

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

Flucos place teams in 3C Region play

Fluco boys soccer loses to Charlottesville

The Fluco boys soccer team played its final regular season game on May 16, hosting the Black Knights from Charlottesville. After the game, Fluco Coach Earl Gibson explained that the game did not have major implications for either team. The Flucos were assured a spot in the Region 3C playoffs, and the Black Knights were assured a number one seed in those playoffs. Possibly the folks who assign officials were not that interested in the game. There was a referee and no linemen. A single referee can hardly be expected to handle a high school soccer game. Both teams were fighting for the ball, but few penalties were called and the players were left to decide who was entitled to the throw in when the ball went out of bounds.

Nevertheless, both teams played hard and looked to score at any opportunity. For the Flucos, junior Sampson Blakey and senior Kareem Ragland were speedy and elusive in mid-field and had several strong runs. Senior Zack Fontenot played a strong game defensively. Unfortunately, the Flucos were not at the same level as the very strong Black Knights squad. Charlottesville scored its first goal after eight minutes of play. For the next fifteen

minutes, the teams competed evenly, but as the first half wound down the Black Knights took control. They scored with 16:55 remaining, with 11:55 remaining and with 8:10 left in the half to put the game away. The Black Knights scored twice more in the middle of the second half, for a final score of 6-0. The boys soccer team had a balanced roster this year, with seven seniors, seven juniors and four sophomores. They play in the very competitive Jefferson District.

The boys soccer team is not alone in continuing its season into the Region 3C playoffs. Most of the Fluco teams that are extending their season are playing on the road. The boys and the girls lacrosse teams played on May 24 at Monticello High. The girls soccer team was at home on May 25 taking on Liberty Bedford. On the same day, the boys soccer team played at Liberty Bedford.

On May 26, the Fluco track and field team will be competing at Waynesboro High School. On May 27 the Fluco baseball team will play at an as yet to be determined site. The softball team will play at Turner Ashby High School, also on May 27. If either of the soccer teams win in the first round, they will play again on May 27.

Update on vehicle larcenies and vandalism in and around Lake Monticello

In the early morning hours of Thursday, May 19, a group of juveniles vandalized over 60 mailboxes in and around the Lake

The Fluvanna Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with the Lake Monticello Main Gate staff, was able to locate a video of a possible suspect vehicle. The sheriff's office posted photos of the suspect vehicle on its Facebook page (barcode data was not yet available). Shortly thereafter, it received information about the possible operator of the suspect vehicle and potential additional occupants inside. The barcode data from the Lake Monticello Owners' Association was also obtained and matched a detailed description to the Jeep posted on Facebook. Sheriff's deputies then located the registered owner of the vehicle.

Sheriff's deputies and Lake Monticello Police Officers continue to gather information on this incident. Currently, three suspects (juveniles) have been identified, with multiple charges pending.

The case of the vehicle break-ins that occurred on May 17 remains under investigation and is not thought to be related to the vandalized mailboxes.

As these events both occurred in the same week, they seem very atypical; however these types of spree vandalisms and thefts are not uncommon in this area when the weather turns warm.

The Fluvanna Sheriff's Office and Lake Monticello Police Department work together in patrolling the Lake Monticello community, with increased patrols during the summer months.

We ask that you help protect yourself by locking your home and car and removing valuables from your vehicle. Good security lighting and cameras are always encouraged for enhanced home security.

Rash of vehicle break-ins reported in Fluvanna

The Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office is requesting the assistance of the community with information related to a rash of vehicle break-ins and thefts that occurred in the early morning of Tuesday, May 17.

The break-ins appeared to be concentrated to the Lake Monticello area of Jefferson Drive between the Slice and Riverside Gates as well as in the Sycamore Square Subdivision.

The Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office and the Lake Monticello Police Department have received approximately 20 separate reports for vehicles being entered, rummaged through with multiple items stolen. A vehicle was also stolen from Lake Monticello and subsequently recovered in Sycamore Square. The Sheriff's Office is the lead investigating agency.


It is believed these break-ins occurred between the hours of 2:30 a.m. and 5 a.m. on May 17.

Surveillance videos in the area appear to show two different subjects; one in dark clothing with their face covered, and one in light clothing with a hood and wearing a backpack. These subjects are believed to be involved.

The Sheriff's Office is requesting that if anyone in the area has home surveillance cameras, to please review the videos for suspicious activity. If you have any information or video footage, please contact the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office. Even if you believe the footage is insignificant it may help us with timelines or to validate other tips.

Tips can be called in to the sheriff's office non-emergency phone number, 434-589-8211, and can be made anonymously.

Also, this serves as an important reminder to always lock your vehicles and remove valuables whenever you park your car, even at your own home. Most thieves are opportunistic and unlocked vehicles in population-dense subdivisions make for easy targets.

Help Your High School Student Become Money Smart

10 great topics!

Often lost in the race to get kids through high school and on to life in the real world are basic financial skills. AS we get ready to send our kids off to college or out into the workforce, here are ten financial concepts to consider explaining to your kids before graduating high school.

- 1. How bank accounts work. While there are numerous online applications, consider using a good old check register when teaching the basics of how to track and reconcile bank account activity.
- 2. How credit cards work. Emphasize to your child that credit card spending actually creates a loan. Go through a monthly statement together and show how interest is calculated and stress the need to never carry a balance from month to month by showing how long it takes to pay off the debt with minimum payments.
- 3. Tax basics. When your child receives their first paycheck, walk through their paystub to explain Social Security and Medicare taxes, federal income tax withholdings, and state tax withholdings. If they receive a Form 1099 instead of a paycheck, consider opening a savings account and explain that they will need to set aside a certain percentage of their money to pay the IRS.
- 4. The power of a retirement account. Explain the advantages of long-term savings tools like an IRA. The wise saver can turn into a self-made millionaire by starting their retirement savings at a young age.
- 5. How credit scores work. Consider explaining how credit scores work and the importance of keeping their score at the highest level possible. If your child is like many young adults who currently doesn't have a credit score, consider downloading your own credit report and walk through
- 6. Spend within your means. Saving first before spending is a simple concept

that is becoming a lost art. Help your child understand this by setting their sights on something they want, and then help them save money to buy it.

- 7. The art of saving. Part of spending within your means implies that your child has healthy savings habits. Walk your child through the techniques that work for you. Perhaps it is setting up a separate savings account or automatic transfers from a paycheck.
- 8. Budgeting. Help your child create a basic budget, then help them track their savings and spending against this budget.
- 9. Cash flow. The hard way to learn the lesson of cash flow is when bill collectors are calling and there simply isn't money to pay them. When creating an initial budget, show your child the flow of funds each month.
- 10. Calculation of net worth. Assets (what you own) minus liabilities (what you owe others) equals net worth. Every person has a net worth...even a child. So help them understand theirs and periodically calculate it.



"These seniors have not only been accepted to their chosen four-year institutions but have also been accepted into their program of choice as freshman. This is a notable achievement as many colleges do not accept first-year stu-

dents into these specific programs unless you have completed general education coursework or you are considered exceptional in your chosen field," said Michelle Coleman, the Fine Arts Department chair and art director for theater at FCHS.

The focus has always been on student-athletes and little attention paid to students who have made amazing contributions to the arts in public schools. Many of these students with just basic training, incredible talent, and embracing the process of creativity and practice have come a long way in a short time. They

Willow Harrison was accepted into George Mason University's College of Visual and Performing Arts in the Arts and Visual Technologies program.

"I have always loved creating in one way or another. The longer I take serious art classes, the more I have realized just how much art positively affects my life, and how important it is to me," said Harrison. "I don't have any concrete plans for the future, but I like it that way. I hope to

take up an apprenticeship in tattooing, teach, work on freelance illustration, and any other job I can get my hands on."

Amya Perry was accepted into Virginia Commonwealth University's Art Foundation program. Perry has been drawing most of her life, a solid foundation for all visual arts. But she credits middle school art teacher Margie Kritzer with inspiring her and igniting her passion for art.

Students/parents rights discussed

During a rather routine School Board meeting Thursday (May 19) a discussion of parental and students rights and guestioning by law enforcement emerged.

The board accepted the 2022-23 school calendar which sets students' first day on Aug. 9, winter break Dec. 19 – Jan. 3, spring break April 3-7 and graduation May 26.

They also discussed giving prospective teachers credit for private teaching experience and military service. That subject will be up for vote at the June 9 meeting.

As board members plowed through a list of proposed updates to 12 Virginia School Board Association and Fluvanna school policies, Andrew Pullen (Columbia) said he had a question about policy dealing with, "relations with law enforcement authorities. Investigations by law enforcement officers at school," which states:

"When it becomes necessary for any law enforcement officer to interrogate a student on school premises, the principal is contacted immediately. The principal or principal's designee makes a reasonable effort to contact the parent or guardian and have the parent or

quardian in attendance for the interrogation. If the parent or guardian cannot be present for the interrogation, then the principal or principal's designee is present throughout the interrogation."

Pullen said: "If there is a deputy that's interrogating a student for a variety of reasons, I hope that they would not wait for the principal or the parent to do so."

Don Stribling, executive director for human resources, operations and student relations, said the school does not have to wait for parents.

"Once they (law enforcement) come in and take control of the situation, they can," Stribling said. "But because we work very closely - we have SROs (school resource officers) - we work closely with the sheriff's department, sometimes given the context of the situation, sometimes they give us grace to let the parent know that this is happening. They don't have to. It works out very well given the close relationship we have with the sheriff's department."

Pullen went on to read further into the same policy involving the school's duty to report incidents that may constitute a felony to law enforcement.

The policy also states, "The principal

may report to local law enforcement officials any incident involving the assault or assault and battery, without bodily injury, of any person on a school bus, on school property or at a school-sponsored activity."

Board Chair James Kelley (Palmyra) asked if a student has the right to have a parent present while being interviewed.

Stribling said the school principal can stand in for the parent under a policy of "in loco parentis."

"We serve as that representative," he said. "We want what's best for the kids. Sometimes they make bad decisions."

Pullen said students can agree to be auestioned.

"And remember, just because they're a minor doesn't mean they can't consent," Pullen said. "If they're over the age of 14 they can say yes or no."

Geguetta Murry-Key (Rivanna) said she would like to get more clarity about the subject.

"This is the kind of thing that agitates people," she said.

Kelley said he had a lot of reservations about the policy.

"I'm inclined to spend a lot more time on this one," he said. "I'd like to hear more from defense attorneys. A lot of this is fundamentally problematic. We need to make sure students are afforded their rights and aren't under duress to be interrogated by police in a school setting."

Charles Rittenhouse (Cunningham) expressed his opinion.

"If the student is on school property, then they are under school authority," Rittenhouse said. "If they've done something egregious enough to be guestioned by law enforcement, then so be it."

Kelley responded: "As if they waive their rights to not speak to police by being in school? I don't think you waive your civil rights by being in a public building."

Superintendent Peter Gretz said he has been places where the relationship with law enforcement isn't as positive and collegial as it is in Fluvanna.

He is comfortable that issues that come up regarding police questioning and students' behavior are handled here in the best way possible.

Stribling said he would ask Capt. Von Hill who heads up the SRO program if he can come to the June 9 school board meeting to answer questions and explain policies.

Lake Monticello Father and Son Killed in Vehicle Crash CONTRIBUTED BY JUDY FISH

Tragedy struck a Lake Monticello family just days ago when a young father and son were killed in a vehicle accident in Charlottesville. Their community of current and past co-workers and friends are coming together to raise money for the surviving wife and son.

Laker Jakki Warrick lost her 34-year-old husband, Bryan Daniel Warrick, and 5-yearold son, Milo, in a horrific crash near Rt. 29 and the I-64 interchange in Albemarle County on May 19. Law enforcement officials reported that they were both wearing their seatbelts when they were struck by another vehicle.

The Warrick family moved to Lake Monticello in the fall of 2019 from Colorado so that Bryan Warrick could accept a position at WillowTree, Inc., an American mobile application design and development company headquartered in Charlottesville.

"We grew up in Denver, Colorado," Jakki Warrick said Monday. "My husband was offered a job In Charlottesville and we said, 'what the heck, let's have an adventure.' We immediately fell in love with the Lake and its amenities."

Jakki Warrick, 34, said the couple's sons have enjoyed life at the Lake. She said the Main Beach and Tufton Fishing Pond were favorite family spots. "So much so, that getting Milo to leave the beach or the pond was always a struggle," his mom said. "He enjoyed swimming in the lake, and fishing." The couple's older son, 12-year-old Landon Warrick, was at home with his mom at the time of the crash.

"My husband and little boy passed away on May 19," Mrs. Warrick said. "May 21 was our 11th wedding anniversary."

Jakki Warrick said her husband's parents arrived for a visit from Denver on the afternoon of May 18.

"My husband had a state inspection done on his car In Charlottesville on May 19," she said, recalling the day her life forever changed. "My father-in-law drove Bryan and my little boy to pick up the car. After picking up the car, my little boy decided he wanted to ride back home with his dad. A big box truck ran a red light when my husband was turning left onto the on ramp at I-64 and 118. My husband was not at fault"

The cause of the crash remains under investigation by the police department's Fatal Crash Reconstruction Team.

You may wonder what Chief Abbott's retirement will mean for Lake Monticello's safety and security, especially after the recent vehicle break-ins and vandalism in the Lake Monticello area. The good news is that LMOA is making significant progress in implementing a solution to make safety and security at Lake Monticello more robust. Soon residents will notice the results of many positive changes within LMPD and the Main Gate.

For example, the Main Gate staff will soon undergo increased training through Allied Universal Security to become certified unarmed security guards. Allied will also provide extra roving security guards who will relieve our police officers from non-law enforcement duties such as locking facilities, hoisting and lowering flags, and repairing gate arms. This will allow our police officers to focus on law enforcement, undistracted by non-law enforcement tasks.

Additionally, we continue to work on hiring certified police officers and implementing new leadership. A Public Safety Director will lead the department, and interviews for the position have started with a target to select a candidate in early June. LMPD Chief Abbott officially retires on July 1 and has offered to do all he can to make the transition go as smoothly as possible.

These changes will enable LMPD to function at a higher level. LMOA will continue to work with the Sheriff's Department and look for more ways to enhance overall coverage. We fully expect to see an increase in law enforcement at Lake Monticello very soon. This week's events demonstrate how important it is to strengthen security in our growing community. That is why LMOA staff is focused on improving overall safety and security, creating a more robust solution. In the meantime, the community can count on the ongoing support from its dedicated police officers and the Sheriff's Department.

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Fork Union Business Park moving ahead

The Fork Union Business Park took one step closer to fruition during the Board of Supervisors meeting on Wednesday night (May 18) - including gaining the formal name of the "Fork Union Business Park."

The county began developing the commercial park, located behind the Fork Union Community Center and the fire department on Rt. 15, back in 2019. Building off some land already owned by the county, they purchased three more parcels to bring the total size up to approximately 33 acres.

Concept designs for the land show the

potential for up to 550,000 square feet of commercial and industrial space.

The county will construct five developable areas, or pads, within the park that are shovel-ready for businesses who decide to lease space on the site. This will include installing a new road onto the property, along with water, sewer, and electrical supply.

On the agenda at Wednesday's meeting was a rezoning application to move the three parcels from A-1 (Agricultural) to I-9 (Industrial, Limited) and a permanent name for the property.

In previous discussions, the supervisors decided to exclude some categories usually allowed in I-9 zoned developments: car washes, manufactured home sales, shooting ranges, commercial amusements, and solid waste collection will not be permitted in the development.

With those amendments, the motion to rezone passed 5-0.

Three names were proposed for the site, including the Fork Union Commerce Park, the Fork Union Industrial Park, and the Fork Union Business Park

Supervisors selected the Fork Union Business Park as the most widely marketable name for the types of businesses they hope to attract. This motion also passed unanimously.

OTHER MATTERS:

Supervisors also voted to approve VDOT's Six-Year Plan, a document that periodically comes before the board outlining VDOT's projects within Fluvanna County.

Chair Mike Sheridan told VDOT Residency Administrator Scott Thornton that he had been receiving multiple calls about the repaving program on Rt. 15 that has been leading to some long wait times between the Village of Palmyra and Zion Crossroads.

Thornton said this was not a repaving project, but rather the application of a sealing product designed to extend the longevity of the asphalt. He added no further details on how soon the project will be completed.

Supervisors also voted on a new sign for the Village of Palmyra and allocated up to \$2,000 for its construction and installation.

FCHS Class of 2022 graduates to cheers and applause

On the hottest day of the year so far, hundreds of students, family, friends, and faculty gathered on the football field at Fluvanna County High School Friday night (May 20) to celebrate the 298 members of the Class of 2022 with cheers, applause, and the occasional air horn blast.

This group of students saw the middle of their high school careers up-ended by the COVID-19 pandemic, a theme that came up multiple times during the 90 minutes long program.

"In conclusion," he said, "please go off and do remarkable things."

"I cannot for the life of me figure out something to say or some piece of advice to give that already hasn't been said to us," said valedictorian Jacob Ondek. He encouraged people to be thankful to all the people that have had an impact on their lives and to make sure to tell them. "It feels great to thank someone for something."

"I'm so proud to be a part of the Class of 2022 and I can't wait to see what wonderful futures each and every one of us has in store," he concluded. "Because I'm sure it'll

be positive."

Don Stribling, executive director of Human Resources, Operations, and Student Services, was this year's keynote speaker. Superintendent Peter Gretz introduced Stribling - a 1991 graduate of FCHS, husband of a FCHS graduate, with children in the school system - as part of "a true Fluco family" and an example of the Fluco spirit.

"You have traveled a labyrinth of life already," Stribling told the students. "You've risen up, you're gone the distance, you've met countless challenges throughout your K-12 experience."

He praised the strength and resilience they had shown through the last three years. "You had to figure it out. There was no playbook, there were no study guides, and you did it with style and grace," he said. Those qualities would take them far in life, although he encouraged them "do not forget where you came from."

Prior to the keynote, Dr. Gretz announced the recipients of three annual awards. Ruthann Carr of the Fluvanna Review received the Community Service Award, Ellie White was given the Student Award, and Christopher Zema won the Teacher Award.

After all the awards and all the diplomas were handed out and all the speeches were made, Bruce returned to the podium to say the words four years in the making:

"I declare you all graduates of Fluvanna County High School."



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
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





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
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
