Morwaeng engages online media association

Speaking at engagement with BOMA in Gaborone recently, Minister for State President Mr Kabo Morwaeng emphasised the rapid change brought about by digitalization, innovation, and robust solutions that were impacting lives, highlighting the necessity for a shift in the way things were done.

He urged the youth to make use of the various media platforms available and tap into the global creative economy, which is largely untapped in Africa.

Mr Morwaeng stressed the importance of participating in the digital space not only to showcase creative work globally but also to potentially make a career out of it

Therefore, he said there was a need for initiatives that not only impact Botswana but the entire African continent.

The Minister highlighted the need for a mindset change in response to the demands of the Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) to thrive in this digital era.

He pointed out that digital platforms offer a blueprint to shape the future of the digital information dissemination landscape and emphasised the immediate need to kickstart technological entrepreneurial pursuits among the youth and the nation as a whole.

Private security companies worry Public Accounts Committee

GABORONE - The safekeeping of government premises and property is compromised by some private security companies' failure or delay to pay employees.

The observation was made by the Chairperson of the Public Accounts Committee (PAC), Mr Wynter Mmolotsi on Thursday when examining the books of accounts for the financial year ending March 31, 2021 for the then Ministry of Defence, Justice and Security that it was a well-known trend that some private security companies faced challenges.

Mr Mmolotsi was concerned that despite their failure to fulfill employment contractual obligations with their employees, they continue to get their licenses renewed and do business with government.

The committee was also concerned by drug proliferation in the country. Mr Mmolotsi said he has never heard of a case where a drug load was arrested.

He said it was unfortunate to observe law enforcers seem to only arrest distributors and users. Mr Mmolotsi said the campaign against the entry and sale of habit-forming drugs must be intensified.

He said the future generation was doomed by the use of drugs.

On other issues relating to the status of refugees in the country, Mr Mmolotsi said some refugees have been in the country since the 1990s, therefore asking why government was not sponsoring their children who were born

in the country to pursue their tertiary education. He said since they were born here, there was no other country that they were to consider as their home adding that such children never chose to be born under such circumstances, therefore were in dire need of assistance.

However, Mr Mmolotsi has acknowledged that the ministry was mandated a mammoth of a task. "You are dealing with difficult and sensitive issues of national interest," he said.

Briefing the PAC and responding to questions from committee members, the Permanent Secretary in the now Ministry of Defence and Security, Ms Pearl Ramokoka said the then Ministry of Defence, Justice and Security was split into two after rationalisation, establishing a new Ministry of Justice.

Ms Ramokoka said during the year under review, the Dukwi Refugee Camp has a total of 725 inhabitants, a decline from the 933 of the previous year.

She said her Ministry will continue to service refugees at the camp. However, Ms Ramokoka observed that during the financial year under review, her Ministry was overwhelmed by asylum seekers mostly from the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC).

She said her Ministry, working in conjunction with that of Labour and Home Affairs, was assessing each case based on its merit to find solutions to those seeking asylum.

Ms Ramokoka also added that

trans-human trafficking was also a challenge, therefore stringent measures have been introduced, which included the development of anti-human trafficking plan to manage the situation.

In relation to dealing with drugs proliferation, Ms Ramokoka said they were focused on increasing urgency towards investigating drug related cases as well as increasing capacity to deal with ever changing trends of the drug relating criminal acts.

Ms Ramokoka said her ministry was only responsible for licensing private security companies and to ensure that they were not in violation of the laws that govern their operation.

She said issues relating to failure to pay their employees was dealt with under a different Ministry through the Industrial

Ms Ramokoka said it was high time to maybe consider looking at their licensing requirements and ensure that those failing to pay employees and therefore compromising provision of a service that they were licensed to provide were accordingly dealt with

Ms Ramokoka also added that the Military Veterans office was in the process of getting a Director to run its affairs and ensure that it was fully functional.

She said it was also important to come up with some means of empowering and supporting lower ranking officers of the Botswana Defence Force upon retirement as the law mandates them to retire at an early age of 45 years. *BOPA*

Survey on NCDs starts Friday

GABORONE - The Ministry of Health is conducting a household-based survey in response to the increasing burden of Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs) in the country.

The STEP Survey, scheduled from March 8 to June 18, is a collaborative effort with the National AIDS and Health Promotion Agency (NAHPA), World Health Organisation and Statistics Botswana.

This survey aims to provide crucial insights into the current prevalence of NCDs and their risk factors among Batswana.

During the launch of the survey in Gaborone on Wednesday, Min-

ister Dr Edwin Dikoloti urged Batswana to cooperate with the survey teams.

The data collected will focus on established behavioral and biological risk factors that contribute to the major burden of NCDs in Botswana.

Dr Dikoloti highlighted that NCDs pose a significant threat to the nation's health goals, with recent studies indicating that NCDs account for approximately 46 per cent of all deaths in the country.

He emphasised the preventable nature of NCDs and expressed concern over the impact they had, especially on the younger population.

Heart diseases, cancers, diabetes, chronic respiratory diseases, and mental illnesses like depression were among the most prevalent NCDs affecting the population, he said

The minister stressed the urgent need for action, noting how NCD-related deaths often occur during individuals' prime years, resulting in the loss of breadwinners and productive workforce members in the country.

The survey will involve faceto-face interviews to gather key information on behavioral risk factors, screen for depression and anxiety, and take physical measurements such as blood pressure, waist circumference, weight, height, and biochemical measurements like blood glucose and cholesterol.

Dr Dikoloti encouraged Batswana to welcome the survey teams into their homes to ensure the collection of credible data that will inform future interventions.

"NCDs not only impact healthcare but also impose a heavy socio-economic toll, draining valuable resources and hindering the nation's development efforts.

They lead to loss of loved ones, disrupt livelihoods, and perpetuate cycles of poverty and despair," Dr Dikoloti said.

Dr Juliet Bataringaya from WHO Botswana commended Botswana for being the second country in the African region to initiate the STEPS fieldwork.

She highlighted the rising mortality rates due to NCDs in Sub-Saharan Africa, with NCDs responsible for 94 000 lives lost in Botswana in 2022.

Dr Bataringaya emphasised the need for a change in mindset towards healthier lifestyles. *BOPA*

Ministry provides counselling to officers

GABORONE- The Ministry of Foreign Affairs has provision of a private psychiatrists who assists officers upon their return from engagements outside the country.

The Director for Regional Cooperation Ambassador Nkoloi Nkoloi told the Public Accounts Committee (PAC) recently that the psychiatrist provides counselling services and is accessible to the entire staff.

He said the ministry encouraged officers returning from service outside the country to attend counselling to help them settle back into the country and adjust to the level of life back home.

For her part, the Acting permanent secretary in the ministry, Ms Lorato Plaatjie explained that the standard tour of service for officers assigned outside the country was four years, adding that this put them in a position to prepare themselves to return home after those years.

Ms Plaatjie said the ministry

continued to manage and coordinate Botswana's foreign policy and advance the country's national interests abroad.

She said the ministry worked closely with other ministries through its diplomatic representatives abroad (High Commissions and Embassies),

to engage the international community in the interest of the country and its people.

PAC chairperson Mr Wynter Mmolotsi had asked if there were any counselling arrangements for officers returning from international service. Mr Mmolotsi was of the view that officers live large when they are in foreign missions, adding that they were well taken care of including their children, but when they come back they become like any government employee. He said it was important that they be assisted so that they adjust back to the level of life back home. *BOPA*

Lesaso calls for construction of old age homes

PARLIAMENT - Government should consider building old age homes across the country as a means to provide a dignified life for the elderly, Shoshong MP, Mr Aubrey Lesaso has said.

Debating the Ministry of Local Government and Rural Development budget proposal for the 2024/2025 financial year, Mr Lesaso said while some elderly people could be fortunate enough to have a strong family support system, others did not have the same privilege.

He said in such cases old age homes could provide a safe and secure environment for senior citizens to live comfortably.

Mr Lesaso argued that old age homes would provide specialised care and attention to seniors, which may not be possible at home due to various reasons such as lack of time or expertise.

He said old age facilities could offer round-the-clock care, medical assistance and daily living support to the elderly.

In response, Minister of Local Government and Rural Development, Mr Kgotla Autlwetse highlighted that government was committed to providing a dignified life for the elderly and other less privileged members of the community through various social protection programmes.

"Government has various social protection programmes such as Old Age Pension, Destitute Persons, Orphans and Vulnerable Children, Community Home Based Care patients, World War II veterans and People with Disabilities allowances," he explained.

He noted that over 236 000 beneficiaries were registered under various social protection programmes and that 135 were old age pensioners.

Mr Autlwetse further noted that his ministry proposed to increase

social benefit allowances by P100 from April.

This, he said, would cover safety nets such as old age pension allowances, destitute cash allowance, World War II veterans allowances and the disability allowances while the Village Development Committee sitting allowance would increase by P130.

"Although these increases may not be exhaustive, they are intended to enhance the wellbeing of the beneficiaries," he said.

With reference to Ipelegeng programme, Mr Autlwetse said the implementation of the programme was making significant strides in addressing the challenges faced by the less privileged across the country.

"The transformed programme, encompassing both labour-intensive and drought relief aspects, has engaged a cumulative total of 602 478 individuals and has expended P480.6 million for the 2023/2024 financial year," he said.

He added that the skills development component of the programme continued to positively impact the lives of Batswana, noting that 157 artisans had been accredited in construction-related trades, including bricklaying and plastering, carpentry, plumbing, electrical, painting, tiling and paving.

The minister said ongoing nationwide training was expected to produce 3 294 graduates and deliver 127 projects by the end of the second quarter of the financial year 2024/2025.

In response to the severe arable drought, Mr Autlwetse said government had increased the Ipelegeng programme quota by a combined 20 000 slots.

He said running costs covering materials and tools had been augmented to accommodate an additional 196 construction and minor maintenance projects nationwide. *BOPA*

Over P12 billion for local govt, rural development

PARLIAMENT - Parliament has approved the Ministry of Local Government and Rural Development proposed budget of over P12 billion comprising of P9.4 billion and P2.8 billion for the recurrent and development budgets respectively for the 2024/2025 financial year.

Presenting the budget proposal to Parliament last Thursday, Minister Kgotla Autlwetse said they were meticulously crafted to align with the Reset and Reclaim Agenda, the Economic Recovery and Transformation Plan (ERTP) as well as cabinet strategic thrusts and the SmartBots strategy.

He said the budget proposal was also in line with his ministry's strategy and transformation plan and national development priorities outlined in the Second Transitional National Development Plan (TNDP) as well as the general direction of the 2024/25 budget speech.

The proposal, he said, acted as a conduit to propel the nation towards achieving Vision 2036 aspirations.

Additionally, Mr Autlwetse said the ministry had made strides in improving the lives of the most vulnerable citizens such as expanding access to essential services and providing targeted support to those in need.

He said the Rural Development Council (RDC) remained steadfast in its commitment to supporting community-led projects and complementing the initiatives undertaken by various line ministries.

"During the financial year 2023/2024 and as part of the Second Transitional National Development Plan (TNDP) II, the Rural Development Council was allocated a sum of P6.3 million to bolster community-led endeavours," he said.

The funds, Mr Autlwetse said, were strategically channeled into diverse projects, including the expansion of Zutshwa Salt Mine in the Hukuntsi District, revival of Morula processing plant in the Kweneng District and another new Morula plant in Tsamaya in the North East District as well as the mapping of Morula in the northern region, covering areas from Tswapong through the North East District to Nata/Gweta.

He said the financial resources facilitated capacity also building programmes for community trusts and boards in Zutshwa, Letlhakeng, Boteti, and BORAVAST, (Bokspits, Rapplespan, Valhoek Struisndam) area, focusing on enhancing governance and financial management.

Enterprise Authority (LEA), aims to empower the trusts to handle projects efficiently and propel them toward commercialisation and sustainability," he said.

He said the implementation of the projects was underway and at various stages, adding that it was anticipated to create 77 permanent jobs and improve rural livelihoods through the establishment of robust project value chains.

To sustain the positive momentum, Mr Autlwetse said funds totalling P3 million were needed to continue supporting identified community projects across various districts during financial year 2024/2025.

Furthermore, Mr Autlwetse said an allocation of P6.3 million was made to the ministry for the implementation of Local Economic Development (LED) strategies and plans during 2023/2024 financial year.

He said the funding was aimed at supporting community project start-ups and fostering community resilience and sustainable local economies.

The minister thus proposed the sum of P1 million for the upcoming financial year to strengthen the technical capacity of beneficiaries and to foster product-market linkages as well as enhancing monitoring mechanisms for sustained production and business viability. *BOPA*

Mzwinila commends employees for commitment

PALAPYE - Employees in the Ministry of Lands and Water Affairs have been commended for their professionalism and commitment when undertaking their duties.

towards meeting the 100 000 target of land allocation by acquiring land from those with ploughing fields.

He also cited the acquisition of land from the Tati company.

Dr Mzwinila, however, pleaded with the employees to improve service delivery and turnaround times to ensure customer satisfaction.

In moving with the times, the minister said they would implement smart prepaid meters in the near future in response to complaints of high water bills. *BOPA*

He said the operation of the mine, especially an open cast mine like at Medie, always comes with challenges that they were prepared to deal with and address to protect the environment they operate in.

He said there would be an upgrade of the Medie-Lentsweletau road to Bitumen and the designs have been completed and approved by the Department of Roads while the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) has been submitted to the Department of Environmental Affairs (DEA).

Mr Senome said this was a joint project with government expected and would start this year to fund the project while Minergy will secure their portion funding. He said they were faced with challenges among them health issues caused by smoke from the burnt coal adding they did not have the requisite machinery to deal with the emissions.

Mr Senome said they faced theft of fuels from their trucks but have since moved to a safer

He added that they continued to maintain Medie and Lentsweletau roads especially during rainfall. Apart from challenges, Mr Senome said the improvements made by the mine, which are dust suppressing spraying done after every two days, installing speed humps and maintenance of roads.

Furthermore monitoring the sounds of blasting including the smoke from burning coal, bringing medical specialists to the clinic in Medie, controlling truck traffic from the mine and inspections have been undertaken every month.

The councillors had their concerns pertaining to the mine and the changes that have been made, which affected the people or villages they represented. Cllr Andrew Selwe of Magokotswane said roads in Medie had not been maintained as stated by Mr Senome. He wondered why that was the case.

Adding to Cllr Selwe's sentiments, Nominated Cllr Joseph Kgarebe urged the mine to constantly update them and the residents about issues that might affect them as a community. Cllr Rogers Kgatitswe of Lentsweletau East asked if the foul smell experienced by the residents was not dangerous to their health.

He further asked if the mine management had any plans to extend the village clinic since it was also catering for their employees, adding that an alternative parking area for trucks has to be sought as they make it difficult for other vehicles to access Lentsweletau kgotla. In response, the Director, Mr John Astrud, explained that dust suppression was only done in Medie due to the fact that it was too costly adding the village was the mostly affected.

Talking about the clinic, he said the mine management would consider building a bigger clinic but said it would depend on their budget since the mine was now back in operation.

Mr Astrud assured councilors that the burning of coal that causes smoke would be monitored and managed as operations have just began. Mr Senome explained that parked their trucks near the kgotla for security reasons as the area had security and lights but added they would attend with the issue soon. *BOPA*

More people continue to benefit from CEDA

SELEBI PHIKWE - The Selebi Phikwe branch of the Citizen Entrepreneurial Development Agency (CEDA), has invested P353m in more than 2 970 projects, the Mayor of Selebi Phikwe, Mr Lucas Modimana, has said.

Giving an update during the ongoing full council meeting in Selebi Phikwe Thursday, Mr Modimana said the projects created a total employment of 5 858 in the SPEDU region. He said CEDA went also funded 202 projects with P42m in Selebi Phikwe during financial year 2022/2023 to date. These included main line projects and informal sector projects.

Under the CEDA mainline projects, Mr Modimana said, 36 customers had been funded with a value of P34m to date with majority of these projects being manufacturing, services and agri-businesses. He also said since the closure of borders, P260 000 had been used to fund agribusiness projects, adding that two of the receipts benefited through Impact Acceleration Subsidy, a programme from the Ministry of Agriculture which supported citizens who wish to venture in horticulture with 50 per cent grant and 50 per cent contribution from the applicant.

Mr Modimana said CEDA had also funded 114 projects to the value of P1m under Mabogo Dinku and Letlhabile micro finance products for the year 2022/2023.

"Most of the applicants are the ones managing the projects under these two programmes," he said.

He said there was also Purchase Order Financing where 123 beneficiaries had received funding with a total of P36m used on this category.

For financial year 2022/2023, 23 trade finance projects with a value of P8m were also funded, he added.

However Mr Modimana decried challenges experienced by the agency such as insufficient business experience and technical skills that resulted in failure of the projects despite training and mentoring.

The other challenge was unavailability of warehouses and high rates of electricity on the available warehouses, mismanagement and division of projects funds by the beneficiaries, abandonment and lack of commitment to projects as well as failure to pay back loans.

"I encourage members of the community to work hard towards these government programmes," he said.

As a way of adopting one of the country's reset priorities, the mayor said CEDA had launched a digital platform named CEDA online services #Kaekapakae which was sourced from the its website.

This service would be used by everyone eligible to apply for

a CEDA loan, adding that the platform also allowed Batswana to enquire online, check for loan balances, apply for loans, and check progress of the loan and the use of a loan calculator at the comfort of their home. Touching on the implementation of the supplementary feeding programme, Mr Modimana said the program was progressing well in the district, emphasizing that all primary schools were adequately supplied required food commodities.

He said local community continued to benefit by supplying bread and other food commodities to all 11 primary schools at the cumulative amount of over P2.4m to date. He said 200 farmers had also benefited from the scheme since the beginning of this financial year with the amount of over P1.2m.

Mr Modimana said during financial year 2023/2024 government had developed the second Transitional National Development Plan to allow for the introduction of enabling reforms to the national development planning system.

"The plan was also developed to allow for the completion of some NDP 11 projects whose implementation was disrupted during COVID- 19 pandemic," he said. Primary school facilities backlog eradication was funded with P3.9m.

He said despite the initial delay, all four contractors had been already awarded tenders and started mobilizing on site. He applauded SPEDU for fulfilling their mandate of business facilitation, project initiation and implementation. The construction of the 30km Platjan - Mathathane road linking the Platjan Boarder with Mathathane village was ongoing. He said the road construction was envisaged to create jobs and link South Africa and Botswana for tourism purposes, reduce cost of transport from production to consumers and ease congestion at the Martins Drift border when complete.

He said SPEDU had also facilitated another project (Pipe World, which had created 70 job opportunities during its construction phase and currently employing twenty people. He said when fully operational the project would create employment for 100 people. Highlighting on community projects, Mr Modimana said most of them were not doing well. He said most of their challenges were attributed to shortage funding.

Mr Modimana applauded the Thakomebosele project beneficiaries for diversifying their project by venturing into rearing of broiler chickens and operating a vegetable garden. He said, the project was still thriving well despite financial challenges they faced. He appealed to business community and the general public to continue assisting the project financially and in-kind. *BOPA*

Sese shopping mall takes off

SESE - The Sese shopping mall, which is undertaken through the Public Private Partnership (PPP) model between FAR Property Company and Sese Village Development Committee (VDC), is expected to create 150 jobs.

Once complete the mall would house Choppies Store, a filling station, a pharmacy and a post office, among other services. Speaking at the contract agreement signing ceremony at Sese kgotla on Thursday, Mabutsane District Council chairperson, Mr Kgopolo Setammere-Ramosesane, said the idea was conceptualised in 2021 to address demands of the ever growing population in Sese.

Mr Setammere-Ramosesane said the project resonated with the government's call to partner with the private sector towards developments.

"This partnership is the new model that the government has adopted to facilitate community developments since the government cannot manage alone," he said.

He said as the fastest growing village, owing to its proximity to the mining town of Jwaneng, Sese needed a robust approach to stimulate economic development. He said the new development would not only create job opportunities for the local people, but would also enhance convenience for services otherwise accessed at Jwaneng.

"The development will offer convenience and provide job opportunities for the local people directly and indirectly, thus contributing to the local economy by providing a source of income for employees. The initiative will stimulate the economic growth of the village by nurturing the business environment," he noted.

Mr Setammere-Ramosesane implored the Sese VDC to prudently use the funds from the project by re-investing in more income-generating projects to advance the developments of the village.

The Chief Executive Officer of Choppies, Mr Ramachandran Ottapathu, said even though the development was expected to be completed in 24 months, he was optimistic that they would do so in 12 months. He allayed fears that the mall would have an adverse effect on informal sector businesses.

"The development will enhance overall service delivery in the village and also benefit a lot of small businesses either directly and indirectly. For example, cattle, small stock and vegetable farmers and other people in the informal sector will benefit from it," he said.

The Chairperson of Sese VDC, Mr Toba Rabasimane, said they were delighted to finally welcome such a development, which will transform the economic landscape of their village.

"We applaud FAR Properties for this partnership that will bring a historic infrastructure which will transform the landscape of our village and also offer convenience for various services," he said. *BOPA*

Some Batswana ignorant on tax matters

SHAKAWE - Residents of Shakawe have been urged to be tax compliant and to voluntarily submit returns.

The call was made by the Botswana Unified Revenue Service (BURS) Commissioner General, Ms Jeanette Makgolo at a stakeholder meeting in Shakawe last week.

Ms Makgolo said BURS saw the need to sensitise Batswana on tax matters to raise awareness, hence the stakeholder engagements and road shows across the country. She said tax is significant as it contributes to the developments of the country to benefit everyone equally regardless of their tax brackets.

Ms Makgolo said Batswana expected to pay tax voluntarily, therefore should take pride in paying tax as citizens. She said Botswana relied on assistance from international pre-independence countries but has since become liberated post-independence due to tax collection.

Ms Makgolo thanked Batswana who were tax compliant. She also said BURS was in the process of restructuring, which would help address some challenges and shortage of staff in some areas.

For his part, BURS General Manager North, Mr Patrick Mavuma, said BURS advocated for voluntary and timely filing of returns, accuracy of returns and customs declaration.

Mr Mavuma said at times BURS had to use enforcement of tax compliance for people who were non-compliant. He said there were cases of noncomplaint people in Okavango.

Mr Mavuma said enforcement is, however, tiring and costly because it required tax auditors, investigators and debt collectors. He said people who were taxed were of income bracket of P4 000 and above or P48 000 annually.

Mr Mavuma said people should avoid late filing of returns since it accrued penalties.

He said BURS had online services although some people still lacked knowledge on using the online services. Mr Mavuma said that their wish is to have zero manual submissions.

In his welcome remarks, Kgosi Mutemo Mbambo of Shakawe said people of Okavango have a challenge since the nearest BURS office is in Maun and therefore requested BURS to set up an office in Shakawe. **BOPA**

Tutume District awards clean villages

TUTUME - Dukwi, Nswazwi and Makuta villages have been recognised as the cleanest in Tutume District for the categories of big, medium and small villages respectively.

Officiating at the awarding ceremony in Tutume on Kopane Mine Wednesday, representative, Mr Herbert Kebafetotse, said the clean-up campaign for all the villages and awards in the districts was launched last September in Dukwi with emphasis put on communities to take responsibility for their environment beginning with individual households. Muzila urges women to support each other

FRANCISTOWN - The former mayor of Francistown Ms Sylvia Muzila has called on women to celebrate and support other women who assume leadership positions.

Sharing her perspective on the topic: Women in Leadership positions and Family, during commemoration of International Women's Day in Francistown on Saturday, Ms Muzila commended Ms Dinah Marathe for her groundbreaking achievements as the first woman to head both the Botswana Prison Service and the Botswana Police Service.

Ms Marathe was also the first

female deputy commissioner of the Botswana Police Service -Operations, before she transferred to Botswana Prison Services as Commissioner.

Ms Muzila observed that the appointment of a new female commissioner of police showed that women could lead.

She emphasised the importance of supporting and encouraging women in their efforts to succeed and encouraged women to run for political office.

She said she was surprised that no women from Francistown were running for office in the upcoming general elections and urged them to step up and run for positions of power

She also praised Minister of Finance, Ms Peggy Serame for her dedication to women's empowerment.

She explained that Ms Serame championed several initiatives and policies aimed at supporting women in Botswana, including financial literacy programmes, business development grants and childcare subsidies.

Ms Muzila urged other women in positions of power to follow Ms Serame's example and work to improve the lives of women in their communities.

The former mayor also spoke against the practice of 'small

house' relationships, which she said was a major factor in the high rate of divorce and was harmful to women and families.

In this regard, Ms Muzila urged women to avoid participating in this practice and to work towards creating more stable and loving relationships.

She said International Women's Day should be used as an effective tool in bringing about change.

"While it is a day to celebrate women's achievements and raise awareness about issues affecting women, it should also reflect on underlying problems," she added.

The panelists also held discussion on the topic: To build a woman is to build a family, and Donga Customary Court President, Kgosi Lerato Mogopodi observed that the institution of marriage was under threat due to a number of factors.

She said one of the reasons was the increasing urbanisation of Botswana, which had led to a disconnect between the traditional customs of rural communities and the realities of city life.

She said another primary reason was the increasing number of single-parent households, which he attributed to a variety of social and economic factors.

She also noted the impact of the increasing number of couples cohabitating, which had resulted in fewer couples going through the customary marriage process.

Another panelist, Francistown District Commissioner Ms Chabongwa Matseka said marriage was not simply about physical intimacy, but rather about a commitment and covenant between two people.

Ms Matseka stressed that marriage should be seen as a partnership of equals, where both partners bring something valuable to the relationship.

She encouraged women to consider all aspects of marriage, , when deciding to marry.

Ms Matseka explained that women in marriage should be respectful and supportive of their husbands, while also maintaining their rights and dignity.

"While they should strive to create a harmonious relationship, women should not allow themselves to be treated as inferior or abused. Their role in the marriage should be one of equality and mutual respect, in which both partners take responsibility for the success of the relationship," she added.

The District Commissioner said women should advocate for a marriage in which the wife was not seen as inferior to her husband, but rather as an equal partner who should be treated with respect and care.

The objective of the day was to commemorate the achievements, efforts and struggles of women in the development of the country as well as to discuss the extent to which gender balance had been achieved between men and women. DPP to file application for Selolwane blood samples

GABORONE - The Directorate of Public Prosecutions (DPP) has been ordered to make a formal written application on its request to have child-rape accused, Samuel Selolwane avail himself for blood tests.

Broadhurst magistrate, Ms Gorata Moremi-Ramakoloi ruled this after the prosecution made an oral submission, indicating that they had failed to have the accused person avail himself to have blood samples taken for conducting a deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA) test.

The prosecuting officer, Ms Onalenna Madimabe said refusal by the accused person had also delayed investigations.

"Such reluctance will also mean that we will oppose any shot at bail by the accused person because he might interfere with investigations," she said.

Ms Madimabe also said there should be no way that the magistrate's court could grant Selolwane bail as he was denied such by the High Court only on February 22. After the oral submissions, defence attorney, Dr Obonye Jonas said they needed a written application to enable them to file heads of arguments.

He also indicated that his client was wary of submitting himself for DNA testing as there could be a possibility of self-incrimination.

Dr Jonas also said that there was no need for the magistrate court to deny his client bail on the pretext that he might temper with investigations, wondering how he could change his DNA.

"The prosecution told us that the only thing left in their investigations was the DNA test, but there is no way my client can temper with that as DNA cannot be changed," he argued

Dr Jonas also said the fact that his client had been denied bail by the High Court last week did not prevent him from applying for it again at the lower court since the High Court did not rule out possibility of granting of bail in the future. "The High Court indicated then that it was denying him bail only that time, and its decision was based on papers submitted last month, which means that circumstances that led to his bail denial have possibly changed," he said.

Selolwane, who is accused of having unlawful carnal knowledge of an underage girl at Oodi in January this year, will appear again on March 15 when the prosecution is expected to file a written application to force him to avail himself for blood samples. *BOPA*

Okavango Junior School aims to improve results

GUMARE - Okavango Junior School parents have been implored to collaborate with teachers to improve Junior Certificate Examinations (JCE) results.

This came to light at meeting of teachers and parents of form three pupils in Gumare on Friday.

The school head Mr Ekubile Mmusinyane said strategies were put in place to help improve JCE results.

Mr Mmusinyane said the current school performance was below the national target of 50 per cent.

The school head however, said learners' behavior in general was pleasing following a boot camp held the previous year.

Okavango Junior School Deputy School head, Mr Noah Saubi said the school scored 27.2 per cent in the 2023 JCE results, which placed it on position eight in the North West region.

He said the school registered a 0.5 per cent improvement from the 2022 score of 26.74 per cent.

He observed that Maitlamo Junior School of Maun was on position one in the district with 48.5 per cent in the 2023 results while Ngami, Sekgoma, Etsha and Gowa junior schools were the lowest performing schools.

Mr Saubi said Okavango Junior School's 2023 JCE results were the most improved results in the past 10 years.

He however, said performance for the current form three pupils was low compared to the last JC leavers hence the need to collaborate more with parents.

Mr Saubi said the school had strategies in place such as a mentoring programme, which allowed a small group of pupils to be tutored by a teacher.

He said pupils whose performance was below D and showed improvement would be added to the mentorship groups.

Mr Saubi said the school was divided into four houses, which competed against each other to encourage competition amongst learners.

He said that teachers' progression also depended on their performance which inspired teachers to produce quality results.

Mr Saubi appealed to parents to encourage pupils to make use of morning studies. He also encouraged parents to do regular class visits and check their children's books. **BOPA**

SIKWANE- Madikwe Cultural Festival, a cultural celebration characterised by traditional cuisine, music, games and attire, is gaining popularity taking its rightful place in the calendar of events in the country while at the same time promoting the river villages as alternative places of entertainment and leisure.

The event, which is now in its third edition, this past weekend offered nothing but loads of entertainment to a mature audience who had come in large numbers to spend time away from a hectic work schedule and day-to-day activities.

In his remarks earlier, Member of Parliament for Kgatleng East, Mabuse Pule commended the hosts for promoting the area, which had a dark history to it. He said in the past, the area was referred to as 'the wrong side' because of pickpocketers who had adopted this bad culture from the then Apartheid South Africa emanating from the fact that black people used to fight for everything for survival.

"We are very proud as people from the river villages to host people from other places as well as the recognition we are now enjoying. This shows growth," MP Pule said.

He encouraged the local community not to take the festival lightly. "This is a big thing that will impact positively on our local economic development," he emphasised.

He further encouraged the informal sector to be part of this event in the future to improve and develop sustainable local economy.

The host, Ms Tshegofatso Powane explained that Madikwe Cultural Festival's purpose was to showcase Setswana culture through performing arts, traditional edutainment games, artifacts and food as well as to promote culture in general.

She also said she was happy that the festival was gaining popularity because they managed to market and advertise the event thoroughly through different media platforms.

She said the event had now stood in the gap left by the once popular Orange Letlhafula, which allowed attendees to taste various traditional

For her part, Ms Batsile Pilane also known as DJ Batsy said this year's edition had attracted a large crowd. Increasing doping cases cause for concern

GABORONE Botswana Athletics Association (BAA) has expressed worry at the increasing number of doping cases amongst athletes, which has consequently placed the country under the red

Addressing the annual general assembly on Saturday, BAA president Moses Bantsi said doping in athletics had taken a new twist and was now out of control given the number of cases reported so far. He noted that athletes were doping openly during competitions and at training, adding that this was supported by evidence the governing body had collected.

"You will find syringes and all kinds of items related to doping at the stadium ablutions block in the far north stand next to where we normally place our call room.

Some have been seen by their fellow athletes using performance enhancing tablets but they choose to keep quiet about such bad practices," he said.

Bantsi said the trend was now worrisome to the future of athletics growth in the country and warned that the National Anti-Doping Agency (NADO) was aware of the situtation, which was a threat to all national teams including the Paris 2024 Olympic Games team.

"We are all working together including BAA, BNOC, BNSC, NADO and RADO to put in place mechanisms that can help in bringing the situation under

In all honesty, our sport is in danger and efforts are needed to save athletics and the next generation by protecting their future in athletics," he said.

On the Botswana Golden Grand Prix, he said they learnt through the organiser, Golden Door Sports Agency that its contract with World Athletics had been withdrawn.

He said BAA had written to the president of World Athletics, Sebastian Coe and the Confederation of African Athletics (CAA) president Hamad Kalkaba to rescind the cancellation of the said contract as it would impact negatively on the development of world-class competitions in the country and Africa.

"What I can tell you is that we are still awaiting a response from both bodies CAA and World Athletics,' he said.

BAA general manager, Pinkie Wilson said their calendar of events for this year had 63 activities.

She said out of that number, 11 would be hosted by the federation, while different clubs would organise 52 events.

She said the target was to improve the performance and preparation of athletes for upcoming events amongst them the Olympics and Africa Senior Championships

She, however, said some events were not captured in their calendar such as the Botswana Life Half Marathon, Lobatse Town Council Half Marathon, the Sir Seretse Khama Day Half Marathon and the African Stars International Championship Athletics collaboration with UB Athletics.

Wilson further said their Memorandum of Agreement with Debswana, which commenced on January, 01 2022, would continue until December 31, 2024.

She also updated the affiliates that despite enduring a challenging transition last year, the association had achieved most of its planned activities, including sending teams to internal events.

BAA, she said remains filled with eagerness to continue attainment of the bold three medal target at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games and other World Athletics Championships. BOPA
