MOTORISTS and pedestrians across Waterford city, eastern parts of the county and South Kilkenny endured treacher-ous conditions on Monday night and Tuesday morning as subzero temperatures caused

There was disappointment for budding snowman-builders, however, as all but one of local schools remained open. Passage East National School decided to close as entry into the village


There were several minor collisions reported across urban and rural areas on Tuesday morning and, in the city, the Folly and Poleberry were 'impassable to cars', according to one local resident. Bright, sunny conditions boosted the City Council's gritting programme during the morning,


although local access roads and many residential estates remained slippy throughout the

Waterford city: City crime up 12%, burglaries up 21%

BURGLARIES in Waterford were being carried out by people desperate to get money to buy drugs, the Joint Policing Committee was told in Waterford, last week.

Up to 70% of burglars had a drug habit and heroin was the largest contributor to crime, explained Supt Chris Delaney of Waterford Garda Station.

A significant number of burglars were heroin ad-dicts and the particular drug was difficult to detect. It was time consuming and laborious work for the Gardai and took many hours of surveillance to seize it.

The overall volume of crime in Waterford city increased by 12% during the past year while the number of burglaries increased by 21 per cent.

Thefts from shops and vehicles and the unlawful taking of cars went up and topped 1,937 in 2012 compared with 1,725 offences the previous year.

One of the biggest areas of increased crime was burglary. There were 537 burglaries in 2012 which was an increase of 114 on the previous year. Burgla-ries increased particularly in the last quarter of 2012. The detection rate was 29% which was well above average.

The Gardai were determined to get on top of burglary and they needed 'eyes on the ground' and co-operations with Community Gardai.

Residents of housing estates were urged to be aware of the movement of people in their areas.

Cllr Gary Wyse (FF) said criminals were watching people's movements and he asked if premises were being properly secured at night.

Determination

In reply, Supt Delaney said he did not believe that home owners leaving their doors unlocked was the main reason for the high level of burglary.

It was down to the determination of the criminals who were both local and transient. It was very important to forewarn the Gardai. All reports would be treated with confidence. Old fashioned policing and reacting to tip offs cut out a lot of investigation work. Burglaries were very trau-

matic for elderly people. "Do not feel bad about ringing the Garda Station

if you see something suspicious," he said.

"Err on the side of caution. Callers at the door should never be allowed into the $house and \,most elderly peo$ ple should have an alarm set up in their homes."

burglary Aggravated showed a major reduction and was down from 14 incidents in 2011 to just 5 last year.

The detection rate in Waterford was 46% which was up 2% on the previous year. Thefts from shops in Wa-terford reached 657 last year which was a decrease

from the previous year. The successful detection rate of 80% was due to CCTV surveillance and a new strategy introduced with the co-operation of traders. Waterford Gardai had made an application for extra CCTV cameras in the city centre.

Supt Delaney said other thefts, including the theft of diesel oil in rural areas, was very difficult to detect. But when patterns were identified, measures were put in place to combat this . crime.

Robberies in Waterford were down from 76 in 2011 to 67 last year and threequarters of them were successfully detected.

Cllr Davy Walsh said an alert neighbour in Green Oaks in Ferrybank noticed suspicious activity recently and alerted the Gardai who were at the scene within five minutes.

This kind of community

alert prevented crime and people felt more secure.

Supt Delaney said he was aware of the case in question.

As a result of quick reaction by the Gardai, many criminals had been arrested near the scenes of their crimes and evidence had been recovered from their cars.

This negated the need for victims to go to court to give evidence.

One phone call could be the catalyst, he said.

Regarding criminal gangs, he said the Gardai had targeted criminals outside Waterford and arrested people and brought them back to the city.

Detectives from Waterford had travelled all over the country to arrested criminals and search their homes and many files were now before the DPP.

Tramore hit hard by weather

TRAMORE was really hard hit on Monday night and Tuesday morning with fairly heavy snow. Monday night it snowed rather heavily in the seaside town and made road conditions difficult.

But, by commuting time on Tuesday at 8am, minor accidents were already happen-ing with Bus Eireann caught up in it.

A council engineer spoke on local radio that they had a tried and tested system but they could get caught out with weather.

Snow in late evening and overnight saw worsening temperatures, he added, but stated that they had been salting from 5.30am.

In the west of the county some roads had been treated but they could not get to every route.

Tramore, however, was almost at a standstill by school going time. Schools remained open despite the difficult road conditions with many pupils arriving late.

In the circumstances, school principals were a little caught out by road conditions and the lack of salting throughout the town.

The Waterford to Tramore Main road had been gritted at 5.30pm, said the council engineer, but so much snow came it proved too much.

As morning broke, the prob-



lems started and minor acci-

dents began. A bus got stuck at O'Neill's/ Main St around 8am due to a parked car. Main St and Patrick was gritted, said the council, but this was countered by local people who saw little evidence of it.

It was only gritted at 9am, noted another local Tramore person.

At Summerhill/Priest Road, we saw one vehicle aban-doned at a junction in what was really a chaotic scene.

No traffic was moving on Main St with newspapers not even delivered by 8.30am. It was hard to maintain serv-

ice at that location, added a council spokesman, who said there were crews out.

was gritted at 5.30pm but snow came later.

We saw a huge Centra lorry get stuck there trying to climb up to the racecourse. Near the Main St, there was

an accident near the post of-fice and Gallweys Hill was also impassable.

Drink and drug driving on increase

DRINK and drug driving in Waterford city increased significantly by 27% during 2012, a meeting of the Joint Policing Committee heard in Waterford, last week.

It seemed people had not got the message about intoxicated driving, said Supt Chris Delaney, Waterford.

He said drivers were still getting behind the wheel after drinking or taking drugs and warned that intoxicated drivers would be caught given the number of Garda check points in operation.

A total of 181 drunken drivers were convicted in Waterford in 2012 as opposed to 143 the previous year.

The age profile of offenders was one of young men under

thirty. Cllr Seamus Ryan (Lab) said the message about drink driving was not getting home. It was a crime that could destroy families

Supt Delaney said a lot of media work had been done by the Gardai to highlight the danger of drink driving.

There were long disquali-fications for those convicted and the fines were heavy.

It was a pity the figures did not reflect the efforts of the Gardai



More tax from high-horse government

WATERFORD City Council is seeking replacement of the pending property tax with reformed, equitable taxation based on ability to pay.

The members passed a motion to that effect by a majority vote at their March meeting, at the same time warning against 'the imposition of an unjust charge based on the market value of homes, without regard to ability to pay'.

to ability to pay'. The motion was proposed by Cllr John Hearne (SF) who listed huge numbers of householders, already under desperate financial pressure, who simply could not pay.

Among them were 23.5 pc of all residential mortgage holders, who were in distress; also social welfare recipients and low paid workers, all of whom had been hit by a litany of new charges.

"Having described household charges as morally wrong when in opposition, Enda Kenny and his cronies are now on their high horses and putting the boot in", he asserted.

He said he knew of one man

facing payment of the charge who could not afford \notin 50 to have a painful tooth pulled and had to use a pliers himself instead.

"That's how bad it is in some homes", he maintained.

Hypocrisy

CLLR Hearne was accused of hypocrisy by Fine Gael and Labour members, John Cummins, Hilary Quinlan and Jack Walsh, who pointed to a £1,000 household charge in Northern Ireland which was supported by his party. But Cllr Davy Walsh (WP)

But Cllr Davy Walsh (WP) pointed out that for that outlay,

just as obtained in other European countries where property charges were in place, they got excellent health, education and other services in return.

He said government politicians were squeezing the life out of low income families

who they claimed to represent. In a further attack on Cllr Hearne and Sinn Fein, Cllr Cummins said they clearly had something against wealth, but those who accumulated it worked for it and earned it. "They didn't rob it from the

banks", he added pointedly. Cllr Walsh spoke of Fianna Fail being responsible for landing the country in crisis by spending money in the good times to buy votes.

He was reminded, however, by Cllr Gary Wyse (FF) that there were no dissenting voices from the opposition at the time.

In fact they were constantly encouraging them to spend more.

Hardship

CLLR Mary Roche referred to the St Vincent de Paul as the people who rolled up their sleeves to help those most in need and she said they were seriously concerned about the additional hardship the property tax would cause.

Also, she didn't consider it fair that people who worked all their lives and were existing on meagre pensions should be expected to pay the same as

people in decent employment. A vote on the motion resulted in it being passed by 8 votes to 5, with Cha O'Neill, Seamus Ryan, Gary Wyse, Davy Daniels, Davy Walsh, Sean Reinhardt, Davy Walsh and John Hearn in support.

Those against were: Jack Walsh, John Cummins, Hilary Quinlan, Deirdre Jacques and Mayor Jim D'Arcy.

A member of the Labour party since 1991, Cllr Jacques is married to Ray and has two daughters and one son.



Some building set for delisting?

He was told by Director of Services Richie Walsh that they could certainly commit to initiating a review, concentrating on areas agreed with the Council members. Cllr John Cummins (FG)

said such a survey was needed nationally.

He said that owners in some instances were subject to unjustly high insurance for listed buildings which should not be categorised as such.

Youth charged over taxi robbery

AN attempt was made to rob a taxi driver at knifepoint last Friday afternoon.

The driver picked up a fare in Waterford city at around 2.30pm. At Sallypark, the young man produced a knife and told the driver to pull over and get out of the car

The taxi driver got out and the culprit got into driver's side, at which point a struggle ensued. The culprit then followed the driver down the road towards the train station.

Gardai, who had been alerted by witnesses, arrived on the scene and arrested the culprit. A knife was also located nearby. The taxi driver was in shock but not injured, a Garda spokesperson said.

The culprit, who is aged 17, was arrested and detained un-der Section 4 of the Criminal Justice Act 1984. He was charged with attempting to rob and possession of a knife at a Special Sitting at Waterford District Court on Saturday evening and remanded in custody.

A ROW between a member of Tramore Town Council and directors of a new company established to acquire the Metal Man remains un-resolved despite assurances from the latter that their sole aim was to secure access to the famous landmark and use it as a key element in a local heritage trail.

Representatives of Tramore Heritage Ltd attended the March meeting of the Town Council to respond to what its directors regarded as misinformation and scaremonger-ing by Cllr Maxine Keoghan at the Council's previous monthly meeting.

At that meeting she voiced fears that the company in question, if it acquired the Metal Man from the Commissioners of Irish Lights, could sell it on for profit, thus depriving the people of the town of an integral part of their heritage.

Town Manager Brian White told her he did not share her fears because the Metal Man, as a protected structure, would have to be preserved as

such, irrespective of ownership. But Cllr Keoghan displayed further animosity towards the heritage company when, in response to a suggestion from Mayor Joe Conway that its directors be invited to state their case, she opposed the idea saying it would only give them a legitimacy they did not deserve

That was the background to last week's meeting which was addressed by three of the directors, Avery Coryell, Paul Jackman and Tramore Tourism Chairman Keith Daniels.

The latter assured the Council that Tramore Heritage Ltd was a non profit making company established by Tramore Tourism specifically for the transfer of the Metal Man and Brownstown pillars to its care and to further develop the heritage trail concept for tourism purposes.

Scuppering hard work

Mr Coryell, in reference to Cllr Keoghan, expressed disappointment that an elected public representative for Tramore 'would go to such lengths to scupper the hard work of the heritage com-pany'. He said she could have made a direct approach over her concerns and he or any other of the company directors would have explained the process in which they were

engaged. He said the Metal Man and pillars at Brownstown and Newtown Heads were cur-rently owned by Irish Lights who wanted to dispose of them. "Our aim is to create a safe walk that would be the jewel in the crown of the local heritage trail, of which access to the Metal Man would be a key element. Efforts to secure that access from the private landowners involved were ongoing.

Mr Jackman said they had got legal advice that the best structure through which to acquire the monument was a newly incorporated limited liability company. Their advice was that such companies were traditional when dealing with charitable or not-for-profit entities, which was the case in this instance. They had instructed their

solicitors to apply to the Rev-enue Commissioners for charitable status in respect of the company and as part of the application the directors had to give undertakings that no dividend would be paid and in the event of the company being wound up none of its assets would be distributed to the directors but transferred instead to the next nearest charitable organisation.

Paranoid

Cllr Keoghan, while welcoming the fact that the transfer of the Metal Man was finally taking place, said the heritage company's articles of association failed to give consideration to the monument's conservation and preservation, or to the fact that it was a protected structure. And she insisted there was no guarantee that it could not be sold in the future.

As for Mr Coryell's references to her and her stance on the subject, she accused him of paranoia.

Conciliation

Mayor Joe Conway wrapped up the debate with what he said he hoped would be a conciliatory tone. He said the Council of Eu-

rope's Convention for the Protection of Architectural Heritage - to which Ireland was a party – was relevant in that a particular section outlined the basis for an initiative such as the Tramore Heritage directors had presented. It said the State had a responsibility 'to encourage private initiatives for maintaining and restoring the architectural heritage of Europe'.

The Mayor pronounced that if they protected and promoted their heritage they would undoubtedly increase heritage tourist numbers. Al-though man-made, the Metal Man was unique and potentially had the same draw-fac-tor as Giant's Causeway or the Skelligs.

"Make no mistake", he lded, "the monument added, presents this town with op-portunity. It is important that we realise this and that we unlock whatever impedi-ments are hindering beneficial outcomes that will surely follow from access and apprecia-

Sword of Thomas Francis Meagher presented to city

THE weather didn't favour the organisers of last weekend's 1848 Tricolour Celebration, but this didn't stop a sizeable crowd from attending Sunday's official flag raising ceremony on The Mall in the city.

Commemorating the first unveiling of the Irish Tricolour first flag by Thomas Francis Meagher at 33 The Mall, this year marked the third year of

year market the festival. Gilbert Lee Meagher, great grandson of Thomas great grandson of Thomas Francis Meagher, travelled from California to be in attendance for the weekend.

Speaking at Sunday's ceremony, Mayor of Waterford City Cllr Jim D'Arcy outlined aspects of Thomas

Francis Meagher's life and spoke of the origins of the Irish tricolour, mentioning the strong links between the Irish and French flags. MC Nicola Beresford kept

proceedings under control in the inclement conditions. Amhrán na bhFiann was performed by local 'Voice of Ireland' finalist Vanessa

Whelan. Actor Kieran Dovle took on the role of Thomas Francis Meagher and read a letter written by Meagher on July 9th 1849 in which he spoke of his love and hope for Ireland.

The ceremony also featured music from the Barrack Street Band, a performance of 'My City of Music' by a choir comprised of local children, the military colour parade by the Thomas Franics Meagher Fife and Drum Band, a performance from the Waterford Male Voice Choir, and dancing from

members of the Mulcahy Bible School of Dancing. A guard of honour was provided by the Irish Naval Service Reserve, with members of the 69th Regiment New York (Fighting Irish) which was founded by Thomas Francis Meagher also in attendance.

At an event at the Bishop's Palace on Friday night, Gilbert Lee Meagher presented the sword belonging to his relative to the city of Waterford which Mayor D'Arcy described as "an act of selfless generosity". Mr Meagher said he felt "a

But Messrs Cowman and Brennan expressed 'grave concerns' over the railings. They feel they are not in keeping with railings already in place and, likening them to a cattle crush, submitted that they detracted from the natural beauty of the area.

More importantly, however, they maintained the railings were dangerous on account of sharp edges and argued that they

would cause loss of sight in the event of an emergency rescue situation and reduced platform space for winch evacuation.

They handed in about a hundred letters of support for their argument, but before the meeting also was a letter of support for the railings from long-time water safety campaigner Frank Nolan, an international water safety risk assessor.

Town Manager Brian White said he was aware of the depth of feeling on the subject, but apart from safety altogether, the diving platform had to be certified as safe before essential insurance cover could be obtained. The Newtown Guillamene Swimming and Club raised the money and, with involvement by the Area Engineer, the railings were erected in accordance with

recommendation from a health and safety audit. He acknowledged, as did the Area Engineer, that with greater resources the design of the railings could be improved.

He undertook to meet with representatives of the protesting group – Mayor Joe Conway is also to attend - but warned that it might not be possible to resolve the matter to everyone's satisfaction.

Fighting 69th to the rescue during Superstorm Sandy

WE had the opportunity at the 1848 Tricolour Festival to talk to Dennis Rick of the Fighting 69th Regiment who told us about their resuce missions during Superstorm Sandy.

The 69th regiment was founded by Waterford man Thomas Francis Meagher during the American Civil War. Dennis was on his fourth trip to Waterford and knows his way around the place.

He told us how they were called into action when Sandy hit New York in late October/ early November last year.

Dennis lives in Staten Island and this was one of the worst hit areas

He lost the roof off his house and this was only replaced last week.

Dennis played a big role in the evacuation of the Bellevue Hospital in downtown Manhattan.

He organised the 69th to empty the hospital of the 800 patients.

They had to carry them down several flights of stairs and he himself carried a number of elderly patients on his back area of operation.

The area was badly hit and the job involved evacuating older people from flooded properties and ensuring that they were alive and well.

Many Irish live near Breezy Point and the Rockaways, including some people from Waterford. Medical

retirement homes were helped

out in the evacuations as were folk in flooded homes, some of whom lost everything and had no insurance.

flooded Staten Island, where the people had to endure heavy

He checked on all the streets he was familiar with and made sure that any one in need was looked after.

The Staten Island borough had many fatalities and was termed the 'Forgotten Borough' of the five New York City boroughs by some press reports Fatalities reached double figures.

TCH Group in receivership News and Star, WLRfm and Beat fm affected

AFTER months of speculation in media circles, the Corkbased Thomas Crosbie Holdings was placed in receivership last week. Included among the company's titles are The Irish Examiner, The Cork Evening Echo, The Waterford News and Star, WLRfm (75% stake) and Beat 102-103fm.

All the newspapers and radio stations are operating as normal following a complex restructuring that saw Mr Tom Crosbie and his father, Mr Ted Crosbie, taking control of most of the media assets of TCH via a new company called Landmark Media Investments Ltd.

Other TCH titles taken over by Landmark Media are The Carlow Nationalist, The Kildare Nationalist, The Laois Nationalist, The Enniscorthy and Wexford Echo and The Western People. It has a 35 per cent stake in Cork youth station Red FM and a 17.6 per cent stake in MidWest Radio. TCH was known to be loss-

TCH was known to be lossmaking and heavily in debt. It lost \notin 5.8m in the year to the end of January 2011. It was also locked into a printing contract that it could no longer afford given the collapse in newspaper sales and advertising since 2006. AIB, which is thought to be owed \notin 15m, supported last week's financial restructuring. There will be losers from the

change of ownership. Webprint Concepts Ltd, a company based in Mahon Point in Cork, had the contract to print TCH's newspapers but the titles will now be printed by The Irish Times at Citywest, Co Dublin. However, Webprint has cried foul and is threatening court action over the situation.

There is also some confusion over unsecured creditors at the newspapers and radio stations such as freelance reporters and contributors. They are well down the chain and, ordinarily in such circumstances, would not be paid. However, the newspapers and radio stations continue to operate and regular freelancers and contributors are necessary to maintain content. The National Union of Journalists insists the Receiver has a 'moral obligation' to pay what are relatively small sums of money but vital to the workers concerned.

In the Dublin High Court last week, Mr Justice Peter Kelly agreed to the appointment of an interim examiner of Post Publications Ltd (PPL), which publishes the Sunday Business Post

The Sunday paper recorded a net operating loss of $\notin 1.2$ million in the year ended January 1st, 2013 and is projected to record a loss of $\notin 1.4$ million this year. AIB has agreed to provide financial support of $\notin 150,000$ at this point to enable PPL to see through its examinership. Landmark is expected to seek to acquire the Sunday title from the examiner.

WRH takes C-section case to High Court

A WOMAN is recovering at Waterford Regional Hospital this week after consenting to having her baby delivered by caesarean section following an emergency sitting of the High Court at the weekend.

The woman, who cannot be identified, had wanted to give birth naturally and believed her due date was March 18. However doctors at WRH estimated that the woman was at least 13 days overdue and raised fears that the baby could die or have severe brain damage and the mother herself could be at risk of a haemorrhage.

Lawyers for WRH made an emergency application to the court on Saturday morning to carry out the procedure on the

woman. However just minutes before Judge John Hedigan delivered his judgment the woman agreed to the C-Section.

The court had been told by senior counsel for the hospital that what was at issue was the woman's constitutional right to refuse treatment versus the right to life of the unborn.

The woman previously gave birth to a baby boy by caesarean in 2010 and the procedure left a scar on her uterus which, if it ruptured during a natural delivery, could pose a grave risk to both the mother and the baby, doctors feared.

Both the mother and her newborn son were said to be doing well following the procedure on Saturday.

Suspended jail sentence for assaulting his father

A SON who assaulted his father in the family home was given a suspended three month prison sentence in Waterford District Court last week.

Dermot Hoban (25), with an address at Newrath, Wa-terford, pleaded guilty to as-

saulting his father Frank. The court was told by Garda Superintendent Chris Delaney that the Gardai received a 999 call from Kathleen Hoban at 6.10pm alleging that her son

Dermot was causing a disturbance in the house. She complained that her

son grabbed his father by the shoulder. The father was uninjured

but the Gardai removed the defendant from the house. He had previous convictions

District Court after he heard that a passenger in a taxi stole the driver's mobile phone in a row over the fare.

Local man John Harty (24), of 42 Wellington St, was given a four month suspended prison sentence when he pleaded guilty to stealing the mobile phone valued €200 and making off without paying a €20 fare on January 12 last.

Garda Superintendent Chris Delaney said the defendant paid a taxi driver $\in 50$ to drive him from Kilkenny to Waterford. When they arrived at Bridge St, Waterford, a further €20 was due to be handed over to the driver.

But instead the defendant asked the taxi driver for his money back and he took the mobile phone from the taxi and left without paying the balance of the fare. The incident was recorded on the video in the taxi and the defendant was identified. He had previous convictions for public order offences, theft and road traffic matters.

Solicitor Hilary Delahunty, defending, said his client had being drinking all day and he had a serious alcohol problem. Initially he gave \notin 50 to the taxi driver and in his drunken state he believed he had paid his fare in full. He took the phone, which was cold comfort for the taxi driver. A sizable part of the defendant's previous convictions were made up of public order offences.

The defendant went to a school for people with intellectual disability. At times he was homeless but was now living in an apartment. He found drink hard to deal with and was still drinking, but he was in a much better position.

Judge Kevin Staunton said while the defendant had his own problems the patience of the court was running thin. He was not learning his lesson despite being given chance after chance by the court. The prison sentence was suspended for 12 months.

Carrick-on-Suir Motorist fined over filling station incident

HAVING arrived in the forecourt of a petrol station, a voung woman motorist on spotting a certain individual, drove in his direction, Carrickon-Suir District Court heard.

him or acknowledge him. When the Judge put it to her that, according to the Superin-tendent, film footage showed her directing her vehicle at the injured party, she denied that to have been the case.

By way of clarification, Su-perintendent Courtney said she drove in a straight line and did not take any evasive action despite the other person being her path. Judge Finn said he was prepared to accept that both parties kept moving and. as the saying went, it took two to tango. He convicted and imposed a €250 fine.

Drink driver crashed into ditch

A MOTORIST who crashed into a ditch was removed to Waterford Regional Hospital where a blood sample showed an alcohol concentration of 195 milligrammes.

At Carrick-on-Suir District Court last Thursday Cormac McDonald (26), of Marian Ave, Maypark Village, Waterford, was fined €500 and banned from driving for three years.

His solicitor, Eamon Haves said that because he had little prospect of employment at home, he had gone to Australia where he was working as a plasterer.

Garda Superintendent John Courtney said the accident happened at Portnaboe, Carrick, in the early morning of January 21 of last year and Garda Donal Slevin was the investigating officer.

Stole cosmetics to help finance apartment purchase

A MAN who stole cosmetics from a pharmacy did so because he was under pressure to finance the purchase of an apartment for himself and his girlfriend, his solicitor told Carrick-on-Suir District Court.

Robert Kennedy (25), unem-ployed, of 9 Carrigeen, Clon-mel, admitted the theft from Meade's Pharmacy at Main St, Carrick, on the afternoon of January 10 last.

The cosmetics, worth €178, were recovered.

Garda Superintendent John Courtney said the defendant was arrested by Garda JP Cronin shortly after the crime had been reported. He had twenty previous con-

victions including larceny, burglary and public disorder. Solicitor Eamon Hayes, hav-

Horticulture student caught out by smell

HORTICULTURE student Jamie Mulcahy (26), of Bal-lycassin Lane, Whitechurch, Carrick-on-Suir, was fined 6400 at the local District Court for possession of cannabis herb.

The offence was detected on April 20 last at Ballydine, investigating gardai having got a pungent smell of cannabis from his car after he opened his window.

The court heard that a search of the vehicle revealed a grinder containing a small quantity of the drug, as well as a hand-rolled cigarette.

The charge was denied, with defence solicitor Eamon Hayes submitting that the gardai were not legally entitled to search the car.

But Judge Terence Finn ruled otherwise.

Garda Sean Cuddy, who was accompanied by Det Garda Jim Felle on the occasion, said they stopped the defendant at a riverside picnic area after noticing that he had an out-of-date tax disc displayed on his windscreen

As he spoke to him through his open window he got a strong smell of cannabis from the car and noticed that he was very nervous. Having found the grinder

and cannabis herb, he admitted it was his. Garda Cuddy said he did not

summons him in relation to the tax - he used his discretion in the matter after the defendant explained that he did not have the money. Det Garda Felle gave cor-

roborative evidence and added that the area in question

was noted for drug activity. In evidence, the defendant said he was on a late lunch break from work placement out of college when the guards searched his car.

He told them he did not even know the grinder was in the vehicle and he was also unaware the hand-rolled cigarette was there.

He admitted it was his grinder but thought it was empty and he did not smoke on the occasion in question.

He said that contrary to garda evidence, he was 'far garda evidence, he was from nervous' and in fact he had no tax disc at all on the windscreen.

Mr Hayes submitted to the court that there had to be a reasonable basis for a search, such as the one that was carried out

He added: "I would suggest the tax issue was a red her-ring, as borne out by the fact that no summons was issued. This was a spot check'

Judge Finn noted that the defendant acknowledged having more than a passing knowledge of cannabis.

He had also denied the presence of a pungent smell, but he might not have been aware of it, not having taken the fresh air outside the car. There was no other person

in the vehicle and the grinder and its contents were his. The Judge said he was satis-

fied the gardai had sufficient grounds for a search, on the basis of the smell and the defendant's nervousness, cou-pled with the area's notoriety for drug use, as outlined by Det Garda Felle.

Three year ban for drink driving

Derelict sites in Tramore 'cause hell'

EIGHT sites in Tramore remain on Waterford County Council's derelict sites register, with as many more having been closed, the local Town Council members were informed at their March meet-

ing. Mayor Joe Conway, who had

requested the report, said der-eliction around the town was an issue close to his heart as he was aware of the extent of distress the problem caused. He knew of people who had gone to their graves having endured the hell of living next door to a derelict house

The report, produced by County Council environment staff, said 120 sites across the county were inspected last year and the relevant database updated accordingly.

Town Manager Brian White said there were a lot of diffi-culties with derelict sites, particularly in the current economic climate and in terms of enforcement the Council had

to tread carefully. He invited the Town Coun-cil members to report any sites they would categorise as derelict.

Deasy backs Tramore's demands

DUNGARVAN-BASED Dail Deputy John Deasy (FG) has formally supported Tramore Town Council's demand that, under local government reform, the unified Waterford local authority structures should in-clude a distinct Tramore Municipal District.

He confirmed his backing in a letter to the Town Council, pointing to the fact that the Tramore electoral area had the largest population of all the local authority divisions in Waterford, with the exception of the city

He said the town itself, with a

population of 9,634 and growing, was a recognised service centre for the surrounding rural hinterland and both ad-

ministrative infrastructure and staff were in place to support a headquarters for a would-be Municipal District covering East and Mid-County Waterford. "This enlarged Tramore Mu-

nicipal District", he wrote, "would have a population of almost 34,000 – a significant critical mass amounting to about one-third of the total population of Waterford City and County combined". Additionally, Deputy Deasy referred to a report of the Wa-Local Government terford

Committee which identified the fact that the city population had been growing at a rate significantly below the national average, while places such as Tramore had experienced rapid growth and there was every reason to believe the latter was part of a long-term trend. "I believe", he concluded,

"that if Tramore is to fulfil its potential as more than a dormitory town for the city, it is essential that it has a strong voice and level of autonomy as part of the merged Waterford Council".

The Town Council enthusiastically welcomed the Deputy's backing at their March meeting.

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Household tax is very unpopular

THE new household tax is very unpopular and could put many government TD seats at risk in next election. How the tax is calculated will also cause concern.

The initial method is the best they can do at the moment, it seems. The lack of breakdown on bedrooms in houses will mean that some will pay less than others. Older houses will pay same as newer ones, which could be more valuable.

Overall the tax is not that high compared to Northern Ireland but they have lower vat rates there and more household services. Starting another tax in these difficult times is not welcome.

We can see why they do it as they need the money and the IMF are forcing their hand. But doing it in better times might have been more advisable.

The household tax in the 1980s saw a previous coalition of Labour and Fine Gael lose power and this one will be no different. That residential property tax only affected expensive houses over £65,000 and with high incomes. This one is less discriminatory.

It will be a very hard sell but using the Revenue Commissioners means that it will be collectible and they will get most of the money. Some who are in default on loans will not probably pay it.

Compared to VAT it is more unpopular. The Irish psyche is very strong on opposing land or house taxes. There is a lot of history going back to the window tax, the tithe war and the days of the landlord/tenant relationship ending with the Land Wars that has been taught at history lessons in schools. The IMF would not understand it.

Getting money in on a drinks excise levy or petrol tax would have been easier and less controversial. We will pay it ourselves and be compliant but we can understand the anger out there. A promise to reduce VAT in the future would be a good concession when the economy begins to show some signs of recovery.

This taxation burden needs more work and a review. Michael Noonan has already said to the public sector workers that this is the last pay cut. What about a decent offer for the taxpayer?

Should we not get some tax reduction in the future in VAT against this property tax. It is a good argument. Fianna Fail may be cynical and oppose this just like Haughey did in the 1980s. Sinn Fein too, even though they have a property tax in the North where they are in Government. In the meantime, the local authorities are hard up for funds.

In the meantime, the local authorities are hard up for funds. Some cynics will say that the roads were not worked on enough for the snow due to reduced budgets. Yet, during the winter, there was road gritting when there was no frost some nights as weather conditions changed.

The household tax will bring extra revenue and bring some benefit for local services. However, it leaves a bitter taste and will hit consumer spending and VAT revenue. It could also delay economic recovery in retail.

We shall watch the consequences with interest.

Living with Alzheimer's

STATISTICS tumble into *The Munster Express* mailbox like the snow that fell across Waterford on Monday night. Some make little or any impact whatsoever given the litany of inane surveys conducted by public relations firms, but some still retain the power to stymie the cynicism that's so often pervasive in this trade. But one such statement stopped me in my tracks on Monday morning.

Its subject line read: 'There are 1100 people in Waterford living with Alzheimer's or dementia'.

I had to read it again. That many?

I would never have considered the local figure to be so high, and of course the consequences of having a loved one with Alzheimer's surely runs the aforementioned tally into multiples of four if not five.

I know of one family in which a father and uncle have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's.

Both men were strong, healthy, houseproud and vibrant. Both were great conversationalists and loved visiting their neighbours and entertaining them. Both were active and enthusiastic contributors to their local community.

Sadly, such days are now behind them, their remaining years destined to be spent away from home and in full-time care.

The closing chapters of their lives are the ones we pray our parents and elderly relatives shall never have to experience: away from domestic comfort, cut adrift from the memories of a life well-lived, of loved ones, of friends, of the events that define a life.

The Alzheimer Society of Ireland, which runs a day centre at Pine Grove on Waterford City's Passage Road, provided over one million hours of community care to people living with dementia.

According to the Society's March 11th press release: "It has warned that it is struggling to cope with an increasing demand for its services so support for the annual Tea Day fundraising campaign (on Thursday, May 9th) is more important than ever."

One of the great failings of successive governments has been their consistent failure to safeguard the relatively meagre allowance which loved ones of those struck down by illness receive when caring in the home. We all know such men and women, living saints in my view, caring out of unconditional love, day in, day out.



"Many family carers are looking after the loved ones 24 hours per day," said Pat Kenny, whose late mother Connie lived with Alzheimer's for 14 years.

"The services provided by The Alzheimer Society of Ireland help to ensure that both carers and people with dementia are supported – these services are vital."

In order to maintain its annual services, the Alzheimer's Society has to raise \notin 450,000 via the forthcoming Tea Day, with all monies raised locally remaining local in terms of subsequent investment.

To put that into context, former Taoisigh Bertie Ahern and Brian Cowen, a duo as myopic as Captain Smith and J Bruce Ismay were aboard the Titanic on April 14th 1912, receive annual pensions of \in 150,000 a year each.

That disgusting figure represents two thirds of what the Alzheimer's Society aims to raise come May 9th.

Now tell me that doesn't make your blood boil with indigination and a sense of grave injustice. The statistics which the Society released

The statistics which the Society released in relation to Alzheimer's and dementia are extremely saddening. "Dementia affects 41,700 people in

"Dementia affects 41,700 people in Ireland and nearly nine per cent of these people have early onset dementia which means they are under 65 years of age," the statement continued.

"There is an estimated 50,000 family carers looking after a loved one with at least one symptom of dementia. Due to an ageing population the number of people with dementia is expected to reach 147,000 by 2041."

Come May 9th, the Society is aiming to recruit 1500 hosts for Tea Day to reach its

€450,000 target, and one hopes that many reading this column will be prompted to host their own event in the south east.

Of course, it is vital that those with dementia do not immediately wave the white flag following diagnosis. Indeed, such an outlook is as important for the diagnosed individual's family as it is for the directly affected individual.

As is the case for those with Parkinson's Disease, maintaining physical activity for as long as one can every day is vital. Be it going for a walk, indulging in a spot of gardening, washing the car or going for a swim, every little helps. Exercise remains life's most effective anti-depressant and antibiotic. Embrace it.

Cures considered impossible a century ago have been achieved; the recent news that a child in Mississippi was pronounced "cured" of HIV remains a declaration which can only be validated by her living a long and healthy life.

But it gives hope to those who dream of a day when incurable diseases such as Alzheimer's, Parkinson's and Motor Neurone Disease will not mean the dreadful inevitability they still retain in the here and now. While a new Pope may well be elected

While a new Pope may well be elected by the time you're reading this, those gilded princes of the Church are not the ones performing the everyday miracles we should be championing.

Those determined to truly live for as long as they can despite their illness, along with those caring for them every step of the way, are the ones who truly deserve the novenas.

Cheesed off at brand names

ANOTHER chapter Waterford's industrial history closed last week as the gates of the Kilmeaden Cheese Factory shut for the final time, as was reported in *The Munster Express*.

Although manufacturing of the product moved to Ballyragget in Kilkenny following Glanbia's controversial decision to cease manufacturing in Kilmeaden in 2005, the Waterford site was still used for storage purposes.

It's a source of annovance for many that a product which was established in Waterford in the 1960s is now manufactured in North Kilkenny bearing the original name.

In fact, I know many people who refuse to buy the product anymore on principle.

And it's not just because of the usual Waterford/Kilkenny rivalry, although this no doubt adds further salt to the wounds. Now that the cheese is no longer stored in Kilmeaden as of last week, it bears no direct connection whatsoever to the village.

I contacted Glanbia this week to find out how they could justify the use of the Kilmeaden brand name and received the following response: "The Kilmeaden brand is made by Glanbia at its Ballyragget facility using the same recipe as always used. Milk collected from Waterford milk suppliers continues to be the key ingredient, thereby retaining the flavour and quality of the distinctive brand"

According to its website, Kimeaden Cheese is "a cheese made locally to a traditional recipe

The reality which Glanbia neglects to mention (either on the website or on the packaging) is that the cheese is made 75km away from where the "local"

recipe originated. In 2005, when production was ending in Waterford, it was argued by farmers that the quality Kilmeaden Cheese came of about as a result of the quality of milk which was sourced locally along with the knowledge of the staff and it was claimed that this couldn't be replicated elsewhere Concerns were also expressed at the alleged reduction in the quality of milk while en route to Ballyragget. Does the use of a placename in a product count for anything anymore?

Trade union UNITE is currently engaged in a battle to force the owners of Waterford Crystal to repatriate manufacturing of the brand to the city and has taken the case to the European Union's Registry of Trademarks Glass which is produced in

Central and Eastern Europe is currently being sold under the original Waterford trademark.

UNITE members are confident in their campaign as they say there is significant legal and commercial precedent in retaining the links between products and places such as Parma ham and Champagne. The EU's Protected

Geographical Status, which encompasses Protected Designation of Origin (PDO), Protected Geographical Indicator (PGI) and Traditional Speciality Guarantee (TSG), aims to protect the reputation of regional foods, help producers obtain a premium price for products, authentic promote rural and agricultural activity, and eliminate any potential misleading of consumers and

unfair competition.

Cheeses are included under the schemes, along with wines, hams, sausages, olives, beers etc. Following rulings, cheeses ncluding Gorgonzola including and Parmesan in Italy and Camembert in France, can only be labelled as such if they come from the relevant area.

Given that Ballyragget isn't extremely far away from Kilmeaden, it might seem as though Glanbia isn't engaging in anything which is all that misleading. However. the aforementioned EU regulations are extremely strict. Newcastle Brown Ale was

given protected status, restricting its brewing to Newcastle upon Tyne.

When the brewery in question decided in 2004 to move



the product no longer had the geographical restriction as Gateshead was regarded as a separate city.

Only a small number of Irish products have already been granted Protected Geographical Status - Clare Island Salmon, Connemara Hill Lamb, Imokilly Regato, Timoleague Brown Pudding, with recognition sought for our own blaa last year.

Can't the manufacturing of the cheese in Ballyragget and the subsequent use of the Kilmeaden name therefore be challenged under EU law as is currently being done with Waterford Crystal? In fact, the question we should really be asking is: why hasn't this been done already?

'The Fillet of Cheddar', as it is known, has won numerous international awards and is worth fighting for.

If the links between placenames and products continue to be diluted, then it will present serious issues, particularly for food products - just look at the ongoing horse meat saga.

Glanbia insisted in 2005 that it was committed to looking at alternative, small volume, niche dairy uses for the Kilmeaden facility. Although it has been designated

as a strategic development site, we have yet to be informed of any specific plans.



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Local Government and Local Development:

Protecting frontline services

MINISTER PHIL HOGAN

"Much has been commented on in the media in recent weeks in relation to my proposals for the Alignment of Local Government and Local Development.

There has been talk of the loss of funding and more recently job losses. While this scaremongering may very well be intended to serve other agendas, Iwant to make it clear that my sole agenda is to protect frontline services to local communities.

"I don't accept that the current local development structures are the most method efficient of

delivering services to The local communities. Alignment Steering Group that I set up to review this area noted the complex range of structures and entities that deliver local and community development supports, all with their own



administration overheads. The Group reported that administration 'these functions carry significant costs and can divert resources from frontline services'. The Group also noted the duplication and overlap that resulted from the complexity of the local the complexity of the local development landscape.

make no apology for the fact that I intend to tackle these issues. We simply have to look for more cost effective delivery mechanisms in the

current economic climate. "The Action Programme Effective for Local Government - Putting People First recommends greater alignment between local government and local development, including the 51 local development including companies that currently deliver important programmes for my Department amongst others. The Government accepted recommendations by the Alignment ng Group. Under the made Steering proposals, those local development companies will continue to have a role in local development delivery. There is no logic therefore to the statement that that this alignment will lead to massive job losses, as has been alleged. What we need

is a more streamlined system. which is fit for purpose, and eliminates unnecessary duplication. **Budgets agreed**

"In recent weeks we have seen the outline for EU budgets for 2014 - 2020 agreed. The amount of funding available under the LEADER Programme, which has yet to be finalised, will be severely curtailed compared to what we had under the previous programme.

This is further compelling evidence of the need to reform the whole area and get better value for money. Business as usual is not an option and the need to change is made all the more urgent by the reductions in funding expected. There is a pressing need therefore to ensure that the various agencies handling public funds work together to make the best use of the scarce resources available to deliver the best level of

service possible in the most cost effective and efficient way. Alignment is about doing just that. It is about developing a partnership approach between the local government and local development sectors in order to bring about more effective delivery of services to our communities and citizens.

I am very aware that the local development sector in Ireland has a strong history and handles large volumes of public funding. However, change is required across all sectors to help meet the challenges facing us during "This debate has been

over focused to date on protecting structures and organisations. I can understandthatmaintaining the status quo is the primary concern of vested interest groups. However, I want to ensure that the best services are delivered to citizens and communities in the context

of reducing budgets. We simply cannot expect to continue as we are. I believe that the new alignment arrangements will place local development structures on a more sustainable footing and will help lessen the impact on programmes of reduced funding over the next few years.

We now know that there will be reductions in programme funding, and by extension adminfunding, in the context of budgetary processes at both national and EU level. However, alignment is not about driving cuts to programme funding; rather it is about helping to sustain the impact of local and community development services through more effective efficient, and joined-up structures. "I have met with the

stakeholders in recent weeks to discuss this matter and I will continue to do so until we have a workable solution.





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

AT a recent special seminar on mental health at the Edmund Rice Centre for the African community plus locals at which mental health issues were widely discussed.

Christine Fitzgerald from Grow Waterford recounted her life experience growing up and how she was a strong active volunteer for Grow to combat depression. Ireland, she says, needs to talk more openly about depression.

Grow is a support group to help people remove stigma from depression and mental health issues.

They have a 12 steps programme and meet together in a formal structure where people talk about the mental health problem being experienced by them or a family member and learn how to cope with such matters

We can all have difficult times and feel as if we are hit with a meteor from the sky. Depression can be a silent killer and can be covered up. People can be great at putting up appear-ances but they might feel awful in themselves but when a visitor calls they always say they are fine. Appearances can de-

ceive and folk must learn how to deal with life's problems

Ms Fitzgerald said Cognitive Behaviour Therapy was a key component of treatment

and some key questions were: How do we feel about ourselves? How do we feel about others? How do we feel about the demands of life? The best thing was to do something about the problems that you have, do not ignore them and allow them build up like debts. The work begins within and then the professional can intervene and help improve with the patient's progress. For treatment to be successful, the patient must take responsibility. The old saying is: "You alone can do it but cannot do it alone." The aim is to prevent break-

down but, if breakdown does occur, the patient would need to get rehabilitation in order to

recover.

pitalization with rehab starting on coming out of hospital. Getting a small change progressively each week or month is a step forward in terms of rehab. Little by little, progress is made, said Christine, who has wide experience in the subject. The small steps make the big change. Do the ordinary things again like make food, watch a movie. Before, there was not the ability to concentrate.

Grow has 12 groups in Ire-land and one in Waterford that meets on Wednesdays in St Brigid's Centre at 7.30pm on the Lower Yellow Road. Please note this is for over 18s only. Samaritans

The Samaritans also had a speaker at the event and gave details of the services in Wa-terford and the vast numbers of calls handled.

Their number is 1850-609090 and they also respond to text and e-mail as well as face to and c-main as went as face to face talks. They get calls from lonely people, depressed and suicidal people. Over 33,000 calls were handled in Water-ford last year. Samaritans volunteers are not counsellors but can talk confidentially. No names are given and repeat calls are possible for lonely or people with negative tenden-cies. They are now even getting calls from teenagers, who be-fore may have called Childline.

John Kennedy of the Regional Suicide Resource office also addressed the seminar. They train people like education, youth and health workers in dealing with people that may have suicide tendencies. Sean McCarthy heads this operation

based at St Patrick's Hospital on Johns Hill. They are part of a national strategy and here they cover the South East with the Reach Out programme. Community workers can also be trained or those in the voluntary sector that might find these skills useful. They have also worked with those in the probation service and Traveler projects, as well as marine rescue services.

They do basic suicide awareness training in level 1 and then more advanced training at higher levels.

Prevention Suicide can be prevented by the action of prepared care givers. Self harm has been growing according to national research. For further information call 874013

They can also help those who are bereaved tragically and can direct GP referral as they have a trained psychologist available outside of the WRH. A counselling service is also there for the bereaved, especially those that have died tragically but a GP referral would be needed.

The final speaker was a rep from the Mental Health Reform who have a campaign for stigma reduction in relation to mental health.

Mental health seminar hears that issues are growing

A SPECIAL seminar on mental health took place in Waterford recently organised by the Nigerian Community and officially opened by the Mayor of Waterford, Councillor Jim D'Arcy. Mayor Darcy said mental health and suicide were complex subjects for discussion.

He was aware that depres-sion, loneliness were in the community with drink and drugs also prevalent and adding to the problem.

Suicide was still a taboo subiect, he maintained, and even to speak about it at funerals could cause problem. Even newspapers were reluctant to mention it in death notices.

There are multi-agencies in the city to deal with such tragedies and he praised the open approach of the issue. Getting rid of stigma was needed, added the Mayor.

Michael Omoteso of the Ni-gerian Community noted how three of their community in Ireland had died from suicide in the past year and hence they wished to highlight the issue. Speaker Sarah said that

the current times couod be depressing with bad news on radio but depression affected all ages, genders and races with 300,000 Irish

reckoned to suffer from it. Affects many Dr Evelyn Obosi from Nigeria

and psychiatrist at WRH spoke of how depression affects all types of people. It was not just a woman's problem after having a baby but affected men too. We are quick to resolve our physical health but not our mental health, she pointed out.

If a person was feeling down for more than a few weeks and had a sense of hopelessness then they might have a mental health problem. There could be some family history of depression while alcohol abuse could depress the brain and added to problems. Escaping with drink was not an answer. Continued Dr Obosi: "If these symptons are present, then seek treatment by way of talking or counseling. More exercise, improved diet and going for walks are little ways to combat it. Getting enough sleep is another priority. There are many self-help programmes on the web.

"If talk therapy or counseling do not work try cognitive behaviour therapy, where people try and make improvements in their behaviour. Anti

> depressants may eventually be needed for more serious cases No magic bullet

"For younger peo-ple this should be avoided and only prozac used in a difficult case. For medicines to work. it will

take two to three weeks for the benefits to materialise. "There is no magic bullet

but a change in behaviour is what is needed. There can be long waiting-lists for mental health services. Taking drink is not good as a quick fix because afterwards it can make you more depressed.

The seminar heard that, in terms of treating teenagers, it was better to focus more on talk therapy and counseling with meds as last resort and they should be limited.

In latter times there is school bullying, peer pressure in groups and eventually some youngsters can get teen depression, this may be mild and can be overcome in a reasonable space of time. Sometimes young people can have a weight of worry with exams pressure. Lifting the weight of worry should be the goal in treatment and overcome the mild depression. A total of 4 out of 5 patients can recover in less than two years for milder depression, but getting an appointment can take twelve months for a psycholo-gist in our public system. Counseling

In certain cases, people have severe depression and experience hallucination and other mind changes. Medication will be needed in these more serious cases. Up to 10 per cent may need long term help, says the World Health Organisation. A major life event can trigger a mental health problem and the objective should be to seek help early in it and that there is light at the end of the tunnel, stressed Dr Obosi.



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Lie of the Land Waterford bucks national trend in '12 agricultural price report

WITH national agricultural land prices rising for the first time since 2006, prices in County Waterford bucked the trend by falling in 2012, according to the *Irish Farmers*

Journal's annual price report. Last year, based on 10 transactions recorded in the county, the fetched price per acre came in at $\in 8,314$, compared to €8,512 per acre in 2011. It should be noted, as the Journal's superbly compiled report does, that "Waterford had the smallest land offering in Munster and also the smallest amount of land sold". The report states: "In 2012,

25 farms comprising 1,528 acres came on to the market in the county, compared with the 19 farms comprising 1,256 acres offered for sale a year earlier.

"Of those 25 that came on the market, 19 were offered for sale by private treaty. Nine of the 25 were under 40 acres, leaving a relatively large proportion -16farms - of between 40 and 199

acres for sale in the county." The biggest sale Waterford was recorded near Kilmacthomas when a 176-acre holding was sold by private treaty. Meanwhile, a 71-acre farm in Ballylaneen was sold by action for €740,000 (€10,423 per acre); with a 113-acre farm with prime agricultural land in



Lemybrien fetching €900,000 (€7,962 per acre). Elsewhere across the south

east, prices rose, reflecting the national perspective. County Tipperary experienced a spectacular 40 per cent hike on the 2011 figure, with the average acre sold last year commanding a price of $\in 12,110$. A total of 33 completed transactions were recorded in the Premier, with almost 5,000 acres coming onto the market last year. The largest farm to come onto

the Tipp land market in 2012 was a 269-acre holding outside Kilsheelan, Carrick-on-Suir, while no less than 85 farms were offered for sale across the county.

County Kilkenny prices rose by 25 per cent last year to $\notin 13,724$ per acre (2011: €10,582) second only to Dublin when it came to the highest price paid for land in the State in 2012.

And while there were 48 farms placed on the market, nine more than was the case in the previous year, there was 500 less acres (a total of 1,837 acres) available for sale than in 2011

Land values in County Wexford rose by 18 per cent last year when compared to 2011, with the average price per acre of sold land coming in at €11,993 (2011: €10,185), while County Carlow experienced a minor increase of €10,197 per acre (2011: €10,000).

Nationally, the price report reveals that prices rose by 14.3 per cent in the State last year. Writes Report Editor Joanne Fox: "This is the first year, since we began the report six years ago, that the average price of an acre of land has risen year-on-year.

"Having survived a price

tumble of 57 per cent in the four years from 2007, followed by a levelling off in 2011, the market for agricultural land appears to be strengthening again."

Dare one suggest it, but does the *Journal's* report suggest green shoots when taking the wider economic picture into account?

Well, without getting too carried away, these figures certainly suggest a welcome step in the right direction for the rural, and indeed the national economy.

And kudos aplenty should be extended to the *Irish Farmers* Journal for producing another outstanding, insightful and detailed publication.

Politicians misleading farmers- IFA President

IFA President John Bryan last weeks accused the Minister for Agriculture of deliberately misleading farmers on the true implications of the CAP negotiations for Irish farming. President John Bryan chal-

lenged Simon Coveney to 'come clean' and reveal the full extent of the losses that productive farmers will face under his proposals. "Despite his claims that there will only be a 9% cut in their Single Farm Payment, thousands of active farmers are looking at reductions of 20% to 40%. It is grossly irresponsible of the Minister to persist with this deliberate downplaying of the outcome of the CAP Reform and the impact it will have on farm families and the growth targets in Food Har-vest 2020. Mr Coveney must toughen his position in Brussels and he cannot sell out Irish agriculture in pursuit of securing a CAP deal," he said.

Mr Bryan said politicians who were pursuing a divideand-conquer strategy were playing Russian roulette with the livelihoods of tens of thousands of farmers across the country.

"Those who are trying to pitch east versus west, or big versus small, either do not understand or are more to do with their own agenda rather than the well-being of farming. The Single Farm Payment (SFP) is not a fund that politicians can promise indiscriminately to garner favour with their constituents

He said the debate on the SFP



IFA President, John Bryan Reform must be about the viability of active farmers and support for primary produc-tion, which was the bedrock of our largest indigenous indus-try, maintaining 300,000 jobs and exports of \notin 9bn.

Mr Bryan said active, pro-ductive farmers in every parish, and of every size and enterprise, would lose 20% or more of their income if the proposals went through.

"With incomes on most farms already at a low level, this robbing Peter-to-pay-Paul, flat-earth policy, will render thou-sands of our most productive farmers unviable. As the CAP proposals stand, a large pro-portion of what is taken from productive farmers will be redistributed to inactive or hobby farmers, most of whom don't depend on farming for a living. Worse still, the more flattening that occurs, the more damage will be done to our ambitions around Food Harvest 2020, said Mr Bryan.

ICSA urges caution as farms get busy

THE Irish Cattle and Sheep Farmers' Association is urging caution as the recent spell of good weather and calving and lambing combine to make farms extremely busy at the moment.

ICSA spokesman on farm safety, John Flynn, said: "With 139,829 active farms in Ireland according to the CSO, it is estimated that around 500,000 people are exposed to health and safety risks while carrying

out farm-related activities. "Last year, 21 people lost their lives on Irish farms.

"Farming will always carry inherent risks and there is no simple solution to the problem, but I would urge farmers to take stock and prioritise farm safety at this busy time of year."

The majority of on-farm deaths last year resulted from incidents involving farm machinery and livestock. "With calving and lambing

either underway or about to get underway on the majority of farms, and the good weather leading to an increase in activities such as slurry spreading, I think that statistic is worth

noting in particular. "An increased workload can lead to fatigue and errors that would otherwise have been avoided. In addition, one thing that is always a danger is a cow after calving. "Farmers need to be extra

careful.

"It is not always easy when there is a newborn calf that needs feeding and perhaps we should be looking at rural development funds to provide support for the installation of better calving and handling facilities on farm.'





CORK Opera House celebrated and honoured Bryan Flynn with a special - a memorably special - concert to acknowledge his considerable contribution to musical theatre and show with Hey, spectacle Mr Director!. For more than ten vears Bryan Flynn has brought raw talent, inspiration and intuition, along with a whirlwind of energy to Cork and this celebration was heartfelt and overwhelming, as a cast of stars and emerging stars did what Bryan Flynn does best - entertain.

During the afternoon, I kept meeting Waterford people down for the event, and there was such a buzz in and around the venue.

Earlier, I visited the Tribute sculpture to Rory Gallagher in Paul Street to pay my respects on his birthday. Words from his songs are part of the guitar sculpture and the line "Don't paint it all so sadly", seemed very apt on the day.

It was such a pleasure and honour to be greeted by Bryan Flynn inside the foyer at Cork Opera House. I have been lucky to attend some of his greatest moments and this was special.

With the work he has done in Waterford, in Cork and throughout Ireland he has defined and redefined the passion and energy of musical theatre. His Michael Collins is a triumph, as was his early composition, Pentimenti and his fun collaboration. All Star Wars. The work he did at Christmas on the Opera House panto, Alice In Wonderland, starring Michael Joseph, was a major advance in theatrical entertainment and spectacle.

The tribute concert opened with a selection from Jesus Christ Superstar with Irene Warren in emotional form with Derek Collins as Judas and Robert Vickers as Jesus, and his Gethsemane, soared into the heavens. Michael Sands, Carol Anne Ryan and Donna Roche delighted in The Sound Of Music and Cara O'Sullivan shone out with Climb Every Mountain.

Ben Flynn was Gavroche and Irene Warren was luminous with I Dreamed A Dream. During the first half Richie Hayes - a Doyle St. and De La Salle boyhood friend and compatriot of Bryan - spoke of their association and panto legend Frank Mackey debunked the Flynn magic in uproariously deprecating style. The second half exploded with Mambo and Alex Sharpe as Anita and Eimear McCarthy as Rosalie from West Side Story, Ellie Mullane made Somewhere take on a positive note. New work by another Paul Redmond, composer, who wrote The Promise, was saluted with David Haves on keyboard, and the extract from All Star Wars, written by Bryan Flynn and Kevin McCormack with arrangements by David Haves, rocked the house. Trevor Ryan was an hilarious priest with Lynda Gough, Andrew Holden, Gillian Storan, Yvonne Cronin, Michael Joseph and the amazing Richie Hayes were in wonderful form.

Bryan's brother David provided an emotional Anthem from Chess via video link and the extract from Michael Collins was like a thunder clap of emotion, with Yvonne Cronin, Eoin Cannon, Bronwyn Andrews, Lynda Gough, Michael Grennell, Derek Collins and Irene Warren, Flying The Flag for Bryan Flynn.

West Side Story

CARRICK on Suir Musical Society celebrated 70 years in existence by putting on their 100th production. Liam Butler's production of West Side Story was a triumph of musical theatre and a tribute to the founders and performers and all who make up a proud community. This large cast musical is very difficult to put on as it needs a strong male contingent and stylish choreography that makes great demands on a company. Carrick delivered and well deserved the plaudits of sold-out houses and rapturous standing ovations.

Liam Butler's direction was precise and detailed as it delivered the social climate of racial tension, discrimination, a sickening hatred and an uplifting love story, that rose powerfully and beautifully out of a careful exploration of the text and score, with a powerhouse musical direction from Fergal Carroll. Patricia Woods achieved a detailed choreography and Liam Butler's powerful staging, set the action for a superb production and an, at times, electrifying experience.

The doomed love story of Tony and Maria is the central focus of this show and Michael Raggett was a wonderful Tony. He looked good, moved well and sang like a hero. You believed he could change the world and that his love for Maria would survive. Louise Mulcahy was sublime as Maria and there was a trusting innocence at the heart of her performance. Her Ballet with Tony was beautiful and One Hand One Heart was such a prefiguring duet. Somewhere was so hopeful that you wanted it to be so - 'hold my hand and we're halfway there'. Their work in the Finale was heartrendingly beautiful.

Dermot Keyes was menacing and authoritative as Bernardo, with a performance Joe Mantegna would have been proud of. He got inside the skin of this part and drove the hatred home just as hard and as viscerally as Bobby Landers did as Action who bristled with rage and hatred. Ray Nolan was strong as Chino and Matthew Wiliams shone as Riff Jamie Power was intense as A-Rab and Amy Walsh delighted as Anybodys.

Padraig Sheehan gave a towering performance as the bigoted Lt Shrank and Fergus Power as Doc and Seamus Power as Gladhand balanced that hatred with compassion and detail.

Sandra Power as Anita soared over all others with a superb performance full of stillness and pent-up anger. What a performance in a quality show. The girls were so impressive in, America, and the guys lit up the stage for, The Rumble and, Gee Officer Krupke.

Time and again, the emotion surged across this stage and it cut into the audience who channelled it and amplified it. The detailed Finale and curtain call were a catharsis of feelings that resonated deeply in me. **The Bluebell Stop**

own work, a two-hander with Damien McDonnell, The Bluebell Stop, at Garter Lane Arts Centre. I praise the clever way she led an audience up the garden path or out the Luas line. with two separate narratives that carried an audience along, with lots of wry humour and a gentle, almost old fashioned Maeve Binchy style of story, of two plain unexceptional people, Martin and Anita growing up and having average lives until their worlds join at the Bluebell stop. Then the amiable story darkens and traps the audience into a story that you would in one sense not want to hear, but in the theatre, not want to miss either.

The way the 'reveal' or 'twist of fate' is achieved is a clever example of control in the deceptive direction by Joe Meagher. Then there was not just the emotion of two narratives being derailed, but the double whammy of not one but two blue teddybears.

For over eighty minutes this was just two wry monologues; of Anita and her Civil Service exploits in Revenue and the hazardous business of school bullies, rural nuns, sex on legs and a randy tadpole of a man. A visit to a fortune teller and an hilarious friend Pearl who has notions of elderly Viscounts, and four suitors, PJ, AJ, CJ, and JJ (one wants to fit in, doesn't one). This alternates on a separate set with Martin in a bedsit, telling his adventures with the Russell family, Jack the father and Bulldog and Poodle, the sons.

At times Damien McDonnell was almost monotonous, until he found love with Angela and their consummation in Wynn's Hotel, with the birth of twin girls and a beautiful boy, who had a blue teddybear that they left at the Bluebell stop on the Luas, where Anita found it and how it helped her release the howls of rage and bewilderment at the death of her husband.

Then Martin's son, the baby, is diagnosed with Stage 4 inoperable cancer and his marriage falls apart as he travels up and down the Luas, looking for the woman and looking for his lost hopes and nurtured dreams. I was held like the audience in a web of sadness, almost in tears as the loss of expectation was imaged by not one but by two blue teddybears. What a powerful ending to a

wonderful piece of theatre. **Micheal O'Rourke**

WATERFORD Music hosted a novel piano recital by the wonderful Micheal O'Rourke and the American Stephen Ackert showed slides from the National Gallery of Art in Washington DC with a Debussy Prelude and developing into Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition, this was a night to remember. A special occasion. Ackert introduced the choice

of paintings and gave a brief slide show before O'Rourke took to the piano. It took me a while to settle into listening and watching and I kept wondering why this choice or that choice. I loved the mix of art styles, especially a fragmented, kite study entitled, Wind, by David Hockney, to suit, The Wind on the Plain, mixed with trees bending in a gale as turbulent passages of music, blew images hither and tither. A painting, Footsteps in the Snow suited the somber stark, lonely music that was tentative and plaintive.

The images of The Submerged Cathedral, slipped away from me and I kept thinking of Jim Webb's, McArthur Park, 'melting in the dark' Mussorgsky composed,

Pictures in an Exhibition as an elegy or tribute to a dead artist friend, Victor Alexandrovich Hartmann, but many of the Hartmann pictures that inspired the work are not available. Ackert made excellent choices to accompany this wonderful piano piece. A series of repeating Promenades introduced the musical sequences and

O'Rourke showed his virtuoso style to admirable effect here.

The stately notes gave way to a going into that good night of death and sadness. I loved the fear in the, With the Dead and the Language of the Dead, sequence, where the visual image was skull hovering over a writing figure. The Russian folktales of the Baba Yaga (The Witch), had great dramatic tone and the music built up into the dramatic bell tones in The Great Gate of Kiev, painted by Hartmann but never built. The music matched the impressive arched Gate and this alternated with images of Russian ikons (icons) with peaceful tones gathering into an elegiac hammering of bells.

For an encore Micheal O'Rourke surpassed himself with the atmospheric, Fireworks by Debussy.

Art in Dungarvan

THE Old Market House Arts Centre in Dungarvan has a trio of artists on view and there is much to savour and enjoy. Seeders by Corina Duyn and Pascale De Connick and a striking set of Oils on Canvas by Mary Tritschler typify what I like about this gallery. Her wild and open canvases, full of sky and landscape, angry skies, slashes and splashes of paint in turmoil and catching the moment, before the artist scrapes back to an atmospheric vision. There is a coastal wildness in Tritschler's work that suits the location. Heart soul and eye are in her work. Seeders is a much more

thoughtful set of tapestries, installations and nature sculptures. Corina Duvn is the author of some exceptional books, that tell of her struggles in an elemental world in, Hatched. The sculpture work exemplifies her work in wonderful, children's fiction where people and creatures fit snugly into a landscape of place and imagination. De Connick takes a more detailed look at the role of the hand in the making of art. The collaboration works well and would attract family visitors. This is a fine exhibition full of nature and wonder.

On a more critical note, I was there for the opening and there was no printed sheet or information to take away. If the Dungarvan arts are to merge or take over with the conjoining of City and County authorities, I hope Dungarvan are not calling the shots, if a photocopier is beyond them.

Joe Harney

MUSICIAN/composer Joe Harney aka Deaf Joe was the featured performer for the March, Music at the Museum lunchtime concert. He used to play in a local band Deaf Animal Orchestra and his work is meditative, rather than easy listening. From the programme presented on keyboards and guitar with Peter Vogelaar on double bass, this is a young man who does not fall into an easy category. He is not particularly interested in lyrical or meaningful words and his style is to elongate vowel sounds, more for the soundscape than in the cognitive sense.

He rambled on in a pleasant fashion and he knows he is not in the performing/entertaining business. He could be part of the laptop digital sampling world, living between headphones and soundscapes. I could see why he is attracted to sound designing; last year he designed sound on Red Kettle's production of, Bevond The Brooklyn Sky.

On this showing his influences are a nod toward John Martyn and, curiously, Brian Wilson of The Beach Boys. His languid style of elongating vowels so that 'alright' has six or seven vowel sounds, is pleasing. At times it was like eavesdropping on a sound composer mixing and sampling a honey drone in a mellow drome.

I got the impression that he would be happier being described as an ambient music composer. Not a lunchtime act but definitely not a piano bar style and his closing choice of The Beach Boys, God Only Knows, spoke more eloquently than he did.

"I finished with primary school before I was thirteen and then spent another two years going to the 'Tech in Portlaw, where we made shoe boxes and coat racks by the dozen learned all about dovetail joints and made glue from boiled cow-hooves



From Butlerstown, Pat is son of Larry and Valerie Cosgrave and attended St Paul's Community College followed by Waterford Institute of Technology (WIT) where he studied Manufacturing Engineering, finishing in 2005. "I was lucky to exit my studies before the global financial crisis when there were plenty of jobs available for young, educated individuals," said Pat.

He spent some time working with Dell in Limerick but decided to leave Ireland and travel the world between 2007 and 2008.

"It was during this trip that I visited Australia for the first time and got a good flavour of what life was like there which would prove useful when faced with the option of a more permanent move in the future."

at first but after a few months found a professional position with a reputable company." It was while living in London that Pat met his future wife

Jennifer (Jen) from Australia. "We were faced with making a difficult choice after about a year of our relationship because her visa for the UK was to expire in 2011 without the possibility of extension.

"Our choices were to move to Ireland or move to Australia. This really was a no brainer for mainly economic reasons," said Pat.

Pat moved to Melbourne in April 2012, some months after Jen had already returned to her native country. "It took me a few months

"It took me a few months to find a permanent job. Even Australia is suffering from the global economic situation, although probably less so than most others. "Now I work with a logistics

He continued: "Regarding work, the Australians have the right attitude to it.

and likes to avail of any opportunities to participate in outdoor pursuits. "I'm into cycling and triathlons when my motivation is high and I think there is hardly any better place in the

hardly any better place in the world to be if you like such outdoor pursuits. "Jen and I live a two minute walk from the beach in

walk from the beach in Brighton (a Melbourne suburb) where, when it's windy, the water is packed with kite surfers and wind surfers and when it's calm there are plenty of people swimming.

He misses the Irish sense of 'craic' and said the Australian countryside was another major difference which took some getting used to. "The country here is brown,



THIS St Patrick's Day, a local aid worker living in Zimbabwe has sent thanks to the people of Waterford all the way from Africa.

"On St Patrick's Day people at home will be celebrating all that is good about being Irish, said Eithne Brennan, who works for the development agency, Trocaire.

The Cutting of Fenor Tree



Axing of Mobility Allowance

LOCAL Fianna Fail Councillor Eacon Aylward says the Government's axing of the Mobility Allowance and the Motorised Transport Grant Scheme is another slap in the face for the most vulnerable. Cllr Aylward stated: "This is an

appalling cut that again targets the most vulnerable in our society. There are a number of hugely worrying aspects to this announcement.

"There was no advance warning, no engagement with the groups who represent people that

stand to lose 20 per cent of an income which is already means tested.

Mobility Allowance "The was bought in by a Fianna Fail Government so that people could leave their homes unassisted, giving them a little respite and a chance to experience some independence.

"The Government has taken the easy option against the most vulnerable in our society and scrapped the allowances altogether.


"This is another example of penny pinching at the expense of the most disadvantaged. It directly affects and targets those who cannot walk and are housebound, which is indefensible. They have had to contend already with decreases in their fuel allowances, increases in their utility bills and cuts to their telephone and gas allowances."

He added: "In the last 12 months, there have been cuts to Home Help hours, Personal Assistance Grants, the Domiciliary Care Allowance and the Respite Care Grant.

"It is blatantly obvious that this Government has cruelly targeted the most vulnerable in our society for cut after cut. I urge the Government to seriously reconsider reinstating these allowances cuts.'

Blessing of 'Little Angel Space' in Kilmacow

RECENTLY, a very special occasion occurred in Kilmacow cemetery - the blessing of the newly constructed 'Little Angel Space³

Many people carry within their hearts the scars caused by the loss of a little one.

Whatever the timing and circumstances of that loss, the pain of never being able to ritualise that little life in a physical way has caused considerable heartache - and for many the memory can take them back years, even decades. In an attempt to heal that hurt, the 'Little Angel Space' was created by the CE participants (formerly known as the FAS team) in conjunction with the Parkside Community from Belmont in Ferrybank.

A beautiful piece of bog oak, possibly as much as 2,000 years old, was acquired in Co Kildare and stripped down, cleaned and treated. A low

stone wall was constructed with a paved sandstone path and a commemorative stone was installed which simply read 'Briefly in our Lives, Forever

in our Hearts'

Beech hedging and shrubs were also planted to create a haven for those who feel the need for such a little space in their lives

The Mass of the Angels was celebrated with the combined choirs from the three primary schools in the locality of Kilmacow and everyone present was invited to place commemorative pebble а provided to serve as a reminder of a little life briefly lived but

always remembered. Sincere thanks to Fr Brian Flynn for both his generosity in supporting this initiative and for the great gentleness and empathy he showed in making this occasion so special.

All are also indebted to the teachers of the schools for their help and to all those who contributed to such a beautiful liturgy.

Safety on the Farm must be Top Priority for 2013

KEEPING the yard clean and ensuring that everything is where it should be can silly drastically reduce accidents.

It is important when you employ anyone that you tell them to think safety first when they are doing any job and point out all possible dangers on the farm that they may encounter. Show them where the First

Aid Kit is and inform them where chemicals and acid are stored Most care must be taken when

children are about and in some cases forbidding them access to the vard is essential.

Tractor Maintenance

THE farm tractor has come through the Winter and it is a good idea to check how many hours it has done since the last oil change.

I like to change the oil and filter after 300 hours work done. or sometimes if the oil is very black or has metal fragments I may change it before then.

Give your tractor a visual check for tyre pressure and breaks because ignoring a problem will let it get worse.

Electric Fence

A NUMBER of years ago l put three earth rods connected together by a strong electric

Rathgormack insulated wire into the ground for my old electric fence and the difference was enormous.

Spray in under wires when conditions allow and right or replace old stakes that may be rotten at the ends.



Glanbia to be queried on future of co-op field

AT THE monthly meeting of Carrick-on-Suir Town Council, Councillor Sylvia Cooney-Sheehan sought clarification on the ownership of the Co-Op field in Carrickbeg so that the development of this site as a park can be addressed swiftly. Cllr Cooney-Sheehan was told that the land in question is owned by Glanbia, to which the Councillor replied by requesting the Council to write to the Company asking if it would sell or lease the site.

Mayor Liam Walsh understood that the Council had previously been in contact with Glanbia about this matter and was of the view that it might be better if the Carrickbeg Development Association made direct contact with the Company. Cllr Pierce O'Loughlin said whoever was responsible for the land needed to survey the land needed to manage it in a better manner than its current condition "and gives a very bad impression of the town'

Cllr Cooney-Sheehan tabled Notice а second of Motion requesting the Council to endeavour to secure a commitment from the National Museum that the coin collection found recently in Cooney's Bar would have a public day's viewing in Ormond Castle. She also hopes that the replicas of the coins would have a permanent home in the Castle with the intent of boosting local tourism.


Town Clerk Michael O'Brien said that as most of the land



A night in the 'West Side Story' life

6.40pm: Many of the cast are already at the Strand Theatre by the time I (who played the part of Bernardo for the show's

eight-night run) arrive. A good deal are suited, booted and made up for the night's performance by the time I'm sat in a dressing room seat, getting my hair blow-dried and all manner of hairspray, mousse and what not applied to my scalp.

Then, with microphone strapped in place, I take a with handbrake turn over to the make-up artists who turn me from pasty-skinned paddy into a bronze-visaged Puerto Rican

The facial hair I've grown (all on my own!) for the part adds to the threatening menace I'm expected to exude as Bernardo every night.

He's a highly-pumped kinda guy. If a Jet's knife hadn't finished him off, a heart attack at 45 would probably have done the trick.

7.10pm: The music is pumping through the dressing room stereo as the cast warms up for the night's production.

The soundtrack of choice s decidedly more Beat 102-103 than Lyric, reflecting the youthful age of those on stage, with a few notable exceptions, including this almost 34-year-old! I was just shy of 17 the first time I took to the Strand Theatre stage for a CBS/ Scoil Mhuire production of 'Godspell'. Half a lifetime ago for me.

Where has the time gone? 7.30pm: Some extremely

punctual patrons are making their way into the Dick Meany Auditorium while the orchestra led by Fergal Carroll, descends into the pit for their pre-show limbering.

I've got a script on either side of the stage just in case I need it (you can never be too sure!) while there's even time for us to have a post-production nibble; the cakes all week have been A1- just look at my midriff and you'll see where a lot of it has vanished to!

There's an excited air among the cast as showtime beckons. Director Liam Butler and Choreographer Patricia Woods wish us well as we get ready, well, at least some of us, to Rumble!

8pm: Curtain-up, only there's no curtain as the 'West Side Story' stage is open throughout the 130-minute running time.

A fence is positioned on the front of the stage which will be hauled above us after the Jets and Sharks have their first mini dust-up during the Prologue, a portent of what's to follow come the Rumble at the end of Act One.

Seeing over 20 men dancing on a Strand stage is relatively unheard of, as is the case in most Irish musical societies. as a lack of male participation outside the principal roles is almost a rule of thumb in most cases

Thankfully, for the second successive year in the wake of last year's 'All Shook Up', there's no such problem in Carrick at present. And considering many of

Jets and Sharks on stage are not vet even 20, the society's future

looks very promising. Very promising indeed.

There are 34 Jets and Sharks girlfriends on stage too, and there's little doubt that principal actresses for future productions lie among them.

There's no concealing the fact that there's

s o m e fantastic talent on stage, and hopefully will be for years to come

The Society, as Liam said at the end of our second dress rehearsal, "is in fantastic shape the future looks bright." 9.20pm: Intermission time. In reality, it's two-thirds time in the context of the production's duration, and the show is, as it

has done on each other run, just hopped along, augmented by a most receptive audience. We've had a minor scuffle, a full-blown fight, young love blossoming and two killings thus far.

Leading players Michael Raggett and Louise Mulcahy both look and sound just as one would have hoped Tony and Maria to look and sound.

'West Side Story is not an easilyshow sung that both Michael and Louise have made it look so easy is testament to how many hours they've put into this since they were cast last October. And it's been an absolute pleasure to among their supporting cast, which also features Sandra features Power as Anita, as striking a stage

presence as ever.

By the way, since Bernardo snuffed it just as Act One ends, I'm moreorless done for the night!

9.40pm: We're off again as Act Two begins, and the sadness of the on-stage tale unfolds and intensifies.

A 'dream sequence' sees peace break out between Jets and Sharks, which brings Bernardo and Riff (played brilliantly by Matthew Williams – a name to watch out for, mark my words) briefly re-appear in a fantasy wedding ballet.

wedding ballet. This sequence is the closest 'West Side Story' gets to a happy ending, and is followed by a wonderful number, 'Officer Krupke', featuring the Jets, with proud Saint Mollerans' clubman Bobby Landers, producing a rib. Landers producing a rib-tickling, all-energy rendition of the show's most comedic number

Bobby's a born natural on the

stage. **10.25pm:** Our tale, as is the scripted wont of any Shakespearean-inspired tragedy, ends in further bloodshed when Chino, tragedy. Bernardo's right-hand man (played by Ray Nolan, one of the Society's hardest working members and a great friend of mine) fatally shoots Tony. Maria nurses Tony's limp

frame as they hold each other for the last time, before the Jets and Sharks carry his body off the New York streets (the on-stage design the brainchild of Chris Hennessy).

Our show has ended, the cast takes its bow, and, perhaps

the greatest validation a cast, production crew and backstage team can ever wish for, the audience rises to its feet.

10.45pm: After the hugs, kisses, handshakes, there's the make-up removal and showering which is, of course, followed by some more hugs, kisses and handshakes, there's some rumination in the Strand Theatre bar.

A few of us are already talking about the pantomime at Halloween, a few social gettogethers in the interim, the 70th anniversary concert to be held later this year and, of course, what we'll sink our teeth into for next year's musical production.

"I don't know how many people begged me not to waste time on something that my could not possibly succeed,' said 'West Side Story composer Leonard Bernstein. "A show full of hatefulness and

ugliness." Well how right Bernstein was to stay the course with his re-telling of 'Romeo And Juliet'.

There are 63 people who appeared on stage for eight nights in Carrick-on-Suir, ending last Saturday with a right good post-show knees-up, who are grateful he did.

We mamboed. We walked tall.

And do you know what? We bloody well rocked. See you all again next year.

Matt Keane meets... Sean Dower has seen it and done it all

S EAN Dower is in many ways an extraordinary person. Born on the 14th of September 1947 he is first and foremost a proud Waterford man, and for many vears he has worn that pride

on his sleeve. He has been deeply involved in politics, sport, light entertainment and many other walks of life and he has at all time strived to do what ever he could for the city he adores. Sean's parents, James and

May (née Power) lived at 7 Andrew Street (New Lane) as indeed did his brother Michael.

Last week I sat down with Sean and his story proved to be enlightening to say the very least.

"I began my education in the Convent of Mercy under the guidance of Sr Anthony up to my First Holy Communion. I then went to Mount Sion Primary and Secondary School and later on I was honoured to serve as Secretary and President of the Past Pupils Union," said Sean as we began our conversation. He married Margaret James on the 27th March, 1974 and the happy couple have two sons, Jamie and Adrian and

one daughter, Corinna. They are proud grandparents of Gabriel (8) and Jack (6)

who are the sons of Jamie, and Olivia (2) who is the daughter of Adrian. Jamie is employed with Ernst and Young while Adrian works with M.K.Brazil. Corinna is a valued member of the Azzurri Ltd.

Sean and Margaret reside at 60 Morrisson's Avenue in the heart of the old city.

Sport had always played a big part in Sean's life as he explained.

He said: "I played soccer at Under 12 and 14 with a club called Maryville who were run by the late Tommy Walker. I also played hurling

Walker. I also played hurling with Ballybricken in the Street League's and junior hurling with Gael Og. "I was present when Waterford played Kilkenny in the 1957 All Ireland Final and the FAI Cup final between Waterford and St Patrick's Athletic in 1959, which went to a replay. to a replay.

"We lost those games in both codes, but thankfully I was present when Waterford won the All Ireland in 1959 and the Blues won the cup in 1980.

"My love affair with Waterford FC stretches back

a long time.

"I worked in the ACEC from 1963 to 1974 and that was a great time for the club. "They won the league in 1965-66 and Don Kennedy was the chairman during that period

"Mr Kennedy was the boss at the ACEC and he asked me to help out the soccer club and it proved to be a wonderful time.

"I travelled with the team to Cyprus when they played Omonia Nicosia in the European Cup and also to many other places as Tour Manager.

"Another of my duties was to keep a check on the gate receipts at league and cup games.

"In those days the home club would keep 70 per cent of the takings and the away club 30 per cent.

"The away fixtures proved to be interesting to say the least.

"Sean Carroll at Shamrock Rovers and Dan Morrissey at Cork Hibernians were true gentlemen to deal with, but we did run into trouble with some of the other clubs.

"I can recall one day in Donegal when we played Finn Harps. "We noticed lots of people

streaming into to the ground in one corner of the ground. "When I went over to check

what was happening I saw a man with a bag collecting money and ushering the fans through a hole in a ditch," laughed Sean as he recalled that particular occasion.

"I served until 2004 and I would like to think that I worked hard for the people in my ward during that five year period"

On that day the legendary David Herd, the former Manchester United (a club Sean has supported since the mid 50s) player was playing with Waterford.

Sean's voice became one of the most recognisable in the South East during the glory

days of the Blues because he was also the public address announcer at Kilcohan Park for many years.

Sean makes no secret of his love for the GAA in his native

city. "I am proud to say that I have been a life long supporter of Mount Sion Hurling and Football Club and I also support all of the county's hurling teams.

"I rarely miss a game when

"Politics has at all times played a major role in his life, and he is a card carrying member of Fianna Fail.

"When quizzed on his area of his busy life, Sean informed me of his rather dramatic election in 1999. "I joined the party in the late 60s and I did all I could

to help out on the local scene. 'I was asked to run for the Waterford City Council in 1999 and I was elected at my first attempt.

"That was a proud day not only for me but for all of the family.

"I served until 2004 and I would like to think that I worked hard for the people in my ward during that five year period."

Sean worked in the ACEC from 1963 to 1974 and he then moved on to the Waterford Ironfoundry where he remained until 2000

During his period of time on the City Council he built up an excellent working relationship with Martin Cullen and when his Fianna Fail colleague was appointed Minister of Environment, Heritage and Local Government in 2002

Sean was asked by Martin to become his personal assistant. Sean jumped at the opportunity and the two Waterford men formed a waterfold men formed a superb partnership which became widely acknowledged by friends and foe alike. Sean expanded on what proved to be eight exciting

years. "Martin went on to become Minister of Transport (2004-2007) Minister of Social and Family Affairs (2007-2008) and Minister of Arts, Sport and Tourism (2008-2010) and I learnt a lot during that time.

"Some people might have wanted a pot-hole outside their home to be fixed while others would require a life saving operation quickly.

"Martin retired from politics in March 2010 due to a chronic back ailment and I believe he worked extremely hard for Waterford during his time in office.

"He remains a good friend of mine I am happy to say.'

Sean became synonymous Waterford with the International Festival of Light Opera for many years and concluding our conversation he lamented on how this wonderful event came to an end.

am a former Chairman and Vice-Chairman of The Theatre Royal and I was involved with the Opera Festival from 1980 until 2009.

"During those 29 years I worked voluntary as House Manager, General Secretary, Chairman and Vice-Chairman and it saddens me that it no longer continues as an annual event.

"It was a fantastic success and it is something else that hopefully can be brought back in some shape of form in the future," he said. Sean is a now a member of

the Dunmore East Golf Club and he plays a couple of times a week with his friends Tony Browne Snr, Jim Griffin and Pat Simpson.

As stated at the outset he is a proud Waterfordian and he has served the Deise superbly for many years.

In many years, does not get the credit he deserves, but in truth he is not the sort of person to seek credit for all he has done.

The exact dimensions of his work in many areas may never be fully revealed, but he can be justifiably proud of putting a great deal more into life that he will ever take out of it.

FOR the second successive League outing, Waterford required a late point to secure a positive outcome, with Sunday's draw with Cork at Fraher Field leaving them as joint leaders with the Rebels after two rounds.

This game was played in, to be put it mildly, terrible conditions. Heavy rain fell in the area overnight and continued to come pouring down throughout the game. Rarely, even in this part of Ireland well accustomed to a biting wind, has a game gone ahead in such treacherous elements.

Indeed had this game been called off, few if any would have complained, chief among them the players of course.

But such a call would surely have had to have been made early in the day as once supporters began to enter the ground, it would be hard to pick who had parted with their cash to return it to them from those who'd entered using official passes.

This proved the proverbial game of two halves, largely due to the strong wind blowing in from the riverside.

Waterford captain Kevin Moran won the toss and wisely with the conditions the way they were opted to play with the winds at their backs. The feeling was that the Deise

needed to be seven or eight points up at the break and that's exactly how it transpired.

The home side made full use of the elements in the first half, retiring to the warmth of the dressing room with an eight-point lead at the break.

Pauric Mahony, who put in a massive shift all afternoon long, finished the first half as the game's leading scorer, registering a hat-trick of frees between the first and the 33rd minutes.

Brian O'Halloran, who produced a magnificent National League debut against Clare finishing the game with four points also impressed in this game, hitting two points in the opening half.

Meanwhile, Seamus Prendergast seems to be revelling in the roll as the side's most experienced player hit three points from play.

Ryan 'almost disappointed' as Waterford snatch result

WATERFORD manager Michael Ryan admitted that he was 'almost disappointed' despite his side's joint lead of Division 1A in the wake of Sunday's draw with Cork at Fraher Field.

"I felt we could have won the game, to be honest, but having said that, with three minutes to go, we were two points behind against a Cork team that were on the rise, playing against a strong wind, and I thought we put in a fantastic finished, scored two great points and fully deserved the draw."

points and fully deserved the draw." One of the notable aspects of Sunday's display was Waterford's tremendous fitness levels, given that the match was effectively played in conditions more suited for crosscountry running in nearby Saint Augustine's.

Time and time again they dug deep, and the manner of their late rally was a source of great encouragement to the Deise faithful.

"We've worked very hard in training over the last 18 months," Ryan felt. "We've a lot of young lads, we've a good blend of youth and experience and I think we're starting to show the benefits of the efforts that these guys have put in over the last while."

He added: "Physically, I'd say there's still more work to be done but we'll just get on with things now and move onto the next game in Nowlan Park on Monday week." When asked if the match should

"Conditions were very poor, there's no question about it. I'd a brief conversation with Pat McAuliffe (RTE) before the start of the match and, particularly at the far end of the field; there was an awful lot of surface water.

"Maybe it shouldn't have been played, but now that it's over and we both have a point, I think we're probably glad with that, because there's a lot of fixtures coming up and the last thing we'd want is fixture congestion, so I'm glad we got a point."

Ryan said he was disappointed with the manner in which Stephen Moylan's 41st minute goal came about given that Waterford lost possession of the ball just seconds earlier.

"We'd spoken about this before the game, a goal was going to be a huge score today and whoever got a goal was going to have a serious amount of momentum.

"But having said that, we kept battling away, we kept at it and at it and at it; and as I've always said, the only score line that matters is the one at the final whistle."

Admitting that he would have taken three points from a possible four before the start of the campaign, Ryan said he was encouraged with how his team had dealt with two tight finishes against Clare and Cork. "We could have lost either of those

two games, but we didn't. We battled very hard, and that's going to be very important for the development of these lads going forward.

"But having said that, Nowlan Park on Monday week represents a severe test for our fellas.



"So we'll prepare well during the next week, move on, go down there, give a performance and see where that takes us."

National Hurling League Division 1A Waterford thinking big as scalded Cats await

WHEN the fixtures for this year's National Leagues were released last winter, some voiced disappointment with the scheduling of some fixtures on the March Bank Holiday Monday.

Some opposition came from supporters in the Déise who recalled a trip to Thurles for a Munster Championship match against Clare on the June Bank holiday, a date which failed to generate too positive a response at the turnstiles.

Given the All-Ireland Club Finals' sacrosanct position on March 17th, which on this particular occasion falls on a Sunday, Croke Park scheduled the meeting of Kilkenny and Waterford for 2pm next Monday in Nowlan Park.

The wisdom of such a decision, with Galway facing Tipperary at the same time in Salthill, shall only be assessed in due course. No doubt we'll have one or two things to say on the matter next week!

Waterford will, of course, go into this game in a buoyant mood. Against all the odds they have collected three points from a maximum of four in their opening two games in this year's League, three points more than what was secured after two games last year.

The impressive but hardly unexpected win (well, at least in these parts) at Cusack Park was followed up with a draw against a Cork side which had annihilated Tipperary in round one.

In both outings, Waterford did remarkably well to take three points from a maximum of four and will be looking to take some further points this weekend.

Some will see this as the perfect time to take on an injury-hit Kilkenny side in the wake of narrow successive defeats to Galway and Tipperary and some may suggest that confidence is somewhat low in the Kilkenny camp right now.

However, a scalded cat never stays off its paws for too long, and Kilkenny could well be at their most dangerous in front of a home crowd demanding victory.

Manager Brian Cody doesn't like losing games, be it a Walsh Cup match in January or the big one in September, and he will not want to see his side succumb to a defeat to their neighbours on Monday next.

Given that there are only six teams in Division 1A and with five of those sides having collected points after the opening two rounds of games, Cody knows it's important that they don't drop any more points. If they do, they could well, remarkably, find themselves in a relegation dog fight. Kilkenny know they have to start

Kilkenny know they have to start winning games, starting with the visit of Waterford and one expects them to treat their three remaining games like

Championship outlings. The reigning League and All-Ireland champions have experience aplenty in their panel, and have, for most of Cody's reign, been able to draft players into the team that other counties can only dream of.

They have a sensational ability to register goals, and are readily capable of hitting 25 to 30 scores per game.

If Kilkenny do set about making up for the defeats against Galway and Tipperary, they have a psychological edge over Waterford.

While confidence will be high in the Waterford camp, especially having come from behind against Clare and Cork to get results.

Cork to get results. However you can't but feel, if Kilkenny click on the day, they should have too much for Waterford, but Waterford cannot be counted out easily. All the ingredients are in place for an absolute belter on Noreside.

Waterford GAA mourns **loss of Tony Mansfield**

IT is with regret that we record the death of well-known Waterford Gael Tony Mansfield who passed away at the Bon Secours Hospital in Cork on Sunday last following a brief illness.

Tony was a man who adored the GAA. He filled many roles in the association, as a player, a manager and of course as a reporter with the Dungarvan Newspaper where he had a weekly column dating back four decades

As a player, Tony played with his beloved Abbeyside club and was part of the Waterford panel that won the 1963 Munster Senior Hurling Championship before losing a classic All-Ireland Final to an Eddie Keherinspired Kilkenny.


Once his playing days were over he turned his hand to coaching. He guided the Abbeyside/

Ballinacourty club to many successes and was involved in different sides that captured titles from Under-14 to Under-21.

While Tony may be best known as a hurling man, at a club level he tasted most success in the big ball game.

In the late 1970s he took over as manager of the Ballinacourty club and guided then to three County Finals. He later took up a manager/trainer position with the Colligan Rockies and guided them to County Final glory in the mid-1980s.

Tony was also one of Waterford's most successful ever inter-county managers, leading the Deise to



The great Tony Mansfield, who passed away in Cork on Sunday last. three major successes, the Under-21 losing to Kilkenny in the All-Ireland Munster hurling title in 1974, defeating Clare in the final before Final In 1992, Tony was again in charge

when Waterford beat Clare in the Munster Under-21 Final before going on to claim the All-Ireland title at Nowlan Park after victory over Offaly. He also had stints in charge of the Waterford senior hurling teams, taking over following the historic low of the mid-1980s, guiding the team to the Munster Final against Tipperary,

having seem Cork after an epic semifinal replay. In the mid-90s, Tony again took over as senior bainisteoir and was, prior to Michael Ryan's appointment, the last Waterford native to manage our senior

hurling team. For over four faithful decades, Tony Mansfield served as GAA correspondent with the Dungarvan *Observer* and built up a network of fellow Gaels whom he could call upon to assist with reports for matches which he was unable to attend himself. Like his fellow reporter Johnny Murphy who died less than a month ago, he was very generous with his time and was able to provide comprehensive reports to colleagues when they too were unable to bilocate.

when Tony was away on Even holiday, he'd often ring someone he knew would be at a particular game to receive updates, and was known to contact a second, even a third person to see if they were of the same view! His views on the game were well respected and from time to time Tony would take a call during a match from someone that wasn't present enquiring as to how it the game was going. He was forthright. He was straight.

He was honest. And he was widely respected.

Tony was also a mind of information. At times when it was felt in the press box that a sub coming on may be wearing a different numbered shirt to which he was named on the programme, Tony would up sticks, head for the bench and enquire about which player was going on was.

Not only would Tony come back with his name but with a mini-biography! His was a marvellous talent.

Henceforth, the Fraher Field press box in particular shall be a much different place to what it once was for so many eventful, entertaining years.

Only a few weeks we lost John A Murphy and now Tony, two men that loved the banter that goes on in the press box during the course of a game. To his wife Moira, his daughter Caroline, his sons Michael and Brendan, his daughter-in-laws and extended family, we extent our deepest sympathy. May he rest in peace.

Dermot Keyes adds: Tony Mansfield was an exemplary clubman, an outstanding Deiseman and a thorough gentleman.

His depth of knowledge was virtually unparalleled from a playing and managerial perspective, and his well-humoured press box jousting with his recently deceased colleague John A Murphy has left both our trade and games permanently diminished. May the sod of his beloved Waterford rest lightly upon him.

"Sit down, sit down, for f*ck's sake," said one. "Go home if you're going –

don't stand there like spares at a wedding" bellowed another. Even those who have attended mass that morning are now roused to a hoarse outpouring of the most vile and blasphemous language. Everybody has to stand up.

As if that's not bad enough, some are so anxious to get an unimpeded view that they stand up on the concrete seating. It ends up with everybody balancing themselves on the concrete, swaying precariously as the ball flies up and down the field. Except for one sour-faced man.

An old hurling injury to one knee prevents him clambering up. He can hear the roars of excitement but can see nothing except the heaving backs of those in front of him; he totally misses the riveting finish. "If I had John Wayne's two

"If I had John Wayne's two Colt 45's I'd blow away a good few of them early leavers," he said with simmering vengefulness as the final whistle went. "That's the last time I'm coming to this hole to try to see a game."

Who are the members of the Early Leavers Brigade? Some are team followers only; they're not really lovers of the game of hurling with all its skills.

If their side is well on top they head for the exits, smiling delightedly. On the other hand if their team is being beaten out of site they don't want to be around to see the coup-degrace delivered.

Perhaps the most famous episode of fans leaving early to celebrate a victory was in the All-Ireland of 1994 between Offaly and Limerick. The Munster champions were

the better side by far and with six minutes to go they were five points up. The Limerick followers, starved of success since 1973, were elated. Some decided there and then

to head out to Gill's pub to begin the celebrations and to watch on TV the presentation of the Liam MacCarthy cup to the Limerick captain.

Making their way from Croke Park they heard two volcanic roars followed by a series of explosions of cheering; they presumed it was Limerick finishing off the hapless Offalymen. They rushed into Gill's and looked at the TV just in time to see a man in an Offaly jersey going up to accept the cup. "Wouldn't you think the Limerick captain would keep his own jersey on for the presentation instead of swapping it with one of the losers," uttered one fan disapprovingly.

They were utterly shellshocked when they were told that Offaly had scored two quick goals followed by a succession of points in the last minutes of the game to win the All-Ireland.

Of course, there has always been a totally legitimate tradition of leaving games before the final whistle.

"Ah, I want to get on the road before the traffic builds up. We have a long journey to Bunmahon"

"The cows are waiting to be milked,"

"We have to catch the five-oclock excursion train"

However, there are some reasons that do not stand up to scrutiny. There was a man famous for leaving before the end of the game in Walsh Park, disturbing others as he did so.

"I can't hang around. I've work to do," he'd say to anyone who complained. He gave the impression of having serious duties to perform, difficult tasks to undertake.

However, one day a group of fellows who knew him happened to go into Flynn's Pub where they found him, sweat running down his face, well into his third pint.

He was beginning to clear his throat, a sure sign that he would soon inflict The Castle of Dromore in his hoarse tones on those within earshot.

"Work to be done, ay?" they threw at him as he grinned somewhat sheepishly.



However Piltown's third goal did arrive on 85 minutes, and surely this was the goal of the season to date. Delightful build-up play resulted in



Minority sports' struggle for recognition

PICTURE the scenario; Ireland beat England to take third place at The European Championships in France in three years' time and the ensuing celebrations countrywide mirror the exhilarating, crazy days of Italia '90.

The players are feted as heroes and pages upon pages of newspapers and hours of television coverage are devoted to Ireland's magnificent achievement. Twitter and Facebook struggle to cope as Ireland's ascent to the third best team in Europe is tweeted worldwide.

For Ireland's athletes though finishing third in Europe is just another sports story. Ten days ago Fionnuala Britton and Ciaran O'Lionaird won bronze medals at the European Indoor

Championships in Gothenburg. Their accomplishment was dutifully reported over the weekend but the athletes will not expect any further recognition or adulation.

Athletics is a minority sport in Ireland which despite its relative success struggles for recognition behind Gaelic games, soccer and rugby. Yet this country consistently produces athletes capable of competing and winning at the very highest level

Apart from Britton's and O'Lionaird's medal-winning performances Derval O'Rourke was just outside the medals in fourth while Cíara Everard finished sixth in the 800m final.

Another very promising young athlete Amy Foster reached the semi-final of the 60m while medal hope Brian Gregan was unlucky not to reach the final of the 400m having been tripped in the final. With the World Championships

scheduled for Moscow in August there's much to look forward to for Ireland's athletes. But athletics isn't the only successful sport struggling for recognition.

Boxing is, by some distance, our

most successful Olympic sport, with our pugilists having won 16 Olympic medals between them, four more than the sum total of all other Olympic medals won in Irish colours. Yet the sport, to be frank, hardly enjoys a high

profile outside of Olympic Year. Just seven months ago our boxers

were the toast of the country as they fought their way to four medals at the

London Olympics.

household name it could well be another three-and-a-half years, when the build-up to the Rio De Janeiro games begins in earnest, before we hear the names of John Joe Nevin, Paddy Barnes and Michael Conlon

again. While Katy Taylor did win the RTE Sports Star Personality of the year for 2012 perhaps the awards ceremony for 2006 best illustrates the difficulty minority sports athletes encounter in attaining recognition.

At the 2006 IAAF World Indoor Championships Derval O'Rourke broke the Irish national record twice on her way to winning the gold medal in the 60m hurdles to become the first Irish woman to win a World Indoor athletics title.

Outdoors, O'Rourke broke the Irish record for the 100m hurdles twice and at the European Championships she finished joint second with Kirsten Bolm behind Susanna Kallur in the 100m hurdles final.

And at the same Championships the Cork athlete ran the first leg of the Irish 4x100m relay team which set a new national record

The 2006 'enlightened' panel of experts which included Eamon Dunphy, George Hook, Pat Spillane, Cyril Farrell, Ted Walsh and Jerry Kiernan overlooked O'Rourke's achievements.

Instead, they gave the award to Henry Shefflin, a supreme talent no doubt, but surely O'Rourke, who has been such a consistent achiever in a global individual sport, merited the honour that particular year.

ALEX Ferguson should have spoken to the media after Manchester United's Champions Real elimination to League Madrid

He should also have shaken hands with Chelsea manager Rafael Benitez before Sunday's topsy-turvy FA Cup tie at Old Trafford.

That he did neither says more about Ferguson than it does about any victimisation he occasionally harbours towards either the media or a managerial opponent he feels remotely threatened by. The irascible manner which

Ferguson frequently deploys managerial against foes demonstrates a point that's been repeatedly made by John Giles over the years when assessing the Man United manager's character. Giles believes that Ferguson's

softened attitude in recent years to both Arsene Wenger and Jose Mourinho is based on the following logic (a) Arsenal are no longer a threat to Man United and (b) Mourinho no longer works in England.

Should 'The Special One' return to Chelsea – why he'd want to do this escapes me given the antics of

Ferguson lets himself down again

the Bond Villain who owns the club - will Ferguson remain as pally with Mourinho? I suspect not.

And while Ferguson and the equally truculent Wenger appear to have developed a genuine friendship in

recent years, would Fergie be so friendly with the Gunners boss were the North Londonders still on an equal footing with United? Again, I

suspect not. Perhaps Ferguson still harbours a grudge at Benitez for the Spaniard's infamous 'fact' press conference when both United and Liverpool were neck-and-neck in the 2009 title race.

But, putting that moment of David Brent-like theatre to one side, Benitez uttered those words four years ago, not at a press conference last week, surely something not worth harbouring a grudge over after all this time?

As for Ferguson's refusal to deal with the media in the wake of Nani's highly questionable red card, the turning point in last Tuesday's last 16 clash with Real Madrid? Well, to use a phrase the man from Govan often

avails of, what nonsense. Sending his highly unexcitable assistant Mike Phelan out to face the press, a tactic Mourinho himself has availed of more than once in his time at Real in the guise of Aitor

Karanka, denied the media some undoubtedly explosive copy. Ferguson should have just come

out and faced the music, and referred to his disappointment with the defeat and sending-off in a manner which reflected the experience of a man with over 50 years in the professional game.

Come his weekly press conference on Friday last, Ferguson, as has increasingly been his wont in recent seasons, was banning reporters from Carrington for daring to ask coherent, news-worthy questions over Wayne Rooney's future.

This thorny, irrational persona is totally at odds with the caring, compassionate Ferguson who recently sent a video message to Paul Gascoigne while the former England player was receiving treatment for his alcoholism in Arizona.

"There's nothing wrong with losing your temper for the right reasons," Ferguson said on Friday. reasons," Ferguson said on Friday. Maybe he's got a point there. But he could surely have

extended a hand to his opposing manager last Sunday. Couldn't he?
