Talking Points Senator Robert Dole Fundraiser for Senator Orrin G. Hatch March 28, 1994

- •Introduction/Neighborhood Caucus Day: It is a particular honor to be with you today because it is Utah's Neighborhood Caucus Day (formerly called Mass Meetings: this is the meeting in Utah where republicans vote for delegates to the county and state conventions). It is important that fellow republicans participate in these meetings and make our voices heard.



At present there is no Democrat candidate. Congressman Bill Orton, a conservative Democrat who prides himself on openly abandoning the Democrats on high-profile votes, was poised to run, but then took himself out of the race. After much prompting from state party officials, Orton said he would reconsider, but finally announced that he would instead seek re-election to the Congress. Grethe (pronounced Gretta) Peterson, all but assured of the nomination, surprised everyone by dropping out of the race. Most recently, the Democrats have been working to recruit '92 Senate candidate Doug Anderson, who lost in the '92 Democrat primary to former Congressman Wayne Owens. Anderson has said that if he runs he wants the Utah Democrats to refashion the party into a broad-based movement that tolerates all points of view, and unlike in '92, Anderson does not plan to use his substantial wealth to finance his campaign. The Democrats are running out of time: the filing deadline is in 2 1/2 weeks (March 17).

Hatch has received his share of negative publicity in the state because of the BCCI scandal. However, both the U.S. Justice Department and the Senate Ethics Committee have cleared him of any wrongdoing. This makes Hatch less vulnerable and much harder to beat than was previously thought.



Hatch Nearly Escapes Utah's Filing Deadline Without Democratic Foe

At Last Minute, Former Hill Staffer Agrees to the Uphill Battle

By Craig Winneker

With just moments to go before the filing deadline, Utah Democrats fielded a challenger to three-term Sen. Orrin Hatch (R), but he's not the person they had hoped would make the race,

After several other candidates decided against running, the task fell to Pat Shea, a former Democratic National Committeeman and unsuccessful 1992 gubernatorial candidate.

Shea, 46, filed his candidacy with the Secretary of State on Thursday afternoon, just a half-hour before the 5 p.m. deadline.

A former chairman of the state Democ-

ratic party, Shea also has experience as a Congressional aide: He worked as an investigator for the House Judiciary Committee in 1973 during its probe of the Kent State shooting; as assistant staff director of the Senate Intelligence Committee in 1975-76; and as counsel to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in 1979-1980. He now works as a lawyer in Salt Lake City.

In the 1992 gubernatorial primary, Shea was defeated by former Judge Stewart Hanson, 57 to 43 percent. Hanson went on to place third in the general election — receiving just 23 percent of the vote and fin-

ishing 11 points behind Independent Merrill Cook. Hatch has watched as several potential challengers passed on the race—perhaps dispirited by Senate Ethics Committee and Justice Department decisions last year to clear him of any wrongdoing after probing his ties to the Bank of Credit and Commerce International.

The most prominent among the wouldbe candidates, Rep. Bill Orton (D), had scored well against Hatch in hypothetical general election matchups. (In the most recent survey, taken at the end of December by Dan Jones and Associates, Hatch was held below 50 percent and led Orton by just 6 points, 47 to 41 percent.)

But Orton said he didn't want to endure a hard-fought primary race against Democratic activist Grethe Peterson, who had already begun a campaign, and said he would instead run for re-election to his House seat. Peterson, however, then shocked party leaders in January by scuttling her campaign, citing fundraising frustrations.

Hatch reported a \$1 million war chest at the end of 1993.

Orton said he would reconsider his decision but eventually reaffirmed his intention to run for re-election to the House. That left Democrats looking to businessman Doug Anderson, who had lost a bit-

ter Senate primary in 1992 against then-Rep. Wayne Owens (D).

Anderson angered party leaders in that primary because of his relentless attacks on Owens, who went on to lose the general election. But those leaders were apparently ready to forgive Anderson if he would make the Hatch challenge. They also hoped he would be able to use his personal wealth to fund the campaign, as he had done in 1992 to the tune of \$1 million.

Party sources said last week that Anderson decided not to make the race because his partner in a business consulting firm had health problems.

After filing on Thursday, Shea left for a previously scheduled family vacation.

In a telephone interview, he said he had told party leaders three months ago that he was available for a Senate race if no one else would run.

"I think it's very important to have competition in our political process,"
Shea said.

Meanwhile, in Utah's 1st district, Rep. James Hansen (R) will face a challenge from Bobbie Coray, the Cache County economic development director.

In the 2nd district, freshman Rep. Karen Shepherd (D) will have to take on two general election challengers: her 1992 opponent, Republican Enid Greene Waldholtz; and millionaire Independent Cook.

And in the 3rd district, three Republicans are vying for the nomination to face Orton. Emery County Commissioner Dixie Thompson, banker Brent White; and Utah County Commissioner Gary Herbert

Utah's '94 Statewide Election Prospects Include Mixed Review of Possibilities

Utah's congressional contests now have a full and formal field for this year's elections. Whether ensuing campaigns will generate excitement, significance or the unexpected is another

question.

In the only statewide contest, for U.S. senator, the initial impact is a let-down caused by the Democratic Party. As a lest-minute candidate, volunteering because, apparently, no one else would take the chance, Salt Lake City lawyer Pat Shea declared himself the Democrat opponent to Republican incumbent Orrin Hatch, who is a cinch to oversome nuisance competition from overcome nuisance competition from political unknowns Warren Hardy, Kent Butler, Stephen C. Heldt and Gil-bert Majcher.

Prospects for the eventual partisan contest aren't amplicions. If a challenge to Mr. Hatch's bid for a fourth term is to be credible, it must be wholehearted, we'll managed and organized and, above all, heavily financed.

all, heavily financed.
In most of those regards, Mr. Shea enters trailing badiy. Recruited because no one clse could be, he seems less than enthostastically committed. Agreeable to the chore at Thursday's filing deadline, his organization is substantially behind Sen. Hatch's.

hind Sen. Hatch's.



Demos Try to Scrape Up Last-Minute Senate Candidate

Going into the final day for Utah candidates to file, Democrats have no one to challenge three-term incumbent Sen. Orrin Hatch.

Doug Anderson, who last week said he was more than 90% sure he would run for the Senate, told Democratic leaders Wednesday he would not file because of private business pressures.

He even went to Washington, D.C., with Utah Democratic Chairman Dave Jones last week at the invitation of Democratic leaders in the U.S. Senate and met with Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell and Vice President Al Gore. But, he informed Jones on Wednesday that his business partner in their international consulting firm had become ill, forcing Anderson to continue the business operations himself.

Democrats, scrambling for a mainline candidate ever since Grethe Peterson of Park City decided in December to withdraw from the race, first had placed their hopes on 3rd Congressional District Rep. Bill Orton of Provo.

He waited until February to say he would seek re-election to his present seat.

Anderson has been the only establishment political type courted by party officials, although constitutionalist John Benson announced Saturday he would file as Democrat. He had not as of 5 p.m. Wednesday.

"At this point, we don't have a candidate," sald Jones. "We are having meetings [today], and by deadline we will have a candidate."

Meetings have been scheduled today with State Senate Minority Leader Scott Howell, a Salt Lake City businessman, and Salt Lake attorney Pat Shea, who was defeated in the Democratic primary for governor two years ago.

Howell has indicated he would run if Anderson did not run, but he hedged Wednesday. "I thought all along Anderson would run," he said. "Now I'll have to make a decision and I will have a decision by tomorrow."

Jones said the Democrats have "no other options [other than Howell and Shea] at this time, unless Doug Anderson changes his mind."

That possibility is not expected to happen.

Mr. Shea is an attorney and currently runs a private lobbying/legal practice in Salt Lake City. He is a former staff member of the Senate Foreign Affairs committee, and has represented and lobbied for many of Utah's largest media interests.

Mr. Shea is also the former chairman of the Utah State Democratic Party. In 1992, he ran an unsuccessful primary campaign for Utah's gubernatorial seat. He is an effective fundraiser and is well-known in Utah and Washington.

Maine: Rep. Tom Andrews (D) and Rep. Olympia Snowe (R) are already sparring over support for the balanced budget amendment, setting the stage for what could be the most evenly matched race this year. The latent clout of retiring Sen. George

Mitchell (D) gives Andrews the early edge, but it should remain close through November. Leaning Democratic Retention.

Ohio: Legal services entrepreneur <u>Joel Hyatt</u> (D) may be losing some of his luster as a recent poll shows Cuyahoga Co. Commissioner <u>Mary Boyle</u> (D) closing somewhat. Hyatt still has a big money edge, although Boyle is picking up support from EMILY's list which could grow if she makes a move.

<u>Texas:</u> Businessman and Perotite <u>Richard Fisher</u> (D) is given the edge in the April 12 runoff against former State Atty. Gen. <u>Jim Mattox</u> (D). Fisher is given a better shot than Mattox against Sen. <u>Kay Bailey Hutchison</u> (R), but is still considered a decided underdog. <u>Probable Republican Retention</u>.

<u>Utah</u>: Republicans received very good news that one of their most vulnerable, Sen. <u>Orrin Hatch</u> (R), will be challenged by a third-tier Democrat, former DNC committeeman <u>Pat Shea</u> (D). Hatch still has negatives, but Shea is not the caliber candidate Democrats hoped to recruit. <u>Probable Republican Retention</u>.

Virginia: The hands of Nancy Reagan, former Sen. Paul Laxalt (R.-Nev.) and Sen. John Warner (R.-Va.) are clearly visible in former President Ronald Reagan's letter condemning ex-NSC Aide Oliver North (R). North is so far ahead for the nomination at the state convention that it is doubtful ex-OMB Director James Miller (R) can overtake him, but the Reagan letter hurts for the general election against Sen. Chuck Robb (D). Two other developments could chip away at North: supporters of home-schooler Mike Farris (R) are re-thinking blanket support of North as a possible waste of their new clout, and Gov. George Allen (R) is being pressed by Miller supporters, including Warner, to join the anti-North crusade.

Meanwhile, the re-airing of stories of his sexual indiscretions have hurt Robb, confirming the prospect of two badly weakened candidates meeting in November and again stirring interest by ex-Gov. <u>Douglas Wilder</u> (D) to run as an independent. <u>Leaning Republican Takeover</u>.
