

The Board of Directors of Schlumberger Limited met on October 1 in New York City and unanimously elected Euan Baird Chairman, President and Chief Executive Officer replacing Michel Vaillaud.

Mr. Baird, 49, joined Schlumberger in 1960, and held various wireline assignments with increasing responsibility in Europe, Africa, the Far East and the Middle East. In 1974 he became Personnel Manager and in 1976 Vice President – Operations in Paris for Wireline activity in Europe, Africa, Asia and South America. In 1979 he was appointed Executive Vice President in charge of worldwide operations in New York. He was elected a Schlumberger Director in 1986.

Mr. Baird attended Aberdeen University in Scotland and is a graduate of Cambridge University.



Mary is a married mother with three active teenagers. Her elderly mother moved in with them six months after her second husband died, and is constantly arguing with the kids, talks out loud to her dead husband, and cries herself to sleep every night. This stressful home situation is affecting Mary's work performance. She's been a half hour late to work several times this month because of morning arguments between her mother and the kids. She feels caught in the middle...

John is having trouble sleeping and doesn't have much appetite. He becomes fatigued and just manages to get through the day. He's lost 10 pounds recently. He's unhappy with his life, but isn't sure where to turn...

Jane is spending a lot of money going out weekends, partying with friends. She gets angry when friends won't ride with her when she's been drinking. They say she drinks too much to drive. She doesn't remember how she got home last Saturday night. Her friends tell her about the hilarious things she did, but Jane doesn't remember anything after midnight...

These are fictitious "case histories." But they are examples of some of the problems an Employee Assistance Program handles through counseling and referrals.

If Mary, John and Jane were Data Systems Division employees, should they discuss their problems with an EAP Counselor?

"Very definitely," say Ken Kinzie and Holly Burcenski. Holly and Ken are Counselors available to help employees and their families, through our Employee Assistance Program.

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AVIATION RECORDERS MOVING FROM CALIFORNIA TO SARASOTA


Ray Ochoa, Manager of our Aviation Recorders West Coast Operations, came to Sarasota in September to train Data Systems Division personnel to produce Flight Data Recorder components and to assist in the orderly transfer of this segment of our Aviation Recorders business to Sarasota.

As announced in May, the Los Angeles facility is being phased out. Analog Flight Data Recorders, using the foil recording medium, and Cockpit Voice Recorders cable harnesses have been produced in California in the past. Manufacture of spare parts and recording foil for these analog units, and any necessary repairs of older units, will be handled through our Sarasota operations in the future.

Ray Ochoa, who observed his 25th service anniversary with Fairchild on June 6 of this year, joined the company at its Harbor Street location in Commerce, Calif. (Los Angeles) in 1961. The operation was moved to the present Sheila

NEW IMPROVED WAVE SOLDER SYSTEM WILL BE INSTALLED

New replacement equipment for the Printed Wiring Assembly wave soldering and cleaning process has been authorized. The new equipment is scheduled to be installed during the plant year-end shutdown.

This new state-of-the-art automatic wave soldering system involves a considerable amount of facility modification and installation effort, including new power lines and water and sewer lines. The new equipment will be installed in the same location as the existing wave solder system. The present wave soldering equipment will be moved slightly north of its present location and kept as back-up until the new system is fully operational. The old system will then be sold.

"The new system is a major capital investment, and promises to be more effective, while offering a safer and more pleasant work environment for employees in the wave solder and adjacent areas," said Tony Reali, of Manufacturing Engineering.

SAFETY AWARENESS HELPS AVOID PAINFUL INJURIES

NSTL SYSTEM SHIPPED

A major telemetry data processing system was shipped this month to Lockheed at NSTL, Mississippi, for ultimate use by the Navy at the Fleet Numeric Oceanography Center (FNOC), Monterey, Calif. The contract is valued at approximately \$2,000,000.

Lockheed has the responsibility for integrating our system with a Perkin Elmer computer system at the National Space Technology Laboratory (NSTL) facility in Mississippi. The integrated system will subsequently go to California.


The EMR ground equipments are new 8000-series based systems and will be handling satellite data from TIROS-N, SMS, GOES-AAA, and DMSP (Defense Military Satellite Program) satellites.

"The standard 8330s and 8340s were modified and 11 new cards were designed to aid in meeting the customer's requirements," explained Program Manager Tom Pittet. "The entire design, assembly, integration and test was completed in 11 months."

"We'd like to say thanks to all the employees who made it possible for us to bring this system together on schedule," Tom said.







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LOWER LOAN RATES AT CREDIT UNION

Effective October 10, 1986, the Credit Union has lowered its loan rates. The rates are scaled to the vehicle years as follows:

1986 & 1987	9%	Maximum Repayment	
1985	12%	Schedule	
1984	13%	48 Months	
1983	14%	+0 Wonths	
All others	15%		

The Credit Union Board of Directors has also waived the \$15 Loan Administrative Fee and Loan Insurance costs on new cars, vans and trucks to give Members additional savings.

The maximum amount a member may borrow has been increased to \$14,500 (Collateral \$13,000 and Signature \$1,500).

If you have recently bought a new vehicle, the Credit Union will now refinance new cars, vans or trucks at 9%, provided the refinancing occurs within 90 days of the date of the original bank note. Call the Credit Union Office, Ext. 5535, for more information.
