The main reason I am having so much difficulty in telling FEE's Board what we would do with more money is that over the years I have come to reject so many proposals that would better society. Most of them can not accomplish more than waste time and money and, as a consequence, cause the greatest of all damage; the diversion of energy from its only meritorious course -- the improvement of self.

Pete and I drove to some motel near University of Dallas where Allen Wallis was lecturing. Paid our respects and then home for a night cap and to hay at 2250.

January 9. Woke up to snow, 20 above, wind, and low visibility.

See what you think of this: Several Trustees are insisting that we put on a demonstration seminar for the Board immediately following our Annual Meeting, Tuesday, May 15.

The plan will be to dispose of Annual Meeting formalities between 10:00 A.M. and 12:00 noon, the seminar to begin in our Board Room at the conclusion of lunch, to continue through the afternoon and evening, and from 8:30 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. Wednesday.

We can accommodate fifty. Perhaps 25 Trustees will find attendance convenient; therefore, why not 25 guests to be sponsored by attending Trustees? There will be no expense for the guests except their travel, a night at the Hilton Inn, and meals. Might this not be a good way to introduce what FEE is doing to some pretty good people?

Anyway, please reflect on this proposed project, on who you would like to sponsor and, by all means, put May 15-16 on your calendar.

GUIDE FOR FEE SEMINAR ORGANIZERS

NOTE: Mr. Dykes, a Trustee of FEE and a skilled thinker and writer of libertarian philosophy, has spearheaded discussion groups in Canton for the past fifteen years, and was the organizer of a FEE Seminar held at Camp Tippecanoe, Ohio, October 13-15, 1961. He offers sound advice.

It may appear paradoxical to open such a guide as this with the advice to reconsider your prospective seminar! If the purpose of the session is to "reform" a number of persons with whom you have a considerable difference of opinion or if you are pretty much alone in the study of the freedom philosophy, then it is likely you are not yet ready for a FEE Seminar in your area.

On the other hand, if your study is fairly well along and if you have a group of perhaps eight or ten who also believe in the freedom philosophy, and if they will enthusiastically assist you in the organization, you will likely have a successful seminar. With such persons as a nucleus, you should be able to attract a sufficient number of really interested individuals without any coaxing. The ones who will attend only if coaxed are not yet teachable.

In other words: Invite only those with basic sympathies for the freedom philosophy, not those of the opposite persuasion. The latter will only handicap and perhaps ruin your seminar.

Now, let us assume that a market does exist for a FEE Seminar and that you have assumed the responsibility for sponsoring and organizing it.

The following suggestions have grown out of my own experiences:

1. Form a general committee of those most interested. Rely on them for part of the guest invitation list, making certain that they understand the type of person needed for a successful meeting. Several mailings and some collection of monies will be necessary; put some of this load on a secretary and a treasurer. Other odd jobs can be passed out as you run into them -- for example, someone to manage the library mentioned below.

2. The selection of a meeting place is important. It should, if possible, be somewhat removed from the area where the participants live and work -- a Retreat, so to speak. Facilities need not be luxurious; neither should they approach the ruggedness of "camping out." Why away from home? There are two reasons: (1) the participants, once in session, must not be running out to take care of this or that personal or business detail. From bitter experience, I know this can and does happen. And (2) one of the most beneficial aspects of a seminar is the concentration on the subject matter. This should never be broken for a moment during the gettogether. The unorganized "bull sessions" -- among the participants and by themselves as they freely choose to form, during meal times and "far into the night" -- are priceless ingredients in the leveling-up process.

The hostelry selected should have one room large enough to handle the entire group and two additional rooms each large enough to accommodate one-third the total group. If this can be done completely free of other people and distractions, so much the better. Do not rule out YMCA or church camps. Often these are admirably suited to the purpose. For one thing, such facilities are reasonably priced. Meals, of course, must be available. Also, there are three coffee breaks to be served.

- 3. Set your date far enough in advance so that few of the invitees will have made conflicting engagements. Normally, the seminar team will require several months notice. Have a date in mind from four to six months following a decision to hold a FEE Seminar.
- 4. Call together the organizing group and prepare a list of possible participants, best held for "screening" by you and your closest associates. As a FEE Seminar should not have over 50-60 participants, send your initial invitations to this number, realizing that the response will fall short of 100%. Have your secondary list ready to use as rejections are received.

Though most FEE Seminars are "stag," it is possible to have a mixed group; but this will complicate your problem in several obvious ways.

- 5. FEE will advance the expenses of the seminar team of three. As a rule one member of the team is a non-staffer to whom FEE pays an honorarium of \$300. In addition, it is appropriate to think in terms of \$4-600 honorarium to FEE. Since contributions to FEE are deductible, collections should be in two parts:
 - a A donation to FEE (deductible) by each partipant in an amount equivalent to his share of FEE 's expenses and honorariums.
 - b A payment to the group's treasurer to cover each participant's share of board, room, and other incidentals.

In our own case we set an absolute minimum for the donation to FEE and then let those who so desired make larger contributions as they saw fit. This worked fairly well. Now and then, at these seminars, a company or an individual will pay the way of those participants who cannot personally afford the expense.

- 6. Be prepared, as seminar organizer, with your own opening and closing remarks. As for the meeting itself, the seminar leaders will set the program and discussion topics. Do not worry about the actual conduct of the lecture and discussion sessions. Be a student like the others. I am appending a topical time table for the seminar we held at Camp Tippecanoe. While each seminar will vary, this one is typical.
- 7. You should have copies of your own schedual available for each participant as he arrives. Also, have mimeographed lists of names, with the whole group divided into sections A, B, and C. Each participant will remain with his own section in all discussion periods, the rotating being done by the seminar leaders.

- 8. As the seminar leaders will arrive at different times, assign someone to take care of each. Be sure to let them know what kind of a hostelry you have selected so they bring the appropriate clothes.
- 9. FEE will send what is referred to as "The Freedom Library" -- about 58 volumes. Make arrangements to have this prominently displayed so that participants may browse at odd times. Several in our group chipped in and gave it to a nearby college.
- 10. After the meeting is over a follow-up letter is a good idea, recapping anything of general interest and perhaps furnishing to each a list of all participants and their affiliations.

MEMORANDUM

February 1, 1962

TO: The Trustees

FROM: Leonard E. Read

The Board, at its December 4th meeting, instructed me to prepare a memorandum on what FEE would do, over and beyond present activities, if more funds were available.

This question comes on the heels of an earlier Board instruction to the management: Build a reserve equal to six months' operating costs -- roughly \$240,000 -- before expanding activities. The average monthly balance for the 1961 calendar year was \$188,000. With the realization of the bequest made by our late fellow Trustee, James W. Clise -- possibly the latter part of this year -- this object may be achieved, assuming that revenue continues at the current rate. Therefore, the question, "What would FEE do with more money?" is appropriate.

To answer this question realistically and honestly requires that we take a hard look at the problem we are working on, as well as what form the solution, if any, must take. Our role at FEE is to continue doing what we can to get a freedom renaissance under way. Few people will quarrel with this as an objective for, obviously, there is no other antidote

to statist philosophy and practice. It's a dispute about the method for attaining this objective that divides freedom devotees. The two opposing methods can be briefly summarized:

- 1. By all odds the most popular proposal is "to sell the masses," or words to that effect. This scheme entails propaganda, that is, each of us attempting to insinuate our own ideas into the consciousness of others. It suggests an <u>outgoing</u> ideological maneuver.
- 2. The minority view insists that there is no solution apart from the emergence of a leadership individuals from different walks of life who deeply understand and can clearly and attractively explain the freedom philosophy. Let individuals of this sort appear and they will attract those in the population who have similar leanings and aptitudes. This approach envisions an ingathering process; it presupposes the existence of an understanding of freedom that will attract and be drawn on.

If one were to accept the first proposition, there is no limit to the millions that could be proposed for annual expenditure. Nationwide TV programs, newspaper publicity, and the like! Organization heads who cling to this notion feel that their ineffectiveness is explained by their lack of funds. Give them enough money and, presto, the millenium! To my way of thinking, this approach is utterly incompatible with our problem.

Here is a crude analogy: Food is of no use to a person except as it goes through some exceedingly complex chemical changes; ingests into the

bloodstream, and then is carried to the 30 trillion cells of the body.

Now, suppose that I were to suggest to you that you ingest another person's food for him. The height of absurdity! Yet, the "ingestion" of an idea into consciousness is more complex than the ingestion of food, far less understood, and as individualistic a phenomenon. Ingestion, be it food or consciousness, is exclusively personal and cannot be induced by or done for others. This is a limitation fundamental to nature and to the educational process which, if not understood, leads only to wasted energy and money, shattered hopes, and chaos? Everybody making over everybody else?

It is the second proposition and its refinement which, as much as anything else, has distinguished the work of FEE. When pursuing this method there are very definite limitations on what money per se can accomplish. Indeed, money becomes a matter of secondary, not of primary, importance.

When adhering to the first proposition, success is alleged to depend on the amount of funds available. Talent, supposedly, will flock to where the money is. Consistent with this assumption is a sales staff "beating the bushes" for all the funds that can be garnered.

The second proposition presupposes the obvious -- a scarcity of adequate libertarian talent. The eye, then, is not on money but on the development of talent, the theory being that money will come to the aid of talent when and if it exists.

Reflecting on FEE's sixteen years, I am unaware of any worthwhile idea or project that has gone down the drain by reason of insufficient funds. It's the shortage of good ideas or talent that has set the limits of our accomplishments, not money.

The FEE pattern can be summarized in the following stages:

- 1. Go only where called, be it with journals, books, lectures, seminars, or personal interviews. This rules out intruding one sown ideas on another. It sabout the same as refusing to enter someone elses home unless invited.
- 2. Qualify in every way possible to be called. The emphasis here is on self-improvement. As relating to FEE, this simply means a program of upgrading in the understanding and exposition of the freedom philosophy on the part of each staff member. The ambition is to achieve an ascending excellence that will result in an increased seeking of counsel and tutorship.
- 3. Make freely available to all and sundry -- overlooking no one intentionally, regardless of occupational, wealth, social, religious, or racial, status -- whatever understanding and/or clarity of expression we can achieve ourselves or ingather from others.
- 4. Such success as may attend points 2 and 3 -- so runs our contention -- will increase the calls on FEE for literature, lectures, seminars, debate material for high schools and colleges, and the like. These increased activities, in turn, will necessitate increased funds.
- 5. Be it noted that points 1 through 4 refer to methods which are consistent with the freedom philosophy FEE champions.

 Financing, we believe should likewise be consistent with

this philosophy: Merely announce to those who find our work useful that FEE is supported only by such contributions as they may, of their own free will, choose to make. The libertarian thesis dictates that it's their judgment -- not ours -- which should prevail when it comes to the placing of their funds.

The fact that FEE still exists and is financially right side up, despite the absence of anything tangible to offer in exchange for revenue, is striking evidence that freedom of choice in every aspect of an institution's operations -- is what ought to be relied on.

Now to the financial problem at hand. The call on FEE has been gradually on the increase. There are, however, indications that a minor explosion is in the offing. For example, conservative book stores are springing into existence. Their call for FEE literature is changing our concept of adequate inventories. Human Action, for instance, is now out of print; a rush order for 25,000 Mainspring has been given the printer. Indeed, the whole FEE recommended library (58) volumes may require new editions. All of a sudden there is a call for FEE video and LP recordings for home and business discussion sessions. These are now in production and promise to increase, enormously, an acquaintance with our literature. If so, the expenditure side of the FEE budget will go into a new magnitude. Receipts can be expected to catch up, but not without considerable lag. Our miniature clerical staff may require revision and enlargement. We can take a steady growth in our financial stride but any sudden development would put quite a strain on our modest reserves.

Required more than anything else is the training of potential libertarian thinkers and writers. In this area we have been gaining experience and, properly, on a very small scale. The Japanese high school teacher's stay at FEE (Toshio Murata) for fourteen months in 1959-60 was attended by outstanding success. In April, 1962, he begins university teaching. During 1961 we had two young men from the Argentine and one from the Philippines for six months with seemingly excellent results. Beginning this June we hope to have 6-8 such students -- foreign and domestic -- for a period of four months. They will receive intensive instruction and training under the tutelage and direction of Dr. Dean Russell who will rejoin the staff this summer. (For more details on this training program, see appended report.)

The above, however, is but a preface to what we have in mind. Come June 1963 we hope to have 15-20 students of liberty for this type of training. This will call for, as a starter, an outlay of \$40-75,000 for remodeling board and room facilities.

To assure 15-20 first-rate students we may find scholarships advisable --perhaps \$10-15,000 annually.

With these developments in mind, a new look must be taken at FEE's senior staff, every one becoming increasingly senior. Presently, we are adequately staffed for current operations. But we are thin; no depth at all: like a football team - all on the field, not one man on the bench!

Will not Curtiss, Poirot, Opitz, Bien, Shelly (in semi-retirement), Mises (past 80), Read require more than one Dean Russell added to their ranks?

Finally, the question, "What would FEE do with more funds?" turns out to be something like, "What would Joe Doakes do were his salary doubled?"

Isn't this getting the cart before the horse? Joe will get his salary

doubled when the value of his service is doubled. Will not the same happen to FEE?

It might be expected that a greater backlog of funds would allow us to proceed with increased confidence. But, as far as my associates and I are concerned, confidence that good works will not go unfinanced, provided we rely unreservedly on freedom of choice, is not in need of bolstering. We believe this. Call it faith in freedom, if you will. In the final analysis, we can serve as a source of this faith only as we ourselves possess and exemplify it in our personal deportment, as well as in every department of the FEE operation.
