Tour Report Albania in Spring

## Day 1

## Wednesday 25th May

Arrive Tirana

We departed a rather drizzly Heathrow mid-afternoon. The flight was delayed by the best part of an hour but the pilot did well to catch up on some of the time so we arrived about twenty minutes late. On arrival we were warmly greeted by our excellent local guide Mirjan and our driver for the first part of the tour, the steady Zamir.

In the pleasant warmth we were driven to the very comfortable Mangalemi Hotel in historic Berat overlooking the meandering Osum River. After a late meal we retired to our rooms to prepare for our adventures over the coming days.

#### Day 2

## **Thursday 26th May**

Vile Boshtov, Fllake-Sektori Rinia Lagoon, Karavasta

On a hot and sunny day, we took a diversion from our planned itinerary to visit a site for breeding Rollers as somebody had requested to see these glamorous birds. As we arrived at Vile Boshtov we saw a singing Blackheaded Bunting on the overhead wire and not too far away also Corn Bunting, Stonechat and Crested Lark also utilising the wires. We were treated to some excellent views of a couple of Rollers but maintained a respectful distance to avoid disturbing them. Bee-eaters were also present here. A Zitting Cisticola was both seen and heard over the field.

Among the flowers by our feet were Pitch Trefoil and Purple Viper's-bugloss while Clouded Yellows and Meadow Browns flitted amongst them.

Returning to the planned schedule we headed for the saline lagoons of Karavasta where we saw about a hundred Greater Flamingos and a few rather distant Dalmatian Pelicans. Pygmy Cormorants were frequently flying over us and after eluding us while singing we eventually saw a couple of Eastern Olivaceous Warblers.

Most conspicuous amongst the insects were a couple of Green-eyed (Norfolk) Hawkers and several Cleopatras.

After a fish lunch for most of us we went to a dried-up area of saltmarsh south of Karavasta. The vegetation was dominated by *Salicornia* and in the distance there were many Collared Pratincoles mobbing a Marsh Harrier. Eventually we had many close views of these beautiful waders. The big downside of this site is that it was infested with millions of aggressive midges which left some of us covered in bites. Despite this we all enjoyed the stunning views of the pratincoles as well as our only Short-tailed Eagle of the trip and also a Montagu's Harrier.

Walking back to the bus we saw a patch of flowers containing Yellow Bartsia, Bellardia and a couple of Bug Orchids just past their best. We saw several of the attractive micro-moth, *Synaphe moldovica*.

Day 3

Friday 27th May

Vjose- Narte, Berat

To break our two-hour drive to Narte on another very warm day we stopped at a service station at Fier where we were able to observe a pair of White Storks that were nesting on a pylon behind the building. A Woodchat Shrike was also observed perched on a low wire.

As we disembarked from our bus at Narte we were thrilled to see a flock of nine Rosy Starlings fly past us and land in a bush. According to Mirjan these were the first records for this site. Gull-billed Terns were seen in flight across the road while as we walked around the dry area, we encountered both Calandra and Short-toed Larks at fairly close range.

Given the heat we took our picnic lunch in the shelter of some pines where we were able to watch Bee-eaters and overhead our first Alpine Swifts.

Unusually we didn't see any dragonflies here, but a Small Copper was new to the butterfly list.

Following lunch, we drove back along the track and made several stops to view birds. We had much closer views of both Greater Flamingos and Dalmatian Pelicans than we had yesterday. New additions today were close views of Slender-billed Gulls, Avocet and Kentish Plovers.

We arrived back to our hotel early to allow the group to freshen up before the evening cultural walk around Berat Castle which is a fortress overlooking the town and was built in the thirteenth century containing Byzantine churches and Ottoman mosques. We then completed our day with a delicious meal in a family restaurant by the castle.

Day 4

Saturday 28th May

Depart Berat, Prizren, Valbona

Having had a couple of splendid days exploring some of the lowlands it was time to head north to Valbona National Park, part of the largely limestone Dinaric Alps.

Whilst having our final Berat breakfast we saw both Grey Wagtail and a showy male Eastern Black-eared Wheatear on a neighbouring roof.

About an hour's drive north of Berat we stopped at a reservoir near Thana. The only birds seen on the water were several Great Crested Grebes and a pair of Little Grebes though we could hear a singing Nightingale and a vocal Golden Oriole in the distance.

Along the edge of the reservoir were many flowering Christ's Thorn, a shrub bedecked in yellow flowers, humming with insects. An attractive purple flowered *Clematis viticella* was scrambling through the scrub. Along the road we also saw flowering *Echium italicum* and *Teucrium capitatum*.

Roadworks in Prizren meant we were late for our lunch in a restaurant overlooking the Prizren River. The town, Kosovo's second most populous town is situated between the Sharr Mountains.

As we waited to cross the border to re-enter Albania, we saw a male Cirl Bunting sitting on a wire.

Before we reached our destination, we explored a field near Barjam Curri that had been abandoned. Along a hedge line we had excellent views of a pair of Red-backed Shrikes as well as singing Corn Bunting. A pair of Peregrines were watched flying around beyond some pylons.

The field was alive with grasshopper nymphs and we saw good numbers of Silver-studded Blues. Botanical highlights included *Anthericum ramosum* with its white starry flowers and the tongue orchid, *Serapias bergonii*.

After settling into our base for the next four nights we took a local vehicle to a restaurant down the road.

## Day 5

Sunday 29th May

Snake Meadow, Valbona

Following breakfast, we headed up into the mountains towards Snake Meadow. Initially somewhat misty and overcast we got out to observe Red-backed Shrikes. Many flowers were found here with highlights including good numbers of Burnt-tip and Green-winged Orchids as well as a single Bug Orchid. Pale Flax, Bloody Cranesbill and Wild Pansy added to the colourful palette of wildflowers.

As we moved onto our final stop the skies opened with heavy thundery rain and thick mist at times. We decided to head to our lunch stop early for shelter and were provided with a choice of Turkish coffee or herbal tea from local plants. After an hour or so chatting we were served a wonderful banquet of local delights.

Fortunately, following lunch, the rain cleared for a couple of hours with some sunny spells. We descended to get out of the mist and saw some Marsh Tits as well as the ever-present Red-backed Shrikes.

In the increasing warmth a good variety of butterflies were recorded including several Queen of Spain Fritillaries, a variety of blues including Mazarine, Little, Chequered and Amanda's and some attractive moths such as a showy Cream-spot Tiger, Speckled Yellow and a Nine-spotted.

New plants included Woodcock Orchid, Greek Hellebore, Spring Vetchling and Blue Bugle.

One of the treats of walking down was to see several adult male Eastern Green Lizards in all their fluorescent finery.

Returning to base the rain returned but stopped before we headed for our evening meal in a different restaurant.

Day 6

**Monday 30th May** 

Kukaj, Valbona

Before breakfast Mirjan had been scanning the mountainside opposite our residence and had managed to find four Chamois. With the telescope the group managed to see three adults and a young one - an excellent start to the day.

On this fine day we set off for our most challenging walk to Kukaj at over a thousand metres elevation. Several of the group opted to stay at various lower levels to avoid getting too tired.

At the start we managed several raptors with a couple of Common Buzzards and a Kestrel while a little further on a Golden Eagle surveyed its lofty kingdom as it soared.

Cuckoos were heard throughout our walk and higher up a White-backed Woodpecker was heard drumming.

Another Eastern Green Lizard was seen and Common Wall Lizards were numerous.

In this scenery the flora and the butterflies excelled. Lower down we saw masses of Bloody Cranesbill, Mountain Sainfoin, Globularia and several magnificent Wild Peonies. Hepatica leaves were seen on the woodland floor while in the alpine meadows there were Elder-flowered Orchids, Spring Gentian and some Grape Hyacinths.

Dingy Skipper was one of the most numerous butterflies and we saw many various blues including Geranium Argus ovipositing on Bloody Cranesbill, Blue Argus, Green-underside, Little, Mazarine and Chequered Blues. Higher up we encountered Berger's Clouded Yellow, Clouded Apollo and Woodland Ringlets.

Alpine Choughs were watched in the upper alpine meadows.

Many of the group that descended early had gone to a farmhouse for refreshment. Spirits there were high and one the group became "married" to a local! You had to be there to understand it!

Day 7

Tuesday 31st May

Motina Valley, Valbona

Around our breakfast outside in the warm sunshine we were again treated to sightings of Chamois. This time they were closer and more of them - about 10 individuals.

Today our vehicles took us to the Motina valley, a tributary of the Valbona River.

Butterflies were landing on the damp stones and beside a Dingy Skipper and both Mazarine and Greenunderside Blue we saw our first Yellow-banded Skipper. In the same area on our return, we also saw a Marbled Skipper. Hummingbird Hawkmoth and another obliging Nine-spotted were also noted.

A few fritillaries were seen today with Queen of Spain, Glanville, Heath and Pearl-bordered recorded.

Along the river Dipper was briefly sighted in flight as well as Grey Wagtail. The Beech woodland was fairly quiet, although Nuthatch and Marsh Tit were heard. We all heard White-backed Woodpecker and a lucky few had sightings of it.

Under the canopy, Spurge Laurel was numerous, and we saw leaves of Sowbread and a single flowering Columbine.

Herptile highlight was a Greek Slow Worm under some fallen branches.

We returned mid-afternoon for people to rest and pack for our departure tomorrow. An optional local walk was made to a pond in the woodland in the early evening. Growing on a rock opposite us was the attractive flower, Ramonda serbica.

### Day 8

## Wednesday 1st June

Leave Valbona, Koman ferry, Shkodra Tirana to London

Following an early breakfast, we departed our mountain home at 07.30 to reach the Koman Ferry. We were again blessed with fine sunny weather.

Lake Koman is a reservoir on the River Drin with also the Valbona and Shala Rivers feeding into it and is surrounded by forested gorges. The scenery along the route was spectacular.

As we boarded the ferry many House Martins seemed to be nesting on it and we watched them collecting cotton fluff from a poplar by the terminal.

Cormorants were frequently seen and a single Goosander. One of our group was lucky to spot a Blue Rock Thrush while we all saw Buzzards. Alpine Swifts were seen several times overhead but at the end of the journey we saw many at close quarters entering their breeding cave.

Our driver picked us up promptly and we set off on our journey south. A coffee stop allowed us to see some Barn Swallow nests up close on the building with hungry mouths waiting to be fed. Several Black-tailed skimmers were flying around and resting on the rocks while we observed various unidentified fish species.

Lunch was taken in the city of Shkodra, considered the capital of northern Albania and the country's fifth largest city.

Following our delicious meal, we continued to Tirana to reach the airport in very good time. Here we said goodbye to two of our group, who were staying an extra day here and to our wonderful local guide, Mirjan, who was the perfect host, entertaining the group and educating us about all things Albanian!
