## Daffodilis introduced or in gardens prior to 1940.

An Aid to Identification


## DAFFODIL TERMS

| Narcissus | the botanical name for ALL daffodils (all daffodils are the genus Narcissus) |
| :--- | :--- |
| Daffodil | the common name for ALL members of the genus Narcissus |
| Jonquil | a type of daffodil; members of the wild $N$. jonquilla group, plus all hybrids <br> that are descended from them and have the typical characteristics of the <br> group |
| Hybrid | this can mean either a wild hybrid or one of garden origin (intentional or <br> accidental) |
| Cultivar | a cultivated variety, or hybrid of garden origin, one that was created <br> intentionally. These must have non-Latin names and are always shown <br> with single quotation marks. |
| Species | a daffodil occurring naturally in the wild, or a wild hybrid. <br> These names are always in Latin, without quotes, and are written in italics |
| Perianth | the 3 front petals and the 3 back petals of the flower. (The back petals are <br> really sepals.) |
| Cup, Corona, | words used to describe the length or type of the cup, depending on the <br> division. All refer to the same part of the flower. |

## To begin your search,

## first look at the form of your flower.

Daffodils are divided into thirteen divisions based on form, as the next slides will indicate. A series of letters follows the division number. These give an indication of the color of the flower.

Letters used are W, White or whitish; Y, yellow; G, green; P, pink; O, orange; R, red.

The division number comes first, followed by the color of the perianth, then a hyphen, followed by the color(s) of the cup going out from the center.

## To begin your search,

first look at the form of your flower. (continued)

Division 1, Trumpet Daffodils
trumpet as long or longer than the petals
Division 2, Large-cupped Daffodils
cup more than $1 / 3$ but less than the length of the petals
Division 3, Small-cupped Daffodils
cup not more than $1 / 3$ the length of the petals
Division 4, Double Daffodils
doubling in either the petals or cup

## To begin your search,

first look at the form of your flower. (continued)

Division 5, Triandrus Daffodils blooms hang like bells
Division 6, Cyclamineus Daffodils
flowers have a windswept appearance
Division 7, J onquilla Daffodils
several smaller flowers with flat petals
Division 8, Tazetta Daffodils
clusters of florets, usually between 3 and 20

## To begin your search,

first look at the form of your flower. (continued)

Division 9, Poeticus Daffodils
very white petals, small disc cup, usually with green eye
Division 10, Bulbocodium Daffodils
"hoop petticoat" shape; no known historics
Division 11, Split-corona Daffodils
cup split for $1 / 3$ its length
Division 12, Other Daffodils
Division 13, Species and wild variants and hybrids
Not eligible for Historic section in ADS shows

## To begin your search,

first look at the form of your flower. (continued)

After you've determined to which division your flower belongs, look through the slides, which are grouped by division, then by color, to see if you can find a match.

Some of the slides are themselves "historic" and badly faded. Hopefully they will give some idea of the form of the flower.

## Trumpet Daffodils



## Division 1

Trumpet Daffodil Cultivars One flower to a stem; corona (trumpet) as long as, or longer than, the perianth segments (petals)

An easy way to determine this is to bend a perianth segment up against the trumpet. If the trumpet is longer, it's in Division 1. If it's borderline, look also in Division 2.
