





## JOURNAL OF THE DAILY PROCEEDINGS OF THE KENTUCKY ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

#### A. SPECIAL SESSION

A special session of the Kentucky Annual Conference convened at Epworth United Methodist Church, Lexington, Kentucky, October 29, 1968 at 10:30 a.m. with Bishop Roy H. Short presiding.

Devotions-With Harold Tatman at the organ, Ted Nicholas led in singing "My Hope is Built" and "O Worship The King." Bishop Short announced the passing of R. F. Ockerman and asked that his family be remembered in the prayer which was led by Russell R. Patton. "Take My Life and Let It Be" was sung.

Roll Call—The Secretary was called upon to take the roll. He called attention to Section 2, Paragraph 5 of the Standing Rules, and announced that cards were provided in the foyer for clerical and lay delegates\* to register.

Announcements—Announcements were made by the Sectary.

Personal Privilege—Motion was made by Onie U. Kays that the Conference Secretary be asked to send a letter of sympathy from the Conference to the family of R. F. Ockerman. It was so ordered.

The Fund for Reconciliation—Bishop Short explained the three phases of the Quadrennial Emphasis as adopted at the session of the General Conference.

Mr. Jesse Stuart, Kentucky Conference layman and noted author and poet, was introduced by Bishop Short. He spoke to the effort of the United Methodist Church now being launched in the Fund for Reconciliation, especially in its regard to the necessity for good education in deprived areas and among underprivileged youth.

Harold W. Dorsey presented the study for the Emphasis— The Sermon on the Mount—as one of the phases of the quad-

rennial program to be carried out in the local church.

The plan for the Fund was then outlined by Bishop Short, using as his Scripture background, Matthew 5:23—"be reconciled to thy brother." He announced a goal of \$20,000,000 to be raised in four years. He stated that there were no quotas as such but a guideline could be established by fifty percent of what each church gives to world service and conference benevolences each year. One-half of the amount raised is to be used in the general church and one-half within the bounds of the annual conference in which it is raised. Individual projects must be approved by the Bishops' Council. The evaluation and recommendation for those in our area is to be done by the Area Committee.

Each pastor was then asked for a personal pledge and he would in turn ask for pledges from the members of his local church. The district superintendents passed out pledge cards. As the congregation sang, "We're Marching to Zion," the

ministers brought their pledge cards to the altar.

Announcements—Our host pastor, Onie U. Kays, made an announcement concerning the nearby places available for the noon meal.

Benediction—Bishop Short pronounced the Benediction. The session adjourned at 12:45 p.m.

#### B. REGULAR SESSION

(Session Two of the United Methodist Church)

FIRST DAY, WEDNESDAY, EVENING SESSION, JUNE 11, 1969

Opening Session. The Kentucky Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church met in its one hundred and fortyninth session at Hiram Brock Auditorium, Eastern State University, Richmond, Kentucky, June 11, 1969 at 7:30 p.m., Bishop Roy H. Short, presiding.

Devotions. Bishop Short called upon Ted Nicholas to lead the conference in singing, "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing"; Jack Tremaine at the organ. The Conference was declared officially in session and "And Are We Yet Alive" was sung after which Charles S. Perry led in prayer. Ted Nicholas led in singing "Be Thou My Vision." Bishop Short announced that an offering would be taken at each evening session of the conference; he gave the offertory prayer and the

offering was received by the ushers. Ted Nicholas introduced Mrs. Reuel Buchanan of Asbury Theological Seminary who presented a vocal solo "When God Speaks."

Bishop Short then addressed the conference on "The Changes Time Brings and the Things That Abide." The conference stood to sing "Faith of Our Fathers" at the close of the address.

Roll Call. L. M. Rogers, secretary, called attention to the standing rules, section 2, paragraph 5 and announced that cards were provided in the lobby for ministerial and lay delegates to register. He also called attention to the fact that the enrollment card requests the correct mailing address of each pastor.

*Nominations*. The secretary nominated Robbie L. Wade as assistant secretary to replace George Walker, deceased, and he was elected.

*Memoir*. The secretary moved that in view of Bishop Gum's leadership in the Kentucky Conference, his memoir be included in the 1969 Conference Journal. It was so ordered.

*Greetings.* The secretary announced that greetings had been received from retired members: John Worthington, R. R. Rose and S. C. Rice.

Announcements. Necessary announcements were made by the secretary.

Courtesy. Harold W. Dorsey, district superintendent of the Danville District introduced Mr. John L. Vickers, assistant to the President of Eastern State University who brought words of welcome to the conference from the University and President Martin.

Motions from the Cabinet. Harold W. Dorsey, secretary of the cabinet, moved that the printed program for the conference be followed as printed with the exception that on Thursday morning the report of the World Service and Finance Commission be heard and the report of the Program Council be heard Friday morning. It was so ordered.

Bar of the Conference. Harold W. Dorsey moved that the bar of the conference be up to and including Row M. It was so ordered.

Changes in Boards and Committees. (See Report No. 1) Harold W. Dorsey made nominations for the cabinet for changes and membership of boards and committees and the nominations were accepted.

Amendments to Constitution. Harold W. Dorsey moved that the vote on Amendments to the Constitution of the United Methodist Church be taken at the Thursday afternoon session. It was so ordered.

Expression of sympathy. Harold W. Dorsey moved that since this is the first session of the Kentucky Annual Conference after the death of Bishop Gum that the conference treasurer be authorized to send a potted plant to Mrs. Gum as an expression of love and appreciation. It was so ordered.

Announcements. Additional announcements were made by the secretary.

Adjournment. The benediction was given by Bishop Short and the session was adjourned.

# SECOND DAY, THURSDAY, MORNING SESSION JUNE 12. 1969

Devotions. Bishop Short, presiding, Ted Nicholas led the conference in singing, "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus" and "Rise Up O Men of God." Steadman Bagby led in prayer. Ted Nicholas led in singing "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken." Organist—John Tremaine, Professor of Music, Asbury Theological Seminary.

Committee on Journal. The report of the committee on journal was called for and given by Glenn Courts who reported that the minutes of yesterday's session as well as the minutes of the special session October 29th in Lexington had been examined and were found to be correct.

Lake Junaluska Associates. Dr. Wilson Weldon was introduced by Bishop Short and he spoke in the interest of the Lake Junaluska associates, an organization to raise additional support for Lake Junaluska. He presented to Bishop Short the fourth copy of the September-October issue of the Upper Room of which he is now managing editor.

United Methodist Publishing Company. Elvin T. Edgar, representing the United Methodist Publishing House spoke regarding publishing interests of the church and presented Bishop Short a check in the amount of \$12,193.61 to be used for the pension funds of the Kentucky Conference. Bishop Short recommended recently published books to the conference: "Ferment in the Ministry," by Seward Hiltner and "The Layman and Other Martyrs," by Bishop Kennedy.

Fraternal Delegate. Bishop Short presented Robert Shaver, district superintendent of the Hopkinsville District, Louisville Conference, who brought greetings from his conference as the appointed delegate. Mrs. Shaver and D. M. Spears of the Louisville Conference were also recognized. D. M. Spears spoke briefly to the conference.

Special Privilege. Harold Dorsey requested that Mr. Murray Short bring his mother Mrs. Roy Short to the platform and they were presented to the conference. Murray Short is a professor at Illinois State University. Both Mr.

Short and Mrs. Short made brief remarks to the conference and the delegates stood to recognize these honored guests.

Area Director, Committee on Church and Community Planning. Bishop Short presented H. H. Greene, Area Director of the Committee on Church and Community Planning, who presented the committee's report and made a statement to the conference regarding the plans of the committee for the future. Bishop Short gave further words of explanation regarding the work of the committee and expressed gratitude for the leadership of Director, H. H. Greene. He called attention to the fact that the title of the Committee is now Committee on Church and Community Planning instead of Committee on Church and Community Development. (See Report No. 2.)

The Director presented the "Plan of Promotion for Reconciliation" as follows: 1. That within each District in the Area there be held during the summer months: a. An afternoon session with pastors in a depth study of the meanings and opportunities in reconciliation for an improving of our own relations as preachers and pastors; a genuine appraisal of the message of The Sermon on the Mount and what it might say to us. b. An evening meeting, on the same day, with pastors and laymen representing local churches in a cost price dinner meeting where we shall look at reconciliation and the fund and share a face to face encounter as we look at the Call to be "agents of reconciliation" to each other and those who are among the alienated. A definite plan to be "agents of reconciliation" as we undertake to "bridge the gaps" that are separating us now. That the District Committee shall serve to arrange the meeting. 2. That we establish in each of our local Churches a Committee on Reconciliation consisting of the pastor; the Chairmen of the Work Area of Christian Social Concerns; the Church Treasurer; the Secretary of Christian Social Relations of the Women's Society; a representative of The Methodist Men and a Youth from U.M.Y.F. These persons constituting the Local Church Committee on Reconciliation shall assist the General Committee in establishing and maintaining within the local Church the true sense of Reconciliation that within the local Church we may see true evidences of Reconciliation taking place. N.B. The Work Area Chairmen of Christian Social Concerns shall be Chairman of the Local Church Committee on Reconciliation. 3. That within each local Church a good record be kept of all funds received for the Fund for Reconciliation that we may keep our membership reminded of the need for completing all pledges made. The SUCCESS of our funding projects depends solely upon the incoming of funds to meet the pledges made. The Local Church Treasurer is the key man here. 4. That a means of reporting be established in order that we may keep all Districts and Churches informed of the "progress" of the fund for Reconciliation and that items of interest gleaned from the reports of our projects be made available for the general information of our people.

This plan and the report was adopted. (See Report No. 3.)

Commission on World Service and Finance. Charles G. Turkington, chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, called upon David Seamands, secretary to read the report of the Commission. The report as it appears in the Report Booklet was voted upon item by item with the following changes:

Section 9—was changed to read "We recommend the payment of eight (8) cents a mile by all boards for traveling expense;

Section 17—The salary of the Council Director was raised to 10,000.00, thus bringing the total of section 17A to \$83,325.00;

Section 17—The total for the Program Council, the office of the treasurer, and the area director for church and community service was changed to \$99,655.00 and after deduction to paid from surplus funds the total became \$90,225.00.

Section 19D—the Lexington District was added to the Ashland, Barbourville and Danville Districts to receive \$2,600.00 as District Superintendents' expense fund.

The report was then adopted as a whole. (See Report No. 3)

Kentucky Wesleyan College. Dr. Harold Hamilton, president of Kentucky Wesleyan College was presented to the conference by Bishop Short and he gave a brief report on the college and some of its plans for the future. At Bishop Short's request he told in some detail of the new library project which the student body is carrying through to completion.

Announcements. Necessary announcements were made by the secretary and the host pastor, Robert J. Scott.

Committee on Standing Rules. Harold W. Dorsey, secretary of the cabinet, gave first reading of the changes in the standing rules of the Kentucky Conference.

Committee on Courtesies. W. A. E. Johnson presented Chaplin (Lt. Col.) Benis G. Carnes to the conference and he addressed the conference on the work of over six hundred Methodist chaplains across the world and told something of his own activities in the armed services.

Announcements. The secretary made additional announcements and Ralph G. Wesley requested that those having a part in the Memorial Service come to the platform and that families of those to be memorialized sit in the front seats of the center section.

Recess. Bishop Short declared the conference in session at 10:50 a.m.

The Memorial Service. The hour for the memorial service having arrived. Ralph G. Wesley, chairman of the committee was in the chair.

Amendment No. 4—vote taken by count, 185 for, 13 against.

Union College. Mahlon A. Miller, President of Union College, was presented to the conference by Bishop Short and he spoke of the work students and staff members of Union College are doing with other groups in and outside the church to meet human need in Appalachia.

Announcements. Charles Rowe was asked to report to the information desk by the secretary.

Redbird Settlement. Edward Ehresman, representative of the Redbird Settlement in eastern Kentucky, gave information regarding the work of the settlement and brought greetings from the superintendent and his staff.

Courtesies. W. A. E. Johnson recognized a group of senior citizens from First United Methodist Church, Covington, who traveled to the conference in a newly purchased church bus, and R. W. Gibson, Sr., Bowman Memorial Church, Hazard, who is attending his 30th consecutive session of the Kentucky Annual Conference. Neither the senior citizens group or Mr. Gibson at the moment were present to acknowledge the recognition.

Announcements. Necessary announcements were made by the secretary.

Conference Inspiration Speaker. Bishop Short introduced Dr. Ernest A. Smith, General Board of Christian Social Concerns, and announced that he would be the conference inspirational speaker this week.

## SECOND DAY, THURSDAY, EVENING SESSION JUNE 12. 1969

Worship Hour. The worship service was directed by Louis Fields. Ted Nicholas led in singing "The Church Is One Foundation" and "Fairest Lord Jesus." Rev. Fields read the scripture and led in prayer. An offering was received. The offertory prayer being given by the worship leader and the offertory by Jack Tremaine at the organ. Ted Nicholas introduced Mrs. Thomas Carruth, of Wilmore, Kentucky, who sang "O Lord Most Holy." Dr. Ernest A. Smith was then introduced by Louis Fields and he took as his text, "What Then Will You Do With Jesus Who Is Called Christ?" "Amazing Grace" was sung by the assembly and the benediction was pronounced by Louis Fields. John Tremaine, conference organist played both prelude and postlude.

## THIRD DAY, FRIDAY, MORNING SESSION JUNE 13, 1969

Devotions. O. P. Smith led the devotional service, John Tremaine at the organ, Ted Nicholas led in singing "Come, We that Love the Lord." O. P. Smith led in prayer. After singing "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" O. P. Smith read Luke 4:16-21 and spoke on the call to the Ministry. At the close of his address, Bishop Short expressed appreciation for the message.

Committee on Journal. Harry Fegan reported that the Minutes of yesterday's session had been examined and were found to be correct.

Greetings. The secretary read telegrams of greeting from the Holston Conference, the Iowa Conference, and Rev. and Mrs. I. R. Sumner. H. W. Dorsey moved that appropriate replies be sent to the two conferences and Rev. and Mrs. Sumner and it was so ordered.

Transfer. Bishop Short announced the transfer of James T. Walker from the Louisville Conference to the Kentucky Conference for the retired relations. He indicated that Mr. Walker would be transferred back to the Louisville Conference at the end of the session.

"The 70." Bishop Short called for the members of the "70" to come to the platform for recognition. He called upon

each District Superintendent to introduce his group and give them a chance to give their names, churches, and position in their local or district UMYF. The Bishop announced that Cochran Dorsey is one of two young people to be delegates to the Detroit Assembly of the National Council of Churches, the first session in which youth in their teens will be members. The conference applauded as the youth group returned to their seats.

*Memoir*. Ralph Wesley spoke in tribute to George Stevens, a former Approved Supply in our Conference who passed away last Saturday. The memoir of George Stevens is to be included in the 1969 Kentucky Conference Journal.

Program Council. (See Report No. 5). Albert W. Sweazy, chairman, presented the work of the Council and spoke regarding the goals and activities during the past year. Frank C. King, director, introduced Miss Myrtle Standiford, director of Conference Adult and Children's Ministries, who addressed the conference briefly concerning her desire to serve well in her new position. Roger Collins, conference director of Youth Work and Family Ministries, gave a report of some aspects of his work and called on Mike Gibbons to speak of the conference youth ministry and Noel White, conference member, of his opportunities and challenges in working with the youth program of the Kentucky Conference. A. W. Sweazy then called for reports of the following boards:

Christian Social Concerns—Paul Royster, chairman, made comments on the report of the Committee on Christian Social Concerns, as printed in the report book. He announced the nomination of Dr. Frank Bean as an additional member of the Board to be elected by the conference. He moved the adoption of the report with the deletion of the paragraph on ABM Missile system at the top of page 41. Robert Pugh moved the deletion of the first full paragraph at the top of page 41 which reads: "The U.S. delegation should support the admission of Red China to the U.N. post haste." His motion was seconded and was passed. John Howard Williams moved to include the paragraph on the ABM missile system but Harold Dorsey rose to a point of order indicating that John Howard Williams was no longer a member of the Kentucky Conference since he transferred out as of June 1. Paul Hager then moved to include the paragraph on the ABM missile system. The motion was seconded. Thomas Ditto then moved to substitute the words "to become as fully informed as possible toward" to take the place of the words "to oppose" in the paragraph. After the discussion the motion on the Ditto amendment was voted upon by show of hands and the Bishop announced that he thought the amendment had lost. A count vote was called for and result showed 98 for, 75 opposed. Mr. Hager then asked to withdraw his motion but the Bishop ruled that a motion cannot be withdrawn when it has been amended. The vote on the paragraph as altered by the amendment was then voted upon and the paragraph was adopted as amended. The report was adopted as a whole. (See Report No. 6.)

Board of Education-Robert Wallace, chairman, made statements regarding the report and its recommendations and called on Don Herren to emphasize some of the goals and dreams of the Board for Christian Higher Education in the Kentucky Conference. William R. Jennings, secretary, read corrections in nominations on pages 35 and 26 of the report booklet. Robert Wallace moved the adoption of the report as corrected. Thomas Ditto raised a question about the present Church School literature for youth and expressed the hope that changes could be made so that the literature would be more acceptable and would offer wider choices in its use in the churches. Bishop Short asked E. L. Tullis to report to the Conference on what has already been done by the area in contacting the editors of the literature by Rual Perkins, representing the Louisville Conference and E. L. Tullis representing the Kentucky Conference. E. L. Tullis reported upon the contacts made with the editorial staff in Nashville and their favorable reactions to suggestions made to them. Other comments were made concerning the Church School Literature. Robert Wallace withdrew his original motion and moved the adoption of the report as amended. It was so ordered. He moved that the nominations of the Board as corrected be approved and it was done. (See Report No. 7.)

Board of Evangelism—Thomas Ditto, chairman, called attention to parts of the Board of Evangelism report as printed on pages 18-20 in the report book. He moved the adoption of the report and approval of nominations for trustees of Ruggles Camp and it was done. (See Report No. 8.)

Commission on Archives and History—Charles Pinkston, chairman, made a statement regarding the new room for the historical items of the commission at the Program Council Office in Lexington and urged that the materials there be used preferably without taking them from the premises. He mentioned some of the plans and goals of the Commission. He moved that the report be adopted and it was done. (See Report No. 9.)

Health and Welfare Ministries.—Kenneth A. Clay, chairman, presented R. R. Patton, chairman of the Hospital Campaign, who gave the report of the progress of the hospital building program and the amounts paid by the conference in the building funds. (Report No. 22 and Financial Exhibit B.) Dr. Patton introduced John C. Pratt, administrator of the Good Samaritan Hospital, Lexington, who gave a report of the progress of the hospital and Lee Keene administrator of the Methodist Hospital of Kentucky, who made a summary

report. Thomas A. Adams, secretary, gave the report of the Health and Welfare Ministries. In response to an inquiry by W. R. Jennings, A. W. Sweazy made an explanation regarding the closing of the School of Nursing at the Good Samaritan Hospital, explaining it was because of lack of funds. The secretary of the board offered a substitute for paragraphs C and D and it was adopted. K. A. Clay moved the adoption of the report and it was done. He moved that the nominations on page 26 of the report book be accepted and it was so ordered. (See Report No. 10.)

Courtesies. W. A. E. Johnson introduced George Wood, director of the Program Council, Louisville Conference.

*Greetings.* The secretary read a telegram of greetings from the California-Nevada Conference and he was asked to send proper response.

*Announcements*. Necessary announcements were made by the secretary.

Adjournment. Benediction was pronounced by George Wood and the meeting was adjourned.

# THIRD DAY, FRIDAY, AFTERNOON SESSION JUNE 13, 1969

Devotions. John Tremaine at the organ, Ted Nicholas led in singing "Faith of Our Fathers."

Announcement. The secretary made announcements.

*Greetings*. E. L. Ockerman sent greetings to the conference and the letter was read by the secretary.

The Program Council. Albert W. Sweazy, chairman, recognized Frank King who expressed deep appreciation to A. W. Sweazy for his leadership in the Program Council.

Laity—C. R. Hager, chairman, presented the report of the Laity, moved the adoption of the report and acceptance of the nomination. It was so ordered. (See Report No. 11.)

Commission on Minimum Salary—David Ross, chairman, presiding, Edward Coleman, secretary, read the changes in the report of the Commission on Minimum Salary as printed in the report book pages 51-53. Harold Dorsey raised the question as to whether we make "Application" for minimum salary or is it set for the conference and then it benefits the men who fall within this catagory. Harold Dorsey moved to substitute for No. III, 1-5 "that the District Superintendent shall furnish pertinent information relating to the men in his district who are eligible for minimum salary." The motion was seconded. Frank King called for the question and the vote was taken on the substitute proposed by Harold Dorsey. The amendment lost. The report was approved. (See Report No. 12.)

Board of Missions—James Shepherd, chairman, presiding, gave information regarding the plan and recommendations in the report of the Board. R. L. Anderson gave the report of the Church Extension section and presented Eugene Barbour who related to the conference a unique mission project begun in Paris, Kentucky where he has been pastor the last four years. R. L. Anderson moved the adoption of the report and recommendations of the Church Extension section. E. L. Tullis read a tribute to Mrs. E. T. Curry, deceased President of the Kentucky Conference Women's Society of Christian Service. The conference expressed its approval by standing and Bishop Short led in prayer. Mrs. Louis Fields, Vice-President of the Women's Society of Christian Service, made explanation as to the absence of an annual report for the conference year 1968-69 and told of the attempts of the present officers to carry on the women's work of the Kentucky Conference during this interim period. Lee Hubbard presented the work of the Methodist Mountain Missions in Kentucky. introduced Ralph Landis, one of the workers in this growing mission and invited all present to visit their work. James Shepherd read the nominations of the board for trustees of the Methodist Mountain Missions and they were approved. He moved the adoption of the report. Paul Royster raised the question as to the response of the General Board of Missions to the demands of the so-called Black Manifesto Group. E. L. Tullis explained the position of the General Board of Missions and its decision to give \$300,000.00 to Black Projects, of which \$100,000 will be given by the Women's Division of Christian Service, \$100,000 from the National Division, and \$100,000 from Emerging Missions of the World Division, the fund to be administered by committee composed of the Black Bishops of The United Methodist Church and the black members of the General Board of Missions. Paul Royster asked for permission to read a paper on this subject taking a somewhat different position from that expressed by E. L. Tullis. Bishop Short suggested that in view of the short time remaining before the 4:00 worship hour that this paper be tabled until the opening of the Saturday morning session. By common consent it was so ordered.

Board of the Ministry—Harold W. Dorsey moved that 10:30 a.m. Saturday, be the order of the Day for the Board of the Ministry.

Lindsey Wilson College. Dr. John Horton, President of Lindsey Wilson College, was introduced by Bishop Short and he spoke of the work of educating young people at an institution of higher learning in these times.

Courtesy. Bishop Short called attention to the death of the 17 year-old granddaughter of J. I. Meyer by drowning. Harold W. Dorsey moved a prayer be offered for the family and that a note of sympathy be sent by the secretary to J. I. Meyer. T. O. Harrison led in prayer.

Announcements. Necessary announcements were made by the secretary and Harold W. Dorsey.

Courtesies. W. A. E. Johnson presented Paul Shepherd, District Superintendent of the Louisville West District, L. W. Woodward, Conference Treasurer, and R. H. Wade, District Superintendent of the Louisville East District.

Recess. The conference recessed until 4:00 p.m.

#### THIRD DAY, FRIDAY AFTERNOON, WORSHIP HOUR

Worship Hour. David C. Ross presided at the worship hour, Ted Nicholas led in singing "How Firm A Foundation" and David Ross led the prayer. David Davies presented a vocal solo, accompanied by Ed Cawood at the organ and Mrs. James Welch at the piano. Dr. Smith was then introduced using the text from the words of Jesus in the feeding of the five thousand "How Many Loaves Do You Have?" and raised the question of "What Contribution Do We Make to Our Society?" He closed his message with a prayer and the service was dismissed.

## THIRD DAY, FRIDAY EVENING SESSION JUNE 13, 1969

Worship Hour. The worship service was led by James C. Stratton. The choir from First United Methodist Church, Corbin, directed by Mrs. Earl Barfield sang, "Onward Christian Soldiers" and William Ray Jennings led in prayer. Ted Nicholas led in singing "How Great Thou Art," Mrs. Robert Jones at the organ. Announcements were made by the chairman. He received an offering and gave the offertory prayer. Organ offertory was by Mrs. Robert Jones. The choir sang "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross." James Stratton introduced Dr. E. A. Smith, the inspirational speaker, who spoke on the story of Christ and the man at the pool of Bethesda. He preached on the wholeness of life and closed with a prayer. The choir gave a choral amen.

## FOURTH DAY, SATURDAY, MORNING SESSION JUNE 14, 1969

Devotions. Ted Nicholas led in singing "Onward Christian Soldiers" with John Tremaine at the organ. Fred Schilffarth led in prayer. "Faith of Our Fathers" was sung after which Fred Schilffarth read the scripture and spoke on the need of the church to be true to Christ and His teachings in a confusing age. Ted Nicholas led in singing "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord."

Committee on Journal. James C. Stratton reported that the minutes of yesterday's session were examined and found to be correct.

Announcements. The secretary made an emergency announcement.

Board of Missions. Bishop Short called for resumption of the Board of Missions report which was not completed at yesterday's session. He asked if the paper to be read by Paul Royster would be proposed as a substitute for the Board report. Paul Royster indicated that his paper would be a matter of information and not a substitute for the report of the Board, E. L. Tullis repeated his statement made at vesterday's session regarding the "Black Manifesto" presented before the meeting of the National Board of Economic Development meeting in Detroit and the confrontation of this group with the General Board of Missions in New York. The statement was given by E. L. Tullis with some additional detail. Paul Royster made a statement regarding his desire not to sit in judgment on the motives and character of the members of the Board of Missions. He was interrupted by E. L. Tullis who wished to correct the statement made by Paul Royster regarding the statement above made to the conference. Paul Royster read his prepared statement and moved the adoption of the paper as the position of the Kentucky Conference. Bishop Short ruled the motion out of order until the report of the Board of Missions has been disposed of. The report of the Board of Missions was adopted. (See Report No. 13.) Paul Royster then moved that the conference adopt his paper as a statement of the position of the conference. E. L. Tullis moved that Bishop Short speak to the issue. James Shepherd seconded the motion. The secretary took the vote and it was so ordered. Bishop Short spoke expressing agreement with much contained in the paper but admitted some misgivings as to some information and statements in the paper and to its singling out only the Board of Missions when other Boards and Agencies are directly involved in the matter. especially the Board of Social Concerns. Paul Royster made response as regards to his attitudes and relationship to the Board of Christian Social Concerns.

E. L. Tullis moved as a substitute for the Paul Royster paper that the Kentucky Conference through its secretary register the opinion of the Kentucky Conference to all Boards and Agencies of The United Methodist Church and the council of Bishops that we resist the pressures of groups presenting the "Black Manifesto" and reject its demands made upon The United Methodist Church, but that we continue to communicate and work in every way possible in the total mission of the church toward reconciliation with the Black Community. Comments were made by Dean Meadows, Louis Fields,

Paul Royster and two unidentified speakers. John O. Kemper moved an amendment to the Tullis motion that the Paul Royster paper be submitted to a committee, consisting of Paul Royster, E. L. Tullis and at least seven other members to study the paper and to report back to the conference with a clear report. This motion to refer to committee was put to a vote by Bishop Short and failed to carry. Paul Royster gave his reasons for favoring the motion of E. L. Tullis. Steadman Bagby requested further discussion on so important an issue. Bishop Short made further remarks followed by H. H. Greene who was applauded by the conference. Bishop Short expressed his appreciation for the work and influence of H. H. Greene in this area of church life. Harold W. Dorsey moved the previous question. Rue Wesley suggested a phrase be added to the Tullis motion and the phrase be "that we continue to communicate and work in every way possible in the total of the mission of the church towards Reconciliation with the Black Community." This was done. W. R. Gibson, Jr., suggested that a copy of the Black Manifesto be sent to all conference ministers and that they strive to be better informed of the issues involved. The vote was called and Horace Greene commented on the matter. Paul Royster made his closing remarks on the issue. Rev. Mrs. Pauline Graves made a plea for action rather than neglect on this issue. The E. L. Tullis motion was adopted.

Board of the Ministry. Donald Durham, chairman, presiding, made a statement in regard to the work of the Board of the Ministry, thanked the members of the Board for their support and as a point of personal privilege read a statement of belief prepared by one of the candidates for admission into the conference which the board felt represented the high caliber of young men presenting themselves for admission this year.

Question No. 27. "Who are admitted as Probationary Members?" The candidates were recommended by the Board of the Ministry. The report being read by Clyde David Burberry II. The candidates were called to the front of the auditorium by Bishop Short along with their pastors and they were admitted. C. N. White led in a prayer of consecration. (See Report No. 15.)

Question No. 26. "Who have been admitted as Associate Members?" Clyde David Burberry II, Registrar, gave the recommendation of the Board of Ministry. These men were called to the front, introduced by Bishop Short and they were admitted. (See Report No. 15.)

Question No. 30. "Who are admitted into full connection?" Clyde David Burberry II, read the recommendation of the Board of Ministry. Bishop Short asked the candidates to come to the platform, read to them diciplinary question, shook their hands as a symbol of the proper answers being given

on their part and they were admitted into full connection. (See Report No. 14.)

Question No. 31. "Who have been elected deacons?" Having been properly recommended by the Board of Ministry the candidates were elected to deacons orders by the vote of the conference. (See Report No. 14.)

Question No. 33. "Who Have Been Elected Elders?" Having been properly recommended by the Board of Ministry the candidates were elected to elders orders by the vote of the conference. (See Report No. 14.)

Question No. 29. "Who Are Discontinued as Probationary Members?" The recommendation for discontinuance by the Board of Ministry was accepted by vote of the conference. (See Report No. 14.)

Question No. 36. "Who are readmitted?" The recommendation of the Board of Ministry regarding the readmission of Francis P. Cook who located many years ago in the former Methodist Episcopal Conference; the Board had investigated and found there was nothing against his character. He has now passed the retirement age and would like for this to be done in order that his name might be on the record. He was re-admitted by the vote of the conference. (See Report No. 14.)

Question No. 22. "Who are eligible to be appointed as Lay Pastors?" The list recommended by the Board of Ministry was presented and was accepted by vote of the conference. (See Report No. 14.)

Question No. 45. "What Members in Full Connection Have Been Retired?" The five conference members recommended by the Board of Ministry were called to the platform by Bishop Short as well as all retired conference members present. Bishop Short asked each of those being retired to make what statement they desired to the conference and O. M. Simmerman, Sr., J. I. Meyer, Kenneth Dillion made brief statements. (See Report No. 14.)

The Committee on Conference Relations. Those recommended for retirement, supernumerary relations, disability and sabbatical leaves were presented to the conference by W. O. Patten for the committee on conference relations and the recommendations were approved by vote of the conference. (See Report No. 14.)

Left Without Appointment to Attend School. The members recommended by the Board of Ministry to be left without appointment to attend school were accepted for this relationship by vote of the conference. (See Report No. 14.)

Question No. 20. "Are All the Ministerial Members of the Conference Blameless in Their Life and Official Administration?" Bishop Short announced that the Board of Ministry had checked with each District Superintendent regarding the

character of the preachers in their districts and all were cleared except one. Donald Durham, member of the Committee on Investigations, reported the hearing on the case of J. H. Igleheart and reported that the committee receiving evidence has recommended that there be a trial. (See Report No. 14.) The character of all conference members was then passed with this one exception.

Announcement. Donald Durham announced that all those to be ordained should report to First Methodist Church by 8:20 Sunday morning.

Conference Trustees. O. M. Simmerman, Sr., chairman, moved that the report as printed in the report book be adopted and it was done. He then presented a recommendation regarding the former Episcopal residence in Louisville. He moved the passage of the recommendation and it was so ordered. He presented a recommendation prepared by the Louisville Conference regarding the taxation of certain church property, moved the adoption of the recommendation and it was adopted. (See Report No. 15.)

Board of Pensions. Harold Gardner called attention to the report of the Board in the report book and asked W. W. Garriott, secretary, to read the recommendations in the report. The report was adopted. Harold Gardner called the attention of the conference to the R. R. Rose fund, announced that a check for \$100.00 from R. R. Rose had been given bringing the fund to \$1,000.00 and he asked Brother Rose to come to the platform and present the check to the Bishop in person. R. R. Rose responded to the request and spoke briefly. (See Report No. 16.)

Ministers' Retirement Brotherhood. W. W. Garriott made the nominations of the Retirement Brotherhood, moved their adoption and acceptance of the report. The report with recommendations was accepted. (See Report No. 17.)

Vote to Continue Session. It was moved and seconded and passed that the present session continue until business is completed rather than have a afternoon session.

Credit Union. Adrian Roberts, Chairman, gave the Credit Union report and it was adopted. (See Report No. 18.)

Deaconess Board. A. W. Sweazy moved the adoption of the report as found in the report book and it was adopted. (See Report No. 19.)

Kentucky Council of Churches. A. W. Sweazy moved the adoption of the Kentucky Council of Churches report as found in the report book and it was adopted. (See Report No. 20.)

Ministerial Education. A. W. Sweazy moved the adoption of the report of the Ministerial Education Funds and it was adopted. (See Report No. 21.)

Treasurer's Report. Basil Hayden gave the Treasurer's report and it was received to be placed in the 1969 Kentucky Conference Journal. Mr. Hayden asked that permission be granted to place the auditor's report in the Journal when it is received and the request was granted. (See Financial Exhibit A.)

Board of the Laity. A proposal on a church-wide every member canvass was presented by C. R. Hager for the Board of the Laity. He moved the adoption of the proposal and it was done. Bishop Short announced that all three conferences in the area (Kentucky, Louisville, and Red Bird Mission Conferences) are participating in this effort described in the above proposal. (See Report No. 11.)

Hospital Campaign. R. R. Patton, chairman, made a supplementary report of the Hospital Campaign to be distributed by Basil Hayden on Sunday morning. (See Report No. 22.)

Board of Education. Robert Wallace, chairman, nominated Dr. John Tremaine as a member-at-large on the Board of Education. He was elected.

He then moved that the conference authorize the secretary of the conference to sign a statement of authorization permitting the charter of Union College as it relates to The Methodist Church to be changed to The United Methodist Church where the name, The Methodist Church, appears in that document. The trustees of the College and its legal counsel have pursued this change until our action is all that is necessary for the change to be effected.

Resolution on Calaski County Fellowship Center. Harold W. Dorsey, District Superintendent, presented a resolution on the purchase of property for the Calaski County Fellowship Center, moved its adoption and it was done. (See Resolution No. 1.)

Resolution on Wilmot Chapel. Harold W. Dorsey, district superintendent, presented a resolution regarding the Wilmot Chapel Property in the Danville District and the resolution was adopted. (See Resolution No. 2.)

Second Reading of Standing Rules. Harold W. Dorsey gave second reading of changes in the standing rules of the Kentucky Conference and they were approved. (See Report No. 23.)

Personal Privilege. John Q. Kemper presented a Kentucky Colonel Commission to Howard Coop for Governor Nunn.

Statistical Report. The report of the statistician was received to be filed with the secretary and included in the 1969 Journal of the Kentucky Conference. (See Report 24.)

Disposal of Church Property. Albert W. Sweazy presented a resolution for disposal of church property in Mt.

Sterling, Lexington District and the resolution was approved. (See Resolution No. 3.)

Committee on Entertainment. A. E. Atkinson, chairman, gave the recommendation of the committee that the conference be held at Eastern Kentucky University, June 10-14, 1970. The recommendation was accepted. (See Report No. 25.)

Transfers. Bishop Short read the list of those who have been transferred out of the conference and those who have been transferred in. (See Disciplinary Questions 38 and 39.)

Courtesies. W. A. E. Johnson introduced Dr. Roy Severin, representative of the Board of Missions for this area.

*Sympathy*. Bishop Short announced the death of the mother of Mrs. E. L. Tullis—Mrs. Tylene Talley—and the secretary was asked to send a note of sympathy to Mrs. Tullis.

Moving Day. Harold W. Dorsey moved that Thursday, June 19th be designated as moving day for the conference and it was so ordered.

Joint Distributing Committee. Harold Gardner moved the adoption of the report of the joint distributing committee as filed with the secretary and it was so ordered. (See Report No. 26.)

*Announcements*. Necessary announcements were made by the secretary and H. W. Dorsey.

Adjournment. R. R. Patton pronounced the benediction and the session was adjourned.

# FOURTH DAY, SATURDAY, EVENING SESSION JUNE 14, 1969

Youth Night. The service was planned and directed by the officers of the Kentucky Conference UMYF and their counselor. Cochran Dorsey, Danville Centenary, announced the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." Susie Collins, Ashland Trinity, led in prayer. The hymn "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord" was sung. The scripture was read by Carol Teaster, Covington Immanuel. ### REPORT No. 2 CHURCH AND COMMUNITY PLANNING

#### A New Department

By action of the 1968 sessions of the Louisville and Kentucky Conferences the Department of Church and Community Planning was created; a Director was appointed, an office secured and with guidelines drawn for the Director the department was launched.

It was understood from the beginning that much of the responsibility of the department would have to bee discovered as its work was developing. The guidelines lay down some specific areas of responsibility for the Director, but many more had to "come" as occasions allowed. Specifically the guidelines prescribe the work of the Director as follows:

- To work with the Bishop, the District Superintendents, and the City-Societies in Louisville and Covington-Newport in the development of effective programs for the churches of the inner-city.
- 2. To work with the Bishop and the District Superintendents of the Districts serving Appalachia in the further development of our program in Appalachia.
- During the first two years of merger to assist the various District Superintendents in helping build the churches and people of the former Tennessee-Kentucky Conference into the life of the new Louisville and Kentucky Conferences.
- 4. Official contact of the Bishop with all community centered projects in our Area which are already set up.
- 5. Relate to other community organizations that would seek our help.

#### Getting Started

The office was set in the Kentucky Conference Council Offices in Lexington. Since it was deemed that the Director should belong to the Kentucky Conference, and since Lexington was home; it was a natural that headquarters should have been there also. So it was.

Shortly after the creation of the office; in fact the first call for assistance was to the Seattle Memorial Church with Dr. James and Dr. Howard Matthews, D.S., to share a consultation of the formation of an Ecumenical Housing Corporation in which our Churches in Owensboro were to share. In this first sharing, realization came as to what could possibly be the scope of the activities of this department. Here the leader of our Area was represented, expressing the interest and concern of Kentucky United Methodism in what was happening in Owensboro, where our people were concerned and participating.

As we thus began certain procedural determinations had to be made in order that the work assigned would not become confused with what some might think as the responsibility of the office. Therefore it was announced in all early consultations that the Director was not a "policy maker" but rather an observer and consultant, attending all meetings where he was invited and where his presence was felt needed by the Bishop: to indicate administrative concern and interest and to lend some such "suggestive" assistance as the occasion might justify. Gradually the significance of the task became clear and the possibilities of the service to be rendered loomed large before us.

#### Movement Thru the Area

In a joint Cabinet meeting held early in the conference year Bishop Short suggested that there be held in each District, where Tennessee-Kentucky Churches had been received, "Get Acquainted Worship Services" where the people of the Districts could meet, get to know each other, share an hour of worship and fellowship. The District Superintendents were to preach, the Director was to preside. Beginning in the Owensboro District on July 21, such worship services were held:

In Lexington District, August 18

In Frankfort District, September 15

In Maysville District, September 22

In Louisville West District, October 6; Bishop Short attended and preached

In Hopkinsville District, October 27

On every occasion genuine fellowship was experienced and the feeling of "getting to know each other" was much in evidence.

Invitations to meet with and share meetings with ministers and District workers came from the: Frankfort; Louisville West; Ashland; Danville; Districts. To share Laymen's meetings: The Louisville Conference Laymen's Retreat at Camp Loucon; the Lexington District United Methodist Men; The Ashland District Laymen's Retreat.

Invitations to share Leadership Training Schools from the Campbellsville and Madisonville Districts.

Numerous invitations came from local churches for special meetings dealing with the ministry of the denomination in new areas of concern.

The privilege to conduct a four session School of Missions in Cynthiana sponsored by First Church, but shared by all our Churches and the Presbyterian Church. As a follow up to this school the projects committee has met and undertaken to implement some "new forms" of mission locally.

Many of our brothers have extended the privilege of their pulpits that the opportunity to preach to their people, and to meet them, might be afforded. On every such occasion the work of the department was presented; but emphasis was upon the hour of worship and the opportunity to preach to the congregations. It is impossible to relay the warmth and genuine spirit that has characterized these hours of worship.

## Consultations With Our Established Ministries

In some instances only one visit has been made; but in others several visits have been made and program development has been shared. Some visits have dealt merely with relating the intent of the department to lend a hand when and where needed; others have involved us in helping structure the ministry offered that the work desired to be done, might more effectively be promoted. Such visits and consultations include:

The Owensboro Housing Corporation

The Louisville East Ministry

The West Louisville Methodist Ministry

The Covington-Newport Ministry

The Harlan Area Ministry

The East Kentucky Ministry-Whitesburg

The Nathaniel Mission-Lexington

First Church-Henderson, Kindergarten

The Owen County Ministry—Owentown

The Adair County Ministry-Adair County

The Calaski Ministry-Danville District

Many insights as to our needs of leadership; training of leadership for these areas; structuring the work so that there is more involvement of laymen and the development of programs that will involve "the people" have come as the result of these consultations and visits. It is to be hoped that thru this department or by some other means, there might be developed a means of coordinating our ministries in these many sections of our Area, that some of the forementioned needs might be dealt with forthrightly. This will require the careful thinking and planning of all the Boards of our Conferences having to do with the funding and directing of these many ministries. The future holds many opportunities for significant contributions to the people we would serve; but more and more it is clear that there must be coordination of our work in the several areas of present interest and in others that need us. In some instances it will be necessary for us to join in ecumenical efforts; but this is as it should be lest there be a duplication of services. It is a part of our responsibility to relate to other groups who seek our

assistance. In two instances inquiries have been made seeking our financial assistance in programs that are Ecumenical in character. It is to be expected that yet others shall come as our work becomes better known.

#### Movements Outside the Area

These have been limited. Upon the assumption of the work, I was directed by Bishop Short to attend the sessions of the Bishop's Linkage Group. This group sponsored by The Division of National Missions meets at regularly scheduled intervals to seek ways of keeping lines of communication open with the Bishops. This has proven to be a most valuable opportunity for orientation concerning our work.

I attended a Conference on Cooperatives in Appalachia sponsored by C.O.R.A., The Commission on Religion in Appalachia. Here was a study of how The Church may provide leadership as people in this section of our country seek by their own efforts to improve their economic position.

It was a pleasure to have participated in the annual session of the Kentucky Missionary Conference at Red Bird.

I have been chosen as the regional Bishop's representative on the Board of Directors of C.O.R.A. This is an appointment to be cherished, for such membership represents the United Methodist Church; since the appointment was approved by the National Division.

#### The General Committee Is Structured

On March 4 members of each Conference who comprise the membership of our Committee on Church and Community Planning met in the Conference Room of The Methodist Building for the purposes of organization. With Bishop Short presiding, Rev. Rual Perkins was chosen Secretary. Bishop Short outlined the purposes of the meeting, a report was received from the Director and the business of the hour was under way. The General Committee assumed the responsibility for the promotion of all phases of the Quadrennial Program. In order to give this program proper emphasis and to provide means for larger publicity four committees were raised. They are:

Executive Committee, Bishop Short, Chairman

Promotion Committee, Dr. Ted Hightower, Chairman

Projects Committee, Dr. Rual Perkins, Chairman

Finance Committee, Mr. W. Taylor Seals, Chairman

To date the Promotion and the Projects Committees have met and have outlined their activities and have entered upon their tasks with zeal and dedicated concern. The folder prepared for distribution under the caption "Reconciliation" will carry all information concerning the propgram as it has to this date been carried on in our Area.

#### The New Year Challenges Us

With this year having shown us our task as we "have played it by the ear" we come to the beginnings of another year, sure of the way we should take, aware of the largeness of our responsibility, conscious of the needs of those to whom we would minister in the name of our Christ and deeply concerned for the limitations that beset us; we nevertheless dare to plan for that new year hoping that we can find ALL the strength needed for the tasks that call us.

We shall need the interest of the Boards concerned; The Cabinets of our conferences; the understanding of ministers who may be asked to serve in these needy areas of our state; the interest, money and in some cases the volunteer services of members in our more privileged sections to bring the healing ministry of "helpfulness" to many who stand a-waiting our coming.

Lend us your prayers as we labor together.

# REPORT No. 3

## COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

SECTION 1—We recommend that there be a conference-wide Every-Member-Visitation in November, 1969, as our churches launch into the new fiscal year policy already adopted by the annual conference.

SECTION 2—We recommend that the Annual Conference require each Board, Commission, Committee and Agency to send to the Interboard Council and the Conference

Commission on World Service and Finance an itemized report of their activities for the current year with their request for funds for the coming year, at last 45 days before the Annual Conference convenes. Failure to comply will result in request for funds not being recommended as the Discipline directs.

SECTION 3—We recommend that churches having a change in pastors pay the moving expense of the incoming pastor, and that the moving expense of incoming District Superintendents be paid out of the District Superintendents' Fund.

SECTION 4—We recommend that the Annual Conference require each District Superintendent to file an itemized list of the expenditurs of the District Promotional Fund with the Commission on World Service and Finance at least 45 days before the Annual Conference convenes. This fund shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

SECTION 5—We recommend that the Annual Conference approve the goal for Higher Education of 2.00 per member.

SECTION 6—We recommend that the fifth (5th) Sunday offering of the Sunday School be designated for the Methodist Home in Versailles, and that the "One Great Day" offering for the Building Fund of the Home be received on September 21, 1969.

SECTION 7—We recommend that in the future all financial campaigns be restricted to a maximum of three (3) years, and that they be closed at that period without extension

SECTION 8.—Again, we cite paragraph 916, page 250 of the 1968 edition of THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE of The United Methodist Church which states: "No annual Conference board or interest, such as a school, college, university, or hospital, shall make a special conference-wide appeal to the local churches for funds without the approval of the Annual Conference except in case of an extreme emergency, when such approval may be given by a two-thirds vote of the district superintendents and of the commission acting jointly."

It is the duty and responsibility of your Commission on World Service and finance to make a diligent effort to secure full information regarding all conference benevolences and service causes, that none may be neglected, jeopardized, or excluded. We feel that there have been cases in which unauthorized appeals have been made to the detriment of our annual conference programs. We believe that in some cases there is a misunderstanding as to the meaning of the term "Conference-wide" and henceforth shall define it as being any area beyond that over which the individual, board, or agency has direct control or supervision, such as pastors soliciting persons other than their own congregation, or agency, minister or layman making unauthorized appeals.

SECTION 9—We recommend the payment of eight (8) cents a mile by all boards for traveling expense.

SECTION 10—We recommend that on those charges which have not reflected an increase in pastor's salary in accord with the increase in living cost in recent years, that the District Superintendent urge the increasing of the pastor's salary at least 5% at the first Charge Conference; and that in those charges where the pastor's salary has been consistenly increased over the years, the District Superintendent is to encourage the continuance of the increase so as to reflect the increase in current cost of living

SECTION 11—In accordance with paragraph 910 of the Discipline, we recommend that each local church remit monthly to the conference treasurer all funds contributed for world service and conference benevolences.

SECTION 12—We recommend an apportionment across the Conference on the World Service Formula of \$11,500.00 for the HMEP (retired ministers and widows of the Conference).

SECTION 13—We recommend that the Program Council be allowed to borrow up to \$10,000.00 for operational expenses in any given year.

SECTION 14—After serious consideration of the suggestion by the Board of Social Concerns (V-2) that each church pay an amount equal to the employer's portion of Social Security Tax, we recommend that any church choosing to do so be required to include the amount in the base salary of the pastor and thus it be subject to percentage assessments.

# REPORT No. 4

#### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

#### No. 1

#### The United Methodist Church

The 1968 Uniting Conference of The United Methodist Church voted to recommend to the members of the Annual Conferences as a proposed amendment to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church, the following:

That Paragraph 12, Article I which reads as follows:

"The General Conference shall be composed of not less than 600 nor more than 1,000 delegates, one half of whom shall be ministers and one half lay members, to be elected by the Annual Conference."

be amended to read:

"Paragraph 12. Art. I. 1. The General Conference shall be composed of not less than 600 nor more than 1,000 delegates, one-half of whom shall be ministers and one-half lay members. 2. Delegates shall be elected by the Annual Conferences except that delegates may be elected by other autonomous Methodist churches if and when the General Conference shall approve concordats with such other autonomous Methodist Churches for the mutual election and seating of delegates in each other's highest legislative conferences. 3. In the case of The Methodist Church in Great Britain, mother church of Methodism, upon mutual approval of the concordat now pending, provision shall be made for the reciprocal election and seating of four delegates, two clergy and two lay."

#### No. 2

#### The United Methodist Church

The 1968 Uniting Conference of The United Methodist Church voted to recommend to the members of the Annual Conferences as a proposed amendment to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church, the following:

That Paragraph 36, Article I which now reads:

"The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the conference president of Women's Society of Christian Service, the conference president of United Methodist Men, and the conference lay leader. Each charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. The lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The United Methodist Church."

be amended by adding after the conference lay leader the words,

"and the president of the Conference Youth Organization" and by adding at the beginning of the last sentence the words, "except for the president of the Conference Youth Organization."

so that the Amended Paragraph 36, Article I will read:

"The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the conference president of Women's Society of Christian Service, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, and the president of the Conference Youth Organization. Each charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. Except for the president of the Conference Youth Organization, the lay members shall be at least twenty-one (21) years of age and shall have been for the four years next preceding their election members of one of the constituent churches forming this union, or of The United Methodist Church."

#### No. 3

#### The United Methodist Church

The 1968 Uniting Conference of The United Methodist Church voted to recommend to the members of the Annual Conferences as a proposed amendment to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church, the following:

That Paragraph No. 8 (Article II) and Paragraph No. 9. (Article III) which now reads:

"Paragraph No. 8. Art. II. There shall be Jurisdictional Conferences for the church in the United States of America and Canada, with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth; provided that in The United Methodist Church there shall be no jurisdictional or central conference based on any ground other than geographical and regional division."

"Paragraph No. 9. Art. III. There shall be Central Conferences for the church outside the United States of America and Canada, and if necessary Provisional Central Conferences, all with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth."

be amended by deleting the words "and Canada" and that the sixth section of Paragraph 42 (Article I) which now reads:

"Western-Washington, Idaho, Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Alaska, Hawaii, Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia."

be amended by deleting the words "Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, and British Columbia" and inserting the word "and" before Hawaii, so that the amended paragraphs will read:

"Paragraph 8. Art. II. There shall be Jurisdictional Conferences for the church in the United States of America, with such powers, duties, and privileges as are hereinafter set forth; provided that in The United Methodist Church there shall be no jurisdictional or central conference based on any ground other than geographical and regional division."

"Paragraph 9. Art. III. There shall be Central Conferences for the church outside the United States of America, and if necessary Provisional Central Conferences, all with such powers, duties, and privileges as ar hereinafter set forth."

"Western-Washington, Idaho, Oregon, California, Nevada, Utah, Arizona, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Alaska and Hawaii."

#### No. 4

#### The United Methodist Church

The 1968 Uniting Conference of The United Methodist Church voted to recommend to the members of the Annual Conferences as a proposed amendment to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church, the following:

That Paragraph 54 (Article V) which now reads:

"Paragraph 54. Art. V. The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected or to which they are transferred. Bishops may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision under the following conditions: (1) The transfer of bishops may be on either of two bases: (a) a jurisdiction which receives a bishop by transfer from another jurisdiction may transfer to that jurisdiction or to a third jurisdiction one of its own bishops eligible for transfer, so that the number transferred in by each jurisdiction shall be balanced by the numbered transferred out, or (b) a jurisdiction may receive a bishop from another jurisdiction and not transfer out a member of its own College of Bishops. (2) No bishop shall be transferred unless he shall have given his specific consent. (3) No bishop shall be eligible for transfer unless he shall have served one quadrennium in the jurisdiction which elected him to the episcopacy. (4) All such transfers shall require the approval by a majority vote of the members, present and voting, of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved after consideration by the Committees on Episcopacy. After the above procedures have been followed, the transferring bishop shall become a member of the receiving College of Bishops

"A bishop may be assigned by the Council of Bishops for presidential service or other temporary service in another jurisdiction than that which elected him, provided request is made by a majority of the bishops in the Jurisdiction of the proposed service.

and shall be subject to residential assignment by that Jurisdictional Conference.

"In the case of an emergency in any jurisdiction or Central Conference through the death or disability of a bishop or other cause, the Council of Bishops may assign a bishop from another jurisdiction or Central Conference to the work of the said jurisdiction or Central Conference with the consent of a majority of the bishops of that jurisdiction or Central Conference."

be amended by adding the following new sentence: "Nothing therein shall prevent the assignment by the Council of Bishops on a quadrennial basis of one bishop for full-time

secretarial responsibility in the Council of Bishops," so that the amended paragraph shall read:

"Paragraph 54. Art. V. The bishops shall have residential and presidential supervision in the Jurisdictional Conferences in which they are elected or to which they are transferred. Bishops may be transferred from one jurisdiction to another jurisdiction for presidential and residential supervision under the following conditions: (1) The transfer of bishops may be on either of two bases: (a) a jurisdiction which receives a bishop by transfer from another jurisdiction may transfer to that jurisdiction or to a third jurisdiction one of its own bishops eligible for transfer, so that the number transferred in by each jurisdiction shall be balanced by the numbered transferred out, or (b) a jurisdiction may receive a bishop from another jurisdiction and not transfer out a member of its own College of Bishops. (2) No bishop shall be transferred unless he shall have given his specific consent.

(3) No bishop shall be eligible for transfer unless he shall have served one quadrennium in the jurisdiction which elected him to the episcopacy. (4) All such transfers shall require the approval by a majority vote of the members, present and voting, of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved after consideration by the Committees on Episcopacy. After the above procedures have been followed, the transferring bishop shall become a member of the receiving College of Bishops and shall be subject to residential assignment by that Jurisdictional Conference.

"A bishop may be assigned by the Council of Bishops for presidential service or other temporary service in another jurisdiction than that which elected him, provided request is made by a majority of the bishops in the Jurisdiction of the proposed service.

"In the case of an emergency in any jurisdiction or Central Conference through the death or disability of a bishop or other cause, the Council of Bishops may assign a bishop from another jurisdiction or Central Conference to the work of the said jurisdiction or Central Conference with the consent of a majority of the bishops of that jurisdiction or Central Conference. Nothing herein shall prevent the assignment by the Council of Bishops on a quadrennial basis of one bishop for full-time secretarial responsibility in the Council of Bishops."

# REPORT No. 5 CONFERENCE PROGRAM COUNCIL

#### Foreword

The Program Council has spent the past year in study and evaluation of the new church structure. This has been a period of adjustment to new terminology, plus an effort to complete program organization. The directory will indicate the areas yet to be finalized. As the Council moves into a broader program relation to the Conference, optional committees will be constituted. Committees on research and planning, program co-ordination, as well as task forces will be formed as program needs demand.

The mission of the church is one mission with various components. The Council therefore provides the structure and methods for the Annual Conference to aid local churches—where the church is at work—to carry out the mission of the church. Hence, there must be a working relationship between the Program Council and the boards of the Annual Conference. The boards plan and promote their work in co-operation with the Council.

To provide a working knowledge of the Council perhaps it would prove helpful to list the functions as follows:

- 1. To study the mission of the Annual Conference and the local churches and determine program emphases which will assist the conference and local churches to perform their mission.
  - 2. To describe, co-ordinate, and organize opportunities to serve within the mission.
- 3. To receive program recommendations from local churches, the District and Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Program Councils to evaluate these recommendations, and to formulate a co-ordinated conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for consideration.
- 4. To provide for implementation and administration of the program adopted by the conference.
  - 5. To provide program resources.
  - 6. To provide staff personnel.

The reports and recommendations of the Annual Conference agencies contained herein are presented as the Council program to the Kentucky Annual Conference.

#### Report of the Council Director

Because of the uncertainties of the new structural changes in the church this has not been an easy year. However, in spite of the frustrations the council staff has endeavored to carry out its responsibilities to the best of their ability.

It is not the responsibility of the council staff to formulate programs. Programs should come from the grass roots and be initiated in the local church and submitted to the respective boards and through them passed on to the Program Council for co-ordination. The staff is to give assistance to the implementation of the conference program after it has been finalized by the Program Council and approved by the Annual Conference. This the council staff has endeavored to do the past year.

A workshop was conducted in each district to interpret the total conference program to local church leaders. A total of fifteen workshops on the new youth curriculum were held across the conference. Several workshops on the new structure of the local church were conducted. A very active and meaningful youth program was carried on. Many opportunities for leadership training were offered on the local, sub-district and district level by the council staff. An effective mission study conference was conducted in each district. These are but a few of our activities. Our efforts are reflected in the reports of the various boards as we have assisted them in implementing their program.

The director has attended many, many meetings of the boards and agencies of the council. He has spent eight weeks outside the conference attending meetings in which he had responsibility. The director and staff have visited a number of churches in each district on Sundays and made our services available to them. This has been very helpful and profitable, and this policy will be continued.

The work in the council office has greatly increased as the boards and agencies are using its services more and more. This is as it should be. It is a part of the function of our office to serve our conference. If we can serve in any way call on us as we are happiest when we are helping.

Shortly after conference the council staff will visit each district staff to discuss the conference program and how it can be implemented. Some time during the year workshops on how the new structure functions will be made available to each district that desires one.

I want to thank each one who has been understanding and co-operated with us in our endeavors. Our staff is a team and works as such and I want to express to each member of the staff my gratitude and appreciation for their loyalty and faithfulness.

### Report of Program Council Coordinator for Adult and Children's Ministries

Seven and one-half months on the staff of the Program Council of the Kentucky Conference of The United Methodist Church has been pleasant, challenging, and sometimes rewarding, and sometimes left one wondering.

Sessions with both adult and children's councils and the individual members of each have revealed both a desire to be of whatever help each can be to the local churches of their respective districts, at the same time find it difficult, almost impossible to get into the local church to help. It has been a learning time: learning one's responsibilities and the people with whom one is to work.

### Local Church Activities

In one capacity or another I have been in 30 local churches, 6 of these have been small open country, 10 small town or village churches, and 6 to attend meetings only. There are schedules set up with 4 other local churches before Annual Conference, and several dates for the summer and fall months. One of the more rewarding kinds of enterprise in a local church is that of the weekend type. In this experience, one age group, either the workers with children or adults, meets on Friday evening, the other on Saturday, and the commission(s) on Sunday afternoon. I am available on Saturday all day for personal conferences relative to a specific help sought. I have had three such weekend workshops, and have others scheduled.

#### District and Subdistrict and/or Cluster Activities

The district workshops were the follow-up of leadership training already set up on my arrival. Five of the districts had a one-day or one-half day training for three sections of the work: vacation church school workers, the key leaders of children's workers, and the classroom teacher, conducted on the district level. One district had three cluster groups, one of the middle and larger churches and two for the small churches. I conducted all three of the later, led the classroom section of each of the others, and was responsible for the coaching of the volunteer leaders in the other two. As a result of the above described training, there will be observation schools in each district during the fall of 1969 and the spring of 1970. It is hoped to have one if not two laboratory schools during 1970. The Covington District had an observation school in October of 1968, set up before I came, but I did arrive in time, at the very last minute, to teach in it as a substitute for a leader who had a death in the family. The outstanding experience in the district work has been in the cluster of small church workshops. They each concluded to plan a follow-up and/or to continue their helpseeking before leaving the session and those plans were made for late summer and early fall. There are others of this nature scheduled before Annual Conference.

Another workshop enterprise already set up will involve my participating in a vacation church school consisting of children, youth and adults, serving to train others by actual demonstration . . . this in the church and community parish setting. In another of these situations I am scheduled to train the leaders who will be doing the teaching.

### Board and Agencies Involvement

In this time of adjusting to the concept of agency and commission interaction, it has been my privilege to attend most of the meetings of them since my coming to the staff. It was my good fortune to present the study emphasis for children in one district mission workshop and am scheduled to do the same in the weekend school at Sue Bennett College on July 12 for the Conference. It has been good to have persons on the boards seek me out as a person to talk about the work, either with a definite goal in mind or to chat informally about it. I hope to become more involved in all programs as they unfold.

#### Elementary Camping

One week of elementary camping does not require a large staff, but it does require a staff. The director and I are working closely together in preparation for the experience, and have all but one counselor recruited in time for the training on May 16-17.

#### Interdenominational and Ecumenical Activities

It was my privilege to present to the class on religious education at the request of the professor at the Lexington Theological Seminary the program of Christian Education and nurture of The United Methodist Church. As a result of this visit, a graduate student devleoping her thesis in the form of a church school unit sought further help. She was writing a unit of study for her denomination for 9, 10, 11 year-olds on the topic of sex education. I was able to bring her our concept and materials regarding it.

A second thrust in this direction was to help a student in a library science course at the University of Kentucky learn of the United Methodist program of continuing adult education. She was a sister of the Catholic church, so I consider this a bit of ecumenicity.

I have received some information and materials I needed from the local agency for crippled children.

In April I attended a two-day workshop relative to weekday religious education.

#### Personal Enrichment and Preparation for the Work

It was a happy experience to be a guest visitor at the conference youth rally in January.

In November I attended the training for conference children's workers at Nashville, Tennessee as well as the executive committee of the National Section as we planned for the Conference in November of 1969.

Training received in a regional workshop regarding the new structure will be used in those planned for the districts.

# Report of the Program Council Coordinator for Youth Ministry

The Conference Youth Ministry established several programs during the Conference year in an attempt to meet the expressed needs of local churches.

Much effort was expended in introducing into the Conference the new youth curriculum. Between June and October 18 workshops were held in the conference in an attempt to familiarize youth leaders with the curriculum.

President's Assembly, Senior High Camp, five junior high camps and Youth Institute were carried on in attempt to furnish youth the opportunity for Christian personal enrichment and leadership training.

In addition to the above, other activities were established for the training of youth and youth workers. During September and October, youth council officers conducted eight workshops for the purpose of publicizing the conference youth ministry. Also, the conference youth minister participated in seven Program Council Workshops in an attempt to introduce helpful teaching aids. Also, the youth minister participated in observation schools in the Danville, Covington and Lexington Districts,

Other activities for youth have been a Conference-wide Youth Rally, January 11 and the Spring Seminar at Asbury College. In addition to the mentioned activities, the conference youth minister has assisted in the administration of Camp Aldersgate, and taught a laboratory school in Miami, Florida in January.

Several outstanding training opportunities were made available to the conference youth minister. They were as follows:

Laboratory School—Lake Junaluska, North Carolina Informal Group Coaching Conference—Nashville, Tennessee National Youth Convocation—Washington, D. C. New Church Structure—Nashville, Tennessee.

#### Report of Program Council Committees

# A. TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMUNICATION

In 1968 the Television, Radio and Film Commission was phased out reappearing as a Mandatory Committee of the Program Council, Rev. George Walker was elected chairman. Following his untimely death, your present chairman was asked to keep apprised of developments in structure, policy and program that would relate to this committee, and keep the conference program council informed. This was done in terms of attending two meetings in Atlanta and meeting with the program council. Subsequently, the program council elected him chairman of its committee on television, radio and film communication.

Since the 1968 Annual Conference, the recommendations of the former Television, Radio and Film Commission, as approved by the conference, were implemented effectively by the program council office.

Having made our way through the appropriate legislation and other relevant materials, we propose as follows:

- (1) Continuation of the Conference Audio-Visual Library, enlarging content and service as needs and funds allocated permit, with yearly membership rates as follows: charges paying minimum salary or less—\$5.00; charges paying \$5 to \$6,099 salary—\$7.50; charges paying \$7,000 and up—\$10.00. Non-member charges may get filmstrips, records, slide sets, etc. from the A-V Library for a \$1.00 rental fee and 16mm films for \$1.50 rental fee. Conference-sponsored boards and agencies may use the library resources without rental or membership fee. New memberships are always welcomed and the new catalogue is ready for distribution.
- (2) Recording of all sessions of the Annual Conference on tape for the use of the conference secretary, for historical record and to provide copies of any portion of the recording to parties desiring such, for a reasonable fee.
- (3) Revitalizing "Word and Music" radio programs with the workshop on August 26, 1969 at Centenary United Methodist Church, Lexington, for three pastors from each district, delegated to attend by their district superintendent, because they can and will use this means of extending their ministries. Those having "Word and Music" records and/or scripts are requested to return the same to the Program Council Office, if and when such are not being used, so they may be redistributed and thus kept in use as much as practical.

- (4) Helping local churches do a better job in public relations by conducting district public relations workshops, at the invitation of the District Superintendent, for the local church committee on public relations. (Par. 161.4—1968 Discipline), and/or persons responsible for such work in the local church. These workshops are designed to help pastors and lay people become aware of the image that their buildings, grounds, signs, bulletins, newsletters, etc. project, and learn what they can do to improve this image;
- (5) Some experimental work in writing and/or recording for paid radio broadcast, materials designed to promote United Methodism in Kentucky, and in developing closed circuit television and educational television as a means to better religious education in the local church;
- (6) Encouraging interested young ministers to attend training experiences that will help them prepare to use modern, highly sophisticated techniques of communication in directing the attention of the man in the pew to the man on the Cross. This encouragement will be mediated in terms of information concerning such training experiences and some financial assistance toward attending one.

Television, radio and film as media for communication, are rising in popularity daily. The serious communicator of the gospel must take these media seriously or he will not be taken seriously, and worse than that, for many thousands his message will not be heard at all! Our committee intends to to help United Methodism in the Kentucky Conference to take these media seriously and develop effective ways of communicating the gospel through them.

# B. COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

The members of the Publishing Interests Committee wish to encourage the churches of the Kentucky Conference to put emphasis in three main areas this year.

1. "Together" Magazine; 2. United Methodist Literature; 3. Church Libraries.

#### "Together" Magazine

Although there has been some over-all increase in the number of "Together" subscriptions, due to the Methodist and the Evangelical United Brethren Churches uniting, the ratio of the number of subscribers to the membership of the church continues to fall. In our own Kentucky Conference there has been a steady decline in the number of "Together" subscriptions since 1965. The statistics are as follows:

1965—4,558 subscriptions 1966—4,218 subscriptions 1967—3,738 subscriptions

1968-3,733 subscriptions

Every district in our conference, with the exception of one, has less "Together" subscriptions in 1969 than they had in 1968. These statistics are as follows:

With all these facts in mind, the people of the publishing house feel that Methodism needs a special church wide "Together" emphasis all across the country. This program has been endorsed by the Council of Bishops. The dates set for this are September 28 through November 2, 1969. A packet of materials will be sent to every pastor with complete information and instructions as to how "Together" should be emphasized during this month. The Publishing Interests committee encourages all churches to give their complete support to this "Together" emphasis month, using the plan suggested in the packet.

We further suggest and recommend that all churches set up their subscriptions so that they will begin during the month of October. This would make it easier to get an accurate count of the number of subscriptions in the conference; it would make less work on the local church, as they would only have to work with the subscriptions once a year. Every year in July, the "Together" office sends each church an audit of their subscribers and their expiration dates. This would be an ideal time to set up your renewals to begin in the month of October. You would have each person pay 25 cents (or the church would pay 25 cents) per month from their current expiration month to October. Then renew their subscription for one year. Anyone subscribing after the October "Renewal" month list had been sent in, would pay 25 cents per month for each month until the next "Renewal" month. "Together" will supply each church with an order reference card to help you easily see the amount that should be paid for each subscription until the "Renewal" month of October.

# United Methodist Church Literature

This committee urges all pastors and churches to know and use the Methodist Literature. The Publishing House makes special effort to produce literature that is suitable and useable for large and small churches, with various kinds of emphasis. Any pastor may write Cokesbury in Nashville requesting one copy of each piece of literature, stating that his church does not use Methodist Literature, and these will be sent free of charge for study by Church School leaders and teachers. Also, if any district is interested in having a representative from Cokesbury come and present the curriculum of the Methodist literature, explaining the goals and ideals behind it, this can be arranged through the Kentucky Conference Chairman of Publishing Interests.

#### Church Libraries

This committee recommends that every church establish a library within the next three years. John Wesley emphasized the importance of the ministry of the printed word and never was it more needed than today. Christians of today must be well-informed in this age of knowledge. Cokesbury will send any interested church all the necessary information needed to establish a library. Cokesbury also gives a 20% discount on all books purchased for a church library. One excellent way of getting a library started or in helping people to get interested in religious books is through a book fair. Cokesbury will send the necessary books for the fair on consignment and they will even give churches an outline as to how to hold a successful book fair. Church libraries are a must in our day and time.

# GENERAL INFORMATION CONCERNING THE PUBLISHING INTERESTS—CHURCH-WIDE

Union of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church in April, 1968, and the subsequent combining of operations and personnel of the publishing interests of the two former churches has brought our Methodist Publishing House to a new day of increased service to eleven million United Methodists.

The Publishing House is able to report that General Conference directives with respect to personnel have been met and that the transition to a revised organizational structure is progressing smoothly, enhancing the House's ability to provide good service to churches, individuals, and agencies of United Methodism.

The General Board of Publication, at its annual meeting in October, 1968, appropriated from the proceeds of the publishing operations of the two former churches \$1 million to be distributed to conference claimants during the 1968-69 conference year.

Production and distribution of books and church supplies under the Abingdon Press imprint showed an increase during the year. The Methodist Hymnal, published in 1966, continues to be well received by the church, with distribution now in excess of 4 million copies.

In spite of general downward trend in church school enrollment and attendance, circulation of church school curriculum materials, published under the imprint of Graded Press, showed an increase. Since 1964 and the introduction of preferred audio-visuals and multi-media class teaching packets, Graded Press has produced more than 103 audio-visual projects accounting for distribution of 800,000 records and 1,100,000 feet of film, primarily in the form of filmstrips.

A completely new curriculum for youth was introduced in United Methodist church schools in fall, 1968. Work is progressing on the second series of materials for adults, scheduled for use in church schools in fall, 1969.

Circulation of the general church periodicals, Together and Christian Advocate, experienced further decline. Merger of Church and Home, general publication of the former EUB Church, with Together, however, now gives The United Methodist Church a family magazine with a circulation of more than 600,000 copies every month,

Other highlights of the year's activity include the following:

Nine Abingdon titles were major book club selections during the year; 110 new titles were published.

Circulation of Abingdon Weekly Church Bulletins averaged 1,637,031 per Sunday. A new Cokesbury Bookstore was opened to the public in Houston, Texas, on May 13, 1969; the Boston Cokesbury Store was relocated to provide better service to the metropolitan area.

# REPORT NO. 6 CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Your Board of Christian Social Concerns has done what it could during this transitional year to perfect its organization, prepare leadership, study and select issues, and give some direction to foster action and education programs in the churches.

Our leaders participated in the District Workshops for the training of local church personnel.

We sent representatives to the Regional Conference on Christian Social Concerns at Lake Junaluska; and to the National Conference (Convo '69); and the Action Conference on National Priorities in Washington, D. C.

Like most structures or institutions in a changing world, one major function of the board has been that of struggling with the board's organization, but beyond that, with the purpose of the board itself. Do we issue statements, organize movements, make materials available, or just what? Not only have we had to make this struggle on the board level and an individual level, we have also had difficulty ascertaining our responsibility and relationship to the conference, particularly in programs which relate directly to our assumed concerns; (1) the area office of Church and Community Planning, (2) the Bishop's Fund of Reconciliation, and (3) the formation of inner city programs. Even now we are struggling with our place and purpose.

#### Proposal for 1969-1970 Program:

- 1. Establish at least the rudiments of a Dangerous Drug Information Service through the facilities of the Program Council. This would initially consist of the distribution of materials for action programs to churches and student leaders, scheduling of presentations by personnel of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, or leadership obtained by this Board; special emphasis in and through the church to develop an awareness of the magnitude of the problem, and to initiate a constructive educational and rehabilitative ministry to persons threatened by drug abuse.
- 2. Conduct a *Peace Seminar* for interested participants from the lay body and the clergy to be held at the Church Center for the United Nations in New York, on July 15-17, 1969. Arrangements are not completed and promotional materials are presently available to acquaint our people with the program. This venture is intended to be financially self-sustaining.
- 3. A Conference Convocation on Christian Social Concerns is requested for Saturday, May 9, 1970. This is to be an inclusive program to involve the conference. The format will include presentations by knowledgeable leaders of government and our General Board of Christian Social Concerns, with afternoon dialogue and confrontation on various group levels. The place is tentatively set for Kentucky State College, Frankfort.
- 4. The Board requests the opportunity to participate in the District Workshops again this year, with a special request for the Superintendents to allow and encourage the participation of the pastors in the Christian Social Concern segment. Work Area Chairmen will also receive special briefing.
- 5. This Board is involved in negotiations with the Louisville Conference Board relative to conducting a Legislative Seminar just prior, or immediately following the commencement of the 1970 session of the Kentucky General Assembly.

This Board seeks the election to membership hereon and places in nomination the following person in accordance with the provision of Par. 1004 of The 1968 Book of Discipline: Dr. Frank Bean.

Furthermore, we request nominees from the Conference U.M.Y.F., and the Department of Campus Ministry to provide representation and liaison as prescribed in Par. 1004, The Book of Discipline.

We urge the District Directors to meet with and organize the local work area chairmen into a workable task force as soon as is practicable.

Your Board of Christian Social Concerns is sensitive to its limited ability to pursue effectively many of the commanding issues which require concentrated and persistent attention. We must, therefore, urge upon our local church leadership that they act as initiators in developing positive action and education programs relating to local and national issues. In this endeavor, this Board pledges to give as much guidance and encouragement as its resources permit.

#### I. General Welfare

#### 1. Law, Justice and Human Relations

Every American has the right to equal protection under the law; and shares in the responsibility for the preservation of an orderly society, justly governed by legally constituted authority.

The legislative process must be enhanced by the willing participation of Christian persons in the electoral process, and in the administration of justice. Legal enactments must support the goal of equality of opportunity and the freedom of conscience integral to human values. It is apparent that citizen participation in the affairs of government on every level remains sub-standard commensurate with the demands of a democratic society, therefore, we seek to encourage all United Methodists to become informed and to register their opinions to the elected representatives in government. Perhaps no more urgent need exists in practicing Christian citizenship than to actively participate in the election process to the end that best qualified candidates are offered to the voters for whom we have assumed responsibility for both their election and performance in office.

#### 2. Alcohol and Drug Issues

With 64% of the national population using alcohol as a beverage (75% of college students say they drink) resulting in a situation tantamount to a national mania for alcohol; producing addiction, and a \$4 billion annual on-the-job hangover to business and industry; and next-to-nothing being done in prevention and rehabilitation (this in view of the phenomenal success rate of the few existing programs); and with a potential per annum dollar savings of an estimated billion dollars, plus release from suffering for many caught in the throes of alcohol addiction; the church must react constructively to meet a sinister menace and growing challenge. The church has both an obligation and an opportunity to develop sources of alcohol information, and to institute rehabilitation programs. To this end, an effort should be made to render this needed service in cooperation with existing agencies serving this need.

In our pill-oriented society, conditioned to finding happiness through chemistry, a crash program is needed to disseminate knowledge of dangerous drugs that would focus not only on youth but the adult population as well. Drug dependency results not alone from youth experimentation with hallucinagens and narcotics for thrills, but also from adults consuming stimulants, sedatives, appetite suppressants, tranquilizers, etc., in an effort to meet the demands and pressures of modern life.

This Conference is urged to consider the establishment of drug information service through its Program Council in cooperation with the Board of Christian Social Concerns, and sufficiently fund same to provide a concentrated, intensive, and continuing program of information and rehabilitation.

#### 3. Public, Health and Human Development

World population is growing at the rate of 8,000 per hour. In less than a generation 7.5 billion persons will inhabit our planet. At present an estimated 3.5 million are starving to death annually; i.e. 10,000 every day. The crisis is now! What is being done? Next to nothing!

It is time to move upon various levels of government to undertake national and local programs of family planning. It is time for the church to enter the field in a realistic way. It is time for the U. S. Government and the U. N. to move upon the world population centers where the present crisis is more acute to pursue birth control research and family planning on a very large scale. The time is now!

This Board affirms a program of adequate income for all citizens and of increasing welfare benefits for those unable either to work or to find jobs.

# II. Human Relations

Violence is not a viable means of settling human disputes, either between racial and ethnic groups, labor-management interests, or nations. We stand for the right of negotiation and demonstration, but within the context of public order and mutual respect for basic personal and social values.

United Methodism has declared itself to be an inclusive fellowship no longer hampered by social or racial distinction. We have officially declared our zeal for the creation of a spiritual entity which may, in fact, exemplify the body of Christ. Regretfully, however, we cannot truthfully boast of having more than partially achieved our aim. We are legally and organically inclusive but practically and attitudinally segregated and separated. We now call for a basic shift in the mind-set of our separate congregations and all racial ingredients of the church to uproot prejudice, paternalism, and militancy, thus purging ourselves of all that is divisive and unlovely, that we may enjoy the blessings and fruits of our inherent oneness as subjects of our common Lord. "Let the church that would move the world first move itself!"

We support our contention in this regard by urging upon all responsible parties the rigid pursuit of:

- a. free and open housing
- b. employment practices based on ability
- c. the use of police power with equity and restraint
- d. the right of citizen dissent expressed in an orderly and peaceful manner.

The Board recommends that church groups promote racial and social interaction within the community by sponsoring opportunity for fellowship, discussion and joint action projects.

#### III. World Peace

We still believe the U.S. should strengthen its position with regard to full support for the U.N. as an international bargaining agency, and that this support should include noticeable restraint in initiating unilateral military action at any time, excepting an overt threat to our own security. Furthermore, we support a more vigorous U.S. policy in the U.N. to channel food and supplies through its international service agencies to critical areas, such as Biafra.

We encourage United Methodists to become as fully informed as possible about the proposed A.B.M. missile system and to express their views to members of congress urging them to actively pursue a program of arms reduction to reduce world tension, promote peace, and channel more of the resources of government toward the reduction of poverty and its accompanying misery; and the alleviation of the national, social, and economic crisis by increased federal expenditures for internal development; and of increasing foreign aid to underdeveloped countries with no political strings attached.

We believe the U.S. should move with dispatch to achieve a negotiated settlement in Viet Nam. The present stalemate must be broken by initiative and creative effort to produce a just solution and a lasting peace.

We affirm the stated position of The United Methodist Church with regard to conscientious objectors.

# Recommendations for Basic Program

It is requested by this Board that the Annual Conference give support to the following programs:

- Peace Seminar, Church Center for the U.N., July 15-17, 1969—to be financially self-sustaining and to be promoted and conducted under the auspices of the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns.
- That the Board of Christian Social Concerns be given the option to participate in the next series of District Workshops.
- 3. That a Conference Convocation on Christian Social Concerns be authorized for the spring of 1970, to be held at a place designated by the Board of Christian Social Concerns, with possible implementation on a District Basis with Rallies, etc.

The Churches are encouraged to observe the following special events that opportunity may be given for a creative approach to the ministry of reconciliation:

CHURCH AND ECONOMIC LIFE WEEK—third week in January RACE RELATIONS SUNDAY—second Sunday in February RURAL LIFE SUNDAY—second Sunday in May

LABOR SUNDAY—Sunday preceding Labor Day

UNITED NATIONS WEEK AND WORLD ORDER SUNDAY—Sunday preceding United Nations Day, October 24th.

# REPORT No. 7 EDUCATION

The Board of Education is trying to face all the questions put to the church today. We know we do not have all the answers. But at least we are concerned that we do more than present a neat "program." What we have done in the past was excellent but it is not good enough for the future since we are becoming less effective in reaching people with the teaching of the Christian faith.

There are three areas the Board of Education has considered seriously, and will continue to study:

- I. Conference Public Relations. In this area we are addressing ourselves to the task of discovering how we can convince the people of our conference that we want really to meet their needs, that we want really to help them. We want to know how we can sell the goals of Christian education to ministers, to churches, and to ourselves. How best do we relate to other agencies?
- II. New Church. In this area we are asking two questions. First, Where and how does the Conference Board of Education relate to the local church in motivating the local church to self-examination that will help it to understand its mission? Second, How do we make ourselves available to a church that is serious about its mission and is seeking help in education?
- III. Specific Goals. The Board of Education also is dealing with pragmatic values and problems. An excellent study of specific goals and projects is under way all of the time. In the year past we have set certain recommendations and aims for ourselves. From meeting to meeting we will be evaluating our progress and adjusting our vision.

Here are the goals and recommendations we considered worthy of our time and judgment:

Regarding Conference Public Relations, we shall explore the possibility of preparing a quality filmstrip depicting the work of the conference Board and the task of Christian education, the filmstrip to be made available to district superintendents for pastors' meetings and local church use.

Regarding a New Church, our aims are:

- 1. Establish a more direct contact with the local church and make more services available to the local church. We believe that the personalized (local church) approach is important.
- 2. Establish more effective contact with persons who have specific responsibility in the local church, rather than channeling all correspondence through the local pastor. Persons responsible in all areas of the church mission should be on the mailing list.
  - Utilize age-level co-ordinators.
- 4. Provide the leadership of "select" people on our district staffs, not merely persons who are willing to "take" a position.
- 5. Support the use of "task groups" who will perform specific jobs and then disband. Heretofore we have relied almost exclusively on permanent committees.
- 6. Provide more flexibility in programming and in presenting the program of the church. Each local church situation is different. Since churches in specific areas of a given district may have similar situations, it may therefore be advisable for sub-district meetings to be called in those areas, to deal with common problems and opportunities.
- 7. Make available, through this Board, a tool (questionnaire) to assist local churches in planning their ministry in education, with the hope that this will be expanded to other work areas.

Regarding Specific Goals, these are our areas of concern:

- 1. Help Christian educators at all levels determine what type of individual they are trying to produce through the program of Christian education. For example, the Christian-educated person must be able to apply his faith and knowledge to 20th-century problems such as those addressed by the Fund for Reconciliation. Likewise, his education must prepare him for service in the total ministry of the church (not just "education" but "missions," "social concerns," etc.).
  - 2. Leadership Training.
    - (a) Re-evaluation of recruitment and training of leaders, workers, administrators, at all levels, with special attention to:
      - providing observation and demonstration schools as accessible to local churches as possible.
      - (2) providing laboratory schools.
      - (3) re-evaluation of current approach to district staffs . . . we have neglected providing job analyses and job training.
      - (4) including potential, as well as active, teachers and leaders in training programs.
      - (5) providing adequate training for local church family coordinators as well as age-level coordinators.
    - (b) Initiate programming that will encourage local churches to raise the level of standards for their church school workers.
    - (c) Initiate programming that will encourage local churches to seek more male teachers, especially in children's classes.
  - 3. Conference Personnel.
    - (a) Seek to employ two additional staff members in the Program Council office, bringing the total to four "specialists" (the three age levels and family life)
    - (b) Provide an adult resident program director for Aldersgate Camp.
    - (c) Initiate an annual meeting for all professional local-church Christian educators in the conference (similar to the annual training and fellowship meeting made available to local church musicians).
  - 4. Winterize the lodge at Aldersgate Camp; build and winterize a dormitory facility.
  - 5. Settings for Christian nurture:
    - (a) Begin new outpost church schools across the conference.
    - (b) Institute new programming that will reach young adults, especially unmarrieds, at all levels.
    - (c) Explore programs that would enlarge VCS to include total family participation.
    - (d) Encourage local churches to begin "depth-study groups" in their total education program.
    - (e) Seek to aid local churches in providing improved continuous training of preparatory members up to and including membership training classes.
    - (f) New approaches of Christian nurture for persons of special needs.
    - (g) Greater home visitation programs in the local church.
  - 6. Youth Emphases:
    - (a) More funds for conference and district programming. Also budgets for summer agencies.
    - (b) Encourage churches to emphasize youth participation in the planning and carrying out of local church ministries.
    - (c) Use Conference youth officers more frequently on district and local church levels.
    - (d) Seek to solve the problem of providing counselors for summer youth agencies, especially the need for more women counselors.
    - (e) Prepare youth who attend summer agencies for more effective practical application of what they learn when they return to home churches.
    - (f) Institute methods of taking program and inspiration of summer youth agencies to youth who do not or cannot attend (for example, the weekend agencies at appropriate times of the year).
    - (g) See that camp information is put into the hands of parents of junior highs and elementary children.
  - 7. Student Work:
    - (a) Better dispensation of information to local churches about campus ministries on both church-college and state campuses.

- (b) Explore and begin program ideas for reaching students enrolled in community colleges.
- 8. Miscellaneous:
  - (a) Improve lines of communication between conference level, district level and local church, encouraging pastors to read and distribute information which they receive to proper leaders in local churches.
  - (b) Encourage keeping accurate records in local churches, especially as regards addresses and age levels.
- (c) Encourage the use of United Methodist curriculum materials in all churches. The following reports outline efforts made in Christian education this past year.

#### Children's Work

Direction of the leaders who work with children was given from May by the executive director of the Program Council, Dr. Frank King, and the chairman of the children's council, Mrs. Maurice Mitchell. In September another member was added to the staff in the person of Miss Myrtle C. Standiford, who assumed her responsibilities for the work with both the children's and the adult leaders.

The thrust of the work with children's leaders this conference year was in the direction of district workshops. Sections were arranged for the workers of the Vacation Church School; the co-ordinators of children's ministries in the local church; and for the regular church school teachers. One district substituted three cluster group meetings, two for those involved in the small church, and one for the middle and/or larger-sized church for the above described specifically sectioned workshops. These were held during March and April under the direction of the district co-ordinator and the district superintendent. Over 200 persons took part in six districts. The staff director and several volunteers manned these workshops. A coaching conference for the workers was held in February led by Reverend Nelson Bunnage of the Southern Indiana Conference staff and the conference director. As the children's council moves through such a training enterprise, it is attempting to develop additional indigenous leadership.

One observation-laboratory school was held in October in the Covington District with 45 persons attending. This school was staffed by the following personnel: Younger children, Mrs. Jack Hickman; Elementary 1-2, Mrs. William Stratton; Elementary 3-4, Miss Myrtle C. Standiford; Elementary 5-6, Mrs. Donald Dobson; and Youth, Reverend Roger Collins.

It is planned to have at least two of these schools in each district during the fall of 1969 and the spring of 1970, with emphasis on the small church in one of each of these two. Hope is still maintained that the local church will make its needs known so that leadership training may be provided for its personnel as it sees its own particular situation.

It is also planned to have two laboratory schools within the bounds of the Conference during the 1970 year.

One week of camping for elementary boys and girls was held in the summer of 1968, and one is planned for the summer of 1969.

Several workers plan to attend classes at Lake Junaluska again this summer. Mrs. Maurice Mitchell and Mrs. Ronald Masters will be in the seminar for specific age groups which means they will be becoming certified as instructors in laboratory schools. This will bring our number of conference certified personnel to five in the area of children's work, one for each age group.

There was a total of 167 Vacation Church Schools reported for the year of 1968. This provided experiences for some 7,589 boys and girls and involved 2,452 workers. Adding the youth and adults involved we find a total of 12,641 in this additional learning. More schools are moving to the evening sessions, thus making participation for the entire family possible.

It is sincerely hoped that as we move into THE NEW CHURCH, the work with the leaders of children will truly be co-ordination of children's ministries, thus including all aspects of the child's life and his Christian nurture.

### Youth Work

The Conference Youth Ministry established several programs during the conference year in an attempt to meet the expressed needs of local churches.

Much effort was expended in introducing into the conference the new youth curriculum. Between June and October, eighteen workshops were held in the conference in an attempt to familiarize youth leaders with the curriculum.

Presidents' Assembly, Senior High Camp, five junior high camps and Youth Institute were carried on in an attempt to furnish you the opportunity for personal Christian enrichment and leadership training.

In addition to the above, other activities were established for the training of youth and youth workers. During September and October, Youth Council officers conducted eight workshops for the purpose of publicizing the conference youth ministry. The conference youth minister participated in seven Program Council Workshops in an attempt to introduce helpful teaching aids. Also the youth minister participated in observation schools in the Danville, Covington, and Lexington Districts.

Other activities for youth have been a conference-wide Youth Rally on January 11 and a Spring Seminar at Asbury College in April. In addition to the mentioned activities, the conference youth minister has assisted in the administration of Camp Aldersgate and taught a laboratory school in Miami. Florida. in January.

Several outstanding training opportunities were made available to the conference youth minister:

Laboratory School—Lake Junaluska, North Carolina Informal Group Coaching Conference—Nashville, Tennessee National Youth Convocation—Washington, D. C. New Church Structure—Nashville, Tennessee

#### Adult Work

Beginning the year with five new district co-ordinators, as well as a new chairman, and no Program Council staff person directly responsible for work with the adult leaders until September, the adult work for the first months was mostly that of determining the task and opportunities before us.

The energy of the council of adult workers will be directed toward a consultive role. This means that requests from the local church for help in taking a look at its adult program are sought and welcomed. In the NEW CHURCH this means a broader view than previously indicated and should include a look at the work of the co-ordinator of adult ministries in the new structure.

While continuing to give guidance in the area of study opportunities for adult groups in various settings, the new aspect of adult work for the coming year is that of the new series of study helps available. These twelve units are known as the Christian Faith in Life Series and begin with the fall of 1969. The title of the first unit is Death in Christian Perspective. This is the second part of the new curriculum for adults and promises to be of vital importance to the adults of our churches, and a fine plan of shared leadership. No workshop for its consideration is planned, but the local church should feel free to call upon the adult co-ordinators indicated above to assist them as they plan for its use.

Inasmuch as these persons are busy pastors and laymen, it is hoped that a number of other persons in each district will be available to assist in this consultive role concerning adult work. Workshops led by these persons near home base could be a very real help to the local churches.

The co-ordination of all boards and agencies will be a major part of the emphasis of all adult work in the future. In order to facilitate this co-ordination, Miss Myrtle C. Standiford, Program Council Staff person responsible for chtildren and adult work, is involved in their meetings and plannings for the coming year. In turn she brings to the council of adult workers relationships of their work to that of the other boards and agencies.

#### Camp Committee

This past year, we had 606 campers using the facilities of Aldersgate Camp. We feel that this is a good number but not enough. We have enough money invested in our camp to warrent more use of the facilities which are available.

Most of the work that has been done this past year has been in the form of maintenance and keeping the property in good condition for the summer program.

The Camp Committee wishes to express their thanks to Rev. Roger Collins of the Interboard staff for his work in the camping program and in overseeing the care of the property.

The Camp Committee wishes to express appreciation to the Conference youth for a gift of \$400.00 to be used in "landscaping" some of the grounds. Such response by our youth is rewarding to anyone who is concerned with our youth.

We wish to urge all churches in the Kentucky Annual Conference to continue their support financially of Aldersgate Camp. The present debt is \$71,250.00. That means that we have paid only \$5,000.00 on the principal this past year. The balance of receipts from the churches was used to pay the interest and general maintenance work.

#### Higher Education

The responsibility for maintaining and promoting Methodism's institutions for higher education has never been more precarious or demanding. In an area where competition for the student is intense and costs imposed upon the student by the private college naturally exceeds the demands of the tax-supported school, we can no longer look placidly at our institutions as thought they will somehow be miraculously sustained. If we are to continue in the higher education business we must pay for it. Our inability to make the \$2.00 per member support a mandatory assessment places the burden upon each layman and minister to adequately inform the people just what is at stake if we do not rally to the urgent calls of our college administrations for help. At no point in recent history has the college situation been as tenuous as now. College riots and protests are bringing into focus one valid concern, that our administrations must be involved in student life, not just fund-raisers spread over the globe. Some great things are happening at Union, Kentucky Wesleyan and Lindsey Wilson Colleges. Union is involved in a four-college exchange attempting to inform students of the sociological and societal differences in geography. New ideas and concepts can result from this interplay. Kentucky Wesleyan students have assumed as their goal the building of a much-needed new library and national publicity has dramatically articulated how fine a "positive protest for building" can be received by the public. Lindsey Wilson continues to send a very high percentage of young people to colleges for bachelor degrees, many graduating with honors.

These institutions need, and must have, our support. The Quadrennial emphasis as recommended by the General Conference and our own Committee are no longer options. They must now be mandatory:

- That our conference endorse the goal of higher education support at the rate of \$2.00 per member. Each district is to be assigned a percentage of this goal on the same basis of assignment to the districts as is used in the World Service formula for such apportionments.
- 2. That district superintendents, pastors, laymen continue to offer leadership, information and inspiration concerning the actions of our conference in the area of higher education.
- That strict adherence be given to the requirement that each pastor supply the district superintendent the names of the high school juniors and seniors in their churches.

- 4. That every Methodist in the Kentucky Annual Conference be informed of the significance of the Race Relations Sunday Offering.
- 5. That every church observe Methodist Student Day and Student Recognition Sunday.

#### Recommendations

We recommend once again these special days and special causes:

Methodist Student Day, second Sunday in June, at which time the Methodist Student Loan Program be emphasized.

Christian Education Week, beginning the last Sunday in September, at which time there will be a special thrust for Christian education.

Student Recognition Sunday, last Sunday in December, for recognition of local church students in institutions of higher learning, and for emphasis on the work of the church college and of Wesley Foundations.

National Family Week, beginning the first Sunday in May, for pointed emphasis on Family Life.

The fourth Sunday church school offering be applied on World Service.

The fifth Sunday church school offering be sent to The Methodist Home, Versailles.

The Race Relations Day offering be directed to Paine College, Atlanta, Georgia.

The church school Rally Day asking of \$2,500 be included in the Roll Call.

That our Kentucky Annual Conference churches accept the challenge of raising the General Conference goal of \$2 per member for higher education (\$1.50 for our colleges and 50 cents per member for our Wesley Foundations).

That the apportionment for Aldersgate Methodist Camp be \$20,000.

That the Camp Committee continue the plan of development, operation, and expansion as provided in the master plan as time, needs, and funds dictate.

That the administrative policies and programming of Aldersgate Camp be under the direction and control of the Camp Committee with the approval of the Board of Education.

#### The Inter-Conference Commission for the Campus Ministry

The campus ministries of the Kentucky and Louisville Conferences continues to be amazingly effective. Fifteen college and university campuses receive dynamic spiritual leadership from men and agencies underwritten by Methodists. But the situation is now crucial, for the future effectiveness of some of these campus ministries is precarious. The Inter-Conference Commission faces a critical alternative: either more funds must be channeled into student work or we will be forced to withdraw Methodist personnel from some of the campuses. We are confident no laymen or minister desires this drastic action but the dilemma is ours at this time. The erupting volcano of the situations on campuses across America should cause us enough concern to work at promoting the finest ministries to youth in the history of our church. Methodism was born on a campus and there we must remain. To abdicate our role as an education-oriented denomination would be tragic.

Our physical investments on these campuses is slightly under \$300,000.00 Buildings and various facilities are being used daily for immeasurable activities. In some cases ecumenical dialogue and interchange has brought Methodism to the forefront in leadership transcending denominational boundaries. Faculty and administrators have been vocal in support of the strategy employed by our campus ministers. The advice and counsel of our men has been eagerly sought by college leaders in helping to direct and give positive thrust to the institutions. The students are supportive (money and energy) of the programs and their affirmation of Christian faith should be all that is required of us to expand our giving to these causes. Last year the Inter-Conference Commission budget for all our campus situations was \$53,000.00. This group, in session in April, were literally torn by the prospect of no increase for our campuses this coming year. After painful consideration and in the faith that Methodists will respond, the budget for 1969-70 was set at \$57,700.00 with the mandate that the vital sginificance of the campus ministry be placed before the proper units of authority in the two conferences in the hope that adequate funding for a more courageous and necessary leadership be supplied. Our alternative is not pleasant to consider.

# REPORT No. 8 EVANGELISM

This has been a year of adjustment: "a new church for a new world"; the beginning of a new quadrennium and the organization of a new board with a new chairman; seeking to find our place in the Conference Program Council and in the local church Council on Ministries. We have not been able to give as much direct leadership to the local churches as in the past but we are hopeful that under the guidance of dedicated pastors, each local church has been kept vividly aware of its work in renewal and witness.

We have attempted to utilize more fully the Conference Board of Evangelism in developing the thrust we feel is needed in our Conference. Growing out of the two meetings of the full Board and several study committess we make the following recommendations:

#### 1. In lay renewal:

- a. A "Renewal Retreat" or "Renewal Seminar" of approximately one day's duration be held at a convenient location sometime in late summer or early fall 1969 in which ministers and key laymen from churches which have had lay witness missions meet with other ministers and key laymen who are interested in renewal of the church and/or lay witness missions.
- b. As part of the Annual Conference Program in 1970, have a minister and one or two outstanding laymen who have experienced renewal in their lives and in their local church as a result of a Lay Witness Mission address the Conference as to what this form of evangelism can do and can mean. Following these addresses we recommend the use of the film "The Search."
- c. A Lay Retreat be held in the fall of 1970 in which the emphasis would be upon Church Renewal.
- d. We request the full cooperation of Conference Lay Board in all phases of these Recommendations.

#### 2. Ministerial Renewal:

Feeling that the minister holds a key relationship in the renewal of the Church and to its evangelistic outreach we

- a. urge all ministers to give diligence to the development of their inner life through personal Bible study, prayer and devotional studies daily.
- b. Each district have one or more One Day Spiritual Retreats during the next Conference Year for the ministers (and their wives) of the district. Dates and plans for these are to be determined by the District Superintendents and District Secretaries of Evangelism after clearing with the Program Council.

#### 3. Youth Renewal:

- a. encourage the youth to give leadership to this as they seek to find the answer to the "negatives" being pictured by some segments of the youth of our time.
- b. Approval and support of the Youth Council of the Conference in their efforts to direct the youth of the Conference in Christian witness and commitment, particularly through the Conference-Wide Youth Rally in January, 1970, and in the reviving of the Youth Drama Group.
- c. Special emphasis be given to individual Christian commitment and commitment to Christian vocation in all youth camps, conferences and institutes.

#### 4. Evangelistic Outreach:

- a. Make use of traditional methods such as revivals, membership classes, visitation, etc.
- b. Use imagination to discover particular needs and opportunities in the local situation such as: industrial, park services, trailer parks, Sunday School, etc. District Secretaries particularly urged to give leadership in these areas.

### 5. Sacramental and Worship Evangelism:

We request the Conference to create a Conference Commission on Worship with special consideration to be given in helping churches discover "renewal" and "evangelistic" values in sacraments and worship.

6. That all local churches, district committees on evangelism, and Conference leadership draw upon the materials and leadership of our General Board of Evangelism and Tidings in Nashville; and that we use our Program Council Staff, Miss Standiford in the area of Children and Adults Roger Collins in the area of Youth and family ministries.

We commend our Conference Evangelists for the work they are doing in the Churches. We commend the General Board of Evangelism for the closer ties which they have established with the Association of Conference Evangelists and for including as an ex-officio member of the General Board staff, the National President of the Association. We are honored that this year one of our Conference Evangelists, Ford Philpot, was elected as the president. Our Conference has approved as the Standard for Conference Evangelists those standards presented by the General Board. (See Supplement 1.) We recommend the following to be continued as approved conference evangelists: Joseph Brookshire, James Gibson, Ford Philpot, James Rose, Maurice Stevens and H. Gilbert Williams. As an approved full-time lay pastor, we recommend W. H. McComas.

#### Supplement 1

# STANDARDS FOR CONFERENCE EVANGLELISTS

#### Adopted by

#### The General Board of Evangelism

- 1. The evangelist should have a conviction of a divine call to this type of ministry.
- 2. He shall be in harmony with the teachings of the Holy Scriptures as set forth in The United Methodist Articles of Religion.
- His personal and professional qualifications for evangelistic work must be established to the satisfaction of the Conference Board of Evangelism and the Cabinet.
- 4. He shall be considered qualified for appointment as Conference Evangelist only if his services are in demand by members of his own Conference.
- 5. He must be loyal to The United Methodist Church, and amenable to its rules and polity.
- He shall have sufficient pastoral experience to acquaint him with the problems of pastoral service in the local church.
- 7. He shall declare his willingness to give his full-time to the ministry of evangelism, allowing preference to United Methodist churches.
- 8. He shall present annually to the Conference Board of Evangelism written recommendations from one District Superintendent and three pastors, from the Conference of which he is a member, with whom he has worked during the past conference year.
- 9. He shall present to the Conference Board of Evangelism a written report at the close of each Conference year. The report guide furnished by the General Board of Evangelism gives guidelines for the preparation of this annual report.
- He shall attend the session of the Annual Conference unless excused by the Annual Conference.
- 11. His faithfulness in submitting an annual report and attending the sessions of Annual Conference shall be considered so important that failure to comply with these requirements automatically disqualifies him for reappointment to the office of Conference Evangelist for another year.
- 12. He shall cooperate with the program of the General Board of Evangelism, and of the Association of Conference Evangelists, so that he may be strengthened by the fellowship and kept aware of the current trends of evangelism within the United Methodist Church.

We have held several meetings in an effort to acquire the Bethel Academy site.

We met with citizens and the Methodist pastors of Mason County to make plans for an organization called "Limestone Heritage Foundation, Inc." to receive and control the old Washington Methodist Church since a new Washington United Methodist Church has been built on a new site. The "Limestone Heritage Foundation, Inc." is a group of interested citizens from Mason County who are interested in preserving the old buildings of historical value in Mason County. The Washington community is being declared a historical landmark by the government.

# REPORT No. 10

#### HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTERIES

This has been a history making year in the work of health and welfare ministries of the Kentucky Annual Conference United Methodist Church. Four new buildings (three new girls dorms and a new farm house) were constructed at the Methodist Home. Ground was broken and construction is underway on the new Good Samaritan Hospital. When the Board met in April, it was reported that the contract for the new United Methodist Hospital of Kentucky, Pikeville, could be awarded by May 1.

These achievements in our health and welfare ministries are commendable and the three administrators of these institutions are to be commended for the outstanding leadership they are providing. United Methodists are to be commended for the support given to provide these new facilities through which a more meaningful ministry to our dependent children and to the sick can be effected in the name of Jesus Christ. Continued support is needed as we are in the last year of our Hospital Development Program and as we look at the other needs of our dependent children.

Let us strive to pay our pledges in full to the Hospital Development Program by the end of this year. We also urge each pastor and congregation to promote the need for a new boy's dorm by receiving a special building fund offering on or near Sunday, September 21, 1969.

While these achievements are indeed worthy of praise, we regret the inevitable decision of the Good Samaritan Hospital Board of Trustees to discontinue the School of Nursing. We hope that continuing studies will find a way for the nursing education program to continue.

#### Recommendations

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministry recommends:

- A. That we continue to designate all Fifth Sunday Church School Offerings for the operational budget of the Methodist Home.
- B. That a special building fund offering be taken in every church on or near Sunday, September 21, 1969 for the purpose of building a new boys' dormitory at the Methodist Home.
- C. That the Conference provide \$3,000 to our Hospitals (\$2,000 to Good Samaritan and \$1,000 to the Methodist Hospital of Kentucky) to be used in the Spiritual Ministries of the Hospitals.
- D. That we receive \$700 from the World Service Commission for the expense of this Board—included in this request an amount not to exceed \$25 for the expenses of the District Directors of Health and Welfare Ministries, to be used for District promotion.
- E. That we receive \$5,000 for Golden Cross.

#### a) GOOD SAMARITAN HOSPITAL

# Lexington, Kentucky John C. Pratt, Administrator For the 1968-69 Conference Year

The outstanding event for Good Samaritan Hospital during the past Conference year was the long-awaited start of construction on the hospital's rebuilding program. July 8, 1968 will always be an important date in the history of the hospital, for it was on that day that ground was broken for the development of the new Good Samaritan Hospital. The event marked the culmination of the efforts of hundreds of people in Lexington and throughout the Kentucky Conference who gave of their time, talents and money to provide new facilities in order that the hospital could continue to provide the finest hospital care.

Though the construction program has caused some inconveniences during the past year and necessitated the reduction of our bed complement by six beds, the hospital has continued to provide quality care, and the volume of service rendered has continued at the high level of recent years. The major indices of that volume of service for the past fiscal year are as follows:

Financially, the fiscal year resulted in an 18.27% increase in revenue. This increase was due principally to a higher volume of service in many of the departments, plus some increases in charges to patients which were necessary to meet higher personnel costs resulting from salary increases granted to employees. At the same time, there was a substantial reduction in losses sustained on services rendered to charity patients. This reduction is mainly attributable to Medicare and Medicaid since approximately 40% of the hospital's patients' days of care is provided to beneficiaries of these two programs.

As mentioned earlier, the single, most significant event of the past year was the commencement of the hospital's construction program. It is estimated that the project will be completed in March 1971, at which time the new Good Samaritan Hospital will offer to the public the finest in hospital equipment and facilities. The new institution will contain 309 beds, including 31 psychiatric beds. The building will be a seven-story structure, completely air-conditioned, with piped oxygen and suction to every bed, telephones and television in every room, adequate parking facilities for the public and employees and, in general, the latest in equipment and facilities to supplement the quality hospital care for which the institution is so well known.

The total project cost for the new institution approximates \$8½ million, of which nearly \$7 million is for construction. The remaining portion will be expended for equipment, architects' and consultants' fees, fund-raising fees, contingencies and miscellaneous costs. To meet the total program costs, the citizens of Fayette County, along with the membership of the Kentucky Conference, provided nearly \$2 million in pledges toward the program. The federal government, through its Hill-Burton and mental health programs, is providing grants totaling approximately \$2.9 million. The remaining funds to meet the total cost of the project will be borrowed, with the initial portion of the funds needed during construction being obtained through the sale of first mortgage notes. These notes, which provide to the purchaser an excellent return on his investment, will be retired on or before the completion of construction by funds obtained through long-term permanent financing.

One of the prime advantages of the construction program as it was finally designed is the fact the hospital can continue to operate without interruption during the entire period of construction. Except for occasional periods of inconvenience, which should be of short duration, service will continue to be provided to patients throughout the rebuilding program. The project has been phased so that when the new building has been completed, most of the existing structures will be vacated, following which complete remodeling and renovation of the 1954 building will be undertaken. When that second phase has been completed and the 1954 building reoccupied, the existing structures with the exception of the Ott Building will be razed. The space now occupied by those existing structures will then be converted into parking area. It is the intent of the Board of Trustees, administration, medical and personnel staffs to continue to provide excellent hospital care during the construction period.

While the commencement of the construction of the new hospital was significant from the point of view of progress, another significant but most regrettable event occurred during the past year. This latter event was the unavoidable decision of the Board of Trustees to discontinue the Good Samaritan Hospital School of Nursing. The decision was reached after many months of study and consideration of various avenues of financing by which the program could be continued. Unfortunately, the school has been a financial burden on the hospital for many years and consultants advised that for the hospital to be able to meet its financial obligations and the indebtedness incurred through the construction program, it would be necessary to discontinue the school unless it could be made self-supporting.

The cash loss sustained by the hospital on the operation of the School of Nursing for the four-year period, 1965-68, totaled nearly \$500,000. The net loss on the operation of the school for the fiscal year 1968 alone, after all tuition and miscellaneous income had been included and both direct and indirect expenses had been deducted, was over \$238,000. Numerous ideas were presented and considered by the Board of Trustees to resolve the financing problems. However, none of the suggestions or programs available would provide sufficient funds on a continuing basis to enable the hospital to maintain the school. As mentioned earlier, over \$4 million of the total project cost of the new hospital must be financed. It would be impossible for the hospital to pay the service on this capital indebtedness and still provide the funds necessary to continue the operation of its nursing education program.

The first obligation of the Board of Trustees is to the hospital and the community the institution serves. As a result, the Board had no recourse but to consider the discontinuation of the School of Nursing. However, in making its decision, the Board of Trustees stipulated that should sources of funds be found to place the school on a self-sustaining basis, the nursing education program of the institution will continue. In this regard, studies are continuing in the hope such sources of funds will be found.

During the year, there were three major changes in the personnel occupying department head positions. One was the employment of Mr. Chester Anderson as manager of the Laundry and Linen Departments, replacing Mr. Jesse Rector, who retired under the hospital's new retirement program on December 31, 1968, after 26 years of employment to Good Samaritan Hospital in the position of Laundry Manager. Mr. Anderson came to Good Samaritan Hospital from the Veterans Administration Hospital in Lexington after several years of experience in laundry operation and management. The second change involved the employment of Mr. John Wehrle to replace Mr. Roger Parry in the position of Personnel Director. Mr. Parry resigned his position with us in mid-November to assume the position of administrator at the Mayfair Manor Nursing Home in Lexington. Mr. Wehrle has had a number of years' experience in personnel work and was previously employed as Personnel Director at Eastern State Hospital, Lexington.

The third major change was that of the promotion of Mr. Sidney Yuro to the position of Chief Pharmacist, replacing Mr. Charles Travis, who retired on July 31, 1968. Mr. Yuro has been a staff pharmacist at Good Samaritan since 1962 and is well qualified to assume the department head responsibilities.

In a continuing effort to strengthen and improve its organization and to follow the recommendations of the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals, the medical staff of the hospital revised its constitution and bylaws, rules and regulations during the past year. In addition, each department of the medical staff formulated rules and regulations for the operation of those respective departments. The result has been a more effective staff organization, which is essential for the efficient and effective operation of the hospital.

The Board of Trustees of the hospital recommends that the following individuals be reappointed to the Board of Trustees with terms to expire in 1973:

Kenneth A. Clay, George B. Dunn, L. D. Sweazy.

The Board's recommendation of an individual to succeed Barckley A. Storey will be made by May 1. Mr. Storey has requested not to be reappointed to the Board.

It is a pleasure to submit a report on the activities and services of the Methodist Hospital of Kentucky, Pikeville, Kentucky for the 1967-68 fiscal year.

I would like to note at the outset that it is a privilege to serve as Administrator of the Methodist Hospital of Pikeville and to lend my efforts to the growth and development program so ably commenced by the late Eugene Lopez and our enthusiastic and dedicated Board of Directors.

The activities during the past year have been amazingly complex in that we have continued to provide the day-to-day hospital and medical services to our patients in addition to finalization of the plans for our new 230 bed hospital and the methods of funding the program. The building program will be elaborated upon in the latter part of this report.

The volume of services rendered was comparable to the previous year. The major indicators were:

The financial operation of the institution for the past year was moderately successful in that we realized a nominal net gain and could add a few dollars to our building fund. The hospital also continued to provide its share of free service to those patients unable to pay.

The Methodist Hospital continued its participation in the education of health care personnel in areas of Medical Technology, Ward Clerk and Practical Nursing.

The following physicians were added to the medical staff of the hospital: Dr. Larry Ronald Tackett, Pathology; Dr. Marguerite Thompson, Ophthalmology; and Dr. E. R. Thompson, Otolaryngology.

The Appalachian Fund, directed by Mrs. Norbert F. Stammer of Berea, Kentucky, continued to lend its most generous support to our School of Medical Technology. We are deeply indebted to the Appalachian Fund for their participation in providing medical technologists to the health care field.

Golden Cross funds received during the year amounted to \$1,040.30 and the hospital has received \$180,000 for the building fund from the Kentucky Conference Hospital Development Program. A portion of the \$180,000 has been utilized for architectural fees.

We received and opened bids on our proposed 230-bed hospital on March 20, 1969. The low construction bid of \$6,390,000 added to equipment and architectural fees

brings the total cost to \$7,290,000, a significant increase over the total estimated cost of \$5.550,000.

Due to lack of sufficient construction funds, it has been necessary to review the project in order to determine possible deductions in an effort to reduce the cost of the project.

The review was focused on items which, under no circumstances, would be critical to, or reduce our program.

A listing of deductions was finalized just last week and has been reviewed and approved by Federal and State agencies participating in the project.

The total project cost for the new facility is \$7,100,000 of which \$6,060,000 is for construction. The remaining portion will be utilized for architectural fees, equipment, and contingencies.

The statistical portion of this report is based upon the first eight months of the Conference year as the Board of Trustees changed the fiscal year to coincide with the calendar year and the audit from which the figures were taken was made in January. Hereafter the report to the Conference will cover the full calendar year.

The Methodist Home has served 96 children, for a total of 19,149 days' care provided at a cost of \$6.00 per day. The "One Great Day" special offering for the building fund was \$34,493.26 from the Kentucky Conference and \$32,479.84 from the Louisville Conference for a total of \$66,973.10. Our building indebtedness is \$55,000.00.

For the second consecutive year death has come to the Home family. Mrs. Jean Biggs, who served as housemother for the older girls for ten years, passed away in February. She will be greatly missed.

During the year the Home admitted seven Negro children, the first in her 98 years of service to children. The seven children rank with the best on campus.

The proposed building program of last year was brought to a successful fruition. Three new dorms for girls was erected, one being named The Stamper Hall in honor of Miss Julia L. Stamper who grew up in the Home and had served for 25 years as secretary and bookkeeper as of June 1968. A new farm managers' house was also built. A new roof was put on the gym and the playing floor refinished.

We list herewith just a few of the many activities involving the boys and girls: Every boy and girl had an off-campus summer and Christmas vacation . . . several won swimming and achievement awards . . . travel opportunities ranged from the East coast to Hawaii and to Mexico . . . 48 saw the Stephen Foster Story . . . All attended the Shrine Circus . . . the older youth visited the Boards of Education and Evangelism, Scarritt College, the Upper Room and the Parthenon in Nashville; Lookout Mountain

and Rock City in Chattanooga; and Stone Mountain and the Cyclorama in Atlanta . . . 34 have taken piano lessons . . . 7 have been in the hospital . . . the immunizations of every child on campus was kept up-to-date . . . 5 attended summer school and did good work . . one attended JESSI at the Florida Institute of Technology . . . the 46 youngest were given examinations, treatment and fluoride applications by the U. of K. School of Dentistry Clinic . . . 4 from the Home, along with 30 from the County, attended the Nursery-Kindergarten School operated by the Home . . . a great number of the children attended the weekly tutoring program . . . the children participated in sports, drama, scouts, choirs, and church sponsored programs . . . three Seniors will graduate: Beverly Buckman, John and Gary McClain.

The Home benefited by 8 sub-district MYF showers and festivals. We extend to these young people our sincere thanks.

For the first time in the history of the Home we now have three sets of houseparents where formerly only housemothers served the children.

We urgently request (1) that the Conferences continue to designate that all Fifth Sunday Church School offerings be for the operational budget of the Home and (2) that a special building fund offering be taken in every church on or near Sunday, September 21, 1969, for the building fund as it is imperative that the Home build a new dorm for the older boys within the next few months.

We express our heartfelt thanks to the Conference and the churches for the fine support given to the Home during the year.

# REPORT No. 11

#### LAITY

The Board of Laity has operated under uncertain conditions as perhaps other boards, because of the new organization structure. We wish to express appreciation to Bishop Short, Dr. Frank King, Program Director, the district superintendents, the pastors of the churches, and every layman for their interest and assistance to accomplish the goals for this year. The changes in the organizational structure will take place on Janary 1, 1970, but plans are already under way to hold training sessions in the fall of 1969 to orient the laity to the new program. We look upon the changes in structure as a forward move and agree enthusiastically to initiate programs thta will be helpful to the spiritual life of the laity.

The mission of the lay program is to interpret the conference program on laity to the local men's groups with a purpose of increasing their spiritual lives in and out of the churches. The conference board serves as a liaison group between the local church and the General Board of the Laity.

The Conference board proposes to operate under the present organization until January 1, 1970, at which time the new program will begin. The goals approved in 1968 will continue to be the goals for the seven months following the annual conference of this year. These are listed in the Journal of the Kentucky Conference 1968.

The following programs have been accomplished this conference year:

- The largest conference lay retreat with an attendance of 280 at Camp Cedarmore and a fine spirit.
- The Bishop's Convocation on Stewardship where the recommendation was made and later approved to have a conference-wide EMV during 1969.
- Twenty-two hundred dollars paid or pledged for buses to attend the Purdue Conference in July. The number registered exceeds the number four years ago.
- 4. Continued efforts to increase the District Methodist Men Groups to one or more in each district.
- 5. Lay Speaking schools conducted in several districts.

- Guide lines set forth for the organization of the lay program under the new discipline.
- 7. Lay academy in one district with an attendance of seventy laymen.
- 8. Newsletter published quarterly for all officials of the laity.
- 9. A committee of ten men from each district invited to meet with conference lay leader, district superintendent, director program council and district lay leader to discuss areas pertaining to the growth of the lay program. The above group met in six districts with tremendous success. Those in attendance were men not involved in district or conference positions, but very active in local churches. The recommendations will be implemented in the program for 1970.
- Continued emphasis on county-wide Methodist Men organizations and countywide lay revivals.

The Conference goals for 1970 as discussed and recommended by the conference board are as follows:

- Emphasize the importance of a vital personal Christian experience for the building of God's Kingdom in the local churches of the Kentucky Conference.
- 2. Lay Life and Work
  - a. Lay Speaking—To establish and place in operation the changes needed for certification regulations for lay speakers.
    - (1) The following is recommended for each person to certify as a lay speaker. Any one who resides in the district and has been approved as a lay speaker prior to 1969 session of the Annual Conference and who meets the provisions of Par. 1274 of The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church may be recommended for certification each year without regard to training courses that may be established.
    - (2) Anyone who has not previously been certified as a lay speaker may be recommended subject to paragraph 1274, after he completes the training requirements; provided he completes those requirements within two years of the beginning of his training.
    - (3) The training program will be a study course recommended by the General Board of the Laity including the reading of and reporting of four books, one in each of the following areas:
      - (a) United Methodist background and organization
      - (b) United Methodist Christian beliefs
      - (c) Conduct on public worship
    - (d) Aids to speech or sermon preparation

Plan of Implementation: The Conference Director of Lay Speaking has the responsibility of organizing on a district level with the district lay leader and district superintendent a school of lay speaking. He will make available materials and books to the districts. Emphasis will be placed on training and dedication of trainees.

b. The Conference Board recommends that an Independent Study Program be made available for laymen following the 1969 Annual Conference.

Plan of Implementation: Qualified Instructors will be selected to write lesson plans on specified books. The questions will be mailed to the laymen as requested by registration and upon completion will return the lessons to be graded. A certificate will be awarded those completing the course.

- c. Lay Renewal
  - (1) To sponsor a conference Laymen's Retreat with a minimum of 350 in attendance. To conscientiously promote the Jurisdictional Retreat at Lake Junaluska for laymen.

Plan of Implementation: The Conference Director of Lay Renewal will appoint a Retreat Director in each district who is to publicize and promote the retreats by means of various committees. He is to provide promotional materials well in advance of the retreats.

(2) The Conference Director of Lay Life and Work is to assist each district to sponsor and conduct at least one lay academy in 1970.

Plan of Implementation: The Conference Director of Lay Renewal will arrange with the district lay leader a meeting to plan the school and appoint a District Lay Renewal Director and a committee. He will aid in the selection of the instructor, books and materials.

(3) Emphasize the value of the lay revivals and lay witness missions through the district and local churches. Plan of Implementation: The Conference Director of Lay Renewal and the District Director will assist the local churches to understand, schedule and plan lay revivals and lay witness missions.

d. Leadership Training—To improve the leadership in the local churches especially among lay leaders, lay delegates to annual conference, members of pastor-parish relations, nominating and lay personnel committees, members of administrative boards and members of boards of trustees.

Plan of Implementation: The Conference Director of Lay Leadership Training will assist the District Board to plan and conduct sessions on a sub-district and local church level to train leaders to serve effectively in the administration of the local church.

- e. Methodist. Men-
  - Organize a Methodist Men Association in every district to meet quarterly.
     Five districts now have such organizations.
  - (2) Promote the organization of sub-district or county-wide Methodist Men groups.
  - (3) Plan with local groups to organize cells of six or eight men on a neighborhood or vocational interest. The purpose of such a program is to lead men to accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

Plan of Implementation: The District Lay Leader with the Conference Director of Methodist Men will in a consortium of persons interested in spiritual growth plan ways to implement.

- (4) Revise the Rating Scale to be used for the purpose of evaluation rather than rating Methodist Men groups.
- 3. Stewardship and Finance
  - a. Sponsor a conference-wide EMV.
  - b. Tithing Commitment and follow-through for youth and children.

Plan of Implementation: This conference in cooperation with the Louisville conference with Bishop Short as area chairman will during the month of November 1969 conduct an EMV. The organization will be coordinated by the conference laity through the districts and the local churches.

The following general proposals are recommended:

- 1. The Conference Committee composed of Bishop Roy Short, C. R. Hager, Conference Lay Leader; O. J. Huntsman, Director of Stewardship and Finance; Frank King, Program Council Director, and Albert Sweazy, representing the District Superintendents plan for a simultaneous Every Member Visitation in November 1969.
- 2. A request will be made for Reverend Louis Woodward to be a resource person for materials and local church planning.
- 3. A training session be conducted in each district during the month of September in preparation for the EMV.
- 4. The Conference Committee will outline the program for the district training sessions.

- 5. The Kentucky Conference will cooperate with the Louisville Conference in planning an over all area program for the stewardship canvas.

## REPORT No. 12

#### COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

#### I. Membership and Purpose of Commission

The Commission shall be composed of one layman and one minister from each district; the Program Council Director; a representative of the cabinet, and chairman of the Board of Missions.

The minimum salary program is designed to supplement salaries of pastors serving charges which, by virtue of small membership and/or poor economic conditions, are unable to pay adequate salaries. Therefore, the commission is responsible for studying all matters pertaining to the Minimum Salary Program, prepare reports, and make recommendations concerning policy, procedure, apportionments, and schedule of payments to be adopted by the Annual Conference. We commend those charges that are making progress in achieving the Minimum Salary goal. However, the number of charges receiving assistance and the total amount being paid by the Commission is creating a financial burden on our present resources. Therefore our goal is to provide adequate minimum salaries where necessary, to encourage charges in increasing their support of the ministry, and at the same time to decrease the total cost of the program. Our goal must always be that of supplement and assistance, not permanent help.

# II. Recommendations

Your commission does not consider that the minimum salary scale provides an adequate salary, but rather a minimum amount for subsistence. Every charge should be expected to provide adequate support for its pastor. We disapprove the creation of charges that will require minimum salary support except in the case of a new church, or in cases that give promise of a fully adequate salary within a reasonable time. We therefore, recommend that:

- (1) The Kentucky Annual Conference adopt a policy of arranging pastoral charges so that in every instance possible the pastoral charge will have a minimum of 250 members with the number of churches such that the charge can be served adequately and efficiently by a fully qualified minister. We recognize that there are situations where this cannot be achieved at once, but will require a longer time span. However, we believe that the establishment of strong charges is essential, not only to provide adequate support for the pastor and a full program, but also to provide qualified leadership for the church, and to build stronger morale among our small and rural churches.
- (2) Each pastoral charge receiving minimum salary funds adopt as a goal the minimum salary set for their category, with World Service and Benevolence Support in proportion. Each charge now receiving minimum salary support should have its records of performance carefully studied by the Administrative Board, the district superintendent and the pastor. Every church should develop its own financial program of salary support and benevolences on the basis of its potential.

- (3) Each pastoral charge shall pay at least 2/3 of the minimum salary of its pastor, with the Minimum Salary Fund paying only up to the remaining 1/3.
- (4) Each pastoral charge receiving minimum salary funds increase the pastor's salary each year by an amount equal to 25 percent of the minimum salary supplement so the charge will be completely self-supporting at the end of four years.
- (5) The district superintendents give careful study to consolidating churches in rural areas with small membership due to the exodus of population to urban areas. Many of these churches have few members, inadequate programs, and low salaries. Our public schools in such areas were consolidated years ago and with modern transportation there is no reason why such merger is not feasible other than for tradition and resistance to necessary change. Consolidation would strengthen the rural church programs, provide a more adequate work load for our rural pastors, and make our rural charges self-supporting.
- (6) Special attention be given to pastoral charges with small membership which, by virtue of their location, membership potential, and other factors beyond their control, but of necessity be supported by minimum salary funds for an indefinite time. If consolidation takes place in areas where possible more attention and assistance can and will be given to charges which are in real need. The Board of Missions, its church and community committee or such other committees as the Board may determine should be aware of these situations and work in close cooperation with the District Superintendents and pastors in assisting these charges with the development of effective programs.
- (7) We, therefore, recommend to the Commission on World Service and Finance that the minimum salary percentage be 3 percent of the current salary of pastor.

#### III. Policies of the Commission

- (1) Application for Minimum Salary Funds shall be made by the Charge Conference through the District Superintendent to the executive secretary of the Minimum Salary Commission at the Program Council Office by December 1, 1969.
  - (2) The application shall be reviewed and approved by the District Superintendent.
- (3) The application shall then be received by the Commission on Minimum Salary and the district superintendent and Charge Conference notified of their recommendations. Consultation with the district superintendent and/or representative of the Charge Conference may be requested if necessary.
- (4) The application shall call for the following information: present salary, travel allowance, utility allowance, and/or other compensation paid by the charge and any other sources of support from the Annual Conference or its agencies. It shall contain the name, mailing address, and conference status of the pastor. It must have the approval of the district superintendent and Charge Conference along with a clear statement of plan and procedure for yearly raises in salary to meet the qualifications for receiving Minimum Salary Funds.
- (5) After approval the conference treasurer will be instructed to make payments in accordance with schedule adopted by the Annual Conference, and on receipt of a form from the Commission on Minimum Salary listing those who are eligible to receive such aid, the amount each pastor is to receive and the schedule for payments to recipients. This form shall be provided by the Commission, shall bear the signature of either the chairman or the secretary of the commission and shall be prepared in triplicate with one copy for the commission, one for each district superintendent and one for the conference treasurer. In no case shall minimum salary support be provided without approval of the commission or its executive committee and certified by the chairman or secretary. Payments from minimum salary funds shall not exceed the scale adopted by the Annual Conference.

Payments of the Minimum Salary Funds shall be made monthly.

- (6) Minimum Salary Funds shall be paid only to pastors assigned to serve local pastoral charges as full-time pastors. Part-time pastors, retired ministers, or retired lay pastors shall not be eligible for Minimum Salary assistance. No associate pastor or person serving other than "pastor-in-charge" shall receive assistance from the fund. Pastors must give full time to their pastoral duties throughout the entire year.
- (7) Charges qualifying for minimum salary funds which amount to less than \$100 will not receive any assistance from the fund. We feel that the charge should care for this small amount.
- (8) When a charge experiences a change of pastors, any complications arising from the change shall be adjusted by the district superintendent and the executive committee.

- (9) Every charge must participate in the area-wide Every Member Visitation Program in the fall of 1969 in order to qualify for minimum salary assistance for the fiscal year 1970.
- (10) New congregations shall pay 25 percent of the salary for the first year and assume full support in four years unless other arrangements are made after a full study of the situation by all agencies involved. The commission may pay the full salary for one year, but only if an acceptable plan for the congregation's full support is submitted and accepted.
- (11) Expenses for the clerical work, correspondence, travel, and other expenses necessary for the Commission on Minimum Salary's work shall come from the budget of the Conference Program Council.
- (12) The Commission shall prepare and report to the 1970 Annual Conference a long-range plan for additional assistance for pastors.
  - (13) This program will take effect January 1, 1970.

### IV. Minimum Salary Schedule

A basic minimum salary for 1970 shall be established as follows:

# REPORT No. 13 MISSIONS Section I

During the past year, the Kentucky Conference Board of Missions has endeavored to promote the total mission program of The United Methodist Church.

In cooperation with the Conference Committee on Mission Study, we put major emphasis this year on the importance of each church being involved in one or more of four suggested areas for Mission Study. The District Committee on Mission Study, cooperating with the Conference Committee, set up the Fall Study Conferences which were well attended and created a great deal of interest. In these conferences all four Mission Study areas were presented by persons who had been trained in Conference, National or Jurisdictional Schools of Missions. We believe that this emphasis on a church-wide mission study is being well received by our churches and will continue to grow.

This year our School of Christian Mission will be held July 7-11 at Sue Bennett College, London. We are also having a Week-end Training for Christian Mission at Sue Bennett July 11-12. We are encouraging every local church to send interested persons to these training programs. The Adult, Youth and Children's literature for use in the local church will be presented. Study courses for next year are:

"Reconciliation In A Broken World"

"Toward Understanding China and the Chinese People"

"The Inner Life and the Christian in Today's World"

In the area of the work in the Inner-City we are pleased to report that in the Covington District, a Greater-Covington-Newport Area Inner-City Ministry has continued to grow. We have also held planning meetings and are endeavoring to increase the effective work of our Larger Parish Program.

We hold again before our Conference our aim for each local church in the work of missions.

- (1) Full support of World Service and Conference Benevolences with each church on the Honor Roll each quarter.
  - (2) A church-wide mission study in each congregation.
  - (3) Regular use of World Service leaflets and Promotional literature.
  - (4) An Advance Special in each of the four areas.

#### In Memoriam-Mrs. Earl T. Curry

As President of the Conference Women's Society of Christian Service she gave unusual time and devotion. Even in the midst of pain, she remarkably fulfilled her heavy responsibilities of leadership. Her Christian concern and commitment to the whole life of the church was expressed as a mother and wife in her family, as a minister's helpmate, as a District and later a Conference Officer, as member of General and Jurisdictional Conferences, as a member of the Board at Sue Bennett College, and in the entire direction and devotion of her life. The Conference Board of Missions gives thanks to God for the life and leadership of Norma Curry in its work and witness, and pledges added devotion to the cause in which we were mutually involved, the redemption of all of God's world through Christ our Lord.

#### Section IV

# Methodist Mountain Missions in Kentucky, Inc.

BUILDINGS AND IMPROVEMENTS—All buildings owned by The Mission have been kept in good repairs. The Bach Memorial Sanctuary was given a new ceiling with a new finish on the side walls. At the Wolverine Church some windows were repaired and some painting in the sanctuary. At Hampton new glass was installed in windows of the sanctuary, and the building underpinned with concrete blocks.

In the fall a new ware room—24'x38'—was added to the Lewis Memorial Building. During the summer and fall a new community building was built by the Hampton Church. See the WINTER 1969 Issue of the MESSENGER for a full report.

Plans are now in progress for the purchase of new pews for the Bach Memorial Church and to install a new front on the Jackson Opportunity Store,

A full report on insurance carried was given to the Board meeting on September 17, 1968. An estimate given to the Board on September 17th shows the estimated value of our physical holdings as following: Store buildings at Jackson and Vicco \$111,000.00; 2 parsonages and 70 acres of land \$24,500.00; 3 church buildings and community buildings \$58,500.00; equipment in the 8 stores, offices and workshops \$16,810.00; trucks, cars and buses \$22,500.00; an estimate on merchandise \$50,000.00—Total of \$283,810.00.

TRUCKS AND BUSES—In June 1968 we found it necessary to purchase a new 1968 2-ton Chevy Truck Chasis. Then in July 1968 we had to purchase a second 2-ton Chevy Truck with a new 20 foot van-type body. In October we placed an order for a new 1969 B-600 Ford Chasis with a re-built body with the Hughes Bus and Body Shop in Lebanon, Ohio. This bus was received the last of December and placed in service with the Hampton Church. This gives a fleet of 3 good 2-ton trucks, 2 good 54-passenger Church Buses, a 1966 Chevy Van, a 1967 Chevy Carry-all, and a 1965 Chevy 4-door passenger car—all in good condition.

OPPORTUNITY STORES—We continue to operate 8 Opportunity Stores, located in Paintsville, Martin, Hazard, Vicco, Evarts, Barbourville, Pineville, and Jackson. During this year we have certainly handled more clothing than in previous years. We believe that we have placed clothing to more needy people and people of limited incomes than in other years. We estimate that an average of over 3,500 people are coming into our 8 stores each month, looking for the clothing which they need or want. Also for other needed items of home furnishings. Our Store Sales were up about 14% during 1968.

EMPLOYMENT AND WAGES—Our number of employed workers continued at the same level, an average of near 50. However, there was an increase of near 15% in the amount paid for wages during the year. Our February 1969 payroll shows checks written to 56 persons on a total payroll of \$11,104.38. Thus our employment and our payroll are truly helping a number of families and we are keeping several families off various types of State and Welfare payrolls. This means that these workers are now "Tax paying citizens"—Not Persons to be "carried by other tax payers" of our Nation.

We have a good spirit among our employees. Their interest and their faithful work have contributed much to the success of the Mission.

CHARITY—We continue to share with several who are in real need. During 1968 we helped at least 14 families whose homes had burned. Many others received from our stores gifts in clothing and some items of furniture. Our gifts to the needy are now over \$3,000.00 per year.

GIFTS TO CHURCHES—During this period of April 1968 through March 1969, our Mission has shared a total of \$3,205.78 toward the up-keep and support of several churches in the Danville, Barbourville and Ashland Districts. In addition we have contributed toward the support and up-keep of our Mission Churches in Breathitt County: \$6,195.00 on salaries for pastors; \$4,720.00 for purchase of new bus; and at least \$3,000.00 on the operation and up-keep of church buses, with some help shared with these churches for the up-keep of their buildings; also over \$5,000.00 from the Mission on the construction costs of the New Youth and Community Building at Hampton.

ADVANCED SPECIALS AND OTHER CASH GIFTS RECEIVED—During this year we have received a total of \$6,741.18 in Advance Special Gifts. We have also received during this preiod a total of \$1,115.10 in cash coming as direct and personal gifts. While these Advance Specials and Personal gifts have come from various parts of our Nation, the major portion have come from the state of Kentucky, from Indiana and from the Memphis Conference. This total of \$7,856.28 in cash gifts have helped us greatly.

TOUCHING THE LIVES OF PEOPLE—While each and all of the items previously discussed in this report are important, yet we do hold that the most important parts of our work are the encouragement, the new hope, and the challenge for higher living which we share with people. The employment which we provide means a more normal way of life to many of our workers. The 3,500 or more people who can come into our stores, select and pay for items which they want or need in their homes find something here more than clothing and furniture.

In and through our churches in Breathitt County and with the leadership given by our 3 pastors, we are continuing to reach over 200 people each week, with helpful challenges for fellowship with God and for a more useful Christ-like way of living. While our efforts and programs are far from perfect, still we do believe that we are giving a leadership to a large group of youth which is showing some results. There

are some definite signs of growth and maturing among a number of the youth at Hampton. There has been a definite increase in the number of youth sharing the youth activities in Wolverine. There has been a "turn over" in the youth group at Bach Memorial with some helpful signs. Rev. Ralph G. Landis continues a helpful program with the children and youth at the 3 mission Sunday schools under his direction.

During the winter months about 80 boys of Breathitt County have been involved in a church league basketball program under the direction of Rev. Lee Hubbard, and Rev. Seldon Short.

In the building of the Hampton Community Building, a number of our local youth and adults were involved in a very helpful way, as they shared their time and labors. It was an enriching privilege to have the Charles Crum family of Dayton, Indiana to come and build the fireplace, to have Mr. and Mrs. Ray Rardin of Alexandria, Kentucky to do the electrical work, plus a "Work Camp Group" from Indiana who came and helped to prepare the foundation.

During this past year the pastors and many of the laymen in over 700 local Methodist Churches shared with us in this program of services. We know that their continued interest and continued sharing has enabled us to go forward with our various services.

#### Section V

#### Church Extension Committee

The Church Extension Committee of the Board of Missions of the Kentucky Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church has shared with other boards, agencies and committees the problems peculiar to a time of transition for a new church and new personnel and leadership at the beginning of a new quadrennium.

We have processed applications for donations and loans to the National Division of Mission's Church Extension Committee. We likewise have processed applications and dispensed funds to various churches in the Conference upon approval of applications. We recommended to our Conference Board of Missions that we give \$500 to the Sunny Acres Methodist Church, Covington District, to help them move into their new parsonage, and \$300 to the Cook's Chapel United Methodist Church to help in a remodeling project. A special financial exhibit will disclose the record of these actions.

It is important that our churches and pastors be apprised of the limited funds the Committee receives from the Conference for distribution to the churches having need. According to the Kentucky Conference Journal, page 192, the Committee received \$3,000 from the Conference last year. This obviously means that only modest grants can be made.

Fund distribution from the Methodist Crusade has been a bit static this Conference year. By action of the 1968 Conference the guidelines for the distribution of these funds were relaxed to allow types of applications other than the establishment of new churches and the relocation of churches. It is anticipated that this action will activate this program.

Since the balance of Crusade funds will doubtless be exhausted within a few years, the need for some new program for the fostering and establishing of new churches is obvious. Study will be given to this area of need. The financial exhibit for the Methodist Crusade Funds will give the present status of this fund.

#### Supplement

The Committee on Church Extension of the Board of Missions has sought through the Conference year 1968-69 to render service in fulfillment of its mission to the needs of the churches. We cite page 57 of the Program Council reports for a portion of our work report.

During the year the pastor of the Paris United Methodist Church brought to our attention a mission project of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years duration which issued in the reception of 100 members into the membership of the Parish Church on March 31, 1969. The shepherd of the group has been a lay pastor, Earl Pennington who has served without salary and anticipates continued and ultimate full time pastoral service. Our committee received an application for a donation of \$4,000 to purchase and repair a building for this group in a \$9,200 project. From the balance of the Crusade Funds this \$4,000

has been approved by the Board of Missions on recommendation of our committee for this unique and inspiring mission operation.

An appeal from Bishop Roy H. Short and the Cabinet came to our committee in behalf of the new church at Washington, Ky. The Chairman and Secretary of the Church Extension Committee by action of the Board of Missions are empowered and authorized to negotiate and place a loan from Conference Crusade Funds in the amount of \$12,000 with the Washington United Methodist Church, Washington, Ky. with no payment of interest or repayment of principal for a period of 5 years from date of note; at the end of the 5 years the loan is to be repaid on a schedule of \$1,000 per year plus interest at 6%. We request approval of this Annual Conference of their action in behalf of a small congregation of brave and courageous people who have erected a beautiful new church on the growing edge of an expanding community in the environment of a newly established community college.

Another unique mission request has come to us from the Calaski Fellowship in the Danville District where Miss Mildred May works as a Church and Community Worker with 21 rural churches in Casey and Pulaski Counties. Details of this project are given in the report to the conference by Dr. Horace Green, on Bridging Gaps. On recommendation of our Committee and approval of the Board of Missions \$4,000 has been granted from Crusade Funds to aid in funding this program which provides a central office and meeting facility for the leadership and the more than 1000 members of this 21 church fellowship.

#### Section VI

#### Committee on Town and Country Ministries

The Committee on Town and Country Ministries was named late in the Conference year and had but one meeting for organization and to consider programs. Mrs. Ray Litton was elected Vice-Chairman and Rev. Lowell Langefeld was elected Secretary.

The Committee has sought to find its purpose and to establish guidelines for service as a sub-committee of the Board of Missions.

A committee has been named to develop a program of options for our Town and Country Churches by which the local church might be strengthened. Merger Programs, Group Ministries, Enlarged Charges, Larger Parishes, County Councils and other possible patterns of Administration will be studied.

The objective is to develop a program of patterns and policies to be presented to the Annual Conference for adoption as an official program of the Conference.

The Committee seeks to relate itself to Area Church and Community Development, under the supervision of Dr. H. H. Greene. It has studied proposed projects in McCreary County, Harlan County, Pulaski and Casey Counties and has recommended them to the Projects Committee of the Fund for Reconciliation for consideration.

As the Committee learns more of its functions and areas of service it will seek to provide efficient programs of service.

### Section VII

#### Commission of the Structure of Methodism Overseas

In 1948 the General Conference of The Methodist Church created the new commission on the Structure of Methodism Overseas. This very title says something—Our Methodist Work Overseas. One might naturally ask how do we happen to have our Methodist work overseas. The answer to this has been given by our own Bishop Roy H. Short in his address to the various Jurisdictional meetings discussing some of the problems of Cosmos. To quote from Bishop Short: "Methodism has always been marked by the tendency to reach out and to share its message. This tendency to reach out and to seek to share the message explains John Wesley's Field Preaching, his use of lay preachers and his organizations of societies. It explains Methodism's following the frontier with its itinerants and its planning of institutions in our own nation until at last it had carried the gospel from one shore of the continent to the other. This tendency to reach out to share the message explains also the numerous overseas missionary efforts of Methodism across a period of now some one hundred and fifty years."

No one questions that we are living in changing times. We have had changing times in the church overseas. In regard to our overseas work many of our churches there have become affiliated autonomous churches. Some of these include Brazil, Burma, Chile,

Cuba, Indonesia, Korea, Malaysia and Singapore, Mexico, United Church of Christ in Japan and others. An autonomous church is one that has full legislative powers and full administrative responsibilities for managing its own life. However, not only in our own United Methodism in the United States but in many of our churches overseas there is a growing desire that some plan or program needs to be worked out adaptable to the situation now. Three plans have been proposed as follows: One-A World Methodist Conference; Two-A World Methodist Council; and then Three-A new international United Methodist Church. Cosmos has been studying these proposals now for the past several months. Jurisdictional meetings have been held across the church with representatives from each Jurisdiction and these plans have been studied. It is now proposed that we have a Structure Congress to meet April 9-13, 1970 and from this Structure Congress a plan of organization will be presented to the Cosmos in its meeting just before the General Conference in 1970. Then Cosmos will make its recommendation to the General Conference in 1970 and it could be one of the three mentioned or some other plan or program they devised that would adequately care for our overseas churches and at the same time help to promote the idea that our United Methodist Church is a World Organization. Whatever plan may be devised we want that it shall be a plan of organization through which the message of the gospel may more effectively reach not only the people of our own nation but those whom we are responsible for overseas.

#### Section VIII

#### Committee on Mission Studies

"New Forms of Missions" and "The Gospel of John" have provided, during 1968-69, many fine opportunities for mission study by local congregations and other groups of The United Methodist Church of the Kentucky Conference. There have come to us reports of many splendid ways of witnessing as a result of the study. We pray that the witness will continue to grow.

Most of us on the Conference Subcommittee on Mission Study have been gravely concerned over the fact that the number of people in attendance at the District Fall Mission Study Conferences in October, 1968, was much smaller than the number in attendance at the October, 1967, conferences. In fact, only two-thirds of the number attending in 1967 attended in 1968. We feel that this loss of numbers is serious despite the fact that a survey of the Fall Mission Study Conferences throughout the nation in 1968 also shows a great decrease in number of those in attendance from the year before. Indeed, some Annual Conferences show a decrease of fifty percent or more.

The decrease in attendance at the Fall Mission Study Conferences in 1968 poses some questions for us:

- (1) Did local churches send fewer people to the conferences because there was only one mission study in addition to the Bible study this year?
- (2) Is mid-October too late for the Fall Mission Study Conferences? (Some churches reported that their studies on "New Forms of Mission" or "The Gospel of John" had already been completed before mid-October. It has been suggested that the Fall Mission Study Conferences be held as soon as possible after September first.)
- (3) Did members of local churches feel that they were attending too many meetings?

Surely we can find some answers to these questions and some remedy for the poor attendance.

We urge all Kentucky Methodists to avail themselves of the opportunities for mission study. Such opportunities are to be found at the School of Christian Mission, the Week-End Training Session, and the Jurisdiction Missionary Conference. The Kentucky Conference School of Christian Mission will be held at Sue Bennett College, London, during the week of July 7-11, 1969. The Week-end Training for Christian Mission is scheduled for July 11-12, 1969, at the same college. Brochures about these two events have been sent to every local church in the Kentucky Conference. #### REPORT No. 16

#### PENSIONS

The 1968-72 quadrennial Board of Pensions assumed the duties of administering the pensions program of the conference when the conference session adjourned June 9, 1968. This board has endeavored to continue the forward-looking program begun by previous boards and to make such adjustments as required by the economic and social changes of life.

During the year the conference board has held two meetings and has had representatives in consultation with the General Board of Pensions in their offices in Evanston, Illinois, on two occasions. The executive committee has met when necessary to direct the detailed business of the Board.

In this report your Board of Pensions will attempt to accomplish the following:

- 1. Present to the conference a continuing interpretation of its long-range plans and program for pensions.
- 2. Make specific recommendations on pension matters which require action of the conference.
- 3. Report changes in the Hospital and Medical Expense Program.
- 4. Report on the R. R. Rose Fund which was established seven years ago.
- 5. Call attention to some of the items of new legislation that affect the program.
- 6. Report other miscellaneous items of interest.

In submitting this report your board endeavors to make members of the conference fully aware of their vital interests in the pension program of our conference and to continue its policy of giving as much information as space and interest permit.

#### Long Range Pension Plan

The long range goal of the pension program as set by the action of the General Conference and the Kentucky Annual Conference is to provide funded pension based on an annuity rate equal to 1% of average salary of the conference. This year that rate would be \$61.00 but, of course, this figure will change, most likely upward, as the average salary of the conference fluctuates.

In order to meet this goal the conference has taken three decisive steps.

- Over a period of years, under the leadership of the Retirement Brotherhood and the Conference Board of Pensions, capital funds were accumulated to apply as reserve when the conference could enter the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund.
- 2. Effective June 1, 1958, the conference entered the New Entrant Program of the MRPF. All new entrants and transfers under 40 years of age entering the conference after that date were enrolled in MRPF and funded each year at a rate of 9% of the average salary of the conference.
- 3. Effective July 1, 1966, the whole membership of the conference was enrolled in MRPF under the Full Transition Program. At that time it was computed that the conference needed approximately \$4,792,010.00 to establish reserves for all claimants, including full-time approved supplies, at a funded annuity rate of \$45.00 per service year.

At that time the Conference-

- 1. Had \$1,500,000.00 for initial deposit.
- Accepted a 33 year graduated estimated amortization payment schedule which began at \$128,460.00 in 1967 and reached a level payment \$158,337.00 in 1974 and for 27 years thereafter.
- 3. Set the apportionment for MRPF at 24% of the pastor's salary.

Since then the following circumstances have introduced variable factors into our pension program.

- The pension responsibilities of the conference were computed conservatively and the actual experience of the conference has been favorable.
- Interest rates have increased so that the earnings on our reserves are higher than originally estimated.
- 3. Merger has brought additional responsibilities and resources.

When taken as a whole the variable factors referred to above have been favorable and we have therefore been able to increase the annuity rate from \$45.00 in 1966 to the \$52.00 recommended for the calendar year 1970. It must be pointed out, however, that the rate is still \$9.00 per service year below the minimum suggested rate of 1% of the average salary of the conference and your Board of Pensions cannot overlook its responsibility to call this deficiency to the attention of the conference.

As stated previously the Board of Pensions presented a plan for Full Transition into the reserve program in 1966 which involved a 33 year amortization schedule for past service annuity responsibility. This plan was amended by the conference as follows:

"That at any future time it may seem feasible the Conference Board of Pensions will give study and consideration to the planning and presentation of a capital fund campaign to fund the balance of the amortized amount at such a time making possible the reduction of the percentage and/or apportioned assessment for this cause on the local churches." (Ky. Conf. Journal, 1966, page 71.)

This action of the conference must be interpreted by the Board of Pensions as a directive to develop information and plans for a capital fund drive for pensions as soon as possible after the current Hospital Campaign ends on December 31, 1969. In compliance with the above quoted conference action this board will feel itself obligated to present to the 1970 session of the conference information and plans for the capital fund drive for pensions. The detailed plans for this capital fund drive will be developed in consultation with conference administrative leaders, related boards and agencies and the General Board of Pensions.

The program as now constituted will provide a fully funded reserve pension for all members of the conference within the remaining amortization period and if we continue to incur favorable experiences we will doubtless be able to reduce slightly the gap between the recommended annuity rate and our actual annuity rate. It will require

large sums of capital funds, however, to completely close this gap, and a conferencewide capital fund drive for this purpose seems to be the only feasible way to realize all the funds needed.

#### Recommendations

Your Board of Pensions makes the following recommendations for Conference action:

- 1. That the annuity rate be established as \$50.00 for the remainder of the calendar year 1969 and that it be \$52.00 funded rate for 1970.
  - 2. That the MRPF assessment remain at 24% of the pastor's current basic salary.
- 3. That a minimum basic salary of \$2,000.00 per year be paid to all pastors by the church or churches they serve before they are eligible for annuity credit.
- 4. That all salary of ministerial and lay appointees with annuity claim upon the conference be pro-rated so that the MRPF apportionment be paid in an amount proportioned to the pastoral salary paid. The primary responsibility for pro-ratings shall rest with the church/charge treasurer but should be fail to do so the pastor shall make adjustments required before submitting his statistical report to the Annual Conference (Par. 1380.6).
- 5. That all persons listed as being under Special Appointment of the Conference who are eligible for annuity claim upon the conference be granted annuity claim for those years of service for which they pay, or have paid in their behalf, to the Reserve Pension Fund an amount equal to 9% of the average salary of the conference, and, that those under Special Appointment who do not pay, nor have paid in their behalf, the above amount be listed as being without annuity claim for those years for which the above amount is not paid.
- 6. That those serving Special Appointments since the 1950-51 conference year who are ineligible for annuity claim upon the conference or who have not paid, or had paid in their behalf, the 9% of the average salary to MRPF be listed in the 1969 Conference Journal as being without annuity credit for the years involved.
- 7. That annuity claim on account of service rendered be granted only to those who have qualified as being eligible for pension in paragraph 1379.4 of the 1968 Discipline and that those who do not qualify be listed in the Conference Journal as being without annuity credit.
- 8. That the following institutions be approved for appointment with annuity credit subject to conditions provided in recommendation number five: Lindsey Wilson Junior College, Union College, Kentucky Wesleyan College, Asbury College, Sue Bennett College, The United Methodist Hospital of Kentucky—Pikeville, Good Samaritan Hospital—Lexington, The United Methodist Home, Methodist Mission of Kentucky, The Program Council of the Kentucky Annual Conference, and The Wesley Foundations at Berea College, Eastern Kentucky University, University of Kentucky and Western Kentucky University.
- 9. That the General Board of Pensions, Evanston, Illinois, be the authorized fiscal agent of Conference Board of Pensions, holding and investing funds placed on deposit by the Conference Board and paying claimants as approved by the Conference Board.
- 10. That the Program Council Director be the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Pensions and the Conference Treasurer be the treasurer of the Conference Board of Pensions.
- 11. That a list of all conference claimants and the amount each one receives be listed in the Conference Journal.
- 12. That the Conference keep in mind that by its own action in 1966, and reiterated at each succeeding session, the next conference-wide capital fund drive will be to provide funds to retire in part or in whole the past approved service responsibility of the Conference.
- 13. That the Commission on World Service and Finance increase the apportionment for HMRP for retired ministers and widows from \$9,500.00 to \$11,500.00 to pay the 15% increase in premiums which the conference pays in their behalf.

#### Changes in HMEP

Due to rising hospitalization and medical costs the rates for HMEP will increase 15% beginning July 1, 1969 and continuing through June 30, 1970. The monthly premium rates and changes in benefits are as listed below:

- 1. Increase to \$15,000 from \$10,000 of Life time Maximum benefits payable following attainment of age 65.
- 2. 10% Medicare increase effective January 1, 1969, for hospital deductible and co-insurance will be paid in full.

Due to the increasing costs mentioned above the Kentucky Conference has not had "favorable experience" in its HMEP program and will not receive the bonus refund as in previous years. This means that the conference will not be able to pay the part of the premium it had previously paid for effective ministers or lay employees.

Your Board also requests that both pastors and district superintendents make clear to the churches of the conference that item No. 12 for HMEP in the Report of the Commission on World Service and Finance is for premiums for retired ministers and widows and not to pay the one-half of the premium which employers are required to pay for employees to participate in a group insurance plan. We further request that the treasurer of the churches be advised when they have employees, either clerical or lay, for whom they should pay one-half of the premium and that the employee assume the responsibility of seeing that these amounts are paid.

#### The R. R. Rose Fund

In 1962 the Reverend R. R. Rose, a retired member of our conference, initiated the R. R. Rose Fund with the Board of Pensions. It is understood that the principal sums accumulating in this fund from gifts and/or bequests will not be expended but that the interest earned will be distributed to conference claimants each year.

A gift at Conference from Rev. Rose raises the amount to \$1,000.00. The conference is in deep debt to Brother Rose for his interest in, and support of, the pensions program of the conference and his sacrificial gifts will directly benefit the ministers and their widows and other dependents who give their lives to God through His Church throughout the years to come.

#### New Legislation

#### Personal Contribution

There have been two changes in the personal contribution annuity account as result of new legislation or General Board Policies.

1. The personal contribution and all accumulated interest of the minister may be withdrawn in lump sum by the minister upon retirement if he elects to do so.

<sup>\*</sup> Church or employer pays one-half of this amount.

T The Conference pays all of this amount for retired men.

TT The Conference pays all of this amount for widows.

This fund may be left in the MRPF and drawn as an annuity by the minister and his dependents, however. Unless the minister elects to withdraw these funds in lump sum upon retirement he will authomatically receive them as annuity.

2. A minister is now permitted to pay more than 3% of the average salary of the conference into his personal contributions account but the total accumulation in that fund is not permitted to be more than three times the average salary of the conference.

#### Retirement After 20 Years Approved Service

"Any member of the Annual Conference who has completed twenty years or more of full-time approved service prior to the opening date of the session of the conference may request the Annual Conference to place him in the retired relation with the privilege of receiving his annuity claims for the number of effective years served in the Annual Conference, payment to begin following his sixty-fifth birthday; provided that he shall have had his character passed annually since retirement." (Par. 362, Section 2, 1968 Discipline.)

#### Fifteen-year Rule for Widow's Pension Eliminated

A widow does not have to have been married to a minister for fifteen years before his retirement to receive her full pension (70% of his) upon his death. It is required that they were married before his retirement for the surviving widow to establish an annuity claim after his death.

#### Miscellaneous Information

- 1. The average salary of the Kentucky Conference for 1969 is \$6,113.00.
- 2. Each member of the conference with annuity claim upon the conference is being funded at a rate of 9% of \$6,113.00 or \$550.17 per year.
- 3. The 3% personal contribution will be \$183.39 per year or \$15.28 per month,
- 4. Personal contribution accounts and service annuity accounts are credited interest at a rate of 6%, compounded.
- 5. Disability Leave, as a conference relation, is granted by the annual conference upon joint recommendation of the Board of Ministry and the Board of Pensions. Disability Benefits for a participating member of MRPF is administered by the General Board of Pensions in accordance with regulations set forth in Section VI of the Pension Manual of The United Methodist Church.
- 6. The Conference Board of Pensions can make a much more accurate and detailed report and interpretation of financial data as a result of our switching to a calendar year basis of reporting.

#### Stabilization Fund

Following is a list of the amounts due on the Stabilization Fund which was established in our conference some years ago, as a part of the pension fund. We are showing the amount due, the interest on same, and the total.

### REPORT No. 17

### MINISTERS' RETIREMENT BROTHERHOOD

The MINISTERS RETIREMENT BROTHERHOOD continues to do all within its power to follow the purpose of its charter and to serve the pension interests of the conference

Due to the entry into the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund and the change of policy that this brought, the Brotherhood has not had the source of income that has been available in other years. However, every possible dollar has been turned over to the General Board of Pensions and the Conference Board of Pensions for use in amortizing the indebtedness of the conference, brought on by entry into the Reserve Pension Fund.

The Audited Report of our Treasurer, Mrs. V. W. Owens, is in process of preparation and will be filed with the conference secretary at the time of our annual report to the conference in June. This will show the remaining holdings of the Brotherhood, that there has been a splended return on the remaining holdings, and that every effort has been made to live up to both legal and moral responsibilities. The MINISTERS' RETIREMENT BROTHERHOOD must continue to be recognized, that those trust funds already turned over to the General Board of Pensions might not be jeopardized in any way. This follows the necessary legal procedure and the Brotherhood thus serves as Trustee of the Conference Board of Pensions.

We ask the prayers of all as we do what we can to further serve His Cause and to advance the work of the pensions in our conference.

# REPORT No. 18 CREDIT UNION

Our Credit Union is over five years old. 1968 was the most successful year in its short history. More loans were made, more people were served, and our income was the highest of any previous year. As a result of our very fine operation this year the Board of Directors voted a 6% dividend.

During the year 23 loans were made in the amount of \$7,866.75. The amount of the loans outstanding as of December 31, 1968 was \$4,942.36. There was only a small increase in the total dollar shares and this was a bit disappointing. If we had \$20,000 in shares it would not cost too much more for operation than is now required for less than \$6,000 but the income would be much greater and we would be able to serve the needs of our shareholders in ways we are unable to do at present with our limited financial resources.

I would like to remind each shareholder that he or she has life insurance in the same amount as his or her shares at no extra cost. In addition to this every loan is insured. Such benefits make buying shares in our Credit Union quite attractive. You are invited to buy more shares in our Credit Union and thus increase your savings.

I would like to invite you to use your Credit Union when you need additional funds for income tax, vacation or other things. You can be served quickly and you will be using your own money and at the same time be earning dividends. It is to your interest to use your Credit Union when you need financial help. We want to serve you and your needs. Use us!

The annual meeting of the shareholders will be held during the session of the Annual Conference, the time and place to be announced. It is very important for the members to attend.

#### REPORT No. 20

#### COMMITTEE ON KENTUCKY COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

On December 11, 1968 the Kentucky Council of Churches became 21 years old. It has literally "come of age." This is mentioned only to call attention to the fact that the Kentucky Council of Churches has long passed the stage when it was just an "experiment" in Christian unity. Through more than two decades the Council has served its member communions as an effective instrument for "doing together what can be better done cooperatively than separately." Some of its programs have been initiated and planned together by the Council's member communions. Some have been denominational programs which, through the Council, have become interdenominational programs. Then there have been other services rendered through the Council that could not have been given at all by a single communion operating alone.

Both the structure and program of the Council have varied from time to time as newer forms of ecumenical witness have evolved to meet new needs or to meet old needs in more effective ways. It is interesting to note that of four interchurch organizations that were "charter members" of the Council only one—Church Women United—remains today. It has maintained a steady growth and has done much to foster interdenominational understanding, mutual appreciation and closer fellowship among the women of the churches. It has grown because it has met a real need in providing a larger fellowship of service. The other groups—The Christian Endeavor Union, The Rural Church Fellowship and The Kentucky Sunday School Association—gave way before the advance of new programs or were unable to keep pace with the changing needs of the churches.

Through the Council the churches work together in many areas. These include such things as ministry to agricultural migrant workers, to several thousand persons in the penal, correctional, child-welfare and mental health institutions of the Commonwealth, the United Clothing Appeal, race relations, open housing legislation, Faith and Order studies, Christian Vocations, etc. The Council also serves as a clearing house for all kinds of information, requests, programs, and other matters of concern to the churches. It issues the only publication in Kentucky devoted exclusively to the ecumenical movement—THE COUNCIL COURIER.

At present plans call for such new program thrusts as Through-the-Week Christian Education, "The Crisis in the Nation," and Planning for Mission in the '70's. As new needs arise study is given to determine if they may be met more effectively by united church action. At all times the Council seeks to be alert to the challenges of a changing Church in a turbulent age.

- 3. Promise of further usefulness of the applicant to The United Methodist Church and the Kentucky Annual Conference.

Each Applicant, when granted a service loan, signs a note for the amount, plus 5%. If on completing his theological education he does not return to the Kentucky Conference for a minimum of five years, he is morally and legally obligated to repay the principal of the loan, plus 5% interest.

#### REPORT No. 22

#### MISSION FOR HEALING

The Follow-up Committee of the Kentucky Conference United Methodist Church Hospital Campaign.

We are pleased to report that to this date our Kentucky Conference has paid to the Hospital Campaign \$702,821.61. Our people have responded to this program with loyalty and devotion. Much needs to be done now and during the remaining months of 1969 to complete this campaign. It is vitally important that each church pay its pledge to the Hospital Campaign during the remaining months of 1969. Every dollar paid on a pledge is very important. This is important not only because of what your dollars will do for the hospital campaign but also because it has a direct bearing on our government aid program and any loans that the Hospitals may make to complete the building program that is now before us. The committee is pleased to make the following progress report on the building program.

Our Good Samaritan Hospital reports that: The concrete work on the foundation, ground floor and boiler-equipment area of the sub-basement has been completed; the concrete forms for the first floor columns and second floor slab are now being erected. The first pour of concrete for the second floor will be during the week of June 9; the anticipated construction timetable presently indicates the new building will be completed in December 1970, following which the remodeling of the 1954 building will be undertaken. Completion of the total project is now scheduled for mid-May 1971.

Our Methodist Hospital of Pikeville reports that on June 16, Monday, the contract will be signed for the building of our new hospital there. The cost of the construction \$6,060,000.00, then the ground breaking ceremonies will be conducted within the next two weeks in Pikeville for this great forward step in our conference and to the ministry of our church in Eastern Kentucky.

### REPORT No. 23

#### COMMITTEE ON STANDING RULES

Your Committee on Standing Rules wishes to present the following suggested changes in the Standing Rules of the Kentucky Conference:

Paragraph II—Annual Conference—Section 2—substitute "for the preceding year by January 20" for the time suggested "fifteen days preceding the meeting of the annual conference," causing the paragraph to read: "The pastors shall mail their Annual Conference reports to their respective District Superintendents for the preceding year by January 20 and World Service and Benevolences shall be remitted to the Conference Treasurer by December 31."

Paragraph II—Annual Conference—Section 7—Change numbering of Discipline paragraph 325 to 327 and the date of the DISCIPLINE to 1968.

Paragraph V—Districts—Section 15—Change numbering of Discipline paragraph to 669-670 and the date of the Discipline to 1968.

Paragraph IX—Pension Rules. Upon request of the Board of Pensions we recommend that the following be substituted for the entire paragraph with this numbering and the numbers to be changed in the remaining sections and paragraphs:

- 21. All distributable funds ordered by the conference shall be disbursed by the Conference Board of Pensions, as authorized by Paragraph 1381, Section 2, 1968 Discipline.
- 22. Membership in the Conference and Membership in the Minister's Retirement Brotherhood shall be co-existive and all members of the Conference shall be voting members of the brotherhood.
- 23. All members of the Conference under special appointment, including Conference Evanglists, who are listed for Annuity Claim upon the Conference shall pay, or have had paid in their behalf, to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Pensions an amount equal to 9% of the average salary of the Conference to establish reserve funding for that year. Special appointees who do not pay, or have not had paid in their behalf, the 9% referred to above shall be listed as "Without Annuity Credit" for each year in which said payment is not made and shall be continued as "Without Annuity Claim" for those years until the amounts in arrears, plus interest that would have accrued as computed by the General Board of Pensions, is paid.
- 24. Each agency of the Conference having a minister serving as a special appointee of the Conference shall pay to the Reserve Pension Fund an amount equal to 9% of the average salary of the Conference. Those appointees in whose behalf the above payment is not made shall be listed as being "Without Annuity Credit" for all years in which such payment is not made.
- 25. The Conference Board of Pensions shall seek the counsel and advice of the District Superintendent in determining whether or not any appointee of the Conference becomes ineligible for Annuity Credit by not fulfilling the requirements of full-time service as set forth in Paragraph 1379, Section 4, of the 1968 Discipline.

# THE REPORT OF THE JOINT DISTRIBUTING COMMITTEE TO THE TENNESSEE-KENTUCKY, HOLSTON, KENTUCKY, LOUISVILLE MEMPHIS AND TENNESSEE ANNUAL CONFERENCES

The Joint Distributing Committee, representing the several conferences concerned with the merger of the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference with the Holston, Kentucky, Louisville, Memphis and Tennessee Annual Conferences, in accordance with the authority granted in Paragraph 1383 of the 1968 Discipline of The United Methodist Church, presents herewith a report of an agreement by which the pension responsibility of Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference is allocated to the several successor Annual Conferences. This agreement is to be in full force and effect as of such date as the transfers of the churches of the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference to the several successor Annual Conferences shall have been effected.

- 1. The pension responsibility of the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference on on account of years of approved service rendered prior to the date of transfer by ministerial members, probationers, and full-time approved supply pastors thereof, as approved by the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference, is hereby accepted and approved for "annuity claim" by the successor Annual Conferences, in accordance with the following principles:
  - a. All approved service rendered while under appointment to a pastoral charge shall be accepted by the successor conference within whose geographical boundaries the charge is located.
  - b. Any approved service which was rendered while under appointment other than to a pastoral charge shall be accepted by the several Annual Conferences in proportion to the number of years of approved service rendered while under appointment to pastoral charges which will be distributed to such Annual Conference.
  - c. Any claim for supply service, which has not been approved and/or is not a part of the total distribution, shall be the responsibility of the conference in which is located the charge where such supply service was rendered.
  - d. Consecutive years of supply service in the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference together with service in a successor conference as a full-time lay pastor shall be counted as consecutive years in one conference for the purpose of qualifying such years for pension claims. (See Paragraph 1379.9, 1968 Discipline of The United Methodist Church.)
- 2. Pension responsibility of the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference on account of service rendered prior to the date of transfer shall be allocated by the Clearinghouse of the General Board of Pensions to the successor Annual Conferences in accordance with the principles set forth in Paragraph 1 of this agreement.
- The pension liability on account of years of approved service rendered to the transferred churches after the date of transfer shall be the responsibility of the successor Annual Conference in which such service is rendered.
- 4. Beginning as of July 1, 1968 the annuities payable to conference claimants on account of the pension responsibility of the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference shall be paid by the successor Annual Conferences.
- 5. Coverage for ministers and lay pastors of the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference now participating in the Death Benefit Program shall be continued at the

Tennessee-Kentucky Conference rate through May 31, 1969. Required contributions for the period from June 1, 1968 through May 31, 1969 shall be made from the assets of the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference prior to the distribution of such assets.

- 6. The pension assets of the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference remaining as of July 1, 1968 shall be distributed to the successor conferences in proportion to the pension responsibility they receive. The service annuity credits under the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, Partial Reserve Pension Fund, and Supply Reserve Pension Fund related to service in the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference shall be counted as conference pension assets and shall be distributed as Service Annuity Accounts. Any Service Annuity provided therefrom at the time of the member's retirement, may be counted as a part of the pension payable on the basis of the annuity rate of the successor conference.
- 7. Any amounts collected by the General Board of Pensions related to claims or liens filed by the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference shall be allocated to the successor conferences in accordance with the pro-rata formula used to distribute the assets of the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference.
- 8. The years of approved service rendered in the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference, prior to the date of transfer, and the pension assets of the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference, as determined by this Joint Distributing Committee, shall be allocated as follows:

The General Board of Pensions is hereby authorized and directed to put into effect the principles agreed upon by this Joint Distributing Committee and to distribute the pension assets and responsibilities of Tennessee-Kentucky Conference in accordance with the principles agreed upon by this Joint Distributing Committee.
- 10. Upon the completion of its work, this Joint Distributing Committee of the Tennessee-Kentucky, Holston, Kentucky, Louisville, Memphis, Tennessee Conferences shall be dissolved as required under Paragraph 1383 of the 1968 Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

Be it further resolved that the purchase of this property is contingent upon the approval of the Louisville Area Committee on Church and Community Development, June 24, 1969.

### **MEMOIRS**

### REV. OVERTON HOWARD CALLIS

The Reverend O. H. Callis was born November 16, 1889, in French Lick, Indiana. He was converted in the spring of 1907, at the age of 18, while attending a series of special meetings held at the Union Church of Westport, Kentucky. Shortly after this one of his best friends, "Tony" Anderson, was also converted and a year or so later found both of them studying at Asbury College where they were roommates.

The Reverend Callis was graduated from Asbury College in 1915, and in the same year married Miss Clarissa Lowry, a daughter of one of the most respected families of Wilmore. He was admitted on trial into the conference in 1917 and into full connection and ordained an Elder in 1919. From the very start he had expressed his calling to be a full-time evangelist. From 1915 to 1954 he served as an approved evangelist of this conference, conducting camp meetings and revivals in 34 states and 22 different denominations. In 1931 he was awarded the Honorary D.D. Degree from his Alma Mater. He was a member of the Board of Trustees of Asbury and Executive Committee from 1916 until 1946. He served as Secretary of both for a term and was Chairman of the Board for two years. From 1944 to 1946 he was Assistant to the President of Asbury and was elected Vice-president in 1946. During those two years Dr. Callis edited the Asbury Bulletin and the Asbury page in the Pentecostal Herald. He supervised the college radio program, "The Morning Watch," over station WHAS, Louisville. He authored a book of sermons, "Victorious and Fruitful Living," Since 1946 he has lived in Florida. In 1952 he became Associate Pastor of the First Methodist Church, West Palm Beach, Florida, in which capacity he served five years. He then served for two years as Chaplain of the Southeastern Florida State Tuberculosis Sanitorium, Lantana.

Dr. O. H. Callis had the unusual ability as an evangelist, to go into any kind of church situation and adapt himself to the spiritual needs of the people. Without compromising the truth of the Gospel and yet without offending the sensibilities of the people, he could meet them where they were and lead them to the feet of Jesus Christ. Wherever he held his meetings he left the Church stronger and better in every way.

Dr. Callis passed away on January 9, 1969 at West Palm Beach, Florida. The funeral service was conducted by the Pastor, Dr. Z. T. Johnson, and Dr. Frank Bateman Stanger, in the Wilmore United Methodist Church, with burial in the local cemetery. Brother Callis is survived by his wife and a daughter, Mrs. David Stewart, of Louisville, Kentucky. Speaking personally as one who has profited greatly by his inspiring evangelistic sermons, and his many words of advice and counsel as I began my young ministry, I know in the years to come there are multitudes of people all over the world who would want to join in saying with us, "I thank my God for every remembrance of you."

### REV. WILLIAM E. CISSNA

William Everett Cissna was born June 7, 1877, in Warrick Co., Indiana. He died December 24, 1968, at Lakeland, Florida. Funeral services were conducted at the Lakewood Park United Methodist Church, Lakeland, Florida, December 27, 1968. He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Laurel Payer, Orland, California; two grandsons, two great-grandsons; 13 nephews and 5 nieces; and 8 spiritual sons in the ministry.

By Dr. Cissna's first marriage to Maude Dial, Eby, Indiana, he had two children, Mrs. Laurel Payer, and William, a member of the Los Angeles Times Staff, who died in 1946. His second wife was the former Margaret Kahle, a National Red Cross nurse and Public Health Nurse. She died in 1963.

Brother Cissna was licensed to preach by the Evansville District of the Indiana Conference in 1905. He was admitted on trial into the Indiana Conference 1906; Admitted into Full Connection 1908; ordained Deacon in 1908; and Elder in 1910.

He received his B.D. degree from Garrett Biblical Institute and his M.A. from Northwestern University, both in 1913.

He was appointed Secretary of Religious Work of the Central YMCA at Chicago, 1913 and 1914; and Financial Secretary of Moores Hill College, 1915-17, where he assisted in the College's move from Moores Hill to Evansville, Indiana. He returned to the pastorate in 1918 and was assigned to West Washington Street Church, Indianapolis, Indiana, where he designed and built a new church.

In 1926 he transferred to the Kentucky Conference and was assigned to Trinity Church, Covington. (The writer was a member, and was inspired by Brother Cissna to enter College and Seminary in preparation for the Ministry.) He served 7 years as pastor of Epworth Church in Louisville. In 1935 he became principal of the Mission School at Henderson Settlement, and pastor of the church where he remained for 7 years. He loved mission work, the mountains, and mountain people.

He responded to the need of his country in 1942 and taught Radio Physics in Lexington, Kentucky for one year.

In 1943 he again returned to the pastorate and served Tower-Dayton; Yancey, Henderson Settlement, and Black Mountain.

He retired from the active ministry in 1949, but continued to serve as an Approved Supply, mainly in the mountain churches and mission stations. In 1955 he moved to Lakeland, Florida. Due to the diabetic condition he lost both legs, but that did not stop his activity. He spent the last 11 years in a wheelchair writing articles, songs, and carrying on a world-wide correspondence. He had written two books "The Great Physician," and "The Messiah." At the time of his death he was writing a history of his early childhood locale in Indiana.

In 1954 Evansville College conferred upon him the honorary degree of D.D.

During his ministry he built 5 churches; 2 parsonages; received over 1,000 into church membership; married over 600 couples, preached over 5,000 sermons; gave over 2,000 lectures; and served in 33 Epworth League Institutes, Christian Adventure and Training Camps as Dean, Manager and Teacher.

### REV. S. B. GODBEY

Brother Godbey was converted in the old Main Street M. E. Church during the pastorate of W. H. Davenport. He entered the M.E. Conference October 1916. He entered heartily into the work of the ministry as a pastor and he loved the work and served very faithfully for 33 years active and some fewer years as a retired supply.

### REV. J. B. KENYON

The Rev. Jay B. Kenyon was born in Britt, Iowa, on June 18, 1885. He spent his early boyhood in North Dakota, and it was there while working out on a farm one afternoon the Holy Spirit nudged him into a revival in a Methodist Church in Grand Forks, and later to Grogans Grove camp meeting, where at an altar he surrendered himself to Christ. He was graduated from Asbury College in 1913 and on August 26, 1914 was married to a fellow student, Miss Ella Dee Hinkle of Wilmore. From 1915 to 1918 served as Dean of Union College at Barbourville. He became a Deacon in the Kentucky conference in 1915, an elder two years later, and remainded active in this conference until 1950. He completed his Master's Degree from the University of Kentucky in 1926.

Dean Kenyon, as he was affectionately known to thousands of students, spent most of his life in a very unique ministry at Asbury College. He held nearly every major position of authority on the campus, such as teachers, Dean of Men, Dean of the College, and Registrar. To countless thousands of Asburians, Dean Kenyon, was literally "Mr. Asbury," the Asburian par excellence. In 1946 he was awarded the first annual "A" Award presented by the Asbury Alumni Association to outstanding graduates. In 1951 Asbury College honored him with an L.H.D. and Asbury Theological Seminary honored him with a D.D. degree. That same year he was also proclaimed "Mr. Asburian of the Last Century," and in 1956 the Alumni Association doubled the capacity of the college library and named the new addition "Kenyon Library." Twice, in 1925 and 1941, the college yearbook was dedicated to him. During the later years of

his service he wrote a 40-year history of his work with college students entitled, "Ten College Generations,"

He was president and served on the board of the Wilmore Camp meeting Association for many years. He was a leading member of the official board of the Wilmore Methodist Church where he held his membership for more than fifty years. After his retirement from Asbury College in 1958, he became Minister of Visitation of Centenary Methodist Church, Lexington, and will long be remembered by the people of Fayette County for his friendly helpfulness.

Dean Kenyon died on October 21, 1968 in a Lexington nursing home after a long illness. His funeral services were conducted in Hughes Auditorium on the Asbury campus by Dr. David Seamands and Dr. L. E. Otter. Burial was in the Wilmore Cemetery. That week a special memorial service was held in the Asbury College Chapel.

The text taken at Dean Kenyon's funeral perhaps best describes his unique qualities. I Chronicles 27:32, where we find the words describing a man who was, "a counselor, a wise man, and a scribe." He was indeed a rare combination of teacher, wise man and counselor. I suppose the memory that stands out the strongest in the minds of all us who knew him was his great ability to handle young people. Although Dean Kenyon never had the joy of having any children of his own, there are thousands of men and women around the world who are literally his sons and daughters in the gospel. There are many things that we do not know about life in heaven. We do know that there are many children and young people there. We do not know whether they continue to grow and whether they ever need a guiding hand as they mature and develop. But if they do, then one thing is sure—we can recommend to the Heavenly Administrators, Dean J. B. Kenyon, as a "teacher, wise man, and counselor."

### REV. RUBY FRANCIS OCKERMAN

Ruby Francis Ockerman was in the truest sense a good minister of the Lord Jesus Christ. Brother R. F. Ockerman, as all his friends knew him was born in Nelson County, Kentucky, on May 21, 1892. His parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Ockerman. Greens Chapel was his home church. This church has sent several young man into the ministry of our church and conference. He attended Western Teachers College and later the Bowling Green Commercial College. He taught school in Nelson County for ten years prior to his entering the ministry. He felt a divine compulsion to preach the "Good News," but he believed that this divine call was a call for preparation. He attended Asbury College and Asbury Theological Seminary. Graduating from the college with a A.B. degree and with a diploma from the Asbury Theological Seminary. Later this same seminary honored him with a Doctor of Divinity degree.

He was united in marriage to Anna Clara Sweasy. To this union the following children were born: Foster Ockerman of Lexington, Kentucky; Elbert Ockerman, Lexington, Kentucky; and a daughter Frances (Mrs. Charley Booth), Louisville, Kentucky. He had the following grandchildren: Foster, Jr., Jeff, Ann Ockerman, Ed and Laura Ockerman and Shea Booth.

He was admitted on trial in the Kentucky Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South in 1924. He was ordained deacon and received into full connection in 1926. He was ordained elder in 1928. He retired in the session of the Kentucky Conference of The Methodist Church in 1960. He served the following churches all within our own conference: Roberts Chapel, Mt. Zion-this was his first appointment in 1924. He then served the following churches: Woodlawn and Beech Fork, Stanford, Trinity Middlesboro, and Corbin First. Here he served during the time of unification and brought these two congregations together now known as the First United Methodist Church of Corbin. He then served a term as District Superintendent of the Frankfort District. This was followed by his appointment to Wilmore, then to the Bowman Memorial Church at Hazard and Ashland Centenary. He then served a term as District Superintendent for the Barbourville District. This was followed by his appointment to Park Church, Lexington. He then retired in 1960. Following the time of his retirement he served as minister of visitation of the Epworth United Methodist Church. In addition to his work as minister of visitation he taught the Home Builders Class for many years. He never ceased in his love to preach and to teach and to use every opportunity to exalt his Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. He served in this capacity in the Epworth United Methodist until his passing from the church militant to the church triumphant on October 28, 1968. Funeral services were conducted on October 30, 1968 in the Epworth United Methodist Church by the pastor, Dr. Onie U. Kays. Dr. Harold W. Dorsey brought the message in which he paid a most worthy tribute to the life and ministry of Dr. Ockerman. Interment was in the Lexington cemetery.

Brother Ockerman gave faithful and conscientious service in every church he served. He served with unswerving devotion the churches committed to his care. In his work as District Superintendent he always thought of the welfare of the churches and of his men equally. He tried and the men believed that he was always trying to be fair in his recommendations for appointments and in his appraisals of the needs of the different churches. He loved the Methodist Church with something more than ordinary devotion. He really believed that the Methodist Church was God's vehicle for the promotion of His Kingdom and he gave of himself to this without reserve. He believed in the other churches but he firmly believed also that our Methodist Church had a peculiar mission to give the Good News of the Gospel in its fullness to the people that he was called upon to serve. He was alert to the changing times. But his devotion to the Lord Jesus Christ never ceased and glowed like an incandescent light to the end. His feet were not on the soft sand but on the solid rock Christ Himself. He was in the truest sense a strong, stable solid man. His faith and his convictions never wavered. ### REV. O. W. ROBINSON

Dr. O. W. Robinson was born in Grant County, Kentucky, March 19, 1879. At the age of 21 he was serving in the Army. He was in the Spanish American War with Company "M" 2nd, Kentucky Volunteers. He was enlisted in the regular army in 1889 and served in Battery "L" 3rd Artillery in Phillippines. Later he served in Marine Corp. 1904-1907 and was in the Expeditionary Forces in Cuba 1906-1907.

Dr. Robinson started his ministry as a supply in 1917 and entered the Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1918. He became an Elder in 1920, and Deacon in 1922. He served 31 years in active ministry and one year as supply. He served such churches as Lenoxburg, Southgate, Florence, Williamstown, Grace in Newport, and served in the Ashland District one term as District Superintendent.

He married Lula Pet Morgan in 1908 and to this union were born three children: Frances, Donna and David. His wife, Lula Pet and son David preceded him in death. In 1941 he married Stella Kendall.

He was a member of Werherell Camp in Newport, Spanish-American War Veterans; Masonic Lodge, Mountain 187—Barbourville, Kentucky; Shrine K. T. and Apperson Chapter Royal Arch Masons—all in Ashland. He was a faithful worker and a help and inspiration to many ministers, as well as members.

Dr. C. Nevil White was one of the ministers who were greatly influenced by Dr. Robinson's life. Dr. White responded to the invitation given by Bishop Henderson and dedicated his life to God. While pastoring at Barbourville Dr. Robinson influenced the lives of many pupils as well as the teachers and those who were preparing for the ministry. The late Flem D. Sampson accepted Christ under the personal work of Brother Robinson. Mr. Sampson told Dr. Robinson that he would join the church after the campaign was over win or lose. After he won the governorship he kept his promise and was baptized and taken into the Methodist Church in Barbourville, Kentucky. Students, teachers, and preachers all felt that they had a personal friend in Brother Robinson.

When he retired he asked to be a member of the Southgate Quarterly Conference. After living at Lakeside and unable to attend at Southgate he requested Rev. W. E. Garriott to have his membership changed to the Asbury Church and permit him to serve as associated pastor without any remuneration. He served faithfully and enjoyed his work. He was loved by all in Lakeside and became a pastor to all regardless of their denomination. He spoke at Asbury a number of times. It was on his 90th birthday that he spoke to the mid-week services at Asbury and related his experiences and gave

his personal testimony. Many were blessed. The congregation sang "Happy Birthday" to him and presented him with a birthday cake. On the following Saturday morning he called his pastor and thanked him for the wonderful time he had and the many kindnesses shown him. He had received Birthday Greetings from all the churches he had served except one. He had received near 200 greetings.

He spoke over the phone to the pastor that this was the happiest birthday he had ever experienced and that he was very happy. He left the phone to go to the hospital room and wheel his wife into their apartment. Just as he reached the door at the room he eased to the floor and died with a smile on his face. The nurse said he did not fall and did not have a struggle. He had spoken to his pastor many times that he was ready to go and said, "I am living just a day at a time now, and am ready whenever God calls for me."

He is survived by his wife, Stella Kendall Robinson, two daughters, Mrs. Frances Simmons, Miami, Arizona, and Mrs. Donna Hill of Walnut Creek, California, six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Services were conducted at both Lakeside for all the residents of Lakeside and then at the Asbury Church. The services were conducted by Rev. William E. Garriott, assisted by Rev. Charles S. Perry, Rev. Howard Reynolds, Rev. James Stratton, Rev. C. C. Tanner and solo by Mrs. Alice Wilson a lifelong friend. Other ministers served as pallbearers: Walter W. Garriott, Larry Smith, Walter Piper, Ralph Wesley.

Dr. Robinson once lived in Corinth, Kentucky where Rev. William E. Garriott was born and first lived. Dr. Robinson was living in Highland Heights and serving as associate pastor under Rev. William E. Garriott when he passed away. They had been lifelong friends and spent many hours together.

The text, II Timothy 2:3—"Thou therefore endured hardness, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ" and a text quoted by Dr. Robinson many times. II Timothy 4:6-8—"Make full proof of thy ministry. For I am now ready to be offered and the time of my departure is at hand—I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. . . . Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day; and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."

Dr. Robinson heard the call early in life as a call of his country and answered it. Later he heard the call of His Master and responded as he entered the ministry selling all and following Christ. On March 22, 1969 he heard the final call of the Master and responded to that call with a smile on his face.

His favorite hymn was "O That Will Be Glory for Me," which was read along with the poem "My Hand in God's" as a closing of his funeral service. He was laid to rest at Corinth Cemetery.

The Reverend W. C. Stewart, son of Calvin and Alice (Gee) Stewart, was born on September 7, 1885, in Music, Carter County, Kentucky. His early years were spent in the mountains of Southeastern Kentucky and Northern Tennessee. In 1904, during a revival preached by the Reverend J. T. Martin at Grays, Kentucky, he was converted and felt that God had called him to be His minister. From 1904 to 1911 his main interest was in preparing himself to preach the Gospel. He was a student at Union College in Barbourville, Kentucky, and took correspondence courses in order to satisfy the

requirements of his higher calling. He became so proficient at Bible study that he was frequently asked to teach courses in it at various Church Institutes and Camp Meetings during his active ministry.

He was "set apart" by Bishop James W. Bashford for the office of Deacon in the Methodist Episcopal Church at Paintsville, Kentucky on September 11, 1910. On September 5, 1916, while the Kentucky Annual Conference was in session in Covington, Kentucky, he was again set apart, "... for the office of Elder ... a man who in the judgment of the Annual Conference is well-qualified for that work and is hereby recommended to all whom it may concern as a proper person to administer the Sacraments and Ordinances, and to feed the flock of Christ ...," by Bishop Frederick D. Leete, "one of the Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church." He was active in local ministerial associations and held many revivals in churches in the Corbin area. It was during a revival at London, Kentucky in 1913 that he met Ida Love Barnett and after a short engagement they were married on September 6, 1913, near Shelbyville, Kentucky.

Their first church assignment of note was to Harlan, Kentucky where their eldest daughter, Ruth Sigmon, was born. They moved in late 1915 to the Cynthiana Charge, Harrison County where their eldest son, George Harrop, and their youngest daughter, Mabel Dunn, were born. In the fall of 1918 they moved to Paintsville remaining two years during which time their youngest son, James Garland, was born.

In the fall of 1920 they moved to Augusta for a five-year stay moving again in September of 1925 to Pineville. In 1927 they moved to Louisville Wesley for a one-year stay and went on to Covington Trinity in 1928 for a four-year term. They were sent to Catlettsburg Panola Street Church in 1932. In 1937 they transferred to the Bellevue Calvary Church where they served until 1945 moving then to Harris Memorial in Stanford. In June of 1950 they transferred to Community Church in Wheelwright and remained for two years. Rev. Stewart retired from the Conference on August 31, 1952, while it was in session at Morehead.

He was assigned as Supply Pastor to the Coronado Community Church in New Smyrna Beach, Florida, in September of 1952 and remained in that capacity until his final retirement in June of 1961. His active ministry spanned 51 years of devoted and dedicated service. He continued to be active by serving as interim pastor on many occasions until his death on November 14, 1968.

### REV. CHARLES RICHARD THOMAS

C. R. Thomas was born January 19, 1882 in Hart County, Kentucky. He died on October 21, 1968 at his home in Eminence, Kentucky. The funeral service was conducted in the Eminence United Methodist Church by the pastor, Thomas F. Adams with the assistance of Dr. C. L. Cooper and Rev. J. B. Hahn. Interment was at the Resthaven Memorial Park in Louisville, Kentucky. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Emma Callis Thomas; a daughter, Mrs. Helen Davis; two sons, Charles Richard, Jr., and Harvey Dale; one sister, Mrs. Annie Miller; and two brothers, Simon and Leon.

Brother Thomas was admitted into the Kentucky Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South on September 7, 1919 and was ordained a Deacon in the Itinerant Ministry the same year. He was received into full connection in 1921 and ordained an Elder on September 9, 1923. He served pastorates at Vanceburg, Saltwell, New Castle, Morehead, Blue Diamond, Lynch, Ravenna, Warsaw, Eminence, Trimble Circuit, and Gilead-Tabor.

The Psalmist said: "The years of our life are threescore and ten or even by reason of strength, fourscore." In October, 1968, a man of strength stepped from the midst of this life into the life eternal with his redeemer.

Brother Thomas was a man of physical strength. He enjoyed remarkable health throughout the span of his 86 years, vigorous years. He never missed but one appointment in his life because of illness, a remarkable record of which few ministers can boast. In talking about this one experience he would say, "I could have gone then, but they wouldn't let me."

He always had a garden, and the year of 1968 was no exception. However, he was not able to tend to it as he always had, working like a young man. It became evident to those who knew him that he was not well, because he had let his garden go untended

He was not only a man of physical strength, but also of spiritual strength. His life reflected strength of character. It can be said without hesitation that he was a Christian Gentleman, always willing to help in any way, always looking for the good in people and reflecting it in his life.

At 86, it was hard for us to think of him as old. He had a keen sense of humor. In addition, he had an openness about him that was unusual for a man his age. Most of us get pretty well set in our ways early in life. We resist change and are not open to it. Brother Thomas was not only open to it, but often advocated it.

The angel of death lifted an aged and weary pilgrim from the infirmities of this mortal life into life immortal. We rejoice because a better tomorrow has dawned for our brother through Jesus Christ. Though we shall all miss him, and someone will have to carry on the work of God that he performed so faithfully, we rejoice and are thankful to God for his faith and for those wonderful words of Jesus: "That whosoever believeth in me shall not die, but have everlasting life."

### REV. GEORGE DAVID WALKER

Rev. George David Walker was born in Enterprise, Mississippi on February 9, 1920, the son of W. R. and Susanna McCormick Walker.

He was a third generation Methodist preacher, for his father and grandfather also traveled the itinerant road. He answered the call to the ministry very early in life and preached his first sermon at the age of ten.

He attended Jackson State College in Mississippi and Clark College in Atlanta, Georgia, where he received his B.A. degree. Later he received his B.D. degree from Gammon Theological Seminary, in the same city. He also did post-graduate work at Wesley Theological Seminary and Northwestern University.

Rev. Walker pastored the following churches in Georgia: Cedartown, Carrollton, Rome and Savannah. While in Georgia he also served as a teacher and school principal. He was the first Negro to run for Alderman in that state. He served as pastor of Wiley United Methodist Church, Chatttanooga, Tennessee for seven years before his appointment to Wesley in Lexington, Kentucky.

He was honored by his church with important positions of leadership. The 1968 Kentucky Annual Conference elected him to the office of First Vice-Chairman of the Program Council and Assistant Conference Secretary. Prior to the merger conference, he held the position of secretary for the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference.

Brother Walker often remarked, "I have a difficult time remembering when I wasn't a preacher." Though he lived only 48 years, most of those years were given

to a labor of love for his Master. He felt that Isaiah 61:1 "he hath anointed me to preach good tidings," announced the purpose of his call.

He lived the faith he proclaimed, "I live yet not I but Christ lives within me." This conviction he shared as a true proclaimer of the Word, for he believed in God's redeeming love and he witnessed broken lives made whole. People sensed in whom he believed and with the Apostle Paul he shared the truth that, "He is able to keep against that day." That day for George Walker was Friday, September 20, 1968 while actively engaged in God's work.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Cornelia Williams Walker; three daughters, Melina and Rosella of Lexington, Kentucky and Mrs. Julia Walker Maxwell of Washington, D. C., three brothers, four sisters and other relatives.

His funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon September 24, 1968 in the sanctuary of Wesley United Methodist Church, Lexington, Kentucky, Rev. A. W. Sweazy, Superintendent of the Lexington District officiated and was assisted by Bishop L. Scott Allen, Holston Area; Dr. Major J. Jones, Atlanta, Georgia; Rev. Raymond White, Chattanooga, Tennessee, and Dr. H. H. Greene, Lexington, Kentucky.

Internment was in Garden Memorial Park, Jackson, Mississippi on Wednesday, September 25, 1968.

### MRS. EARL T. CURRY

We come into this moment with emotions that are intense and varied. The wounds of grief remain deeply upon us; our whole Kentucky Conference is still in the wake of fresh sorrow growing out of the death of Norma Curry, a cherished member of the conference family. A growing awareness of the unfinished work she left behind reminds us of the greatness of our loss.

But we also feel a sense of gratitude—gratitude for the years of friendship and service we have been permitted to enjoy. We find comfort in the knowledge that as time heals over the wounds of grief, the realization and appreciation of her many contributions to the conference will add to the memory of her good life.

Norma Blanton Curry was born in Shelbyville, Kentucky, August 2, 1915, the first of two daughters of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Blanton. The family moved to Winchester, Kentucky, in her childhood and she attended Kentucky Wesleyan College. She was united in marriage to Earl T. Curry April 8, 1935. To their union were born three children.

The fabric of her adult life has been woven of the loves and the labors of being a wife, a mother and a co-worker in God's vineyard. She served with exemplary unselfishness in the parsonage, the district parsonage and in the home. The order and serenity which she created everywhere were a witness to God's grace in human life and her sincere hospitality always radiated the warming gifts of the Spirit. Privately and personally, we are all deeply grateful for having shared a part of the journey of life with Norma Curry.

But her gifts of self went far beyond the parish or the district or the home. She served all of us through her competent and dedicated leadership in the highest bodies of the Church. At great personal sacrifice she fulfilled her responsibilities to the conference by being a delegate to the historic Uniting Conference of the United Methodist Church in 1968 and in the Jurisdictional Conference soon thereafter. She was an informed, capable leader of the Women's Society of the Kentucky Conference for many years, and, even in declining health, served heroically as the president of that body until her death. The appreciation and love of United Methodist leaders from across the Church converge here in this moment as we, her conference family, hold her life and deeds in memory.

Sweazy, a long-time friend, on June 3 at the Edgington Funeral Home, Winchester, Kentucky. She was buried in Richmond, Kentucky. She is survived by her beloved husband, Dr. Earl T. Curry, Superintendent of the Maysville District; by three children, David Curry, Middlesboro, Kentucky, Mrs. James Pollock, Leominster, Mass., Mrs. Charles Feix, Cynthiana, Kentucky, by her mother, Mrs. F. D. Blanton, Winchester, Kentucky and by four grandchildren.

Upon learning the seriousness of her illness, Mrs. Curry faced death with the strength and courage that characterized her life. She was not afraid. Her faith is like a beacon that will brighten the path of all who knew and loved her. Family and friends have committed her to eternal life in God with the assurance that He who said, "I go to prepare a place for you" also said, "Well done, good and faithful servant; enter into the joys of thy Lord."

### MRS. WILLIE SHEHAN PARKER

cloth. Once they were washed downstream a mile, in a flash flood. Uncle Newell crawled out on the swimming horse's back and guided them as best he could while Aunt Betty sat on the top of the buggy seat holding the little organ to keep it dry.

In later years they were sent to the blue grass section of our state where they served many years. Aunt Betty became a licensed minister and it was said that Uncle Newell was in great demand at conference because he was such a wonderful pastor and because Aunt Betty was such an asset to the churches they pastored. She was also a beautiful housekeeper and an excellent cook. She kept ready for any occasion or situation that might arise in a minister's household. She could preach on ten minutes of the notice or cook for a houseful of ministers and singers.

She studied everything she could find that would make herself more useful to her minister husband, their congregations, and her Lord.

After thirty-two years of marriage, Uncle Newell went to Heaven. Aunt Betty carried on their work alone, as best she could, but she was really never a whole person after his death.

Her life was built around her church and she has taught many young ministers and their wives in her Sunday school classes. Missionaries have gone out from her teaching, to serve on both the foreign and home fields.

On June 2, 1969 at 6:00 a.m. she left Ironton General Hospital and went to be with her Lord and Uncle Newell.

### BISHOP WALTER CLARKE GUM

Walter Clarke Gum was born July 4, 1898 in the small village of Monterey, Virginia, and became a world figure. He was married to Mary Lucille Hendricks who was his constant source of strength and support. Their daughter, Mrs. John Wiley Mason, Jr., held a unique place in his life and love. Their four grandchildren and one great-grandchild were his delight and joy.

He was admitted to the Virginia Annual Conference in 1918, and served as pastor at South Sussex, Irvington, Chatham, South Boston, First Church—Norfolk, Monumental, Ghent, Barton Heights. In 1940, he became Superintendent of the Norfolk District, where he served for five years, then to Richmond, and a five-year pastorate at Centenary. In 1950, he became Superintendent of the Richmond District, leaving in 1956, to become pastor of Park Place, where he remained until he was elected a bishop in the Methodist Church at the Jurisdictional Conference in 1960. For four years he served as the Presiding bishop of the Louisville, Kentucky Area, returning to his beloved Virginia for his last quadrennium as an active Bishop.

At the Jurisdictional Conference in 1968, the calendar caught up with him, and retirement was his lot. Upon retirement he returned to Norfolk—among friends and family. Here he lived—loved by all. Here he died—Mourned by all.

To list all his honors alone would take many pages. To attempt an account of his accomplishments would require far more time than allotted.

These things must be said, however:

WALTER CLARKE GUM WAS A PRODUCT OF THE CHURCH. His early life was influenced by the Sunday School and the Church of his boyhood days. It was the Church that gave him his educational background at Randolph-Macon College and Emory University—schools that make no apology for their Church ties. It was the Church that gave him a pulpit in which to preach and a parish to serve.

You cannot even think of Walter Gum apart from the Church he loved and served. For 50 years he gave himself in tireless devotion as pastor, District Superintendent and Bishop. Truly, if any man was ever a product of the Church, this man was. He was a big man—big in body, big in mind, big in spirit, big in friendship and love—and the Church had all that there was of him.

WALTER CLARKE GUM WAS A GOOD WITNESS FOR THE CHURCH. There is not an area in the life of the Church that he did not touch—and help to mold.

Evangelism: If any part of the Church was dearer to his heart, this was probably it. He never ceased to be an evangelist. He never ceased to believe that persons could be changed into the image of God by faith in Christ and no one can number the vast army of people for whom this experience became personal because of Walter Gum,

Missions: You can't speak of missions in the Methodist Church, and especially in the Southeastern Jurisdiction, without having Walter Gum's name come into the conversation. As Chairman of the Committee on Missions of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, new heights in mission work were reached under his leadership. He was honored by the General Board of Missions in his election as Vice-Chairman of the National Division and Chairman of the Church Extension Section.

Education: The Church educational institutions that molded the life of Walter Gum were also molded by him. For 24 years he was a Trustee of Randolph-Macon College and for many years served as Chairman. One of the last duties he performed was the signing of the diplomas given only yesterday. He was also chairman of the Trustees at Randolph-Macon Academy.

He served as Trustee at Randolph Macon Woman's College, Virginia Wesleyan College, and Ferrum Junior College.

Walter Gum was instrumental in establishing the Alaska Methodist University and served as Trustee from its beginning.

As a testimony of his interest in and concern for education, it can be noted that honorary degrees were conferred upon him by Randolph-Macon College, Kentucky Wesleyan College, and Union College.

Truly, there was no area in the life of the church that his life did not touch.

But he was also a good witness for the Church beyond her walls. He was active in Civic Clubs, Fraternal Orders, and in all kinds of sports. As a Mason, he served as Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Virginia probably longer than any other man has ever served.

In everyday life he was a good witness for the Church and those with whom he was associated never doubted that they were in the presence of a man of God. He was never "preachy" in words, but a man who constantly marched to the sound of a different drummer.

WALTER CLARKE GUM'S LIFE IS A MESSAGE TO THE CHURCH. His was a life that was genuine. There was no pretense—no sham. He was honored in many ways but flattery never turned his head. He was in constant company with the great men of the Church, business and state—but he was at home in the humblest parsonage, vitally concerned with the smallest church, and a friend to all, high and low. He was a Bishop in The Methodist Church—but he was still WALTER GUM.

One experience will suffice. After a short stay in the hospital about the middle of May, he was released on Wednesday, May 14. He had accepted an invitation to preach for the Homecoming at Knotts Island on his District for Sunday, May 18. All counsel to the contrary, he went—and he preached. He said to me, "This is a small Church and I can't let them down. They are counting on me."

WALTER GUM's life is saying something to the Church, something we need to hear. His love, loyalty and devotion to the Church of God compels us to examine our own. Warm friendship, genuine humility, unselfish service—all these he had—and more.

All these we need-and more.

Even in death-Walter Gum's life speaks. He that hath an ear, let him hear.

### X. MISCELLANEOUS

### (A) STANDING RULES OF THE KENTUCKY CONFERENCE

### I. Rules of Order

1. The Rules of the preceding General Conference, in so far as they may apply, otherwise, Robert's Rules of Orders, revised, shall govern the procedure in the Annual Conference, except (1) that those present and voting shall be a quorum for the conference, and (2) in meetings of the boards, commissions and committees, or any other subordinate bodies of the Annual Conference, a quorum shall be those present and voting, and (3) where the Discipline provides otherwise.

### II. Annual Conference

- 2. The pastors shall mail their Annual Conference reports to their respective District Superintendents for the preceding year by January 20 and World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be remitted to the Conference Treasurer by December 31.
- 3. The pastors and official boards of local churches shall cooperate with the Bishop and District Superintendents in holding quarterly checkup meetings as soon as possible after the end of each quarter for the purpose of checking on the payments to World Service and Conference Benevolences, District Superintendents' Fund, the Episcopal Fund, the Conference Pension Fund, the Minimum Salary Fund, the Administration Funds, and the Hospital and Medical Expense Plan for the Retired Ministers and the Widows of Deceased Ministers by having all monies for these funds in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by the time of adjournment of the checkup meeting in order to be listed on the Quarterly Honor Roll. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Missionary Secretary shall be charged with the responsibility of preparing the Honor Roll each quarter.
- 4. "The program committee of the conference shall be composed of the resident bishop who shall be ex-officio chairman, the district superintendent in whose district the session of the conference is to be held, and the pastor of the church entertaining the conference or assisting with the entertainment. Any vacancy occurring between conference sessions shall be filled by the bishop and the cabinet. It shall be the duty of this committee to make a careful study of the Quadrennial Program and the program and needs of the annual conference and assign each board and committee sufficient time for presentation of these programs with the understanding that the more advantageous periods for presenting anniversary programs shall be rotated among the boards, committees, and commissions in so far as the wisdom of the committee may indicate."
- 5. The Conference Roll shall be checked by members of the Annual Conference registering their names on enrollment cards furnished by the Secretary.
- 6. The executive officers of any board of the Conference or of any Institution owned by the Conference shall have the privilege of the floor without vote, if he is not a regular member of the Conference, for the purpose of discussing any matter involving the work of his Board or Institution.
- 7. The Kentucky Annual Conference will receive for admission on trial into the Annual Conference, only those who hold the B.D. Degree; except in the case of men for whom provisions are made in Paragraph 327 of the 1968 Discipline.
- 8. The Kentucky Conference shall elect no person to more than two annual conference quadrennial boards, committees, commissions or to a combination of any two of the afore-mentioned agencies. This does not include those who are members ex-officio. The Kentucky Conference shall not elect a person to membership to the same quadrennial board, committee, or commission for longer than eight years (8); such a person may be eligible for membership after one quadrennium has passed. No person may serve as an executive officer of more than one annual conference board, committee or commission at one time.

### III. Reports of Boards

- 9. All reports of Boards, Commissions, and Committees presented to the Conference shall be in quadruplicate with one copy going to the Bishop.
- 10. All matters relating to Temperance and Public Morals shall be referred to the Board of Christian Social Concerns.
- 11. The Secretary and Treasurer of each Board, Commission, or Committee shall combine their reports so that there shall be only one report.
- 12. The first Annual Conference in each quadrennium, the existing quadrennial Boards, Commissions and Committees shall function throughout the session of the Annual Conference.

### IV. Ministerial Character

13. The Committee on Conference Relations shall inquire of each District Superintendent concerning the character of each Minister and make a report to the Annual Conference.

### V. Districts

- 14. There shall be seven districts.
- 15. A district conference may be held annually in any district at the discretion of the district superintendent of that district. Where such a conference is held, the membership shall be as set forth in paragraphs 669-670 of the 1968 Discipline, and in addition, one delegate for each 300 members of a pastoral charge or majority fraction thereof.

### VI. Committee on Nominations

16. The District Superintendents shall constitute a committee to nominate from time to time the members of the Boards, Commissions, and Standing Committees of the Conference, and determine the number of members thereof, unless such nominations and members are otherwise provided for in the Discipline.

### VII. Important Committee

- 17. There shall be a Committee on Journal which shall examine and correct the Journal and report to the Annual Conference. There shall also be a Committee on Courtesies which shall attend to all matters of Conference Courtesies.
- 18. There shall be a Quadrennial Committee on Entertainment. The committee shall study all proposals for Conference entertainment and make recommendations to the Annual Conference.

### VIII. Lay Members

- 19. The Lay Members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.
- 20. The Lay Members of the Conference Boards, Commissions, and Committees, who are not members of the Conference shall have the privilege of the floor without vote, to discuss the report of their respective Board, Commissions, or Committee.

### IX. Pension Rules

- 21. All distributable funds ordered by the conference shall be disbursed by the Conference Board of Pensions, as authorized by Paragraph 1381, Section 2, 1968 Discipline.
- 22. Membership in the Conference and Membership in the Minister's Retirement Brotherhood shall be co-existive and all members of the Conference shall be voting members of the brotherhood.
- 23. All members of the Conference under special appointment, including Conference Evangelists, who are listed for Annuity Claim upon the Conference shall pay, or have had paid in their behalf, to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Pensions an amount equal to 9% of the average salary of the Conference to establish reserve funding for that year. Special appointees who do not pay, or have not had paid in their behalf, the 9% referred to above shall be listed as "Without Annuity Credit" for each year in which said payment is not made and shall be continued as "Without Annuity Claim" for those years until the amounts in arrears, plus interest that would have accrued as computed by the General Board of Pensions, is paid.

- 24. Each agency of the Conference having a minister serving as a special appointee of the Conference shall pay to the Reserve Pension Fund an amount equal to 9% of the average salary of the Conference. Those appointees in whose behalf the above payment is not made shall be listed as being "Without Annuity Credit" for all years in which such payment is not made.
- 25. The Conference Board of Pensions shall seek the counsel and advice of the District Superintendent in determining whether or not any appointee of the Conference becomes ineligible for Annuity Credit by not fulfilling the requirements of full-time service as set forth in Paragraph 1379, Section 4, of the 1968 Discipline.

### X. Secretary, Treasurer

- 26. The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be charged with editing and publishing the Conference Journal. He is hereby authorized to contract for the printing of the Conference Journal and to draw upon the proper Treasurer for the expense of the same, as the Conference may direct from year to year.
- 27. All materials to be published in the Conference Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary within ten days after the adjournment of the Conference.
- 28. The Treasurer of the Annual Conference shall make final settlement and disburse all funds to the Treasurers of the Annual Conference Boards, Commissions, and Committees as early in the Conference session as possible and before the adjournment of the Annual Conference.

### XI. Standing Rules

29. The District Superintendents shall be the Committee on Standing Rules. Any member of the Conference desiring to amend the standing rules shall present in writing the proposed amendment to the committee for consideration and recommendation to the Conference.

### XII. World Service

- 30. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall furnish each District Superintendent, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, and the Conference Missionary Secretary before adjournment of Conference, a written statement of the apportionments to the several districts.
- 31. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall provide a contingent fund to meet any expense incurred in carrying out the necessary work of the Annual Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be authorized to disburse this fund, subject to the joint action of the Commission on World Service and Finance and the Cabinet.

### XIII. Housing Allowances

32. In order to comply with the permission in Decision 6239 of the United States Treasury Department, the Conference designates six hundred dollars of the basic salary of each District Superintendent to be set aside for housing allowance, including parsonage utilities.

### XI. PASTORAL RECORDS
