In a departure from the past, this year's listing is smaller to allow time for attending the World Daffodil Show in Melbourne, Australia this September. To help compensate for a reduction in listings many never before offerings are provided. As they have been down for some time, the bulbs may be smaller. In addition to my new introductions, Larry Wier is introducing several of his bulbs. Larry has been breeding daffodils for almost 20 years now. He is very demanding of what he keeps so you can be sure of vigorous, quality show blooms from him. Maker's Mark 1Y-O has already won awards in Ohio. He is acquiring some of Charles Wheatley's seedling stocks and these may eventually be offered as Charles plans his retirement.

The new Fobro bulb digger was used to lift seedlings and some selected stocks in 2003 and much appreciated by all. Eventually most lifting will be mechanical but for the present, hand digging is the norm for orders.

Lastly, thanks to the urging and help of Suzy Wert, Southwestern Michigan will have its first ADS Daffodil Show on May 2, 2004. In addition to our many fine blooms, we hope to attract new members from the surrounding area that like I found the trip to other shows too early or too far. Come and see for yourself at our "Bertrand Barn".

#### INSTRUCTIONS FOR ORDERING

- 1. All orders must be received by **July 7th**. ABSOLUTELY NO LATE ORDERS ACCEPTED, because bulb digging needs to be completed by then as most of the bulbs are dug on an order basis You will receive an acknowledgment of your order as they are processed.
- 2. MINIMUM CHECK ORDER: \$10.00. Please make checks payable to: OAKWOOD DAFFODILS. MINIMUM VISA/MC ORDER: \$25.00. If you sent money for your catalog, it will be credited to your account when you place an order.
- 3. Bulbs will be shipped via UPS, unless otherwise specified, so please include your COMPLETE shipping address. Minimum shipping and handling charge for up to 12 bulbs: \$7.80 for orders placed East of the Mississippi River and \$9.50 for orders placed West of the Mississippi River. For EACH BULB in excess of 10, please add 15 cents. Overseas shipping will be billed at cost. NO SHIPPING FEE SHOULD BE ADDED FOR SEEDLINGS THAT ARE ORDERED!
- 4. Bulb shipments will hopefully be finished by the first week of September. Please specify if you require a particular shipping date.
- 5. Visitors are welcome, but please make arrangements ahead of time to avoid disappointment due to variation in bloom time or unfavorable weather.

6. You will receive information about planting and care for your bulbs with your order. Please note that they should be in a location that receives natural rainfall and that does not puddle up!

The format used in this catalog lists the Registered Daffodil name first. This is followed by the classification and color code, then the hybridizer and country of origin. After the description, the seed parent and the pollen parent are listed, then its flowering time, the order number for that variety, and then the price for each bulb.

From 2 wonderful parents comes a distinctive show flower of trumpet character. The orange color is subtle and variable. This flower has many breeding possibilities. The stems are tall and carry the well-balanced flower with excellent poise. Was Reed 81-21-1.

#### BIG MO 1Y-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The finest flower from a prolific small cross. Very smooth, large blooms verging on a subtle shade of orange as the flowers age. It has had good reviews from Ohio and New Zealand, too. Named for my father, M.O. Reed (Mo) and the greatest United States battleship, The USS Missouri. A top quality show bloom. A slower increaser than its sibling Dr. David Hough. Was Reed 83-40-1.

#### BERRIEN SPRINGS 1YYW-P (Dr. John Reed, USA)

One of the many yellow-pinks raised in 1983. This is a well-balanced and pleasingly-colored full trumpet. The petals form a double triangle and are very broad. The cylinder-shaped trumpet has a flanged rim. For show and garden. Was Reed 83-18-1.

## BUCHANAN 6Y-GWW (Dr. John Reed, USA)

From a prolific cross that gave whites, reverses or both. April Cheer has shown susceptibility to basal rot since its last digging but the rest of the selected cross is okay so far. A lovely, early bloom for show and garden. Stock is limited. Named for the Michigan town I first practiced medicine in. Was Reed 84-101-2.

## CINNAMON RING 3W-WWO (Dr. John Reed, USA)

From the same cross as My Sweetheart. Its color is more subtle and changing. At its best time the cup's rim is a shade of cinnamon. Tall stems support the lovely show blooms with overlapping petals. A slower grower. Was Reed 81-197-8

#### FLUSHER 2O-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

From my first cross to get an orange-petaled orange trumpet – two of 120 flowers showed some color in the petals. Alas, the slowest growing one was the best colored one! Of trumpet character and form, it usually has some degree of petal flush. The stems are tall but not as strong as I would like. The corona measures 30 mm and petals 36 mm (Note: most of my daffodils will grow bigger in a protected watered area. All the flowers measured here are grown in the fields) The petals have good overlap and excellent poise. I did not breed with it until I actually flowered a 10-O and expect to see its first seedlings bloom next year. Was Reed 84-79-2.

#### HALF MAGIC 3Y-GYY (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Magical flowers do appear in the beds of daffodil breeders. A number of "toned" all-yellow and reverses came from this cross. The large, smooth, over-lapping blooms are carried on tall stems. It changes from white to a pale-yellow as it ages. In a sense it is only half-magical as it does not become an intensely golden yellow. Still a lovely show flower. Named for a wonderful book from my early childhood. Was Reed 85-26-6.

#### MICHAEL'S DREAM 11aW-GPP (Dr. John Reed, USA)

A large entrancing showy pink split that goes through many color changes. It can have an iridescent mixture of green-yellow and pink color in the corona. Coveted by Mike Berrigan on his first visit to Oakwood. Stems are of average height and strong. Stock is small. Was Reed 84-121-1.

## MOBY DICK 11aW-GWW (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Colblanc was the best all-white split that I got from Gerritsen but it was not very tall. This one is . Not the ultimate but a really big imposing show flower on a tall, strong stem with great poise. Lots of substance, too. Admired when it won its single bloom class at the 2002 National Show. Slower grower. Was Reed 84-140-1.

#### PAWATING 4W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Many crosses were made with Spun Honey here because of its vigor and fertile stigma. This is the best bicolor raised from it with a strong stem inherited from Camelot. For show and garden. Named for the hospital in Niles, Michigan where I practiced before. It is also the Indian name for the river crossing adjacent to the hospital. Was Reed 83-70-3.

## RIGHT STUFF 6Y-O (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The first of this prolific cross to be named. They usually flower so early that most years would result in frost/freeze damage making selection difficult. The stems are short and strong support a well-chiseled cyclamineus bloom that is well colored. The corona is a little stubby but the petals are smooth and, eventually sweep back nicely. The name was prompted by Steve Vinisky's comment on a bulb sent him several years ago. It has the "right stuff" as our astronauts had. Hence, the name. Was Reed 84-117-3. Stock is small.

## WILLIAMS GLEN 2W-GWW (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Williamsburg 2W-W was beautiful at the 1983 National Show (in Williamsburg!) Bill Pannill let me have the pollen and it was put on Misty Glen when I got back home. Hence, the name. This is a most distinctive white with great substance. A slow grower but the smooth, white wide petals supported with great poise on strong stems are worth waiting for. Definitely for exhibition but has staying power in the garden. Was Reed 83-60-1.

#### ANIMAL CRACKERS 2YYW-WWY (Larry Wier, USA)

This name was chosen from the Marx Brothers as only they would mix sweets and liquor, the parents of this beautiful bloom. The perianth segments are very round and large. The medium sized cup expands slightly to the mouth where it is flanged. As with most reverses, it opens all yellow and takes time to mature with the small yellow rim. A show flower. Was seedling 88-2. Resists rot well so far.

## CORAL JUNGLE 2W-P (Larry Wier, USA)

The intense coral-pink corona is the most distinctive feature of this unique bloom. We have never seen any others like it. The pleasing corona expands slightly to a small flange at the rim. The perianth segments are rounded with good overlap and a clear white contrasting to the bright corona. Despite Magician as a parent and a beautiful down under pink trumpet from Mr. Best, there has not been any rot even in heavy clay soil. Was seedling 90-1.

MAKERS MARK 1Y-O (Larry Wier, USA) Registration pending.

This is Larry's most successful cross so far to get a better colored show flower here in the orange trumpets. The strong yellow color of the overlapping perianth is a good foil to the cylindrical shaped corona with little expansion of the trumpet. The perianth is not starry nor widely overlapping but very pleasing. The stems are tall and strong with bulbs having good increase. Breeding both 1 and 2 Y-Os. Show winner already in its class. Was Wier 87-1.

This is a sibling to Dayton Lake. The petals are not as wide but they are smoother with a flat perianth and almost no incurving of the petals. Very consistent and healthy. It should be a good show flower. Named for a lake just east of Niles, MI. Was Reed seedling 79-165-2.

BLACKSTONE 2W-PPR (Dr. John Reed, USA)

In the tradition of Magician this flower is named for a great magician. Combining the better qualities of both parents its corona is well colored (a bright shade of red), slightly longer than average. The white petals overlap and the stem is strong and of medium length. While not of the highest show caliber its value is more as a breeder. Was Reed 83-68-2.

A large bloom carried on strong stems with a deep pure pink cup and very white, wide petals that can go wingy if left on the plant too long. At its best, it gives beautiful superb show blooms and should be a good breeder, too. Admired by Brian Duncan when he visited here in 1991. Makes large bulbs. Parent of my most impressive pink to date. Formerly Reed 79-65-1. Slow grower.

The petals overlap well but are a bit rough and the stems arch as it ages. Healthy and a good grower/seeder. The seed parent of my best colored 1W-O to date. Smaller blooms will measure division one. Was Reed 80-129-1.

## CASSOPOLIS 2Y-R (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is a well-engineered daffodil with an exemplary smooth very flat wide perianth supported by a strong stem and neck. A row of blooms is almost military like in their bearing. Alas the deep colored cylinder-like cup burns easily and needs protection for show. Named for a local Michigan town where I have purchased my Ford trucks. Was Reed seedling 82-200-3.

#### CASTLE REGIMENT 2W-Y (Dr. John Reed, USA)

From a cross designed to breed 1W-Os this outstanding and different looking flower was kept. Its size and perianth were inherited from its trumpet parent and smoothness, poise and color intensity (?) from the large cup parent. (Perianth segments 40mm and cup 25 mm) The shortened wide trumpet like cup is a dark golden yellow verging on orange. Registered now, was Reed 79-122-1.

#### CHAR 2YYW-YRR (Dr. John Reed, USA)

Named for a remarkable nurse who alas did not get to see the bulb I planted for her before she passed away. After years of battling lung cancer, she lost the fight. A remarkable short, smaller flower, possibly of intermediate size but a bit rough for showing. The colors are most intense. The white halo is suffused with a red cast. Strong stems and necks with excellent poise. I have seen nothing else like it. Was Reed 81-162-1.

A most striking flower for the garden and breeding. An intense red tubular corona sports an intense very white perianth. While the petals overlap, they are narrow and some color bleeds into the perianth. It may be of value in breeding red-pink perianths. Color fast. Was Reed 83-28-1.

# CHICAGO HOPE 1Y-GYY (Dr. John Reed, USA)

The name says it all. Besides using the famous TV show's title, I had hoped that it would win the Rose Ribbon when shown some years ago in Chicago. But that honor went to a sibling of Haunting. It is a well-balanced, medium sized, smooth yellow trumpet capable of giving superb blooms. The smooth overlapping wide petals were inherited from Dream Prince and the vigor imparted from Golden Jewel. Was Reed 85-7-2.

CHICKEN HILL 1Y-W (Dr. John Reed, USA) This is a most elegant looking tall yellow trumpet that slowly reverses here. Admired by David Jackson when he visited here in 1987. 1001 bulbs were lined out from this cross and eventually 100+ were selected and by the process of basal rot only 12 clones have survived. Obviously this is very rot resistant here. It has an excellent long stem with a short neck that displays the long lasting blooms. Regina Keightley who lives on Nantucket Island chose this outrageous name. The section that she lives on was originally called Chicken Hill. It won a blue ribbon for a "Vase of 3" stems for her. It is breeding very smooth offspring. Formerly Reed 79-1-1.

## CINCO DE MAYO 2W-GPP (Dr. John Reed, USA)

This is a grand flower. It blooms late when most daffodils are going down. A large smooth flat white perianth is a perfect foil for the pleasing pink colored trumpet-shaped cup. Tall strong stems support flowers that face up and are most impressive looking. It is usually in bloom by the 5<sup>th</sup> of May, hence the name, which is also the Mexican holiday celebrating their victory over France in 1862. Formerly Reed Seedling 81-1-1

## COLIN'S JOY 2W-WR (Colin Crotty, NZ)

This is the first of Colin's daffodils to be registered by him and the first to be offered in the United States. We have imported over 100 different cultivars so far from Colin to Oakwood. The circular, bowl-shaped cup sports and intense red rim. The flower is of excellent show quality and is held on tall, strong stems with excellent poise. Only a limited number this year.

Dave Karnstedt is very fussy about the daffodils that he likes. They need to point high and be aesthetically beautiful. In other words, approaching perfection! I wish it was more highly colored and have bred it with Burning Bush in hopes of that end. A very high quality show flower. Was Reed 84-142-1.

From an early cross to improve Festivity, this selection was kept. Almost every bloom can go to show. The strong stem has a short neck with upward poise that displays a white perianth, which is very flat and smooth with no incurving. The pleasing mid-yellow cup does not stain the perianth. Fertile both ways. Can be unbelievably good in some years. Was Reed 79-165-1.

Selected from a small but potent cross that yielded outstanding deeply colored yellow trumpets. Three selections have been named for men that I admire. Tall, strong stems with excellent necks and poise support deeply colored blooms with great substance and excellent petal overlap. The foliage is a deep green and vigorous, even into the summer. A grand daffodil for the garden and show. Named for the best physician I have worked with who also is tall, strong and outstanding. Was Reed 83-40-2. Hough is pronounced "Huff".

The color is variable and the cup is not long as were many 6's then, but the flower and its habit are small. The reflex can be variable too. A slow increaser so far. Other selections are taller and more colored. Was Reed seedling 81-23-1.

The cup is about 30 mm long and the perianth 35mm. In the tradition of its pollen parent, a composers name was chosen. This time an American. Formerly Reed 80-129-5

This is the most distinctive flower from a very prolific cross. The large dish like cup is usually a strong strawberry color. Occasionally small white flecks are seen on its rim. Crossed with 11Y-Ps, it has given my best second-generation 11Y-P to date. Excellent stem, neck, overlapping perianth. Was Reed 81-45-1.

# ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY'S

SYSTEM OF DAFFODIL CLASSIFICATION

The classification of daffodils has changed many times over the years. The present system combines the RHS classification of thirteen divisions based on form and species heritage with Dr. Throckmorton's color coding from the American Daffodil Society. This combined system gives us a very useful tool for describing daffodils quickly. A single letter denotes a color and its appropriate location as found in the flower, first in the perianth and then in the corona. W=White Y=Yellow G=Green O=Orange R=Red P=Pink For example: Arctic Gold is classified as a 1Y-Y. It is a trumpet daffodil with yellow petals and a yellow corona. Misty Glen is classified as a 2W-GWW. It is a large-cupped daffodil with white petals and a green-eyed white cup. First Born is a cyclamineus hybrid with swept-back, yellow petals and the corona has a greenish eye with a small transition of light yellow going to a deep pink color extending to the edge of the cup. In otherwords, it is a 6Y-GYP.

Division 1	Trumpet Daffodils: The trumpet (corona) is equal to, or longer than, the petal (perianth) segments.			
Division 2	Large Cup: The cup (corona) is less than the length of the petals (perianth) but more than a third.			
Division 3	Small Cup: The cup (corona) is equal to, or less than a third, of the petal (perianth) length.			
Division 4	Double Daffodils: This division is for all forms of double flowers.			
Division 5	Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with N. triandrus characteristics.			
Division 6	Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with N. cyclamineus characteristics.			
Division 7	Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with N. jonquilla characteristics.			
Division 8	Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with N. tazetta characteristics. The stems usually will have multiple flowers.			
Division 9	Hybrid Daffodils that predominate with N. poeticus characteristics.			
Division 10	All Species and Wild forms.			

Division 11	Daffodils with the cup (corona) that is split for more than a half of its length. This division has two subdivisions:
Division 11a	Collar Daffodils have the corona segments parallel to the perianth segments.
Division 11b	Papillon Daffodils have the corona segments project outwards from the perianth segments, usually in a whorl-shaped arrangement.
Division 12	Daffodils that cannot be classified within the preceding divisions.
Division 13	Daffodils distinguished solely by botanical name.
