



Mask mandates extended

The a mandate requiring people in Sweetwater County to wear facial coverings in response to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic was extended last week, with its new expiration date set for Jan. 4, though a new statewide facial covering order announced Monday took effect Wednesday and expires Jan. 9.

Along with the mandate's extension, other changes have been made. One of those changes regards the requiring anyone 12

years of age or older to wear a mask while encouraging children aged three to 11 to wear a covering.

Businesses within the county, as well as government buildings excluding state and federal buildings are required to post notices requiring a face covering near their entrances and employees must wear a facial covering if their work places them within 6 feet of customers, clients or other workers. Masks are also required for people working in highly trafficked areas such as reception areas and public restrooms.

According to the order, facial coverings are not required in a personal office that isn't regularly visited by the public and if seated at a restaurant at least 6 feet away from other patrons, though patrons are required to wear a mask while entering, exiting or moving inside the restaurant space.

People who have a mental or physical health condition or disability that prevents them from wearing a mask are exempt from the order.

City has solid waste options

In Sweetwater County, the November election capped — at least for now — a decades-long shift of one of the state's few Democratic strongholds from blue to red.

The transition marks a milestone for the state's southwest region, as well as its statehouse, which is ever-more dominated by the Republican Party. The Rock Springs and Green River election results also represent gaps the state's struggling minority party must overcome if it hopes to achieve relevance anytime soon, Democratic politicians say.

Democrats suffered two losses in the House as 14-year-veteran lawmaker Rep. Stan Blake (D-Green River) lost to Libertarian Marshall Burt by 275 votes. Meanwhile, Republican Mark Baker defeated Democrat Lindsey Travis to flip retiring Rep. John Freeman's Rock Springs seat. Baker will turn to the Legislature after representing a different Sweetwater County House District from 2013-2017. In the Senate, lawmaker Liisa Anselmi-Dalton (D-Rock Springs) lost to Republican John Kolb by 702 votes.

Democrats retained one seat in the county, that of retiring Rep. JoAnne Dayton-Selman. Democrat Chad Banks, a former Rock Springs city councilman and manager of an urban renewal initiative, won the seat. He was unopposed.

Times weren't always so tough for Democrats in the state's southwest.

In 2004, the year Republican President George Bush won reelection with Wyoming politician Vice President Dick Cheney on the ticket, Democrats won three of six Wyoming House seats and three of four Wyoming Senate seats including Sweetwater County.

Those lawmakers worked in a statehouse with a more robust partisan divide. The 2005 Legislature had 17 Democrats in the House and seven in the Senate, according to Ballotpedia.

In contrast, just two Democratic senators and seven Democratic representatives will take their seats this January.

Working on the railroad

Democratic Party politics in southern Wyoming share an origin source with statehood itself: the construction of the Union Pacific railroad. The development of coal mines and train yards across the railroad's route drew union laborers and built a stronghold for Democratic politicians, according to WyoHistory.org, a project of the Wyoming State Historical Society.

Fire investigation continues

Little information is available as to the cause of a fatal house fire over Thanksgiving weekend that claimed the life of a Green River resident as investigators continue to look at the remnants of the home.

Assistant Fire Chief Larry Erdmann said two fire investigators representing USAA, he family's home insurance company, and a state fire investigator will be attempting to determine more information about the fire during follow-up investigations. Erdmann said they believe the fire started with the home's furnace, but further facts about the fire have yet to be determined. He also said the continued investigation is

not due to suspected criminal activity.

The property, located at 1610 Idaho St., has been boarded up to prevent people from trespassing and looking into the structure. Erdmann said trespassers isn't often a problem with burned structures, but the walls and supports holding the home up are significantly weakened, which could result in someone being injured if they decide to sneak in. Erdmann said the insurance investigators have noted a concern about the structure's stability and asked the fire department to shore up the home until their investigation ends. Erdmann said once that concludes, the home's remnants will be torn down.

The fire took place early Nov. 28, with firefighters being dispatched to the

home at 5 a.m. Four of the home's five occupants were able to escape the blaze, but a fifth person, Elizabeth Andrews, was unable to get out. This caused firefighters to focus their attention on the portion of the home Andrews was at while letting the rest of the home burn. Andrews was recovered by firefighters, who were then able to extinguish the fire within an hour.

Erdmann said the fire was part of a busy four-week period for the department as firefighters were called to four "significant structure fires" within that period. Including an apartment fire occurring last weekend and the Idaho Street house fire, he said the GRFD was dispatched to another fire on Midwest Street and at the Genesis Alkali facility.

Apartment fire caused by lit candle

A Saturday afternoon fire at 370 Upland Way was started by a candle according to Larry Erdmann, assistant fire chief for the Green River Fire Department.

The fire department was called to the fire at 1:43 p.m. Saturday after a resident reported hearing a fire alarm in a nearby apartment. The caller said they could smell smoke, but firefighters could not see smoke or flames when they arrived. Apartment residents outside said they could see flames from under the door on the third floor of the complex.

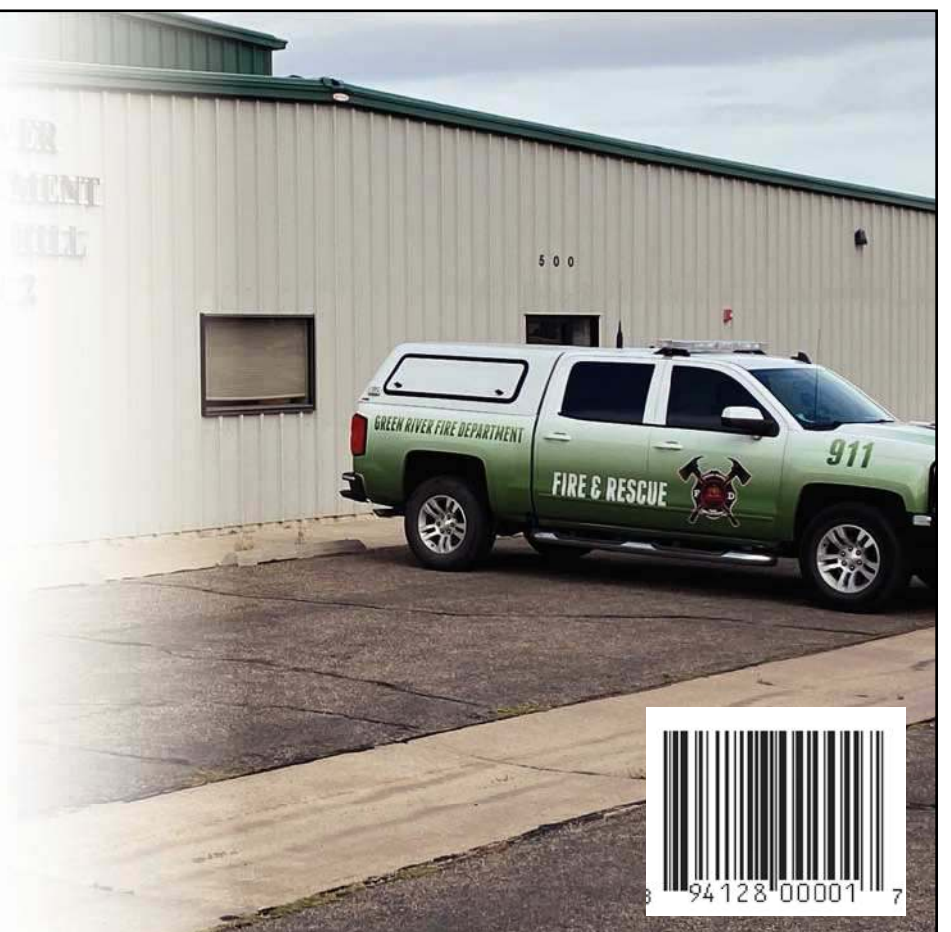
Firefighters forced entry into the

apartment as the door was locked and the space was unoccupied.

They found the fire, which consisted of a table and items placed on it, as were able to extinguish the blaze.

Firefighters interviewed the occupant, who said they had lit a candle near flammable materials on the table. Firefighters were at the scene for more than an hour and responded with two trucks and 18 firefighters.

Erdmann said people should ensure their smoke alarms are operational and make sure lit candles are placed in safe places, far from combustible materials.

Demos have history in county

Though not everyone familiar with the area's political history considers the union vote naturally Democratic, they agree that a strong labor movement helped the party's candidates.

"It is very definitely because of some pronounced union history," said Chris Boswell, a Democrat who served as state representative from Green River from 1993 to 2003 and went on to a long career in Wyoming government and politics.

But, "union labor in Sweetwater County was not a solid vote for Democrats," Boswell said.

Still, until the mid-2000s at least, an affiliation with the Democratic Party was helpful for winning public office in Sweetwater County,

according to residents and former state politicians.

"It was important to be a Democrat and it was important to say you were a Democrat," Bernadine Craft (D-Rock Springs), who served in the House from 2007-2012 and then in the Senate from 2013-2016, said.

Nate Martin, who grew up in Rock Springs and today directs the progressive political organization Better Wyoming, remembers his once-Republican mother registering as a Democrat to make sure she had a say in primary elections, he said. It's a tactic left-leaning residents in many parts of Wyoming are familiar with today, but in reverse.

A slow-moving but fundamental change in the county's bedrock politics coincided with an oil and gas boom beginning in 2006, around the time of Craft's first election, locals say. To Craft, the change seemed to come on fairly quickly.

"After that first election, I never again put 'Democrat' on my campaign signs," she said.

A different shade of blue collar

The coal mining, railroad and later coal-burning power plant jobs of southwest Wyoming shared more in common than unionization. Their industries, at least until coal's current decline began, offered long-lasting and stable careers.

"If you get a job at the mines or the power plant, you're [often] working there the rest of your life," Martin said.

The oil-and-gas boom of the early aughts brought an influx of new workers to the

region. The jobs may have been considered blue collar like those on railroads and in coal mines and power plants, but the politics were distinct.

If local and national union leaders tried to push their members' votes toward Democrats, oil and gas bosses had a different message for their non-unionized employees, Boswell recalled.

"Their employers very effectively tell them, 'the Republicans will support your continued livelihood and the Democrats are trying to put too many restrictions on our way of doing business,'" he said, "so vote Republican."

Democrats struggled to counter the suggestions that they were a threat to the oil and gas industry, he said. "If there's a perception that one side of the political equation is more interested in my paycheck and my financial security, then the votes are going to go that way."

By 2012, the year of President Barack Obama's reelection, Democrats were losing ground in Sweetwater County, losing two seats in the House. The party had already lost a Senate seat by that election. Craft was always supportive of the energy industry, she said. She recalled "hearing whispers that people were being warned against Democrats because they were the enemy of oil and gas, which upset me greatly," she said, "because I've always known where the bread is buttered here."

Her former House district used to include the oil and gas town of Wamsutter. Craft always won her elections, but

lost the vote in that town, she said.

"I would go out there and campaign heavily and everyone was happy to see me and everything was good, and then they never voted for me," she said.

Today, the state's oil and gas industries are both in a bust. The influx of new workers has ceased. But the political change stuck.

"The flavor that was imparted then is still with us and it remains here," Craft said.

Wyoming Democratic politicians, and voters, have often considered themselves as distinct from the national party. In Wyoming, blue-party politicians often support the fossil fuel industry and resist gun control measures.

At the statehouse, many Democratic lawmakers focus on issues they believe can gain support across the aisle, like Blake's focus on wildlife protections that were popular with both hunters and conservationists.

Such tactics, however, weren't enough to overcome polarized politics, Blake said. "I had several people tell me, 'you're a Democrat. There's no way I can vote for you,'" he said.

Many in Wyoming, including prominent politicians, place coal's decline at the feet of Democratic politicians and policies.

"Fossil fuels are at the top of people's lists, certainly for their own livelihood," Joshua Coursey, a native of Sweetwater County and the director of the hunters' organization Muley Fanatics, said.

State sets masking order

Other exemptions include people actively working out at a gym and following state recommendations, those who are hearing impaired or speaking with someone who is hearing impaired where the need to see a person's mouth movements is essential, situations involving law enforcement to identify a person by removing their facial covering and situations where a facial covering is needed to be removed to obtain a service or verify an identity.

In addition to the order, Gov. Mark Gordon announced a series of tightened restrictions Monday that aims to curb the spread of COVID-19 across the state, which has since gotten support from Wyoming's Washington, D.C. delegation, but has prompted the Sweetwater County Sheriff and the

Sweetwater County Attorney to publicly question the move.

"Our state and those surrounding us are facing a hospital capacity crisis that now compels us to take additional action. All through the fall, Wyoming has seen a rise in serious cases of COVID to a point where every county is facing critical and dangerous levels of spread of the virus. Too many people have died," Gordon said in a statement Monday.

Gordon initiated a statewide facial covering order that essentially copies mandates already in place in several counties, as well as limits to restaurant groups, gym class numbers and social gatherings. Gordon's order also places a curfew on bars and restaurants serving patrons onsite, calling for a closures between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m.

In a joint statement issued Tuesday, Sheriff John Grossnickle and County Attorney Daniel Erramouspe asserted their belief that the masking order, regardless of if it's issued by the state or local health officer, is unenforceable.

"We encourage everyone to thoughtfully consider their friends, family and neighbors as we navigate the uncertainty of this pandemic. We're all in this together, and we have to continue to work together to get through it," Grossnickle said in the statement.

"While my personal feelings on the topic are well known at this point, wearing a mask is not the issue here. The issue is that this public health order is unenforceable from a law enforcement perspective because it doesn't allow our deputies a way to separate those who are exempt from the mask requirement from those who are willfully violating it," he said.

Erramouspe spoke about the ethical issues the mandate poses him, which he originally posed to community leaders throughout Sweetwater County during a virtual meeting called to discuss a mask order.

"The American Bar Association Standards for Prosecution states that a prosecutor is ethically bound to file charges if they reasonably believe the charges are supported by probable cause, that 'admissible evidence' exists to be sufficient to support a conviction beyond a reasonable doubt and that the decision to charge is in the interests of justice," Erramouspe said. "So, in order to successfully prosecute a mask mandate case, the prosecution would have to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that a person not wearing a face covering does not suffer from a medical or mental condition, or disability, that prohibits them from doing so. How can we prove that if the order itself prohibits the investigation and collection of evidence into this exception?"





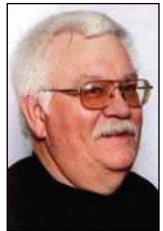

Financial Focus



CONSIDER THESE YEAR-END FINANCIAL MOVES

We're nearing the end of 2020 and for many of us, it will be a relief to turn the calendar page on this challenging year. However, we've still got a few weeks left, which means you have time to make some year-end financial moves that may work in your favor.

For example, if you sold some investments whose value has increased, you could incur capital gains taxes. To offset these gains, you could sell other investments that have lost value, assuming these investments are no longer essential to your financial strategy. Your tax advisor can evaluate this type of move, along with others, to determine those that may be appropriate for your situation.

Review your investment mix. As you consider your portfolio, think about the events of these past 12 months and how you responded to them. When COVID-19 hit early in the year, and the financial markets plunged, did you find yourself worrying constantly about the losses you were taking, even though they were just on paper at that point? Did you even sell investments to cut your losses without waiting for a market recovery? If so, you might want to consult with a financial professional to determine if your investment mix is still appropriate for your goals and risk tolerance, or if you need to make some changes.

Evaluate your need for retirement plan withdrawals. If you're 72 or older, you must start taking withdrawals—technically called required minimum distributions, or RMDs—from your traditional IRA and your 401(k) or similar retirement plan. Typically, you must take these RMDs by December 31 every year. However, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Stimulus (CARES) Act suspended, or waived, all RMDs due in 2020. If you're in this age group, but you don't need the money, you can let your retirement accounts continue growing on a tax-deferred basis.

Think about the future. Are you saving enough for your children's college education? Are you still on track toward the retirement lifestyle you've envisioned? Or have your retirement plans changed as a result of the pandemic? All of these issues can affect your investment strategies, so you'll want to think carefully about what decisions you may need to make.

Looking back and ahead can help you make the moves to end 2020 on a positive note and start 2021 on the right foot.

Guardsmen Are Expected Home For Christmas

Possibility that a majority, if not all, of the Green River youths comprising membership of the military police unit that forms a part of the 41st division of the National Guard would be home for Christmas was seen today.

The 41st division, now in training with the regular army at Camp Murray, Washington, will be granted a 11-day Christmas vacation, according to announcement issued this week. They will leave the camp December 21 and report back by January 2.

The 12,000 soliders from Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho and Wyoming who are included in the division cheered for 15 minutes when Major-General George A. White, their commanding officer, announced the 11-day leave. The vacation had been kept a secret until he made the public announcement.

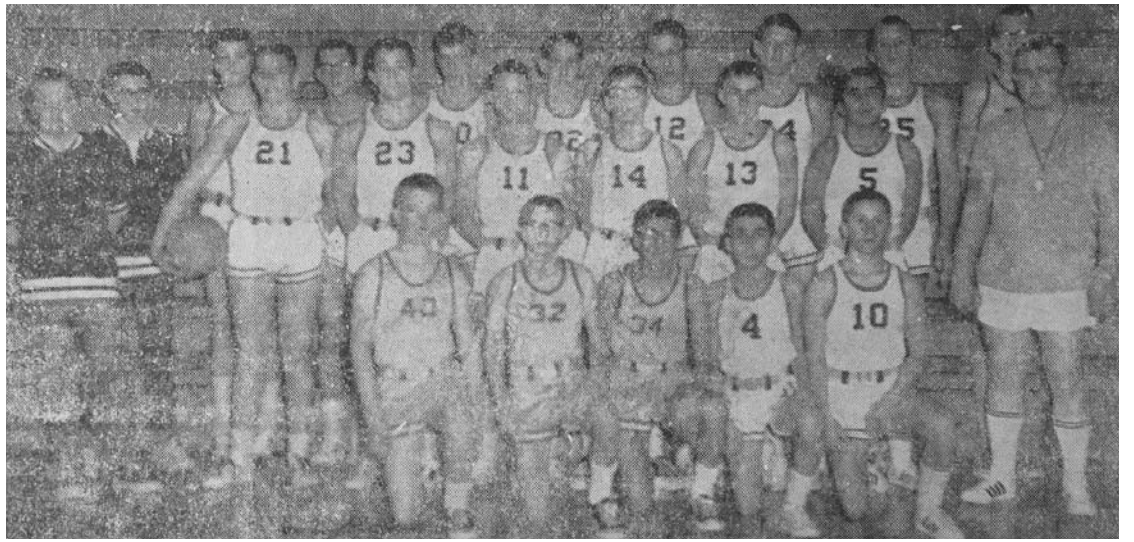

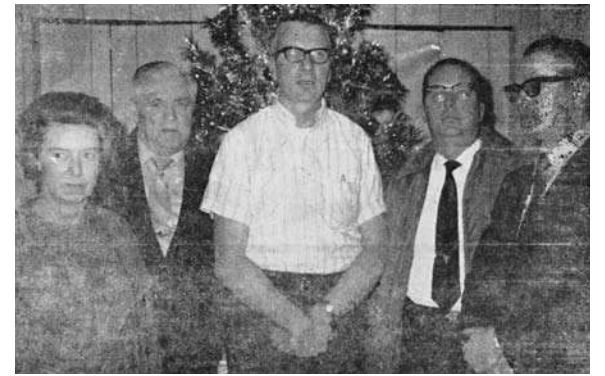

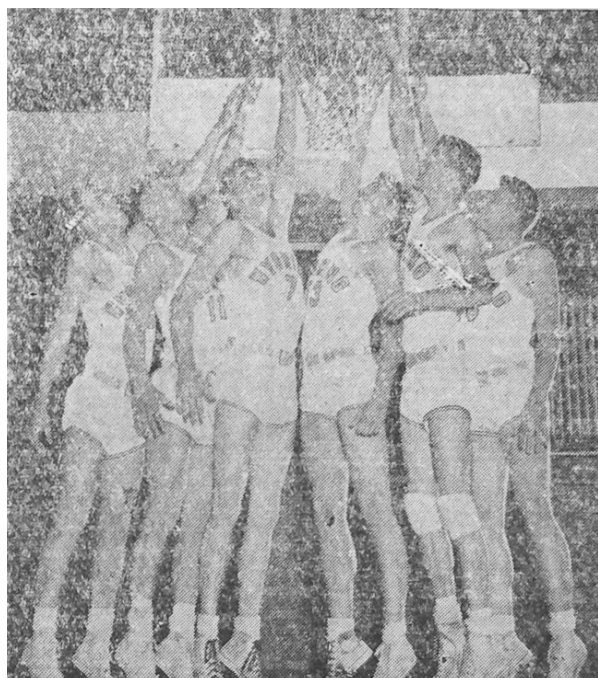

The Green River High School boys swimming and diving team will start their season against Rock Springs Friday and head coach Colleen Seiloff is busy prepping her swimmers for the upcoming season.

According to a news release from Sweetwater County School District No. 2's Athletics Director, Tony Beardsley, the complete swimming season hasn't been finalized yet. Seiloff said the late schedule is a symptom of competing during a pandemic, saying

the girls season in the fall had a finalized schedule, but the team ended up competing in meets not initially listed because of pandemic-related situations.

Overall, she said the boys are doing a great job of getting ready for that first meet. She said some of her swimmers have already had pool time earlier in the school year, while swimmers coming in from fall sports like football are making gains in transitioning into swimming. Overall, she has 22 swimmers on the team this year, with seven seniors leading the team.

"They're going to do a great job," Seiloff

said about the seniors.

While 22 students isn't as many swimmers Seiloff has for the state-champion girls team in the fall, she believes the Wolves will still be a competitive team for their first year in the 3A conference. She said one of the main challenges for the boys swimming is the difficulty in getting athletes to compete during the winter. Despite that, she sees the large number of seniors as a major strength for the Wolves going into the season.

For the conference, Seiloff said 3A will be highly-competitive for the Wolves, espe-

cially with Lander's swimming team. The Lander Tigers swimming team dominate the 3A conference in Wyoming, with the team seeking their 25th consecutive state title this year.

While Seiloff says a top-three finish at state, at the hardware that comes with it, is one of the team's goals, the boys are more focused on improving their individual times throughout the season.

"They want to get in there and do the best they can this year," she said. "We'll see where they end up at the end of the season."

County employee retires after 38 years

A 38-year employee of Sweetwater County's land use department will be retiring at the end of the year.

Mark Kot, the county's public lands planner, said he has enjoyed working in various roles at the Sweetwater County Courthouse during his time as an employee. Kot was originally hired in 1983 as an engineer and surveyor. Kot originally came to Rock Springs in 1979, being hired by the Bureau of Land Management as a temporary hydrologist.

"The job was supposed to last four months," Kot said.

Kot, who resided in Winter, Wisc., prior to coming to the county, said he was aware of Rock Springs because of the well-known crime and corruption occurring in the city at the time. When accepting the job offer during a phone call with a BLM representative, Kot recalls asking if "that was the place with all the crime and corruption." Kot said he had worked the previous summer in Glenwood Springs and Steamboat Springs, Colo., and expected the landscape to be similar to those areas. Driving along Interstate 80 through Laramie towards Rock Springs, Kot remembers constantly fighting the wind as he drove, eventually pulling over near the Red Desert thinking something was causing his vehicle to drift. He quickly learned the wind was so strong it was pushing his vehicle to the side as he drove. Upon arriving in Rock Springs and getting a room at the Springs Motel, he used a pay phone to call his mom.

"This place looks like the moon," he remembers telling her.

Following his time at the BLM, Kot said he was a day away from moving back to Wisconsin because he was unable to find work. The day before he planned to leave, he received a call from Glenn Sugano, a longtime Rock Springs city employee future city councilman, offering him a job at the city's solid waste treatment facility.

The facility Kot worked at was behind where the Albertsons grocery store is located, not the current treatment facility west of Rock Springs. He said the facility was 1 million gallons over capacity -- a symptom of the explosive growth the city had seen in the previous decade.

"When that red light went off, you went down and opened up the floodgates, emptying it all into the Bitter Creek," Kot said.

After leaving that job and a posi-

tion at the Jim Bridger Power Plant, he would be hired at the county, with his initial task being to survey all of the county roads, a task he doesn't believe has been accomplished yet. Deciding he didn't want to be 40 and going out into the freezing cold as a surveyor, Kot applied for an open planner position in the land use office. In the following years, Kot worked his way through the office, becoming the community development supervisor in 1995 and the public lands planner in 2011.

During that time, Kot helped initiate Operation Desert Pride, a group committed to cleaning up the garbage left in the Red Desert. He said the organization would host half a dozen cleanup events each year, with volunteer numbers ranging from a few people to a small army committed to picking up the litter. Kot also credits the organization with introducing him to his wife, Linda, whom he met while working the Operation Desert Pride booth at the Sweetwater County Fair.

Kot also has pride in his work on the county's growth management plan, which aimed to create an agreement between the county and the Green River and Rock Springs municipal governments regarding growth and zoning on county lands surrounding the two cities.

More recently, Kot believes his work

as the county lands planner, which he teamed up with Sweetwater County Commissioner Wally Johnson, has benefited the county and its residents.

Kot credits Johnson for creating his current position, which has been aimed at keeping Sweetwater County a cooperating group with federal agencies and helping push a multiple-use philosophy for federal lands, supporting both industrial and commercial uses for federal lands, as well as recreational uses.

Kot cites the county's work with organizations like the Greater Little Mountain Coalition and promoting protections for Adobe Town and portions of the Red Desert in helping protect the county's vital areas.

"Wally made this job possible," Kot said. "We're protecting the wide open spaces and the economy of Sweetwater County that's derived from it."

Kot believes that moving forward, the county should continue striving for and maintaining a working relationship with the BLM, U.S. Forest Service and other federal entities.

"It's through those relationships you get things done," he said. "Recreation comes from open spaces, we need to keep the (balance between industrial and recreational uses) viable."

Overall, Kot said the last 36 years working for the county have treated him well, as well as given him a chance to interact with people in a wide range of fields and expertise.

"It's always been an interesting opportunity to visit places with people who know a lot about oil and gas, archeology or biology," Kot said.

Kot doesn't plan to rest once he's retired. If anything, he plans to be as

active as he can.

"Sitting for 35 years has wrecked my back," Kot said.

Kot said he intends to travel, having an interest in visiting Poland, Greenland and Morocco, as well as "anywhere else my wife wants to visit."

He also has an interest in being a substitute teacher and wants to take a class to study calculus, something he never had the chance to do. Kot said he intends to work out more and continue exploring Sweetwater County, saying there are 12 wilderness study areas and a number of places he hasn't seen yet.

He said he's also trying to photograph the seven species of chickadee bird in North America, having already photographed three of the seven.

Kot also said he has an interest in promoting dark sky lighting in Green River and Rock Springs. The lighting is designed to allow for more stars to be visible in the night sky. Standard streetlights cause light pollution, which is excessive and misdirected outdoor lighting that can obscure stars and has been linked to having adverse effects on health.

"I want to be part of this community," Kot said.

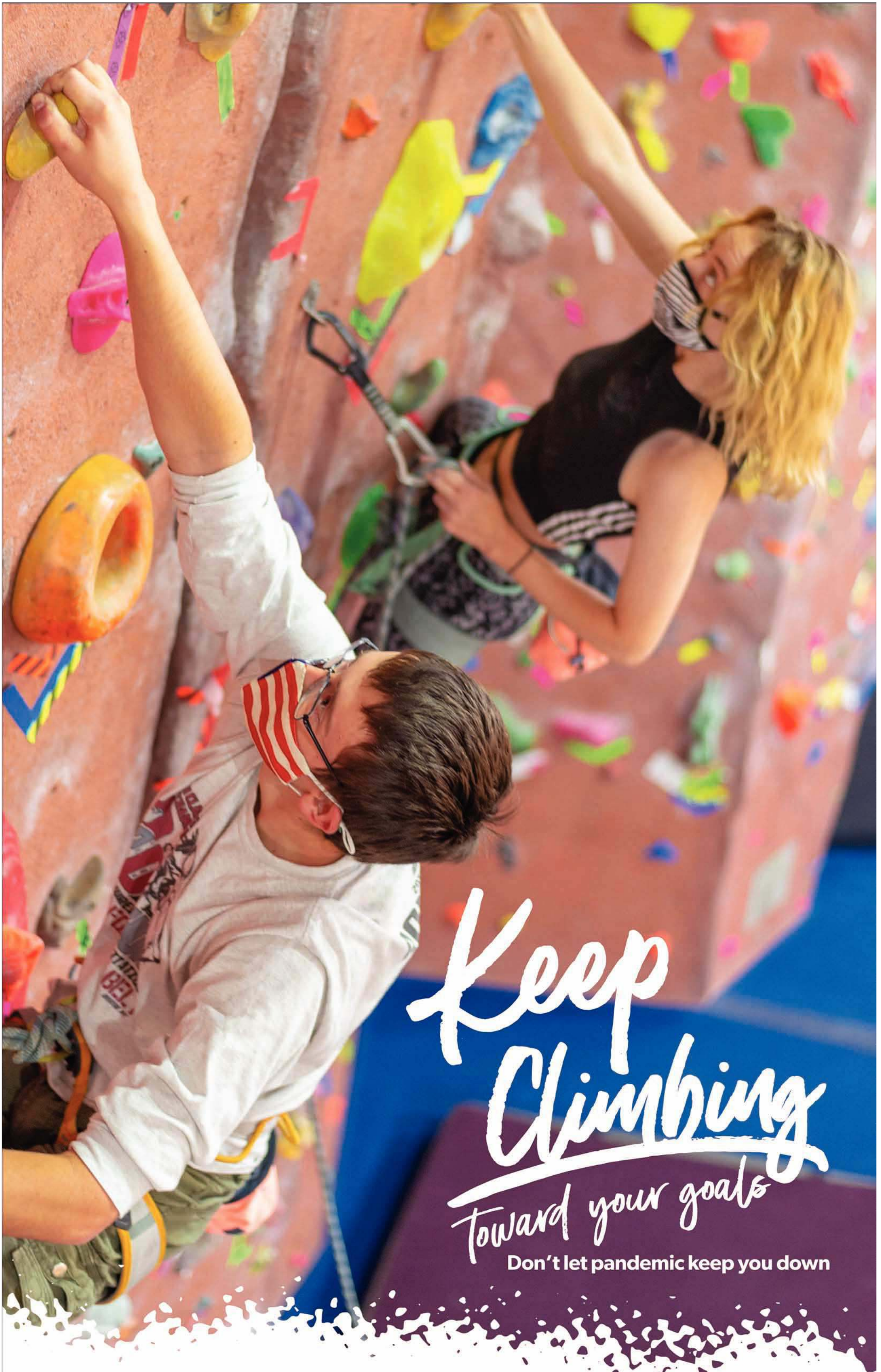
