Vote On Report of Credentials Committee Indicates Taft Victory

VOTE ON REPORT OF CREDEN TIALS COMMITTEE IS VIC-TORY FOR PRESIDENT.

HADLEY IS TURNED DOWN

HIS MOTION NOT TO ALLOW CON-TESTED DELEGATES TO VOTE IS TABLED.

ROOT RULES AS EXPECTED

CHAIRMAN ALLOWS ALL EXCEPT ALABAMA REPRESENTA-TIVES TO VOTE.

Chicago, June, 21.-By a vote of 569 to 498 the republican national convention this afternoon tabled the motion of Governor Hadley of Missourl to the effect that no contested delegates should be allowed to vote upon the report of the credentials committee seating the Taft delegates from the Ninth Alabama district. The proceeding was a big victory for President Taft, as it showed for the third time his strength with the del-

The victory was complete, when, a few minutes after the completion of the ballot, the majority was adopted without a roll call.

Opening the Convention. Chairman Root announced the first business to be the report of the committee on credentials. The report recommended the seating of the Taft ing. delegates in the Ninth Alabama district. The report was presented by W. T. Dovell of Washington. The report sustained the findings of the national committee.

DEMOCRACY HAS A LONG LIFE

PARTY IS OVER 100 YEARS OLD AND HAS HELD TWENTY-ONE CONVENTIONS

Washington, June 31.-The conven tion which opens at Baltimore next Tuesday will be the twenty-first national assemblage of the democratic party, while the one now in session in Chicago is only the fiteenth republican national, gathering. But the smooratic party surpasses the republican in age more than this difference would indicate. Born in the bank controversy of 1791, christened by Jefferson, its founder, in 1792, and strengthened in the division among the people which Washington's neutrality proclamation at the beginning of the Anglo-French war in 1793 caused, the democratic party passed its centennial mark more than a de-

But the history of the party's conventions dates back only to 1832, in which year the national delegate convention method of nominating candidates for president and vice president was adopted. The first national democratic convention was held on May 12, 1832, at Baltimore, and adopted two rules which have guided the actions of all subsejuent conventions. One of these provided that the delegates, when so instructed, should cast the votes of their states as a unit, and the other that no candidate should be nominated without a twothirds' majority. Andrew Jackson was nominated for president and Martin Van Buren for vice president. They were elected.

In the convention of 1848, also in Baltimore, took place the first of the great "walk-outs" in democratic national assemblages, the others being in 1860 and 1896. The party in New York was divided into two hostile factions. The national convention attempted to patch up a truce between them by admitting the delegations which each chose, allowing each to cast half the votes. The result was that the faction whose choice was defeated indignantly withdrew from the convention. Louis Cass of Michigan was named for president and William O. Butler of Kentucky for vice president. This ticket was defeated by Taylor and Fillmore, whiga.

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

FIRST THEATER IN AMERICA

It Was in Philadelphia and Its Walls Are Only Now Crumbling Into

There is an echo of the past called up by the falling of the walls of an abandoned distillery on South street. These walls once inclosed the first theater that was erected in the United States. It was burned out some years later, but the walls have remained to

If surprise be noted over the loca tion of the theater, it is only necessary to point out that in the middle o civic spirit of the day prevented the rofanation of the city by any such institution, so it was erected outside known as Southwark. Of the troub lous history of this artistic enterprise much has been written. It is unfortu nate that records of the dramas given are not complete and that we have few contemporary criticisms from unof record that the city authorities were much shocked, that much of Soclety (with a large S) frowned on the institution, and that rogues and vagabonds were under the ban for a long

But even in that day there were those who found pleasure and profit in attending the theater. A few years who patronized the enterprise. At that day the name of Washington might have stood against the world, and many young men at least consid ered that it would do them no harm to follow their leader to the theater.

If we can believe what evidence is available, dramatic managers in those days had some Illumination and inspiration, as well as being mere purof plays was meager and not of high class, according to modern standards The theater was ill appointed and poorly lighted. 

There are bears that can swimfrom 40 to 50 kilometers without great effort.
