ZONE 1 THE FAR NORTH: ALASKA, YUKON and NORTHWEST TERRITORIES. Coordinator: Kenelm W. Philip. Contributors: C. D. Ferris, J. & L. Troubridge, P. Ross, and collectors for the Alaska Lepidoptera Survey. Previously unreported localities or species are emphasized; collecting was by ALS volunteers unless noted. Note regarding Alaska Lepidoptera Survey: K. Philip (along with C. D. Ferris and J. & L. Troubridge) spent 20 June through 9 July on the Seward Peninsula, Alaska. Collecting was concentrated at 7 sites: Dry Creek (at the western foot of the Darby Mountains, near Omilak); mile 41.5 & 54 Council Road (east of Nome); mile 50 Kougarok Road (east end of the Kigluaik Mts.); Bonanza Hill on the Glacier Road, and mile 18 & 28 Teller Road. The weather was incredibly cooperative-only 3 days out of 20 were lost to poor weather, which is not the usual summer condition on the Seward Peninsula! Temperatures were abnormally high both preceding and during our field work, and the butterfly flight season was noticeably advanced. The Darby Mountains have never been collected for butterflies (barring one ALS volunteer who obtained a few specimens from unspecified sites in 1971), so the Dry Creek fauna was of considerable interest (see below). Abbreviations: A.S. = Alaska Summary; s.l. = sensu lato (in the broad sense).

YUKON TERRITORY. Weather: The southern Y.T. had a late spring, a hot and dry early summer, then poorer weather from mid-July on.

BUTTERFLIES: OG ILVIE MTS- Windy Pass, km 154 Dempster Highway, 6-12 June. Ferris, Philip, and Ross report Pyrgus centaureae, Parnassius eversmanni, Artogeia napi, Pontia occidentalis, Euchloe creusa, Glaucopsyche lygdamus, Clossiana freija, Erebia fasciata, E. mackinleyensis, E. youngi, Oeneis melissa. No new records here-but it is of interest to note which species are flying at the very start of the butterfly season. The tundra was still brown, there were patches of snow on the hillsides, and North Fork Pass, 50 miles to the south, was still in the grip of winter. The remaining Yukon Territory reports are all from C. D. Ferris: KLONDIKE HIGHWAY 2- Carcross dune area, 15 July, additional species (see 1985 A.S.), Lycaeides idas, Vaccinina optilete. Montana Mountain (south of Carcross), 15 July, additional species (see 1985 A.S.), Colias philodice, Lycaeides idas, Boloria napaea, Clossiana titania, Erebia youngi. YUKON HIGHWAY 11 (Stewart Crossing-Keno Road)- Km 31.5, 13-14 July, additional species (see 1985 A.S.), Hesperia comma, Colias alexandra, C. palaeno, C. philodice, Epidemia dorcas, Lycaeides idas (abundant), Clossiana titania (abundant), Basilarchia arthemis, Phyciodes pratensis. Keno Hill, 14 July, nothing seen except for Clossiana chariclea and Oeneis melissa. Hansen Lake Road, 14 July, additional species (see 1985 A.S.), Colias palaeno, Epidemia dorcas, Lycaeides idas (Clossiana titania) idas, Clossiana titania.

OG LLVIE MTS- Windy Pass, 12 June, Ferris reports: [Arctiidae] Acsala anomala (?), [Geometridae] Epelis KLONDIKE HIGHWAY 2- Montana Mountain, 15 July, Ferris reports: [Geometridae] Aspilates orciferarius, truncataria. [Noctuidae] Sympistis kolthoffi, S. lapponica.

ALASKA. Weather: In the Interior, a late spring was followed by a record-breaking spell of hot, clear weather in early and middle summer. 'Normal' weather resumed in mid-July. On the Seward Peninsula the same weather pattern (because of the later emergence of insects in coastal areas) produced an early spring and an unprecedented period of excellent collecting through the first week of July--at which time the weather deteriorated abruptly and ended the collecting season. New collecting sites: 1) Dry Creek, at the W foot of the Darby Mountains, 3 miles S of Omilak. In the early 1950's the Bureau of Mines improved a natural airstrip on Dry Creek, about a mile west of the mountains. The present runway is 1100 feet long--no problem for a Cessna 207. Dry Creek is about a 45-minute flight from Nome by bush plane. There is a small wooden cabin on the runway, which provides welcome protection from the occasional fierce winds that can hit this totally unprotected site. Biotopes range from tussock tundra and riverbank thickets at 250 feet elevation to blockfield and scree up to 2514 feet elevation, and include a large gravel alluvial fan (the base for the airstrip) with a markedly xeric flora. Colias and Boloria (s.1.) were not abundant here, but it was an excellent spot for rockslide



species. 2) Council Road, mile 54, col between E fork Solomon River and Skookum River. This col is the highest point on the Council Road (1000 feet), and the peak just to the north goes up to 1737 feet. Erebia youngi was more abundant here than I have ever seen it on the Seward Peninsula, and Clossiana improba was flying in depressions on the slope N of the col. 3) Bonanza Hill, mile 4.3 Glacier Road. This was not a particularly interesting site at first glance, but proved excellent for Colias and Boloria (s.1.).

RANGE EXTENSIONS: BUTTERFLIES- Erebia mackinleyensis from 2 miles east of the Kelly River (8 miles north of the Noatak River), and the following localities on the Seward Peninsula: Dry Creek (west side of Darby Mountains), mile 54 Council Road, mile 50 Kougarok Road. The Kelly River record is the first from the Noatak drainage, and is also the first from the 230-mile gap between Ogotoruk Creek on the NW Alaskan coast, and Howard Pass in the west central Brooks Range. There have been two previous records for E. mackinleyensis from the Seward Peninsula, both from the Teller Road (see 1981 & 1969 A.S.) between Penny River and Cripple Creek--but it is now clear that the species is much more

widespread, and will probably be found in many other parts of the peninsula.

Numerous localities between the Kelly River and the Nimiuktuk River, 5 July-1 August, Papilio machaon, Artogeia napi, Colias hecla, C. thula, C. nastes, C. philodice (?), C. palaeno, Lycaeides idas, Vacciniina optilete, Agriades rustica, Boloria napaea, Clossiana chariclea, Coenonympha kodiak, Erebia rossii, E. disa, E. mackinleyensis, Oeneis bore. Noatak Village, 8 July, Colias philodice, C. palaeno, Lycaeides idas, Vacciniina optilete, Clossiana chariclea, Coenonympha kodiak, Oeneis polixenes. SEWARD PENINSULA- Dry Creek, at the W foot of the Darby Mts, 3 miles S of Omilak, 20 June-1 July, <u>Parnassius eversmannii</u>, <u>Papilio machaon</u>, <u>Pontia occidentalis</u>, <u>Artogeia napi</u>, <u>Euchloe creusa</u>, <u>Colias hecla</u>, <u>C. thula</u>, <u>C. nastes</u>, <u>C. philodice</u>, <u>C. gigantea</u>, <u>C. palaeno</u>, <u>Everes amyntula</u>, <u>Glaucopsyche lygdamus</u>, <u>Lycaeides idas</u>, Vacciniina optilete, Agriades rustica, Proclossiana eunomia, Clossiana frigga, C. polaris, C. freija, C. distincta, C. chariclea, Coenonympha kodiak, Erebia rossii, E. disa, E. mackinleyensis, E. fasciata, E. youngi, E. occulta, Oeneis bore, O. jutta, O. melissa, O. polixenes. Council Road, mile 53-54, 3 July, Parnassius eversmannii, Papilio machaon, Pontia occidentalis, Artogeia napi, Euchloe creusa, Colias nastes, C. palaeno, Vacciniina optilete, Clossiana frigga, C. improba, C. polaris, C. freija, C. distincta, C. chariclea, Erebia disa, E. mackinleyensis, E. youngi, E. occulta, Oeneis melissa, O. polixenes. Council Road, mile 41.5, near Quigley's Camp, 3 July, additional species (see 1979, 1981) A.S.), Papilio machaon, Pontia occidentalis, Colias thula, C. palaeno, Vaccinina optilete, Clossiana freija, Erebia fasciata, E. occulta (the "E. sp." of the 1979 A.S.). This locality contains a large expanse of nearly level fine gravel scree--an ideal collecting site for Erebia occulta! Kougarok Road, mile 50, E end of Kigluiak Mts., 4 July, additional species (see 1976, 1980 A.S.), Parnassius eversmanni, Papilio machaon, Pontia occidentalis, Artogeia napi, Euchloe creusa, Lycaeides idas, Vacciniina optilete, Proclossiana eunomia, Clossiana frigga, C. polaris, C. freija, C. distincta, Erebia rossii, E. disa, E. mackinleyensis, E. fasciata, E. youngi, E. occulta, Oeneis bore, O. melissa, O. Bonanza Hill, mile 4.3 Glacier Road, 5-9 July, Parnassius eversmanni, Papilio machaon, Pontia occidentalis, Artogeia napi, Euchloe creusa, Colias hecla, C. thula, C. nastes, C. philodice, C. palaeno, Lycaeides idas, Vaccinina optilete, Agriades rustica, Boloria napaea, Proclossiana eunomia, Clossiana polaris, C. freija, C. chariclea, Coenonympha kodiak, Erebia rossii, Oeneis bore, O. polixenes. Mt Distin, terminus of Glacier Road, 5 July, additional species (see 1976 A.S.), Oeneis melissa. Teller Road, mile 18, 2-9 July, additional species (see 1976, 1979, 1980, 1981 A.S.), <u>Lycaeides idas</u> (abundant), <u>Erebia disa</u>, <u>E. fasciata, Oeneis bore, O. melissa</u>. Note that the 1976 reference to "<u>Erebia dabanensis</u>?" from this site is actually <u>E. occulta</u> (abundant in 1986), which seems to be present here in numbers almost every summer. Teller Road, mile 28, Sinuk River valley, 2-7 July, more additional species, (see 1976, 1979, 1980 A.S.), <u>Papilio machaon, Euchloe creusa, Colias nastes, Clossiana polaris, Erebia fasciata. Note: Parnassius phoebus</u> was not observed on the Seward Peninsula this summer, despite thorough checking of previously known localities. It may have emerged after 10 July, but if so its emergence was well after any of the species it normally flies with. It was expected that the hot weather would have advanced the emergence of this species as it did all the others--but possibly moisture rather than heat is the trigger for P. phoebus, and this summer was noticeably deficient in precipitation until the weather broke in mid-July. It might also be noted here that Erebia theano has not yet been found on the Seward Peninsula. We looked for it in the Darby Mountains, but with no luck. INTERIOR ALASKA- Charley River, numerous sites from Bonanza Creek to 15 miles SSW of Copper Creek, 18 June-23 July, <u>Colias palaeno</u>, <u>Lycaeides idas</u>, <u>Vacciniina optilete</u>, <u>Agriades rustica</u>, <u>Proclossiana eunomia</u>, <u>Clossiana improba</u>, <u>C. freija</u>, <u>C. titania/chariclea</u>, <u>Phyciodes pratensis</u>, <u>Nymphalis antiopa</u>, <u>Basilarchia arthemis</u>, <u>Erebia disa</u>, <u>E. discoidalis</u>, <u>E. youngi</u>, <u>E. epipsodea</u>, <u>Oeneis bore</u>, melissa. Coal Creek, 10 miles W of Charley River, 7 August, Colias philodice, Epidemia dorcas, Vacciniina optilete, Clossiana titania/chariclea, Polygonia faunus. Eagle, 7 June, Erynnis persius, Papilio machaon, Glaucopsyche lygdamus, Aglais milberti, Polygonia faunus. Note: A. milberti was collected in Eagle by S. Hall Young (presumably in 1899 or 1901—there are no dates on the specimens), but I have not seen any subsequent records until this one. I was beginning to doubt that A. milberti was a resident species in Eagle -- but a capture this early in the season would appear to indicate an overwintering specimen. Yukon River, 11/2 miles N of Fort Hamlin, 2 July, Basilarchia arthemis (common). B. arthemis appears to have been unusually abundant in the Interior this year. Chicken, mile 65.5 Taylor Highway, 6 June, Colias near hecla (the "Murphy Dome Colias"), Glaucopsyche lygdamus, Clossiana freija. This locality was taiga, at 1650 feet elevation--considerably lower than the biotope for the Murphy Dome Colias near Fairbanks. Wickersham Dome, mile 30 Elliott Highway, 15 June, Ferris & Philip report: <u>Papilio machaon</u>, <u>Pontia occidentalis</u>, <u>Artogeia napi</u>, <u>Colias</u> near <u>hecla</u>, <u>Clossiana freija</u>, <u>Erebia rossii</u>, <u>E. youngi</u>. This is the first record for <u>E. youngi</u> so close to Fairbanks. Ester Dome, 14 June, Vanessa cardui. Previous Alaska records for this migratory species have been from SE Alaska. ALASKA RANGE- Windy Fork, Kuskokwim River, about 30 miles SSW of Farewell, 4700 feet, 27 July, Parnassius phoebus. SOUTH CENTRAL ALASKA- Terminus of Eureka Glacier, head of Maclaren River, 12 August, Parnassius phoebus. Independence Mine State Historical Park, head of East Fork Fishhook Creek, 3500-3700 feet, 11 July, Ferris and Philip report: Artogeia napi, Aglais milberti, Boloria napaea, Clossiana chariclea. This is an extremely lush area floristically, with a surprisingly sparse butterfly fauna--but the large B. napaea from this site are interesting. SOUTHEASTERN ALASKA-Haines Highway, mile 41 (Alaska/B.C. border), 6 September, additional species (see 1978, 1982, 1983 A.S.), Colias philodice, Speyeria mormonia.

MOTHS: SEWARD PENINSULA- Dry Creek, at the W foot of the Darby Mts, 3 miles S of Omilak, 20 June-1 July, Ferris reports: [Lymantriidae] Gynaephora rossii, [Geometridae] Aspilates orciferarius, Holarctias sentinaria, Rheumaptera subhastata, Selenia alciphiaria, Semiothisa near marmorata, Scopula septentrionicola, Xanthorhoe near abrasaria, [Noctuidae] Anarta melanopa, Sympistis lapponica, Lasiestria (?) sp. Bonanza Hill, mile 4.3 Glacier Road, 5-9 July, Ferris reports: [Geometridae] Epirrhoe alternata, Holarctias sentinaria, Scopula inductata.

ZONE 2 PACIFIC NORTHWEST: IDAHO, OREGON, WASHINGTON, BRITISH COLUMBIA. Coordinator: J. H. Shepard (JHS). Contributors: Ray Albright (RA), G. Cassis (GC), G. M. Cooper (GMC), C. R. Crowe (CRC), Theata Crowe (TC), David L.

General Collecting Conditions: Collectors in the southern and especially costal portions of the Zone reported an early and prolonged season with early and late capture records for several species. At about the Washington - British Columbia border the situation changed so that the season was normal there and slightly late in the central part of B.C., particularly for alpine species. A few contributors sent in scattered moth records but it is not possible to determine if they are County Records. The coordinator is nearly finished with a checklist and county records for PNW moths so that moths can be more accurately reported in the future.

MIGRATORY SPECIES: Several contributors (JH, RMP, RR) noted an abundance of N. californica in Oregon and SW Washington. CDF noted large numbers of N. californica in Columbia Co, Wash. and Latah Co, Ida. Other migratory species

IDAHO. CDF collected in Boundary, Latah, Idaho, Lemhi & Nez Perce Counties. DLE again collected in Canyon and Owyhee Counties in mid Aug. RR collected extensively in Bonneville, Kootenai, Shoshone, Teton Counties with several new County Records as noted below. JB collected briefly in Kootenai County in early Sept. All told this is one of the best

reports from Idaho with 17 County Records!

WASHINGTON. WW, RMP, and RR reported extensive collecting with most species common in eastern Washington, but despite this there were few county records! RMP reported several county records plus many unusual flight dates for SW

Washington. Total county records were 16.

GTA and ANA report that the winter of 1985-86 was very dry with the first light rain in the southern part just before mid-Jan. Thereafter quite warm -- in the low 70s through much of the rest of Jan. Early Feb cool with showers, followed by another warm spell. This brought out a number of species, accounting for 13 EARLY records for southern Nevada, with 8 species recorded in Jan. This warm weather extended to northern Nevada causing a very early thaw at the middle elevations. Summer was very dry in most of the state. Summer fauna of the lowlands was early to normal, mid elevation butterflies flew early and were nearly past by mid-July. Higher elevation areas were about normal, whereas fall collecting ended abruptly with the cold of mid-Sept.

There were moderate rains in late fall and early winter in 1985, but also extended periods of clear, cold weather. Jan 1986 was a mixture of rain, showers and cloudy days, but several sunny periods warming into the high 60s in the Bay Area (RLL). Heavy, above normal rains in early Feb to the 21st (RLL), resulting in widespread flooding, and severe damage to habitats and loss of some local populations of marsh and riparian butterflies; both L. xanthoides and P. campestris devastated in Yolo & Solano Cos (AMS). Gates Cyn. (Inner Coast Range) had 28" and was blocked by mudslides until 22 Feb (AMS). Then folowed by sunshine and a sudden warming; 77° on 25 Feb & 81° on 26 Feb in San Francisco (RLL), 81° on 26 Feb in Fairfield (AMS). Subsequent heavy rains in March, followed by unusually hot from mid-spring to early summer in the Bay Area (RLL). Summer remarkably cool with only three 100° days in Davis (AMS) and extensive fog along the coast (RLL), but no measurable summer rain. Heavy mid-Sept rain in the lowlands and 12" of snow at Donner Summit on 18 Sept. Thereafter, almost no precipitation through year's end. The autumn dragged on forever, with little valley fog until Christmas week (AMS), with most of the common species flying very late in the Central Valley (AMS) and along the coast (RLL). Southern California, in contrast, had a relatively dry spring. Rainfall totals somewhat below the 40 year average for most Mojave Desert locations (WLS), whereas further north (Fresno, etc.) rainfall was right at average (WLS). At Jerseydale, Mariposa Co, it was a dry winter with much below normal ppt., though heavy rains in the 3rd week of Feb, plus some in March, April and early May (OS). Dry, hot summer and fall -- few species and low numbers for the season, black-lighting poor (OS).

Data received included 1304 total records, of which 1142 were for butterflies and 162 for moths. There were 9 state records and 901 county records for butterflies, the second best year since I became coordinator. volume of moth data received was disappointing. Nearly 20 additional bf species were completed from all counties of a particular state. Data were received for 271 species of bfs, a new high; the total for the last ten years combined is 372 species. The 1986 season was a very good one overall, mainly early and dry at lower elevations and about normal up high. Many southern immigrant species were observed, as was also true in Kansas (Chas Ely). The Summary format is as previously; the year for all records is 1986 except as noted. Capitalized county names represent new county records for my files. I hope eventually, with computerization, to start indicating new county records for moths as well as butterflies. This is a ways away, however. I express thanks to all contributors, and wish all a good year in 1987!

Contributors: BFC, SLE, GBG, JLH, SJK, F/JP. No one commented on the season, but from the data received it must have been fairly dry and advanced, with numerous records for southern casual species. No moths were reported. BUTTERFLIES: Over 350 data points were received, representing 109 species and 333 new county records. There were two state records (Boloria frigga and Amblyscirtes oslari), both of which are probably breeding resident species. Two more species were completed from all MT counties (P. occidentalis and V. cardui), raising that total to 4 (the other two are <u>C. philodice</u> and <u>C. pegala</u>). <u>UTAH</u>. Contributors: GBG, JLH, JMJ, P/SS, SWS, RES. It was a very warm and early season (P/SS), and from the volume of data received it must have been a good one. My own experience in May and June was fabulous weather with high rivers and some flooding.

BUTTERFLIES: I received 277 data points and 255 county records for 106 species, which is even better than last year. There was one state record (<u>J. nigrosuffusa</u>), and only Salt Lake and Utah counties had no new county records. It is unfortunate that CFG has asked me to stop using his statistical totals for Utah, because the state went over 100 average species per county in 1986. Using only my own totals, which include those from all sources for which I have full data, the current average is 92.55 sp/co. Also, as in previous years, the listed STATE and COUNTY records do not

take into consideration earlier CFG and other records for which I do not have data. The records reproduced here represent the first published records as indicated. The collecting season began earlier than in the average year. For butterfies it was a spectacular year with six new species being added to the state list, five of them strays, in what was the best season since at least 1979. OHIO. The Ohio Lepidopterists experienced an outstanding year for both butterfly and moth collecting, amassing a wealth of data for the Ohio Survey of Lepidoptera. Records from 29 contributors were compiled, resulting in a grand total of county records in excess of several hundred, with 13 new state moth records, plus a new U.S. record! Iftner and Lucas reported a very early spring (2-3 weeks advanced), with spring-emerging butterflies collected the last days of March. Most species appeared 1-2 weeks early through much of the season. I. henrici, S. melinus, L. bachmanii and B. philinor

were much more common than in previous years, with irregular species P. communis and P. protodice locally abundant. P. sennae was seen several times, and a number of southern migrant moths were reported.

Hess and Sedman reported an unusually hot, early spring, with the season advanced several weeks. P. polymenes was collected on 27 March! The remainder of the season was variable, with a hot July, an unusually cool late summer, and mixed cool and warm rainy spells in fall. Most resident butterflies were up in numbers. Migrant species also had a good year, with P. sennae the most abundant since 1975. Wiker also experienced an early spring, with nine butterfly species (including D. plexippus) collected by 31 March, and he found P. sennae common in August and September. Six reports were received. Ferge noted a sudden onset of mild conditions in March, which caused several species of spring-emerging Noctuids to appear by the month's end, unusually early. Fmergences of Catocala were also advanced, with a record 12 species seen before the end of June. Cool or rainy conditions prevailed after early August, hampering collecting efforts. Parkinson sent data on butterflies and moths from many counties, giving the state good coverage. He and Ferge reported finding a number of southern migrants. Balogh summarized collecting trips to Grant and Vilas Counties. Wilterding, reporting for Door County, felt it was a poor year overall, finding Hesperiidae, Nymphalidae and Noctuidae down from last year.

possibly predicting further reduction in lep populations for next season.

BUTTERFLIES: DS observed oviposition by E. horatius on Quercus alba in Medford, Middlesex Co; Euphyes dion, near Stockbridge, Berkshire Co, 17 July, STATE (DS); C. inornata, 1st brood peak 3 June, 2nd brood peak 14 Aug, Wilmington, Middlesex Co (SG); SG noted C. pegala alope feeding at dung and tree sap, but nectaring at only one species of flower, Rhus glabra, which also attracted 8 other butterfly species, Wilmington, Middlesex Co, 15 July.

C. ladon "marginata", Rothsville, Lancaster Co, 16 Oct (AS). D. plexippus larvae were seen in equal numbers on A. syriaca and A. incarnata in Gettysburg in '86 (CS).

ZONE 11 HAWAII/PACIFIC ISLANDS: Coordinator: J.C.R. Riotte [R]. Contributor: Peter Hall [H], Ottawa, ONT, Canada. Weather in the first half of 1986 was still much on the dry side. Since then it seems to have returned more to the normal status. Butterflies seem to have fully recovered. With the moths this apparently will take a longer time.

OAHU AND HAWAII. For the first time, absolutely clear white specimens of Danaus plexippus were observed in Kalihi (Honolulu) in 2 colonies of normal and brownish/whitish ones and in one colony on the big island of Hawaii, [for the former R, for the latter Dr. F. Howarth (Bish.Mus.)]. Although it would have been possible to catch one of these new genetic developments, this was not done so as not to interfere with their further development. However, a sample of 45 pupae was taken from one Oahu colony. Of them, 3 were parasitised by tachinid flies; 7 died for unknown reasons; 35 produced adult specimens, in which 34 cases were normal brown forms, and one single specimen was the already well known brownish/whitish form; no pure white one was obtained. The brown specimens were released, the abnormal one is in the collection of Bishop Museum. The experiment will be continued, [R and Sabina F. Swift, Bishop Mus.].

<u>MAUI.</u> The sphingid <u>Manduca blackburni</u> was well observed on *Nothocestrum* and also on its previously known foodplant *Nicotiana glauca*. Some larvae were brought to the Museum in Honolulu and photographed. The larvae are very interesting as they have elevated sculptured white adornments instead of simple lines. It seems that this sphingid has made a full come-back, [R].

FIJI. Hall submitted a list of what he had observed and/or taken at the beginning of September: Melanitis leda, Xois sesara, Danaus plexippus, Euploea boisduvali, Hypolimnas bolina, Anaphaeis java, Catopsilia pomona, Eurema hecabe, Jamides bochus, Zizina otis, Oriens augustula (common), Hasora khoda (a good record from Fiji; Bishop Museum has only 2 specimens from 1969), Badamia atrox which is not too uncommon, [H].

ZONE 12 THE NORTHERN NEOTROPICS: MEXICO, CENTRAL AMERICA, THE ANTILLES. Coordinator: Eduardo C. Welling M. Contributors: James P. Brock (JPB), Dr. Keith S. Brown, Jr. (KSB), Kenneth C. Hansen (KCH), Stering O. and Eileen Mattoon (SO&EM), John T. McBurney (JTMcB), James R. Mori (JRM), Douglas Mullins (DM), Dr. Raymond B. Nagle (RBN), Steven J. Prchal (SJP), Vincent Roth (VR), Michael J. Smith (MJS), and Ralph E. Wells (REW). No weather reports were given but it seems that, in some places, drought conditions were in effect, especially in the Yucatan peninsula. Once again crop losses were heavy in this area, and where there might have been a fair crop, swarms of locusts fattened themselves. In November, out of season rains began, and at least in Quintana Roo and Belize continued right through the end of December. By this month the locusts had spread to western Yucatan and northern Campeche, and seemed to be on the increase. Let us wonder why inedibles (locusts, roaches, flies, rats, etc.) are always so abundant! We had word that in the Mexico City area there was rain in the afternoons for nearly 100 days in a row. It is unknown to me where the normal or over normal amount of rain area stopped and the drought area in the southeast of the country began. Coordinator's note: JPB notifies me that the Chlosyne mazarum reported from Sonora in the 1984 summary was misidentified; it is really rosita. People using this data in any way, take note.

MEXICO. SONORA. JPB, RBN, SJP, and MJS collected near Mariscal (57 km SW of Moctezuma) on March 29-30, finding Hesperia pahaska, Atrytonopsis pittacus, Dione moneta, Apodemia hypoglauca, Cyllopsis windi and Pindis squamistriga (these last two probably important range extensions). From Aug 4 to 9, MJS, SJP, JRM, RFW, SO&FM, KCH, DM, and JPB collected on Hwy 16 localities mentioned in the 1984 report for Sonora and found most of the same species mentioned plus Emesis emesia, Typhedanus undulatus, Windia windi, Heliopetes macaira, Phoebis intermedia, Chiomara mithrax, Zopyrion sandace. On the Yécora-Santa Rosa road, they found the same species mentioned in the 1984 report plus D. moneta, Apodemia nais, Paratrytone melane vitellina, Ministrymon phrutus, Atrytonopsis lunus, Phoeides uranus, Catasticta nimbice, and Autochton cincta. The P. intermedia and C. nimbice may well be new STATE RECORDS. Moth records for the state include Hylesia continua cressida on Hwy 16, 30 km E of Rio Yaqui, at light. Anisota assimilis larvae common on Oak (Quercus) sps. on which larvae of Eacles oslari and nests of Gloveria howardi were also found. On Aug. 8, Citheronia splendens sinaloensis, E. oslari, Sphingicampa montana and hubbardi, Adeloneivaia isara, Rothschildia c. cincta were taken at light. MJS notes that these species were taken in July (of which year?) and this would indicate a second brood; perhaps it may indicate nothing more than a late emergence date due to climatic factors. On the Yécora road, 6 km E of Santa Rosa, on Aug 6, taken at light were Sphingicampa albolineata (S. raspa according to Lemaire), Automeris randa, iris hesselorum, and cecrops pamina, R. c. cincta, and H. continua cressida. A. iris and S. montana larvae were found on Mimosa biuncifera.

<u>VERACRUZ</u>. KSB collected from Cuauhmapa to Poapan, near Fortin de las Flores, on Jan 25 at 1200 m elevation. On Aug 5-13 near Las Palmas, Omealca, he found interesting collecting including <u>Ituna lamirus</u>, <u>Limenitis archippus</u>, <u>Adelpha melantho</u>, <u>Asterocampa argus</u>, 4 sps. of <u>Doxocampa</u> including females, <u>Eribates battus</u>, 8 sps. of <u>Eurema</u> and a few <u>Graphium</u>.

GUERRERO. KSB, near Teocalco on Aug 14, found Morpho polyphemus, Microtia elva, Myscelia cyananthe, Graphium thymbraeus and abundant Parides sps.

MORELOS. On Aug 14 near Cuernavaca, KSB collected Papilio garamas and G. thymbraeus.

OAXACA. KSB collected in the Sierra Chinantla (northern reaches of the Sierra Juarez) on Jan 26 & 27 and on Aug 6 to 12. Elevations given for the following species are along the Valle Nacional-Yetla (75 m)-Mo Cuou (Cerro Pelon, at 2950 m) road. Without relating which species were found on whichever of his two collecting trips, he found Morpho luna (1500 m), Caligo uranus (200 m), 3 sps. of Opsiphanes, Paramacera chinanteca (2400 m), Pedaliodes circumdecta, Dioriste tauropolis, Satyrotaygetis satyrina, Cyllopsis suivalens, Cyllopsis sp. (all at 1500 m), Taygetis mermeria and Chloreuptychia sericeela (200 m), Anetia thirza (2400 m, ova and foodplant found and reared by Jorge Llorente), Mechanitis doryssus larvae found on a Solanum (near palinacanthum) and reared to adults by KSB, Callithomia hezia wellingi and Napeogenes tolosa (750 m), Oleria zea (ova on Lyciantes sp.), O. paula (ova on a Solanaceae-Bassoria sp.), Ithomia leila (larvae defoliating a wild Capsicum), Episcada salvinia and Pteronymia cotytto on Solanum geminata, Hymenitis oto (ova and larvae on Cestrum sp.), 10 sps. of Phyciodes, Polygonia g-argenteum (1800 m), 8 sps. of Adelpha, 8 Hamadryas, Catagramma lyca, C. casta (both at 750 m), Anaea schausiana (1700 m, ova found on foodplant, reared by Armando Luiz M.), Eumaeas debora, Arcas imperialis and cypria, Theritas mavors, Euselasia aurantiaca, Mesosemia tetrica, Baeotis hisbon zonata, Symmachia tricolor, probetor, and accusatrix, Dismorphia eunoë, jethys, and nemesis, Catasticta

flisa, Hesperocharis graphites, Papilio abderus, P. esperanza (sight record), P. torquatus tolus, Prepona phaedra.

YUCATAN and QUINTANA ROO. JTMcB collected from March 22 through 27, at the following localities in Yucatan:
Chichem-Itza, Mpio. Tinum (CHI); Kabah, Mpio. Santa Elena (K), Uxmal, Mpio. Santa Elena (U), Santa Elena (SE). In
Quintana Roo: Xelha (X), Tulum (T), Coba (C), and Akumal (A). He found Battus philenor acauda (C), Eurytides philolaus
(C), Ascia amaryllis (josephina) (K), A. monuste (SE), Phoebis statira (SE), P. philea (A), Eurema daira (T,A),
Euptychia hermes (A), Danaus gilippus (C,A), Agraulis vanillae (U), Heliconius charitonius (A), Euptoieta claudia (U),
E. hegesia (C), Melitaea theona (C), Didonis biblis (CHI), Mestra amymone (T), Siproeta steneles (A), Phyciodes frisia
(SE,A), Anartia fatima (X,A), A. jatrophae (A), Dynamine mylitta (X,T), Strymon rufofusca (K,SE), Hemiargus (probably
ceraunus) (SE,T), Everes comyntas (C), Calephelis sps. (T,A), Pyrgus adepta (K,A), P. oileus (A), Cogia hippalus (K),
Typhedanus undulatus (SE), plus other species he was unable to identify with certainty. This is quite an interesting
list, not because of the species, but on account of the time of the year when normally very, very few things are out.
Welling noted a population explosion of butterflies along the north coast of Yucatán at Progreso, Chicxulub, Uaymitun,
San Bruno, to Telchac, late Aug and into September. Composia fidelissima, Ascia monuste and A. amaryllis, Papilio
cresphontes, Danaus gilippus, and other common species were exceedingly common. Further inland, to the south,
butterflies were scarce; however in eastern Yucatán it appears that populations were more abundant than the previous
years. Blacklighting in the forests of northern Quintana Roo in May, Eacles ormondei, Copaxa multifenestrata, and a
Rothschildia sp. were way above normal in abundance, the second species actually swarming around lights of any kind in
the forest, villages, etc. Sphingidae were up in numbers in May, soon dwi

20NE 13 SOUTH AMERICA. Coordinator: Boyce A. Drummond. Contributors: Keith S. Brown, Jr. (KB), Thomas C. Emmel (TE), Ronaldo Francini (RF, via KB), R. Hutchings (RH, via KB). KB's extensive contribution (5 countries) includes updates of previous FSS reports (1984 & 1985) on three Brazilian research projects: (1) the last strong colony of Graphium lysithous harrisianus in eastern Rio de Janeiro, (2) the rich butterfly community in the Serra do Japi in São Paulo, and (3) the butterfly inventory for World Wildlife Fund's Minimum Critical Sizes of Ecosystems project north of Manaus in Amazonas. In addition, KB reports that his continued (see FSS 1984) chromosome studies of long series of Philaethria (Heliconiini) from various localities suggest that there are at least 3 and maybe as many as 6 species in the dido complex, including a large new species taken in western Colombia in July. TE led trips to French Guiana and

Ecuador for Holbrook Travel and he reports on the findings of the 28 collectors who accompanied him on each trip (see also NEWS No. 4, 1986: pg 54-56).

PANAMA. In July, KB found good collecting east of the Panama airport, to 112 km into Darien. At 100 km E (16 km E of the Bayano high bridge), abundant Heliconius and Parides visited Palicourea flowers. On the road north from El Llano over the San Blas Mountains were many Philaethria, Heliconius hecalesia, H. sapho, Stalachtis magdaleniensis, and Eumaeus minyas.

COLOMBIA. In the Rio Anchicayá valley in western Colombia, from Queremal (1300 m) down to sea level (Rio Tatabro), KB found a new giant species of Philaethria, Morpho theseus, M. cypris (% & o), Neruda godmani (lower elevations), Antirrhaea undulata, Anaea godrun, A. laura, Chimastrum carnutes, and several Symmachia spp. including threissa. Along the Rio Cocona, 1200-1600 m above Coello, W of Ibagué in the central Cordillera, KB took many Eucides vibilia ssp. nov., Heliconius eleuchia, H. cydno hermogenes, and 3 spp. of Diaethria. In the lowlands N of Cucuta, KB made several interesting finds, including Tithorea tarricina franciscoi (at sea level!), Eucides tales franciscus, Heliconius ismenius tilletti, Pierella luna (in exceptionally dry forest), and Oleria amalda. Near San Bernardo, E of Pamplona on the Colombia/Venezuela border, KB found a short-tubercled, dark larva of Athesis clearista on Capsicum ciliatum.

VENEZUELA. KB found many interesting mixed species (high/lowland, cis/trans-Andean, Colombia/Venezuela) on the Rio Frio, at Táchira (600 m), including Morpho (achilles x peleides), an all blue-black Heliconius sara (sara x thamas), and Papilio (zagreus x ascolius), a female, which refused to lay eggs on her (known) foodplant when confined, and did not give a fertile egg when expressed. The area had very abundant Ithomiinae, many also mixed, but including Melinaea lilis lateapicalis and M. messenina, and several new ssp. of Parides. Consul panariste was seen ovipositing on a large Piper sp. by a stream. At nearby El Pabellon (road to Delicias, 1500 m) KB found Elzunia humboldt nr. bomplandii and observed Eucides procula edias roosting individually under high tree leaves (1700 hrs). Above Barinitas (kms 37-53) KB found large numbers of Hyalyris coeno avinoffi and Ithomia terra, a few Hyalyris cana flebilis, Hyalenna alidella, Graphium columbus, G. dioxippus, Papilio rhodostictus, Heliconius cydno barinasensis, many species of Perisama, and Epiphile epimenes electra.

ECUADOR. On February 1, KB found excellent high-altitude, little-known Pronophilinae to be common in woods and meadows at km 201 on the road from Quito, east to Baeza, along a side stream from 8 km below Papallacta and 11 km above Coyuja (2200 m). Between May 10 & 18, TE (with a group of 28) collected at Tinalandia (730 m), a resort nestled in one of the few remaining stands of forest on the western slope of the Andes in Ecuador. In many years of collecting there (since 1969), this was the best May flight of moths and butterflies yet seen. The weather was excellent (sunny days and foggy nights), and over 250 species of butterflies were recorded. Many Heliconius, Mechanitis, Melinaea (and over 30 other species of Ithomiinae), Dismorphia, Pierella, Callitaera, Euptychia, Hamadryas (including vibex), Smyrna, Catagramma, Phycioides, Panacea, Colobura, Prepona, Caligo (2 spp), Opsiphanes and other Brassolinae, Marpesia (6 spp), and a host of Riodininae and Lycaeninae species were taken in fresh condition. Moth collecting at black lights and mercury vapor lights was overwhelming, often with over 10,000 insects per sheet.

FRENCH GUIANA. TE (with a group of 28) collected in northern French Guiana from March 24 to April 2, with guidance from Lep. Soc. member Dominique Dauthville, insect pathologist and sphingid specialist at the AUCOM Institute in Cayenne. A 6-week drought ended in late March and the drier than usual weather greatly reduced the number of species and individuals expected. Moth collecting was excellent for Sphingidae and some Saturniidae, with the aid of a 12-meter tower and powerful lights erected by Dauthville in the coastal forest N of Cayenne. Morpho and Heliconius species were abundant 20 km SW of Cayenne in the hills near Camp Rochambeau and also several km N of Cayenne in coastal forest. Excellent collecting for Riodininae (close to 30 spp), Morpho (6 spp), Baeotus baeotus, Heliconius spp., Philaethria (dido complex), Parides spp., etc., was encountered in the inland site of Cacao. The palm hammocks in coastal savanna 39 km N of Cayenne yielded a rich assortment of Anaea, Bia, Pierella, Riodininae, and 3 Parides spp.

BRAZIL AMAZONAS. (All records by KB; includes a report from RH via KB). Work continued (4 visits, 27 days) in the reserves of the WWF "Minimum Critical Sizes of Ecosystems" project N of Manaus in Amazonas. All three local Agrias species were very frequent in August-November, in large clearings, along with Prepona eugenes and various Anaea (vicinia, polycarmes, glaucone, xenocles). In October-November, Morpho metellus (eperseus, telemachus) was everywhere in its single yearly brood. Other interesting new species on the local list (now at almost 450 species, less Hesperiidae, up from 375 in 1984 and 420 in 1985) included Caerois chorinaeus and Antirrhaea ornatus (completing the 10 expected Morphinae), Catoblepia versitincta, Caligo euphorbus, C. marsus, Taygetis zippora, Marpesia tutelina, Eunica sophonisba, Leucidia brephos, Graphium ariarathes, G. pausanias, Papilio thoas cinyras (the first Papilio seen, after 1300 man-hours observation), Thecla olbia, T. orcydia, Mesosemia calypso, Uraneis hyalina, Symmachia tricolor, Orimba disparilis, Xenandra helius, Alesa fournierae (and a new species in this genus), Menander hebrus, M. coruscans, Synargis tytia, Nymphidium plinthobaphis (recorded as a hybrid in the 1985 FSS), and N. omois. Also found were 4 Castnia: rutila, palitinus, cronida, and michaeli. RH (via KB) reported that an unusual, very orange-washed race of Anaea eribotes occurs near the Rio Negro in Manaus, unlike the very orange/blue forms found to the north.

RONDONIA. (All records by KB). In Costa Marques (Bolivian border of Rondonia) on July 1, were found mixed populations of Morpho menelaus (x godarti), Sais rosalia (promissa x badia), Neruda accede (faleria x philipi), Heliconius ethilla (chapadensis x tyndarus), H. erato (amazona x venustus x phyllis), and H. melpomene (mostly penelope, some amandus genes), as well as Eunica ingens, Libythina cuvierii and a new (?) dark ssp. of Stalachtis phlegia. On the new road to this town, near the Serra (and National Park) Pacaas Novos on eutrophic soils, were found Athyrtis mechanitis, Heliconius demeter eratosignis, Phyciodes aveyrona, Hypothyris anastasia niphas, Lycorea pasinuntia, Cithaerias aurorina, Ceratinia tutia ssp. nov., and Eunica sophonisba.

MATO GROSSO. (All records by KB). A rapid visit to the Chapada dos Guimaráes in central Mato Grosso in April showed Graphium common (protesilaus, orthosilaus), the first Hypothyris euclea recorded there (ssp. barii), and the usual abundance of Heliconiini, Callicore, Hesperiidae, Phyciodes, Callithomia (2 spp.), and Hypoleria. On the Transpantanal highway on June 23, Anaea evelina and Hypna clytemnestra corumbaensis were common in open sunny woods, flying in more open areas among thorny trees and protected by millions of seed ticks.

RIO DE JANEIRO. (All records by KB). Throughout SE Brazil (RJ, São Paulo, Espirito Santo), a very dry winter and spring (except for strong rains in August) made conditions ideal for the spring generations of Papilionidae, concentrated along watercourses or on flower patches. Good mark-recapture data obtained in the last strong colony of Graphium lysithous harrisianus in eastern RJ, through 2 rather small generations and a supplementary flight between them, revealed that they age even more rapidly than troidine swallowtails, with an average lifespan of less than 2 weeks. The morph ratio tended towards strong predominance of form platydesma (77% of the 53 individuals marked or

recorded; up from 60% recorded in 1984 and 68% last year), perhaps because its model (Parides ascanius) was again active and common in a colony 500 mW of the primary Graphium concentration, with occasional individuals sympatric in both areas and between them. The site of the P. ascanius colony in Recreio dos Bandeirantes (see Otero & Brown, Atala 10-12: 2-16, 1986), is being filled, subdivided and built over, and the colony probably will not survive. Likewise, the site of the Graphium lysithous harrisianus colony in Barra de Sao Joao is being rapidly cut over and may not last another year; no further individuals of this nearly extinct subspecies were seen in other areas this year. No Graphium iphitas were seen in many days' walking through its former habitats, where forest is still intact [only the rare Castnia (Geyeria) strigata rewarded these efforts]. In Tres Rios, an old haunt of R. F. D'Almeida (and now of Luis Otero), Melinaea ludovica paraiya was reared on Markea viridiflora, and Placidula euryanassa was reared on Brugmansia candida; other foodplant records included Morpho anaxibia and M. menelaus (on Erythroxylon), Lycorea cleobaea (on a large-leafed Ficus), Hamadryas spp. including amphinome (on Dalechampia), Doxocopa (on Trema; in Japi, SP, uses Celtis), and Caligo (on Marantaceae). In Barra de São João, Callicore selima was very common, as was Pierella lamia ssp. nova, Arcas imperialis, Stalachtis susanna (large group of larvae on Simaba glabra, intensively tended by ants), Adelpha aethalia, A. thesprotia, "Thecla" talayra, Syrmatia dorilas, Mesene epalia, and Dalla diraspes. Also in this locality, single Danaus eresimus plexaure, Magnastigma teucria, and Alesa prema were taken, and 7 species of Castnia were frequent: decussata, boisduvalii, phalaris, acraeoides, thais, marcel-serres, and amycus (red/white morphs).

SAO PAULO. (All records by KB; includes one report from RF via KB). In the rich butterfly community in the Serra do Japi, 191 Graphium males were marked and released on 4 days in the period October 9-16. This number included: 72 asius, 49 nigricornis, 38 dolicaon, 18 lysithous, 8 protodamas, and 6 bellerophon. Only a single "embrikstrandi" was captured; it seems to be a single-gene variant (orange antennae) of nigricornis, as travassosi (common in Rio) may also be. Only 5 released males were recaptured more than a day after marking; most were taken within minutes to hours after Juveniles of G. nigricornis were found commonly on the same foodplants as last year (Cryptocaria aschersoniana, Lauraceae). Reared specimens suggest this species might be conspecific with G. helios. Also in Japi, Pereute antodyca was common on Sept 2, before the main papilionid flight season; Eteona tisiphone and "Euptychia" pronophila larvae were found feeding on a robust bamboo, and Prepona chalciope was found feeding on Polygala, a most unexpected foodplant. Papilio cleotas did not colonize Japi this year. Actinote were intensively studied by RF, who discovered how to properly tell apart the many SE Brazilian species by larvae, foodplant, male genitalia and/or forewing scale shape in either sex. Eight species fly commonly in Japi in April (parapheles, pellenea, pyrrha, carycina, rhodope=melanisans, discrepans, genitrix, canutia) and at least 5 others occur in nearby areas of São Paulo (magnifica, mamita, alalia, surima, zikani). All except the last (and 2 more little-known, possibly separate species) have now been thoroughly studied. A visit to the Morro do Diabo State Park in extreme western São Paulo, in June, just before the vegetation was cut in the lowest part preparatory to flooding it by a hydroelectric project (a most unfortunate event since it included the area inhabited by half the remaining individuals of the Black Lion Marmoset), showed very abundant but mostly uninteresting Nymphalinae/Charaxinae, but also a number of choice or little-known species such as Narope cyllastrus (also taken in Japi this year), Amphidecta pignerator, Taygetis larua, Sais rosalia (very far south), Adelpha del phicola, A. mincia, A. calliphane, Callicore selima, C. pygas, Anaea sp. nov. near evelina, Phyciodes pedrona, and Itaballia mandela.

ESPIRITO SANTO. (All records by KB). Graphium asius was very abundant everywhere this year, including on the coastal plain of northern Espirito Santo, far from its usual submontane habitats, but no females were seen. No new juvenile data for Graphium were obtained, even though large numbers of females (of protodamas, nigricornis, telesilaus, glaucolaus leucas, dolicaon, stenodesmus) were captured, especially in Linhares. Here, in late November on low Cordia flowers along a woods edge, all of these 6 species were flying in great abundance, with sex ratios of 1:1 in all cases (asius was absent on this alluvial floodplain). Also present in Linhares was the farthest north known Graphium lysithous, a new ssp. near sebastianus (="oedipus"). In the same area, the last known large colony of Papilio himeros was very strong, and both sexes were easily photographed on Lantana flowers. However, no females gave eggs when confined with known or suspected foodplants, and no expressed eggs hatched for any of these species (can anyone offer advice on how to tame the wildest swallowtails?).



Another Season Summary is behind us and from the looks of it, there were lots of collectors in the field last year and lots of new county records for both butterflies and moths. The Zone Coordinators are to be commended for doing a great job, and our thanks to all of the collectors who contributed their data. While some members aren't interested in the Season Summary, it does seem to have its place, and the information in it is adding greatly to our knowledge of butterfly and moth distribution in the Western Hemisphere. This is the fifth Season Summary issue I have worked on, and it is the longest yet in these 5 years. The zone 4 report is shorter this year than last as the Rocky Mountain States have been getting good coverage throughout the years so the numbers of butterfly records are beginning to taper off. However, the Zone 5 report this year is twice as long as last year's as more collectors are finally starting to cover the plains states and are discovering the wealth of butterflies and moths in the prairies. The Annual meeting in Ottawa and accompanying field trips enhanced the records for Zone 7 as did the Pacific Slope

meeting for Zone 3. Also, some of the records from Tom Emmel's field trips to South America are finally getting made known in the Zone 13 report. There was a report of some sort from every state but Georgia and Vermont and from all but the Northwest Territories and Nova Scotia in Canada. We are still leaning heavily toward the butterflies, especially in the midwest and west, but I'm pleased to notice that moth reports are increasing.




GRESSITT CENTER DEDICATED

Bishop Museum's Department of Entomology was formally dedicated as the J. LINSLEY GRESSITT CENTER FOR RESEARCH IN ENTOMOLOGY on 26 July 1986. The event was well attended by the local entomological community, as well as by two of the Gressitt daughters, Mrs. Rebecca Lau and Mrs. Ellyn Brown, and by Dr. Felicia Bock and Ms. Audie Bock, sister and niece of the late J. L. Gressitt. Dr. Allen Allison, Bishop Museum Zoologist, officiated the ceremony, Drs. Alexander Spoehr and Edward Creutz, former directors of Bishop Museum,

gave addresses, and Dr. Felicia Bock gave closing comments. Highlighting the dedication, a bronze plaque was unveiled citing the late Dr. Gressitt as a "Leader in taxonomy, biogeography, and biological exploration; noted founder of research centers and scientific publications; and preeminent builder of Bishop Museum's entomological collections." The plaque says of Gressitt that "He never faltered in climbing great mountains, of the earth and of the mind."



Dear Jo,

Enclosed is a photo of a <u>O Automeris louisiana</u> F&B which I reared. It lacks all traces of eyespots on all wing surfaces, above and below. I don't believe this has ever been documented before.



The year 1986 can certainly be called the "Year of the Catocala" here in Louisiana. Until this past season, I considered 1985 to be the best Catocala season in 25 years of collecting insects. Catocala usually begin flying in Louisiana in early April, but in 1986 they were practically non-existant until the last week of May when the rains began on a daily basis and continued through June quite heavily. So did the Catocala in unbelievable numbers. On June 1, 1986, collecting with one light at Kisatchie National Forest, Natchitoches Parish, 743 Catocala were recorded in this one night. There were 22 species with 4 new state records and one new species. About half of them were C. epione. The others, listed in order of abundance, were: C. andromedae, gracilis, amica, connubialis, ilia, micronympha, dejecta, mira, similis, muliercula, jair, louisae, sp. nova, alabamae, judith, ultronia, titania, messalina, orba, insolibilis and texarkana. There were singletons of the last 2 species mentioned while the first 2 numbered over 50 specimens. This must certainly be a quantity record for one light in one night. Two weeks earlier, in the same location, there were very large numbers of Haploa colona, reversa and clymene in a single night.

At my home, I found increasing numbers of Catocala during this past June. During the first week over 1000 specimens per night were attracted to bait and light, then for the next 2 weeks about 1000 to 1500 per night and finally there were upwards of 4000 or more for 5

consecutive nights before they started tapering off. Even on full moonlit nights large numbers came to the yard.

Catocala muliercula was extremely abundant this season. Bait traps emptied in the morning had collected hundreds more by mid afternoon. Attracting large numbers of Catocala in daylight hours was a first for me. Muliercula was so abundant that at the peak of the flight period, hundreds could be flushed from the leaf litter just walking around my yard. The species apparently prefers resting on the ground, as practically none were found on tree trunks, while other species were prevalent there.

I noted a listing of various recipes of fermenting bait used by our members and offer my own for a larger quantity. In one 55 gallon drum, blend 400-600 apples or peaches, 55 lbs of granulated sugar and 10 gal. of beer. Ferment at least 2 weeks or preferably one year. Make next seasons' bait now.
