El Valor's Community Day Services actively nurtures socialization, life skills development, and full community engagement for adults with disabilities. Our drama and music classes exemplify just one of the many avenues where they not only have fun but also strengthen crucial social skills.

Culinary Exploration

Our cooking class has become an integral part of our El Valor Day Program.

Participants eagerly dive into learning new recipes while honing essential life skills like cutting, frying, and gaining overall kitchen knowledge. A standout favorite is the renowned El Valor Salsa, a recipe our participants now whip up with minimal guidance. This class not only offers a delightful culinary experience but also serves as a flavorful journey for our adults to enhance their life skills in a fun and engaging way.







Nurturing Conservation Through Partnerships

At El Valor, we prioritize environmental education across all our programs. Through impactful partnerships, with the National Audubon Society & U.S. Forest Service, our families and staff access unique opportunities to learn about conservation. Audubon provides engaging outings to local parks and nature preserves where participants explore migratory birds, ecologies, and local nature areas. These experiences cover diverse topics, including food sources and the interplay between science and nature. Conservation efforts extend to workshops, science activities, and gardening initiatives for plant identification.





A notable example is El Valor's participation in the 2023 Migratory & Urban Bird Institute at Lakeland Community College in Kirtland, Ohio. This workshop equips our staff with knowledge on integrating bird ecology, identification, and conservation activities into educational programs. El Valor's team plans to use this information to design outreach programs, drawing attention to the significance of migratory birds and actionable steps. This workshop is a collaborative effort between the International Programs of the U.S. Forest Service, Wings Across the Americas, and the Department of Fisheries, Wildlife, and Conservation Biology at the University of Minnesota.

We express our heartfelt gratitude to partners like the National Audubon Society and the U.S. Forest Service for their invaluable contributions, helping us underscore the importance of science and nature in our communities.

Childrens Programs

5 Years of Community Baby Showers

Bridging the Techonology Divide

At El Valor, each of our Children & Family Centers features a SMART Classroom with diverse themes like forestry, oceanography, and space. Equipped with SMART Boards, teachers lead interactive STEAM-based lessons. Access to iPads and laptops is also provided to bridge the technology gap in the communities we serve. We are grateful to offer young learners the opportunity to engage with the latest technology, enriching their educational experience.



In-Home Enrichment for Families

El Valor's 'Birth to 3 In Home Visiting Services' provides comprehensive programming directly in the family's home, creating a tailored learning environment in their preferred language. Our dedicated Parent Infant Educators (PIE's) visit families weekly, delivering family health services and valuable resources. They bring age-appropriate aides, school readiness activities, and information tailored to each family's needs, including prenatal health care. Twice a month, families also engage in socialization groups hosted at the Children & Family Centers.

These gatherings foster a supportive environment for sharing meals, developing social skills, and building connections among peers in a safe and inclusive setting.





Empowering Parents, Fostering Learning

At El Valor, we recognize parents as a child's first teachers, emphasizing the importance of learning at home. Throughout the year, we provide various opportunities for parents to engage with their children. Earlier this year, parents enjoyed visiting classrooms, sharing meals, and participating in art activities, creating cherished moments.





A particularly memorable celebration in our calendar is Mother's Day, where each center orchestrates unique activities to honor the incredible contributions of mothers. These festivities include spa days, heartwarming performances by the little ones, artistic paint and sip sessions, and invigorating Zumba classes, offering a blend of joy and relaxation. Community Partners

Environmental Education with the U.S. Forest Service

Thanks to our flourishing partnership with the U.S. Forest Service (USFS), El Valor has soared in its conservation efforts and expanded its monarch conservation program. We engage in workshops like the 2023 Migratory & Urban Bird Institute (MUBI) in St. Paul, Minnesota. This collaborative effort between the University of Minnesota and the USFS International Programs, has equipped our staff with birding basics and skills to lead walks, providing enriching experiences in nature for diverse audiences, including adults with unique needs.







The Minneapolis Monarch Festival has been another enriching experience for our staff. They actively engage in activities, bringing back newfound knowledge to share with our children, adults, and families.

A standout event is the International Seminar on Urban Forestry, where El Valor has the privilege of hosting global visitors. In the 2023 Seminar, we welcomed 11 international foresters from Bangladesh, Bosnia & Herzegovina, Brazil, Egypt, Ghana, Malawi, Ukraine, and Vietnam. Our dedicated participants and staff showcased presentations on El Valor's monarch butterfly program and various conservation initiatives. Notably, our adults demonstrated their culinary prowess, showcasing how to make our famous salsa and quacamole. Thank you to Mike Rizo and the US Forest Service for their incredible partnership, which continues to fuel the success of our monarch butterfly program and create a lasting positive impact!

Tropical Optical is a strong supporter of El Valor. Their team visits our adult program twice per year to perform eye exams and fit our clients for glasses.


Our program schedules thousands of medical appointments per year. When a clinic visits El Valor, it saves us valuable time and money.


Harmony of Culture: Mariachi Internacional Los Pérez at Noche Mexicana




