About this User's Guide

This user's guide provides an insight into the functionality of the DNS-346. This guide is based on the current running firmware/software version available for this product and might touch on some new and exciting topics never seen on this product line and acts as a guide when installing and maintaining this product.

Introduction

The D-Link DNS-346 4-Bay Network Storage Enclosure shares your documents, photos, music, and videos across the network and on the Internet (via Secure FTP server) so that family members, friends, or employees can access them. This enclosure, which can hold four 3.5" SATA hard drives of any capacity¹, creates a central network point for backing up valuable files.

The DNS-346 shares files over the Internet via the built-in FTP server². Users and groups can be created and assigned to folders with either read or read/write permissions.

Switch between file-based NAS or block-level iSCSI data transfer schemes. NAS allows users to access a wide variety of services. iSCSI allows for high-speed data transfers by utilizing block-level transfers.

The included CD contains D-Link's Easy Search Utility. This utility allows you to locate the DNS-346 on the network and map drives to your computer. Backup software is also included on the CD. This software allows you to back up your files from a computer to the DNS-346 manually, by a schedule, or in real-time. Real-time backups are a great way to safeguard against unfortunate accidents that may result in the loss of important files.

Combining ease of use with practical, high performance features, the DNS-346 is an organized solution for any network. Free up drive space on computers and centralize data on your network with the DNS-346 4-Bay Network Storage Enclosure!

Hardware Overview

Front Panel



COMPONENT	DESCRIPTION
OLED Screen	This screen displays detailed information about the following: System information, HD status, server status and iSCSI session status.
Power Button	Use this button to switch the device on or off. To switch on the device press the button once. To switch off the device hold the button down for 5 seconds.
Next Button	Use this button to display the system information (system state), HD status (hard drive state), server status (server status state) and iSCSI session status on the OLED. Press the button once to alternate between the different status screens.

Rear Panel (Connections)



COMPONENT	DESCRIPTION
Drive Eject Levers	Use the provided levers to eject the SATA hard drives.
Reset Button	Press this button for more than 5 seconds to reset the unit to factory defaults.
Power Receptacle	Connect the 19V / 4.74A power supply to the receptacle.
USB Connector	1x USB 2.0 (Type A) connector. USB Host port for print server or USB UPS monitoring.
Gigabit Ethernet Port	Use the Gigabit Ethernet Port to connect the DNS-346 to the local network.
Cooling Fans	The cooling fans are used to cool the hard drives and feature speed control. When the unit is first powered on the fans rotate at a low speed and rotate at a high speed when the temperature rises above 49 °C.

Using the OLED (Organic light-emitting diode)

The DNS-346 network storage enclosure features an OLED that enables the administrator to easily view information about the DNS-346. The OLED display screen displays information about the network connection status and the number of hard drives installed and the bay IDs they are installed in. The OLED has three different screens:

- **System Information** - This screen shows the following information:
 - The hostname of the DNS-346
 - The firmware version
 - The IP address of the DNS-346
 - The operating temperature
- **Hard Drive Status** - This screen shows the following information:
 - The percentage of space used on the hard drives
- **Server Status** - This screen shows the following information:
 - Whether a printer is connected to the server
 - The status of the FTP Server
- **iSCSI Status** - These screens shows the following information:
 - When an iSCSI initiator connects to the DNS-346, these screens will display the IP addresses of the iSCSI initiators.

Press the **Next** button once to alternate between the different **Status** screens.

Basic Installation

Hardware Setup

Follow the instructions below to install a hard drive, connect to the network and power on the DNS-346. Open the shipping carton for the DNS-346 and carefully remove and unwrap its contents. Follow the instructions below to set up the DNS-346. If this is the first time using the DNS-346 or if a new hard disk is installed, use the Easy Search utility located on the Installation CD and follow the instructions for setting up, configuring and formatting the new drive.

To install DNS-346 on your local network, refer to the steps below:

1. Access the drive bays by sliding the faceplate up until it unlatches from the device.
2. Once the faceplate is unlatched, pull it off the device, exposing the drive bays.



3. Insert a 3.5" SATA hard drive into an available drive bay. Make sure to align the drive connector to the SATA connector on the bottom edge inside the drive bay of the DNS-346. Gently push the drive in until it connects.



4. Attach the faceplate to the front of the device.



5. Connect an Ethernet cable to the available Ethernet port. This cable should connect the DNS-346 to your local network via a router or switch, or directly to a computer for configuration.



6. Connect the supplied power adapter to the power receptacle.

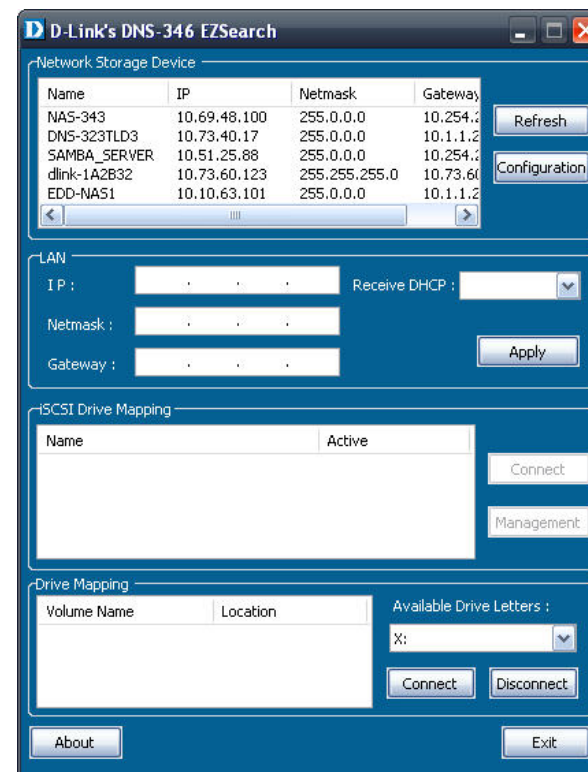


Software Setup

Easy Search Utility

When first powered on, during the initial boot sequence, the DNS-346 will wait to be assigned an IP address via DHCP. If it does not receive a DHCP assigned IP address, by default it will have a self-assigned IP address of 192.168.0.32. It is recommended to use the included D-Link Easy Search Utility when accessing and configuring the DNS-346 for the first time. If you want to change the IP address before logging in or are unable to connect to the DNS-346 IP address, you can use the Easy Search Utility provided on the product CD to locate the device on your network and make any needed changes.

- Network Storage Device:** The Easy Search Utility displays any DNS-346 devices it detects on the network here.
- Refresh:** Click Refresh to refresh the device list.
- Configuration:** Click Configuration to access the Web based configuration of the DNS-346.
- LAN:** Configure the LAN Settings for the DNS-346 here. Click Apply to save changes to the LAN Settings.
- Apply:** Displays the available iSCSI targets on DNS-346.
- iSCSI Drive Mapping:** Click Connect to connect to the iSCSI target.
- Connect:** Click Management to edit the information.
- Management:** Volumes available for mapping are displayed here.
- Drive Mapping:** Choose an available drive letter. Click Connect to map the selected volume. Click Disconnect to disconnect the selected mapped volume.
- Available Drive Letters:**
- About:** Click About to view the software version of the Easy Search Utility.
- Exit:** Click Exit to close the utility.



Getting Started

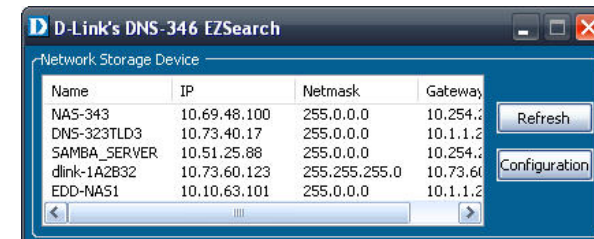
To run the Easy Search Utility, insert the DNS-346 CD into your CD-ROM drive:

1. Click Easy Search Utility.



2. Select the listed DNS-346 and click the Configuration button. This will launch the computer's default web browser and direct it to the IP address listed for the device. Make sure the browser is not configured to use a proxy server.

The first window that appears will require the user to login to the Configuration or Downloads menus. The Downloads menu is described later in this guide in the section titled Downloads on page 89.



NOTE: The computer used to access the DNS-346 web-based configuration manager must be on the same subnet as the DNS-346. If your network is using a DHCP server and the computer receives IP settings from DHCP server, the DNS-346 will automatically be in the same subnet.

- The Login screen will appear:



NOTE: If the web browser is unable to connect to the web manager of the DNS-346, please make sure that your computer is in the 192.168.0.0 subnet. For example, if there is no DHCP server active, your computer will need an IP address in the 192.168.0.0 subnet. Your computer should have an IP address of 192.168.0.x where x equals a number from 1 to 31 or 33 to 254.

Web User Interface

The DNS-346 Web UI defaults to the Setup page. The main categories for configuration are located in the menu tabs at the top of the page. The user is able to log out of the device from the Setup, Advanced, Maintenance and Status menus by clicking on the Logout link. The categories available for configuration include:

- **Setup Section** - Contains the DNS-346 setup wizard, LAN setup, time and date settings and device settings.
- **Advanced Section** - Allows the DNS-346 administrator to configure RAID options, iSCSI target settings, users, groups of users, their storage quotas and the Network Access Rights of the user's setup on the DNS-346. The FTP Server, DHCP server, SNMP, NFS Server, Remote Backup and VLAN settings are also contained here.
- **Maintenance Section** - Allows the DNS-346 administrator to reset the admin password, perform system maintenance tasks, carry out firmware upgrades, configure E-mail alerts, configure power management options, configure Dynamic DNS, change the LCD display settings and get diagnostic information about the installed hard disks.
- **Status Section** - Shows current information about the LAN configuration, device information, printer information, information about the hard drives installed in the DNS-346 and iSCSI Session Information.
- **Support Section** - Contains the DNS-346 help files.

These pages and their configuration options will be discussed in detail in the following pages of this manual.



NOTE: After logging in to the DNS-346 for the first time it is recommended to add a password to the admin account.

Setup Section

The setup section contains the DNS-346 setup wizard, LAN setup, time and date settings and device settings.

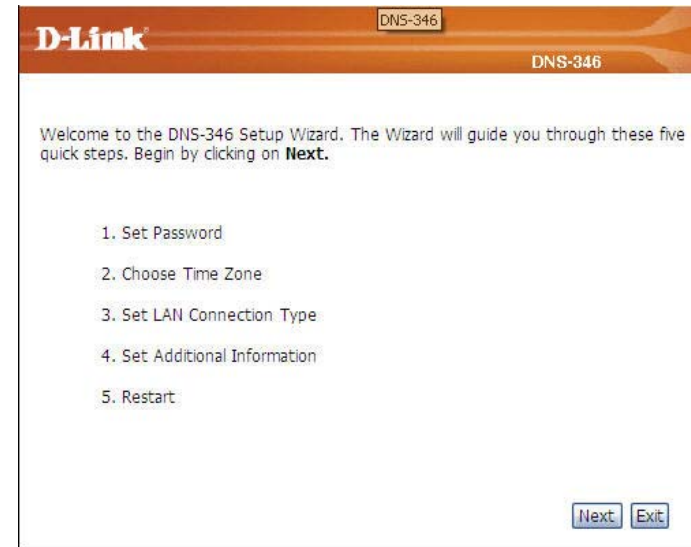
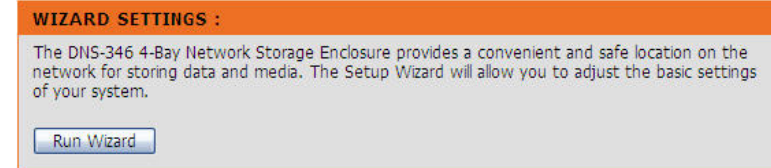

Wizard Page

The DNS-346 has a setup wizard that allows you to quickly configure some of the basic device settings. Click the Run Wizard button to start the setup wizard.

Step 1: When running the DNS-346 setup wizard, the welcome screen details the five steps of the wizard.

Click on the **Next** button to accept these changes and continue. Click on the **Exit** button to discard these changes.



Step 2: It is recommended you set an admin password here. Enter the new password and re-enter it for confirmation.

Click on the **Next** button to accept these changes and continue.
Click on the **Back** button to go back to the previous options.
Click on the **Exit** button to discard these changes.

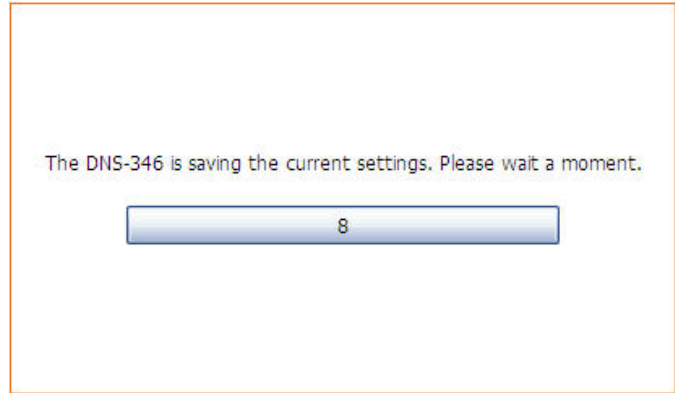

LAN Setup Page

The LAN Settings section allows the user to configure the link speed and to configure the IP address as a DHCP client or Static IP.

Enabling Jumbo Frames allows the user to increase the frame size from 3,000 to 9,000 bytes which increases the network throughput and performance. Standard Ethernet frames are 1,500 bytes in size.

- Link Speed:** The LAN link speed is set to Auto by default, but can be manually set to 100Mbps or 1000Mbps.
- DHCP Client:** Selecting DHCP Client will cause the DNS-346 to obtain an IP address from the local DHCP server.
- Static IP:** Selecting Static IP requires you to assign the IP information for the DNS-346 manually.

- Jumbo Frames:** The DNS-346 can support Jumbo Frames that are between 3000 and 9000 bytes in size. In order to enable Jumbo Frames on the DNS-346, click the Enable radio button and select the MTU size from the drop-down menu. Click the **Apply** button to save any changes made.

Click the **Save Settings** button to apply and save the new settings. If you have changed the IP address or selected DHCP client, it will be necessary to log in again using the new IP address. If you do not know the new address (which is likely to be the case when changing from a static IP address to DHCP client), use the Easy Search Utility on the Installation CD to obtain the IP address of the device.

LAN SETTINGS :

The LAN Settings section allows you to configure the Link Speed and to configure the IP address as a DHCP client or Static IP.

Enabling Jumbo Frames allows you to increase the frame size from 3,000 to 9,000 bytes which increases the network throughput and performance. Standard Ethernet frames are 1,500 bytes in size.

Disk Management Page

The DNS-346 supports seven different disk configuration types:

- **JBOD** – This combines all disks in a linear fashion to create one volume.
- **0** – This option specifies that the disks will be configured as RAID 0.
- **1** – This option specifies that the disks will be configured as RAID 1.
- **5** – This option specifies that the disks will be configured as RAID 5.
- **10** – This option specifies that the disks will be configured as RAID 10
- **Standalone** – This option specifies that each disk will be configured as a separate volume.

RAID Configuration: In this section the user can create, remove and configure RAID configurations.

Create: Click on this button to **add** a new RAID configuration.

Remove: Click on this button to **remove** a RAID configuration.

Configure: Click on this button to **configure** a RAID configuration.

Volume Management: Click on this button to **configure the Volume Management** of the selected RAID configuration.

RAID SETTINGS :

RAID CONFIGURATION allows you to setup a RAID configuration on the selected hard drives. Please note that the data stored on the drives will be erased during the formatting process.

AUTO-REBUILD CONFIGURATION allows you to enable or disable the Auto-Rebuild feature. You can also manually rebuild by clicking the Rebuild button in the RAID CONFIGURATION section. Please note that rebuilding your volume will erase all data on the newly inserted drive.

At most 6 iSCSI volumes can be created on this device.

RAID Create: When the user click the **Create** button the following screen appears.

ID: Type in a number between 1 and 99 to identify the new RAID array.

Level: Use the drop-down to choose the level of RAID. The options are JBOD, 0, 1, 5, 10 and Standalone.

System Disks: Displays the disks that are installed in the DNS-346.

Array Disks: Use the ==> button to add disks to the new RAID array from the disks listed in the System Disks section. Use the <== button to remove disks from the Array.

Spare Disks: Use the ==> button to add spare disks to the new RAID array from the disks listed in the System Disks section. Use the <== button to remove spare disks from the Array.

NAS Space: Type a value in the **G field** to specify the size of the array in gigabytes. Use the – and + icons to reduce or increase the size of the array.

File system: Choose the type of file system you want to install on the volume. You can choose Linux **Ext2** or **Ext3**.

Click the **OK** button to add the new Array.

RAID Configure: When the user clicks the **Configure** button the following screen appears.

System Disks: Displays the disks that are installed in the DNS-346.

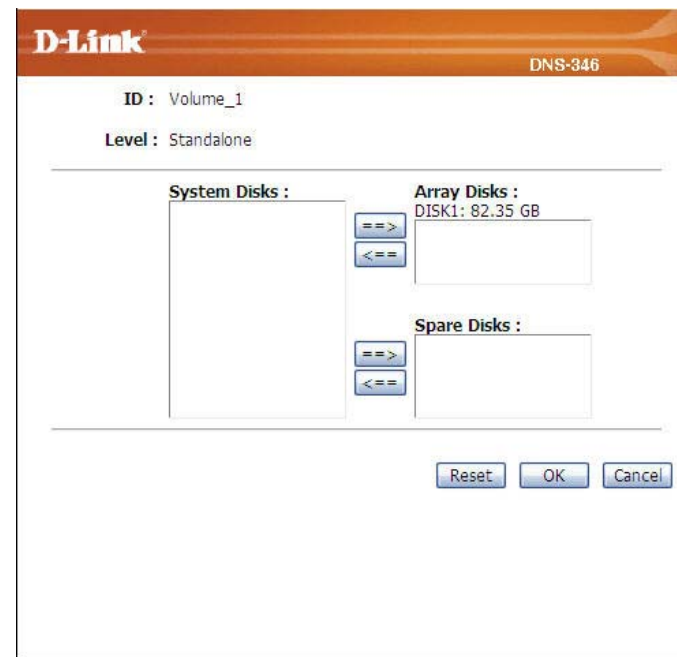
Array Disks: Use the ==> button to add disks to the RAID array from the disks listed in the System Disks section.

Use the <== button to remove disks from the array.

Spare Disks: Use the ==> button to add spare disks to the RAID array from the disks listed in the System Disks section.

Use the <== button to remove spare disks from the array.

Click the **OK** button to save the changes to the array.



RAID Space Allocation: When the user clicks the **Volume Management** button the following screen appears.

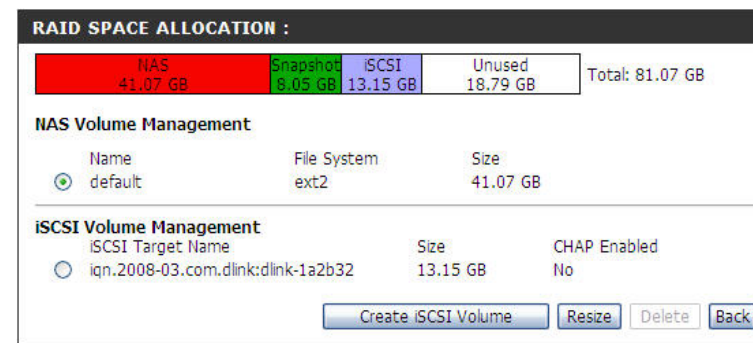
NAS Volume Management: Click the radio button of the NAS Volume you want to configure.

Create iSCSI Volume: Click the **Create iSCSI Volume** button to open the iSCSI Volume Create window.

Resize: Click the **Resize** button to open the NAS volume resize window.

Delete: Click the **Delete** button to delete the NAS volume.

Back: Click the **Back** button to return to the RAID settings window.



Create iSCSI Volume: When the user clicks the **Create iSCSI Volume** button the following screen appears.

iSCSI Target Name: Type a name in the textbox to identify the new iSCSI Target.

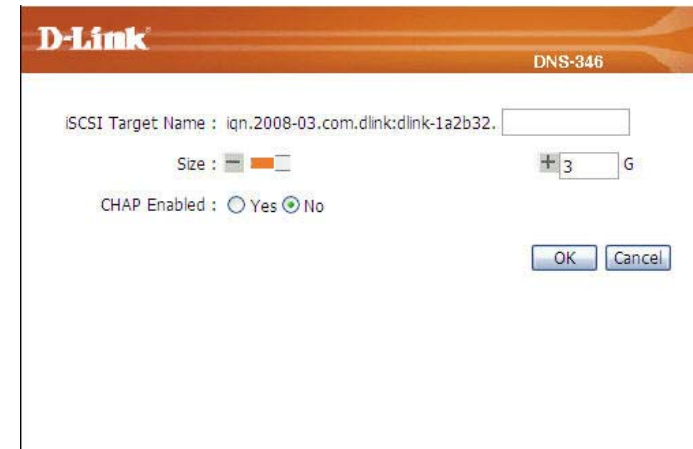
Size: Type a value in the **G** field to specify the size of the iSCSI Target in gigabytes. Alternatively use the **-** and **+** icons to reduce or increase the size of the iSCSI Target.

CHAP Enabled: If the iSCSI initiator supports Challenge Handshake Authentication Protocol, click the Yes radio button. Click the No radio button to disable.

If enabling CHAP you will need to type in the CHAP Username and Password (between 12 and 16 digits) in the appropriate fields.

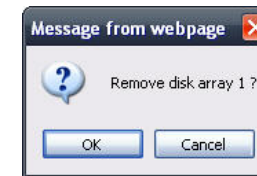
When you have finished configuring the iSCSI Volume, click the **OK** button.

Remove RAID Configuration: When the user clicks the **Remove** button, a warning message will appear and after clicking OK the RAID Configuration will be removed.

Auto-Rebuild Configuration: The Auto-Rebuild feature allows a degraded RAID to **automatically** be rebuilt when a failed hard disk is replaced by automatically restoring data from the existing hard drive to the newly inserted hard-drive.

For example, if a RAID 5 array is in degraded mode and the DNS-346 has the auto-rebuild function enabled, when the user inserts a new hard disk into the DNS-346, the RAID 5 configuration will recover automatically. If the RAID 5 array is in degraded mode and the DNS-346 has the auto-rebuild function disabled the user will have to configure the RAID 5 settings manually after replacing the failed hard disk. The different parameters that appear in the RAID Space Allocation window are explained below:

Enable Auto-Rebuild: Click the radio button to **enable** the Auto-Rebuild feature.

Disable Auto-Rebuild: Click the radio button to **disable** the Auto-Rebuild feature.

Click the **Apply** button when you have finished configuring the Auto-Rebuild configuration settings.



NOTE: Rebuilding will erase all the data on the newly inserted drive.

Snapshot is a point in time copy of the data in the volume. It is basically an image ("snapshot") of the data on a volume at a specific moment in time (thus the name snapshot). It is essentially a photograph of the state of your data at that moment in time. The snapshot acts as a guide for restoring the storage device in the event that it fails. A snapshot creates a point-in-time copy of the data. Normally, the snapshot is done instantaneously and made available for use by other applications. The original copy of the data continues to be available to the applications without interruption, while the snapshot copy is used to perform other functions on the data.

Snapshots: In this section the user can configure and take snapshots of the data on the drives.

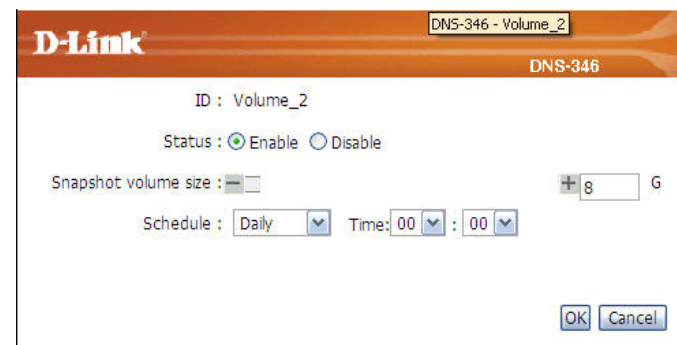

Network Access Page

The Network Access settings allow you to assign permissions for users and groups to specific folders or volumes. By default, all volumes are open to anyone on the local network with read/write access. Before specific user or group rules can be created, the default rules must be deleted.

- Folder:** To see the detail of this field, see next page.
- User & Groups:** Select the users and/or groups that you want to assign access rights to a specific folder to. These guarantees inform the Client that a file's content will not be allowed to be changed by the server, or if some change is imminent, the client will be notified before the change is allowed to proceed.

- Map Archive:** The archive bit (on Windows file systems) is used to keep track of the latest status of a file since the last backup (archived). Enable Map Archive by selecting Yes from the drop-down menu. This will map the (Windows) archive bit to the Linux (UNIX) owner execute bit, so as to preserve this part of the file's attribute under a Linux file system. The Linux (UNIX) file system lacks the concept of an archive bit. It is recommended to enable this option if you are performing backups on a Windows system or if you are using applications that require the archive bit. Some backup software will attach this attribute to files that are being stored as backups, and as such, archive bits are used in incremental backups.

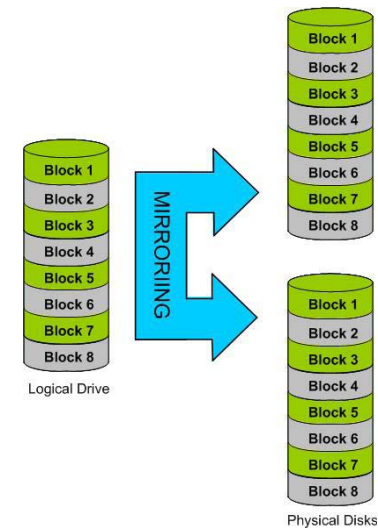
What is RAID?

RAID, short for Redundant Array of Independent Disks, is a combination of two or more disks with the aim of providing fault tolerance and improving performance. There are several different levels of RAID, with each one providing a different method of sharing or distributing data among the drives. The DNS-346 supports JBOD, RAID 0, RAID 1, RAID 5, RAID 10 and Standalone.

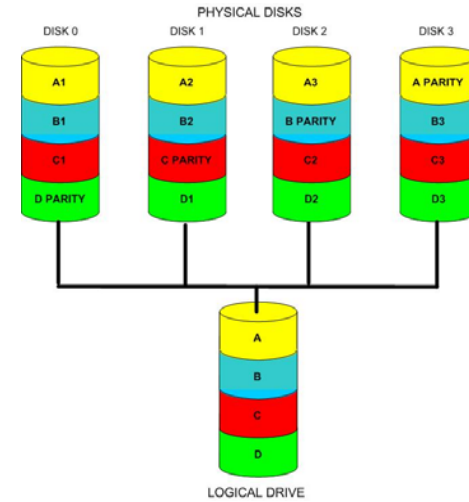
RAID 0: RAID 0 provides data striping, which spreads out blocks of data over all drives, but does not provide data redundancy. Although performance is improved, the lack of fault tolerance means that if one drive fails, all data in the array will be lost.



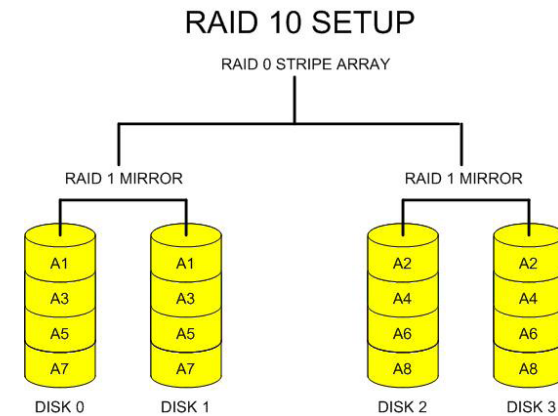
RAID 1: RAID 1 provides mirroring over multiple disks, with the same read/write speed of a single disk. A RAID 1 array can only be as large as its smallest member disk. Because the data is stored on multiple disks, RAID 1 provides fault tolerance and protection, in addition to performance advantages.



RAID 5: RAID 5 provides data striping with distributed parity, which stores information that can be used to reconstruct data. A RAID 5 array will be the size of all the combined disks capacity less the capacity of one disk, e.g. If there are 4x 80GB disks in the array, the arrays capacity will be 240GB (3x80GB). Implementing RAID 5 on the DNS-346 allows it to continue operating even if one of the disks fails. The diagram below indicates the operation of RAID 5:



RAID 10: RAID 10 combines the best features of RAID 0 and RAID 1 by implementing a stripe of mirrors. RAID 10 requires a minimum of four evenly sized disks. The advantage of implementing RAID 10 is that it all but one of the disks in any of the RAID 1 mirrors can fail without any loss of data. The diagram below indicates the operation of RAID 10:

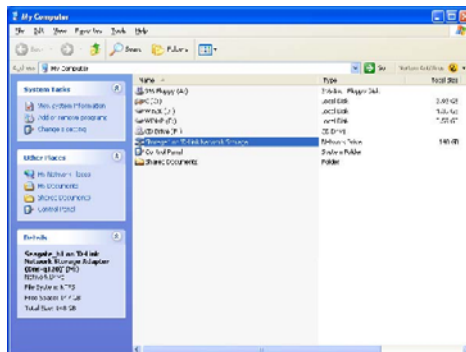


Mapping a Drive

You can use the D-Link Easy Search Utility to map drives to your computer. Insert the DNS-346 CD into your CD-ROM drive.



1. Click Easy Search Utility. The Easy Search Utility will load and detect any DNS-346 devices that are on the local network. If the DNS-346 you are working with does not show up in the device list, click Refresh.
2. Highlight an available DNS-346. Available volumes will be displayed under Drive Mapping. Highlight the volume you want to map. Select an available drive letter from the drop-down menu and click Connect. Once connected, your mapped drive(s) will appear in My Computer.



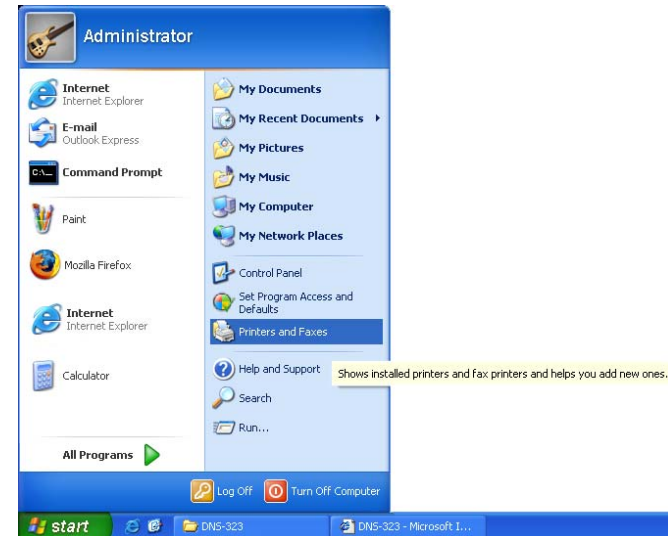
3. Double-click the My Computer icon on your desktop. Double-click on the mapped drive to access the files and folders.

USB Print Server

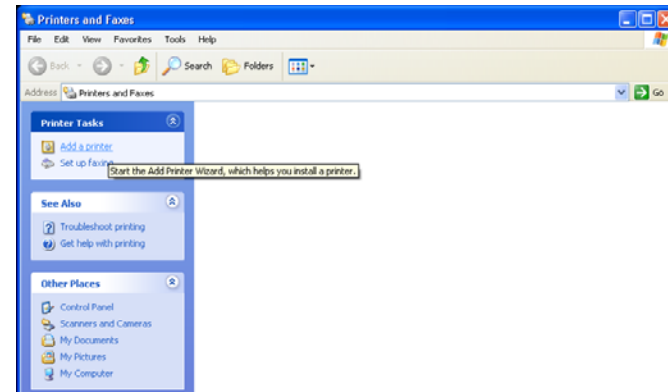

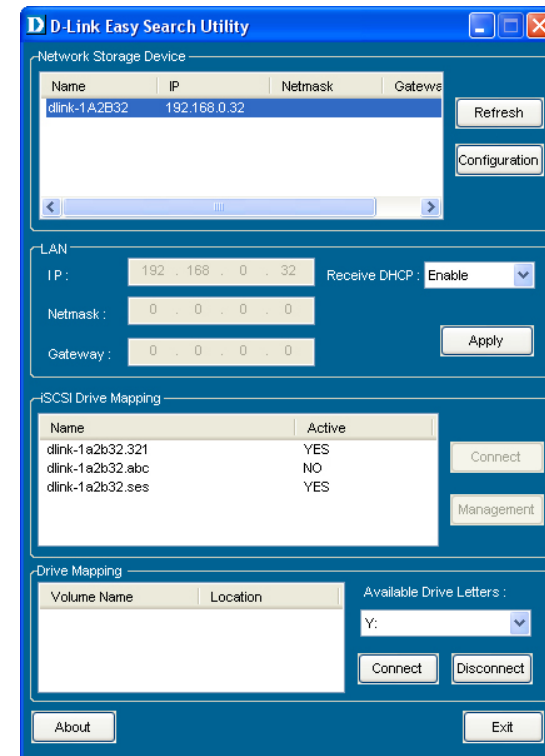


iSCSI Drive Mapping

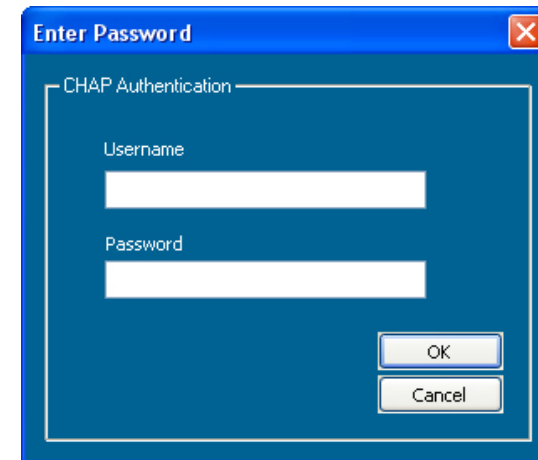
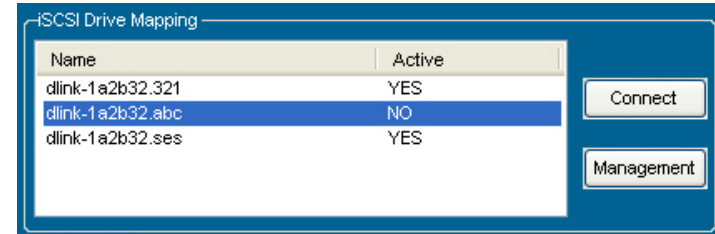
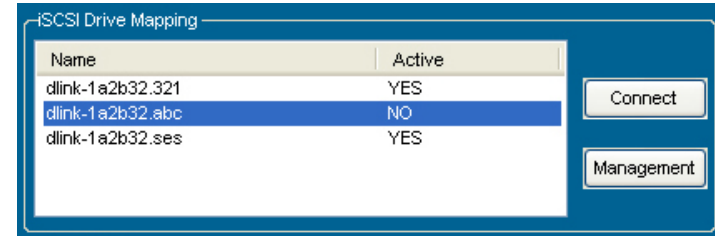

Management: The window allows you to add, delete, mount and unmount the partition.

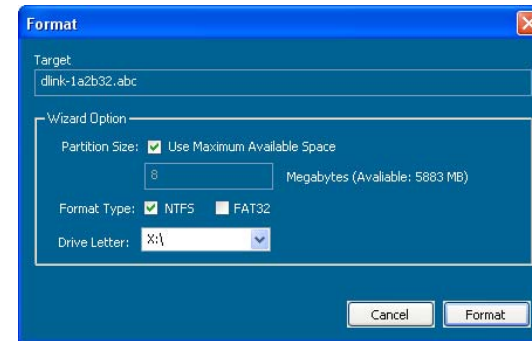

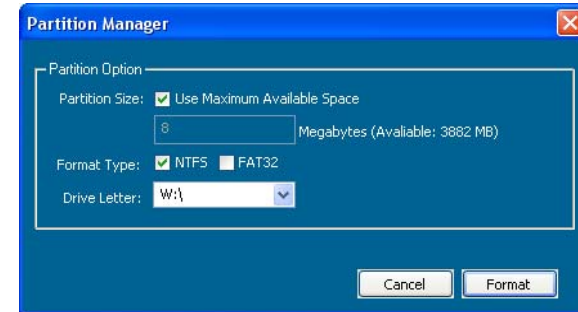
- Disk:** Displays the ID number of the disk installed in the DNS-346.
- Partition:** Displays the Partition number of the disks partition.

- Capacity:** Displays the total capacity of the partition.
- Target:** Displays the iSCSI target name of the partition.

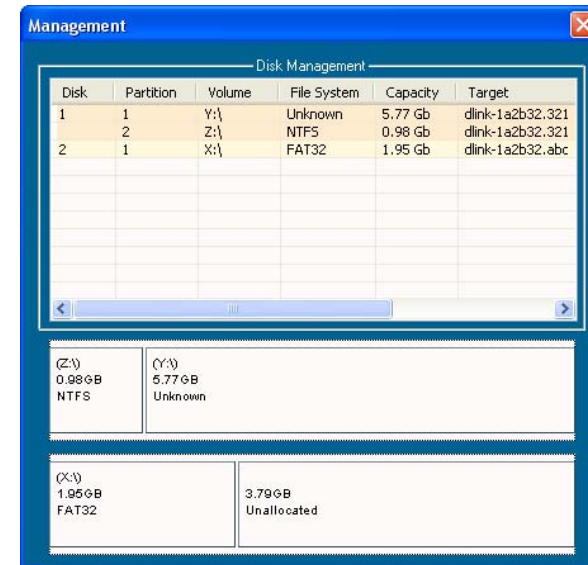
Mounting Disks: When a partition is not mounted, a * (start) symbol will appear in the Volume column in the Disk Management list. Carry out the following steps to mount a disk:

Right-click an unmounted partition and click **Mount**. The Drive Select window appears.

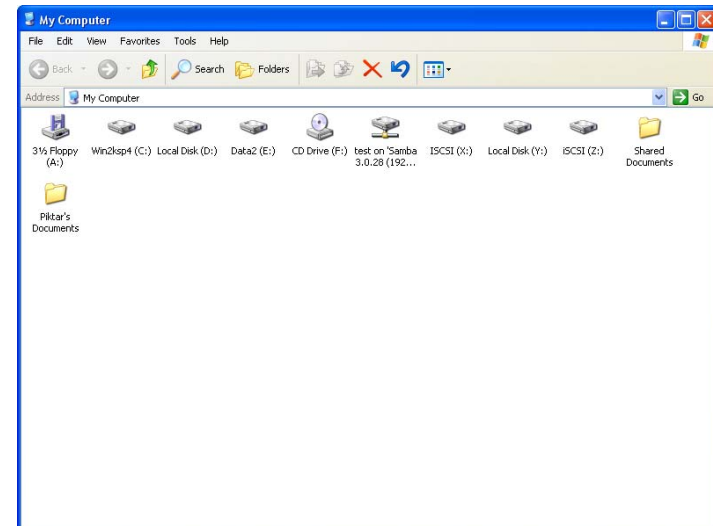
Select the drive letter in the Device drop-down list. Click the **OK** button.



The mounted disk is displayed in the Disk Management list.



The newly mounted disk is displayed in the My Computer window and can be used as if it was a locally attached disk.



Hot-swap Function

The DNS-346 supports hot-swap drive trays. You can eject or insert 3.5" SATA hard drive(s) when the DNS-346 is operating.

However, if the hard drives are created into various levels of RAID, you cannot hot swap all the hard drives at the same time. Hot swapping all the hard drives will cause a loss of data, and the RAID volume will need to be re-created again. Different levels of RAID required various numbers of hard drives remaining in the DNS-346.

Standalone/JBOD/RAID 0:

The data will be lost and the volume will crash, if any of the hard drives are hot swapped.

RAID 1:

You can hot swap the hard drives as long as one of the hard drives in the mirror is still in the DNS-346. Removal of all hard drives will result in a loss of all data and volume will have crashed.

RAID 5:

In a RAID 5 volume, it is only possible to hot swap 1 hard drive at a time without losing all data. This is because a RAID 5 volume can only tolerate the loss of 1 hard drive and still continue to work. After hot swapping a hard drive, the volume must first be rebuilt before another hard drive can be hot swapped, otherwise this will also result in a loss of all data and the RAID volume will have crashed.

RAID 10:

RAID 10 is a stripe of mirrors. You cannot hot swap the paired hard drives at the same time. This means Hard Drive 1 and Hard Drive 2, or Hard Drive 3 and Hard Drive 4 cannot be hot swapped at the same time. Otherwise, you will lose all data and the RAID volume will have crashed.

You can check the RAID configuration from the Setup -> Disk Management page on the Web UI. When hot swapping hard drives, you will see the changes in the Disks column. Hot swap one of the hard drives, make sure the Disk number has disappeared from the Disks column, and then hot swap the next hard drive.

Storing non-English Character Files

By default the DNS-346 will support Unicode which is an industry standard allowing computers to consistently represent and manipulate text expressed in most of the world's writing formats.
