January 4. During the night I had some thoughts on why "we" argue so much with each other. Russell Kirk once explained to me (St. Moritz) that it was the sign of a dying movement. He was being picked on at the time by Hayek and others. I think he was wrong. It is the sign of a movement that has not yet come to life. The real trouble is that so many of us who do not like authoritarianism are trying to buy freedom too cheaply. Actually, we should be arguing only with ourselves. Socialism is the consequence of our not having settled on how we must behave. We were given a taste of freedom -- had a first-rate demonstration -- and think we can get it back for something as cheap as cussing communists or behaving a little like socialists ourselves. We'll get it back only if we learn the source of our blessings and never try to play God ourselves.

We should not do anything for man, woman, or child if the doing tends to weaken another in doing. Help should be extended that will strengthen another. Most of us do not know how to help others. In gratifying our compassionate instincts, we tend to live others' lives. We become only their crutch. To help people get rid of their crutches is the thing.

Magnus Gregersen on phone for half hour about troubles in his China Foundation. Can see no way I can help. He just wants me "to hold his hand."

Phoned Chet Anderson, Milwaukee, about arrangements later in month.

Ivan Firth brought a Mr. Louis Solomon from Greenwich Village here for luncheon and a two-hour session. Mr. Solomon, a wealthy Jewish gent, 75 perhaps, is as agreeable to our philosophy as anyone I have come upon -- and he is excited about FEE. Quite a scholar. I believe we shall hear more from him. Am indebted to Ivan Firth.

Turned "Conscience of the Majority" over to Poirot for publication in March Freeman.

January 5. Tony Reinach sends \$1,500 which, over the phone to Paul, he indicated would be but the first of several for 1961. Good to have him back as a substantial contributor.

Phoned Hutch about how I should write the minutes regarding Howard's statement before the Board. He advised that I put his thoughts in my own words, not to use his exact wording, that were we to do so he would then have to "eat crow" or get off the Board. Advised I phone Howard.

Phoned Howard. He agreed to my wording:

Trustee J. Howard Pew expressed his grave concern over FEE's free trade articles and essays, contending that existing conditions constitute an emergency, and that this calls for protective measures favorable to American industry.

Told him I was anxious that we have a talk. He seemed to be more anxious

than I. However, I am on a travel schedule through the 27th and he is leaving for six weeks at Chandler, Arizona on the 29th. Just as well.

Erling Week here from 1230 to 1500. Brilliant and highly spiritual.

Phoned Emily Holmes, Bellevue, Wash, to find out about Jim Clise. Out of his head for a week, he is now rational and feeling better! Amazing.

January 6. The Curling Committee designated last year's winner of the Clyde Park Memento to defend the honor of St. A at this year's Stockton Bonspiel. What fun!

Began the writing of "The Mayflower Lecture" to be done at Norman Whitehouse's Congregational Church in Oklahoma City, April 9. Tentative title: "Spiritual Faith: The Font of Freedom."

A Frenchman, Rene D'Anjou, here for an hour explaining a mass global "atlas" plan of his, wanting FEE to launch it. He's quite a person and his idea has some merit but it is out of our range.

January 7. Gerald Heard once told me that he regarded Billy Wilson, an alcoholic and founder of AA, as one of the twenty greatest living men. Knowing something of the philosophy he espouses, I can offer no disagreement. Last evening I read a short mss. from Melvin Burger, an alcoholic (11 years conquered), "The Lessons of Lost Weekends." It is so good I cannot get it off my mind. He compares alcoholism to socialism in a remarkable homologous manner. All of which raises the question with me: Why are so many alcoholics, who have conquered their problem, such outstanding persons? I know many of them. The reasons are plain. January 9. Brad Smith phoned saying he cannot go to Stockton -- U.S. Steel's Annual Report. Phoned Nelson Fry and he is pleased to play lead for me.

Phoned Mr. Franz, Sec. Contributions Comm, Gulf Oil, Pittsburgh, about a date there tomorrow. He said all of them have "a very high regard for FEE's work." Good.

Phoned Randall Compton, J & L, Pittsburgh, about date. Agreed.

Sam drove me to Newark Airport where I lunched. Boarded CAL's #145, 1400 for Pittsburgh. Read in Wall Street Journal about Viscounts of 700 series having cracked ribs in its wings, but this one was smooth and routine. To one of my favorite clubs, The Duquesne.

Bob Harper, my host, of Koppers called at 1715. We had a snort or two here and then to the Penn Sheraton for an excellent dinner. I like this lad. He doesn't appear to leak at all and, as nearly as I can tell, is of high integrity. He may be the person for whom I have been looking -- one to work with and write for some 1,000 editors -- not too bright, by and large -- for corporation house organs. We bade good night at 2100.

Phoned me Ag, left alone except for Tobe and Kit-kat. Doing all right. To hay.

Wrote two small items for March NOTES.

Drove to NY, Millard Moore and Bob Thornton riding along. Millard and I went to University Club where Bill Reid hosted a luncheon in honor of Ross Tarlton's Hamilton (Ontario) Thistle Rink, Ross being one of the greats among the old-timers. McCullough, Seibert, Dudley, and Ada were the others of the local gentry. A delightful social event.

To Canadian Club and half an hour with Joaquin Reig, just back from Caracas. He says he and his Spanish speaking friends want to send young men to FEE for six months of instruction. I agreed to the general idea. More talk on same tomorrow night.

Took Ag to China Garden. Afterward, we went to Seiberts in Bronxville where Marge and Linc had 25-30 of the curling fraternity in for howjados, tipples, and the like.

January 13. Completed copy for page 4 of NOTES. This is a more spirited issue than any I have done.

Bill Rickenbacker here for luncheon. He has dared the government to force his filling out of the Census Bureau's questionnaire.

To what kind of thinking must we look for a cure for statism? Some of my own views are in "Conscience of the Majority."

January 17. George Garrett phoned from Portland about tonight.

Sam had me at LaGuardia very early. An hour writing at Admiral's Club, lunch in terminal. Boarded NE's #714, 1315 for Portland, Me., scheduled stop at Boston. On trip read a book sent me by McHootch, "The Prophet," by Kahlil Gibran. There is, if I may pass judgment, much wisdom in it but sometimes it seems as if he gets carried away with the beauty of his own writing. Such truths as the following make the book worth reading:

No man can reveal to you aught but that which already lies half asleep in the dawning of your knowledge.

If he [the teacher] is indeed wise, he does not bid you enter the house of his wisdom, but rather leads you to the threshold of your own wisdom.

Flight routine, except 75 minutes late. To Eastland Hotel.

Phoned Ag and she has Aunt Ruby with her. Janette reports business at zero zero.

About 320 at Annual Banquet, Greater Portland C of C, Eastland Hotel. Carleton G. Lane introduced me. While no one took me on, and quite a few were very favorable, and the applause was enthusiastic, there is no question about it, the people in old rock-ribbed Maine, at least many of the Republican leaders, have gone Margaret Chase Smith or, shall we say, new deal. Urban renewal republicans all around me at the head table. Knowing this, I press down all the harder. George Garrett, however, looks like a real libertarian thinker -- something to say for a c of c manager. Tonight's affair, for some strange reason I can't explain, gives me an unholy type of delight.

Afterward, I joined George and a good dozen of his staff (boys and girls) at bar of the nearby Lafayette Hotel. Got in some serious talk which several of them appeared to appreciate. This is signed off at 0003 tomorrow.

January 18. Following a breakfast of codfish cakes, taxied to airport and boarded NE's #761, 0815 for Idlewild, stop at Manchester, N.H. Routine. Sam had me at FEE at 1100.

Bob Snowden phoned from Arkansas about the Pew matter and LeFevre's book.

Phoned Pete Gifford, Dallas, about his proposed change in Seminar dates.

Pierre phoned from New York on way to Boston.

Cabled Benedicto Padilla, Manila, inquiring what about our date.

Played a fair spare lead for Larry Davis in the evening's JR.

January 19. Decided to send my "The Right to Strike is Conceded, but..." to a hundred or so commuters into New York. Right now they are "burned" and may have an ear for some reflection.

Phoned Jim Rogers on several matters. Among other things, he told me how wonderful Dean is getting. Probably he is now the very tops among all of us.

Tom Hartley of Union Carbide, the fine young man who was a seatmate from Dallas to N.Y. several months ago, here from 1200 to 1330. He is a good worker in the vineyard.

Vee Winn phoned from Chicago saying Hughston wouldn't return until next Thursday, thus my dinner date with him is off. Too bad!

Tony Reinach called at 1545 and stayed on for Boquet de Poisson with Ag and me, Jackie resting in a hospital for a month or two with a "nervous". According to Tony, "she won't face reality," but it's Tony's brand: No reality beyond that which can be perceived by the five senses! The bosh (?) of an egotist. Tony left early on account of the snow storm getting underway.

January 20. A terrific snow and wind all night, going strong at 0900. Most of staff will not show up this day.

Father Steiner phoned from Detroit asking that I participate in convocation at the U of Detroit, April 5. Agreed.

A George Baker from Hubbardston, Michigan, whom I do not remember, phoned from N.Y. Wanted loan of \$35. Sent.

Andrews, Ex. V.P., Binghamton, N.Y. C of C, wants me for his Annual Banquet in March. Agreed.

Vic Milione of ISI phoned from Philadelphia. Great lad and doing a fine job.

With not over half a dozen of staff here and business at a standstill, I spent most of day on trying to write my "Spiritual Faith: The Font of Freedom," the Mayflower Lecture.

January 21. At 0800 came the disappointing cable from Benedicto Padilla, Manila, saying that because of tight money and exchange controls

I finished a letter to Herb Cornuelle to call off his proposed meetings for me in Honolulu and then came another cable from Benedicto saying the whole deal was on. Called Baisley Sheridan, St. A friend and attorney for Pan Am to arrange our flight plans.

H. Franklin Bloomer, Jr., a young man we discovered from a letter The Wall Street Journal published, here from 1000 to 1245. We have in him, I am certain, a fine potential worker.

Played a rather good lead for Bill Miller but he or we lost 13-8.

In honor of Manila, took Ag to Parise's.

A confirming wire to Padilla.

January 22. Mike drove me to Idlewild for AA's #65, 0900 jet to Chicago's O'Hare.

Our life here is but a phase in an eternal experience of the individual spirit. The conclusion of this phase is as much a part of it as is the beginning. The time between beginning and conclusion is for the purpose of growth -- a growing in consciousness, which is to say, a coming into harmony with Infinite Consciousness. If this lofty view is believed (it is as near as I can come to Purpose), then a code for life on earth rather easily takes shape. For example, longevity as an object is seen as rather silly. When growth is over, regardless of age, 'tis time to conclude this phase and the individual, if he could but rise to it, ought to be not adverse to this. Programs to keep people from dying, private and government, are the rage of the day. To delay death after growth is completed may be as evil as to thwart birth before growth has begun. (The more I reflect on this the more closely do I approximate some of the Mormon views -- spirits waiting to be born; the borning is itself a spiritual event which should in no way be beneath all that is good and sacred.) Giving money to all of these voluntary associations is, by and large, indiscriminately to finance longevity for its own sake, which may prolong experiences that should conclude as well as some that should be maintained for potential growth. However, in these instances, each of us has a free choice -- one does not have to participate if one does not wish to do so. The real evil is for government to indulge in this sort of thing -- where all are compelled to partake whether or not we wish to do so. In this later instance, life substance is taken from many people, substance that is essential to growth. This kind of reasoning leads to another thought: If it be conceded that the taking from others to feather one's own nest is the greatest evil of all -- I believe it to be -- then government is today practicing the greatest evil on a scale never before known. Such an example in itself makes plausible the practice of lesser evils about which we complain so much, that is, child delinquency, sex and other laxities, the enormous breaking down of self-reliance, labor union monopolies, and a host of other evils. When we put the state gargantua in the place of God, we put legalized evil in the place of conscience. When we do this we cut the roots of individual growth on a mass scale. This is mass murder of the individual spirit, perhaps more to be condemned than the mass murder of human flesh.

Airborne at 1000, arriving O'Hare at 1047 CST. Much to my pleasant surprise, Bill Grede, Pres., J.I. Case, and his son-in-law, Burleigh Jacobs, Pres., Grede Foundries, to meet me. Drove some 60-70 miles to home of Muriel and Norman Ream in Wauwatosa, a very spirited discussion all the way. Lunched and spent afternoon with Muriel and Norman, including a visit to his large Congregational Church.

The three of us at home of Burleigh Jacobs in Elm Grove at 1715 where Wally Davis & wife, and Bill Grede & wife joined for a nice Sunday dinner. About 14 were on hand at 2000 for a discussion that went on for 2½ hours. One of Bob LeFevre's philosophical anarchists got the discussion too long in that hair-splitting area but otherwise it was a pleasant and a seemingly rewarding evening. The Laws, Bob Baird, Bob Rice & wife were among those present. To Bill's home for the night, turning in at about 2330.

January 23. Bill takes off every morning at 0630 for the 35 mile drive to J.I. Case in Racine. Mrs. Grede cooked a sumptuous breakfast after which she drove me to Milwaukee Athletic Club where I took room for a few hours.

Phoned Aggie, Louise arrived very late last night but she's there. Thanks for patient and wonderful Mike. Janette had little business to report.

Phoned Dehmlow, McLeod, Jim Rogers and others setting up dates.

Chet Anderson came to room at 1100 for an hour. He introduced me to the luncheon group gathered at MAC, about 95 encouraged to attend by some of the libertarian gals. Appeared to go all right. Think I made on^e crack about government education that would have been better left unsaid. Adjourned at 1400, Muriel Ream driving me to Raulf Hotel in Oshkosh, arriving at 1600.

Dr. Neil McLeod and Dr. Whitney of The Institute of Paper Chemistry, Appleton, with me for an hour, discussing their May 25 program at which I am to speak.

Mr. Dailey, Ex.V.P., Associated Industries of Oshkosh, called for me at 1730. To Athearn Hotel and cocktails with directors. The banquet was held in the main dining room of this old hotel, pleasantly reminiscent of the gay '90's -- famous in these parts for its good food. About 200 present. Introduced by Irving G. Reamer, Controller, Rockwell Standard Corporation. The audience was very responsive and I worked hard at it. Well received and worthwhile. Ready for turn-in at 2200, and welcome.

January 24. This is the 43rd Anniversary of boarding Tuscania.

Had breakfast at Athearn, taxiing to airport for North Central's #450, 1940 for O'Hare. Plane announced as 3 hours late and probably would be cancelled. A Mr. Charles de Young, V.P., Appleton Mfg. Co., and son, and I chartered a Comanche for O'Hare, making 205 mph ground speed and arriving at 1045, earlier than the plane we were scheduled on.

To Chicago Club. Janette phoned: Invitation to Houston Rotary Club, the Sam Husbands' Seminar is on at Carmel for weekend of April 28, Fred Stanback, Jr. sends \$1,500. Revenue good.

Phoned Jim Rogers and invited him to join Opitz and me as the Carmel Seminar Team. He agreed.

Louis Dehmlow came at 1200. We lunched at CC and talked to 1440, almost about everything. He is a most stimulating and vital person.

Jim Lorie, who really runs the Graduate School of Business at U of Chicago, came at 1700. We went to CC's Bar, of which there is no whicher, to Donna da Bitch to eat, of which there is no better, and to Jim's apartment, from which there is no better place to depart for home. We talked about so many things that neither of us recall anything except maybe these: Allen Wallis to edit a new Encyclopedia of the Social Sciences (about time -- the present job is almost commie); Jim is to go as FEE's guest to the next Mont Pelerin meeting, and I am to meet with several of his friends when next here -- about May 1st. Turned in at 2335, none the worse for wear or, so it seems to me as I write this.

January 25. Phoned Aggie and Janette. Allegheny of Pittsburgh sends one grand.

Spent from 0900 to 1030 with Tex Shaver, Chairman, U.S. Gypsum, and I hope a future FEE Trustee. Sold him on idea of trying The Freeman on a thousand or more of his folks.

A short visit with Vee Winn and a purchase of a pair of boots at MF.

Phoned Sam Husbands at SF. The Seminar is to be at Carmel Valley Inn.

To Chicago Tribune. My curling friend, Fred Nichols, Ass't. to Pres., Chicago Tribune Co. We had a most agreeable half hour. Fred plans a luncheon with Howard Wood (new President of Chicago Tribune Co., Fred introducing him to me) on some early trip here. He is a VIP from my and many other standpoints. Fred took me to The Tavern Club for luncheon, the two of us having a delightful discussion until 1400.

Had an hour with Jonathan Gibson of Santa Fe. They come no better.

With David Graham, Financial VP of Standard Oil, from 1600 to 1735. He has a bad time with his own top folks on things that interest him, of which FEE is one. It's a long, slow pull for us there -- probably never.

As much as I enjoy spending an evening with Hughston, I am happy he had to cancel, for a trip to Winetka tonight would be beyond me. Too pooped to be either thirsty or hungry, I, out of habit, imbibed a couple of snorts at the Bar, had a nibbled-at light dinner in the Grille, and put myself to bed ere 2000.

January 26. To O'Hare for UAL's #640, 0805 to Canton, scheduled stop at Cleveland. Departed 40 minutes late, snowy and gooey. Bill Dykes had me at Canton Club at 1250 where 16-17 excellent fellows were gathered. Went into a general discussion at 1310 until 1430. Spirited and fun, and I think rewarding.

Bill and I stopped at his home, left my bags, and drove to Akron where we called on a Mr. Panning of Ohio Electric, Mr. Costello at home with the flu. Both Bill and I impressed with him.

Ag and Louise went to St. A to watch the curling. I played a fair #2 for Pitt Carl. We lost to John McCormick.

Louise being with us, we thought it appropriate to dine at Parise's.

January 30. Magnus Gregersen phoned and ordered three FEE libraries, about \$500 worth!

In a very real sense, man is not living except as he is "in tune" with Infinite Consciousness," an idea that would have meaning to others only if highly embellished or explained.

Took Ag and Aunt Ruby to Charley Chen's for dinner.

The financial statement for January will be sent to you in a few days, showing more than 1,250 contributions for the month, within a dozen or so from setting a 15-year record.

Appended is my calendar, as of now, for the next six months. This, you will note, includes a series of lectures in the Philippines (expenses paid), these to be somewhat similar to those done in the Argentine, 1958.

Some have asked, "Why hop off to other countries when there is so much to do at home?" Acceptance was in pursuance of FEE's policy of going where called. For instance, the material in the Argentine lectures received not only a good distribution (translated) in Latin America, but was more generously picked up and duplicated in the U.S.A. than has been the case with anything I have done at home.

The invitation to do the Philippine lectures came because of a suggestion made to Benedicto Padilla by Trustee Henry Hazlitt. These people wanted Hazlitt, but settled for me.
