

### **Session I: This is your Tanzania: The Role of the Diaspora in Tanzania's Vision 2025**

Thabo Mbeki once said "Out of Africa reborn must come modern products of human economic activity, significant contributions to the world of knowledge, in the arts, science and technology, new images of an Africa of peace and prosperity."

The African diaspora has for decades been reported to make significant contributions to Africa's development. According to the latest World Bank data, East African economies received more than \$3.5 billion in diaspora remittances in 2015, out which, an estimated \$770 million was sent to Tanzania. With an estimated 3 million Tanzanians living abroad,

there's an opportunity for Tanzania Diaspora to contribute to development including skills transfer, microenterprise capital, and diaspora philanthropy.

During the Diaspora conference held in the Dar es Salaam in 2014, the Director of Diaspora in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation, Ms. Rosemary Jairo, said investment from the Diaspora between 2013 and June 2015 was 32bn Tanzania Shillings. Most of this was linked to Small and Medium Enterprises (SME's) that contributes to 35% of Tanzania's Gross Domestic Product (GDP).

**10:45 - 12:30 Session II: Finance & Innovative Funding Mechanisms**

Data shows that only 12.5 per cent of the Tanzanian citizenry has access to banking services. This not only presents a great opportunity in the banking industry but also an opportunity to help eradicate poverty. The World Bank president, Yong Kim, was noted saying that "Access to financial services can serve as a bridge out of poverty. We have set a hugely ambitious goal – universal financial access by 2020."

Various funding mechanisms have been utilized to avail Diaspora and African Entrepreneurs with the much needed capital such as USAID's Development Credit Authority (DCA). DCA uses risk-sharing guarantees to mobilize private sector financing in developing countries to reach credit-worthy but underserved entrepreneurs such as members of the

Ethiopian Diaspora interested in returning to their home country to start new businesses. The Tanzania Diaspora stands to also benefit from this opportunity.

Each Tanzanian Diaspora community is defined by geographical settlement, history and other socio-economic factors. Migration from Tanzania to the US began in the 1960's, after independence.

Since then, the Tanzanian Diaspora has assumed roles of responsibility in corporate America, in numerous fields of science, research & development and academia. As true contributors in their respective ways, the Diaspora has quickly become a conduit for transfer of knowledge and technology to their country of origin.

The African Diaspora also represents an influential economic block. This group is composed of about 35 million citizens of African descent in the U.S. alone and a collective purchasing power of about \$450 billion per annum. If this sum was represented by a single country, this would be the second largest economy in Africa, after Nigeria. The role of the Diaspora is becoming increasingly more important in their home and host countries.

There has been renewed interest in Public Private Partnerships (PPPs) in both developed and developing countries, driven by government austerity, and constraints on public resources. Recognizing the importance of infrastructure investment in facilitating economic growth, governments are increasingly turning to the private sector as an alternative source of funding to meet the investment gap.

Exploring PPPs has been a way of introducing private sector technology and innovation in providing better public services through improved operational efficiency, and incentivizing the private sector to deliver projects on time and within budget.

PPPs have been used as a way of gradually exposing state owned enterprises and governments to increasing levels of private sector participation (especially foreign) and structuring PPPs in a way so as to ensure transfer of skills leading to national champions that can run their own operations professionally and eventually export their competencies by bidding for projects/ joint ventures.

- TPA currently performs the role of both a Landlord and Operator with the main functions of promoting the use, development and management of ports and their hinterlands, entering into contracts for the purpose of delegating the powers of the Authority (through licensing and concessioning ports services).
- TPA administers a diverse system of Tanzania's Mainland sea and inland water ways (Lake Ports). The major sea ports are Dar es Salaam, Tanga and Mtwara while smaller sea ports are Kilwa, Lindi, Mafia, Pangani and Bagamoyo. The lake ports under TPA mandate are: on Lake Victoria include Mwanza North and South Ports, Nansio, Kemono Bay, Bukoba and Musoma: on Lake Tanganyika, are Kigoma and Kasanga: and on Lake Nyasa are Itungi Port, Kiwira, Manda Liuli and Mbamba Bay.

The principal objectives of the Authority are:

1. To establish and coordinate system of Harbors;
2. To provide facilities relating to Harbors and provide harbor services;
3. With approval of the Minister, to construct/operate new harbors
4. To construct, operate & maintain beacons and other navigational aids
5. To carry on the business of stevedore, wharf age or lighter man;
6. To act as a warehouseman to store goods, whether or not the goods have been or are to be, handled as cargo or carried by the Authority;
7. To consign goods on behalf of the other persons to any place either within or outside the United Republic;
8. With the approval of the Minister, to act as carriers of goods or passengers by land or sea; and
9. To provide amenities or facilities that the Authority considers necessary or desirable for persons making use of the facilities or services.
