

Thoughts From Our President

A Review of Where We Stand

This is the last column I will write as B'nai Moshe President. As promised, I want to review what we have accomplished and what we still must do to achieve our strategic plan goals to hopefully, ensure a secure future for our shul.

We had five goals. The first was to try to increase the involvement of young adults in our shul since they and their children will be essential to secure our future. Rachel Daien and Hannah Fine worked very hard to get this going. They had two quite successful virtual events. However,

"attendance" was not what they hoped for because people in that age group (who work all day often staring at a computer screen for hours on end) were not eager to spend more time staring at a screen. Our hope is that, once people can gather to go out and do enjoyable things, interest and participation will increase.

Our second goal was to find ways to make shul leadership (like serving on the Board or as an officer) and involvement in our activities more appealing so as to enhance the number of active members. We succeeded in getting three new young Board members, and they have provided creative ways for our Board to function. I have tried to make meeting participation more interactive and meaningful, and I think this has been moderately successful. Our slate of Board members include more new people who will further enhance the energy of our meetings.

Our third goal was to make our religious activities more meaningful and attractive to people. Marc Sussman, Hannah Fine and, of course, Rabbi Kantor have made many innovative contributions toward this goal. We can hardly keep up with the Rabbi's creative and energetic new ideas. He has made virtual minyan services something that people come to with great regularity and joy. Shabbat Experience provides a different Jewish experience, and also has a group of "regulars" who wouldn't miss this. Again, the number of participants is less than we would like, and, hopefully, when we can be together physically, more people will try this out and join in regularly.

Our fourth goal was to find ways to secure a sound financial status both now and for our future. I am pleased to say that we "survived" the pandemic financially very well. However, our membership is aging and, until we succeed in getting new and younger members to join us, our numbers are slowly dropping due to the imbalance between younger and older members. We also have another important task to accomplish. We really need to increase our endowment funds to help ensure our financial security.

Finally, we want to form small groups of people who have something in common (young or adolescent children, empty nesters, or some common interest) to develop a camaraderie which, in turn, will enhance involvement with the totality of what B'nai Moshe offers. Our first goal is to gather families who have young children. This has been a challenge. Stacey Whelan is continuing to work to get these groups (Chavurot) formed and active. In the past it was this camaraderie which led to the development of our current group of active members, and we need to reinvigorate that closeness by forming new chavurot.

So there you have my final presidential summary of the status and hopes of our synagogue. It has been an honor to serve as your president, and I thank all those people I spoke of before who helped me guide the shul over the past two years. Now I am ready to ride off into the sunset and join the ranks of past presidents. I wish the incoming administration and board great success as we continue to build and strengthen the future of our beloved B'nai Moshe.

We Finish Together

While it may be over simplifying things, I think there are two ways that people pack for a trip. There are the people who the **night before** the trip, go through their closet and drawers, get what they need, place it in a suitcase and are ready to go. Then there are those **who at least a week before the trip** (if not more) begin lining

things up against a wall in their bedroom, planning exactly what they will need for each part of the trip.

Sometimes we are given a choice and other times we find ourselves thrust into one category or the other. When the Israelites were driven out of Egypt, the Torah tells us:

...since they had been driven out of Egypt and could not delay, they had not prepared any provisions for themselves. (Ex. 12:39)

They did not have the opportunity to pack, to plan, and think about what they would need on the

trip. Whatever they could borrow from their Egyptian neighbors and take on their backs, they took and left. It is not a stretch to say that



this is similar to how we left our building last year. We did not have our prayer books, Chumashim, our Tallitot – and, at least in the beginning of the pandemic, we cobbled our services together so we could pray as a community.

Now, as we begin making plans for **moving back into our building**, it is much more appropriate to see ourselves as Joshua and the Israelites as they **prepared to cross into the Land Flowing with Milk and Honey**. It took a few verses to tell how they left in haste from Egypt. But their planning for crossing into the land of Israel spanned more than 3 chapters in the book of Joshua. Upon crossing the Jordan we are told,

The priests who bore the Ark of the LORD's Covenant stood on dry land exactly in the middle of the Jordan, while all Israel crossed over on dry land, until the entire nation had finished crossing the Jordan. (Joshua 3:17)

As we make plans to move back into the sanctuary there are those of us who might "just want to dive in." Yet the reality is that we have made it this far and we want to do this safely, making sure that we **bring EVERYONE** along so that we can **sing, pray, and celebrate together**. What this means is that we will be moving slowly but safely – letting you all know what the plans are so that you feel comfortable with each step we take. And **NO ONE WILL BE LEFT BEHIND**. Even when we move back into the sanctuary for services on a consistent basis, we will continue to employ a hybrid service model that allows for those who don't feel safe coming into the sanctuary to still PARTICI-PATE from home through their computers.

We are all grateful that it did not take us 40 years to get here – and look forward to the day, not too far away, when we will "cross the Jordan" and join together in singing out Halleluiah!





mittee and has been the chair of our phone call team which has contacted many of our senior members during the pandemic. Anne is always willing to lend a hand.


If you happen to not feel well and Anne hears about it - you will likely receive a delivery of her delicious homemade chicken soup, even during the pandemic!!!


Marc has taken on many leadership roles at B'nai Moshe. He served on the Executive Committee and currently is back on the Board of Directors where his





Rachel Slagter Shares Her Story of Surviving the Shoah

B'nai Moshe Men's Club welcomed Rachel "Chelly" Slagter to share her incredible story of surviving the Shoah as a young child and the bravery of the righteous gentiles who rescued her from an orphanage to the sanctity of a caring gentile family.




"I was hidden for two years by some brave Dutch people and transported to them by a young man who saved 33 Jewish children during the years 1943-1945," she said. Rachel's siblings were rescued in a similar fashion after forced separation from their parents who were transported to Bergen-

Belsen concentration camp.

Rachel's father survived, however, he would not discuss any aspect of his Holocaust experiences, his wife's death or the children's survival. This led to Rachel's decades-long search to identify and thank her rescuers. You can watch Chelly's presentation on the B'nai Moshe YouTube page or by typing into your web browser:

Sorry Kermit. It's Actually Easy Being Green . . . by Ada Yerman

Thank you to Chef Cari for presenting at our Zero Waste Food Program on Monday, March 8. The event was well attended and very informative! We will use this column to keep you posted on activities that the Green Team has planned, include some



facts about environmental sustainability. Hopefully, it will inspire you to join us on the journey of preserving our planet for future generations.

Did you know that scientists predict that by the year 2050 there will be more plastic in the ocean by weight than fish? Plastic pollu-

tion has created a "garbage patch" in the Pacific Ocean that is 3 times the size of France! Although single use plastic offers the consumer a lot of convenience, it is very harmful to our planet and wildlife. It has been reported that all sea turtle species, 45% of marine mammal species and 21% of seabird species are harmed by ingesting plastic or becoming entangled by it.

I collected all the plastic that I use in my home for 1 week and I do not use Ziploc storage bags or plastic grocery bags, and rarely use plastic wrap. I was amazed by how much plastic I collected. Most items in the grocery store come in some sort of plastic. A box of cereal has a plastic bag inside containing the cereal. Cheese sticks are wrapped in plastic, produce is wrapped in plastic. And the list goes on...

I have decided that each month I will commit to one change that will decrease my single use plastic waste. In March, I decided to reuse the little plastic medicine bottles that my family receives its medication in. I called our local pharmacy—Lakes Discount Pharmacy on Haggerty Rd. in West Bloomfield and asked if I

brought in my used amber or green plastic container, would they put the refill in that bottle. I was so happy to hear the answer - YES!

Prior to the pandemic I used mesh bags when buying produce at the grocery. I stopped as stores were requesting that shoppers *not* bring their own bags. I have started to use my own mesh produce bags again. I have tried to use my own grocery totes, but have been told by some stores that they cannot put the groceries in them. I asked if I could pack my own bags and the answer was YES. Now I pack my groceries in my own reusable totes.

The other change I made in March was to try and use less paper towel as it comes wrapped in plastic. I bought a product called Unpaper Towels online (they are washable and recyclable/compostable). I have used a lot less paper towels since purchasing these. In April, I stopped buying dental floss in the little blue plastic case. I have ordered dental floss from an online store that is recyclable and comes in a refillable glass case.

I know it seems like a small thing, but if we all did a small thing and told our friends about it, then maybe we could start to have an impact. What can you do this month? Can you give up drinking/buying water in plastic water bottles, use reusable grocery bags, or stop using a plastic straw?
