

Warning

Be sure to read this user guide and the safety precautions before using your telephone.

Explain their content and the potential hazards associated with using the telephone to your children.



Use only the charging cradle supplied with the power adapter.



Use only **recommended**, **rechargeable batteries** (→ page 49). Failure to do so could damage your health and cause injury.

Do not charge the handset in charging unit or base station while the headset is connected.



Using your telephone may affect nearby medical equipment. Be aware of the technical conditions in your particular environment (such as a doctor's office).



Do not hold the rear of the handset to your ear when it is ringing or when the handsfree function is activated. Otherwise, you risk serious and permanent damage to your hearing.

Do not install the charging cradle in bathrooms or shower areas. The charging cradle is not waterproof (\rightarrow page 49).



Do not use your phone in environments that pose a explosion hazard (e.g., paint shops).

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If you give your phone to someone else, make sure you also give them the user guide.

Checking the package contents

Installing the charging cradle

The charging cradle is designed to be operated in closed, dry areas at temperatures ranging from $+5^{\circ}$ C to $+45^{\circ}$ C.

– Please note –

 ♦ Keep in mind the range of the base station. It is up to 985 feet (300 m) in unobstructed outdoor areas and up to 165 feet (50 m) inside buildings. The range is reduced when Eco mode is activated (→ page 34).

- Never expose the telephone to heat sources, direct sunlight, or other electrical devices.
- Protect your phone from moisture, dust, corrosive liquids, and fumes.

Setting up the handset for use

The display and keypad are protected by a protective plastic film. Please remove the protective film.

Inserting the battery and closing the battery cover

Warning

Use only the rechargeable batteries (→ page 49) recommended by Gigaset Communications GmbH; using other batteries could result in significant health risks and property damage. For example, the outer casing of the batteries could be destroyed, or the batteries could explode. The phone could also malfunction or be damaged as a result of using batteries that are not the recommended type.

- First insert the battery at the top of the receptacle (a).
- Then press the battery downwards
 (b) until it clicks into place.





- Align the protrusions on the side of the battery cover with the notches on the inside of the housing.
- Then press the cover until it clicks into place.

If you need to **reopen the battery cover** to connect the USB cable or change the battery:

- Remove the belt clip (if attached).
- Place a coin into the notch at the bottom of the casing and pull the battery cover upwards.

To **change the battery**, place a coin in the cavity on the casing and pull the battery upwards.



Attaching/removing the belt clip

The handset has notches on each side for attaching the belt clip.

- To attach: Press the belt clip onto the back of the handset so that the protrusions on the belt clip engage the notches.
- To remove: Use your right thumb to press the belt clip slightly to the right of center, then slide the fingernail of your left index finger between the clip and the casing and lift the clip upwards.

Placing the handset in the charging cradle

- Insert the power adapter for the charging cradle into the electrical outlet.
- > Place the handset into the charging cradle with its **display facing forward**.

To charge the battery, leave the handset in the charging cradle.

Registering handsets


A Gigaset SL78H handset can be registered to up to four base stations.

Registration of Gigaset SL78H


You must initiate handset registration on the handset (1) and on the base station (2).

Once it has been registered, the handset returns to idle status. The handset's internal number is shown on the display (e.g., **INT 1**). If not, repeat the procedure.

1) On the handset



The display indicates that the handset is searching for the specified base station.



2) On the base station


Within 60 seconds, press and **hold** the Registration/Paging key on the base station (approx. 3 sec.).

Please note -

Information on how to deregister can be found in your base station's user guide.

First battery charge and discharge

The correct charge status can only be displayed if the battery is first fully charged and then discharged.




the battery is fully discharged.

Please note

- After the first battery charge **and** discharge, you can place your handset in the charging cradle after every call.
- Always repeat the charging and discharging procedure if you remove the battery from the handset and reinsert it.
- The battery may heat up during charging. This is not dangerous.

Setting the date and time

Set the date and time so that the alarm and the calendar can be used.





 Press the key below Save on the display screen to save your entries.

The display shows **Saved**. You will hear a confirmation tone.

Press the key below Back on the display screen to return to idle status.

Display in idle status

Once the phone is registered and the time set, the idle display is shown, as in this example. After successful registration, the following is displayed:

- The strength of the signal between the base station and handset:
 - poor to good: ¶ ¶¶ ¶¶]
- Battery charge status:

outside the charger

- white: charged over 66 %
- white: charged between 33 % and 66 %
- white or red^{*}: charged under 33 %

- **(** flashes red: battery almost empty (less than 10 minutes talktime)

in the charger

- **f f f f f h** white: battery is charging

^{*} red: older firmware version, please update the handset's firmware (\rightarrow page 51)


Please note

In idle status, the calendar display can be switched on and off (\rightarrow page 34).

Setting up area codes

Before you can return a call from the Calls list (+ page 31), you must store the local area code of the area in which your phone is being used. If your phone is in a multiple area code area, you must also store the extra codes for that area.

Enter the local area code.

Press the Display key.

Press and hold (idle status).

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
Enter the extra code.

Press the Display key.

Press and hold (idle status).

Repeat the above steps until all the extra codes have been entered for your area. A maximum of five (5) extra codes can be stored.

Your phone is now ready for use!



Connecting the USB cable

You can connect the supplied USB cable to the back panel of your telephone to connect the telephone to a PC (\rightarrow page 50).

- ▶ Remove the belt clip (if attached) (→ page 9).
- ▶ Remove the battery cover (→ page 8).
- Connect the USB cable to the USB socket 1.

Using the phone

Using the Control key

In the text below, the side of the Control key that you must press in the operating situation described is marked in black (top, bottom, right, left, center), for example, ress right on the Control key" or for "press the center of the Control key."



The Control key has a number of different functions:

When the handset is in idle status

- Open the menu for setting the handset's call volume (→ page 42)
- Open the main menu.
- Open the directory.
- Open the list of handsets.

In the main menu, submenus, and lists

In input fields

You can use the Control key to move the cursor up 🖿 , down 🖵 , right 🕞 ,	or left
Press and hold or to move the cursor word by word.	

During an external call

- Open the directory.
- Initiate an internal consultation call.
- Adjust the loudspeaker volume for earpiece and handsfree mode.

Functions when clicking the middle of the Control key

The key has different functions, depending on the operating situation.


- In idle status, the main menu is opened.
- In the submenus and selection and input fields, the key takes on the function of the Display keys OK, Yes, Save, or Change.

Please note

In this guide, operation is shown through the right Control key and the Display keys. However, if you prefer, you can also use the Control key as described.

Using the Display keys


The function of the Display keys changes depending on the particular operating situation. Example:



Important Display keys include:

Options	Open a menu for further functions.
OK	Confirm selection.
< C	Delete key: Backspace deletes character/word.
Back	Go back one menu level or cancel operation.
Save	Save entry.
Redial	Open the Last Number Redial list.

Using the keys on the keypad



Correcting incorrect entries

You can correct incorrect characters in the input fields by navigating to the incorrect entry using the Control key. You can then:

- Press <C to delete the character to the left of the cursor.
 Press and hold <C to delete the word to the left of the cursor.
- Insert characters to the left of the cursor
- Overwrite the highlighted (flashing) character, for example, when entering the date or time.

Using the menus

Your telephone's functions are accessed using a menu that has a number of levels.

Main menu (first menu level)

Press the Control key right in the handset's idle status to open the main menu.

Symbols are used to show the main menu functions on the display. The selected function is indicated by means of an orange circle around the symbol, and the associated name appears in the header of the display.

To access a function, i.e. open the corresponding submenu (next menu level):

▶ Using the Control key 💭, navigate to the required function and press the Display key OK.

Press the Display key Back or the End Call key shore briefly to return to idle status.

Submenus

The functions in the submenus are displayed in list format (example to the right).

To access a function:

 Scroll to the function with the Control key and press OK.

```
Press the Display key Back or the End Call key 
briefly to return to the previous menu level or to cancel
the operation.
```

Reverting to idle status

You can revert to idle status from anywhere in the menu as follows:

▶ Press and **hold** the End Call key .


Or:

• Do not press any key: After 2 minutes, the display will **automatically** revert to idle status.

Settings that are not confirmed by pressing the Display keys OK, Yes, Save, or Change will be lost.

An example of the display in idle status is shown on page 14.





Activating/deactivating the handset

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With the phone in idle status, press and **hold** the End Call key to switch off the handset. A confirmation tone plays as the phone turns off. Press and **hold** the End Call key again to switch the handset on.

Please note

```
When switching on, an animation of a clock will be displayed for several seconds.
```

Activating/deactivating the keypad lock

The keypad lock prevents any inadvertent use of the phone.

⊷ #

Press and **hold** the Pound key to activate or deactivate the keypad lock. You will hear the confirmation tone.

When the keypad lock is activated, you will see the icon **D**- on the display and a message when you press a key.

The keypad lock is deactivated automatically if someone calls you. It is reactivated when the call is finished.


The operating steps are shown in abbreviated form.

The **Auto Answer** function is already selected.

Press the Display key Change to activate/deactivate the function.



The change is immediately effective and does not need to be confirmed.



Making calls

If the backlight is deactivated (→ page 42) it is switched on by pressing any key. In this case the pressed key has no other function.

Making an external call

External calls are calls using the public telephone network.



Enter the number and press the Talk key.

Or:

Press and **hold** the Talk key , and then enter the number.

You can cancel the dialing operation with the End Call key 💿.

You are shown the duration of the call while the call is in progress.

Please note

Dialing using the directory, the Quick list (page 1, page 27), or the Calls and Last Number Redial list (page 31/page 31) saves you from having to re-enter numbers.

Continuing a call on a Bluetooth headset

Requirement: Bluetooth is activated; a connection has been established between the Bluetooth headset and the handset (→ page 38).

Press the Talk key on the Bluetooth headset; it may take up to 5 seconds to establish a connection to the handset.

For further details about your headset, see the user guide issued with it.

Ending a call

Press the End Call key.

Accepting a call

The handset indicates an incoming call in three ways: by ringing, by a display on the screen, and by the flashing Handsfree key •.

You can accept the call by:

- Pressing the Talk key 😑.
- Pressing the Handsfree key .

If the handset is in the charging cradle and the **Auto Answer** function is activated (→ page 42), the handset will take a call automatically when you lift it out of the cradle.

To deactivate the ringer, press the Silence Display key. You can take the call as long as it is displayed on the screen.

Accepting a call on a Bluetooth headset

Requirement: Bluetooth is activated; a connection has been established between the Bluetooth headset and the handset (→ page 38).

Only press the Talk key on the headset when the headset rings; it can take up to 5 seconds.

For further details about your headset, see the user guide issued with it.

Using the handsfree feature

In handsfree mode, instead of holding the handset to your ear, you can put it down, for example, on the table in front of you. This allows others to participate in the call.

Activating/deactivating handsfree mode

Activating while dialing



] Enter the number and press the Handsfree key.

 You should inform your caller that you are using the handsfree function so that they know someone else is listening.

Switching between earpiece and handsfree mode

Press the Handsfree key.

Activate/deactivate handsfree during a call.

If you wish to place the handset in the charging cradle during a call:

Press and hold the Handsfree key
 while placing the handset in the base station. If the Handsfree key
 does not light up, press the key again.

For instructions on how to adjust the loud-speaker volume, \rightarrow page 42.

Switching to mute

You can deactivate the microphone in your handset during an external call.

- Mute Press the Display key to mute the handset. The display shows Microphone is off.
- Mute off Press the Display key to reactivate the microphone.

Making internal calls

Internal calls to other handsets registered on the same base station are free.

Calling a specific handset

- Initiate internal call.
 Enter the number of the handset.
- Or:
- Initiate internal call.
- Select handset.
- Press the Talk key.

Calling all handsets ("group call")

- Initiate internal call.
 Press the Asterisk key.
 Or
- Call All Select menu option and
- Press the Talk key.

All handsets are called.

Ending a call

Press the End Call key.

Using the directory and lists

The options are:

- Directory
- Quick list
- Last Number Redial list
- Call lists
- List of missed appointments

You create the directory and Quick list for your own individual handset. You can also send lists/entries to other handsets (→ page 29).

Using the Directory/Quick list

You can save a total of 500 entries in the directory and Quick list.

Please note —

For quick access to a number in the directory or the Quick list (Quick Dial), you can assign the number to a key (\rightarrow page 40).

Directory

In the directory, you can save

- A contact's first and last names, and up to three numbers
- E-mail addresses
- Anniversaries, with reminder
- VIP ringers, with VIP symbol,
- CID pictures.

You open the directory in idle status using the \mathbf{r} key.

Entry lengths

First and last names: max. 16 characters each

3 numbers: max. 32 digits each

E-mail address: max. 60 characters

Quick list

A list of name/numbers that can be Person/ Business name and phone number; dialaround name and code; descriptive name and PIN, etc.

Open the Quick list in idle status by pressing the → key.

Entry lengths

Storing a number in the directory

Enter a number in at least one of the fields.

When scrolling through the directory, the entries are indicated by a preceding symbol: $(\Delta / \square / @$.

E-Mail:

When setting On:

Enter Anniversary (Date), Anniversary (Time), Anniversary (Signal), then select the number associated with the signal style(→ page 30).

Using the directory and lists

Caller Melody (VIP):

You can mark a directory entry as a **VIP** (very important person) by assigning a specific ringer to it. VIP calls can be recognized by the ringer.

When scrolling through the directory, VIP entries are indicated by the symbol **VP**.

Requirement: Caller ID service subscription.

Caller Picture:

If required, select a picture to be displayed when the caller calls (see Using the Resource Directory, page 44). Precondition: Caller ID (CID).

Save Press the Display key.

Order of directory entries

Directory entries are generally sorted alphabetically by last name. Spaces and digits take first priority. If only the first name was entered in the directory, this is incorporated into the sort order instead of the last name.

The sort order is as follows:

- 1. Space
- 2. Digits (0-9)
- 3. Letters (alphabetical)
- 4. Other characters

To bypass the alphabetical order of the entries, insert a space or a digit in front of the first letter of the last name. These entries will then move to the beginning of the directory.

Selecting entries in the directory and Quick list

↓ Open the directory or Quick list.

You have the following options:

- Use 🖵 to scroll through the entries until the name you want is selected.
- Enter the first letters of the name (max. 8 characters), or use to scroll to the entry.

The last name is searched for in the directory. If no last name is entered, the first name is used.

Linking Quick list numbers with one number

You can insert the dialing code of a network provider ahead of the number ("linking").

Select and press OK.

- Press the Talk key. Both numbers are dialed.

Sending the directory/Quick list to another handset

Requirements:

- The sending and receiving handsets must both be registered to the same base station.
- The other handset and the base station can send and receive directory entries.

 \blacksquare / \blacksquare \rightarrow \blacksquare (select entry)

→ Options (open menu) → Copy Entry /

Copy All → to Internal

Select the internal number of the receiving handset and press OK.

You can transfer several individual entries one after the other by responding Yes to the Entry copied - Copy next entry? prompt.

A successful transfer is confirmed by a message and confirmation tone on the receiving handset.

Please note:

- Entries with identical numbers are not overwritten on the receiving handset.
- The transfer is canceled if the phone rings or if the memory of the receiving handset is full.
- Anniversary reminders, pictures, and sounds entered are not sent.

Transferring the directory as a vCard with Bluetooth

In Bluetooth mode (→ page 38), you can transfer directory entries in vCard format, for example, to exchange entries with your mobile phone.

(Select entry) → Options
 (Open menu) → Copy Entry / Copy All
 → vCard via Bluetooth

The list of "Known Devices" (→ page 39) is displayed.

Ţ

Select device, and press OK.

Receiving a vCard with Bluetooth

When a device sends a vCard to your handset from the "Known Devices" (→ page 39) list, this process takes place automatically. You will be informed on the display.

If the sending device does not appear in the list, you will be asked on the display to enter the device PIN for the sending device:

Enter the PIN for the sending Bluetooth device and press OK.

The transferred vCard is available as a directory entry.

Copying a displayed number to the directory

Numbers displayed in a list, such as the Call lists or the Last Number Redial list, or during a call, can be copied to the directory.

A number is displayed:

► Complete the entry → page 27.

Copying a number or e-mail address from the directory

In some cases, you can open the directory, for example, to copy a number or e-mail address. Your handset doesn't have to be in idle status.

Saving an anniversary in the directory

For each number in the directory, you can save an anniversary and specify a time at which a reminder call should be made on the anniversary (default setting: **Anniversary: Off**).

Anniversaries are automatically recorded in the calendar (\rightarrow page 34).

Reminder call on an anniversary

In idle status, a reminder call is signaled in the handset display (→ page 2) and with the selected ringer.

Your telephone saves different types of calls, depending on the base station:

You can display each type of call individually or have an overall view of all calls. The last 20 entries in each case are displayed.

Using the network mailbox

The network mailbox is your network provider's voice mail within the network. You cannot use the network mailbox unless you have **subscribed to** the service from your network provider.

Configuring Fast Access for the network mailbox

With Fast Access, you can dial the network mailbox directly.

Fast access is set for the network mailbox. You only need to enter the number of the network mailbox.

Configuring Fast Access for the network mailbox and entering the network mailbox number

By using a power-saving adapter plug, your telephone consumes less power.

Reducing radiation (dependent on base)

The radiation can only be reduced if your base supports this function.

The transmission power of your telephone is **automatically** reduced depending on the distance to the base.

You can reduce the radiation of the handset and base even further by using **Eco Mode** or **Eco Mode+**. For further information, please refer to your base user guide.

Setting an appointment (calendar)

You can use your handset to remind yourself of up to 30 appointments.

Anniversaries (\rightarrow page 30) entered in the directory are automatically recorded in the calendar.

You can set whether the graphic calendar is displayed in idle status. To do this in idle status:

Calendar → Options → Show Cal. in Idle (✓ = display)

Press Change to activate/deactivate the function ($\mathbf{M} =$ on).

Saving an appointment

Requirement: The date and time have already been set (\rightarrow page 12).

- Days on which appointments have already been saved are highlighted in orange.
- Select the required day in the graphic calendar.

The selected date is bordered in orange. Today's date is bordered in white.



Signaling appointments and anniversaries

Setting the alarm clock

Requirement: The date and time have already been set (\rightarrow page 12).

Activating/deactivating the alarm clock and setting the wake-up time

Save Press the Display key.

The \bigcirc symbol and wake-up time are displayed in idle status.

A wake-up call with the selected ringer is signaled on the handset (\rightarrow page 2).

The wake-up call sounds for 60 seconds. If no key is pressed, the wake-up call is repeated twice at five-minute intervals and then turned off.

During a call, the wake-up call is only signaled by a short tone.

Deactivating the wake-up call/ repeat after pause (snooze mode)

Requirement: A wake-up call is sounding.

- OFF Press the Display key. The wakeup call is deactivated.
- or

Snooze Press the Display key or any key. The wake-up call is deactivated and then repeated after 5 minutes. After the second repetition, the wake-up call is deactivated.

Using a handset as a room monitor

When the room monitor function is activated and the handset detects a specific noise level, the handset automatically calls a destination phone number. That phone number can be either another handset or an external number.

The room monitor call to an external number stops after around 90 seconds. The room monitor call to an internal number (handset) stops after approx. 3 minutes (depending on the base station). When the room monitor is activated, all keys are locked except the End Call key. The handset's speaker is muted.

When the room monitor is activated, incoming calls to the handset are indicated **without a ringer** and are only shown on the screen. The display and keypad are not illuminated, and advisory tones are also turned off. When the room monitor function is activated, all of the handset keys are deactivated except for the Display keys.

If you accept an incoming call, the room monitor is suspended for the duration of the call, but the function **remains** activated.

If you deactivate then reactivate the handset, the room monitor remains activated. – Warning!

- Always check the operation of the room monitor before use. For example, test its sensitivity. Check the connection if you are diverting the room monitor to an outside number.
- When the function is switched on, the handset's operating time is considerably reduced. If necessary, place the handset in the charging cradle.
- Ideally, the handset should be positioned 1 to 2 meters (3 to 6 feet) away from the baby. The microphone must be directed towards the baby.
- The connection to which the room monitor is forwarded must not be blocked by an activated voice mail.

Activating the room monitor and entering the destination number

Select On to activate.

Alarm to:

Select Internal or External.

External number: Select the number from the directory (press Display key) or enter it directly.

The destination number or the internal destination number is displayed in the idle display.

Sensitivity:

Select noise level sensitivity (Low or High).

Press Save to save the settings.

The room monitor function will deactivate after the call ends. There will be no further room monitor calls. All other room monitor settings (e.g., no ringer) on the handset are retained until you press the Display key **OFF** on the handset.

To reactivate the room monitor function with the same phone number:

Reactivate and save with Save
 (→ page 37).

Using Bluetooth devices

Your Gigaset SL78H handset can communicate wirelessly with other devices using Bluetooth™ technology.

Before you can use your other Bluetooth devices, you must first activate Bluetooth and then register the devices to the handset.

You can register one Bluetooth headset to the handset. You can also register up to five data devices (PC, PDA) to send and receive directory entries as vCards or exchange data with the computer (\rightarrow page 50).

Area codes (international and local area codes) must be saved on the phone to use the numbers again (\rightarrow page 45).

You will find a description of how to operate your Bluetooth devices in the user guides for these devices.

Please note

- On your handset, you can operate headsets that have the headset or handsfree profile. Where both profiles are available, the handsfree profile is used for communication.
- It can take up to five seconds to create a connection between your handset and a Bluetooth headset. This applies both when a call is accepted using the headset or transferred to the headset, and when a number is dialed from the headset.

Activating/deactivating Bluetooth mode


