Summary: It is deeply inspiring to travel through western Sichuan with some of the most spectacular country and the most species rich temperate flora in the world, and I think this year we got a good bite at the cherry. After a reconnaissance in 2007 with Adong I constructed an itinerary that would take in both mountain and forest, covering the collecting grounds of many of the great plant hunters, especially Wilson and latterly of course the Coxes, Lancaster and more recently AGS groups. It was meant to have run last year but the massive earthquake last year put paid to half the route, and political problems in the wake of the Olympics closed off much of the itinerary. We were unable to make some of the route near the Yellow River but nevertheless everything went pretty much to plan and we took in the innumerable botanical highlights from the hillsides covered in the famous Blue, Red and Yellow Meconopsis, the plethora of Rhododendron, Acer and many other woody species to the grail of *Lilium regale*.

The trip encompassed a good range of habitats with the several ascents and descents usually from around 2,000 to 4,500m, which make this part of the world so unique. In the woody wealth of Wolong, Danba and Huang Long we immersed ourselves in the breathtaking array of trees and shrubs, and from the several high passes, the flanks of the 7000m Minya Konka and the Tibetan grasslands we revelled in the masses of alpine and meadow flowers. The group had an array of botanical knowledge unusually heavily weighted in favour of woody experts, and I am deeply indebted to Philippe, Charles, Klaas and Hans for their profound knowledge. Heather, Martin and Gordon provided the Alpine enthusiasm, and Ian a Kiwi slant. Martin's passion for insects and Heather's photographic expertise added extra dimensions to the group's repertoire. We travelled in three vehicles driven by the intrepid indefatigable trio Adong, Dehun and Janchuan with Jason Lees acting as our ever resourceful and entertaining guide.

Day 1

Chengdu

The whole group arrived from Europe, various parts of China, and New Zealand, to successfully meet up in the now super modern metropolitan chaos of Chengdu and base ourselves in one of the 45 floors of the Shudu Mansion Hotel.

Sunday 21st June

Chengdu - Wolong

We headed out of the murky smog of Chengdu in our three vehicles and soon reached the mountains that start abruptly to the west. I had hoped to find Lilium sargentiae at the beginning of the Pitiao River Gorge that leads to Wolong but earthquake landslips appeared to have covered the site. We were extremely lucky to negotiate the road up to Wolong as a few days later part of it was blocked by a landslip. We made several stops before Wolong, finding our first Actinidia, Acer spp, Euptelia pleiosperma and much else. One of the stops was outside the Panda Sanctuary, which had been partially destroyed by the earthquake and the pandas evacuated.

After lunch in a Wolong eating-house we drove to the Yin Chang side valley, one of several tributaries into the Pitiao River. Walking up the gorge here we were met by a massive range of material, Hydrangea heteromalla in flower, Cledastris sinensis and Pterocarya insignis in fruit as well as a host of herbaceous plants, including several Corydalis and Pedicularis spp. The Wolong Hotel had been destroyed by the earthquake so a newly built government hotel housed most of us, but Charles, Philippe and Daphne stayed in a separate hostelry where we all had our meals, an odd arrangement but it worked ...

Day 3

Wolong

We explored the Dasheng Valley which starts at 2,800m just before just before the zigzag up to Balang Shan. Before getting there we made several finds on stops up the Pitiao Valley. The forest is fantastically rich in tree species, and it seemed that almost every adjacent plant was different. Often 3 or 4 species of Acer grow next to each other, for example Acer pectinatum in flower next to A cappadocicum and A. stachyphyllum. We were particularly excited by Tetracentrum sinensis, Salix magnifica and Tsuga dumosa with beautiful new growth, often adorned with Clematis potanini and the flashing variegated leaves of Actinidia of pilosula. The Dasheng Valley is a botanical treasure trove of herbaceous and woody plants, and we spent the rest of the day spread out along the paths down to the river. Our first Veratrum nigrum and the orchid Calanthe tricarinata were amongst the highlights in forest dominated by Abies ernestii and Betula albosinensis. Beyond a meadow of Iris chrysographes was the river adorned the by several Rhododendron species with Ligularia, Arisaema and Paris amongst the ground flora. In fact the valley really deserves several days of exploration and it was with difficult to drag ourselves away and back to road down to Wolong.

Day 4

Balang Shan Approaches

Gathering as before at the restaurant/hotel where Philippe, Daphne and Charles were staying we set off up the valley again to have a look at the higher ground towards Balang Shan. The day comprised several stops as we gained altitude. At 3,200m we found our first stand of the bright red Paeonia veitchii, and at 3,300m we stopped in one of the many glorious meadows with stacks of plants in flower, including Veratrum nigrum and V.nigrum, Primula sikkimensis and Polygonatum cirrhifolium.

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Wednesday 24th June

Tour Report

Monday 22nd June

Tuesday 23rd June

At 3,600m we climbed onto pastures above the road to discover acres covered in our first *Lilium lophophorum*, the spectacular *Cypripedium tibeticum*, and the other great feature amongst many others was purple *Omphalogramma vincaeflora*. Ian found *Rhododendron balangensiensis*, which delighted the woody men!

Finally gathered together after exploring the mountainside we carried on up the road but were stopped by road works due to a landslide. Dropping down to 3,800m with mist descending we spotted our first *Meconopsis punicea*.

Day 5

Thursday 25th June

Wolong - Baoxing

Today we left Wolong and drove up the Pitiao River for the last time but not without a special stop for *Populus sichuanensis*. Climbing up to Balang Shan we stopped again by one of the many roadwork camps to inspect *Rhododendron balangsiensis* again. We were lucky with the weather today as the pass is often covered in mist in the summer so we had superb views as we climbed the pass. At 4,150m we were stopped by groups of blue *Meconopsis* very clearly two separate species. This led to extensive exploration of the rocky slopes, which yielded a new discovery behind every boulder. As well as the alpines there were groups of rhododendron species as well.

Reaching the pass at almost 4,500m the weather was still clear and despite the altitude energetically clambered around boulders to find *Primula dryadifolia* and *P. amethystina* amongst many other alpines but sadly we didn't explore enough to find *Sausserea*, one of the grail plants. However on the way down, stopping for a group of Rhododendron we found one such, a fine group of *Paraqualegia anemonoides*. Several stops later and far from exhausting the Balang Shan area we made a start on our long journey to Baoxing. This was a journey made even longer by ubiquitous road works and it wasn't until ten or eleven that we finally reached the town, after a breathtaking drive over the 4,200m pass.

Day 6

Friday 26th June

Baoxing - Kangding

Today was a long day but we did have one botanical find in *Lilium sargentiae* growing along the road south of Baoxing. Just after Tianquan a small truck reversed into Janchuan's car. The driver's door being damaged we let the other two carry on to Kangding while Jason and I stayed behind with Janchuan, together with Ian who nobly volunteered to stay with us. This meant going back into Tianquan, so after a roadblock (incidently by some more *Lilium sargentiae!*) and some negotiations, Janchuan managed to extract damage money and we could carry on. Our day was marred further as Adong's vehicle had some problems just short of Kanding, so again we arrived rather late in the day at our hotel.

Day 7

Saturday 27th June

Kangding – Kangding Cuo

As the vehicles were being repaired we hired a mini bus and together with Dehun's car we drove up to the lake I had found two years before. I was apprehensive lest the whole place had been turned into a mine or a hotel complex.

In fact this apprehension was partially justified as much of the valley approach was being dug out to make way for hotels. A church that we had previously visited was completely gone, and meadows full of interesting material flattened. However at the head of the valley we made a stop to see what remained. The little orange Primula cockburniana was still extant and much of the other variation. Higher up little had changed and we had two splendid stops, the first with a wonderful array Rhododendron soulei in flower and an array of alpines. Higher again the splendid stand of Rheum alexandre was still there, accompanying Primulas and orchids and much else. The alpine lake at 4,000m was in mist but we spent the afternoon exploring, finding lots of blue and yellow Meconopsis and upland Rhododendron species and finally making a full kora of the lake.

Day 8

Kangding - Kangding Migu Cuo

We drove up to the entrance of the newly inaugurated Migu Cuo Park in our newly repaired vehicles. Their green buses took us up to the lake at 4,000m, and we wandered separately around the lake and in the woods and meadows beyond and noted a good range of plants, many of which we had already come across. Perhaps the richest haul of new material was in the forest lower down with several new Rhododendrons and some fine under-storey plants such as Clintonia, Smilicina and Chrysoplenium.

Day 9

Kangdang - Danba

With the road works over the Zhedou Pass and on to Xinbuqiao, mostly related to the new international airport, I considered a route to Danba up the Dadu River, however the famous pass and the first view of the Tibetan grasslands was not to be missed, and in the event was negotiated reasonably quickly. Stopping at the top we were passed by the daily enormous army convoy on its way to Tibet. Dehun led us onto a side road around the new airport and on to a back road to Tagong. This took us over fabulous moorland where we found our first Incarvillea along with Meconopsis, Lilium and Primula. The weather was being kind still and we hoped to fit in a visit to Tagong Monastery. However after stopping to buy fresh yoghurt from yak herders, a roadblock made us take a diversion and we drove on to the very Tibetan town of Bamei for lunch. Turning east from here we drove over a 4,000m pass to get fleeting views of the glaciated Zhara Mountain, making a couple of plant stops before and after the pass. After drinking tea with an old gatekeeper we started the 2,000m descent through the forested gorge to Danba. The forest was fabulously rich in tree and shrub species with plenty of woodland perennials including a sighting of Notholirion bulbiferum. Arriving in Danba we met up in our hotel and were greeted by a mass of smiling (and later dancing) Jiarong girls who placed us in our various rooms in their rambling Jiarong style building, built against rock.

Day 10

Danba

Retracing our route for a few kilometres we explored the valley Adong that I had discovered two years before. Little had changed and we followed a rough track that zigzags steeply up through forest. The valley, marked at its entrance by resplendent Koeloeteria paniculata in flower, is wonderfully species rich, with several species of Acer, Betula and Ostrya, Carpinus, Ulma, Hydrangea and Quercus all excitedly recorded.

Monday 29th June

Sunday 28th June

Tuesday 30th June

Klaas was particularly excited by a *Tetrapanax paperifera*. There were herbaceous highlights too, such as *Lilium davidii*, *Lilium duchartrei* and *Anemone hupahensis*. By afternoon we had just reached a deserted conglomeration of decaying buildings, which might have been a redundant government enterprise, when time pressed us to drive back to Danba.

Day 11

Danba - Markham

After viewing the strange Danba Towers whose origin is a mystery, even to the Jiarong themselves, we headed north to Xiaoqin, the dry valley decorated with *Incarvillea arguta* and *Ailanthus altissima*. Heading north and gaining altitude again we had lunch at the small hamlet of Mopo where we found *Clematis rehrdiana* and *Caragana* spp. Climbing again at above 3,000m we began finding alpine meadows, which although well grazed by yaks, still furnished us with *Primula, Anemone, Thalictrus, Trollius* and some *Meconopsis punicea*.

We then climbed over a well-grazed pass at 4,150m where we met a policeman and several of his mates on the zigzags on the other side. We became aware of a cavalcade of police cars behind us and an enormous armada of official vehicles surged past us and at the junction at the bottom of the valley we had to wait for the visiting government party to head off into Markham. When we got there ourselves all the major hotels were full so a police deputation took us to another place to stay instead.

Day 12

Thursday 2nd July

Markham - Hongyuan

We left Markham and going northwest gained altitude again until we emerged on the Tibetan Plateau at Shuasingsi. We made several stops and everywhere found something new to admire; *Hydrandea, Picaea,* and *Abies* forest lower down, then roadside *Thalictru., Pedicularis, Clematis* and *Sorbus* for Charles who has a particular passion for the genus. We passed the meadow where Adong and I had camped on our recce, and we found our first meadow of *Cremanthodium brunneopilosum*, a wonderful damp meadow plant still not in cultivation in Europe. The woodland meadows were also filled with *Primula, Meconopsis, Paeonia veitchii and Ajuga lupulina*.

Heading north we crossed the watershed between the Yangtze and Yellow River basins. Here there is the rather low insignificant looking pass of Chazhenliangsi. Un-dramatic it may have been, but a wonderful plant stop with the very dark maroon *Primula tangutica*, *Fritillaria unibracteata*, more *Corydalis* and so much else it was hard to drag everyone back to the vehicles. We had lunch at a tiny roadside hostelry at Anqu.

The plan then was to get to Tangke where we could have a view of the great Yellow River bend. But at the junction we were met by a police roadblock again and told we couldn't turn left for Tangke. Adong tried to pull all the strings at his command but it ended in stalemate. We were forced to go south again. At the junction hamlet of Waquie we booked into a simple hotel there, but just before taking a well-deserved refreshment we were told foreigners couldn't stay at this hotel, and so we had to go south to Hongyuan where we were booked us into a different hotel!?

Wednesday 1st July

Friday 3rd July

Day 13

Hongyuan - Juizhagou

We left the bleak town of Hongyuan, a Chinese concrete blot pasted over the original Tibetan community, and heading north again we turned right at Waqie. The high grasslands were resplendent with meadow flora of all colours; *Vicia, Hedysarum, Ajuga, Aster*, and we made several stops to relish the display. There were so many that Daphne was inspired to make everyone flower garlands. We met groups of nomad children on horseback to complete the wonderful open scenery.

At Sedi we stopped to visit the monastery and had lunch in the little Tibetan town. As we settled down to Tibetan noodles in a small hostelry, the local police again said we were not allowed, but having ordered food they let us finish our meal. Whatever tension it was that blew up last year obviously still hadn't dissipated and the authorities were still twitchy.

Regaining the main road from Rua ar Gai we stopped for wonderful stands of *Meconopsis* and *Corydalis* of every hue, *Primula tangutica* and most impressive of all *Primula orbicularis*. The road drops away from the Tibetan Plateau and we rolled into Juizhagou. I had wanted to avoid Juizhagou since, although it is spectacular and very rich in plants, it has become a tourist mecca with thousands of Chinese tourists flying in every day. But as we had been moved along and out of the Tibetan highlands I had originally wanted to explore we had to bite the bullet and join the throng.

Day 14

Juizhagou

Heather and Martin were happy to enter the maelstrom of Juizhagou Park for some photographic enterprises. The rest of us endeavoured to retrace the back road Adong and I had emerged from two years ago, which leads onto a wonderful pass back onto the plateau. We later joined the masses in Juizhagou Park, and taking the green buses up the left fork we were able to admire the vegetation in what is a spectacular place. Numerous tree species, *Acer, Betula, Abies, Sorbus* absorbed Philippe, Hans, Klaas and Charles. Lower down we circled some of the limestone pools escaping the mass of busloads of people to find *Rhododendron, Dipelta, Euonymus, Cornus* and much else.

Day 15

Juizhagou - Huanlong

We made several stops as we climbed up to the Gongganhen Pass. Woodland meadows were filled with *Primula, Anemone, Aster and Iris.* The pass itself is now heavily overgrazed but there are still good stands of *Meconopsis* and *Primula.* Climbing again to Huanlong Pass we had lunch on the high moorland where we wandered over the spectacular landscape amongst the dwarf *Rhododendron* and *Cassiope* to find *Incarvillea, Androsace, Meconopsis* and orchids such as *Galearis, Mitostigma* and the usual plethora of *Corydalis.* In thick mist near the top of the pass we had rich finds of alpine flora, *Meconopsis* in profusion, *Pinguicula, Cremanthodium* and *Lloydia.* Over the pass we dropped down to Huanlong. Although also now made into a park like Juizhagou it doesn't attract quite so many people and the service town is much smaller and easier to get along with.

Sunday 5th July

Saturday 4th July

Day 16

Huanlong Park

There are no green buses in Huanlong and one is free to wander the limestone pools more or less at will. Half the group took the cable car to the top of the valley. Although this way affords a high level walk through forest it does carry most of the bus loads of tourists, although Hans and I managed to evade guards and make a fruitful descent to the pools on our way down. At the bottom of the park are fabulous stands of Orchidaceae, *Cyprepedium, Phaius* and *Galearis*. At the central point is a Bon Monastery, which happened to be in celebration mode with the local Tibetans all taking part. At the highest pond are fabulous stands of *Meconopsis* that can be viewed best by again evading attendants!

Day 17

Dan Yun Gorge

By driving down the Dan Yun Gorge from Huanlong we had a great day taking in the forest below. The road is little used and we were able to take in the fabulous scenery on our own. Again there is a plethora of tree and shrub species, *Acer, Cornus, Cledastris, Schizandra,* and *Hydrangea* were amongst the highlights with *Magnolia officinalis* near the bottom of the gorge at the little village where we had lunch. There was also *Lilium, Epipactis* and *Calanthe* to enthuse the herbaceous and Orchid tastes. Our three vehicles headed separately back up the gorge with various individual stops and we cruised back over Huanlong Pass and down to the Min Jiang Valley and Songpan where we spent the night.

Day 18

Songpan - Monigou Park - Mao Xian

After a very brief shopping session in the walled city of Songpan, we headed a short way down the Min River before driving east to the little visited Monigou Park - another realm of limestone pools which so far doesn't attract the crowds. The clear pools fringed with great stands of *Ligularia* and *Cardamine* are a delight as are the meadows full of *Primula, Meconopsis* and various orchids with a good range of trees and shrubs to examine. We gathered by the vehicles in late afternoon for the long drive down the Min River. The previous year's earthquake had swept away much of the original road but it had been reconstructed rapidly and we experienced no more hold ups than one finds in any other part of the country. Near Maoxian where we were to stay I kept a look for the stands of *Lilum regale* that Adong and I had found two years before and I feared that the unique populations of this amazing plant may have suffered, but 20km from the city I spotted a fine stand high above us. Hans and I clambered up and took our pictures.

Day 19

Mao Xian - Chengdu

In the morning we drove out of town and found great stands of *Lilium regale* a bare 2km from the city. In full bloom this was our botanical piece de resistance. We drove back to Chengdu and because we had missed the pandas in Wolong we went to the Panda Reserve near the city which was enjoyed by everyone.
