Failure to Report (FTR)

This list and the Reported but no Choice list were compiled by Mr. Graves, who was helping with the social welfare interviews, under the direction of Dr. Opler. This list is does not indicate anything very accurately, except that notices were sent out to these individuals, but there was no record of their having come in for an interview. In some cases the first notices failed to reach the individual for some reason or another. In other cases even if they did come in for an interview, their records were misplaced. A Still others did not come in for interviews because they were out on seasonal work, they had to consult another party first, etc. Consequently, this list cannot be considered a list of resistance cases, although many of them were undoubtedly resistance cases.

Reported but No Choice

This seems to represent a list of resistance cases. These individuals had come in for an interview and had stated definitely that they did not want to leave Tule Lake. However, those who gave only one choice were included in this list, too, although the number of one choice only is said to have been small. Of course, this does not represent a complete list of resistance cases at this time. Later on this list was reduced somewhat.

Evacuees leaving Tule Lake for other projects as their destination are being asked to indicate their preference in order that the WRA may, so far as possible, comply with their wishes. Obviously, there will be instances where too many families will want to go to the same project. Therefore, the administration is providing means of determining reasons for preferences on as fair and equitable basis as possible.

It is felt that those families who wish to go to projects where they have relatives residing there should be first preference.

It is also felt that, inasmuch as some groups residing in the same area prior to evacuation have been separated, that they should have second preference in destination as far as possible. There will also be some family problems which will need special consideration in determining destination.

Many requests have come to the administration for movement of numbers of families as units to a project in order to prevent the breaking of close friendships and associations existing here in the center. It has been expressed that the desire to maintain these groups is more important to the residents than any particular destination. In every way possible, the WRA will attempt to comply with these wishes and the following procedure has been established:

Expression of this desire is left to the evacuees. It will be impossible to consider groups involving more than 20 families and it may be necessary, in some instances, to further reduce this size, in order to be fair to all. Such family units should immediately get together and have their leader submit their request through the Social Welfare Office at 1804. Since time is an important factor, it is obvious that these requests should be submitted as quickly as possible. Entire families should be listed, with the family head underlined. Use that individual who is the head of the family for Clothing Allowance purposes.

Such requests should take the form of the attached outline.

Begar STAFF MEETING #1320 August 4, 1943 The meeting was held jointly with the Social Welfare Department. Mr. Frank Nakamura, Coordinator of CAS, presided at the meeting: Dr. Harold S. Jacoby, Chief of Internal Security, who was a member of the delegation that attended the Project Directors' Conference in Denver, was introduced. His topic was on the segregation problem. He explained that everyone in any project will find himself in one of the four groups, namely; Group 1: Those who have applied for expatriation or repatriation and have not withdrawn their request prior to July 1, 1943. Group 2: Those persons who have: (a) Not registered (b) Answered "No" to Question 28 By not registering the individual in effect says "no" to question 28. Group 3: Those persons who have: (a) Registered late (b) Asked to have their "no" answer changed to "yes" prior to July 15. (C) Withdrawn repatriation or expatriation request prior to July 1. (d) Given qualified answers. There are three places where people will go: 1. Segregation Center, which is Tule Lake. 2. Nine other centers, six of which are open to those leaving from Tule Lake: Central Utah, Heart Mountain, Minidoka, Granada, Jerome, and Rohwer. 3. Relocation to the outside. The segregation group will go to the segregation Group 1: center, which happens to be Tule Lake, where they will be permitted to live the Japanese way of life. Those who signed for repatriation have by their act stated that they wish to go to Japan. This group has a lot of reasons. They do not neces-Group 2: sarily mean to prefer to live the Japanese way of life, so will not be handled in a mechanical fashion. They will go direct through a segregation hearing on the basis of which some will go to the segregation center and others will go to one of the free centers. The segregation hearing will be available to those who have: 1. Failed to register 2. Answered "no" to question 28 3. Answered with a qualified answer. Those in this group will go directly from here without Group 3: any segregation hearing to one of the free centers,

Group 4: They will have a choice of going either direct on relocation or to one of the free centers. Special inducements are being offered to the people of Tule Lake only, in the matter of relocation. All of the jobs that are coming into various relocation offices will be offered to the people of Tule Lake. Furthermore, persons who are interested in relocation, although no specific job is in mind, are guaranteed both employment and housing. Full expenses, without question in regards to the ability of the family to pay transportation, will be paid by the WRA to persons going out on relocation to any part of the United States. Heretofore, expenses were paid only to those persons who couldn't pay their own way. head of the family relocating will be given \$50 plus his transportation, and the second and third members of the family with will receive \$25 each. Expenses of your household goods will also be borne by the WRA. The family of those who are going to the outside, may remain in Tule Lake until the first of November, so that they may call for them after he resettles. Persons who do not wish to relocate may transfer to other centers with assurance that the centers will not be closed. Those in Group 3, before they can relocate, will have to go through a leave clearance hearing. Persons who did not register, but cleared through the segregation hearing, will have to go through another second hearing before they can relocate. Those who answered "Yes" can go directly to the outside on relocation. Those who answered in a qualified "Yes" will have to go through the leave clearance hearing.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS: 1. The standard of those who came back from the internment camps are handled as individuals falling in one of the four groups. 2. Everyone who answered "yes" will not be forced to leave Tule Lake. However, everyone who has the opportunity to leave the segregation center will be expected to leave. The first trains will leave on September loth. 3. Families will not be broken up. If a member of the family wishes to stay with the rest of the family he may do so as he desires. 4. Those who will be released from the segregation camp will be through appeal. 5. Segregation hearing will begin soon. They will be very informal and will not, in any way, persuade you to change your decision. 6. The transfer to other relocation centers is expected to be come pleted by the end of October. Whether you wish to relocate or transfer will depend on your family's plan. However, those who wish to relocate now may take advantage of the wonderful opportunities and grants being offered by the WRA. 7. By household goods, it would probably include those goods stored back home too. However, those who have been going out on indefinite leaves have been able to have 500 lbs. of goods shipped to them. 8. By the middle of September, a decision will have to be made by one of the members of the family on whether they wish to remain in Tule Lake or not. 9. Representatives of important Field Offices of Relocation will be here at Tule Lake during the next five or six weeks, bringing with them movies of different sections of the country. Office jobs which have never been opened before will be offered. The headquarters for jobs will be at the Placement Office at 1208. 10. If they remain in Tule Lake until November, they would not be able to go out even if they do find a suiable suitable job then. 11.. Those of group 2, who have been cleared through the segregation hearing, and those of group 3, will have to go through a hearing in order to relocate. Those who wish to relocate will go through a leave clearance hearing at one of the free centers before they can go out. BRIEF OUTLINE OF PROFESSOR ICHIHASHI'S SPEECH (Jotted down out of memory)

And D. K.

Dr. Ichihashi opened his speech with the announcement of his departure from this project on Saturday, September 4th, by an order from the adminis-. tration. He spent some lengthy period on this point, markedly, with a sense of apology implied, presumably because he was arrain that the colonists might think he had a special and private deal with the administration, and also lest they should think he was leaving the project forgetting his responsibility as a leading member of the community Representatives. He then gave a chronological description of the development and activities of the Community Representatives on the segregation program. He stated that in the past, every time a problem of serious nature occurred a few so-called leaders from among the colonists used to be calle in b the administration. He then pointed out how he happened to be called in as one of them. He said that it was because Mr. Coverley, for Project former Project Director, was once upona time a student of his. He proceeded to state that when the segregation program was announced, there was no organization of colonists to represent the colony officially; the Planning Board had ceased functioning; and it was undesirable for any group of individuals to work between the administration and the colony only on the basis of their interest in the affair, because people are prone to criticize them of doing things out of their way and suspect their motive. It was suggested to have an official organization of colonists and representatives set up and the suggestion was more than welcome by Mr. Best because he had wished that there was something of that sort but did not dare to suggest it from his side lest it should be misinterpreted as the tool of the administration.

Professor Ichihashi spent some time on how Mr. Coverley and his staff did not know when and how the segregation program should take place, and how they did not know that Tule Lake was going to be chosen as the segregation center; then he stated how the Denver Conference was held, and how a few of the appointed personnel from this administration attended and came back with a perfect surprise in the fact that the whole thing had been planned by Washington, and there was nothing for them to do about it. After the Denver conference, it became evident that there was no other choice for Tule Lake than to accept this whole program; and it became necessary to set up an official organization.

It was believed by those so-called leaders called in by the administration unofficially representing the colony that the best workable committee was one Issei and one Nisei from each ward. However, when this idea was conveyed to the colonists, some wards did not respont to it very favorably. At the first meeting of such representatives, there were three wards with representatives duly elected, three wards with none at all, and one ward with unofficial observers. It was then suggested to have a mass meeting of all the colonists or a ward meetings in the wards which did not send representatives to explain the whole situation. Neither of these two ideas came to materialize for some unknown reason; but, thanks to the untiring effort of Mr. Yoshida of the Planning Board, all the wards came to choose their representatives soon after.

To expedite the activities of the Community representatives organization, seven men were chosen out of the fourteen as Working Committee, that is, one from each ward disregarding the Issei or nisei distinction. The consequence is five Issei and two Nisei are on thes Working Committee.

This Committee did not like to deal orally with the administration on any important matter, so it chose three men as negotiating committee whose signatures must be on all the written documents with which the Working Committee should make negotiations with the administration. Dr. Ich ihashi emphatically pointed out that this committee of the Community Rpresentatives are working in the interest of all the colonists regardless of whether they are remaining in this center of transferring to other centers. This is the organization officially to represent every single chlonist, and there should be no misunderstanding about it.

Dr. Ichihashi reported briefly on the conference the committee had with Captain Martin, the Vice Consul of Spain when he visited the project on August 20th. He said, first of all, that a question was asked concerning the legal status of evacuee to Mr. Blake from the State Department, but no satisfactory answer was given. Also a question as to the legal significance of the terms repatriation, repatriates, expatriation, and expatriates was asked, but again no satisfactory answer was given. He reported, it was made clear that a mere fact that one has applied for repatriation does not necessarity mean he can surely go back to Japan. The procedure is that the State Department submits the applications to the Japanese Government, but unless the Japanese Government authorizes the applicants, they cannot return to Japan by the exchange boat. He also reported that the Spanish Consulate is receiving application for repatriation, a simple form has been made, and the sheet will be distributed through the block representatives, and anybody who cares to may

turn their application in to the Spanish Consul. He gave an advice to the colonists in general to the effect that everybody should accept calmly whatever the U. S. Government decides for or about them because under war time circumstances noe cannot make any other choice than to comply with the government regulations. To worry and to get excited do not get anybody anywhere, but to wear themselves out. He finally concluded, whatever one believes is true and just, he must do it bravely and manly, but let him never forget that he is a subject of a great country, and as such, should do nothing likely and unadvisedly.

Solva. (Just for your information. D.K.) CONFIDENTIAL WRA TERMS (1) Segregation--Kakuri The connotation this term has in the mind of Issei is Quarantine for communicable diseases. In English the term means just to separate one kind of people or things from another kind of people or things, not necessarily with a sense of "good and bad"or "right and wrong." but translated as kakuri the term cannot help indicating to "quarantine undesirable elements". This psychological association is aggravated because of the vivid memory of that ill-managed registration and voice of pressure groups outside. (2) Loyalty--Chusei --allegiance, loyalty
--integrity, sincerity or truthfulness Chu-sei--"Chusei" is a good and practically the only translation for "loyalty". But the same term has a tremendously different connotation in the mind of Issei, due to the traditional ethics of Japan, in which Patriotism is the center of morality. Right at this point we are dealing with the fundamental difference of national constitution between U. S. and Japan. In the traditional Japanese ethics "Chu" and "Ko" are the two highest virtues and at the same time the basic principles of moral like. "Chu" is the loyalty to one's ruler and is applied for household master, feudal lord, or national ruler that is Emperorp. "Ko" is the filial loyalty and is used only in reference to parents. Furthermore, it must be noted that according to the traditional teachings, the highest type of "Ko" is found in the absolutely unqualified "Chu", namely to the mind of Japanese the nation comes before the Family, and one can be loyal to his own parents only by way of being loyal to his nation. The term for Nation or County is Kokka (Koku \* ka) "koki", meaning "country" and "ka", meaning "family" or "home". The underlying idea is that the Nation is one big family of which each individual family

is a small part. Without the country there can be no individual family existing. Therefore, to obey one's parents and forget his duty to the ruler of the nation is as a matter of principles an unethical conduct. Whenever conflict exists between loyalties to the Nation and to the parents, one must choose that toward the Nation and by so doing he is attaining to the highest type of "ko" to his parents even against their will, wish or desire.

It is, therefore, extrement important to note that "loyalty" in the sense of "chusei is more of a collectivistic virtue than a personal one.

In the mind of Issei, "Chusei" is not a matter of personal choice or preference as to which country he should be loyal, but as a member of the county and no other country whatsoever. This means just one thing in reference to the Issei under the present circumstances, namely as long as they cannot be and are not American citizen they cannot pledge their "Chusei" to America. And it is not a matter of their personal choice either. Most of them invariabley like America. They prefer to live the rest of their life here in the U. S. They know they cannot live comfortably in Japan even if they went back there shortly. Personally they all choose to live in this country with their children, but the moment the term "Chusei" is used, then their minds stop working on an individual basis, but immediately start working in terms of national collectivism. To be labelled "loyal" to America means, as far as a Issei is concerned, that he is not only "disloyal" to his country but he is "immoral" and as such is put to shame by all his friends.

It is extremedly unfortunate that this term "loyalty" and "chusei" have been so carelessly used in such close connection with the segregation program. But the irony is that without loyalty question the whole program loses its meaning, and yet the moment this term is used, especially in Japanese, it leads the mind of Issei in a direction which WRA neither means nor expects to lead them into.

In conjunction with this question, it may be worth pointing out that the attitude of Issei toward government per se is fundamentally different from that of American. To the traditional mind of Japanese, government is an instrument by which the sovereign ruler (who is the ruler not by the choice of people) executes his authority. As far as the people are concerned there is nothing to say about the government. They simply expect it to be helping the Emperor, who in any situation is always doing his best for the best of his subjects. It is the Emperor, therefore, who utilizes the Government; the people has no idea of utilizing it. They just completely depend on the Government and are ready to do whatever the Government tells them to do. A majority of Issei cannot get away from this traditional concept of Government and looks at the U.S. Government in the same way, hence, on one hand they expect the Government agencies to take care of their welfare to the utmost details and on the other hand they lose faith in the government because it does not give them what they expect. They say "the Government ordered us to evacuate and put us in Relocation Center, therefore, if it is the policy of the Government to relocate us outside it is up to the government to see et to it that we are financially enabled to re-establish ourselves, and until such time actually comes we are not going out." Or again, they say, " the government of this country is no good, because it changes its policy (mind) so often. If we do always what it tells us to do we shall have to take all the beating and nothing could be accomplished for us. Everything it does, it does for the sake of its own expediency and not for the sake of our welfare. There's no sense in obeying the Government."

Putting the wisdom of Segregation Program aside for the time being, we may conclude that a good many troubles have been caused because WRA as a Government Agency has attempted to deal in a most democratic way with a group of people to whom Government cannot be but authoritarian. Government as people's instrument is entirely inconceivable to Issei. Both evacuation of a certain racial group on a wholesale scale and segregation on the basis of that loyalty registration are basically anti-democratic. These things could not be put to practice unless the principles of democracy is even for the time being forgotten.

It would be better, therefore, if segregation must be done at any cost, to do it in an authoritarian fashion. Little sense is there to give an impression that democracy is maintained by way of giving or pretending to give people a personal choice of centers. The basis of democracy is lost already in admitting that segregation is necessary and there is no use of disguising it by apparently humane but actually confusing way of handling secondary things of minor importance.

(SUGGESTIONS AND CRITICISM APPRECIATED)

1. In certain circle of those who are remaining in Tule Lake Center, there is an opinion that after this place becomes the segregation center, there will be schools for education in Japanese fashion. They think they are going to give a purely and thorough going Japanese education to their youngsters. Some of them even go as far as to think that there will be no recreation problem or entertainment of American style. Granting that people who have this sort of idea are a minority even among the segregees, still it shows that those who purposely remain here are dreaming of such a state of affairs.

2. Number of people who remain here think that after this place becomes the segregation center, there will be very little internal trouble because they say everybody who is coming here is one who has determined to return to Japan as quickly as possible. That is to say, his mind is all made up for one thing, and no longer to waver between two loyalties. As long as the government is giving them freedom and privilege of living as Japanese in this center, they will be well satisfied and happy. Consequently, no trouble among the segregees is anticipated.

3. Against this sort of sentiment of a group of Issei remaining in this center, we can foresee a conflict of rather serious nature between them and their youngsters who are forced by their parents to remain in the segregation center against their will. No matter what the parents may think and may hope, their youngsters are nothing but Americans, and it is impossible to make Japanese out of them overnight. They will crave for recreation and entertainment of American type. They will crave for more democratic way in every aspect of their life. They will not be able to stand the unreasonable pressure on the part of their parents. It is of vital importance for the WRA to decide what policy it is going to follow regarding the education of Nisei here in Tule Lake Center. In this connection it is of great

importance for WRA to state its policy concerning Japanese education in the center. It seems to be advisable for WRA to set up rather rigid policy on this matter, and be ready to carry it out even against the desire of the segregees in some instances.

4. Nisei group will be bound to become a minority, that is Nisei of ages 18 and over. They will be minority both in terms of number and of influence. There is no question that Issei will be the dominant group, but at the same time the influence of Kibei group will be of tremendous fonce. This reporter will not be surprised if aggressive type of Kibei take the initiative and leadership in the affair of the center. I am sure Kibei of mature age are more or less looking forward to doing this. It is therefore extremely important how to handle a Kibei group.

5. More aggressive attitude on the part of Buddhist group is anticipated. Up to this time the Buddhist group, in spite of the fact that it has more people in it than any other religious group, has been rather inactive in participating in civic affairs, mainly because they felt they were on the spot under the circumstances and also because of the fact that Christian group has been rather active in every aspect of the cology affair; but after this place becomes the segregation center, there would be definitely more Buddhists than Christians. It is more so with leaders, and also the Buddhists will feel assured that they can carry on their program without any pressure from the

American government. Together with the inevitable tendency toward pro Japanese patriotism, this might lead to mild type of persecution of Christianity. Even though number of Christians is going to be small, many of the younger people will prefer Christian religion to Buddhism as their personal religion. The Protestant group will in some way continue its activities in the center, so a conflict between these two religious groups should be carefully watched. This whole matter will depend on what sort of leadership the two groups will have. It will be of tremendous importance for the administration to make contact with the leaders of both groups, and if possible to have them meet together before any activities are organized by either group.

6. Among those who are remaining here, there will be a number of people who will regret that they remained here as time goes on. I should think their treatment is no less important than the treatment of the aggressive Kibei group because those who regret to have remained here will be more easily become bitter than those who come from other centers with their own minds made up. There will be a small group of people who still maintain rational thinking and wish to live as decently as could be expected in American community. They will resent the extremist's attitude of others. How to reconcile these two groups is another matter of no small importance.

7. General attitude of the colony toward the administration will be that of dependance and cynicism mixed together. Reference should

be made to the note prepared by this reporter a few weeks ago concerning the attitude of Japanese toward government per se. On one hand therefore the segregees may show off that they are not depending on WRA which is an agency of American government, but on the other hand, they are more heavily depending on the administration than in any other center. Democratic way of dealing with the people will not get the administration anywhere. Certain type of benevolent despotism will be more welcome by the colonists as long as it is not openly labeled.

Sub-Caption: Myer Addresses Local Residents at Ad. Area

Presenting the requests, suggestions, and demands of the colonists, seven representatives of the residents met with National Director Dillon S. Myer and Project Director Raymond R. Best yesterday afternoon.

During the conference which lasted over two hours, practically the entire population showed their support by surrounding the administration building area during the entire afternoon.

At the end of the negotiations Myer addressed the local residents over the public address system and stated that he has met with the people's delegates to discuss their representations. Expressing utmost confidence in Director Best, Myer concluded by asking residents to cooperate with the administaration in settling all problems.

George Kuratomi, a member of the representative group, gave a brief report of the proceedings with the WRA officials.

In conclusion, the Reverend Kai appealed to the residents to remain calm during the negotiations and not create violence harmful to the Japanese interests.

The seven representatives will meet ###### today and tomorrow with the Mational director and the project director to discuss further the points brought out in yester#day's initial conference.

Quoting from the TULEAN DISPATCH - TUES., NOV. 2, 1943, the following appeared: HEADING: TOPAZ SENDS WORKERS TO HARVEST CROP

Prevailing wages are being paid to the volunteers who are here to harvest the local farm crop, according to a letter received by the Tulean Dispatch from a Topaz resident.

The letter states that 33 volunteers out of which 90% are misei answered the WRA's appeal for workers to harvest the Tule farm crop and the majority of this group are former Tuleans.

Charles Ernst, Topaz Director, in addressing the Topaz City Council, said that the Tule farm produced were raised not only for Tuleans but also for other centers.

The conditions under which the volunteers are working as stated in this letter are as follows:

- 1. Free transportation
- 2. Prevailing wages i.e., shed workers, truck and tractor drivers \$1 per hr.
- 3. Room and board -- \$1 per day.
- 4. No contact with the Tule Lake Center (My own parenthesis: What difference does this make if there was no strike as Ernst stated on Oct. 28th?)
- 5. Hold center jobs open.
- 6. Season is 3-4 weeks

The correspondent said that the Topez residents are greatly interested in this matter and the sympathies of many are with the Tuleans.

The underlining and parenthetical statements are mine.

(Ed. note: The following is from a memo written to the Topaz community council chairman by Charels F. Ernst, project director of the Utah project, Oct. 28)
We have been asked by the War Relocation Authority to recruit workers to harvest certain crops raised this season at the Tule Lake Center farm.

Considerable interest has been shown in this job offer. In discussing the job, I have been asked to find out if there is any trouble like a "strike" at Tule Lake.

Last night I telephoned to Tule Lake and received this information. There is no "strike" or labor trouble in the Tule Lake Center.

Therefore, to insure these crops for the residents, the War Relocation Authority has asked each of the Relocation Centers to send a crew to do this hervest work. They will be paid the prevailing wages. (End quote.)
