

National spotlight on successes of students, faculty By Chancellor Philip Marshall

It is a joy to be associated with a university which has such outstanding students and faculty. In many areas it is easy to list their accomplishments. And in some cases they are truly outstanding. Athletics is no doubt the easiest area to identify because one can list wins and losses, championships, etc. And this year is no exception in that regard. Under new head coach Jay Eck, the men's basketball team also won a championship and D.J. Leroy's football team came within two plays of an undefeated season. Jeff Stepanski was a national champion in swimming as were Arnie Schrader and Michelle Riedi in track. Michelle set a new national record in the high jump. And for the first time in history, our men's athletic teams combined to win the WSUC all-sports trophy.

But this institution has far more than a strong athletic program. It is just that those accomplishments are easier


Recently I was talking to Steve Odden, chair of the English Department, at a reception following our annual Rites of Writing. Steve observed that our writing program was better than our basketball program. I was somewhat taken aback. One does not normally compare two such disparate activities. I reminded him that the basketball program had won five consecutive WSUC championships and two years ago was second in the national tourney. Steve replied, "Yeah, I know."

The writing program is indeed very good, although I

don't know how I could compare it to the basketball program. Steve may be a little biased, but I am glad that he has such confidence in that program.

This conversation led me to ask a new question. What if we listed academic and other non-athletic extracurricular accomplishments the way we do in athletics? What kind of a list could be assembled? You might be surprised.

The president, vice-president and secretary of the Wisconsin State Home Economics association are all from Stevens Point. At a recent national meeting in Communicative Disorders there were more research papers presented by students from UW-SP than from any other institution. Last summer one of our students was selected as the top cadet in the ROTC basic camp at Fort



Knox, Ky. There were cadets from 419 institutions at this

The past year the UW-SP chapter of Beta Beta Beta (biology club) was chosen as the best student chapter in the nation (out of 338 such chapters). The chapter also won this award in 1981 and 1984. Among candidates taking the CPA exam for the first time, UW-SP graduates have had the highest percentage passing all four parts of the exam of any institution in Wisconsin. This has been true every year since 1982. In addition, Wisconsin traditionally has had the highest pass rate of any state in the union. In 1985 Steve Hansen scored among the top 500 students nationally (from about 70,000 candidates each year) and in 1984 John McCormick scored among the top 100 students.

This year the Adventors Club (a joint effort between Business and Communications) won the regional competition (Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota) in a national advertising contest. In this contest college groups design an advertising campaign for a large national company and then present that campaign in written and oral form before a panel of judges. The university won this regional competition in six of the past eight years. Last year they placed third in the nation.

Our Student Economic Leadership Forum won the regional Free Enterprise Competition in 1984 and 1985. There were 20 colleges and universities competing from a four-state region. One of our students won the "best entrant" award in 1985.

This year one of our English majors received the Outstanding Student Teacher of the Year award presented by the Wisconsin Council of Teachers of English. UW-SP students also won this award in 1982 and 1983. Our students have won honors in both the poetry and the play divisions of the state American Association of Teachers of French competition in 1984

For the past several years the UW-SP entry in the American College Theatre Festival has been selected to compete in the regional competition. Frequently we have been the only entry from Wisconsin chosen for this honor. The play selected this year was Amadeus. And finally, Fantasy For a Few Good Men, choreographed by Linda Caldwell, was selected to be presented in Washington, D.C. as a part of the National American College Dance Festival. This dance is one of nine which will be presented at the gala finale on the last night of the four-day festival. John Millard, one of the dancers in Fantasy For a Few Good Men has been nominated as the outstanding dancer of the entire competition.

This is just a short list, but I'm out of room. It really feels good to be associated with these outstanding people.

Hall of Famers chosen

Five star athletes from the past and a faculty member who was instrumental in the development of sports programs for women will be inducted Oct. 11 into the UW-SP Athletic Hall of Fame.

Marge Spring, a retired physical education professor, and Sue Brogaard, who excelled in several sports in her student days, will be the first women inductees in the history of the recogntion program.

Since the hall was established in 1959, a total of 52 men have been chosen for membership. Plaques with their photographs and information about their contributions to Pointer teams and achievements as business or professional people are displayed near the entrance to Quandt Gymnasium.

They will be joined by four men who have been chosen for honors this year: Fred Kestly, longtime athletic director at Pulaski High School, who was a standout in football, basketball, track and field from 1955 to 1958; Jeff Gosa, elementary teacher at Coleman, alltime leading pass receiver for the Pointers who played football from 1973 to 1976; Fran Roman, a Stevens Point insurance agent, a multi-talented athlete best known for his successes as a baseball player from 1954 to 1957; and Greg Charlesworth, retired administrator of the New London School System, who played football and basketball from 1927 to 1929.

Now holder of the honorary title of professor emeritus, Miss Spring taught and coached women's teams and promoted the upgrading of women's athletics from 1965 until her retirement in 1983.

Miss Brogaard, who was teaching on the high school level in Wild Rose before returning to UW-SP as a graduate student, was a standout performer in basketball, field hockey and tennis from 1974 to 1977

A committee representing community fans and university personnel selects the inductees.

The Hall of Fame Dinner is held in conjunction with homecoming. Besides that event, the honorees are special guests at the homecoming football game earlier in the day and introduced to the audience at halftime.



Building additions planned

Officials at UW-SP have announced they will seek state funding for six major building projects between 1987 and 1993. The total cost of the construction is estimated at \$20 million.

Top priority is a proposed addition to the Physical Education Building which would include a new pool, locker rooms and facilities to accommodate the growing wellness program. Cost would be about \$7 million.

That work, plus a \$2.5 million remodeling to upgrade food service facilities in the DeBot Center, has been requested for the 1987 to '89 biennium.

Between 1989 and 1991, a \$5 million addition to the Natural Resources Building and a \$4 million addition to the Fine Arts Center is sought.

For 1991 to 1993, plans call for a \$2 million expansion of the Communication Arts Building (formerly the Campus Laboratory School) and a \$1 million addition on the Maintenance and Materiel Building.

An addition to the Science Building to house a new wing to be used primarily by the Department of Paper Science is expected to begin this summer. The structure will cost approximately \$2.2 million.

Hugh D. Walker of the history faculty and Robert Engelhard of the natural resources faculty and administrative staff, were on missions to the People's Republic of China late in 1985 to explore opportunities there for business people and students. ■

Indian art for UW-SP

The UW-SP Foundation has begun recruiting patrons to support the development of a one-of-a-kind permanent display of Indian art on campus.

The art objects would comprise a set of 34 hand carved figures to represent the five major clans plus subclans of the Menominee Indian Tribe. The figures would be in the likenesses of animals, birds and creatures which are part human and part animal.

James Frechette Jr. of Rhinelander has agreed to do

Frechette has been described by a representative of the National Indian Arts and Crafts Board as "the finest Indian artist in America today." Several of his works are on permanent display at UW-SP.

The Menominee clan people he creates are about 18 inches high and made of carved pine from the Menominee forests and acrylic paint. About 300 hours goes into the carving, and another 45 hours for the painting of each figure.

In a brochure for prospective donors, it is written that a display of the figures "would be inherently educational, stunningly beautiful, in harmony with the natural resource thrust of the University." The display would "have an emphatic attraction for alumni and tourists and, most importantly, build within the student body another strand of collegiate meaning."

UW-SP has been sponsoring annual exhibitions of traditional Indian art from the state's tribes and has begun purchasing items from them for a permanent collection that is expected, when more fully developed, to be a major attraction to the campus.

Scholarships for freshmen

The UW-SP Foundation will be awarding about \$150,000 in scholarships to high achieving students next year. Currently enrolled students are eligible to receive about \$60,000, and new freshmen will receive about \$90,000.

The money is from endowments that have been established in the foundation, primarily as memorials to former faculty members and alumni of the school.

When prospective freshmen for the fall of 1987 submit their applications for admissions, they will be invited to compete for the \$90,000 in scholarships providing they rank in the top 10 percent of their high school classes. Additional scholarships are available to students who are not in the top 10 percent of their classes, but who have excelled in extracurricular activities and in leadership.

Library space doubled

Rededication ceremonies for the James H. Albertson Learning Resources Center were held March 16 to mark completion of a \$7-plus million remodeling and expansion of the structure opened nearly 16 years ago.

Stevens Point's tallest building stands seven stories with a mechanical area on the top level.

The project doubled the floor space, and Dean James Shurter estimates the facility will be adequate to house the growing number of print and non-print materials through the late 1990s. There are now more than 26 miles of linear stack space throughout the building.

The collection includes about 300,000 volumes and non-print materials, about 800,000 documents mostly in the form of government publications, and about 2,000 current publications.

Fall enrollment limited

UW-SP, anticipating a larger freshman class than it can accommodate, will continue to guarantee admission this fall only to those high school graduates who ranked in the top third of their classes.

Chancellor Philip Marshall announced that the limited admissions policy went into effect on June 18.

Applications from all others for the fall semester are being handled on an individual basis, but Marshall said he doubted if many of the requests will be approved.

The temporary tightening of admission policies for this year will not be used in processing applications from transfer and nontraditional students because the university traditionally receives only a small number of them between June and September.

The university's regular policy of accepting students ranking in the top 70 percent of their high school classes will go back into effect this fall when applications start being received for new freshmen planning to enroll in the fall of 1987. However, if there is another large number of admissions requests during the ensuing year, restrictions may again be needed, the chancellor said.

The university had a record enrollment last fall of about 9,500, including 1,887 new freshmen. This year, applications from prospective new students are coming in at an even higher rate, Marshall said, and without putting on limitations their numbers probably would exceed 2,000.

The university lacks the money, faculty and facilities to accommodate additional growth, Marshall said. This fall, the university faces the prospect of having another record enrollment but a budget about \$500,000 less than last year because of cutbacks in state spending.



A view between ancient bones in the UW-SP Museum of Natural History.


Home ec students donate

A student organization at UW-SP has given \$100 to a professor to use in sponsoring a special project in support of the interior design program.

The UW-SP unit of the American Society of Interior Designers held several fund-raising events to raise the money which has been turned over to Professor Mary Ann Baird to be used for the enhancement of her instructional offerings. Because of budget constraints, academic departments at UW-SP have been seeking private funds to assist in financing purchases of equipment and sponsorship of special events. Tax deductible contributions for the home economics department can be sent to the UW-SP Foundation, in care of Billie Lou Sands, head of the UW-SP School of Home Economics.

Beverage course started

In the School of Home Economics, beverage management has become the topic of a new course in which students learn everything from pricing alcoholic drinks to making decisions on the kind of coffee to offer diners. Carol Wilson, a new faculty member, developed the course as part of the popular food service management major she is coordinating. In addition to having a Ph. D. from the University of Missouri, she brings 12 years of food service and restaurant experience to her classroom.



Earlier starting date

UW-SP has revised its calendar for the 1986-87 academic year to comply with new legislation prohibiting fall semester classes from starting before Sept. I and closing state facilities the third Monday in January in honor of Martin Luther King.

The new schedule calls for the fall semester to begin on Wednesday, Sept. 3 instead of Aug. 25, and for spring semester to start Jan. 20, one day later than previously

The midyear commencement will be moved up one week to Sunday, Dec. 14. The spring commencement will be May 17, 1987. ■

First 'All Sports' trophy

Paced by a fifth straight basketball championship and a second place finish in track, Stevens Point won its first Wisconsin State University Conference All-Sports Trophy in history this year. It ended a three-year reign by La

The Pointers captured the coveted trophy, which epitomizes overall athletic excellence, in some of the most intense competition in the 20-year history of the award.

This is apparent by the final point totals, which show Stevens Point with 57½, followed by Whitewater 56, Eau Claire 54½, La Crosse 54, Oshkosh 53, Stout 46½, River Falls 41½, Platteville 26 and Superior 12.

Stevens Point also finished third in football, golf and swimming, fourth in cross country and tennis, shared third with three other teams in baseball and wound up eighth in wrestling.

Runner-up Whitewater won the golf title and took second in basketball, wrestling and tennis. La Crosse won cross country and track championships, while River Falls captured titles in football and wrestling. Eau Claire finished first in swimming, Oshkosh in baseball and Stout in tennis.

Points are awarded in the all-sports competition according to the final standings in each sport on a 9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 basis. Finishes in indoor and outdoor track are combined to determine the overall track standings.

More wellness offerings planned

UW-SP which helped start the national movement for healthier lifestyles now is planning to train professionals to carry it out.

A new major in health promotion/wellness has been proposed for implementation next fall in the School of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics.

The UW-SP Faculty Senate has approved it and Chancellor Philip Marshall has sent the plan to Madison for a final okay from UW System officials.

Students who decide to pursue this program would work in a broad range of public and private facilities such as corporations, hospitals, YMCAs and YWCAs, and related fitness facilities.

The program is intended to be interdisciplinary and would include courses from the health—physical education—recreation, business, psychology, communication, philosophy, home economics, biology, sociology and several other departments.

The majors would be prepared to use the six dimensions of wellness model which was developed at the National Wellness Institute, an arm of the UW-SP Foundation. Those six areas are social, occupational, spiritual, physical, intellectual and emotional.

The focus of the major will be on worksite health, behavioral change and management, health promotion-marketing and family-community environment.

A health promotion/wellness movement was started in the early 1970s in the UW-SP health center primarily by Dr. Don Johnson, now with Sentry Insurance, and Dr. Bill Hettler, director of the campus facility. By 1974, physical education professors were beginning to incorporate some of the physicians' ideas into the university curriculum. Later modifications in the physical education major made it possible for students to pursue a wellness option which half of the current students not intending to be teachers are now doing.

The university's wellness offerings have been models for other schools and about 15 institutions in other states now have majors on that subject. If approved, the one at UW-SP would be the first in Wisconsin.

Accolades for teachers

Four area teachers were honored in February by UW-SP's School of Education as recipients of the annual "Outstanding Practitioner Awards."

Winners included Mary Gifford of Riverside Elementary School in Schofield; Barbara Splinter of Marshfield Junior High School; Sally Newby Ellingboe of the Stevens Point School District; and Arlon Parkin of Lincoln Elementary School in Wausau.

They were special guests at the university's winter conference for elementary and secondary teachers and administrators which this year focused on integrating art into the total curriculum of schools. In addition, they attended several classes and answered questions by students pursuing careers as teachers.

Each of them was given a framed certificate.

Ms. Gifford, cited for her work in elementary education, has been instrumental in the development of the curriculum for gifted and talented students in the D. C. Everest School District. She received a master's degree from UW-SP last December.

Ms. Splinter, the junior high school science department chairman in Marshfield, has been active in projects to encourage more women to study mathematics and science. She has served on a state committee with that objective. Ms. Splinter also received a master's degree from the university in December.

Ms. Ellingboe was an elementary teacher in the Stevens Point School District before being promoted to the position of environmental education coordinator. Part of her responsibilities involve the administration of the Boston School Forest which has about 5,000-student visitors annually She earned a bachelor's degree in 1969 and a master's degree in 1981 from UW-SP.

Parkin, who completed a bachelor's degree from the university in 1953, has been the longtime principal of his school in Wausau. His award acknowledged his "innovative" leadership in developing model programs for children ranging from gifted to learning disabled.

Computer information available to businesses

A nonprofit unit has been formed at UW-SP to provide professional computer information services to businesses, organizations, and individuals.

The Central Wisconsin Computer Information Services (CWCIS) is a self-sustaining unit affiliated with UW-SP's Division of Business and Economics.

Its director is Robert L. Dean who has served the university since 1982 as computer services director and as a faculty member teaching management information systems. He is a native of Kentucky, holds an M.B.A. degree, and is a candidate for the Ph.D. degree from the University of Kentucky.

In his new post Dean is coordinating technical consulting services, computer fairs and swap meets, and computer camps. In addition, a quarterly newsletter for CWCIS is prepared.

Resources for the consulting services include experienced computer information systems personnel from the faculty and staff within the UW system, data processing professionals working in a variety of industries in the state, and other systems professionals throughout the country.

Consultants are available to do needs analysis, feasibility studies, systems analysis and design, equipment and software selection, acquisition, and installation.

National computer demonstration site

UW-SP has been designated by AT&T Information Systems as a national test and demonstration site for the firm's newest equipment.

"There are dozens of other undergraduate regional universities in the Upper Midwest that would like to emulate the information systems already in place on this campus," said Gil Regnier of Minneapolis, AT&T vice president. "We want to showcase our systems in student laboratories and faculty and staff offices here," he added.

Chancellor Philip Marshall, said a faculty development program will be part of an agreement which UW-SP has made with the company. "We intend to partner with AT&T in designing and presenting course material on its operating system and on-premises networking, in addition to developing research grant proposals," Marshall continued.

Besides being designed as a test/demonstration center, UW-SP receives these other benefits from the agreement:

—A \$50,000 AT&T processor equipment grant;

Designation as the agent making the AT&T personal computer product line available at discounts to students, faculty and administrators elsewhere in the UW System.
 A visit from a contingent of Bell Lab scientists who will bring a new AT&T local area network called Starlan to campus for testing and development. The Starlan network allows different kinds of personal computers to communicate.

—Installation on campus of the firm's new 3B2/400 minicomputers—the first such installation in Wisconsin.

Early in 1985, the university hired AT&T to install a voice and data communication system that provides phone service as well as a means for all computers and word processing units at UW-SP to communicate with one another. It was one of the first installations of its kind on an American campus.

Before that, computer technology at the university was advanced with the announcement that UW-SP would be the only UW System school to win federal funding to promote computer literacy. Since that program began about three years ago, about \$1 million has been funneled into the campus, primarily for purchase of equipment and training for faculty and staff.

The university now has more than 400 minicomputers in operation throughout campus. Among the latest projects to be undertaken with them is one involving about 175 students in seven English composition classes who are learning to write essays with word processors.

"Weekend College" for older students

The UW-SP "Weekend College," established four years ago specifically for Indians, has been opened to all nontraditional students.

The coordinator, Martha St. Germaine, says efforts are being made to expand the offerings in view of enthusiastic responses from the initial participants.

During the spring semester, there have been classes in history—racial groups in the United States and the history of Menominee Indians; geography—the physical environment under stress; economics—personal finance.

"The beauty of this program is that people can attend the university without it interfering with their jobs and without having to give up all of their weekends with their families," says Ms. St. Germaine.

Classes are conducted late Friday afternoons and evenings and Saturday mornings. Each semester involves 10 weekends of class attendance—every third Friday and Saturday are free times.

Participants may enroll for either three or six credits (one or two classes).

"Weekend College" registration is handled by Ms. St. Germaine separately from regular signups administered by the registrar. Interested participants may begin arranging now to be in the program. Her office is on the second floor of the Park Student Services Building; the phone number is 346-3576.

Reading, writing promoted

Professors at UW-SP aren't content to produce graduates whose reading and writing skills are merely "adequate."

"We want students to seek excellence in these areas instead of doing just the minimum," says Richard Behm who is directing UW-SP's new Academic Achievement Center.

At most colleges and universities in this country, similar facilities emphasize remediation. "Surely we want to help students with needs, and we are," the director explains.

In the positive approach, UW-SP's center is intended to attract people who like to read books and mold the language. Going a step further, the center's staff strives to cultivate an appreciation for and an interest in literature and composition among the indifferent.

The Academic Achievement Center has been formed through the consolidation of the former Writing Lab, Reading/Study Skills Lab and a resource facility that has been in the development stages several years for area teachers and other professionals whose careers are tied to reading and writing.

Foremost, the new center is designed "to serve all students and give them the critical skills in reading and writing necessary for success in college," Behm declares.

However, public service will be addressed, too, in a continuation of the kinds of assistance provided in the Writing Lab to people from off campus plus faculty/staff of the university

In expanded offerings for clients wanting to become better readers, Behm said the focus will be on ways of creating links between reading and critical thinking and improving comprehension. There will be no push for speed-reading, he adds. "If something is worth reading, it's worth savoring."

A pilot project is underway involving the center staff and students in philosophy and communication classes taught by Richard Feldman and Kathryn Jeffers. Their students are doing extensive writing about assigned readings.

Behm announced that Susan Casper of the English department faculty is coordinating the writing projects, and Alice Randlett is in charge of the reading activities. A decision has not been made on the management plan for the resource facility for professionals.

Staffers working with Behm, in addition to coordinators, include one half-time writing specialist, three quarter-time writing specialists, one quarter-time director of the independent writing course, two graduate assistants, about 30 peer tutors and several volunteers from campus and the community.

The center is in Room 27 in the lower level of the Albertson Learning Resources Center.

DEATHS OF RETIRED FACULTY



Fern Horn 1923-1986

Fern M. Horn, 62, a retired home economics professor at UW-SP, died of cancer Thursday, Jan. 23, at her home, 3634 S. 75th St., Milwaukee.

She had been on the UW-SP faculty from 1966 until 1980 when she retired because of illness and was granted the honorary title of professor emeritus.

A private funeral service for the family was held in Milwaukee. The body was cremated. A memorial has been established in her name in the UW-SP Foundation for a student scholarship fund. Contributions may also be sent in her name to the Milwaukee Visiting Nurses Hospice Home Care and the American Cancer Society.

Miss Horn was born March 2, 1923, near Chili in Clark County, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Horn. She was a graduate of the Loyal High School and received a certificate to teach and later a bachelor's degree from UW-SP, a master's degree from UW-Stout and a doctorate from Michigan State University.

She began her teaching career in 1943 and served at rural schools in Clark County for three years and later in the home economics departments of high schools in Oxford, Wonewoc, Mosinee, Schofield and Eau Claire.

On the collegiate level, she taught at UW-Stout where she was acting dean of the home economics program for two years. Prior to coming to Stevens Point three years later, she served at the University of Minnesota.

As a specialist in home economics curriculum development, Miss Horn was a consultant for the U.S. Office of Education and the education departments of experience of the control states.

several states.

The American Home Economics Association cited her in 1979 for serving as a member of its council for professional development. In 1980, UW-Stout gave her the alumni distinguished service award, its highest recognition of a graduate. In 1982, the Home Economics Teacher Education national organization honored her by publishing her biography in a yearbook entitled "Seventy Significant Leaders." And, she received the Wisconsin State 4-H Alumni Award in 1968.

Miss Horn's survivors are one sister, Mrs. Harry (Sylvia) Koroghlanian of Milwaukee; two nephews and four nieces. Her parents and one brother have died.



Warren Jenkins

Warren Gard Jenkins, 81, a retired dean at UW-SP, died April 11 at a nursing home in Wisconsin Rapids where he had been a patient since January.

A memorial service was held April 15 at the Episcopal Church of the Intercession in Stevens Point. The body was cremated and burial followed in Okeana, Ohio.

Memorial funds were being established for the Church of the Intercession and the UW-SP Foundation.

Jenkins served as a history professor on the UW-SP faculty 38 years, from 1934 to 1972. In 1952 when the College of Letters and Science was established on campus, he was chosen as its first dean and held the post for 18 years. He also was an initiator of the College of Fine Arts and served as its first head in the capacity of acting dean. His other contributions to the university included service as chairman of the faculty and acting dean of men.

Shortly before his retirement, the university community honored him by naming the new drama theater in the Fine Arts Center for him.

In the early part of his career on campus, he had served as technical director and drama adviser for the college theater organization, assisting students with the staging of about 20 plays. He also coached intercollegiate boxing for several years.

Jenkins was born Dec. 12, 1904, on a farm near Okeana, Ohio, son of John and Anna Jenkins. He was graduated from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, and received his master's degree and doctorate from UW-Madison. Except for one year as a sixth grade teacher in Hamilton, Ohio, he spent his entire career at UW-SP.

In addition to serving as clerk of the Village of Park Ridge, he was president of the Portage County Historical Society and a member of the board of curators of the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. He had a hobby of operating ham radios.

Jenkins and Marion Bourne, a teacher in rural Indiana, were married May 30, 1931. The couple lived in Park Ridge until her death last September.

Survivors include one son, Richard, Park Ridge; one daughter, Mrs. Norman (Barbara) Schultz, Fairfax, Va.; three grandchildren and one great-grandchild. In addition to his wife, one brother and two sisters have died.



Philip Falk 1897-1986

Funeral services for Philip H. Falk, 88, a former president of the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, were held May 8 in Madison.

Falk was the fifth man to head the institution, then known as Central State Teachers College, and his tenure in office for little more than a semester in 1938-39 was the shortest in the institution's history.

After leaving here, he served as superintendent of the Madison school district, retiring in 1962.

He died May 4 at a Madison nursing home, and services were held at the Cress Funeral Home. Burial was in Riverside Cemetery in Stoughton.

Falk returned to the Stevens Point campus in 1980 at the invitation of Chancellor Philip Marshall who secured approval from the UW Board of Regents to give the former campus administrator the honorary title of UW-SP president emeritus.

During an interview, Falk acknowledged that his decision to leave the presidency so soon after assuming it was met with disfavor among townspeople. But the reason for his decision was not only because the Madison school chief's post carried a better salary. He said his wife had medical problems and preferred being nearer to her physician in Madison.

Born June 13, 1897, in Stoughton, he was educated at UW-Madison, taught and was an administrator in several school districts in Lake Mills and Stoughton, and was a principal and district administrator in Waukesha before coming to Stevens Point.

In addition to education, Falk served as chairman of the Madison Redevelopment Corporation and was active in the Wisconsin Partners of the Americas Program. He made several trips to Nicaragua as a Partners official to supply agricultural and educational assistance. A school in that country was named for him. An elementary school in Madison also was named in his honor.

Falk was a member and officer of numerous organizations for school teachers and administrators, a Mason, a former deacon of the First Congregational Church of Madison, a past president of the Madison

Rotary Club and a past president of the UW-Madison Alumni Association.

He was married to Ethel Mabie who died in 1979. His survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Alan (Carol) Johnson of Washington, D. C., and two grandchildren. ■



Edith Treuenfels 1908-1986

A memorial service for Miss Edith Treuenfels, retired professor of mathematics at UW-SP, was held May 11 at the University Center.

Most of the service was in the form of a recital by Guy Cremnitz, a concert pianist and music teacher from Framlingham, England, whose education was partially sponsored by Miss Treuenfels.

A memorial fund to support needy people of the community was established in her name with Operation Bootstrap, 636 W. Janick Circle.

Miss Treuenfels, 78, died April 30 at St. Michael's Hospital a short time after becoming ill at her home, 1414 Wyatt Ave. Her body was cremated.

She was a faculty member at UW-SP for 18 years prior to her retirement in 1975 and had been a local leader in advocacy groups for the elderly.

Miss Treuenfels was born March 9, 1908, in Breslau, Germany. She was educated from kindergarten through university and served as a teacher and social worker there until fleeing her homeland in 1937 after the

political takeover by Adolf Hitler.

After arriving in Lebanon, she was held by the French as a prisoner of war for a time before resuming her teaching career there. Her first position was in a Danish mission orphanage in Djoubeil. Later, she mastered the Armenian language and joined the staff of the Sahaguian School in Beirut where she taught children and prepared future teachers. From 1943 to 1952, she was on the faculty of the American Community School in Beirut.

Miss Treuenfels came to the United States as a tourist in 1952 on a ticket given to her by the U. S. government in appreciation for her work at its school in Lebanon. After deciding to become a citizen, she taught at a high school and a small graduate college in Putney, Vt., and then served from 1954 to 1956 as a teacher at UW-Madison's laboratory school in secondary education. She also pursued a Ph. D. in mathematics at Madison and, after completing work for it in 1957, she came to Stevens Point.


In 1964, she received a Fulbright grant to support a leave from UW-SP to introduce modern mathematics to youngsters and teachers in Trinidad.

In her efforts on behalf of the elderly, she served from 1978 to 1985 as a member of the Portage County Commission on Aging. When the Retired Senior Volunteer Program was established here, she was one of the first participants in its public service projects. She chaired the Portage County RSVP Advisory Council in 1977-78.

Miss Treuenfels, a Quaker, was one of the organizers of the Society of Friends Meeting of Stevens Point. She also was a longtime member of the League of Women Voters and of University Women

Voters and of University Women.

She had no surviving relatives.

New book focuses on Catholics, Hitler

A historian at UW-SP received assistance from his wife, a psychology professor, while preparing a book manuscript analyzing German Catholics' responses to the policies of Adolph Hitler's Third Reich

Donald J. Dietrich's approximately 450-page work is expected to be off the presses this summer under the title of, "Catholic Citizens in the Third Reich: Psycho-Social Principles and Moral Reasoning.'

His wife, Coralie, who also is a member of the UW-SP faculty, "guided me to the psychological materials about how people form behavior patterns, why people do what they do and the interrelationships of belief and behavior.

German Catholics did not, as a group, make widespread objections to anti-Semitism, but in their defense, Dietrich contends, "it is easy for us to now say what happened was awful. In the 1940s it would have been difficult for them to accept the extermination plan because it would have been so unreal to them. For the average German, stories of atrocities would be viewed as Allied propaganda.'

"Like other Germans, Catholics were trapped in a cruel dilemma. To conform to the Nazi system could easily mean a loss of moral credibility; to oppose could result in the full force of the state being used against the church and her members," Dietrich continues.

The professor concludes that Catholic bishops were

aware of evils in the Third Reich but also recognized they had a responsibility to preserve the institutional church. "After all, the church had lasted 1,900 years and the bishops didn't believe the influence of Hitler would last that long, so they wanted to be able to bring back their institution after he was gone. In that vein, you can't take all of their statements as sheer cowardice."

He believes "the nub of the problem" was that church leaders viewed politics as a "very narrow" aspect of life and wanted no part in it while Hitler "saw politics as

German Catholics represented about a third of their nation's population and had a long tradition of "feeling like second-class citizens." They attempted to compensate for their lower status through patriotism-support of the government, Dietrich suggests.

Nevertheless, there was considerable resistance from Catholic quarters but not always for the best reason, the professor believes. Priests and their parishioners in numerous communities opposed Nazis for interferring with life in the small towns. Some German Catholics sympathized with their Jewish neighbors but not with the Jews as a whole. Legislation in 1935 stripped Jews of their basic rights which resulted in most of them congregating in ghettoes, apart from society. "They became an abstraction," according to Dietrich.

Most of the courageous actions by Catholics against the Nazis took place on "the local level," he adds. There is a story about a priest who went out of his church on a Sunday morning and slugged a Nazi officer who was leading local boys away for an outing when they were supposed to be at a Mass. Several of the boys were spanked before the group was asked to enter the church.



The government never took action against the priest. Dietrich says German Lutherans, like Catholics, faced dilemmas, too. They belonged to the majority denomination, the state religion but, unlike the Catholics, had no hierarchical religious body to back up their resistance.

'The Lutherans capitulated more rapidly than the Catholics," according to the professor, though a "confessing" branch of that church "had its share of

Given little mention in history books, Jehovah's Witnesses and homosexuals shared the same kind of fate as the Jews. Dietrich estimates that several thousand Witnesses went to the gas chambers. Also, many Germans who defaced the swastika, spoke insultingly of Nazi leaders and rejected offers of employment were

Dietrich has been doing research for his book for a decade. He has received grants to travel in this country and in Europe and to be on leaves from his classroom. His funds have come from the UW-SP Personnel Development Committee, the American Philosophical Society, the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Rockefeller Foundation.

Transaction Books at Rutgers University is publishing the book in both hardcover and softcover.

Kirby heads union

William Kirby, an education professor, is the new president of The Association of University of Wisconsin Faculties (TAUWF) chapter on the Stevens Point campus.

He was elected without opposition to succeed Pete Kelley, a communication professor, who held the office

Kirby, 46, a native of Baltimore, has Ph.D. from the University of Maryland. He came to UW-SP 18 years ago. He said he is interested in working to build improved employee-employer relationships and to promote passage of legislation that would give UW System faculty and academic staff the opportunity to bargain collectively.

Specifically, he believes "a lot can be done to clarify standards and processes used here regarding retention and promotion of faculty."

Statewide, the Stevens Point TAUWF chapter is considered in many quarters to be the leader in promoting the organization's causes, Kirby said. "I like that, and I would like to work to enhance it so we can

Robert K. Miller

Miller pens writing text for freshmen

An English professor who couldn't find a comprehensive text to use in his freshman classes at UW-SP solved the problem by writing a book of his own.

Robert K. Miller, associate professor of English, is the author of "The Informed Argument, A Multidisciplinary Reader and Guide," published in January by Harcourt Brace Jovanovich Publishers.

The book is designed for use with students learning how to read and write analytically. Miller says he searched for a text that contained "everything" needed to teach the second semester of freshman English, but he couldn't find a suitable publication. He says books have become so expensive, one volume was all he wanted to require for his pupils.

Miller also is the author of books about Oscar Wilde and Mark Twain, published by Frederick Ungar Publishing Co. He has written essays for Newsweek, the Christian Science Monitor and the Milwaukee Journal. A Connecticut native, he holds degrees from Vassar College, the University of Leicester and Columbia University.

Cited by Arts Board

An art professor at UW-SP is among 15 recipients of awards from the Wisconsin Arts Board.

Daniel Fabiano received an honorable mention in the field of visual arts. Also, Stevens Point artist, Carol Emmons, was selected for recognition in the same

They attended a reception held at the governor's residence in Madison to honor the eight artists who were recipients of \$5,000 Arts Board Fellowships and seven who received the honorable mention designations.

More than 170 artists from throughout the state submitted works which were judged by a panel of nine nationally recognized art experts.

According to Timcak, most universities now provide physical access such as ramps and public elevators. The current focus is the promotion of programmatic services to the handicapped.

At UW-SP Timcak serves as an advocate for handicapped students, informing faculty and staff about their special needs. He is the editor of "Access," a public information handbook and the coordinator of campus workshops to educate people about disabilities. In addition, he is the director of freshman orientation at

Barbara A. Inch, assistant director of continuing education and outreach at UW-SP, is the first person to be named an honorary member of the Wisconsin Society of Land Surveyors. Pittsburg State presents award to Charles Long

Charles Long of the UW-SP biology faculty is one of five men who will receive the Meritorious Achievement Award, highest honor bestowed by Pittsburg State University to members of its alumni ranks,

Long was cited at several events at his alma mater in Pittsburg, Kan., the weekend of May 16 and 17.

Pittsburg State has an enrollment of about 5,000 and prepares a high percentage of its graduates for advanced study or professional programs. It specializes in premedicine, business, engineering, nursing and education.

The institution awarded Long his B.S. degree in 1957 and his M.S. degree in 1958. As an undergraduate, he participated in the Army ROTC program and was commissioned an Army infantry officer upon his graduation. As a graduate student he was the holder of a fellowship. He later earned a Ph.D. at the University of

Among UW-SP faculty members, Long has one of the longest lists of publications in scholarly journals. He has penned nearly 150 articles, most of them about mammals, and is the author of three books including "Badgers of the World."

After joining the UW-SP faculty 20 years ago, Long became one of the founders and longtime director of the the school's Museum of Natural History. Beyond his campus, he has been instrumental in the formation of the museum and culture center for the Chippewa Indians in Lac du Flambeau. He received a commendation for that work from the Indian band.

About two years ago, he was given the university's annual award to an outstanding research scholar.

Long currently is doing extensive study of the evolution theory.

Nash in Cancer Society

Dennis B. Nash, a UW-SP speech and language pathologist, has been re-elected secretary of the Wisconsin Division of the American Cancer Society.

Nash, who has served the American Cancer Society in many capacities, currently is a lay director-at-large and chairman of the Wisconsin Division Service and Rehabilitation and Cured Cancer Assembly Committees.

Myrvin Christopherson



Myrvin Christopherson, head of the division of communication at UW-SP was chosen in December as president of Dana College in Blair, Neb.

The private school is affiliated with the American Lutheran Church and has an enrollment of about 500 which is down from previous highs. It is noted for its offerings in the arts and humanities, notably music, teacher training, art, and a unique reading program. The campus is built to serve a student body numbering up to 1,000.

Christopherson will assume his new duties July 1. A UW-SP faculty member since 1969, Christopherson has had a key role in the development of the communication program which ranks among the school's largest. It has about 700 majors.

Christopherson has long had personal ties with Dana. He attended it, served as its student body president and after graduation in 1961 represented it for a semester as an admissions counselor and fund-raiser.

Very few former faculty members at UW-SP have become presidents of other colleges and universities. One of them is Robert Powless who heads Mount Senario College in Ladysmith.

Christopherson is a native of Milltown who, after graduating from Dana, received an M.S. and Ph.D. from Purdue University. He has headed the communication program most of the time since 1971 and was promoted to the title of associate dean and head of communication when his department was upgraded to a division within the College of Fine Arts.

Long active in university governance, he currently serves as chairman of the UW-SP Faculty Senate, a position he has held previously. He also has headed semester abroad programs to Taiwan and England. The university gave him its annual distinguished service award three years ago.

Spangenberg named editor

Earl Spangenberg of UW-SP's natural resources faculty has been appointed editor of "Hydata-News & Views," bi-monthly publication of the American Water Resources

Approximately 3,000 copies of each edition are distributed nationally to individual, corporate and institutional members of the association. The publication embodies about 24 pages.

Spangenberg said he will work with a printer in Minneapolis in developing each edition which will contain current information about water resources issues and news about the organization. He also will continue to serve on the association's national board of directors as a representative for members in a five-state region.

With the academic rank of associate professor of water and forest resources in the UW-SP College of Natural Resources, Spangenberg serves as faculty adviser for the association's student chapter which he was instrumental in establishing on campus.

In 1983 and in 1985, the chapter was cited as the number one unit of its kind at an American college or university. It received plaques both years from the association for its activities in "promoting water resources knowledge and objectives."

Spangenberg was one of the organizers of the association's Wisconsin chapter and has served as its president.

He is currently writing articles for his own publication as well as other professional journals about some of his findings during a sabbatical last fall which was spent in research at the Natural Resources Law Center in Boulder, Colo. He concentrated his studies on non point source control laws and administrative practices in agriculture plus similar controls in the area of forestry.

Hagen's art applauded

Gary Hagen of UW-SP's art faculty has been named one of the top artists in a state-wide exhibition which was held in February at the Wright Museum of Art, Beloit College.

Hagen's work was chosen as the best threedimensional piece in the 29th Annual Beloit and Vicinity Exhibition. He received a \$250 cash award for his wood, plexiglass and acrylic sculpture entitled "Ennadai." It was singled out from among more than 300 entries.

The professor's recent work was encouraged by a grant from the Canadian Faculty and Institutional Research Grant Programme. The award provided money for him to travel to Baffin Island in Northern Canada last summer and to conduct Eskimo ethnographic research in Ottawa, Montreal and Toronto.

Hagen, who came to UW-SP in 1966, formerly served as director of UW-SP's Edna Carlsten Gallery.



Foresters honor Engelhard

Robert Engelhard of the UW-SP faculty is one of three state residents to be designated recently as fellows of the Society of American Foresters (SAF).

Nationwide, he is one of 84 "distinguished foresters" chosen for the recognition. The other two from Wisconsin are: Ralph Swanson, recently retired woodlands manager for Consolidated Papers Inc. of Wisconsin Rapids, and Robert Stone, retired official of the U.S. Forest Products Laboratory in Madison.

The SAF has more than 21,000 members of whom 364 are now fellows. Among those who hold the honorary title of fellow are seven Wisconsin men including three on the UW-SP faculty: Emeritus Professor William Sylvester, Jay Cravens and Engelhard. The organization is comprised of foresters who are public and private practitioners, researchers, administrators, educators, technicians and students.

Engelhard has been on the UW-SP faculty nearly 20 years as a specialist in forest economics. In addition to his teaching, he is serving this year as acting assistant to the dean of the College of Natural Resources. He has been one of the developers of the forestry curriculum at UW-SP which now has the largest undergraduate enrollment in the United States.

Before coming to the university, Engelhard served in northern Wisconsin on the management staff of Trees for Tomorrow for a decade and still earlier was with the U.S. Forest Service for three years. He holds a Ph.D. in forestry from Michigan State University.



Ball State gives Lawlor alumni award

Ball State University of Muncie, Ind. has given one of four awards in its annual Outstanding Doctoral Graduates in English recognition program to William Lawlor, associate professor of English at UW-SP.

To develop his skills in teaching English as a second language, Lawlor worked in 1983-84 at Universidad Catholica Madre v Maestra in Santiago, the Dominican Republic, while on a professional leave from UW-SP. Since returning, he has been chosen to serve on the executive board of the Wisconsin Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages. He coordinated the group's fifth annual conference.

All royalties from the text go to a fund in the UW-SP Foundation supporting incentive awards for student writing.

Gerald F.Johnson, a speech pathologist at UW-SP, has been appointed an honorary board member of the National Stuttering Project (NSP)





Passenger pigeon not extinct at our campus

One of the nation's few remaining mounted passenger pigeons has gone on permanent display in the newly remodeled and expanded Museum of Natural History at UW-SP.

The 80-year-old specimen was given to the museum by a donor who asked to remain anonymous.

It was mounted in the early 1900s after being found shot along the Rock River in the Beloit area. It was kept in the homes of three generations of a family until a woman, whose husband was a grandson of the person who found the bird, made the donation.

Museum Director William LeGrande said the history of the bird is "fascinating." Once the most abundant species of birds in the United States, the passenger pigeons began declining in number with the arrival of white men who exploited them in hunting and ruined much of their habitat in the massive harvest of trees. Forest fires also devastated the habitat

According to LeGrande, the naturalist John James Audubon once estimated that a group of migrating passenger pigeons he witnessed which was one mile wide and traveling at a rate of one mile per minute covered the sky for three hours. By Audubon's calculation, there were 1 billion, 115 million, 136 thousand birds in the flight.

The last known passenger pigeon died in 1914 in the Cincinnati Zoological Park.

LeGrande said the owners of the mounted bird kept it in a glass case which was largely responsible for the good condition it is in.

The mounted bird has been displayed at the entrance of the museum, on the first floor of the James Albertson Learning Resources Center. It is near the new living wall which has been constructed with concrete ponds to house snakes, toads, salamanders, frogs, fishes, turtles

Also new is a 20 by 20-foot combination gallery/meeting/instructional room adjacent to the museum. It has been used recently for shows of wood carvings and wildlife photography.

The museum, established in 1968, has become one of the Midwest's major facilities of its kind in its displays as well as in its research collections. Charles Long, who was instrumental in its development and served as its director for 15 years, now is curator of mammals. Other curators are LeGrande, fishes; Marshall Parry, geology; Ed Stern, invertebrates; Stephen Taft, parasites; Stanley Szczytko, aquatic insects; Robert Freckmann and Frank Bowers, herbarium; Vince Heig, birds; John Moore, anthropology; Ed Marks, education. ■

National goblet treasure at UW-SP

One of the largest and finest collections of early American pattern glass has been donated to UW-SP for permanent display.

The gift includes 1,300 pieces of glassware representing most of the patterns and many of the variants of goblets manufactured on this continent between 1830 and 1900.

Jacque and Dorothy Vallier of Tomahawk and Mequon estimate the value of each goblet ranges from a minimum of \$50 to, in a few cases, more than \$2,000. However, they invested considerable time and effort acquiring the pieces and located some that are extremely rare. Therefore, the Valliers regard the collection as

Going a step beyond the donation, the couple spent \$17,000 of their own money to construct the kind of exhibit cases they always envisioned for their collection.

Half of the display area was completed when the gift was dedicated last fall. The other half is scheduled to be finished later this year so every piece of glassware can be on public view.

When the Valliers began their pursuit of goblets in the late 1960s, they chose displays at Bennington, Vt., and Oberlin, Ohio, as leading models to emulate. They now have matched them in quantity and surpassed them in some areas of specialization. The uniqueness of the collection is in its broad representation of etched and colored goblets.

During their collecting, the couple crisscrossed the nation to scour antique shops or to track down leads about individuals known to own unusual goblets. The trips often coincided with journeys to all corners of the United States, including Alaska, when Mrs. Vallier was a member of the national board of directors of the Audubon Society and loyally attended its scattered

Of all their sources, John Mordock of Northbrook, Ill.,

sold them the most single pieces. A retired Sears Roebuck & Co. executive, he now is writing a book about his experiences as a collector.

After he learned about the Valliers' plan to make their donation to UW-SP, Mordock decided to give the school his entire collection of various kinds of tableware in the Dakota pattern for a permanent, companion display on campus. There are over 100 pieces in this grouping.

Mark Spencer, a member of the UW-SP art department and director of the Edna Carlsten Gallery, is curator of the collection. He says it "is impressive in scope-it's encyclopedic and a very good educational display for the student of pressed glass.

Spencer called the Valliers "the most efficient collectors I've ever seen "because of the information they have recorded about each piece.'

According to the book, "American Glass," of all the varieties of glass produced from ancient times to the present, the type which is peculiarly American is pressed glass. No other nineteenth century glassmakers turned out the quantity of ware or approached the quality achieved by manufacturers in the United States.

The patterns vary greatly, from animals, fruits, people

to geometric designs.

Early pattern glass appealed to the Valliers because its quality depended so much on the personal touches of artisans and craftsmen. Molds, for example, were handcrafted of wood.

Today, as has been the situation for many years, pattern glass production is fully automated. And, because early, rare pieces of pressed glass can be reproduced so accurately, collectors of the real antiques must be well versed on their subject.

The Valliers say that after considerable study, they aren't fooled easily, though they were hoodwinked a few

Mrs. Vallier began the collection after a very slow start. Her mother, Meta Uihlein Kopmeier, daughter of one of the early heads of the Schlitz Brewery in Milwaukee, served guests with a gooseberry pattern sugar and creamer at a "gentleman's farm" near Milwaukee's Whitnall Park. When the property was dismantled in 1955, Mrs. Vallier saved the set. More than a decade later, when her husband began collecting logging artifacts, she decided she needed something to do while he pursued his hobby. She remembered the beauty of the pressed glass in the sugar and creamer. The decision for goblets was made because she thought there would still be quite a few available for a new collector, unlike many other antique items.

For a decade, Vallier made an all-out effort in his quest for tools used to shave the virgin forests. His goal was to create a replica of a logging camp that would have existed anywhere in the lake states between 1870 and 1900. He built and equipped an authentic camp office, bunk house, cook shanty, wood butcher shop, saw filer shack, blacksmith shop, horse barn and a 100-foot out-of-door shed with cedar scoop roof. Vallier gave the camp and its contents to the Menominee Indian Tribe which has opened it for public viewing on its reservation at Keshena Falls.

As he was winding down from that project, his interest was growing in his wife's hobby. "Jack is one of those one-in-a-million husbands who'll turn around and go back when you've passed an antique shop and wished you would have stopped," says Mrs. Vallier.

It was he who went in search of some of the most rare goblets to achieve more completeness in their collection. He learned of one with a harp pattern that had been made of flint glass in the 1850s. He tracked it down to Lancaster County, Pennsylvania and estimates there are only a couple more like it anywhere.

The gift of glasswear follows the Vallier's contribution of approximately 1,000 acres of land to UW-SP that has been developed for the Treehaven natural resources field station. Located near Tomahawk, this facility is the UW-SP College of Natural Resources new summer camp.

Madison woman gives lake frontage

A Madison woman who learned by reading in a newspaper that UW-SP is developing a natural resources field station near Tomahawk has added a gift of land to

Mrs. Joan Weinkauf of 314 Orchard Drive, Madison has donated seven and one-half acres with lake frontage to the UW-SP Foundation, Inc. to complement its other holdings in the area which are used as outdoor

laboratories by students and faculty.

The gift has been valued at \$10,000.

The property is an important acquisition for the university, according to Foundation Director Leonard Gibb, because it includes 240 feet of frontage on Dudley Lake, the deepest body of water in Lincoln County. Another feature is a large stand of northern hardwoods which will useful to forestry and other students.

Located near County Highway B in the Town of Harrison, the property is about 10 miles from Treehaven, a 1,000-acre field station that was donated to the foundation by Jacque and Dorothy Vallier. Buildings have been constructed at Treehaven to house students and faculty who will use it as a summer natural resources camp. One of the few things the land lacked for the students was a stand of mature hardwoods. Mrs. Weinkauf's gift fills that void, according to Gibb.

The donor said she had been considering putting her

property into public ownership for some time, and after she read an article about Treehaven in the "Wausau Herald," she contacted the university.

Sound devices donated

Two donors have contributed \$11,500 for the installation of sound equipment in UW-SP's theater and drama

Mrs. Marion Fey of Wisconsin Rapids, a 1926 graduate of the school and longtime benefactor in its student scholarship program, contributed \$10,000. She has previously endowed two \$10,000 funds to support outstanding music majors and high achieving upperclass students from the campus at large.

The additional \$1,500 was given by NAPA Auto Parts Distribution Center of Stevens Point through its manager, Stephen Wardrop.

Jenkins Theatre in the Fine Arts Center and the two dance studios, one in the Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics Building and the other in the lower level of the Learning Resources Center will have the equipment in operation by the time classes begin next fall.

Arthur Hopper, chariman of the theatre arts department, said the gift will statisfy a long-standing and major need.

Not only will students and faculty appreciate the new equipment, so will theatergoers, he said.

There will be improved amplification of performers on stage as well as sound effects. In the past, there have been occasional complaints from members of the audience who have said they were unable to hear the voices of actors and singers over the music being played by orchestras. That problem will be eliminated, he explained.

The theater will be equipped with sound amplification, microphones, speakers and reel-to-reel recorders. The dance studios will get turntables, tape recorders, amplification equipment and speakers primarily for dance class accompaniment.



Endowment funds established in memory of teachers, students

Endowment funds with a total value of about \$60,000 have been established recently in the UW-SP Foundation, Inc., to support annual scholarships in memory of former teachers and students at the institution.

Staff members in the Office of Development and Alumni Relations said there is growing interest in scholarship funds as a means of honoring people who have died who had an appreciation for the university's offerings, activities and personnel.

They provide assistance to donors interested in establishing accounts to support students or to provide

assistance in other ways.

The largest fund set up in the past year came in a bequest from Emeritus Professor Fern Horn. She provided \$20,000 for scholarships that will be given to students pursuing master's degrees in the School of Home Economics. At current rates, the annual award will be about \$1,800.

The first recipient will be named in 1987.

The charter, written by Miss Horn several years ago, stipulates that winners be chosen on the basis of high academic achievement and that they are in or planning careers as teachers or extension home economists specializing in service to youth. Other considerations, she wrote, should be given to applicants who have participated in professional organizations and to those who have demonstrated competence in teaching or extension work and have supervised student teachers from UW-SP

An obituary of Miss Horn can be found elsewhere in this publication.

A \$10,500 fund was set up to memorialize a 1971 graduate who founded what has become the world's largest circulating astronomy magazine.

Atty. David Walther of Milwaukee provided the endowment in the name of his late brother, Stephen, to generate money that can be distributed annually to needy students in the Division of Communication.

"I wanted to do something a little different, so when a kid is down and out and needs money there's someplace to go for help," said David Walther. High scholastic achievement is not to be required of recipients, he emphasized. Interest from the fund is expected to be about \$1,000 per year at current rates.

Stephen Walther was a Stevens Point native who was graduated from P. J. Jacobs High School in 1964 and, after a stint at Holy Cross Seminary in La Crosse, earned a bachelor's degree from UW-SP with a major in communication and a minor in German.

The brother recalls that Stephen was interested in astronomy from childhood and at the time of graduation from the university had completed a research project on a proposed magazine for amateur astronomers

Stephen borrowed money to purchase mailing lists and then collected 14,000 subscriptions at \$12 apiece by the time he turned out his first edition of "Astronomy Magazine" in 1973. The publication underwent rapid growth. But his involvement was cut short by a malignant brain tumor. The problem was diagnosed in the late summer of 1976. Stephen continued working several months and died in September of 1977

He had lived long enough, though, to see "Astronomy Magazine" surpass the circulation of "Sky and Telescope," which is produced in Cambridge, Mass., and become the world's largest publication of its kind. At that time, there were 57,000 paid subscribers. Today, there are 140,000 subscribers and about 32 employees. The magazine is printed on slick paper and contains about 100 pages in each monthly edition.

Stephen's heirs sold the magazine last summer to

Kalmbach Publishing Co. of Milwaukee.

There's a reminder of Stephen's career on his marker in St. Stephen Cemetery in Stevens Point. The likeness of planet Saturn with its rings is cut in the stone. He used that likeness as a symbol to signal the end of each story in his magazine.

·A \$10,000 fund to support scholarships in the College of Fine Arts will memorialize a father and his son, both of whom attended UW-SP. The endowment was provided by Mrs. Kathryn Bukolt of Stevens Point, wife and mother of Edmund Bukolt Sr. and Jr. She has studied at the university, too, and been a patron of many art activities. She is an accomplished painter.

The father, who headed Lullabye Co. at the time of his death in 1965 was a talented musician. The son was a student on campus at the time of his accidental death

The annual Bukolt award will be for \$750 and rotated

between art, music and dance students.

·The \$500 Albert Croft Scholarship will be given annually to a graduate student in communication from a \$6,250 fund. A communication professor, he served the university from 1967 until his death in 1984. He was instrumental in the development of the Division of Communication and served as its first chairman.

· Two \$250 Vivian and Lulu Kellogg Scholarships will be awarded to nontraditional students with B averages or better in the disciplines of history, music, natural resources or teacher education. The sisters had long careers in Wisconsin public education and served together at UW--SP from 1953 until their retirements in 1970. Vivian, who taught intermediate classes in the Campus Laboratory School, died in September of 1982. Lulu, who served as curriculum librarian in the Learning Resources Center, recently gave \$5,000 to establish an award in memory of her sister. But foundation officials requested that the names of both sisters be placed on the

·The James Newman Treehaven Scholarship will help support a student in the College of Natural Resources who will be attending the summer camp at Treehaven Field Station near Tomahawk which Newman helped plan. The recipient will be a high achieving student involved in professional organizations and other extracurricular activities. The awards will be supported from a \$3,500 fund. Newman was a professor of forestry and assistant to the dean of his college, serving the institition from 1961 to the time of his death in January

· About \$2,800 in memorial gifts in the name of alumnus Scott Irons will support a \$300 scholarship for another student who will be studying at the Treehaven Field Station. Irons died in a fall down an elevator shaft at the American National Bank Building in Rockford, Ill., last October. He was 24. He was employed at the time by City Club of Rockford and Rock Valley Fence Co. and previously was a ranger for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources headquartered in the Wausau area. He was graduated from UW-SP in 1982.

· A \$150 prize to an outstanding art student will be given in memory of Elizabeth Weber Rice of Stevens Point who was one of the founders of the Stevens Point Art League and an active member of the group for many

An endowment of approximately \$1,500 will support the award.

·A \$150 prize to recognize outstanding photographic work by a UW-SP student will be given as a memorial to UW-SP alumnus and staff member James Pierson. Money to support the award was given by relatives and friends at the time of his death at age 34 in 1983. Pierson served as director of the Educational Media Services which provides graphics and photo services to university personnel

An endowment, invested in a Racine bank, will support a \$500 scholarship to be given annually to a natural resources student in memory of a young woman who was murdered.

The Joanne Esser Environmental Scholarship is earmarked for juniors who plan careeers in environmental research and management. Preference will given to candidates from the Racine-Kenosha a.ea.

Miss Esser was murdered in May of 1979 after her assailant ran her car off the road and abducted her while she was driving to a family campsite at Pelican Lake. She never attended UW-SP, but because of her interest in the out-of-doors and the fact the university provides training for future environmentalists, her parents decided to give the scholarship to local students.

\$50,000 raised for message center

Donations from area businesses and organizations defrayed half of the cost of a new computer-driven electronic message center which began flashing announcements of future campus and community events in December.

Ten contributors each provided \$2,500 to help the university purchase the equipment, which cost in excess

The sign has been installed in front of the Quandt Gym on Fourth Avenue.

Athletic Director Don Amiot acknowledged the contributors at a basketball game this past season. They are the Copps Distributing Co., Allen Supply Co., Journal Printing, Ellis Stone Construction Co., Holiday Inn, Community Parks Improvement Committee and the UW-SP Division of Student Life, all of Stevens Point; The Katz Co., and Basic American Foods (American Potato) of Plover; and Bushman's Inc. of Rosholt.

Besides the \$25,000 from private sources, the student government organization gave \$12,500 and the university

defrayed the remaining \$12,500.

The message center provides time and temperature and can be programmed to give short announcements. The university will use most of the announcement capabilities to promote upcoming events both on campus and in the community.

A board of control will monitor the messages. No advertising will be permitted.

Foundation receives gift of 160 acres

Two businessmen have donated a tract of wild land in Chippewa County worth nearly \$50,000 to the UW-SP Foundation, Inc.

The donors are Jerome Bushman, Galloway, and Darrell Koehler, Plover, who are agricultural marketers, packers and growers affiliated with the firms of Bushman's Inc. of Rosholt, and Potato World, Inc. of Grand Marsh.

The gift is unrestricted, which means the donors have no objection to how the property is used. It probably will be sold eventually and the proceeds used to support a special university project. However, in the meantime it has potential for use by natural resources students and faculty, according to Len Gibb, executive director of the foundation.

The land encompasses 160 acres and is located off Highway D in the Town of Colburn, Chippewa County, north of Boyd. It has a graveled access road, a stream and some harvestable timber. Bushman and Koehler had used the land for hunting.

Appraised valuation of the property is \$48,000.

Bushman and Koehler said that through their business they have begun to depend on professional expertise of people associated with UW-SP.

In 1985, Bushman's, Inc. contributed \$2,500 to the foundation to defray part of the costs of a new message center outside UW-SP's Quandt Gymnasium.

Business library expanded

Foundation collected \$1.7 million

The University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point Foundation, Inc. collected more money than ever before—\$1.7 million—during 1985 to support institutional projects, but the trustees were challenged to do even more to offset declining state funding of the institution.

The 21st annual meeting of the organization was held on campus in January.

Chancellor Philip Marshall said need for increased donations from private sources stems from a growing percentage of members of the state's high school graduating classes pursuing UW System attendance while fewer tax dollars are being allocated to defray the

added costs.

There's getting to be less of a difference in the financial base of public and private colleges and universities, Marshall explained, as private institutions depend more on grants from governmental agencies and public schools are forced to seek more money from individuals and businesses.

If the Stevens Point campus alone were funded by the state at the rate it was 13 years ago, the appropriation received here this year would have been about \$38 million instead of the present \$30 million. Meanwhile, he added, officials are now mandated to make more cuts.

Loss of the money will hurt the school, Marshall lamented, "but we will still do our best to have good programs because we have good people--we do very well with the funds we receive."

The foundation's president, David Miller, an executive at Sentry Insurance, said private funding has become an important part of the financial scheme at public universities everywhere. "It's a fact of life that won't go away."

Two consultants were brought to campus late last year to recommend ways UW-SP can gear up for fundraising campaigns that would generate a significantly higher amount of contributions. But Miller said the advice was that more staff would be needed on campus before such an endeavor could be undertaken. The president also urged the foundation officers to consider

expanding their membership to include people from a wider area of the state.

Officers now come exclusively from Central Wisconsin.

"Are we going to be a major foundation or are we going to continue going along the way we are? The decision will have to be made, and fairly soon," he said.

The donations and income from foundation-sponsored projects last year were about a third of a million dollars greater than in 1984, according to Robert Worth, foundation treasurer. The proceeds included nearly \$150,000 received by the Paper Science Foundation and nearly \$20,000 by the Suzuki Foundation which are arms of the UW-SP Foundation.

Many contributions are endowed for restricted use; only the investment income they generate can be spent. Last year, the foundation allocated nearly \$500,000 of its earnings, primarily for student scholarships and special projects of faculty and students.

Worth said he is encouraged by the fact foundation income, since the beginning of a new fiscal year in September, is running about \$13,000 ahead of the same time in 1985.

Leonard Gibb, executive director of university development and of the foundation, said Treehaven, the new natural resources field station near Tomahawk, has become "a very popular place." The facility was developed for UW-SP by the foundation.

Attempts to recruit organizations, education groups and government agencies to rent the facilities and to arrange programs there on weekends and during the fall, winter and spring are exceeding expectation.

Also, the first of three eight-bed housing units for faculty and staff at Treehaven will be completed soon.

The directors re-elected all of their officers for one year terms: Miller, president; Leonard DeBaker, vice president; Worth, treasurer; and John Buzza, corporation counsel. Robert Hanes and Dr. Nyles Eskritt were re-elected to three-year terms as board members.

Remembering Norm Knutzen In this continuing series of "Popular Professors from

In this continuing series of "Popular Professors from the Past," we pay tribute to the late Norman E. Knutzen, teacher of literature and English composition and director of the Men's Glee Club.

Mr. Knutzen, for whom one of the UW-SP residence halls is named, served on the faculty from 1931 to 1963 and returned after his official retirement to do some part-time teaching and to assist in admissions counseling, alumni and special projects.

He was a part-time staff member in the alumni and development office at the time of his death on May 26, 1972 in St. Michael's Hospital, Stevens Point. He was 79.

Mr. Knutzen, like his colleague May Roach, who gave innumerable public addresses in behalf of her school, was an ambassador of good will with music. He founded the Men's Glee Club in 1933 in response to the request of 26 students who wanted to sing for pleasure, and kept the organization alive for several years after his official retirement. More than 375 concerts were given in 34 years in high schools and at such distant places as the New York World's Fair, West Point Military Academy, Pabst Theatre in Milwaukee, Solider's Field and the Shrine Auditorium in Chicago, and the National Federation of Music Clubs convention in Miami.

At alumni gatherings nowadays, it's not uncommon to hear Mr. Knutzen's former students reminisce about the course in which he encouraged his students to conduct personal interviews and oral recordings with state residents on folklore topics. Many of his lectures on folklore were broadcast by the state radio network.

His favorite offering was known as the New England Circle in which his interest and devotion to the writings of Henry David Thoreau became a focal point of his teaching. Like the author he idolized, Mr. Knutzen lived part of his life in a simple cabin on a small body of water. The professor had a small cottage overlooking Pike Lake near Bevent where he spent his summers

spent his summers.
"I like to think I have many of the philosophies about the love of nature that Thoreau possessed," he once said.

He took several groups of students to New England to visit places where writers lived and worked in the previous century.

A measure of Mr. Knutzen's popularity in the classroom was made in the latter part of his career when he began serving a large number of what he referred to as "academic grandchildren." They were under his tutelage at the recommendation of their parents who had studied under him in the 1930s.

Several of Mr. Knutzen's former students later became his colleagues at UW-SP. One was William Clements who has since retired from the post of director of institutional research on campus. He wrote years ago that, "Norman Knutzen inspires his students to develop minds for originality and discovery, and they are encouraged to find things out for themselves."

Mr. Knutzen, son of a druggist, was born in Manitowoc on Dec. 28, 1892 and began his long involvement with UW-SP as a student in 1911. The late Madge Miller and her daughter Sally Garcia of Stevens Point, donated a painting to the university last year that Mr. Knutzen had done as a student at the Stevens Point Normal during the period he lived with Mrs. Miller's mother and father-in-law. He also attended Lawrence University in Appleton.

His full-time teaching spanned 45 years and included service to high school faculties in Appleton, Chippewa Falls and Stambaugh, Mich. He also served at the Homme Children's Home in Wittenberg and taught at Lawrence University for a year before coming to Stevens Point.

His career was interrupted during World War I when he served as an artillery sergeant at Camp Zachary Taylor in Kentucky.

Mr. Knutzen, a bachelor, was one of the charter organizers of the Wisconsin Federation of Music Clubs, executive secretary of the Central Wisconsin Schoolmasters Association for 30 years, and president of the Stevens Point Kiwanis Club. His religion was Lutheran.

He received several awards for his contributions to his school and his professional organizations. The highest recognition came in 1969 when he was among the first graduates designated as a UW-SP Distinguished Alumnus.

After his funeral 14 years ago at a country church near Wittenberg, his remains were taken to Manitowoc and buried in the family plot of the city cemetery.
