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Day 1

Friday 23rd March

Overnight flight from London to Addis Ababa

Day 2

Saturday 24th March

Addis Ababa to Awash

We arrived early in Addis following an overnight flight from Heathrow. Immigration, baggage retrieval, customs and money exchange was a little slow but after a couple of hours we were on the road. Right outside the airport we saw Pied Crows and Yellow-billed Kites right outside the airport, and picked up Fiscal Shrikes, Purple Eared Starlings and Marabou Storks while we were still in the city. After about half an hour we stopped at a coffee shop overlooking Lake Hora where we added lots of interesting birds; Red-knobbed Coots, Southern Pochards, Blue-naped Mousebirds, Red-fronted Tinkerbirds, Mocking and White-winged Cliff Chats, Fan-tailed Ravens, plus many others. About an hour later we stopped for lunch in a hotel about half way to Awash. We had a very enjoyable meal and watched Black-headed Batis, Hadada Ibis, Montane White-eyes, and a pair of African Dusky Flycatchers.

En route we spotted our first mammals, a troupe of Olive Baboons, plus other roadside birds like Abyssinian and Rufous-crowned Roller, Lanner Falcon and Dark Chanting Goshawks. As we drove past Lake Basaka we added many new bird species; Pink-backed Pelican, Gull-billed Tern, Yellow-billed Stork, Anhinga, plus various Egrets. We didn't have time to stop though as we wanted to maximise our time in nearby Awash National Park, where we arrived about 3pm. Within seconds of entering we saw two Beisa Oryx (the first of many) and Salt's Dikdiks (some authorities have split this species and the form here is Harar Dikdik *Madoqua hararensis*).

We later saw a number of Soemmering's Gazelles and Warthogs, Scrub Hare, and more Olive Baboons. The birds did not disappoint either; Red-billed and Abyssinian Ground Hornbills, Chestnut-bellied Sandgrouse, Buff-crested Bustards, Go-away bird, White-breasted Scrub Robin. We arrived at the lodge around six, as most people were eager for a shower and change of clothes. We met up for lunch at 7pm before turning in.

Day 3

Sunday 25th March

Awash National Park

After a welcome night's sleep, we were about at dawn (6am) and seeing lots of good things before the 6:30 breakfast. Our first Grivet Monkey was seen in a tree, then rather spoiled the moment by sharing breakfast with us! African Fish Eagle joined the dawn chorus, along with numerous Guinea Fowl. On the river we saw Striated Herons, Hammerkop, African Pied Wagtail, and biggest of all, a Goliath Heron. They shared the river with quite a few Nile Crocodiles. Straight after breakfast we were still finding new birds around the camp; Harrier Hawk, Shikra, Madagascar Bee-eater and two beautiful Bruce's Green Pigeons.

We then set off on another "game drive" and within minutes we had seen the elusive Lesser Kudu, the first of many as it turned out. Oryx, Soemmering's Gazelles and Warthogs kept the mammal enthusiasts happy, and there were birds a plenty too. We saw Yellow-breasted Barbets, Nile Valley Sunbirds, Mouse-coloured Penduline Tit, Pygmy Falcons, Red-faced Warblers, Rosy-patched Bush Shrikes and elusive Gillet's Larks. On one of several short walks into the scrub we flushed a couple of Three-banded Coursers and eventually managed good views. We also added two more species of bustard to the list; White-bellied and Kori. Overhead were Bataleurs, Montagu's Harrier, Tawny Eagles, Ruppell's Vultures and the ever present Dark Chanting Goshawks. Unbelievably, Helga spotted a Chameleon from the bus while we had stopped to look at a Kori Bustard. On the way back we stopped to photograph some Olive Baboons with very photogenic babies.

We had lunch at noon, then a siesta until the next game drive at 4pm, although most people wandered around the camp and environs enjoying more views of the birds and mammals. For our game drive we visited the "Kudu Valley" where we saw just a single Lesser Kudu, plus a few good birds; Yellow and Red-billed Hornbills, White-browed Coucal, Yellow-throated Francolin plus a male Pallid Harrier. We then drove just north of Lake Besaka for the Hyena cave and we were not to be disappointed. As soon as we arrived we saw a Rock Hyrax but this quickly dived for cover when the noisy local children rushed to greet us. We also saw a Greyish Eagle Owl, Egyptian Vulture, Harrier-Hawk, Lanner Falcon hunting bats and a pair of Melba Finches. Then Sally spotted our first Spotted Hyena. This spooked a large troupe of Hamadryas Baboons which were welcome, if a little distant. Then about twenty Hyenas appeared from the cave and were playing around nearby. Surprisingly about 6 Warthogs also appeared from the Hyena cave. There were also hundreds and hundreds of bats emerging from the volcanic chasms in the basalt. Nobody could believe that hyenas and warthogs would tolerate each other in the same small cave.

We had a rather slow drive back through the park but we did see 5 Bat-eared Foxes, Golden Jackal, Gerbil, lots of Scrub Hares, Oryx and a few Dikdiks. Birds were good too with White-browed Scops Owl, 2 Greyish Eagle Owls, Slender-tailed Nightjar, plus a couple of Common Quail. We also saw a Scorpion. We arrived at the Lodge at 9pm for a rather late meal.

Day 4

Monday 26th March

Awash to Wendo Genet

After breakfast we headed straight off on our long drive to Wendo Genet. In the park at Awash we saw a few Lesser Kudu plus Grey-headed Batis, which was new. Not far down the road we stopped for an Abdim's Stork, but later saw several more. We also spotted a few Wattled Starlings as we passed Lake Besaka. Just before midday (beyond Nazaret) we had a coffee stop and picked up yet more birds in the gardens; Red-faced Crombec, Red-cheeked Cordon Bleu and Abyssinian White-eye. We saw a few Rock Hyraxes from the vehicle in difficult places to stop. It wasn't long before our scheduled lunch stop but en route we managed to spot a group of three Oribi, plus a single later on (some authorities have split this species and the form here is Sudan Oribi *Ourebia montana*)..

Lunch at Ziway had some bird-rich gardens with Paradise Flycatcher, Grey-headed Woodpecker and Hoopoe. After an excellent lunch we went to Lake Ziway where we saw about seven Yellow-spotted Bush Hyraxes (after a slight altercation with the "church guardian" who did not want us to cross the church land. The area was also teeming with birds; Marabous, Terns (White-winged Black and Whiskered), Squacco Herons, Yellow-billed Stork and lots of Jacanas. A Black Heron was a rare find and a treat to watch as it created an umbrella of shade to hunt fish under. A few people also saw White-faced Whistling Ducks and a Hottentot Teal. The Blue-breasted Bee-eaters were perhaps the most popular. Very distantly in the lake we could see four Hippopotamuses.

As we arrived at Wendo Genet we started to see good birds from the bus; Silvery-cheeked Hornbills and Wattled Ibises. In the hotel gardens were about ten Guereza Colobus Monkeys and lots of Grivet Monkeys. Half an hour before dark we managed to see our first Thick-billed Raven and Red-chested Sunbirds of the trip. We then had a meal in the bizarrely designed restaurant.

Day 5

Tuesday 27th March

Wendo Genet to Goba

Early birding at 6:30 for six of us, the rest spent the time pottering around the hotel watching the Colobus Monkeys. The Colobus and Grivet Monkeys also showed well. The birdwatching was amazingly productive with about fifty species seen. Highlights were probably White-cheeked Turaco, Narina Trogon, Double-toothed Barbet, Yellow-fronted Parrots, Spotted Creeper and White-headed Vulture. We then set off on the very long drive to Dinsho.

En route we saw Lesser Kestrels, White-collared Pigeons, Black-winged Plovers, Black-headed Herons plus the occasional Colobus and Baboon. Beyond the summit we pulled into a small gorge where we saw two Cape Eagle Owls and several Rock Hyrax. A small pool further on gave us our first Rouget's Rails, Blue-winged Geese and Yellow-billed Ducks. This was at the start of the Gaysay grasslands where Warthogs, Mountain Nyalas and Bohor Reedbucks were seen aplenty.

A little further on we visited the Dinsho Lodge park where our guide Abdullah led us round. This place was amazing for mammals with excellent photographic views of Mountain Nyalas, Bohor Reedbucks, Menelik's Bushbucks and Bush Duiker. We also had two sightings of a Black-backed Jackal, plus lots of Warthogs with babies.

Birds were a little thin on the ground but there were a few highlights; Chestnut-naped Francolin, Great Sparrowhawk (hunting the Francolins), White-backed Black Tit, Mountain Thrush plus the elusive Abyssinian Ground Thrush. We then set off for our hotel in Goba, stopping for an unexpected Lammergeier right out of habitat, plus Dwarf Ravens. The hotel at Goba was a great base for reaching both the Senetti Plateau and the Gaysay grasslands as it was half way between the two. The hotel must have been the best in town as Kate Adie was also staying there.

Day 6

Wednesday 28th March

Sanetti Plateau

We were excited as this was the day we were to go in search of Ethiopian Wolf. We had a 6am breakfast and were en route to the plateau by 6:45. It was rather chilly first thing and there was even frost on the ground long before we reached our highest altitude of 13,500 feet. On the way up we saw two Bushbucks, a single Mountain Nyala and a Duiker. We also stopped to look at Moorland Francolins, though Rufous napped Francolins were common. As the sun began to warm the plateau we started to see lots of Blick's Grass Rats and a few of the smaller Meadow Rats (also known as Black-clawed Brush-furred Rats *Lophuromys melanonyx*). Starck's Hares were also much in evidence. We pulled in for a comfort break where we spotted two Ethiopian Wolves! Fantastic, if a little distant and skittish... A short way further on we found three of the elusive Giant Mole Rats. Weighing about a kilogram, they resembled giant lemmings.

We continued over the plateau and found another Ethiopian Wolf, this time a little closer. It was a real privilege to see this rare Ethiopian endemic so well. Birders were kept interested too with Thekla Larks, Black-headed Siskins, Mountain Chats, Choughs, Augur Buzzards, Lanner Falcons, Steppe Eagles and Malachite Sunbird. We then continued down the escarpment at the far side for about 15km until we reached the narrow altitude zone where bamboo grows. This is the place where the rare and endangered Bale Monkey occurs. We spent nearly an hour looking for them and eventually we found a male, low down in a Bamboo thicket, plus a mother and baby that climbed higher and joined another one, so everyone managed to see them.

We then had the long ascent, but this time we saw Klipspringers (another split, these are Ethiopian Klipspringers *Oreotragus saltatrixoides*), Mountain Buzzard and an Ayre's Hawk Eagle. It wasn't long before we found a fourth Ethiopian Wolf, this time right next to the road so everyone had really good views. Merid had told us that he had missed the endemic Spot-breasted Lapwings on his last three trips because of dry conditions, but there was some water in the pools. It appeared that the Lapwings were just returning as we saw about 15 on our return journey, yet none were seen on the way out. We returned to the hotel for lunch with contented smiles.

After lunch we pottered round the hotel looking at Wattled Ibises, Baglafaecht Weavers, Groundscraper Thrushes, Mousebirds and numerous Mountain Thrushes. At 4pm we set off for the Gaysay grasslands west of Dinsho. They were teeming with wildlife; Nyalas, Reedbucks and Warthogs in particular, but Duikers were also seen. We also added Abyssinian Longclaw by a pool with Rouget's Rails and Yellow-billed Ducks. African Stonechats were also fairly common. We were intending to stay until dark, then spotlight in the remote hope of seeing a Serval. The group split and wandered around enjoying the wildlife, then Merid spotted a Serval in daylight, but only half the group were near. We kept the scope trained on it while Merid went in search of everyone.

After a very long half an hour everyone was back. Amazingly, the Serval stayed in view for an hour, but we also found another one nearby. We watched them hunting close to each other, with tails twitching like a domestic cat when they spotted some prey. Everyone had great telescope views, and we left at dusk with no real need or desire to spotlight. All agreed this was one of the best mammal days ever!

Day 7

Thursday 29th March

Goba to Lake Awassa

We set off around 7:15am in order to arrive at Awassa for lunch. Passing through the Gaysay grasslands again we saw Warthogs, Reedbucks, Nyala and a Duiker. Stopping at a small pool we saw Yellow-billed Ducks, Blue-winged Geese, Black-headed Heron and Rouget's Rail. We then continued on the long trip to Lake Awassa, arriving about 11:30. The hotel informed us that the Government had commandeered all of the rooms and there were none left for us. Merid quickly sorted things, lunching at the original hotel, birding in the grounds, while Merid arranged an alternative (as good as the original).

The hotel grounds had about 10 photogenic Colobus Monkeys, including a new born baby and two "teenagers". The birds in the hotel grounds were good too; Red-throated Wryneck, Common Wryneck, Nubian Woodpecker, Sulphur-bellied Bush Shrike, Thrush Nightingale, Paradise Flycatchers and Black-billed Woodhoopoes. On the lake at the back we saw White-backed Ducks, African Pygmy Geese, Lesser Jacana, Black Crake, Grey-headed Gulls, Gull-billed Terns plus lots of Malachite Kingfishers.

At 4pm Merid met up to take us to a spot where he had seen Clawless Otters recently, but despite waiting until dusk it failed to show. We were amply compensated by at least 11 Hippopotamuses, including two very close. Birds were quite good too; Temminck's Stints, African Snipe, Red-throated Pipits and a Blue-headed Coucal. After dusk we drove the short way to our new hotel, the Oasis.

Day 8

Friday 30th March

Lake Awassa to Addis Ababa

We tried early morning to see Otter but only managed another Hippopotamus! There were a few interesting birds; Goliath Heron, Purple Gallinule plus dozens of Black Crakes. After breakfast we visited the fish market which attracted Pelicans, Grey-headed Gulls and dozens of White-winged Black Terns. The park nearby gave us Gambian Sun Squirrels (this race is without the "diagnostic" banded tail), plus Banded Barbet and the usual marsh birds.

We then headed west to Senkelle sanctuary to look for Swayne's Hartebeest, which was situated about 8km down a maze of dusty farm tracks. As we left the cultivation and arrived in the grassland we saw large numbers of Hartebeest, plus surprisingly large numbers of Oribi too. We called at the park centre where a guide took us up a different track where we had even closer views of Hartebeest, Oribi and Warthogs. The birds were good too with Swallow-tailed Kite, Clapperton's Francolins, Lilac-breasted Rollers, Wahlberg's Eagle and Crowned Lapwings. On the way out we spotted a Secretary Bird that was stalking in grassland close to more Oribi.

We then set off on the very long drive back to Addis Ababa, arriving at our hotel after 8pm. We also encountered our first rain of the trip, with a heavy thunderstorm, thankfully only while we were driving. We also picked up a few good birds en route; Lappet-faced Vulture, Abyssinian Black Wheatear and Black-crowned Cranes.

Day 9

Saturday 31st March

Debre Lebanos Gorge

A little birding in the hotel grounds before a 7:45 departure for the 100km journey to the spectacular Debre Lebanos Gorge. We arrived mid morning and it wasn't long before we had spotted our first Geladas, always on the move, up and down the cliffs. We wandered around the clifftop and nearby Portuguese Bridge where we had excellent close views of two different troupes, each with an alpha male and many females and youngsters. Lesser males seemed to watch from the sidelines. They seemed quite unconcerned by our presence, frequently mating within a few metres of us. There were also plenty of birds, particularly birds of prey. We had at least seven good close views of Lammergeier, perhaps attracted close by some bones that Merid had tied to the cliff top.

After lunch in the clifftop restaurant we tried to find a few more specialist birds. We succeeded with Ruppell's Black Chat and White-beaked Starling but failed with Abyssinian Woodpecker. There was some compensation though, with a close perched Tawny Eagle. We pulled in a couple of times to allow everyone to photograph Geladas as a couple of us didn't venture onto the clifftop path thinking it a little steep. Geladas were a fantastic way to end a wonderful holiday.

We drove back to the hotel (stopping to buy Ethiopian Coffee en route) where we said goodbye to Merid. It was a fantastic trip with 34 different species of mammal (not including thousands of unidentified bats) and over 340 birds.

Day 10

Sunday 1st April

Arrived back early morning in the UK from Addis Ababa.
