- 1. What are the similarities and differences between the countries in the regions Svitlana is studying?
- 2. What is the difference between politics and political science?
- 3. What four factors contributed to post-election protests in Belarus in 2020?
- 4. How is Svitlana's research different to that of other political scientists?

APPLICATION

- 5. How could an organisation, such as the United Nations, use Svitlana's research to improve global democracy?
- 6. If you met Svitlana, what questions would you ask about her research and career journey?

ANALYSIS

- 7. Why do you think political repression before an election leads to protests after the election?
- 8. Why do you think changing election rules causes losing parties to reject election results?

EVALUATION

9. Do you think you would participate in a post-election protest? What events or election characteristics would influence your decision to protest?

Activity

Imagine you are a journalist in a fictitious country. The country has recently held an election, in which the winning party received 93% of all votes, and post-election protests are now occurring throughout the country.

Write a news report (for newspaper or TV) to cover the story. Your report should consider the following:

- What is happening? How are people protesting and how is the government reacting to the protests?
- What happened before the election? Did political repression occur?
- Did the party really receive 93% of the vote, or is electoral fraud suspected?
- What do the winning and losing political parties have to say about the election results?
- What is the economic situation in the country, and has this contributed to the protests?
- Have there been any post-election protests in neighbouring countries that may be influencing protests in your country?
