Dear Parent/Carer

In January 2018, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland visited Bun-sgoil Stafainn and Sgoil Araich. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- The strong start that children in the Sgoil Araich are making to their learning. In particular, they are progressing well in their understanding of Gaelic, and development of literacy and numeracy.
- Children who are content, ambitious and value their learning. They are ambassadors for their school, community and the Gaelic language through their high profile successes in national and local competitions.
- The range and quality of partnerships that the staff have developed with the community, parents and Comunn na Gàidhlig. These partners, along with staff, are increasing children's knowledge of their local area, as well as Gaelic culture and music. Partners enhance children's fluency in Gaelic.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from The Highland Council.

- Develop a more strategic approach to self-evaluation and the leadership of change as a responsibility of all staff. Self-evaluation needs to be more firmly centred on the Gaelic aspects of the school and the Sgoil Araich. The headteacher should ensure that all stakeholders are involved in improving the school, based on a climate of collegiality.
- Continue to develop the curriculum to raise attainment. This should focus on defining further children's progression, development of skills and, at the primary stages, more of the curriculum being through the medium of Gaelic.
- Develop a strategic approach to health and wellbeing which builds on the school's vision, values and aims and the use of wellbeing indicators.
- Increase the pace of developing effective arrangements to assess, track and evidence the progress that children are making. Staff should ensure that this information is used to plan learning and timely interventions. Parents need to be better informed of their children's progress.



We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate some quality indicators from How good is our school? (4th edition). Quality indicators help schools, education authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers evaluations of quality indicators to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.

Here are Education Scotland's evaluations for Bun-sgoil Stafainn and Sgoil Àraich.
