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Confessions of a SESQUIPEDALIANIST

by John Krich, Director of Eleemosynary

I confess! I'm very fond of words. Long words in particular. That's not, however, the only reason I have chosen to direct Eleemosynary. It's not simply a play about curious words. It's about the love that binds us all - the love that runs like a thread through our lives, from grandparents to parents to children and their children, and how fragile it often is and how our spirits can soar magnificently into realms of beauty and imagination given the chance. The play is filled with wonderful words, and like Echo, I am enchanted and fascinated by them. I think you might find many of the words equally fascinating. So I provide the following abbreviated dictionary of interesting words from the play. I have also included a few of my favourite words not in the play. See if you know them. I am indebted to my Assistant, Heldor Schäfer, for researching and providing most of the definitions. Have fun!


Lee Blessing - Playwright

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

A lot has happened to Barry Yzereef since UVic audiences last saw him as Sir Peter Teazle in *The School for Scandal*. He is now Dr. Barry Yzereef and is a full time professor in the Drama Department at the University of Calgary. He teaches dramatic literature, theatre history and directing, as well as maintaining a busy professional career.

Barry's more recent directing credits include, Bulwer-Lytton's *Money*, Shakespeare's *As You Like It*, John Gay's *The Beggar's Opera*, Offenbach's *Monsieur Chouflueri*, and Sir Arthur Sullivan's *Cox and Box*, as well as Paul Quarrington's *The Invention of Poetry*, which he also acted in.

Currently, Barry is directing his own adaptation of Emanuel Chabrier's opera An Unfinished Education, and later will direct Jean Paul Sartre's No Exit. In March, he will be directing his own adaptation/translation of Arthur Schnitzler's La Ronde.

Not content with just directing, Barry's research activities involve him in investigating the dramatic career of Edward Bulwer-Lytton and publishing, for the first time, some of the author's classical translations.

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
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Phoenix Phacts

Allan Stichbury attended the USITT /CITT Design Communication Workshop and designed the set and costumes for A.R. Gurney's The Cocktail Hour for Theatre Calgary. Juliana Saxton co-chaired the 3rd annual IDEIRI Conference held in the Phoenix Building with Carole Miller. Juliana's most recent book Teaching Drama, is, as we speak, being translated into Chinese. Giles Hogya, designed the lighting for the New York premiere of Tom Stoppard's Rough Crossing for the off-Broadway, Jean Cocteau Repertory Theatre. Harvey M. Miller gave a directing workshop on Play Interpretation and Analysis at the University of Northumbria in Newcastle-upon-Tyne in the U.K. He also directed a production of The Sisters Rosenzweig by Wendy Wasserstein as part of the University of Wyoming's 44th Summer Theatre in Laramie.
