

The cemetery land, often called the most hallowed ground in the United States, originally was part of a grant made to a ship captain, Robert Howsen, for bringing colnists to the New World, the National Geographic Society recalls. The patch of wilderness inhabitated Indians and wild animals meant little to the seafaring man. Howsen sold the property for six hogsheads of Virginia tobacco.

About 1,100 acres eventually were acquired in the Arlington area by John Parke Custis, stepson of George Washington. Custis' son, George Washington Parke Custis, built a white-columned mansion atop a hill in the tract. Robert E. Lee married Custis' daughter and became master of the estate, which he abandoned after the outbreak of the Civil War.

Where the material in question is cleary pornographic, criminal action is usually aken by the local prosecuting authorities with the cooperation of the Post Office Department. Convictions in such cases provide for both jail and dollar fines for the dealers in obscenity.

Every state was covered by the survey, which disclosed such conditions as these: in Illinois ,several boys were held in jail without a hearing for 24 days. In Virginia, a diabetic sentenced to a detention farm received no insulin and died the day after he was admitted. Homosexual prisoners in Georgia were allowed to administer vicious beating to other prisoners. A man sentenced to a Maryland jail for "drunk driving" died the next day - of a brain hemorrhage. A prisoner in a Tennessee jail was beaten to death by guards last July.



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Such conditions have led many states to undertake dramatic reforms. Price Tags

There definitely seems to be a trend today in our judicial system of putting a price on justice. More than ninety per cent of all sentences meted out in our courts of law involve merely the payment of a specified sum known as a "fine" and the costs involved in handling the case.

In the majority of the cases justice is and the cost. These cases involve the minor violation of the law usually through the use of an automobile or the commission of some other act that is not a serious grievance against society or a direct malicious threat to safety or welfare of others.

However, the mere payment of a fine and cost becomes questionable for an individual that continually violates the law and accesses to himself a long criminal record. Also, the deterrance factor that should be present in every court conviction suffers when others get the idea that if they have "money enough to pay off," they can get by with anything.

It appears that for some people today, crime is merely a matter of economics . . . the big question being: "How much will it cost me if I'm caught?" Talking to these people you will find that they have little concern for the fact they have been convicted of a serious violation of the law, their attitude being: "I got off for only \$100!" r some other such statement.

In too many cases today, a crime bears a price tag. If you can pay the price . . . you will suffer little for the commission of the crime. As a result, the old axiom of: "Crime does not pay!" . . . is becoming questionable . . . if considered only in the light of economics.

Respect for the law can only be taught in ratio to the seriousness of the violation. To the average layman, the payment of a \$25 fine for a violation of the motor vehicle law is much more severe punishment than the payment of \$100 for the malicious beating and threatening of another with a deadly weapon. The following practices will help: 1. Good Sanitation: Dirty, dark.

2. Separate Calves by Age nure. Calves that have just been feeted with parasites if thrown

3. Don't Overgraze - Rotate and Renovate Pastures: The parasite eggs that infect cattle are located near the bottom of the blades of grass - usually not more than one inch above the ground. Unless a pasture is grazed very close the heifers will not pick up large numbers of eggs. Rotating the pastures will avoid overgrazing and reduce the number of live eggs on the pasture. 4. Provide Fresh, Clean Drinking Water: Parasite eggs can be picked up in stagnant drinking on infected animals.

5. Keep Calves on High Ground: Calves and young heifers should be housed so that drainage from the herd is away from them.

6. Provide Plenty of Feed: Parasites become a real problem only when you have a heavy infection plus underfeeding. Supplement pastures with grain, hay ,or sil-

Sweep the ceilings, walls, and floors of the The sweepings should be disposed of by burning and should not be swept into another bin or left under the building. Apply one of the residual bin sprays listed below to the walls and ceilings at the rate of one gallon per 500 square feet.

Materials TDE, 50 per cent wettable powder, 1 lb. to 3 gallons water. Methoxychlor, 50 per cent wettable powder, 1 lb. to 3 gallons

Malathion, 57 per cent emulsifled concentrate, 1 pint to three gallons water.

These sprays should be applied scycral weeks before storing grain. This allows enough time for the residue to disappear, leaving no health hazards and giving better insect control. 

The maximum project involving the \$1,700,000 bond issue includes a building or renovation program for every school in the county. There are other proposals of course narrowing the program down and involving less money.

Number one on the list is of course the ompletion of the new consolidated school lant. Limping along now for three years with partial and inadequate facilities, the conditions there are becoming critical.

"It cost in excess of \$227,000. It required more than two years of engineering, planning and construction.

"First, you must understand something about the town of Mocksville and its citizens. Basically, Mocksville is a residential town moving quickly to becoming a city. Many of the folks who live there work in pearby Winston-Salem in the large Western lectric plant, Reynolds Tobacco Company, P. H. Hanes Knitting Co., and Hosiery Mill.
