter L# to verify that the course is now scheduled.

A student who does not obtain a wait-listed class on one processing date will automatically be forwarded to the next processing date.

All WAIT LISTS will be discontinued after the Wait-List Purge Date. After the Purge Date, the student must obtain special permission from the departmental chairperson in order to add a CLOSED class.

Be aware that departments may choose not to make certain classes available for wait-listing.

4. *W nnnn# — REMOVE COURSE from wait-list.

This function allows you to remove your name from a wait-list. Doing this will free up the reserved time-frame and credit hours on your schedule.

5. W# — INQUIRE into status of WAIT-LISTED courses.

This function allows you to inquire into the status of any wait-listed course(s) you had previously requested.

6. R nnnn# — REQUEST CREDIT/NO CREDIT grading status.

This function will allow you to select Credit/No Credit grading status for a course that is already scheduled.

The computer will check a dates table to ensure that the request is within the appropriate time period.

Freshmen may not request Credit/No Credit grading status.

Undergraduates may not request Credit/No Credit for any courses 5000-level and above.

Graduate students may not request Credit/No Credit for any courses 4750+.

7. *R nnnn#—REMOVE CREDIT/NO CREDIT grading status.

This function allows you to remove Credit/No Credit grading status from a course, leaving the course under regular grading status.

The computer will check the appropriate dates table to be sure the request is within the proper time period.

8. L#—LIST ALL COURSES on your schedule.

This function allows you to list your complete schedule over the phone, including all wait-listed courses.

The computer will give the following for each scheduled course:

Call number
Dept/Course/Section
Meeting time and day
Bldg/Room
Credits
Total credits

This function will also indicate Credit/No Credit or Audit.

9. L nnnn#—LIST DETAILS of a SPECIFIC COURSE.

This function will allow you to find out specific information about a specific course.

The computer will give the following:

Call number
Dept/Course/Section
Starting date (primarily used for second-half-term and Summer courses)
Meeting time and day
Bldg/Room
Credits
Open or closed

10. A nnn#—ADD A PREVIOUSLY SUGGESTED CLASS.

This function allows you to add the previously suggested course to your schedule.

This entry must be used immediately after a course has been suggested by the computer—any other entry will negate this option.

11. I nnnn#—INQUIRE to find an OPEN SECTION.

This function allows you to find an open section of the specified course that meets at the same time. If there are no other sections at this time, then the computer will so indicate and will look for any openings at all.

If all sections are closed, the computer will so indicate.

The computer will give the following for the selected course(s):

Call #
Dept/Course/Section
Meeting time and day and length
Seats remaining

A subsequent entry of "I#" will continue the search for a different section—if one exists. Use the "I" function to find sections added after the schedule was printed. If you have problems with closed classes, use the "I" to find out what sections are open before you schedule any classes.

12. N ddd#—List NEW COURSES ADDED for DEPARTMENT NUMBER.

Use this NEW function to find any new courses—not sections—added since the publication of the class schedule bulletin. ddd = 3-digit academic department NUMBER.

13. T#—TERMINATE phone session.

The computer will give the total credit hours and any other important data, and then terminate the call.

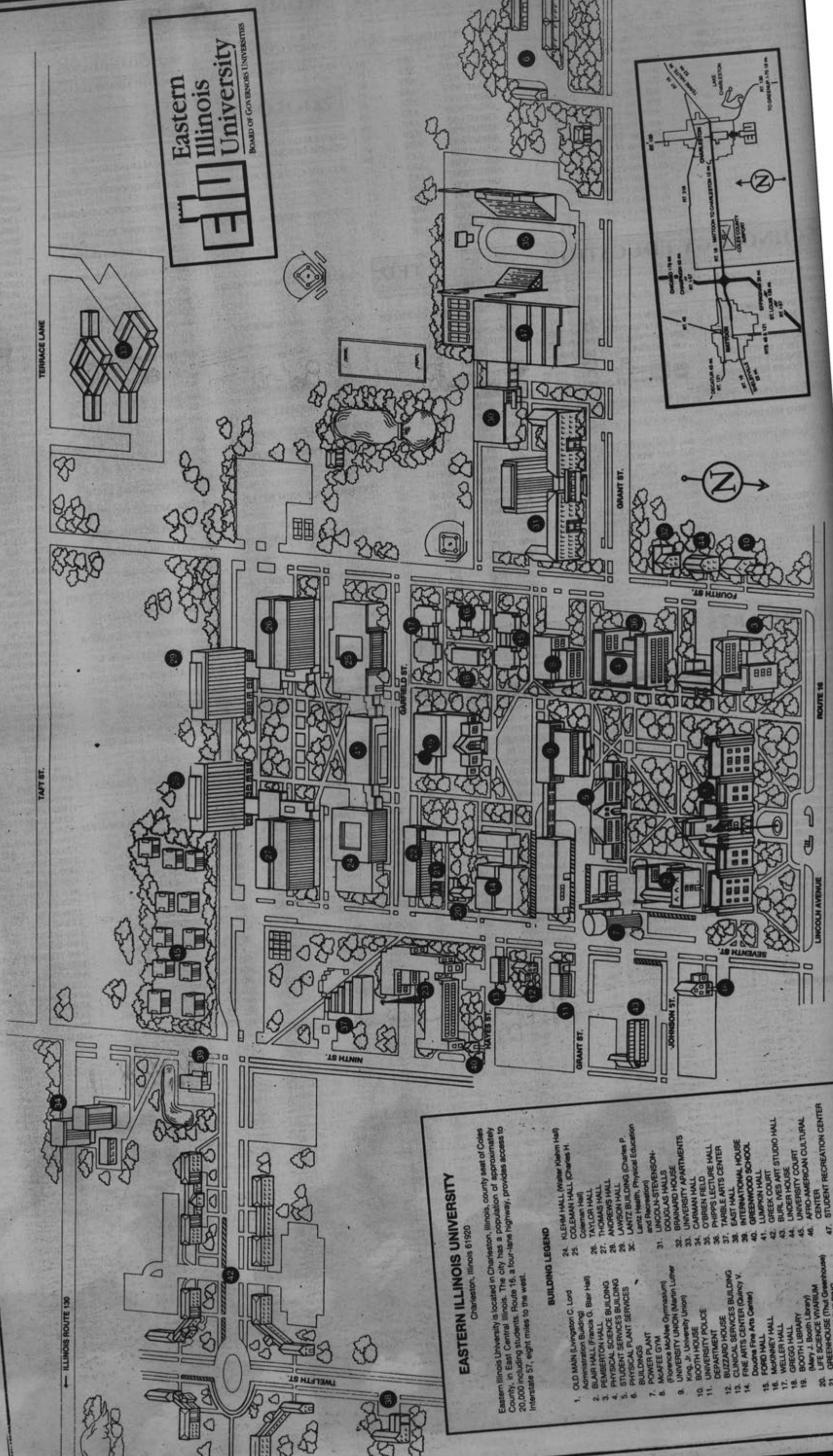
