


Fisheries in ASEAN





- ASEAN is a major fish producer and consumer
- ASEAN fisheries contributed about a quarter of the total world marine capture fish production of 90.63 million tons in 2016 (FAO, 2018)
- The top four fish producing nations in ASEAN are Indonesia, Thailand, Vietnam and the Philippines (Invest in ASEAN, 2018)
- The fisheries sector is an important source of employment and income in ASEAN

To enhance regional cooperation on information **sharing through an online interactive platform**; as well as on the use of Monitoring, control and Surveillance (MCS) information; and



- Important tools to exchange information about Monitoring, Control and Surveillance (MCS) system in combating IUU fishing
- To share the good practices and experiences between MCS operating agencies of each ASEAN members
- To share fisheries law and regulations among ASEAN member
- Strengthening ASEAN collaboration for tackling IUU Fishing in ASEAN region














Carrier vessel AIS track


