


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The Fund had a good year in 1970. Thank you! Along with its success there were some disappointments, too, and we shall talk a bit about both.

HURRAH!

For the tenth year in a row the Fund continued its steady growth. The graph, which appears elsewhere in this report, dramatically shows this happy fact. The total dollars received in 1970 reached \$325,346.12—an increase of 14.1 per cent over the previous high mark. This resource has been very important in assisting the School to maintain its position among the GREAT Law Schools, and as one of the LEADERS in legal education. We are appreciative of your generosity, and you may be proud of your achievement.

STANDOUTS

There were some notable accomplishments at regional, state, and local levels, and in the classes that we want to bring to your attention.

Eight regions increased the dollars contributed in 1970 over 1969. They were I, II, IV, VI, VII, VIII, XIII, and XIV. Congratulations to each chairman and to the "teams" that worked with them.

Four regions—I, II, III, and XI—showed an increase in the number of gifts received over the preceding year. Harry Gaines with 18.25 per cent growth in Region III (South and South-eastern U.S.) had the largest per cent of increase. Region I (New York and New England), Frank Stone chairman, had the greatest increase in numbers—47.

Dear Frank:

I am happy to report to you as National Chairman of the University of Michigan Law School Fund for the 1970 campaign. It is very gratifying to be able to advise you that the total dollar amount continues to show an annual increase—from \$283,683.29 in 1969 to \$325,346.12 in 1970. This occurred in a year in which contributions to higher education were considered to be jeopardized by the economic recession and public resentment against student unrest and the manner in which this problem was handled by the authorities in many schools. I am concerned with the slight drop in the number of contributions—from 4302 in 1969 to 4250 in 1970—but feel sure that this is only a temporary setback which will be overcome in 1971.

Congratulations as well as thanks are due to the members of the national organization who have devoted much time and effort to bring about the results which have been obtained. I refer to the Regional, State, and Local Chairmen and the many solicitors, class agents, and others who are the backbone of the Law School Fund organization.



Dear Jack:

It has been my great privilege to occupy the Dean's office during five of the ten annual campaigns in the history of the University of Michigan Law School Fund. The progress made by the Fund in each of these years has been of great satisfaction to me. The 1970 campaign, however, holds a special significance. In part, of course, this is because it was to be the last campaign in my tenure as Dean. But, in addition, the campaign of 1970 was a testing year for the Fund. The campaign took place in a time of economic stringency which has adversely affected private support of higher education throughout the country. Moreover, the year saw events on the nation's campuses which caused understandable concern and even dismay in many alumni.

It is surely a great pleasure to observe that the Law School Fund passed its test in outstanding fashion. By not only reaching the previous year's record dollar total, but in exceeding it by nearly 15%, the Law School Fund accomplished what few other comparable campaigns were able to achieve last year. I wish to extend my personal thanks and congratulations to you, to the National Committee, the Regional, State, Local, and Class Chairmen, to all of those who solicited contributions and to all who gave to the Fund. The entire faculty of the School would wish to join in this expression of appreciation.

The results of the 1970 campaign are heartening for many reasons. The needs served by the Fund are larger and more pressing than ever. But the Fund has significance also as a testimonial of support for the School by its alumni and, in many cases, as a demonstration of the value attached by those who participate in the campaign to the professional training they received at the University of Michigan Law School. It has always seemed to me that there is something unique about the strength and quality of alumni support for this School. The insistence and expectation of its graduates that Michigan be a great and even greater school, goes far to insure its distinction and excellence in the years ahead.

Although we have cause for celebration in the outcome of the 1970 campaign under your dedicated and effective chairmanship, there is little about the present period to tempt us into undue complacency. For the indefinite future each year will be a testing year for the Law School and the Law School Fund. I am confident, however, that these challenges will be met with devoted and energetic response.



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

The Law School's Program For Minority Group Students

At the annual meeting of the National Committee of the Law School Fund in Ann Arbor on April 17, 1971, Dean-designate Theodore J. St. Antoine was asked to comment on the Law School's special program for minority group students. Dean St. Antoine replied to the following effect, and the Committee urged that this statement be communicated to all Law School Alumni.

The Law School's program for blacks and other minorities was started in response to an overwhelming social and educational need. Even so, the faculty did not find it easy to make all the decisions that had to be made to fashion this program. For at least a couple of generations, Michigan has tried to base admissions not on a person's wealth or family connections, but on his or her demonstrated ability, as best we could measure that ability. That meant relying primarily on such "objective" criteria as aptitude test scores and undergraduate records. Anything resembling a religious or ethnic quota was especially abhorrent. To take race or socioeconomic background into account in choosing among applicants, even for the worthy purpose of compensating for previous deprivations or educational handicaps, necessarily cuts against the principle of objective selection. A good number of the faculty found this troubling, and I can fully understand why some of the alumni have found it troubling, too. Nonetheless, I am satisfied we made the right decision when we decided to establish a program that should result in at least ten per cent of our student body being black or members of other minority groups.

A half dozen years ago, there was not a single black student in the Law School—and this at a time when the achievement of racial justice had become the most critical domestic issue confronting the country. The absence of blacks did not result, of course, from any invidious discrimination in the admissions process. But it also did not result from the lack of black undergraduates who were fully qualified to go through this School and become good lawyers. Over the years Michigan has produced many black graduates who have gone on to distinguished careers as judges, government officials, private practitioners, and law teachers. What had happened in the mid-'60s was that the black applicants had been swept aside by the rising tide of law school applications, which this year approached the 5,000 mark at Michigan.

We can admit only about 370 freshmen each year. Our Admissions Officer, Dean Matthew P. T. McCauley, estimates that 2,000 of the applicants we are forced to reject are fully qualified. We are no longer using test scores and undergraduate grades just to weed out the unqualified; we are using them almost arbitrarily to help us pick and choose among the best. In light of the inferior schooling and the other cultural disadvantages that are the lot of so many black applicants, it was no wonder they were hurt the worst of all by this painful educational squeeze.

Someday we may have time enough and skill enough to

weigh a whole range of factors, including such intangible factors as personality and motivation, in assessing every young applicant's potential to be a successful law student and a valuable lawyer-citizen. But knowing the limitations of grades and test scores in predicting law school performance, especially on the part of disadvantaged students, and knowing also the desperate need for black lawyers in the profession, we feel we are justified right now in giving special weight to at least one nonquantifiable factor in our evaluation—race.

Some alumni have been concerned that the presence of a substantial number of minority group students with inferior credentials would corrode the educational standards of the School. My own experience suggests this is not a serious danger. The black students in my freshman contracts course this past year worked extremely hard. A good number performed at or above the level of the class average. Every single one did better than some of the regularly admitted white students whom I had when I began teaching here six years ago. Moreover, the contributions of black students to several class discussions—most memorably those on consumer sales and consumer credit—added a whole new dimension to the subject under consideration.

Other alumni have told me they were not unhappy about the special admissions program itself, but they were unhappy about the faculty's adopting it under pressure. This reflects a misconception. The main lines of our minority group program had been laid down long before the black student strike against the University in the spring of 1970. During the strike, as part of a University-wide response, we reaffirmed our commitment to the program, and agreed in effect to continue it. But I truly do not believe that compulsion influenced the affirmative vote in the Law School. If anything, the strike and accompanying disruptions cost the program support; many faculty members resented the efforts to coerce them. A majority, however, felt that a program that had been worth supporting on its merits was still worth supporting, whatever one might think of some of the tactics employed on its behalf.

Finally, I should mention a highly practical point made by a former Law School classmate of mine, who is now a partner in one of the largest and best law firms in the Mid-West. He insists that all considerations of morality or social consciousness aside, there remains one hard-headed, even selfish reason why alumni should applaud the minority group program here at Michigan. He believes that in a few years at most, law firms will be under the same social and governmental pressure that industry has experienced to hire black employees. He argues that it is in the firms' own best interests to have available a good supply of well-trained black lawyers, preferably the graduates of quality law schools. This is surely not the loftiest reason for acclaiming our minority group program (I know my friend doesn't think it is, either), but I never balk at finding pragmatism in harness with idealism.

In my judgment, the Law School's program for minority group students is a social imperative and a sound educational undertaking. I know there will be defects in the project and I ask the alumni to bear with us while we work them out. Twenty-five years from now, I am confident, we shall all look back upon the initiation of this special program as one of the proudest moments in the history of the Michigan Law School.

Between the Sheets (continued)

Once again two states had 100 per cent participation—but they were two newcomers—**Vermont**, (Alan Overton) and **New Hampshire** (Joseph Ransmeier). Wonderful! The previous winners of this important distinction, Alaska and South Carolina, were close behind. Could we have four in 1971?

In the classes it was exciting to see that two—1962 (51 per cent, L. William Schmidt, Jr.) and 1945 (50 per cent, Margaret G. Schaeffer) reached the 50 per cent bracket for participation. The class of 1934 (Cornelius Van Valkenburg) moved to 47 per cent participation and third in this important category, and last year's top class, 1963 (John Galanis) finished strong again with a 46 per cent mark.

The class of 1932 had a rather substantial lead over the others in the matter of dollars contributed. (See the Class Summary of Gifts.) Stephen E. Jones of Erie, Pennsylvania can take the bows as class agent.

In the two boxes marked "Tops in Percentage of Participation," the leaders are shown. These figures, however, do not show the dramatic *increase* in some localities. Because the areas vary in size, population, density, etc., comparisons between them are difficult, but a few of the **growth** leaders are:

WORRIES

You may wonder, after these success stories, how the Committee could be disappointed. In a sense the answer is that too much still is dependent on too few. We shall describe two situations that have caused some concern. It is

hoped that bringing them to your attention will prompt you to help start the cure.

The first worry is that in 1970 both the number and percentage of Law School alumni contributing to the Fund fell off a bit. In numbers this means that the Fund received gifts from a total of 92 fewer alumni in 1970 than in 1969, and the per cent of participation dropped from 38.3 per cent to 36.9 per cent. In many ways this is not catastrophic because 1970 was still the second best year for the Fund in both respects. But, as we have said in previous reports, we think that the surest test of the strength of an annual giving program for alumni such as the Law School Fund is the percentage of the alumni actually taking part. Growth in this respect has obvious relevance to the health of the Fund, but it is also indicative of the enthusiasm of the alumni for the School in other important ways. We are not convinced a suitably high mark for Michigan has yet been reached. The Fund is still young, and we hope that more of you will agree with the Committee (and the 3,641 wonderful alumni who did contribute to the Fund in 1970) that the Law School not only needs but deserves your support. It sounds pretty good to say that more than one-third of the alumni actively contributed to the support of our School last year, but the opposite side of that coin is that nearly **two-thirds** of you did not. If you are in the latter group, **you** can do something about it. If you are in the former group, why not urge some friend whose name is not listed to join you. Other schools with similar programs have reached 50 and 60 per cent. The Michigan alumni can and should do as well.

The second point of concern, which has some obvious relevance to the first, was the discovery that 861 (that's right 861) alumni who had participated in the Fund in 1969 did not contribute in 1970. That is approximately 23 per cent of the total. At the same time, 769 alumni who had *not* contributed in 1969 did so in 1970. The difference is, of course, the net loss of 92. Of the 769, 264 alumni (representing \$26,887.00) joined the Fund for the very first time. Since these particular figures had not been counted before, we do not know whether they are abnormally large; but the loss, even temporarily, of 23 per cent of the previous contributors in a single year is larger than we think it should be. The Committee has hoped and expected that giving to the Law School Fund each year, once started, would become a regular habit for most people, and that the new contributor would be, for the most part, a net gain, rather than used to reduce a deficit.

Why the large drop-off? Probably several reasons, but we suspect that procrastination, oversight by the alumnus, and failure of the Fund "team" to get a reminder to the proper place at the proper time were the major causes. By the time of writing this report more than 10 per cent of the 861 **have already contributed** to the 1971 Fund. With others it was undoubtedly a deliberate choice. Whatever the reasons we hope that in 1971 the "lost" figure will be **substantially** reduced.

NON-ALUMNI GIFTS

In 1970 the Fund received gifts totaling \$93,738.22 from 297 non-alumni. Many are sent as memorial gifts (see details in another part of the report), and a substantial number are from companies with "matching gift" programs. A few other very substantial gifts come through


charitable foundations and trusts where our alumni have a role in advising the directors or trustees; and from time to time we receive a gift from an alumnus' individual client who wishes to make a charitable contribution, and on advice of the alumnus, considers the Law School Fund a worthy recipient. Perhaps you, too, represent a foundation, a trust, or other client that would appreciate knowing more about the Law School Fund.

BEQUESTS TO THE LAW SCHOOL FUND

The Law School Fund was the direct recipient of money in 1970 pursuant to bequests in the wills of three deceased alumni. These gifts are not reported with any other figures and statistics in the report, because they were not the result of a donative intent in 1970, and because we thought the addition of the amount of the proceeds to the annual giving campaign would distort the direct results of that campaign. These bequests serve as reminders of the truth and applicability of a statement published by one of our sister law schools to show the inter-relationship of its annual giving program and bequests to the school: "Annual giving to the Fund has improved steadily—but death terminates annual giving, and annual givers must become testators who remember the Law School in their Wills."

The Presidents Club

The University of Michigan Presidents Club is one of the most respected organizations of its type in the country.

The Presidents Club has been enthusiastically supported by many Law School alumni, and a list of the Law members is printed elsewhere in this report. How can you join?

You may be closer to eligibility than you are aware. All the gifts you have made to The University of Michigan since 1961, including, of course, your gifts to the Law School Fund, are totaled as credit toward your membership.


Gifts of cash, or property or deferred gifts may be used to fund your membership through one of the following means:

- 1) A gift in cash, securities, real property, or gifts-in-kind—totaling \$10,000 or more payable either immediately, at the rate of \$1,000 a year for ten years, or within and over the next ten years; or,
- 2) A deferred gift of \$15,000 or more payable through a bequest, a Unitrust agreement paying you life-time income, an insurance policy on the life of the donor (or spouse), a trust agreement, or any other deferred giving instrument acceptable to the University; or,
- 3) A cash/bequest combination of \$5,000 outright or over ten years at a rate of \$500 annually, and a minimum bequest of \$7,500; or,
- 4) A matching gift arrangement whereby a gift of \$7,500 by an individual is combined with a corporate matching gift of \$7,500.

Gifts to the University through the Presidents Club qualify as charitable contributions entitling a donor to federal income, gift, and estate tax deductions as appropriate to type, amount, and conditions of gift, age, and income of the donor, and state tax benefits where appropriate.

Gifts through the Presidents Club may be designated for the LAW SCHOOL FUND or any other Law School purpose; for information write or call:

The Hundred Club

Michigan Income Tax Credit

During 1970 we again were able to assure alumni whose income is subject to the Michigan Income Tax that their gifts to the LAW SCHOOL or LAW SCHOOL FUND, *not otherwise limited as to purpose* "will be considered as being made to the General Fund of the University and, therefore, DO QUALIFY FOR THE LIMITED CREDIT PROVISION IN SECTION 260 OF THE MICHIGAN INCOME TAX STATUTE."

Without trying to get too technical here (obviously you will want to look at the statute) this meant (and means) that within the limitations of the Act the taxpayer can receive *credit* equal to 50 per cent of the aggregate amount of charitable contributions made by him to the "general fund" of institutions of higher learning located within Michigan. Basic limitations in the Act provide that the tax credit cannot exceed 20 per cent of what would otherwise have been the taxpayer's Michigan Income Tax, or \$100,000 whichever is less.

There is little doubt that many of our alumni took advantage of this tax credit provision to increase their contribution (or in some cases to make their initial contribution) to the Law School Fund. Many more of you can do the same. Since these charitable gifts also qualify as deductions on your Federal returns (as contrasted to the Michigan *credit*) it means that many of you can make a substantial gift to the Fund, up to \$200,000, without a very large increase in your cash outlay.

Regardless of what you feel you can give, the happy fact is that for those of you subject to the Michigan Income Tax, you can increase the pleasure of your gift to the Law School Fund by the knowledge that you can "recover" a part of it through the Tax Credit allowance.

The favorable ruling from the Department of Treasury, upon which "assurance" was based, was predicated in large part on the fact that such contributions to the Law School Fund are directly under the control of the Regents of the University, and that budget procedures for the Law School Fund follow regular University channels. No ruling has been requested concerning the qualification of gifts to the Law School for specifically designated purposes such as class memorial funds, specified scholarship or loan accounts, etc. We expect that the designation of a particular fund or specific use for many gifts will continue, and we shall gratefully accept them. But the present ruling of the Department of Treasury, as given, applies only to gifts to the Law School Fund not otherwise limited as to purpose.
