Mr. A. G. Kauloukou gave personal reminiscences of the late Queen with whom he was quite well acquainted. He emphasized the fact that her later life had been very much sweetened by Christianity.

Mr. Wm. Hyde Rice told of his tour around Kauai with her, and how she had made him governor and showed the decorations she had bestowed on him. Such decorations are no longer given in these days and which will be most interesting and valuable as heir-looms. The children watched and listened spell bound.

At Lihue High School Wm. Henry Rice gave a talk on the same subject in the morning; gave personal reminiscences that had come under his knowledge, and told how the Queen admonished her subjects to be loyal to America as they had been loyal to her, and how they had heeded her injunction, and thus far there have been no Benedict Arnolds among the Hawaiians.

An Improvement

A fine piece of stone wall work is being put in by way of plantation railway parapet on the Grove Farm main road near the church. This is a permanent improvement in line with the wise policy of Lihue Plantation, and when planted with some clinging vine of the ivy type will be decorative and artistic as well.

Baseball Next Sunday

An Unfortunate Accident

A serious casualty happened on the morning of Nov. 17 by which one man was killed and another seriously injured. It was in connection with some railway extension on Grove Farm where a cut and fill were being made involving the transfer of a large amount of material by cars.

The contractor who had taken the job in his anxiety to make a big profit adopted the dangerous policy of tunneling through the cut in advance in order to load his cars from the top by gravity.

Realizing that this was dangerous Mr. Broadbent, the manager, stopped them from using this method and made them return to the slower but safer way.

Some days later, however, in his absence they resumed it on the ground that they knew their own business better than any one else. Learning that they had resumed this dangerous method, Mr. Broadbent sent post haste instructions to stop it but to late, the roof had just fallen in, and the damage was done. The injured man is being cared for and will recover in a short time.

The regular business meeting of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Kauai was held at the usual place and hour on November 7th, 1917.

Present: H. D. Wishard, chairman; F. Brandt, W. D. McBryde, J. F. Bettencourt, Jr., A. Menefoglio.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and with some corrections the same were approved.

The Board having examined the several demands submitted approved them to be paid out of the following appropriations, viz:

A few demands from C. B. Hofgaard & Co. for janitor supplies etc. for the schools at Kekaha and Waimea were received and upon the motion of Mr. Brandt seconded by Mr. Menefoglio these were ordered return to the principals of these schools with instructions that all requests for supplies, duly approved by the supervising principal, must be submitted first to the Board for its approval, and that no supplies be bought until permission has been obtained from the Board. That

the Board declined to approve these bills until requisitions therefor duly approved by the supervising principal are submitted to the Board for its approval; further the Board declined to approve the bill for the purchase of a lawn mower.

A suggestion (P1485) from E. A. Creevey, Vocational Instructor, for material for making furniture for the use of the teachers' cottages on Kauai was received, and after general discussion had on the matter, upon the motion of Mr. Brandt, duly seconded, it was ordered that one complete set of the furniture suggested be made and if the Board upon examination at some future day will be satisfied with them the Board then would enter into the whole proposition more fully.

A requisition (P1483a) for material for the school gardens at Koloa and Makaweli; and for material for a small addition to be put to the Elele school kitchen; also for material for necessary additions to the cottage at present occupied by E. A. Creevey was received and the requests were granted.

Mr Brandt moved that the Board rent some of the rooms of the new Japanese school house at Lihue for the use of the children attending the Lihue public school at \$6.25 a room to include janitor's services; also the Board authorizes the employment of a janitor for the Lihue public school at \$20 per month; the repainting of the Lihue public six-room building; the putting up of three (3) water fountains of sufficient capacity to serve the children attending this school and one (1) water fountain on the new Lihue Japanese school premises for the use of the English speaking children attending that school.

Reports (1484) on school buildings for October were received from Anahola, Elele, Haena, Hanamaulu, Huleia, Kalaheo Kapaa, Kapahi, Kauai High, Kekaha, Kilauea, Koloa, Koolau, Lihue, Makaweli, Manā, Wailua, and Waimea, and were placed on file.

Mr. Moragne made a verbal report regarding the claim of Geo. R. Titcomb of Haena for injuries done to his horse. No action was taken but Mr. Menefoglio was asked to look into this matter and advise the Board on the matter.

At 12:30 p. m. the Board took a recess until 1 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The Board again met at 1 p. m. After a verbal statement by Mr. Menefoglio that A. S. Wilcox has offered to donate to the County of Kauai a piece of land at Hanalei for the use of the Hanalei public school and upon his motion, which was seconded, it was ordered to accept the offer and to extend a vote of thanks to the donor; and that the notes of survey and plan of the land be given to the County Attorney with a request to draw up the necessary papers for the transfer. It was further ordered to extend the present fence so to include the new land.

Mr. Brandt made a partial report on the matter of securing a piece of land out of the public lands at Hrnapepe for the use of the County and was given further time to make his final report on the matter.

A contract, in duplicate, (P1481) between the County of Kauai and the Territory of Hawaii that the former shall survey and superin-

tend the work, and furnish all labor, tools and materials for the construction of a road along the westerly slope of Kukuiohono hill at Kalahoe was received and the chairman signed the same on behalf of the Board.

Of the Board's own motion the chairman was given full authority to install at the proper time electric lights in the teachers cottages of the Kauai High School.

A petition (P 1485) from Kawaihau for the macadamizing of Kukui street to the top of Pueo hill in Kapaa town was received and in connection therewith and upon the motion of Mr. Betten-court, Jr. seconded by Mr. Menefoglio the engineer was given full authority to break sufficient rock for macadamizing this road.

A petition (P 1486) to straighten the public road lying near Lots 62 and 63 of the Kapahi Homesteads was received.

The report [P 1487] of the County Road Supervisor for the month of October was received and placed on file. It is as follows:

"Road Work: Sluicing was resumed on the Camp 4 Makaweli job which is now nearing completion so far as can be done by sluicing. Repair work went on as usual.

In Koloa District: The asphalt coating was finished on Koloa grade—Lihue side of Koloa. Other grades between Koloa and Lawai are now being asphalted. The road between the cannery and homestead store was patched temporarily. The little crusher was run a few days and crushed a lot of rock for repairing.

In Lihue District the main road was oiled from Puhi gulch towards Lihue to Mr. Weber's road. The Hanamaulu-Kapaia grade was coated with asphaltum and sand improving the surface greatly. It is my intention to use asphaltum

extensively in trying to extend the life of the unoiled roads. The rock for macadamizing the Halehaka-Malumalu road is being hauled; about 2000 cubic yards has been delivered to date and about 1300 remains to be hauled.

Kawaihau District: Macadamizing at Kapaa went on satisfactory during the month. The gap at the cannery is being closed today, the road being finished to a point within 3000 feet of the Catholic church. The final connection will probably be made by or before the 25th inst. and when this connection is made the macadam will be continuous from Waiawa in Wai- mea district to Haena in Hanalei district. By or before the 25th all of the surplus rock from Kealia quarry will also be hauled and piled at the crusher. I would like instructions in regard to the macadamizing outfit when the main road is finished. The new macadam throughout Kawaihau district is being kept in splendid condition.

Work in Hanalei district consisted of keeping up the main road. Building stonewall on Kalihiwai grade and covering the loose sand road near the old Haena school lot with a layer of dirt; also the work of paving the Wainiha power house road with a layer of river gravel was completed and the road is now apparently good for any weather. The K. E. Co. assisted in this improvement.

Water Works: All apparently in satisfactory condition.

Schools: All repairs finished as requested."

The Financial Reports Nos. 205, 205a, 205aa, and 205b for August, also Nos. 206, 206a, 206aa, and 206b for September were approved upon the advice of Mr. Brandt.

Financial Reports Nos. 207, 207a, 207aa, and 207b for October; Auditor's statement [R 208] for ten months to October, 15 1917, also M. H. Drummond, Deputy Bank Examiner, report of the financial condition of the County of Kauai were referred to Mr. Brandt for report.

The reports of the Poundmasters at Lihue [P 1461 and 1476], and at Waimea [P 1448 and 1477] were approved upon the recommendation of Mr. Menefoglio.

A communication from Raymond C. Brown, secretary of the sixth Annual Civic Convention was received and is as follows:

Honolulu, Hawaii
November Second, Seventeen.
To the Board of Supervisors,
County of Kauai,
Lihue, Kauai.

Gentlemen:
In a meeting of the Sixth Annual Civic Convention which was held in Honolulu on September 16, 17, and 18, 1917, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, that this Civic Convention urges all local governing bodies to establish public comfort stations wherever necessary in their several cities and counties."

We trust that everything will turn out right, that more of our plans as to the quality of the chickens, and the weather and the landings may miscarry, but in any case we want you to know that we extend to you a generous Hawaiian welcome such as no word in any language will convey save the one Hawaiian word Aloha!

How Far Does Our Patriotism Go?

A writer in a recent number of the Atlantic Monthly raises this question. "We are patriots enough to stand up with the right music, to float the flag, and to yell when the soldiers go by. We are even patriots enough to offer our lives to our country. Are we patriots enough to stand without finching when our pockets and appetites are touched? We shall see."

We would venture to assure the Atlantic that for the American Communities of this Island we are.

Some Food Commission Results

The significance of the National Food Commission is evident, among other things in this, that the farmer is receiving \$3.00 a barrel more for his wheat than last year, and the consumer is getting his flour \$3.00, cheaper. This is because of a fixed price for wheat, and of the restraint of speculation and of undue profit.

If it were not for the restraining influence of this Commission sugar would now be selling for 15 or 20 cents a pound, which would mean that the wealthy would have sugar, and the poor would not.

By fixing the price and limiting the quantity the available supply is equitably distributed.

The Fellowship of Service

A visit to the Koloa Red Cross contingent revealed the pleasant fact that no less than fifteen women, a very goodly number for so small a community, and of three or four races, were untiringly engaged in the good work. Fully half of the number were Japanese and several were Hawaiian.

Even if no other benefit were attained the coordination of these different elements of the community into one common purpose and one common effort would in itself be a significant gain. These common interests bring us together so that we learn to know one another better and that leads us to understand and appreciate one another, and that in turn makes for peace and happiness.

Save On Meat

In view of the prospect that Hawaii will have to import beef in order to meet the growing demand and in view farther of the growing difficulties of transportation the injunction to observe meatless meals and meatless days imposed upon us by the Food Conservation authorities assumes a new significance.

We have been thinking, under our breath more or less perhaps, that this meat conservation program didn't exactly apply to us since we were sufficient unto ourselves in the matter of meat supply and thus were in no danger of infringing on the supply which might go to our Allies. It now appears that we will have to economize to make our supply go round and this we must do not only to conserve the meat that it may go to the Allies, but also that we may conserve transportation space for other and more necessary things. Clubs, hotels, restaurants, as well as private families are urgently requested to observe at least one full meatless day a week and to reduce the consumption of meat on other days.

Meatless Tuesdays and wheatless Wednesdays are being commonly observed on the Coast and the same, or some similar plan may well be adopted here.

Food for the Family

A bulletin with this title has recently been issued which gives the following suggestions as to diets for growing children:

1. Spend from one third to one fourth of your food money for bread, cereals, macaroni and rice.
2. Buy half a quart of milk a day for each member of the family.
3. Spend as much for vegetables and fruit as you do for milk.
4. Spend no more for meat and eggs than for vegetables and fruit. Meat and eggs can be cut down more wisely than any other one of these things.

MRS. RUSSELL VISITS KAUAI

Mrs. James Russell, who has been making a ten days tour of Kauai in the interest of the Food Conservation, was a departing passenger for Honolulu on Saturday by the "Mauna Loa." The Hanalei side was covered during the first days of her visit, and the last week was devoted to the leeward side of the island. She was accompanied by Miss Channon, general secretary of the Y. W. C. A. of Honolulu, and Miss Wilcox of the local Women's Sub-Committee of the Territorial Food Commission.

Good-sized audiences of representative women of all races greeted Mrs. Russell at each place. Ten demonstrations in all were given, eight of which were devoted to showing the making of the "Liberty Loaf," in which one-third of the loaf is made up of rice, potatoes, sweet-potatoes, or some other cereal such as oatmeal or barley. These breads have been pronounced delicious by the women attending, they are as nutritious as ordinary wheat bread, and already many families and some of the bakers have adopted them. The demonstration in Makaweli was on "Leftovers," and aimed to show how economy could be practised in the household in the using up of odds and ends when put on the table in appetizing form. The Saturday morning meeting at Lihue was given up to "Meat Substitutes."

The Koloa committee added a happy touch to the meeting there by appearing in "Hoover Dresses" of blue chambray, trimmed with white collars and cuffs, and white caps. Those having in charge the meetings of the week were Mrs. Brandt for Waimea; Mrs. Hodge for Makaweli; Miss Hastie for Elele; Mrs. Waterhouse for Koloa, and Mrs. Broadbent for Lihue.

Meat Substitutes

Mrs. Russell devoted her last meeting on Kauai to the consideration of Foods which could be well used in place of meats. The meat question is becoming a pressing one. The food animals of the Allies have decreased by 33,000,000 head since the war began; thus the source of their meat production is decreasing. At the same time the needs of their soldiers and war workers have increased the necessary meat consumption. Our meat exports to our Allies are now already almost three times what they were before the war. The needs of the Allies will steadily increase, because their own production of food animals will steadily decrease because of lack of feed for them. If we will save one ounce of meat per person per day we can send our Allies what they need.

Locally, our problem is indeed a serious one. We are told that the islands have a sufficient meat supply for one year only, and the outlook in the matter of transportation from the mainland is not very promising. We are already cutting down on our use of imported meats, such as ham, bacon, canned goods, etc., from patriotic reasons as well as because of the high prices for these articles. We must secure foods from local sources which will supply the protein, or tissue-building elements, in our diet, which we now secure so largely from meats. This means the substitution of other protein-rich foods for meats, and we are asked to use more vegetables, fish, cheese, milk, eggs, poultry, peanuts, peanut butter, beans, (which have nearly the same food-value as meat), dried peas and nuts, —surely a wide range to choose from. We are also advised to use soups more freely, and to use all left-over meat cold or in made dishes. A very good substitute for bacon which many find hard to go without, is salt pork, which may be secured locally, soaked over night, and fried in thin strips like bacon.

What Will Russia Do?

Charles Edward Russell Back From Slav Republic With Startling Revelations

"What the new Russian republic does, whether it continues in the war or makes a separate peace with Germany, may mean one million American lives and twenty billion American dollars," says Mr. Charles Edward Russell, who has just returned from his trip as special investigator for President Wilson on conditions in the new Slav republic. "What Russia will do," he continues, "is therefore one of the most interesting questions that now confronts the American people."

Mr. Russell himself is very hopeful. He does not believe that the new Russia will desert her allies. The fact that some things go poorly in the government does not surprise him half so much, he says, as the fact that anything goes well. This is particularly true, he thinks, of conditions in the army; and he continues to show in his article in Hearst's Magazine, which under the circumstances amounts almost to an official report on these matters, why the breaking down of army discipline was inevitable, and why in spite of the loss of Galicia and Riga and a general demoralization in other sections of the line, the Russian fighting force will come through stronger and better than ever and play a dominant part in the great general offensive which it is an open secret the allies will undertake next spring. These opinions have the value of having been reached through the personal observations of not only a trained student, but of one who by temperament and experience is particularly fitted to judge and appreciate the spirit of the new Russian social democracy.

Cheese and Potato Pie

4 medium-sized potatoes boiled until tender with skins on. Remove skins, cut up in small pieces and place lightly in a fire-proof dish. Make a sauce by melting 1 tablespoon butter and stirring in 1 1/2 tablespoons flour. Add pepper and salt, and 1/2 cup milk, and boil up, stir in 4 tablespoons grated cheese and pour quickly over the potatoes. Bake about 1/2 hour. Cold potatoes can be used for this dish. In that case, add 1 teaspoon finely chopped parsley to take away the stale taste. Sweet potatoes can be used in this recipe.

Savory Beans

Soak 1 cupful beans over night in cold water to cover, with 1/2 teaspoon baking-soda. In the morning drain off the water and wash well. Put 2 tablespoons fat into a saucepan and stir the beans around in it until they are thoroughly hot. Remove from the fire and add 1 large onion finely chopped. Pour into a casserole or bean pot and cover with beef or chicken stock or water. Cover closely and cook for two hours slowly. Add salt and pepper, and 2 tablespoons grated cheese and serve hot piled on a dish or in the casserole.

Rice and Tomatoes

1/2 cup rice, 1 1/2 cups gravy, 2 tomatoes rubbed through a sieve or 1 tablespoon tomato sauce, 1 teaspoon butter. Blanch the rice. (Wash and bring to a boil with plenty of water, then strain off.) Put into a pan and add half gravy and tomatoes. Cook until gravy is absorbed, then add a little more until the rice is soft. Just before dishing up, add butter, pepper and salt and toss it around. Do not cook again after the butter is in. This may be prepared in the same way without tomatoes, adding 2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese when the butter is added.

Carrot Pudding

1 cup grated raw carrot
1 " " potato
1 " seeded raisins
1 " sugar
1 " flour
1 teaspoon soda mixed in flour
1 " allspice
1 " salt
Butter size of egg
Steam two hours.

TERRITORY OF HAWAII, BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF AGRICULTURE AND FORESTRY

RULE XIII

DIVISION OF ANIMAL INDUSTRY

Rule and Regulation of the Board of Commissioners of Agriculture and Forestry concerning the Keeping and Breeding of Rabbits.

The Board of Commissioners of Agriculture and Forestry of the Territory of Hawaii hereby makes the following rule and regulation pertaining to the keeping and breeding of rabbits in the Territory of Hawaii in accordance with Act 50 of the Session Laws of Hawaii of 1917.

Section 1. Every keeper or breeder of rabbits or hares, whether the same are kept singly, as pets or in numbers for their meat, skins, or other purposes, must obtain from the Board of Agriculture and Forestry a permit to keep or breed rabbits.

Section 2. In order to obtain such permit it is necessary for the applicant to submit to the Board of Agriculture and Forestry an affirmed statement to the effect that he will use due diligence and take every possible precaution to the end that such rabbits, for whatsoever purpose kept, remain confined.

Section 3. Applicants for permits must obtain from the said Board or its local representative an application blank to be filled in and returned.

This rule shall take effect upon its approval by the Governor of Hawaii.

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Mauna Kahili is Ascended Once More

Kahili, the precipitous peak flanking the "gap" on the north west side was successfully ascended Monday, November 5, by a party consisting of C. S. Dole, Judge L. A. Dickey, A. H. Case, C. H. Wilcox, E. A. Knudsen, Philip Palama, Joe Rita, forester, (two employees of Mr. W. D. McBryde) and Nakashima their guide.

Starting from the rendezvous near the mountain house of Mr. B. D. Baldwin, manager of Makaweli Plantation, at about eight o'clock in the morning (to which point they had come in automobiles), they continued the journey on foot up the ridge extending along the valley of the Wahiawa river, past the reservoir recently installed in that valley, to the large horse-shoe-shaped swamp lying at the base of Kahili.

Here they admired the beautiful little flowers which grow in such profusion over the grassy surface of the swamp,—the dwarf lehua ("lehua makano") with its brilliant red blossoms; and the dainty pale blue flowers of the Hawaiian violet; and about ten o'clock, under the guidance of Nakashima, their guide, (the ditch tender for the McBryde Sugar Company, who lives near the reservoir and has ascended the peak several times, by himself), they began the actual climb up to Kahili's summit.

This took two hours, and they reached the top at noon, after some very steep and precipitous climbing, just in time to get a glimpse of the grand panorama towards the east, of the Haupu mountain range, the bright green cane fields of the Lihue, Koloa, and McBryde Plantations, the coast line mountains back of Hanamaulu and Wailua, Kilohana crater and the Anahola mountain range, with the ocean glittering in the sunlight beyond; as well as the mountains, canyons, and plains to the westward.

But after all too short an enjoyment of the magnificent spectacle the unkind tradewinds from the eastern ocean assembled an army of silvery clouds, which settled down over us and enveloped the mountain with their thick gray mist for the remainder of the day.

So we had to make the best of it, and sat down for our lunch, with appetites stimulated by the steep climb and the cool air of the mountains, and after our meal we set about the main purpose of this trip, which was to make careful measurements and observations of the aboriginal remains which were still in evidence, for the benefit of the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum, which had requested certain members of the party to obtain the figures as to the present situation and extent of the ancient relics.

We found the platform mentioned in the previous reports, a fairly level space twenty seven feet long by twelve feet wide in its widest part, roughly elliptical in shape, with a few rocks and branches of trees scattered over it, and surrounded, especially on its west side, by a fairly vigorous growth of trees and shrubs, several of the former being eight to ten feet high.

Of the "kauwila" posts, or timbers, mentioned, there are five remaining at present, the large one, which two athletic members of our party climbed, (with the aid of the several notches cut in the wood) and found to be just thirteen feet and three inches in height and a foot in diameter, and four small ones, nearly rotted away but the firm portion of the wood showing the flinty solidity which is characteristic of that species of our indigenous forest trees.

These small remainders of shafts are, respectively 3½, 1¾, 1¼, and ¾ of a foot high, from six to eight inches in diameter, and three of them are in a straight line which runs past the large pillar from the north to south, and are distant 4 feet, 7½ feet, and ten feet, from the latter; the fourth being 7½ feet from the large one, and on the

edge of the platform, in a southeasterly direction from the "king pin."

After remaining a little over an hour up in the clouds, we felt satisfied we had seen all there was to see, up there, and began our return descent,—first posing for a picture, grouped around the large pillar (on which no signs of a face had been found carved, as was surmised by previous explorers to be the case, by our athletes who scaled it and pulled off the moss), which the Judge, our expert photographer, snapped, or rather, "time," with the assistance of our guide.

The descent to the swamp was accomplished in an hour and a half, and after plucking a pretty bunch of "lehua" and violets, the last of us reached the mountain house, and our car, in time to drive back to Lihue before six o'clock in the afternoon,—the other car having returned earlier, with the intention of seeing the finals of a tennis tournament which was in progress.

It may be interesting to recall one or two earlier ascents of the same peak, viz, that of James J. Jarves in 1844, taken from "Scenes and Scenery in the Hawaiian Islands."

The Ascent of Mount Kahili

After groping our way upward for an hour or more, we reached the summit. It consisted of a small plot of earth about a rod square, bare in the centre, but overgrown with stout trees upon its sides. Upon it were several large timbers, of a foot in diameter, standing perpendicular and about twelve feet high, with notches for foot-hold cut in them. These, as runs the legend, have stood from time immemorial,—that is to say, some half century or more, and are the remains of a fortification which a chief erected, who lived on bad terms with his less elevated neighbors. As the approaches to its site are a succession of narrow ridges, a few warriors were able to set a host of enemies at defiance, and make the place impregnable. During the night his followers sallied down and levied blackmail in the shape of pigs, fowls, taro, and potatoes, for their lord's table. What was his end, the legend tells not; but if his enemies did not eventually take him off, an influenza must, for no mortal could have lived there long, not even if possessed of a hide such as Nebuchadnezzar boasted.'

The Second Ascent

In 1885 a party of Kauai residents climbed the mountain, among the members of the expedition being J. K. Farley, W. D. McBryde, A. M. McBryde, E. H. W. Broadbent, Henry Blake, C. D. Pringle, and others.

In their report of the trip they state that then they were informed by reliable authority, as opposed to Jarves' theory, that the posts (which are all "kauwila" the very heavy, beautiful red cabinet wood, the trees of which are only found in the mountains back of Waimea and neighboring sections) are the remains of a funeral pyre, for the burial of the bodies of the ancient kings and chiefs of the Island.

At that time the largest "kauwila" stick was estimated by them to be about eighteen feet long and fifteen inches in diameter, of solid wood, with two or three inches of rotting wood on the outside, covered with moss. One of that party says:—"This big log of very heavy wood must have been brought from back of Waimea, and I haven't the remotest idea how they could have done it, for we had to haul ourselves up by "ie-ie" vines, in places, the side of the mountain was so precipitous." He says, further:—"That flat on top is levelled off in the solid rock, and the largest post is in a hole four to six feet deep, which had been dug for it in the flinty cracked rock. The hole must have been dug by means of the stone adzes which were the instru-

ments used for such purposes in ancient times."

Another of the '95 party says:—"The sticks were all covered with a thick covering of moss and "well," oozing with moisture. The whole top of the mountain, in fact, except a small cliff on the eastern side, was all covered with a wet growth of moss, on account of the heavy rainfall up there, and the fact that Kahili, which is over three thousand feet high, is much of the time covered with clouds."

Although they made an early start, and hiked along industriously they didn't reach the summit until nearly 2 o'clock because of a good deal of lost time finding the way.

Returning they reached the autos at Hale-manu-akua about dark to find that two of the machines had flat tires, which still further delayed the weary and hungry party. They confirm all the facts and figures of the former party, they saw all that their predecessors did, and the view besides.

An Interesting Book

Probably the first book of any consequence published about the Hawaiian Islands is also one of the very best "Ellis Tour of the Island of Hawaii," first published in 1827, in England. A universal favorite at the time and widely read, it is of course long since out of print and to be found only in old libraries, or in the possession of historical societies.

It has recently been published in a very attractive shape by the Advertiser as the second of its Hawaiian Historical Series and is now on sale at \$2.50. Rev. Wm. Ellis was originally an English missionary to the South Seas, a man of much more than ordinary intelligence and ability.

In 1822, in company with other missionaries, he made a visit to the recently established Hawaiian Mission, and in response to the urgent invitation of that mission remained with them two years, instead of the few months that he had originally intended. With a view to extending the missionary operations an exploring party was commissioned to make a tour of the Island of Hawaii, and of this party Ellis was a member and the historian.

The journal of that trip gives the most faithful, detailed and interesting account of what they saw and experienced. They were the first white men to make such a tour, the first white men to visit the volcano of Kilaua.

Finding the country thickly populated they proceeded leisurely, afoot of course, stopping at every little hamlet and village to confer with the natives and learn the character and resources of the country. Ellis in particular, by virtue of his more intimate knowledge of Polynesian customs, language and outlook was in a position to gather a vast amount of information in regard to the customs and habits of the people which constitute a most reliable mine of information, the more reliable because of the intelligence and liberality of the writer. It is an exceedingly valuable book which every lover of Hawaii should have.

The Carambola

This is not a munition of war, an unfamiliar religion or a new disease, but a more or less familiar fruit which you may find sometimes in our market, and which, we are told, should be grown and used much more largely. It comes from India where it is known as the Coromandel gooseberry but it is no more a gooseberry than a watermelon is.

It grows on a small tree, is about the size of a large lime, with five prominent acutely-angled ribs. The skin is very thin, light yellow or greenish yellow, and fragrant.

There are two kinds of Carambolas, one sweet, to be eaten out of hand, the other sharply acid, to be made into pickles.

It grows readily from seed, maturing fruit in three or four years. Here it is generally supposed to be a Chinese fruit, but that is a mistake.

All who are interested are cordially invited to come and enjoy this rare opportunity as may suit their convenience, 9 to 12 in the morning and 3 to 5:30 in the afternoon.

Mr. Bartlett is a member of the International Society of fine arts of Paris and of the International Society of water colorists of France which latter Society is limited to 25 members from all countries.

We would say for the benefit of those who have not seen Mr. Bartlett's work, that these pictures are not to be confused with ordinary wood cuts. They are veritable works of art of great originality and distinction so that this is by all means an opportunity not to be neglected.

Mr. Bartlett in his own original line ranks among the leading artists of this generation and we are very fortunate to have this favorable opportunity to see his work.

Practically all the men teachers of Punahou Academy, having been called out with the National Guard, their work devolves on the remaining teachers, who are thus doing double duty.
