Tour Report Menorca

Tour participants: Ian Nicholson and Martin Beaton (leaders) with 13 Naturetrek clients.

## **Summary**

This holiday looked at all aspects of wildlife on the attractive island of Menorca, focussing mainly on birds and plants, but also including butterflies and dragonflies. The weather was very kind to us, apart from the last day which was overcast and very windy, and during the course of the week we saw a good variety of wildlife, as well as touching briefly on some of the history of the island.

#### Day 1

# Friday 20th April

Our flight from Gatwick departed just about on time at 6.45am and two hours later we met Llorenc, the hotel owner, at the airport, organised the minibuses and drove the short distance to our hotel, where we met Nick and Isobel who had made their way there independently. After lunch we had a walk around the fields adjoining the hotel and along the long entrance drive. It was a warm afternoon, and not ideal for birding, but we managed to find Tawny Pipit, Common Redstart and Thekla Lark, in addition to numerous House Sparrows and Common Linnets. A few Common Nightingales and Cetti's Warblers were heard but not seen. Booted Eagles and Red Kites soared overhead, and small numbers of Barn Swallows hunted for insects over the fields. Three Hermann's Tortoises provided some variation, as did various butterflies including Swallowtail, Common Blue, Speckled Wood and Wall Brown.

Some of the group found a couple of European Hoopoes and a Woodchat Shrike a little later in the afternoon, and a Common Chiffchaff was heard briefly calling.

The hotel grounds provided a useful introduction to the island's plants. In the fields behind the hotel we found both Common Asphodel (Asphodelus aestivus) and Hollow-Leaved Asphodel (Asphodelus fistulosus) occurring along with Milk Thistle (Silybum marianum) and Boar Thistle (Galactites tomentosa) - conspicuous plants that are common on roadsides and uncultivated fields around the island. Alongside these large plants we found the delicate Annual Daisy (Bellis annua) and the oddly-shaped leaves of the small yellow Annual Hyoseris (Hyoseris scabra). Aleppo pines (Pinus halepensis) grow along the hotel track along with a variety of plants including the attractive Crown Daisy (Glebionis coronarium) and some rather old specimens of Sawfly Orchid (Ophrys tenthredinifera) and Giant Orchid (Himantoglossum robertianum)

Martin and Ian returned to the airport to collect Nora and Geri, whose flights from Amsterdam and Barcelona had been delayed by a total of almost six hours, and the group then met up at 7pm to run through the day's sightings and to talk about our plans for the next couple of days, and after an excellent evening meal accompanied by wine and beer, most people opted for an early night after a long day travelling and birding.

# Day 2

# Saturday 21st April

Some of us met up at 7am for a pre-breakfast walk along the hotel's entrance drive. It was a bright morning, although slightly chilly, but a few birds were around including two Turtle Doves, a Whinchat and a Pied Flycatcher, as well as lots of Goldfinches and Greenfinches, both of which seem to be doing very well in this area. We also found Fodder Pea (*Lathyrus annua*) and Winged Vetchling (*Lathyrus ochrus*) on the adjacent hotel

track. We returned to join the rest of the group for a substantial breakfast of assorted pastries, cheeses and meats, bread, fruit juices, coffee and tea, and having loaded the minibuses with the picnic lunches, we set off for a day in the Menorcan countryside.

Our first stop was intended to be a quick 10-minute scan over a fairly distant area of water and reedbeds, but, as is so often the case, there was so much to look at that it was over 45 minutes before we were back in the vehicles. Species of note here included about 15 Gadwall, six Garganeys, Squacco, Purple and Grey Herons, a Marsh Harrier and several Booted Eagles. A Red-rumped Swallow flew low over the water, but unfortunately was only seen by a few of the group, and it didn't return. On the hillside across the road there were Whinchats and Northern Wheatears as well as Corn Buntings (still very common in Menorca) and Sardinian Warblers. In the adjacent roadside fields we saw Purple Vipers-bugloss (Echium plantagineum) and Blue Alkanet (Anchusa azurea). At the roadside stop we found the Three-cornered Leek (Allium triquetrum) and, scrambling along the field wall, Smilax (Smilax aspera).

Somewhat reluctantly we moved on a short distance to our next destination overlooking another wetland area where there was another Marsh Harrier and several Little Egrets, and a little further on again we found around 15 Bee-eaters which were feeding on flying insects and also appeared to be prospecting a potential new breeding colony. This extensive marsh is dominated by Common Spike Rush (Eleocharius palustris) and dotted with Tamarisk (Tamarix gallica), but close to the edge of the track we found the Large-leaved Buttercup (Ranunculus macrophyllus) and the white-flowered Pond Water-crowfoot (Ranunculus peltatus), Celery-leaved Buttercup (Ranunculus sceleratus) and Three-lobed Buttercup (Ranunculus trilobus).

By now it was nearly 12.30, so we decided to have our picnic lunch, after which we had a walk down onto the beach and in the sand dunes. An Audouin's Gull was the highlight here, and we also found a couple of Chiffchaffs and Little Egrets, while two species of Terrapins were in the stream which enters the sea here. There was the native European Pond Terrapin, but also the Red-eared Terrapin which is an invader from Mexico and the southern USA. They are commonly kept as pets, but frequently escape or are deliberately released and, unfortunately, they are dominant over the native species. Attempts have been made to eradicate them, but so far there has been only limited success.

The lunch stop provided us with an opportunity to see the typical shrub community (Maquis) of the island with the Pampas-like Mauritanian Grass (*Ampelodesmos mauritanica*), Spiny Broom (*Calicotome spinosa*), Grey-leaved Cistus (*Cistus albidus*), Sage-leaved Cistus (*Cistus salvifolius*), and Phoenician Juniper (*Juniperus phoenicea*).

The sandy dunes contained a spectacular covering of Sea Chamomile (*Anthemis maritima*), along with Annual Valerian (*Centranthus calcitrapae*), Sea Bindweed (*Calystegia soldanella*) and Sea-holly (*Eryngium maritimum*) and Sea Rocket (*Cakile maritima*)

We drove next to the village of Fornells for a coffee stop, after which we visited the disused salt pans just outside the village where we found two Greenshanks, about six Kentish Plovers, which nest here, at least eight Common Sandpipers and an Avocet. The salt pans were surrounded by small salt marsh dominated by Shrubby Glasswort (*Arthrocnemum glaucum*). This was our final stop of the day, after which we returned to the hotel to relax before another excellent evening meal. Some of us walked around the hotel grounds before we ate, seeing Thekla Larks,

a Spotted Flycatcher, several Pied Flycatchers and a Hoopoe, while after dinner we heard a Scops Owl calling - as sound which was to become a regular feature each evening and early morning.

#### Day 3

# **Sunday 22nd April**

We awoke to another bright but chilly morning. The pre-breakfast walk today produced a single Turtle Dove singing on the wires adjacent to the car park, two Hoopoes and a Woodchat Shrike, but other than that it was fairly quiet. Nightingales and Cetti's Warblers sang from the dense undergrowth but didn't allow themselves to be seen.

After breakfast we set off towards Cap de Cavalleria, the most northerly point of the island. Along the way we saw several Woodchat Shrikes, Corn Buntings and Booted Eagles, and at our first stop beside the ancient Roman port at Sanitja we saw Stonechats and Tawny Pipits. Here we found Pyramidal Orchid (*Anacamptis pyramidalis*) growing amongst small shrubby plants of the endemic False Olive (*Phillyrea latifolia var rodriguezii*). We also found a Dodder (*Cuscuta epithymum*) growing on the endemic Balearic Milk-vetch (*Astragalus balearicus*) which also had the small endemic Four-leaved Bird's-foot-trefoil (*Lotus tetraphyllus*) growing up through it and a little further along the almost insignificant endemic spurge *Euphorbia maresii*.

Further on, at the picturesque inlet of Cala Viola, we were surprised by two Stone-curlews which were flushed from cover by a loose dog. Also here were several grounded migrants, including Chiffchaffs, a Common Redstart and a Wheatear. The coast here is very exposed. On the shore line we found Rock Samphire (*Crithmum maritimum*), and on the escarpment the low growing spiny bush community ('socarrall') containing the endemic Hedgehog Lettuce (*Launaea cervicornis*) and the endemic *Anthyllis hystrix*, and Evax (*Evax pygmaea*).

We decided to drive on to the lighthouse, parking just short of it; walking round the headland we found about six Blue Rock Thrushes as well as Tawny Pipits and Thekla Larks, while a flock of about 30 Ravens were a spectactular sight for some of us. Near the lighthouse we found the endemic Rodriguez's Ragwort (Senecio rodriguezii) and on the path from the the lighthouse the Balearic Foxglove (Digitalis dubia), and in the same location the endemic Smilax (Smilax aspera var. balearica), while further along the cliff we saw the spectacular Dragon Arum (Helicodoceros muscivorus (formerly Dracunculus muscivorus).

We had our picnic lunch back at the minibuses, where there were several species of butterfly to be seen, including Painted Lady, Bath White, Small Heath and Swallowtail. As it was such a fine, sunny day we decided to change the itinerary somewhat, and visit Monte Toro, the highest point on the island, this afternoon rather than later in the week when the views from the top might not be as good. En route we stopped briefly at Platja de Cavalleria to find Coris (*Coris monspeliensis*). We didn't see much in the way of bird life at Monte Toro, although a Spotted Flycatcher was good to see, but we did find Swallowtail butterflies and a few Italian Wall Lizards, and the drinks and ice creams were most welcome and, as always, the view from the summit was spectacular, taking in most of the island.

Our final stop of the day was at Cala en Porter on the south coast, where we hoped to walk the scrubby area behind the beach, but it has been fenced off since last year, presumably to protect the habitat from holidaymakers wandering in there from the beach. There was number of stems of the red Broomrape (Orobanche crinita) which we could only observe from a distance. However, we walked round another area slightly further

from the road and found Cetti's warblers, Blackcaps and a Common Sandpiper as well as a Cackling Goose (now split from Canada Goose), which has lived here with some Muscovy Ducks and Mallards of doubtful parentage for a number of years. We also had very good close views of European Pond Terrapins swimming in the clear water of the stream, and from the car park we saw a mixed flock of Common and Pallid Swifts hawking for insects amongst the buildings. Back at the hotel we had time to relax and unwind before another excellent evening meal.

#### Day 4

# **Monday 23rd April**

It was another bright, sunny morning but the pre-breakfast walk today was fairly quiet apart from a Turtle Dove and the usual chorus of Nightingales and Cetti's Warblers.

After breakfast we headed for Cala Galdana on the south coast, stopping first of all at a viewpoint just outside the resort. A male Blue Rock Thrush singing from a satellite dish on one of the houses was a bit of a surprise, but more expected were Common and Alpine Swifts hunting along the steep cliffs. As we watched, two Peregrines flew from the cliffs and one of them pursued and caught a small, unidentified wader which was flying just above the surface of the sea and took it back to the cliff where it presumably had a nest. We walked the short distance to another viewpoint which gave a spectacular view over the bay, where we saw more Common and Alpine Swifts, as well as several Pallid Swifts which entertained us for a while before we moved on. At the view points we recorded Rush-like Scorpion Vetch (Coronilla juncea) and Pale Stonecrop (Sedum sediforme).

Parking at the mouth of the Algendar Gorge just outside the resort, we walked into the gorge, seeing the House Martin colony in the limestone cliffs, numerous Greenfinches, Goldfinches and Linnets, and also admiring a Woodchat Shrike. This is often a good area for butterflies and today we found Swallowtail, Clouded Yellow, Brimstone, Small Copper and Brown Argus, amongst others. Further on in the gorge many Nightingales were singing and some of us actually managed a decent view of one, along with several Spotted Flycatchers, a Whinchat, more Alpine Swifts and four Egyptian Vultures, which nest at a colony further up the gorge. Also here we found a Copper Demoiselle and a Green-eyed Hawker dragonfly.

In the grassy areas at the entrance to the gorge we found Red Vetchling (*Lathyrus cicera*), Small Restharrow (*Ononis reclinata*) and Reversed Clover (*Trifolium resupinatum*); in damper areas False Grass-poly (*Lythrum junceum*) was growing and, in a remnant small wet area, Pond Water-crowfoot (*Ranunculus peltatus*) and the False Fox-sedge (*Carex otrubae*). Further along the track we saw the Pitch Trefoil (*Bituminaria bituminosa*), the woodland on the edge of the track contained Kermes Oak (*Quercus coccifera*) and on the track sides we found Pale Flax (*Linum bienne*) and Apple Mint (*Mentha suaveolens*).

After lunch back at the minibuses, we drove to another resort on the south coast, Son Bou, where we had a brief coffee/comfort stop before walking along a track overlooking the back of the large reedbed where we found Blue Hound's-tongue (*Cyonoglossum creticum*). At the side of a small stream we saw more Copper Demoiselles and a Keeled Skimmer, while Wood and Green Sandpipers fed on the wet fields adjacent to the reedbed, and two Glossy Ibises and a Purple Heron accompanied the Little and Cattle Egrets feeding in the margins of the open water. Also here were two Hoopoes, a Woodchat Shrike and a Northern Wheatear, plus several butterflies including Swallowtail and Cleopatra. Further along the track we found a single Carob Tree (*Ceratonia siliqua*), and

in the marshland towards the end of our walk we found Narrow-leaved Water-plantain (*Alisma lanceolatum*) and Rough-fruited Buttercup (*Ranunculus muricatus*).

#### Day 5

# **Tuesday 24th April**

Today we set off on the longest drive of the week to the headland of Punta Nati on the north-west tip of the island. Along the way we saw Booted Eagles, Red Kites and Woodchat Shrikes - all familiar sights by now - and our first brief stop was at the island's only Cattle Egret colony. It was difficult to estimate how many active nests there were, but there were around 30 Cattle Egrets present in the trees and on the ground beneath, in addition to a Glossy Ibis. We couldn't stop for long on this single-track road without disrupting the local traffic, so we moved on slowly towards the car park, having very close views of Thekla and Short-toed Larks on the roadside walls, and we saw more of these birds, along with Tawny Pipits, Blue Rock Thrushes and Wheatears as we walked out to the lighthouse. Some of the group were fortunate enough to see a Stone-curlew in flight, and most of us had good views of Egyptian Vultures. At the lighthouse we found two Audouin's Gulls and also saw an Osprey carrying off its catch of a large unidentified fish.

On the road to the lighthouse we found Squirting Cucumber (*Ecballium elaterium*), Caper (*Capparis spinosa*) and Silver Ragwort (*Senecio cineraria*), whilst on the exposed maritime headland, where *Senecio rodriguezii* seems to thrive, we also found Sea Lavender (*Limomium virgatum*), Dwarf Sea-lavender (*Limonium minutum*) and Curved Hard-grass (*Parapholis incurva*). On our way back to the vehicles we saw a small flock of five Yellow Wagtails, one of which appeared to be of the Scandinavian race *thunbergi* - known colloquially as Grey-headed Wagtail.

Lunch today was to be a barbecue provided by Llorenc at his father's house at the upper end of the Algendar Gorge. After driving along the narrow road and rough track to the car park at the top of the gorge we walked down into the gorge itself, where many Nightingales and Cetti's Warblers were singing, and we crossed the stream to the house in its superb setting. Everything was prepared for our arrival and we sat down to a variety of meats and pastries, accompanied by beer, soft drinks and water and followed by locally grown fruit. As we ate, Egyptian Vultures from the nearby colony soared overhead along with a Booted Eagle, Nightingales and a Blackcap sang and, somewhat unexpectedly, a Scops Owl was heard calling briefly in broad daylight. Lunch today, not surprisingly, took longer than usual, but eventually it was time to return up the hill to the car park, some of taking the main track while others took the steeper, narrower old path. Those following the old track were treated to some spectacular finds, including the endemics *Paeonia cambessedesii, Viola stolonifera, Sibthorpia africana, Cyclamen balearicum* and *Ononis crispa*; we also found the ferns Jersey Fern (*Anagramma leptophylla*), Irish Spleeenwort (*Aspelenium onopteris*) and Mule's Fern (*Asplenium sagittatum*).

We decided to take the old road - the Cami den Kane - back to Mahon, which is much quieter than the main road across the island, and took a drive along the side of the harbour, admiring the many luxury yachts moored here, eventually returning to the hotel just before 5pm, leaving plenty of time to relax before dinner.

## Day 6

# Wednesday 25th April

After breakfast we headed first of all towards the holiday resort of Son Parc, driving all the way through the built-up area, which was almost deserted as the main tourist season hadn't started yet, to the car park by the beach. It was warm and sunny again, so after liberal application of sun block we set off to walk through the

wooded area to a point overlooking a marshy wetland, with some open water. On the track from the car park we saw the Many-flowered Heath (*Erica multiflora*) and a single specimen of Balearic Orchid (*Ophrys balearica*). Crossing a damp area adjacent to the marsh, we found Thick-leaved Plantain (*Plantago crassifolia*).

The water level was quite high this year, with very little in the way of muddy margins, but there were plenty of birds to be seen. Three Squacco Herons flew across the water in front of us, landing in a reedy area to our right, two Purple Herons were feeding in the shallows, a female Marsh Harrier hunted over the reeds and wet grassland and three Western Swamphens (previously known as Purple Gallinule) moved in and out of view, mostly remaining hidden but occasionally allowing good views. Around 15 Red-crested Pochards were on the open water, along with two Ferruginous Ducks, which showed themselves eventually after we had almost decided that we were going to miss out on them.

As we scanned the lake a small falcon shot into view at high speed, and those who were fortunate enough to get onto it before it disappeared behind the trees recognised it as an adult male Red-footed Falcon - the first on the island this year. We also found several dragonflies and damselflies here, including Winter Damselfly, Blue-tailed Damselfly and Black-tailed Skimmer, plus various butterflies including Swallowtail, Clouded Yellow, Wall Brown and Green-veined White.

On returning to the car park we walked down onto the beach, seeing a Willow Warbler and a Tawny Pipit in the low scrub, and an Audouin's Gull on the rocks. On the short walk through the sand dunes we found the Figwort *Scrophularia ramosissima* and *Reichardia tingitana*.

We then decided that it was lunchtime, so we drove the short distance to Sa Roca, a pleasant wooded area in the centre of the island where we unpacked the picnic. During lunch we found Holly Blue and Wall Brown butterflies and two Ravens flew overhead, along with a Booted Eagle. Here, amongst the wooded slopes thick with Aleppo Pine and Tree Heather (*Erica arborea*), we found Sawfly Orchid (*Ophrys tenthredinifera*) and numbers of the spectacular Violet Limodore (*Limodorum abortivum*). After lunch we drove a little further along the road to an area where we have previously seen the parasitic plant Cytinus (*Cytinus ruber*) and we found several specimens of various sizes.

Our final stop today was at the prehistoric site of Taula de Torralba. We spent an hour or so wandering around this ancient settlement which dates back to around 1,000 BC, some of the site having been restored while other parts have been left exactly as they were abandoned.

#### Day 7

# **Thursday 26th April**

This was our last full day in Menorca, and the weather finally spoilt itself. A strong north-easterly wind had developed overnight, resulting in the pre-breakfast walk being curtailed. It remained windy and overcast all day, but we still managed a full day exploring various habitats in the north-east of the island. We drove along the back road to our first stop, the disused salt pans at Mongofre Nou.

We saw a few Corn buntings and a Whinchat on the way, but just as we reached the entrance track to Mongofre two large raptors appeared low over the roadside field. One was clearly a Red Kite, but after a few moments the

other was identified as a female Hen Harrier, which we spent a few minutes watching as it glided effortlessly low over the ground.

We parked at the end of the narrow track and set off to walk to the salt pans, having to take a diversion due to the very high water-level, and also stopping to look at the very unusual marbled patterns in the sedimentary rocks here. The high water-levels were not ideal for waders, but we found about 15 Wood Sandpipers, two Greenshanks and four Little Ringed Plovers as well as numerous Black-winged Stilts. The star turn was an Osprey which circled several times over the open water but failed to attempt to catch any of the large fish which are present here.

Beyond the initial scrub the salt pans and salt marsh are dominated by Perennial Glasswort (Sarcocornia perennis) and Sea-purslane (Halimione portulacoides). Growing on a small bluff adjacent to the track we found the Tongue Orchid (Serapias lingua) and a Toadflax Linaria aeruginea. Further along in the edge of a patch of woodland we found what appeared to be a cross between the Heart-flowered Tongue Orchid (Serapias cordigera) and Serapias nurrica. The plant looked superficially like S. nurrica but lacked the distinctive yellow margin to the lip (epichile). Further behind the marsh we also found Bumble-bee Orchid (Ophrys bombyliflora).

Next we drove out towards Cap Favaritx, stopping on the way to spend some time looking at the specialised plant community found on this exposed, windswept area. This area contains the typical 'soccoral' (the spiny dwarf bush community of the north coast) and additional plants for the week's list that we found here included Rodriguez's False Olive (*Phillyrea latifolia var. rodriguezii*) and the Spiny Clover (*Dorycnium fulgerans*). Amongst these spiny bushes we also discovered the Miniature Daisy (*Bellium bellidioides*).

After parking near the lighthouse, we walked to the edge of the low cliffs and scanned around, hoping to see some shearwaters, as the strong wind blowing directly onshore provided just the right conditions, and sure enough we saw several Scopoli's Shearwaters making their way north around the headland, and also a few smaller shearwaters, but it was impossible to determine at this distance whether they were Balearic or Yelkouan. On walking towards the lighthouse, we found the Hairy Catchfly (*Silene sedoides*), and Hairy Sea Heath (*Frankenia hirsuta*).

It was now lunchtime, but the wind was far too strong to contemplate having the picnic here, so we headed to the large nature reserve at S'Albufera des Grau, where, after a quick call at the visitor centre, we unpacked lunch. A walk around the reserve produced a few Great Crested and Little Grebes plus numerous Coots, but little else. Near the track to the fist hide we found a number of specimens of Bee Orchid (*Ophrys apifera*) and Tongue Orchid (*Serapias lingua*) and some superb specimens of the Heart-flowered Orchid. Over lunch next to our van we found the attractive Purple Vetch (*Vicia benghalensis*). We rounded off the tour by visiting the other side of the reserve, and then driving the short distance to the village of Es Grau for coffee and/or ice cream, where two Audouin's Gulls on the beach provided a fitting finale to the tour.

# Day 8 Friday 27th April

We had very little time this morning before our flights home, but a few of us saw a Turtle Dove on the wires near the car park and Nightingales entertained us while we loaded up the minibuses. It was time to say our goodbyes to Nick and Isobel who were staying on in Menorca, and to thank Llorenc for his help and hospitality, and then we were on our way to the airport. Here we said goodbye to Nora and Geri who were flying back to

the Netherlands via Barcelona. The flight back to Gatwick was uneventful and after collecting our luggage we all went our separate ways.
