Dear Parent/Carer

In November 2019, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland and the Care Inspectorate visited Meethill Primary School and Nursery Class. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- The nurturing and supportive relationships across the school and nursery class leading to children's readiness to learn.
- The staff team across the school and nursery class who work well together and are ready to develop their skills and knowledge to improve learning experiences.
- In the nursery setting, practitioners use of the outdoor environment to skilfully support children to be creative, curious and confident.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from Aberdeenshire Council.

- Improve children's attainment in literacy and numeracy. Staff should establish a clear strategy to raise attainment and achievement for all children across the school and nursery class which increases expectations of standards and progression in learning.
- Work as a team to ensure all children experience high quality learning and teaching.
- Staff should ensure all children have increased opportunities to lead their own learning and be more involved in evaluating their own progress.

We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using quality indicators from [How good is our school? \(4<sup>th</sup> edition\)](#) and [How good is our early learning and childcare?](#) Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
