

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The Honorable Jamshid Amouzegar Chairman, Boards of Governors 1966 Annual Meetings COVER PHOTOGRAPH: Dr. Jamshid Amouzegar, the Iranian Minister of Finance, who will be Chairman of the 1966 Annual Meetings, was born and raised in Tehran. He attended the University of Tehran for three years, taking courses in Engineering and Law simultaneously. In 1944 he transferred to Cornell University and received his bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering. After graduating from Cornell, he attended the University of Washington where he received his master's degree in Hydraulics and Sanitary Engineering. Upon completion of a year of special training, Dr. Amouzegar returned to Cornell as an instructor and postgraduate student, receiving his Ph.D. in Civil Engineering in 1951. It was during this period that he met a German born co-ed whom he later married.

Dr. Amouzegar began work with the United Nations special team in Iran for a few months prior to joining the Point Four Organization in Iran where

he served for three years as head of the Technical Department.

His government career started in 1955 as Assistant Director of the Public Health Department of the Ministry of Health, and he advanced to the post of Deputy Minister of Health where he served for three years. He then was appointed Minister of Labor in 1958 and while in this office, prepared the first Iranian Labor Law which was enacted.

In 1959 he became Minister of Agriculture for a year until the Cabinet changed, and as Minister presented the first land reform bill to the Parliament. He was out of Government for three and a half years and ran an engineering consultant firm. In March, 1964 he was appointed Minister of Health and in April, 1965 he was entrusted with the office of the Minister of Finance. Dr. Amouzegar was head of the Iranian delegation to the 1965 Annual Meetings.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE ANNUAL MEETINGS

From Savannah, Georgia, in 1946, to Washington's Sheraton Park Hotel in September, 1965—a span of 20 Annual Meetings of the Boards of Governors: 13 in the United States (all in Washington after the Inaugural Meeting in Savannah); seven in other countries: London, 1947; Paris, 1950; Mexico City, 1952; Istanbul, 1955; New Delhi, 1958; Vienna, 1961; and Tokyo, 1964. There were fewer than forty members when the Articles of Agreement came into force over twenty years ago. Today there are 104 members. The increase in membership, the creation in the Bank Group of the International Finance Corporation and the International Development Association, and the increasing number of ancillary meetings have made it necessary to prepare and arrange for Annual Meetings on a year-round basis.

A few more than 300 individuals attended the first Meeting of the Bank and the Fund Governors in 1946. In 1965, there were over 2,000, including delegates, observers, staff, invited guests (private bankers, brokers, professors, and representatives of professional or economic research organizations), press, and

public.

The growth in size and complexity of the Meetings has increased the work of the Meetings far beyond the proportional increase in membership. For example, in 1946, there were fifteen addresses in plenary sessions, and in 1965, there were ninety addresses, and over two and one half million pages of documentation.

During the first decade, the Bank and the Fund experienced little difficulty in squeezing all the business into a five-day period, and the ad hoc Joint Secretariat (headed by the Secretaries of the Organizations), in active operation for a relatively short time, was able to cope with all logistical and administrative arrangements. Today, work must begin at least two years in advance of the Meetings held away from Washington, while some arrangements for the Meetings in Washington must be made as much as eight to ten years in advance. Meetings held outside Washington require considerably more planning and a large staff to carry out the plans. For example, the Japanese Government and the Organizations' Secretariat began preparations in mid-1963 for the Tokyo Meetings of September 1964. About thirty individuals seconded from the Ministry of Finance and the Bank of Japan were working full time by January 1964. By the end of the Meetings, more than 200 locally employed Japanese were assisting the Joint Secretariat.










Because many Governors believe that the international character of the Organizations is better maintained by holding some of the Meetings away from Headquarters, the practice of holding every third Meeting away from Washington has become fairly well established. This gives the Governors and their advisers an opportunity to see at firsthand what is being accomplished by way of economic development and maintenance of monetary stability in various parts of the world.

The first arrangements for the 1967 Meetings to be held in Rio de Janeiro were begun in March, 1965, when a mission composed of the Secretaries of the Organizations and their assistants visited Rio at the request of the Brazilian Government, to explore the possibilities of holding the Annual Meetings there. After the Governors' decision to hold the 1967 Meetings in Rio, the Brazilian Government appointed a Coordinating Committee that met with another mission to Rio in March of this year when decisions were taken on the location for plenary sessions, Joint Secretariat and the staff offices, and other arrangements for which early decisions are necessary. Since its establishment, the Brazilian Coordinating Committee has been working full time on the arrangements for the 1967 Meetings, which has involved further construction on the Museum of Modern Art, where the Meetings will be held. The Coordinating Committee, accompanied by technical experts, will observe the 1966 Meetings at the Sheraton-Park Hotel. The Committee, composed of Mr. Expedito Geraldo Teixeira, Coordinator, Mr. Luis E. F. Galante, Mr. Hugo Brasil Cantanhede, Mr. Jose Augusto Duarte Fiaes, and Mr. Lourence Guimaraes Monteiro, will arrive some ten days before the opening ceremonies and remain an equal time afterwards. Of course, other travel to Rio will take place in the next twelve months, culminating with the movement of Secretariat staff in late August and early September.

Ancillary meetings in conjunction with plenary sessions of the Governors' Meetings are becoming increasingly important and more frequent. It is recognized that the Annual Meetings bring together a greater number of Finance Ministers and central bank governors than any other occasion during the year. Hence, the Joint Secretariat, though mindful of its main responsibilities, has helped to conduct these smaller and related meetings. In 1965, there were meetings of the Group of Ten, of their Deputies, of Working Party 3 of the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development, and of many other groups getting together on a less formal basis, as well as the regular African and Latin American caucuses.

The pace and excitement of the preparations for the Annual Meetings is similar to that of preparing for the first day of a new business: the doors open for business when the Chairman's gavel calls the Opening Session to order. When the Meetings are adjourned, little time is available for reflection by the working Secretariat for the Meetings just ended. In only twelve months the 1967 Meetings in Rio de Janeiro will be opening, and twelve months is a short time, especially when at the same time preparations must also be made for future Meetings to be held in and outside Washington.

He worked for the same corporation in Hanover during 1963 as Supervisor of the Asian and African potash markets. Mr. von Gontard spent the years between 1952-62 in India as Managing Director of Potascheme, engaged in the execution of Indian agricultural development schemes, extension service activities and fertilizer planning on a nationwide scale. Joseph G. Nott, Assistant Chief of Office Services in the Administration Department, came to the Bank on August 1. Mr. Nott has been Executive

Dagfin Juel, a Norwegian, began a two-year appointment as an Adviser to the Economic Department on August 8. Mr. Juel served his country as Under Secretary of State for almost ten years. During this time, he was particularly concerned with the government economic program and served as Chairman of the committee that prepared the Norwegian long term program for 1958-1961. He also had the chief responsibility for preparing Norway's long term program for 1949-1952 and 1954-1957 while he was on the staff of the Ministry of Commerce and advised on the preparation of the program for 1962-1965 and 1966-1969. As head of the Office for International Economic Cooperation in the Ministry of Commerce, Mr. Juel was responsible for administering the Marshall Plan aid to Norway and handled matters concerning the Organization for European Economic Cooperation. He was appointed Deputy Director-General of the Ministry of Commerce in 1954 and served in that capacity until 1956 when he was named Under Secretary of State in the Prime Minister's Office. In recent years, Mr. Juel has been Chairman of several committees that advised the government on policy matters concerning regional development. The next major event on the Tennis Club calendar is in process now. The Club championship matches started on Saturday, September 10 and will continue through the month.



This month's recipe was contributed by Jayne Hall, who recently joined the Staff Relations Office. Mrs. Hall spent four years in Pakistan with her family. This recipe from there is one of her favorites.

VARIATION ON PALAK GOSHT

(Lamb Stuffed with Spinach and Rice)

Have the butcher bone a good sized leg of lamb (six pounds or more). If possible convince him that this is for rolling, not just stuffing, and should be cut so that it can be laid out as flat as possible. If he doesn't oblige, you can trim it yourself so that the meat is a flat piece, about an inch and a half thick. Spread it with the following stuffing, roll, skewer and/or tie, and roast in a 325 oven for $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 hours depending upon whether you like your lamb "just done" or very well done.

1 box chopped frozen spinach (thawed but not cooked)

1 tsp. ground red pepper or chili powder

1 tsp. ground coriander

1/2 stick butter (1/8 of pound)

4 chopped cloves of garlic

1 two-inch piece of ginger root (chopped)

1 large onion (chopped)

1 tsp. salt

1 cup cooked rice (minute or long cooking as you prefer)

1/4 to 1/2 cup yoghurt (this is used as a binder, so use only

what you need to make the mix easy to spread)

Brown onion in butter, slowly. Add chopped garlic and ginger, stir for three minutes. Add other spices and cook about ten minutes more. Add chopped spinach and simmer slowly for ten minutes then stir in cooked rice and yoghurt. Spread on meat, roll up as you would a jelly roll, tie and roast. This is attractive served surrounded by additional spinach-rice mixture, omitting the yoghurt.

The roast may be prepared in advance and frozen. I usually make two or three at one time and freeze them. To do this, remove the roast from the oven ½ hour before it is done. Cool, wrap and freeze. Pour off pan gravy and freeze. To reheat, remove from freezer in time for complete thawing, (the night before or early morning during warm weather). Roast 1 hour at 325, basting occasionally with the reheated pan juice.

In the original Palak Gosht, the meat is cubed and combined with the spinach

mixture.
