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
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Foreword

The National Longitudinal Study (NLS) of the High School Class of 1972 is a large-scale long-term survey effort supported by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), Office of the Assistant Secretary for Educational Research and Improvement in the U.S. Department of Education. Broadly stated, NLS is designed to provide statistics on a national sample of students as they move out of the American high school system into the critical years of early adulthood. Data have been gathered and colligated from several sources, coded and edited for analysis purposes, and stored on magnetic computer tapes for future access. The current tapes contain base-year (1972) survey data, collected by the Educational Testing Service, integrated with first follow-up (1973), second follow-up (1974), third follow-up (1976), and fourth follow-up (1979) survey data, collected by the Research Triangle Institute.

The Users Manual provides a detailed description of the merged NLS data file now available for use by the general research community. These data provide an extensive and potentially rich resource for a variety of research purposes. The purpose of this manual is to document the contents of the available tapes, and thereby enable the interested investigator to exploit effectively the research potential of the data.

Obviously, a project of the size and scope of NLS requires the close cooperation and combined effort of many people and organizations. This manual documents an interim file of those efforts. Finally, a special recognition is due to the thousands of anonymous sample members who have participated in NLS, without whose cooperation the study would not have been possible.

NLS first follow-up activities were the responsibility of the project codirectors for the contractor, Dr. J. A. Davis and Dr. J. P. Bailey, Jr. Second follow-up activities were directed by Dr. Bailey; third follow-up activities were directed initially by Dr. Bailey, and then by Dr. J. R. Levinsohn. The fourth follow-up was initially directed by Dr. Levinsohn, and then by Dr. J. A. Riccobono.

Preface

The merged NLS data file represents a rich and complex source of information. It contains important and timely data of potential use to a broad spectrum of educators, researchers, policy analysts, and decision-makers. Preparation of this data file for general use by such a large and diverse set of users was a difficult task. Decisions as to the kind and extent of data editing that needed to be performed were by no means clearcut. In conflict were the need to maintain a faithful record of the original raw data -- including respondent errors and inconsistencies -- versus the need to provide a straightforward set of data for the typical researcher. The former need was given more importance in the approach to editing this file. That is, it was felt that editing, recoding, imputation, or other data transformation procedures should be minimized so as to limit tacit assumptions about the respondents or subjective interpretation of the data that would be required for these procedures. Any imputations or modification of the original data might be considered "biased" by other investigators. Where imputations are concerned, researchers should be free to set data standards in accordance with their specific needs. Thus, the data transformation procedures used were directed toward making the data available in a consistent and useful format which would preserve as accurately as possible the original responses of the study participants.

The file processing performed involved extensive verification, cleaning, and supplementary coding of the original data. Editing transformations were limited to verifying that respondents followed the written instructions and routing patterns in the questionnaire. If either type of instruction was violated, then supplementary codes were inserted in the data to indicate the location and nature of the violation. The extent and details of editing are the subject of this manual.

It would have been possible to provide another level of editing. Responses could have been edited with respect to the content of the question and with respect to the interrelations of sets of questions. But this kind of editing requires some guidelines and is usually directed by the particular set of hypotheses one wishes to investigate. Since the data file is designed for a broad range of investigators, and in the interest of timeliness, it was decided that any further editing must be left to the discretion of the analysts. This decision creates some additional work for the user, but it allows full

access to all the original detail in the data file. No analyses have been prohibited by preprocessing or prior summarization of the data.

The decision to produce the data file in this format places some additional responsibility on the user. Since little simplification of the data has been done, the analyst must exercise care in using the data file. The NLS data base is large and complex. The routing patterns in the instruments and the fact that data have been collected at different points in time require that the analyst view the data base holistically. Many of the individual items are not well suited to independent analysis. Moreover, it is necessary to consider the interdependent nature of such items and to study the patterns of response to those items.

Given consideration of these cautions and careful study of the documentation provided in this manual, the NLS data file will serve as the rich source of informaton that it was designed to provide.

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Part 1: Introduction

This manual is a guidebook to facilitate use of a data file prepared from information collected, processed, and systematically stored during the course of the National Longitudinal Study of the High School Class of 1972 (NLS), which has been conducted under contract to the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES), Office of the Assistant Secretary for Educational Research and Improvement, U.S. Department of Education. The primary goal of NLS is the observation of the educational and vocational activities, plans, aspirations, and attitudes of young people after they leave high school and the investigation of the relationships of these outcomes to their prior educational experiences, personal, and biographical characteristics. The study provides data to allow a better understanding of the development of students as they pass through the American educational system and of the complex factors associated with individual educational and career outcomes. Findings in these areas are essential as a basis for effective planning, implementation, and evaluation of Federal policies and programs designed to enhance educational opportunity and achievement and to upgrade occupational attainments and career outcomes.

The potential uses for the data gathered by these surveys are multifold; the broad data base and succession of observed effects can fill a widespread need on the part of educational researchers and administrators for information on the flow of young adults through the postsecondary occupational-educational system. These data can provide insight for identifying and understanding the major branching or decision points which affect the educational and life patterns of individuals in the period following secondary school. Important linkages or path choices can be traced; estimates of the associated transition probabilities can be provided; and insight into the relative importance of the factors which determine or otherwise affect these transition probabilities can be obtained.

A. Background

In 1968, NCES conducted a survey to determine the specific data needs of educational policymakers and researchers. Respondents to the survey expressed a need for data that would allow comparisons of student educational and vocational experiences with later outcomes. This finding provided the impetus for NCES to begin planning for the first of an intended series of national longitudinal studies.

In April 1970, leading educational researchers and administrators met with Federal officials in Washington, D.C. The NLS reflects their guidance and the interests and data needs of a number of U.S. Office of Education (OE) agencies, including the Office of Planning, Budgeting, and Evaluation; the Bureau of Postsecondary Education; the Bureau of Occupational and Adult Education; the Bureau of Programs for the Handicapped; as well as NCES. Four advisory committees provided guidance in planning and implementing the survey. One committee was composed of research experts and representatives of various educational organizations; two others were made up of officials of state education agencies; and the fourth, an internal OE users' committee, represented the data needs of the various offices and bureaus of the Education Division, U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

Following a rather extensive period of planning, which included the design and field test of survey instrumentation and procedures, a full-scale survey was initiated in the spring of 1972. The sample design called for a deeply stratified national probability sample of 1,200 schools with 18 seniors per school, school size permitting. A total of 19,001 students from 1,061 high schools provided base-year data on up to three data collection forms: a Test Battery, a School Record Information Form, and a Student Questionnaire. The Student Questionnaire was completed by 16,683 seniors. 2

The first follow-up survey was conducted from October 1973 to April 1974. Added to the base-year sample were 4,450 1972 high school seniors from 257 additional schools that were unable to participate earlier. First follow-up forms were mailed to 22,654 students, and obtained from 21,350 by mail, telephone interview, or personal interview. Sample members were asked where they were in October 1973 and what they were doing with regard to work, education, and/or training. Similar information was requested for the same time period in 1972 to facilitate tracing of progress since leaving high school and to define the factors that might have affected that progress. Retrospective

information on some base-year variables was requested from those added to the sample at this time. The first follow-up sample retention rate among the 16,683 seniors completing the Base-Year Questionnaire was 93.7 percent.

The second follow-up survey was conducted from October 1974 to April 1975, with forms mailed to 22,364 sample members. Information requested was similar to that of the first follow-up, but for the new time point; however, some new questions regarding work and education were included. Concurrently with the second follow-up, a special retrospective survey was conducted (using an Activity State Questionnaire) to obtain key activity status information about prior time points from those who had not provided this information previously. Second Follow-Up Questionnaires were obtained from 20,872 sample members by mail, telephone interview, or personal interview. Among the 21,350 persons who completed a First Follow-Up Questionnaire, sample retention rate for the second follow-up was 94.6 percent.

The third follow-up survey was conducted from October 1976 to May 1977. Third follow-up forms were mailed to 21,807 sample members, and 20,092 Third Follow-Up Questionnaires were obtained by mail, telephone interview, or personal interview. Information collected included respondent status in October 1976, as well as for October of the intervening year (1975), and summaries of experiences and activities since the previous follow-up. The third follow-up sample retention rate for second follow-up respondents was 93.9 percent.

The fourth follow-up survey was conducted from October 1979 to May 1980, with Fourth Follow-Up Questionnaires sent to 20,862 sample members and obtained from 18,630 by mail, field interview, or telephone interview. Some 5,548 of these individuals were also requested to complete a Supplemental Questionnaire in order to collect key work and educational history data that had been requested but not obtained in prior follow-ups. Additionally, a subgroup of 2,648 sample members were retested during the fourth follow-up on a subset of the base-year test battery. The Fourth Follow-Up Questionnaire requested summaries of educational and occupational activities and experiences since the previous follow-up, including status at the time points of October 1977, 1978, and 1979. Given the time since high school graduation, some additional emphasis

was placed on other activities (e.g., family formation, political participation) in the fourth follow-up instrument. Fourth follow-up sample retention among the third follow-up respondents was 90.8 percent, and at the conclusion of fourth follow-up activities a total of 12,980 individuals had provided information on all questionnaires (base year and all four follow-up studies), representing 78 percent of the base year respondents. As a result of the various retrospective data collection efforts, the number of individuals with some key data elements for all time points is 16,450, 73 percent of the cases on the file.

B. Purpose and Organization of the Users Manual

The principal purpose of this manual is to provide information that will permit potential users of the NLS data file to understand the nature and content of the currently available data file. Many of the aspects of conducting past NLS surveys that are not particularly relevant to that purpose are addressed only briefly. Since operational details of data collection, processing, and coding as well as details of the auxiliary operations of sampling, weighting, and special variable construction have obvious implications for the file user, they are considered in more detail.

The basic approach taken in preparing this manual has been to provide sufficient documentation in the text to allow the general understanding of the file needed by most users and to supplement this general overview with accompanying appendixes or external references, cited in the text, that detail specific issues of file use. Given the many complexities of the file, this approach allows a potential file user to pursue particular issues in the detail required while not burdening all readers of the manual with unnecessary detail.

The remainder of the text is divided into four parts. Part 2 provides the methodological background of sampling, weighting, and data collection as well as brief descriptions of the study data collection instruments. Part 3 indicates the procedures of file preparation, including data editing/coding entry operations and development of data quality indices and composites. Part 4 overviews the content and organization of the data file, and describes important blocks of data. Part 5 provides technical specifications for the data file and defines some potential processing problems.

Appendixes include copies of all NLS questionnaires, a complete codebook of file contents, frequency distributions for all variables on the file, a subject keyword index with cross references, a bibliography, and several detailed treatments of special topics, as indicated in the Table of Contents. Liberal reference to appropriate appendixes is provided in the text.

Part 2: Methodology

I. THE SAMPLE

A. Original Sample Design

The sample design for NLS is a stratified, two-stage probability sample of students from all schools, public and private, in the 50 states and the District of Columbia, which contained twelfth graders during the 1971-72 school year. The study excluded students from schools for the physically or mentally handicapped, those for legally confined students, and in special situations (such as area vocational schools) where students were also enrolled in other high schools in the sampling frame.

The first-stage school sampling frame was constructed from computerized school files maintained by the Office of Education and the National Catholic Education Assocation. It was divided into 600 final strata based upon the following variables:

- Type of control (public or nonpublic)
- Geographic region (Northeast, North Central, South, and West)
- Grade 12 enrollment (three size categories)
- Proximity to institutions of higher learning (3 distance categories)
- Percent minority group enrollment (8 categories, public schools only)
- Income level of the community (11 categories, public schools; 8 categories, Catholic schools)
- Degree of urbanization (10 categories).

In the smallest size strata (fewer than 300 seniors), schools were selected with probabilities proportional to the estimated number of senior students; in the remaining size strata, schools were selected with equal probabilities. All selections were without replacement. The potential for including disadvantaged

The total number of classes that would be defined by a cross-tabulation of these stratification variables is far greater than the number of cases that could, in fact, have been utilized in the stratification. Consequently, it was necessary to consolidate or ignore, in some instances, some of the stratification criteria through a procedure for assigning priority to the variables. A determination of the final strata involved these priority considerations, but also involved judgment in consolidating the various classes to produce strata of the desired sizes.

students in the sample was increased by sampling schools in low-income areas and schools with a high proportion of minority group enrollment at twice the rate used for the remaining schools. Within each final stratum, four schools were selected, and then two of the four were randomly designated as the primary selections. The other two schools were retained as backup or substitute selections for use only if one or both of the primary schools did not cooperate.

The second stage of the sampling procedure consisted of first drawing a simple random sample of 18 students per school (or all if fewer than 18 were available) and then selecting five additional students (if available) as possible replacements for nonparticipants. In both cases, the students within a school were sampled with equal probabilities and without replacement. Early (i.e., mid-year) graduates and those attending adult education classes were excluded from the sampling.

B. Sample Redefinitions and Augmentations

Of the 1,200 primary sample schools, 948 participated in the base-year survey, 21 had no senior students enrolled, and 231 either refused to participate or could not participate because the request was received too late in the school year. Due to this large school nonresponse, further attempts were made to secure participation of the 231 nonparticipant primary sample schools and replacements for the 21 schools that had no seniors. This "resurvey" activity, initiated by NCES in the period prior to the first follow-up survey, involved securing school cooperation and selecting random samples of up to 18 former students (1972 seniors) per school. The "resurvey" activities were successful in 205 of the 231 primary sample schools; thus, students from 1,153 of the 1,200 primary sample schools were included in the first follow-up and subsequent surveys.

Students selected from backup or substitute schools were also included in the base-year and follow-up surveys. In the base-year survey, 121 backup schools participated--including 26 schools which were "extra" in their final

Income for any area was based upon either an adjusted 1960 Census median income of the county containing the school or the average adjusted gross income determined from the 1966 tax returns with the same five-digit ZIP code as that for the school. The minority group enrollments for individual schools were determined from either the records of the Office of Civil Rights or the 1970 Census data by counties.

stratum. A backup school was termed "extra" if both primary sample schools from that stratum also participated. Students from the 26 "extra" schools were not included in the first follow-up survey, but additional backup schools were included to obtain at least two participating schools in the first follow-up survey from each of the 600 original strata. In the second and later follow-up surveys, 18 of these "extra" schools were included to avoid elimination of cases with complete base-year data.

Samples of former 1972 senior students were also selected from 16 sample augmentation schools; these schools were selected from those identified in 200 sample school districts canvassed to identify public schools not included in the original school sampling frame. The augmentation schools defined eight additional strata (601-608). Samples of students selected from the 16 augmentation schools were not included in the base-year survey but were included on subsequent surveys. Table 1 summarizes school representation 6.

See Appendix H for a more detailed presentation of school participation and student response rates.

C. Subsampling Procedures

Subsampling was performed only in the fourth follow-up survey and was related to the retesting of a subsample of 1,016 NLS 1972 participants who had been administered the test battery during the base year. Eligible to participate in the Retest Study were the 14,628 NLS respondents who satisfied the following criteria:

- (1) eligibility for the NLS fourth follow-up,
- (2) completion of the base-year questionnaire, and
- (3) completion of the base-year test battery.

Because a self-weighting retest subsample would have yielded an inadequate number of Black subsample members, a design option which oversampled Blacks was adopted. Specifically, two strata (a non-Black stratum and a Black stratum) were formed, and a self-weighting subsample was chosen within each of these explicit strata. Retest sample members were selected from the eligibles in the stratum with probability inversely proportional to their probability of being in the full NLS sample. This sampling procedure resulted in equal probabilities of selection, and thus, in equal weights, within a given stratum.

In addition to the explicit stratification by race, the sample was also controlled, within strata, on three factors (base-year ability, SES, and postsecondary educational achievement) believed to be highly correlated with retest ability scores. This control was achieved by applying an implicit stratification procedure.

D. Student Weights

Unadjusted student weights, the inverses of sample inclusion probabilities, were calculated for all students sampled. These weights are a function of the school selection probabilities and the student selection probabilities within school. Because of the various sample redefinitions and augmentations (see above), and nonresponse to the various student instruments. Several sets of adjusted weights were computed. It should be noted that adjustments were made only for instrument nonresponse and, consequently, no adjustments were made for item nonresponse in returned questionnaires.

The general adjustment procedure used was a weighting class approach, which distributes the weights of nonrespondents to respondents who are most

like them (i.e., in the same weighting class). The adjustment involves partitioning the entire student sample (respondents and nonrespondents) into weighting classes (homogeneous groups with respect to survey classification variables), and performing the adjustments within weighting class. Adjusted weights for nonrespondents are set to zero and their unadjusted weights are distributed to respondents proportionally to the respondents' unadjusted weights. Differential response rates for students in different weighting classes are reflected in the adjustment, and the weight total within each weighting class (and thus for the sample as a whole) is maintained.

Several adjusted weights were calculated for the NLS sample members. Adjustments were made only for sample peculiarities, instrument nonresponse, and subsampling, and each weight is appropriate for a particular analysis (i.e., a particular respondent group). A complete specification of available weights and appropriate variables to which the weights apply is provided in Table 2. The specific procedures used in each of the several weight adjustment steps and the logic leading to the choice, as well as references to related reports, are provided in Appendix G.

II. INSTRUMENTS⁸

A. Base-Year Instruments

1. Student Questionnaire

Each student in the sample was asked to complete applicable portions of a Student Questionnaire containing 104 questions distributed over 11 major sections. The base-year Student Questionnaire dealt with factors related to the student's personal-family background, educational and work experiences, plans, aspirations, attitudes, and opinions. Students were given the option of completing the questionnaire in school or taking it home and answering the questions with the assistance of their parents.

Unless otherwise indicated, copies of all NLS survey instruments are provided in Appendix A.

2. Test Battery

In addition to the Student Questionnaire, each student in the base year was asked to complete a 69-minute Test Book measuring both verbal and nonverbal ability. The Test Book consisted of six tests, which are described briefly below in the sequential order of administration.

- a. <u>Vocabulary</u> (15 items, 5 minutes). A brief test using synonym format. The items were selected to avoid academic or collegiate bias and to be of an appropriate level of difficulty for the twelfth grade population.
- b. <u>Picture Number</u> (30 items, 10 minutes). A test of associative memory consisting of a series of drawings of familiar objects each paired with a number. The student, after studying the picture number pairs, is asked to recall the number associated with each object.
- c. Reading (20 items, 15 minutes). A test based on short passages (100-200 words) with several related questions concerning a variety of reading skills (analysis, interpretation) but focusing on straightforward comprehension. In combination with the vocabulary test, it provides a means to derive a verbal score which can allow links to the normative data available for SAT.
- d. Letter Groups (25 items, 15 minutes). A test of inductive reasoning requiring the student to draw general concepts from sets of data or to form and try out hypotheses in a nonverbal context. The items consist of five groups of letters among which four groups share a common characteristic while the fifth group is different. The student indicates which group differs from the others.
- e. Mathematics (25 items, 15 minutes). Quantitative comparisons in which the student indicates which of two quantities is greater, or asserts their equality or the lack of sufficient data to determine which quantity is greater. This type of item

- is relatively quickly answered and provides measurement of basic competence in mathematics.
- f. Mosaic Comparisons (116 items, 9 minutes). A test which measures perceptual speed and accuracy through items which require that small differences be detected between pairs of otherwise identical mosaics or tile-like patterns. A deliberately speeded test, it has three separately timed sections consisting of increasingly more complex mosaic patterns.

3. School Record Information Form

Base-year data were also obtained from a Student's School Record Information Form (SRIF). Items on the SRIF pertained to the student's high school curriculum, grade point average, credit hours in major courses, and (if applicable) his or her position in ability groupings, remedial-instruction record, involvement in certain federally supported programs, and scores on standardized tests.

4. Other School-Related Questionnaires 10

Finally, a School Questionnaire and one or two Counselor Questionnaires were also obtained for each participating high school. Counselor Questionnaires were not obtained from schools involved in the "resurvey" activity.

B. First Follow-Up Instruments

Two forms (A and B) of a First Follow-Up Questionnaire were developed and designed for self-administration by the student. Form A was mailed to each sample member who responded to the base-year Student Questionnaire, and consisted of 85 questions distributed over five major sections. Seniors from the high school class of 1972 who were added to the sample through the resurvey activity or who were otherwise unable to participate in the base-year survey (usually because of time and scheduling considerations) were mailed Form B of the questionnaire, which contained an additional section of 14 questions to supplement, retrospectively, missing base-year key information. Otherwise the

forms were identical. Questions dealt with information concerning the respondent's activity state (education, work, etc.) in October 1972 and October 1973; his or her socioeconomic status; work and educational experiences since leaving high school; and future educational and career plans, aspirations, and expectations. Most were of forced-choice format. Open-ended, or free-response, questions were limited to questions involving dates, income, number of hours or weeks worked, and the like.

C. Second Follow-Up Instruments

1. Basic Questionnaire

The Second Follow-Up Questionnaire was similar in format and information requested to the one administered in the first follow-up, but contained additional questions regarding work and education. It contained 153 questions arranged in seven sections--General, Education and Training, Work, Family, Military, Activities and Opinions, and Background Information. The instrument requested updated information concerning the activity status of NLS sample members as of fall 1974. In addition to activity states, information concerning family status, personal attitudes, opinions, and plans were obtained. As was the case in the first follow-up, most of the instrument items were of forced-choice format.

2. Activity State Questionnaire 11

This brief questionnaire contained only 15 items regarding activity states in October of 1972 and 1973 and background information about high school program and parents' education and occupation. The questionnaire was administered to collect this information retrospectively from those individuals who had not provided it in Base-Year or First Follow-Up Questionnaires.

D. Third Follow-Up Instruments

The Third Follow-Up Questionnare followed the format of previous follow-up questionnaires. It contained 158 questions organized in a seven-section arrangement similar to that of the second follow-up. In addition to repeating

major measures of past questionnaires, the third follow-up instrument collected information on activity states for October 1975 and October 1976, graduate school application and entry, job supervision, sex-role orientation, sex and race biases, and a subjective rating of high school experiences. As in previous instruments, most questions were forced-choice.

E. Fourth Follow-Up Instruments

1. Basic Questionnaire

The Fourth Follow-Up Questionnaire contained 202 questions organized into seven sections analogous to the two previous follow-up questionnaires. The questions sought information concerning the individual's education and work experiences, family status, plans, aspirations, attitudes, and opinions. As in previous instruments, most questions were forced choice. To maintain the longitudinal nature of the study, many of the questions were the same as those used in the base-year, first, second, and third follow-up surveys; however, some questions were modified or added to obtain unique information.

2. Supplemental Questionnaire

A Supplemental Questionnaire was also developed to obtain, retrospectively, important information missing for a respondent from previous years. The Supplemental Questionnaire consisted of 11 brief sections (Forms A-K), the contents of which were: (a) Form A, School attendance in October 1972; (b) Form B, Job held in October 1972; (c) Form C, School attendance in October 1973; (d) Form D, Job held in October 1973; (e) Form E, School attendance in October 1974; (f) Form F, Job held in October 1974; (g) Form G, School attendance in October 1975; (h) Form H, Job held in October 1975; (i) Form I, School attendance in October 1976; (j) Form J, Job held in October 1976; and (k) Form K, License or diploma status as of October 1976. The Supplemental Questionnaires actually administered to a particular sample member consisted of from two to four of the possible sections, specifically tailored to that sample member's pattern of missing responses. 12

As suggested, these questionnaires were distributed only to those missing more than one but no more than four of the data blocks (see Section III.F). Supplemental questionnaire data is provided separately on the data file and has not been integrated into the corresponding missing data fields of the first, second, or third follow-up questionnaire data.

3. Test Battery 13

A twenty-minute test (a subset of the base-year test battery including the vocabulary and mathematics items) was administered to a subsample of sample members during the fourth follow-up.

III. DATA COLLECTION PROCEDURES

A. Base-Year Data Collection 14

Within the 1,061 schools participating in the base-year survey, the resulting student sample of 19,001¹⁵ produced varying response rates for each of the data collection instruments. The bulk of the student data was collected in April, May, and June of 1972 through group administration in each participating school. Survey administrators completed a School Record Information Form (SRIF) for each participating student, plus approximately 1,000 additional students during the summer of 1972. Base-Year Questionnaire data are available for a total of 16,683 sample members; SRIF data are available for 21,738; and test data are available for 15,860 individuals.

B. First Follow-Up Data Collection 17

Data collection for first follow-up began with an extensive tracing operation to update name and address files. A newsletter was developed and mailed in July 1973 not only to encourage participation but also to use as a

vehicle for updating names and addresses. When mail was returned by the U.S. Postal Service as undeliverable, telephone tracing procedures were used to obtain current addresses where possible.

The base-year name and address file contained 19,001 records; however, only 18,672 of these individuals (from 1,043 schools) were used for the first follow-up survey. In addition, 4,450 individuals from 257 resurvey schools were added to the base-year lists. Prior to the questionnaire mailout, 468 individuals were excluded for operational reasons (e.g., inaccurate addresses, deceased), yielding a target survey group of 22,654.

Questionnaires were mailed to the last known addresses of the resulting sample in October of 1973. This mailout was followed by a planned sequence of reminder postcards, additional questionnaire mailings, and reminder mailgrams to nonrespondents. The questionnaire return rate by mail was 61.5 percent. To improve data quality, telephone follow-up interviews were initiated to individuals for whom responses to key items were incomplete or inconsistent (see Appendix B for definition of critical items). The names and addresses of those sample members who failed to mail back their questionnaires were then turned over to the Bureau of the Census for personal interviews in accordance with a Bureau arrangement with the U.S. Office of Education. This personal interview phase of first follow-up data collection continued into April of 1974, at which time questionnaire data had been obtained from 21,350 sample members (a response rate of 94.2 percent of the target survey group and 91.0 percent of the total sample of 23,451).

C. Second Follow-Up Data Collection 20

Among the core of 23,451 NLS sample members, 22,364²¹ were available as a

target survey group for the second follow-up. Excluded were several categories of individuals who were unavailable for survey. These categories included refusals obtained in the base-year or first follow-up surveys (those who stated they were unwilling to participate in the study), ineligibles (those out of the country, institutionalized, deceased, mentally retarded, etc.), and no address (those who were untraceable as of fall 1974). Data collection activities took place from July 1974 through June 1975. Survey activities included the mailout of newsletters to sample members, telephone tracing of those individuals whose newsletters and/or questionnaires were returned as undeliverable, mailing of letters to parents of respondents to advise them of their child's involvement in the study, questionnaire and postcard mailouts, mailgram and telephone contacts with nonrespondents to mail efforts, personal interviews, and telephone interviews for incomplete key data on returned questionnaires. 22 A total of 20,872 Second Follow-Up Questionnaires were obtained by mail (5,814 by personal interview) for a response rate of 89.0 percent of the total sample and 93.3 percent of the second follow-up target group.

D. Activity State Survey 23

Concurrent with second follow-up data collection activities, a special survey operation was also undertaken. This survey was initiated in response to the extent of missing activity state information for the base year and first follow-up. About 3,100 respondents could not be classified into an activity state for October 1972; over 2,400 could not be classified for October 1973; and over 3,500 could not be classified into the activity state transition matrices. The unclassifiable cases appeared to be more heavily represented by low SES and low aptitude respondents, thus introducing a potential bias for certain analyses. Second follow-up activities underway at that

time were obvious vehicles for collecting these data efficiently. Telephone calls were in process for Second Follow-Up Questionnaires that had failed the edit checks (see Appendix D, Section II.A), and the additional questions were added to the already scheduled calls. Similarly, field interviewers would begin contacting second follow-up mail nonrespondents in early January 1975, and questions could be added. Consequently, the Activity State Questionnaire was administered only by field interviewers or telephone interviewers.

The number of respondents to be recontacted was determined to be 3,904 among whom 218 had been removed from active NLS participaton because of refusal, physical or mental handicaps, or they could not be located. The status of the remaining 3,686 respondents to be contacted in the second follow-up was:

- (1) 1,580 nonrespondents, subject to field interview;
- (2) 739 fail-edit, subject to telephone call;
- (3) 1,367 passed edit, in process or in transit, subject to special telephone call.

A total of 3,088 Activity State Questionnaires were completed, a completion rate of 83.8 percent of the eligible target group.

The resulting data served as the base for updating all 1972 and 1973 activity states and computing various composite values (father's occupation, high school program, mother's and father's education level). Since the ASQ survey was an additional survey, one or two years removed from the initial surveys, ASQ data were not used to replace corresponding base-year or first follow-up items. These data were used solely to compute updated activity states or updated composites which are distinct variables in the release file.

E. Third Follow-Up Data Collection 24

Of the 23,451 NLS sample members, 21,807 were in the third follow-up survey target group. Original sample members, regardless of their response status to the base-year, first follow-up, or second follow-up surveys, were included unless they were deceased, they had refused further participation,

they were physically or mentally incapable of further participation, or their whereabouts were unknown to parents or alternate contacts. During the period August 1976 through June 1977, data collection methods used by RTI to increase the response included the mailout of newsletters to sample members, telephone tracing of those individuals whose newsletters and/or questionnaires were returned as undeliverable, mailing "alert" letters to sample members and to parents whose address was the same as the sample member, three questionnaire mailouts including a \$3.00 incentive payment with the initial questionnaire, postcard and mailgram follow-ups with nonrespondents at predetermined intervals, telephone interviews to obtain data on key items (see Appendix B) and personal interviews with those for whom data were otherwise uncollectable. As in prior follow-up surveys, additional telephone interviews were conducted with sample members providing incomplete key data. The major mailout took place in October 1976. A total of 20,092 Third Follow-Up Questionnaires were completed during the data collection period (16,102 by mail, and 3,990 by personal or telephone interview) for a response rate of 92.1 percent of the target group and 85.7 percent of the total sample.

F. Fourth Follow-Up Data Collection 25

In early Otober 1979, after additional tracing to update the name and address files, questionnaires were mailed to the last known addresses of 20,862 sample members in a target group for whom addresses appeared sufficient and correct and who had not been removed from active status by prior refusal, reported death, or other reason. This mailout was followed by a planned sequence of reminder postcards, additional questionnaire mailings, and reminder mailgrams. The total number responding by mail was 14,356 (68.8 pecent of those mailed).

Among the mail respondents, nonresponse or indeterminacy of specific questionnaire items existed; however, telephone follow-up was initiated to gather as complete data as possible on a critical set of questions (see Appendix B). Additional data collection efforts were initiated for those who failed to mail back their questionnaires by January 1980. Personal or

telephone interviews were completed for 4,274 additional individuals, ²⁶ increasing the overall number of returns to 18,630, 89.3 percent of the target group and 79.4 percent of the total sample.

The fourth follow-up survey also involved the distribution of a tailored Supplemental Questionnaire to a target group of 5,548 active sample members. The purpose of this activity was to attempt to collect key data in the areas of work and educational history that had been requested in prior follow-ups but had not been obtained. A total of 4,541 (81.9 percent of the target group) sample members completed the questionnaire by mail, telephone, or personal interview.

Additionally, retests were targeted to be personally administered to a subsample of 1,016 sample members. Test results were obtained from 692 of those in the subsample, for a response rate of 68.1 percent. Additional test data was requested from all those who had participated in the base-year testing and who were scheduled for personal interview. This resulted in additional test data for 1,956 individuals (50.3 percent of those defined as requesteligible).

G. Questionnaire Response Patterns

A total of 32 (2⁵) response patterns are defined by the completion or noncompletion of the Base-Year Questionnaire and the four primary questionnaires used in the first through the fourth follow-up surveys. The number of sample members defined by each of these response patterns is provided in Table 3. Additional detail is provided in Appendix G.

During personal interviews, the entire questionnaire was administered, but during telephone interviews, only critical items that were suitable for telephone administration were administered (see Appendix B).

This group was defined by all eligible sample members missing no more than one of the first through third follow-up questionnaires but missing two or more items in at least two but no more than four of eleven critical data blocks (see Section II.E.2 and The Supplemental Questionnaire in Appendix A).

While results of this additional testing are recorded on the data file, the group defined does not represent a probability sample and thus weights are available only for those 692 subsample members who completed the test.

Part 3: File Preparation

I. FOLLOW-UP DATA PREPARATION AND ENTRY²⁹

Follow-up questionnaires returned by mail were routed on a flow basis to a central check-in point for initial processing. Each respondent's six-digit ID number and batch number were noted and transmitted to the data processing section for entry into an automated survey support system so that a daily count could be maintained on the number of questionnaires already received and inhouse. Batches were then routed to the pre-machine (manual) editing section where certain checks were made to ascertain if each questionnaire contained a minimum set of critical data. Questionnaires which passed this manual edit stage were then transmitted to the direct data entry section to be transformed into machine-readable form. Those questionnaires which failed the manual edit procedures were routed to the telephone follow-up section where contact was made with the respondent to resolve problems uncovered in manual edit. After resolution, these questionnaires were also transmitted to the direct data entry section for encoding. After data entry operations, questionnaires were placed in temporary secure storage prior to microfilming and eventual destruction. At each phase of the document flow, appropriate event entries were made to the automated survey support system so that there could be constant monitoring of the location of all questionnaires in the document flow process.

A. Manual Pre-Machine Editing

The general approach considered in the pre-machine editing centered around the following ideas: if specified critical or "key" questions were answered, or could be presumed by responses to other related items, then a questionnaire would be accepted--no matter how little other information was given. However, if a respondent failed to properly answer these key items, the questionnaire was marked as failing edit and the respondent was scheduled for telephone follow-up in order to obtain these priority data.

Base-year data preparation procedures are documented in T. L. Hilton and H. Rhett (1973), Op. cit. Considerably greater detail on follow-up data processing is provided in Appendix D.

B. Manual Coding

Manual recoding of alphabetic information into numeric form was performed in a few areas of the questionnaire prior to transformation into machine-readable form. ³¹ Job area or occupation was recoded into the corresponding three-digit code specified in the Census Index of Occupations. The complete three-digit occupational classification scheme is presented in Appendix C.1.

The other major area involving recoding of alphabetic data concerned school information. Postsecondary school identification provided by respondents, whether of the college or university type or of the vocational-technical type, was coded into six-digit U. S. Department of Education (ED) vendor or FICE codes, using a master index provided by ED. Fields of study reported by respondents who attended school during the post-high school period were recoded into HEGIS categories, using both the four-digit academic subdivisions of knowledge and training provided by the HEGIS Taxonomy (Academic Subdivisions) and the six-digit HEGIS technological and occupational schemes (see Appendix C.2 for a list of six-digit field of study codes).

There were questions in each follow-up questionnaire which had closed- or fixed-response alternatives and which included an "other" option with room for the respondent to write in his particular answer. Whenever possible, the "other" choice (when selected by the respondent) was reclassified by manual editing into the closed-choice options provided. Where this was not obvious or logical, the "other" option was retained in the coding, but the alphabetic description was not included on the data file. In some areas

There were minor differences in manual coding from survey to survey. Specific data processing rules peculiar to particular follow-up instruments are described in detail in Appendix D.

These FICE codes have been updated such that each FICE code is unique for a particular school name and address across the entire NLS data base. Thus, for some schools, these codes may differ from those found in previous NLS data files. The alphabetic fields containing the school name and location (city and state) have been retained in the file, and RTI FICE Code Directories including FICE codes and corresponding school name and address information are found in Appendixes C.10 and C.11.

new categories were created from "other" responses and assigned codes, thus eliminating alpha data for these items. A list of the latter items with newly created categories and their respective codes is presented in Appendixes C.6-C.8.

There were some questions in the follow-up questionnaires for which no numeric coding was performed. That is, the written replies of the respondents were recorded as they appeared on the questionnaire. The user should be aware of these alphabetic fields and use appropriate computer techniques to process them.

C. Telephone Follow-Up

Questionnaires which failed the manual edit process (or computer edit in the case of fourth follow-up) because insufficient information was available for "key" questions were examined carefully by telephone follow-up staff in preparation for a telephone interview with the respondent. Telephone follow-up personnel were trained in questionnaire administration and editing so that they would be able to cope with any instrument-related questions a respondent might bring up.

D. Direct Data Entry Operations

Follow-up data were transformed to machine-readable form by the use of programmable direct data entry terminals. Major advantages of this type of data transformation include higher speed, fewer processing steps, and lower transcription error rate. The terminals were programmed to accept only values within a specified range for most of the data fields, and only specific field widths for all data items. Acceptable ranges for fixed format variables were decided prior to data entry and were programmed for the terminals; data provided by the respondent which were outside of these a priori ranges were specially coded to indicate that condition.

E. Retest Data Processing

Answers to test items, which corresponded to the vocabulary and mathematics portions of the base-year test battery, were coded on an RTI special answer sheet. Separate sections existed on the answer sheet for answering vocabulary items and mathematic items from the test book. Completed answer sheets were optically scanned by a nearby scoring center which produced a computer tape containing item scores for each question in the Student Test

Book for each participating respondent. From these data, four retest related variables were computed and included on the NLS data file. The variable F4FUVERB indicates number of correct responses and VERBFORM is the formula score for the verbal portion of the retest; F4FUMATH indicates number of correct responses and MATHFORM is the formula score for the mathematics portion of the retest.

II. ERROR AND MISSING DATA CODES

A set of standard "error" codes were defined and applied uniformly across the file (except as noted below concerning code 95) to indicate certain common classes of erroneous or missing data. These codes are listed below:

- 93 Partial response. This code is used only for questions in the First Follow-Up Questionnaire which employ the two-column response format (e.g., FQ1). 34 Each of these questions consists of a set of sub-items and requires the respondent to indicate whether each sub-item applies or does not apply. If the respondent answered at least one, but not all, of the sub-items for a question of this kind, then those unanswered sub-items were coded 93 to indicate a partial response to the question.
- 94 Don't know. This code indicates a written response by the respondent indicating he did not know the answer.
- 95 Out-of-range response. This code is used when the response or transcription exceeds the specified field width. Additionally, for the second, third, and fourth follow-up items listed in Appendix D, 95's were assigned to values outside the listed acceptable ranges. This code is described more fully in the following section.
- 96 Multiple response. This is used if the respondent gave several answers to a question when the directions called for only one, and the multiple response could not be resolved.³⁵
- 97 Refusal. This code indicates that the respondent refused to answer an item either by written statement or in the interview.
- 98 Blank, or nonresponse. This code represents nonresponse in all cases other than those identified as legitimate nonresponse (see below).
- 99 Legitimate nonresponse. This is used when the respondent should not have answered the question and did not, i.e., he was routed around

The following first follow-up questions received 93 codes: 1, 16, 22A, 24, 29B, 31, 35, 38, 44B, 48B, 54B, 62, 63, 71, 76.

an item. If the respondent did not answer an entire instrument, then all fields representing that instrument were also coded 99.36

The codes specified above apply to data items with two-digit fields only; for items with three-digit fields, the error codes have two leading nines followed by the appropriate digit indicating the particular class of error-that is, 993 through 999. For four-, five-, and six-digit fields, the number of leading nines was increased accordingly.

III. MACHINE EDITING PROCEDURES

Following the data entry process, an extensive machine edit of all NLS data was necessary in preparing the release files for public use. This machine edit process involved rigorous checking of all routing patterns within an instrument (not just skip patterns containing "key" or critical items) as well as range checks for all items and the assignment of error and missing data codes as necessary. "Hard copy" or source document checks were required in some cases for error resolution. As a result, the final data file contains only (a) valid response codes, ³⁷ (b) error or missing data codes, and (c) "logically recoded values" including, in each case, an indicator for the reasons for such a recode (see Section C concerning routing checks).

Three sequential machine editing programs were employed and are described below. (These programs were not applied to the NLS base-year data, since these data were already subjected to editing procedures employed by the previous contractor. The base-year data were simply reformatted, and in some cases recoded, to achieve consistency with the first follow-up data on the file.)

A. Range Checks

The first program in the editing sequence dealt with out-of-range data.

This program checked the responses to each fixed-response item against a specified range of acceptable values, "flagged" any value that fell outside of

Both the 98 and 99 codes are further defined, with examples, in Section VII of Appendix D.

The 71 free-format items in the first follow-up include responses outside the specified range of acceptable values.

this range, and recoded each flagged datum to 95 to indicate the occurrence of an out-of-range response. It should be noted that this recoding procedure was applied to fixed-choice items only. In each follow-up, acceptable ranges also were specified for free-response items calling for numeric data (see Appendix D). In most cases, there were some responses outside of these ranges. In general, these responses were logically possible but were considered highly improbable. Appendix P lists in detail the range and frequency of these data. It is recommended that the user make his own decisions as to what are acceptable data for these items, using as guidelines the ranges set forth in Appendix D, Section VII Tables D.4-D.8).

The exclusion (or recoding) of values outside the specified ranges for second follow-up, third follow-up, fourth follow-up, and Supplemental Questionnaire items was considered to be reasonable since values beyond these bounds were highly suspect. Hence, no values exceeding these ranges appear on the data file for the follow-up and Supplemental Questionnaire items.

B. Consistency Checks

The second program of the machine editing sequence was concerned with checking the consistency of an individual's responses over the entire questionnaire. For each follow-up, a set of internal checks, or response comparisons, were selected on an a priori basis for this purpose. The consistency program read the responses comprising each individual's record and tallied those consistency checks which were failed. As described in the following section, indices were subsequently computed for each record based on the number of consistency checks failed by the individual. These consistency indices reflect the internal consistency of a record, and, therefore, provide the user with a rough indication of the quality of each respondent's data. (See Appendix D, Section VIIIB.)

C. Routing Checks

The follow-up instruments contain many, and in some cases rather complex, routing instructions. An extensive coding and flagging system has been devised to verify the respondents progress through these patterns. This system labels any respondent errors or inconsistencies that occur.

The first follow-up instrument includes 33 routing questions, with 52 routing items appearing in the second follow-up instrument, 62 in the third

follow-up instrument, 61 in the fourth follow-up instrument, and 22 possible routing items in the Supplemental Questionnaire. A routing question is one that either implicitly or explicitly directs a respondent around other questions in the instrument. The aim of the routing questions is to quickly move respondents around questionnaire sections that do not apply to them. In order to determine if the respondents correctly followed the routing patterns, a routing-check program was developed and implemented. This program read each record and flagged responses to all routing questions which were inconsistent with the subsequent pattern of response. Two kinds of routing flags were used; one indicating the type of inconsistency and the other the level of inconsistency. Three types of inconsistencies have been identified:

- 1. A first type of inconsistency occurs when the response to a routing item indicates that the questions associated with that item (i.e., contained within the routing pattern) should be skipped but are not (error of commission). When this type of inconsistency was detected, the response to the routing question was recoded by adding 20 to the original response code.
- 2. A second type of inconsistency occurs when the response to the routing item indicates that the questions associated with that item should be answered but are not (error of omission). Here recoding involved adding 40 to the routing-question response code.
- 3. The third type of inconsistency is actually a combination of the first two types. This type of inconsistency arises when the response to the routing item indicates that certain questions should be skipped but are not (type one) and other questions should be answered but are not (type two). In these cases, recoding involved adding 60 (20 + 40) to the routing question response codes.

Examples of the testing and recoding procedure employed by the routing check edit program are provided in Appendix D, Section VIIIC.

IV. QUALITY INDICES

Several data quality indices were developed during file preparation and have been included in the NLS data file. The quality indices focus on a single individual and quantify the amount and quality of information present

in that individual's record. They are described briefly below and detailed in Appendix D. The user should be cautioned that the utility of these quality indices is in the determination of the credibility of individual records. They have little utility for making judgments about data over respondents such as item response, since the real test of item response quality is the oversubjects distribution. These indices should not be considered for discarding subjects unless one's concern is with the entire instrument or subsection. Summary tables of these quality indices for follow-up questionnaire data are presented in Section IX of Appendix D, and a list of all such indices are provided in Appendix I.

1. Consistency Indices

The consistency indices represent the percentage (truncated) of a set of defined consistency checks failed by an individual for a given instrument. The index was computed as follows:

$$CS = \begin{pmatrix} \sum_{i=1,m} X_i \\ \frac{i=1,m}{m} \end{pmatrix} \quad 100$$

where $X_{i} = 0$ if respondent passed check i,

 $X_{i} = 1$ if respondent failed check i, and

m = the number of checks defined for an instrument or item subset within an instrument.

2. Out-of-Range Index

This index represents the percentage of out-of-range responses for an individual's record for a given follow-up instrument. It was computed as follows:

OR = N/D * 100

where N = the number of items with response codes of 95 (out-of-range)

and D = the number of items with response other than 99 (legitimate skip).

This was computed in the same manner for all four follow-up surveys. In all four surveys, at least 96 percent of the respondents had no out-of-range responses. In general, the allocation of out-of-range codes does not seem to be a problem, although it should be noted that the ranges set for the acceptance of a write-in response were unlimited in the First Follow-Up Questionnaire and were very generous in the Second, Third, and Fourth Follow-Up Questionnaires.

3. Routing Indices

These indices, computed identically for each follow-up survey, represent the percentage of the routing questions that were ambiguously answered by an individual (i.e., routing questions which were answered in a manner which was inconsistent with the respondent's subsequent pattern of response) for a given instrument. The routing index was computed as follows for each follow-up instrument:

RI = N/D * 100

where N = the number of ambiguously answered routing questions,

and D = the number of routing questions with response other than 99.

In general, 56 to 68 percent of all respondents proceeded through an instrument without violating any routing patterns, about 20 to 30 percent violated one to five routing patterns, and 7 to 15 percent violated six to ten patterns. In all four instruments there were a small number of respondents who had great difficulty with the routing patterns and violated the routing instructions in more than ten different patterns (3 to 7 percent).

4. Completeness Index

There are five first follow-up completeness indices--one for each major section (A-E) of the First Follow-Up Questionnaire. In the second, third, and fourth follow-up instruments, there are six completeness indices, one each for the six (A-F) major sections of these questionnaires. For a particular section and instrument, the completeness index represents the percentage of items with valid responses--that is, responses that are not coded as errors or missing data (FFU codes 93-98, SFU, TFU, and FTFU codes 94-98). The index was computed as follows:

CIx = N/D * 100

where x = the particular section of the questionnaire,

N = the number of items with valid responses (responses other than error or missing data codes), and

D = the number of items with response other than 99.

V. COMPOSITE VARIABLES

During file preparation, a number of composite variables were constructed. These variables, which may prove useful for many analyses, are included in the data file. They include a composite index for participants' general aptitude

and socioeconomic status, as well as a number of cross-year composite classifiers for variables such as race, sex, and high school program. Important documentation for these and other composites is included in Appendixes E, J, K, and L. Each composite was constructed from several variables and required a number of steps in its derivation. A complete list of all created or composite indices included on the data file along with a brief definition of each is provided in Appendix I. Appendixes J, K, and L describe in detail the development of the analytic composite indices. Since other procedures and components may be employed in deriving such indices, users are encouraged to decide for themselves whether the analytical indices included on the file are appropriate for their particular needs or purposes.

Part 4: Contents and Organization of the Data File

I. OVERVIEW

The data base contained in the release data file consists of 22,652 records, one record for each individual on the file. Although the final NLS sample contains 23,451 students, those 799 students who did not respond to any student instrument (BSYR, FFU, SFU, TFU or FTFU) are not included in the data file. ³⁸ Appendix P of this manual contains a complete and detailed listing of all variables in the NLS data file. The appendix presents, for each variable, the variable number, a short variable label, the tape location, a longer variable title, and a completely labeled frequency distribution for all codes that occur for that variable. ³⁹

Other appendixes are provided to facilitate the location and/or a better understanding of the meaning of the variables on the file. Appendix O contains a sequential listing of all variables on the file, providing for each variable the short variable label, the number of implied decimal points in the field, tape location, and the long variable label. Appendix M contains a subject index of all NLS variables in alphabetical order, relating variables (by subject) to the appropriate variable label. Appendix I contains an alphabetical listing, by short variable label, of all created variables (i.e., not direct transcriptions or simple recodes of data provided by the various instruments) and also includes a definition of each variable. Appendix A contains copies of instruments used; 40 the data file short variable label has been entered by the corresponding item in the instruments. The specific nature of coded values of various NLS variables (exclusive of those that are directly related to questionnaire codes) are provided variously in Appendixes C, D, E, F, G, J, K, and L.

The great bulk of data items in the NLS file are direct transcriptions or simple recodes from the various survey instruments; however, other data

such as identification codes, data indicators, quality indices, sampling weights, analytic indices or composites, and activity states also exist on the file. 41 The organization of the data within a record reflects the temporal order in which data have been added to the file and, thus, is not completely blocked by the time period in which the data were collected or to which the data apply. Some large blocks of data are logically organized but other blocks of data may appear to consist of a potpourri of recoded values, composite variables, quality indices, and the like. A general description of a blocking of the data (including the potpourri blocks) is provided in Table 4. A brief description of major file components (types of data elements, not blocks) is provided in the following section.

II. FILE COMPONENTS

A. Identification Codes

Two major identification codes appear at the beginning of each record. The student ID code (RTI ID) is a random five-digit number which uniquely identifies each record and which appears in the first five character positions of each record (an associated check digit is in the sixth character position). The other is a school code (SCHCODE), a random four-digit number identifying the high school from which the student was sampled. An additional ID code (STUCODE) exists, but this four-digit code is unique only within a particular high school.

B. Data Indicators

Several indicators have been included in the release file to assist users in processing the data records. Principally, the indicators signal the presence or absence of large blocks of data within an individual record. Such indicators are available for the following data sources: Test Book (TB IND), School Record Information Form (SRIF IND), Base-Year Student Questionnaire (BSYR IND), Sections D through J of the Base-Year Student Questionnaire (D IND through J IND), First Follow-Up Questionnaire (FFU IND), Second Follow-Up

Appendix I presents an alphabetical listing (by mnenomic label) and description of each data item in the file that is not directly obvious from the questionnaires, with cross-references to other appendixes.

Note that base-year items 81 through 95 (BQ81-BQ95) are not in their expected sequence in the data file; rather, they appear following base year item 31 (BQ31).

Questionnaire (SFUIND), Third Follow-Up Questionnaire (TFUIND), Fourth Follow-Up Questionnaire (F4IND), Supplemental Questionnaire (SQIND), and Retest Battery (TESTIND1 and TESTIND2). An overall indicator for the complete pattern of questionnaire responses (INSTRIND) also exists on the file (see Appendix G for explanation of this variable). Certain other special purpose indicators also exist on the file (e.g., Form A or B of the first follow-up-FORMAB). Additionally, the presence of a nonzero weight serves as an indicator for some variables.

C. Test Book Data

As noted earlier, each student in the base-year survey was asked to complete a battery of six tests, including: vocabulary, picture number (two parts), reading, letter groups, mathematics, and mosaic comparisons (three parts). Total test scores were computed for each of these tests. In addition, sub-test scores were computed separately for each part of the picture number and mosaic comparisons tests. Thus, the test battery data for each record consists of 11 subtotal and total scores in all. For each test or sub-test, a formula score (FS) was computed and added to the file. The 11 formula scores (VOCABSC through MOSCOM-T) are stored on the tape prior to the large block of SRIF data. Generally, these are four-digit scores with two implied decimals, with the exception of the mosaic comparisons total score, which is five digits with two implied decimals.

In addition to the formula scores, the test scores were standardized across the sample with a mean of 50 and a standard deviation of 10. These scores are integerized to the values 1-99; each score is three digits. These scores exist on the file as variables SCVOCSC through SCMSCMT, which are located following the large block of base-year questionnaire data. The standardized scores are more appropriate than the formula scores for forming linear combinations of test scores for analysis.

The purpose of the two indicators is explained in Appendix G.

Computation for formula scores was FS = R-[W/(C-1)]; where R = number of right responses; W = number of wrong responses, and C = number of item response alternatives.

D. Student's School Record Information Form Data

Data from the SRIF were coded and edited according to the previous contractor's specifications and stored on the data file. Most of the SRIF data exist as a single logical block; however, recoded SRIF data and composites using SRIF data are scattered through the file. The SRIF data are related to the student's high school records; a completely labeled SRIF is provided in Appendix A. Information provided includes student's high school grade average, college admission test scores (SAT, ACT), courses taken, and major course of study. Certain SRIF fields contain alphabetic information and must be processed accordingly. For example, the student's average (SRIFGRCD) may be numeric or alphabetic depending upon the grading system used by the school. Similarly, the lowest and highest grades used by the high school (SRIFLWGR, and SRIFHGGR, respectively) may be alphabetic or numeric. Additional detail on high school grade point average and percentile rank is provided in Appendix E.

E. Base-Year Student Questionnaire Data

A completely labeled questionnaire is provided in Appendix A. These data were also coded and edited according to the previous contractor's specifications and are located in the data file primarily in the large block of variables labeled BQ1 through BQ800. It should be noted that items BQ81 through BQ85 are out of sequence on the file and appear immediately after BQ31. Responses to unnumbered questions of the Base-Year Student Questionnaire (e.g., sex, date of birth, zip code of home address) are located elsewhere in the file. Some base-year items (BQ96, BQ97, BQ101) were coded for the first time during the fourth follow-up, and these items appear on the file following the Fourth Follow-Up Questionnaire data. Various composites constructed from base-year data are located throughout the file.

F. Follow-Up (First Through Fourth) Questionnaire Data

The procedures used in coding and editing responses to the Follow-Up Questionnaires are detailed in Appendix D, and a completely labeled questionnaire for each survey is provided in Appendix A. Most of the data obtained from each follow-up instrument exist in a large block of variables. First follow-up variables are labeled FQ1A through FDATE. Most second follow-up data are in the block of variables labeled SQ14 through CMP-YR; third follow-up variables are labeled TQ1A through TQ158IE; and fourth follow-up questionnaire

data are mostly in the variable block labeled FT1A to FTCMPYR. Data from unnumbered questions (e.g., zip codes), recodes, or composites exist elsewhere in subsequent locations in the file.

In almost all cases the various questionnaire items were coded in a format that was a one-to-one match with the instruments; exceptions are described in Appendix D.

G. Supplemental Questionnaire Data

A completely labeled questionnaire is provided in Appendix A, and details of editing and coding questionnaire data are provided in Appendix D. This questionnaire was administered during the Fourth Follow-Up survey to collect missing data elements from prior surveys. Data have been recorded separately on the file rather than used to replace the previously missing data elements (such replacement is an option provided to the user). All such data exist in a single logical block of variables labeled from FSQA1 to FSQK5. Two indicators are available to define which parts of the questionnaire were completed by the sample member. The first indicator (WCHFORM) provides a four-digit alphabetic code of which of the seven parts (A through K) were completed (i.e., a code of ABC would indicate parts A, B, and C were completed. The second indicator (SQFRM) is a numeric code providing the same information (see Appendix D, Section I.B.2, for numeric coding and decoding algorithm).

H. Retest Data

Details of processing retest data are provided in Appendix D. Four variables exist on the file for the retest administered during the Fourth Follow-Up survey. These variables are a total verbal score (F4FUVERB), a total mathematics score (F4FUMATH), a verbal formula score (VERBFORM) and a mathematics formula score (MATHFORM). The retest formula scores are the last two variables on the data file. They are truncated to five digits, with three digits to the right of an implied decimal point. They are prefixed by a sign byte which is a blank if the score is zero, positive, or missing and a minus sign if the score is negative.

Retest formula scores were computed using the same algorithm that was employed in the computation of base-year test battery formula scores (see footnote 43, p.43).

I. Data Quality Indicators

Various data quality indicators exist throughout the file. These indicators, described in Section IX of Appendix D, generally signal problems of incompleteness or inconsistency of certain questionnaire data. In general (but not always) these indicators appear on the file following the major block of questionnaire data to which they apply and prior to the subsequent major block of questionnaire data. Typically, all quality indicators for a particular questionnaire are not adjacent variables on the file.

Each record contains a single inconsistency score for base-year Student Questionnaire data, labeled INCONSC. This score was computed for a set of 37 Student Questionnaire item comparisons. The inconsistency score ranges from 0-4, denoting the number of checks failed. The quality indices relating to the follow-up questionnaires are more numerous. First follow-up data indicators are labeled FCSIND, FORIND, FRINDX, FCIAIN, FCIBIN, FCICIN, FCIDIN, and FCIEIN; for the second follow-up, they are labeled SFUORIND, SFUCIAIN, SFUCIBIN, SFUCICIN, SFUCIDIN, SFUCIEIN, SFUCIFIN, ROUTDINDX, CINDEX1, and CINDEX2; for the third follow-up they are labeled TCSIND1, TCSIND2, TFUORIND, TFURIND, TCIAIND, TCIBIND, TCICIND, TCIDIND, TCIFIND; and for the fourth follow-up they are labeled F4FURI, F4ORI, INDEX1, INDEX2, INDEX3, INDEX4, INDEX5, INDEX6, F4FUCS1, and F4FUCS2.

J. Sampling Weights

A description of the computation and nature of student sampling weights is provided in Appendix G. Weights appearing on the file are labeled TBWT, SRIFWT, W1 through W29, and WEIGHT. Additionally, three weight multipliers (TELMULT, TELMLT3, and TELMLT34) are available for creating additional weights from those already on the file.

K. School Variable Data

Three variables from the School Questionnaire or school sampling data were selected for inclusion in each student's data record. They are region, type of community, and 1972 senior class enrollment. These variables are labeled REGION, COMMUNIT, and SENIORS, respectively. REGION is a four valued code that divides the nation into four geographic locations (see Appendix F for a list of states within regions). COMMUNIT and SENIORS are recodes of School Questionnaire items concerning the type of community and size of the

senior class (items 40 and 2 of that questionnaire, respectively). Reference to Appendix P will detail the values these variables can assume.

L. Analytic Indices, Activity States, and Composites

These entries in the data file are the SES and ability composites, the SES raw score, the activity state variables for 1972-1979, planning state variables, and other over-item and/or over-instrument composites. A listing of all such variables (plus other created variables such as indicators) is provided in Appendix I, with a brief description and reference to other appropriate appendixes for specific details of their nature. These variables are distributed throughout the data file as indicated in Table 4.

III. DATA AVAILABILITY

The number of respondents available for various subpopulations and for various combinations of instruments are indicated in Table 5. This tabulation provides a summary of the amounts of data available for the several instruments over the survey periods. The table shows the patterns of data availability in the data base, the amounts of data available for each instrument independent of the others and in combination with other instruments. The pattern of response by various classifier variables is also presented. Examination of the table indicates that some data are available for all five student instruments (BSYR, FFU, SFU, TFU, and FTFU) for 12,980 respondents. There are 4,386 respondents with only the four follow-up instruments and of these, 3,881 also have a subset of base-year items collected retrospectively. There are also several small subsets of individuals with some other pattern of instrument response (see Appendix G for additional patterns).

Data availability figures provided in Table 5 refer to instrument return and, thus, represent the maximum data availability for particular datum from an instrument (or combination of instruments).

If one is concerned with only certain base-year items (Form B items), then data is available for another 3,881 Form B respondents from the first follow-up yeilding a total of 17,993 cases with at least partial data for all four time points.

Part 5: Technical Specifications

RECORDING SPECIFICATIONS

The data file consists of 22,652 records, one for each NLS sample member who responded to either the base-year Student Questionnaire or any follow-up questionnaire. Each record is 11,475 bytes long and contains 3,524 variables. The block size is 11,475 bytes, with a fixed-block format. The file resides on nine-track tape with IBM standard labels and data set name NLS.F4FU.MASTER.RLSE. Two reels of tape are required to hold the file using a recording density of 6,250 bytes per inch.

The data file is relatively simple in structure; each fixed-length record contains the same number of data fields. The file is sorted by final stratum number (VARO021, FINSTNO), with the records blocked by school identification within final stratum number (VARO004, SCHCODE). 47 Within each school the records are sorted by student identification number (VARO001 RTI ID). The file, as defined, is compatable with most commonly available "canned" statistical packages (e.g., SPSS, SAS, BMDP); however, users are reminded that most of these packages have a limitation on the number of variables definable on a given run and that this limit will be exceeded by the number of variables in the file. Users must therefore be prepared either to build smaller working files or to change the control cards to the particular package when different subsets of the file are desired.

The file consists of 11,326 blocks—two records per block. This fact and consultation with the local computer facility's user service can determine the amount of time required to read the tape at a given facility. Overall job time in most analysis packages is a function of the tape read time, the number of variables requested in the package's variable list, and the procedures employed within the package. Users are cautioned to select only those variables which are absolutely necessary, since the run time is a function of the number of variables read. Users are also cautioned to look carefully at the accompanying documentation to determine which fields are alphabetic prior to attempting to use the packages.

II. PROCESSING SUGGESTIONS

The NLS data file coding scheme was designed to allow for straightforward use of packaged programming systems. The design has been only partially successful, however, due to the size and complexity of the data base. This data file, perhaps more than most, requires careful study and planning prior to accessing the actual data. The data base has been developed over a period of six years, and it is necessarily complex. It reflects not only the developmental process of the respondents but developmental changes in instrumentation, data collection methodologies, and data processing procedures, in continuing attempts to develop a historical and developmental record for almost 23,000 individuals. The complexity and richness of the behaviors of this number of people over their most active developmental years cannot be recorded in a simple format. Consequently, a considerable burden is placed on the data file user to study, select, preprocess, and analyze desired variables from the multiplicity of variables that exist.

After several years of analytic use of the data base, by many users, there are several basic questions and operational problems that appear to be common to most analysis tasks, independent of the type of problem or questions that are being investigated. In some cases such problems have arisen well along in the research process, at which point they have caused considerable difficulty. In the following subsections the nature of some basic processing decision points will be considered. Hopefully these considerations will alert users to potential difficulties, which they can address prior to their research program rather than following several months of effort.

A. Cost Reduction

The NLS data base is large, and the coding is complex. A good first step toward reducing the cost of processing the NLS data is careful consideration of the nature of the data file and its interaction with analytic goals. In most cases, it is unlikely that all variables and all individuals will be desired for analysis. Thus, a basic decision is the potential deletion of variables and individuals. Such decisions can result in major cost reduction.

Decisions involving deletion of variables are typically quite straightforward, given a well-planned research effort; however, many decisions regarding deletion of individuals (records) are nontrivial, if sample integrity is to be maintained. Such decisions frequently are related to problems of missing data--instrument nonresponse, item nonresponse, and routing instructions (see subsection II.B below)--and to assumptions or procedures (e.g., imputation, weight adjustment) acceptable to the user for treating the missing data problem. The decision to delete individuals should be guided by an examination of data availability for items as well as instruments, since there is no point in carrying individuals in the analysis files with incomplete data if the subsequent analytic procedures will exclude them (e.g., in regression analyses where cases with one missing variable would be omitted from analysis).

Nonetheless, significant savings can be realized if one treats the main file as an archive and subsets from it the necessary subpopulations of people and variables. Once the subsetted file is defined, all one-time recoding, index construction, and data editing should be done to produce a small efficient analysis file. Subsequently, such a file can be optimized in structure, coding, and sequence for the selected analysis software. Another variant of this process is to calculate basic analytic aggregates (e.g., correlation or variance/covariance matrices) on but one occasion and subsequently to perform iterative or sequential analyses on the aggregates rather than the raw data.

In general, the most significant savings in cost will result from extensive planning. The effort required to study carefully the instruments and availability of data is more than offset in cost reductions. Some initial investment in descriptive runs prior to subsetting the data base also may pay off in refining the exact populations and items needed for a given analysis. Additionally, this Users Manual contains much information to help in this process. In addition to the general material provided in Parts 2, 3, and 4 of this manual; greater detail necessary for effective planning is provided in various appendixes. In particular, Appendix P (Volume III) contains item frequencies that detail the amount of available data for each item, and Appendix D, Section VIIIC, contains detailed listings of the routing patterns that illustrate which items are controlled by which routing questions.

B. Missing Data and Routing Patterns

An aspect of the NLS data base that has caused some difficulty to data file users has been the complex patterns of missing data and routing instructions reflected in the file and/or how these problems are best addressed.

There are essentially only two sources of missing data: (1) instrument non-

response, and (2) item nonresponse. For analyses in which national estimates are not required, the major problem introduced by these two types of missing data is that of limiting the effective sample size on which analyses will be based. In generating national estimates from the NLS data, however, nonresponse represents a large potential source of bias.

Most instances of instrument nonresponse can be treated by the application of the appropriate available weights, which have already been adjusted for various patterns of instrument nonresponse. When the approaches, such as imputation or simplyfying assumptions about the nature of nonresponse, may also be employed. Regardless of the approach taken to the missing data problem, the analyst should note the significant changes in the effective sample size as blocks of data combining parts of different instruments are used. Excluding the null case, there are 31 (i.e., 2⁵-1) possible basic ways in which blocks of data from one or more of the five time points (base-year plus four follow-up surveys) could be combined. Depending on the particular combination desired, the maximum (i.e., exclusive of item nonresponse) effective sample size without imputation will vary from 12,980 to 21,350 cases.

Beyond the problem of instrument nonresponse, the additional problem of item nonresponse typically will have to be addressed. At first glance, many items in the data base will appear to have high (i.e., greater than 10 percent) occurrences of missing data (illegitimate skip--code 98). In most instances, items with these higher percentages of missing data are associated with the routing patterns in the instruments. Part 3 (and Appendix D, Section VII) of this manual explain the rather conservative rules used to label blanks as either missing (illegitimate skip) or inapplicable (legitimate skip--code 99). In cases for which analysis requires data that lie within complex routing patterns, it will probably be fruitful to invest additional planning and data processing effort to examine further the routing items and data within those routing items. An effort to redefine data as missing or legitimately skipped

A careful study of the patterns of present and missing instruments and their associated weights (see Appendix G) will illustrate the adjustment process and the assumptions inherent in its application.

Combinations using "either or" definitions are also possible, but such combinations are typically of little analytic usefulness (for a possible exception, consider the group defined by weight W2 - Table 2 in Part 2) and are not considered here.

in accordance with specific analysis goals and consideration of the specific content of the items could prove quite useful. Similarly, data that is supplied by respondents but that has been labeled suspect by file editing may be re-examined and possibly reclassified for specific purposes. While the suspect coding is such that it may be used in its current form as a means of excluding data from analysis, care should be exercised in "stripping" the suspect coding from the data element if a decision is made to use the element.

In summary, it should be stressed that the issue of missing data is mainly in the hands of the individual analyst. The labeling accomplished in general file editing may not provide the specificity and attention to detailed item content or analysis plans that a more analysis-oriented edit could provide. In most cases, however, the nature of the RTI editing allows the user to consider employing his own reediting or imputation rules for those data labeled as problems by the general file editing.

C. Weighting and Variance Estimation

A final area of concern and difficulty for some users has been the question of employing sampling weights and methods of estimating population parameters and the associated variances of the statistical estimators. The NLS sample was drawn under a complex multistage cluster sampling process and cannot be considered a simple random sample of the high school class of 1972. There are correlations among the observations due solely to the sample design; hence, calculations ignoring the weights and sample design have the potential to be biased.

In general, the values of statistical estimators (means, proportions, etc.) calculated without sample weights will differ from those computed using the sample weights. The magnitude of the difference usually varies with the size and nature of the subpopulation for which an estimator is calculated. While several statistical analysis packages allow the calculation of weighted estimates, their calculations of variance estimates do not compensate for the sampling design. Consequently, even though accurate (i.e., unbiased), weighted estimators may be readily computed at most facilities, accurate variance estimates are typically more difficult to obtain. Thus, when moving beyond descriptive analysis to inferential analysis, or to complex analytic modeling, the question of the appropriate variance estimates and degrees of freedom becomes quite difficult, especially if the problem of cost of computation is also considered.

The question of the appropriate methods or even necessary methods for solving this problem is an open one and subject to different emphasis in different disciplines. When considering single time points (i.e., a particular set of responses specific to a particular questionnaire), users may use generalized standard errors or generalized design effects that have been computed by RTI and reported elsewhere. 50 For applications of regression analysis with the NLS data, a previous RTI study 51 has suggested that unweighted ordinary least squares estimates of regression parameters and associated variances may introduce only a slight bias in some cases; however, in other cases the bias may be considerably greater, leading to much more nonconservative statistical tests. The same study demonstrates the robustness of a Taylor Series Linearization variance approximation approach that may be implemented at some increase in processing costs. It is beyond the scope of this manual to suggest a single best approach to parameter and variance estimation. Rather, the problem is identified as a formal decision for each analyst. A variety of NLS studies are available that illustrate different approaches to these and other problems. 52 The user is encouraged to consult these studies and must make a decision reflecting his own analysis goals and needs.

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





Each questionnaire for the first, second, and third follow-ups was manually edited to insure response to critical items. Machine editing was utilized for critical items in the fourth follow-up. Critical items were those questions which had to be answered, and in some cases answered consistently in relation to others, before the questionnaire was considered acceptable. Some critical questions in the first, second and third follow-ups are followed by supporting questions which are important non-key items. Some of the critical items, if answered "no," lead to the editing of following supporting items to insure no response to these related questions. However, the same critical items, if answered "yes," indicated necessary editing of supporting questions to make sure they were answered consistently with the "yes." For the fourth follow-up there were no supporting items; each critical item, if not answered or answered incorrectly or inconsistently caused that questionnaire to fail the computer-edit process.

If there was no response to a critical item, where expected, then follow-up activities were initiated to attempt to obtain this information. Lists of critical and supporting items for the first, second, and third follow-ups, as well as the critical items for the fourth follow-up, are presented on the following pages.
