What course the Government will take under the circumstances is at this time unknown. Lospos, Dec. 5 .- [World's Special.] The vote

in the Versailles Assembly, to-day, on the formation of Dufaure's Committee has excited the liveliest apprehension in Paris, where fighting is expected

There is great excitement at Chistehurst. Marshal MacMahon controls the army, but will act only in obedience to the Assembly, not to Thiers. German re-occupation of France is certain if fighting occurs. Correspondence has recently passed between Bismarck and Napoleon, and German re-occupation will result in the re-establishment of the Empire.

The vote of the Assembly yesterday in electing nineteen Deputies of the Right or the Monarchists, to eleven of the Left or the Republicans, on the Committee to consider the question of the constitution of the Republic, makes French affairs again exciting. Without accepting all that is contained in the New York World's special dispatch from London, on the interference of Germany if fighting should commence, and the re-establishment of the Napoleonic dynasty, all friends of the Republic will be deeply interested in watching the result of this apparently Monarchical victory. There is, however, some gratification in knowing that the Monarchists are divided among themselves as to who should be called to the throne, and the sort of constitution which France should adopt ; also that to many of them the fear of re-establishing the Napoleonic dynasty will be a strong consideration before overthrowing the Republic. The Left as representing all shades of the Republican Deputies, generally been represented as outnumbering the Right, and this seemingly Republican reverse is perhaps due to the votes of those Deputies, numbering in all about 100, who are not strongly affiliated with either of the two great parties. Prudence, if nothing else should, and will, probably, restrain the Right, even if they have the power, from declaring against the Republic at the present juncture .- Bulletin.

ROME, Dec. 5 .-- Sir Bartle Frere has arrived here on his way to join the British expedition to suppress the slave trude on the African Coast. He was received by the King, who gave him a gold medal bearing the Royal effigy, and asked him to present it to Dr. Livingstone, as a badge of his esteem.

Summer's resolution, demanding that the names of battles for the Union shall not be continued in the Army Register nor placed on the regimental colors of the United States, is very characteristic of the man. It is not true that such practice "is contrary to the usages of civilized nations." On the contrary, in every country the names of battles won, and of the heroes who fought for their country, are written not on paper alone but engraved in marble and bronze. Statues, columns, obelisks are erected to their memory, bearing their names and commemorating their deeds. We fear that Summer has made an unprofitable tour through England and France, if he has not seen such monuments. If the object of his resolution be to revive brotheriv feelings among citizens by forgetting the past conflict, why not ask then that the sale of the history of the war by both sides be suppressed, and the copies in the public libraries be suppressed? The next demand Summer will make will be, we suppose, that all must believe that there was never a rebellion in this country, and that Secession by States was lawful.-Alta. Dec. 3.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 18 .- Reports of the destruc-· tion by terrible gales last week continue to be received from sea and land. Several villages in Schleswig-Holstein were destroyed, and a number of towns in Pomerania seriously damaged.

Advices from the provinces show that the wreck and ruin caused by the hurricane is enormous. At many ports the sea embankment and draining works are demolished. The loss is very great. The damage in the Island of Falster, known for its fertility as the orchard of Denmark, will exceed a million rix dollars. The King has sent relief to the inhabitants. The Queen started a subscription list, and presides over an aid association. The Minister of Marine has ordered commandants of Danish vessels at naval stations to give every succor to shipwrecked crews along the coast.
