Dear Sir,

The following are the dimensions of the School Building referred to in my letter to you, re terms.

VIZ - The building over all is 56X 63 feet, two class rooms 24X 30 feet with seven windows in each and two floor and one ceiling ventilators in each room, front vestibules, front and center halls, rear vestibules, hall and cloak rooms. Four entrance doors two at front and two at rear, the two class rooms and center hall can be up into one room. A Teachers Room is situated at the front of building. The basement is 7'6" high containing boys and girls play rooms, boys and girls lunch rooms and furnace room, all cement floors and floor ventilators. The walls of building to be 16" stone walls to main floor joist and 9" brick walls to top of gables. The main floor to be laid with 1" dressed pine and over laid with 1" dressed maple, all treads of steps and stairs are of oak, the Bell tower is 7 feet square and 20 feet above roof.

Hoping this will be sufficient to warrant a building to suit

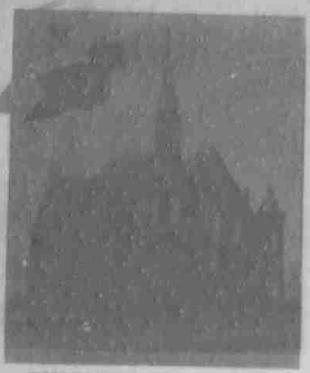

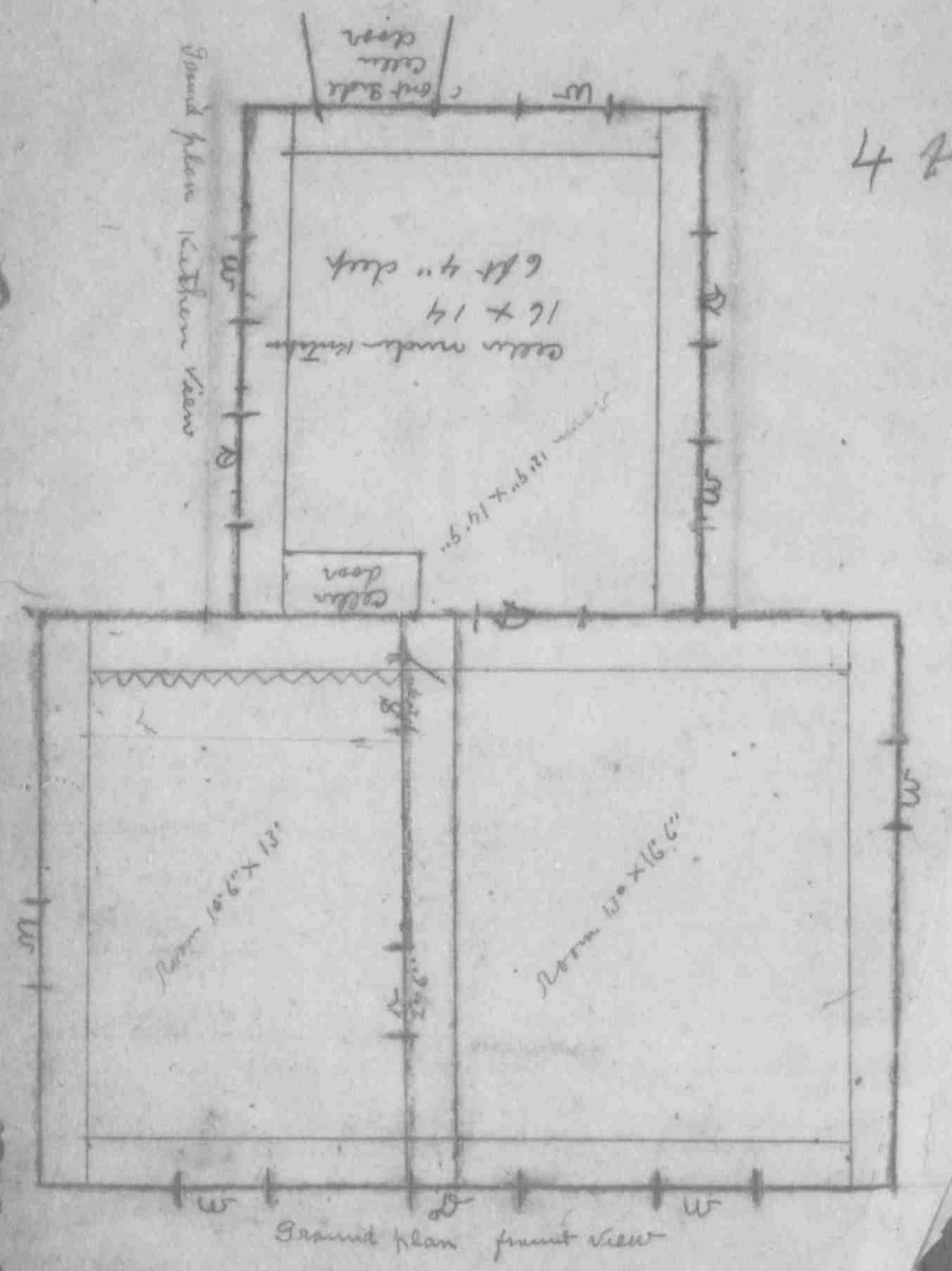

SIR,-

Mr. John Clark head teacher of the Chaweken School on the Reserve where he has been employed for the past few years has given every satisfaction to the School Board, Chiefs and members of the Six Nations. He is a married man and has experienced difficulty in procuring house accommodation for himself and wife. For the past year or two, he rented a house from Chief J. S. Johnson, who notified him that he required the house in June. Mr Clark could not procure another dwelling and was therefore considering resigning as teacher there. The trustees of the Chaweken School requested him to defer his resignation until they could lay the matter before the Chiefs in Council, which they did at their meeting held on April the 12th, when the Council decided to build a dwelling house in Chaweken for a residence for the teacher. The minutes of which Council meeting was duly forwarded to you. After the meeting I requested the trustees to prepare the plans and specification for the teacher's residence and ask for tenders to be returned at the Council meeting to be held in May, when the Chiefs would consider the plan and tenders and if approved of, the matter could be fully reported without further delay to the Department. Chief Johnson one of the Trustees prepared a plan and specifications for a house which I enclose. I also attach the tenders of:-

The Chiefs accepted the offer of Mr John Hill for a brick house 18X32 with cellar under whole, A frame kitchen attached 14X24 in all eight rooms, stable 14X20 wood-shed 12X24 one and a half acre of land, first class well and out buildings. The only other building which was worthy of any consideration was the offer of Chief J.S.Johnson for the house at the present time occupied by the teacher. The house is of the same plan as the one Chief Johnson proposed to build for the teacher residence, but the Chiefs would not accept his offer. Mr John Clark the teacher informs me that he prefers the house of Mr John Hill to any of those offered for sale. All the houses offered are convenient to the school. I consider the offer of Mr John Hill's the best value and most desirable of all properties offered. I would much prefer building a suitable residence but as the Chiefs object to this, I beg to recommend that you approve of the Chiefs

I suppose it is natural for Chief Johnson to feel annoyed on account of the Chiefs not accepting his plan for a new building and also not buying his property. I consider the Chiefs action worthy of your endorsement.

The Deputy Superintendent General:-

With reference to the proposal to purchase a house for the head teacher of the Ohsweken school I beg to say that Mr Supt. Cameron was informed on the 9th June last that if the Six Nations Council wished to have the proposed cost of the building and first repairs charged to capital account, upon the understanding that the same would be repaid from interest a resolution setting forth their wishes should be obtained so that an Order-in-Council sanctioning the expenditure might be made. Mr Cameron now sends the required resolution which asks for the sum of \$1000.00 for the purchase of the house and also the first cost of necessary repairs. I was present at the Council meeting when this resolution was passed and in conversation with the Trustees and Mr Supt. Cameron, and from a personal inspection of the building they propose to purchase, I consider that it would take about \$250.00 to make the necessary repairs, and that the Order-in-Council should cover an expenditure of about \$1250.00

The Council after some consideration decided that they again refuse to have the extra repairs done to the Teacher's residence as the contract had been awarded a month prior to the proposed addition to the work and the contract was let in accordance with the requirements of the occupant.

Council again refuse to make further repairs to the Teacher's residence.

The Council then adjourned until to morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Sir,

As a teacher here under a three year contract with the Six Nations School Board I beg to advise you of a grievance under which I am living.

My contract calls, (as part remuneration for services) "the free use of house and barn" and "The Six Nations School Board hereby agrees to do all necessary repairs to the said house and barn" Agreement signed March 23, 1912, to begin April 1, 1912.

Relative to said repairs.

The Six Nations council ordered Inspector of works, Augustus Jamieson, to attend to this repair work early in the summer of 1912.

Several times during the summer of 1912, I asked Supt. Gordon J. Smith, Indian Agent, Brantford, to have this work done as some of the repairs were then badly needed.

The work was not touched until late in the fall and was carried on until about New Years in very unfavourable weather.

The following is a copy of a portion of the specifications prepared by Inspector Jamieson. I obtained a full copy from the specifications on the work on Nov. 30, 1912, and if ^{a copy of} the complete specifications is desired I will furnish it, but here quote a part only for the sake of brevity.

General Conditions - The contractor is to give his personal supervision to the works, to furnish all necessary materials, labor, apparatus, and tools needful for performing the works in the best and most satisfactory manner according to the specifications and these particulars prepared for the same and are intended to include everything necessary and requisite for the full and entire completion of the repairs notwithstanding every item necessarily involved in the works are not particularly mentioned and vice versa are to be done as if specified "

In this will be seen ample opportunity for the obnoxious and unjust discrimination which characterized the whole management of the affair from beginning to end.

In tendering, friends of the Inspector, who were not successful in securing the contract, but who afterwards manipulated affairs to get the work put in tenders without looking over the several items. Others, not "in the ring" told me when they came to get data for their estimates that it was almost impossible to figure owing to the general conditions of the specifications.

In one case and on one point the specifications particularly mentioned two new doors whereas he would be compelled to figure on four owing to the General conditions. I might say here that only one door was renewed of those particularly specified.

When the repair work was being discussed in the Six Nations Council, Mr. Hilton M. Hill, Clerk of the Indian Office, Brantford, presiding over the said Council as the Deputy of Supt. Smith made false statements about dancing damaging the floors and plaster of the house and so deceived the chiefs as to influence them against the repairs, so that the items then being considered have never been done.

One particular of the specifications calls for a new dining room door where the weather had rotted a large hole in the old one. The hole was filled with plaster paris, cement, or some such material and painted over.

The front door of the house admits snow and rain. It was not touched.

Although the roof was reshingled and the chimneys were to be properly flashed, some furniture &c has been damaged by rain coming in near the chimney.

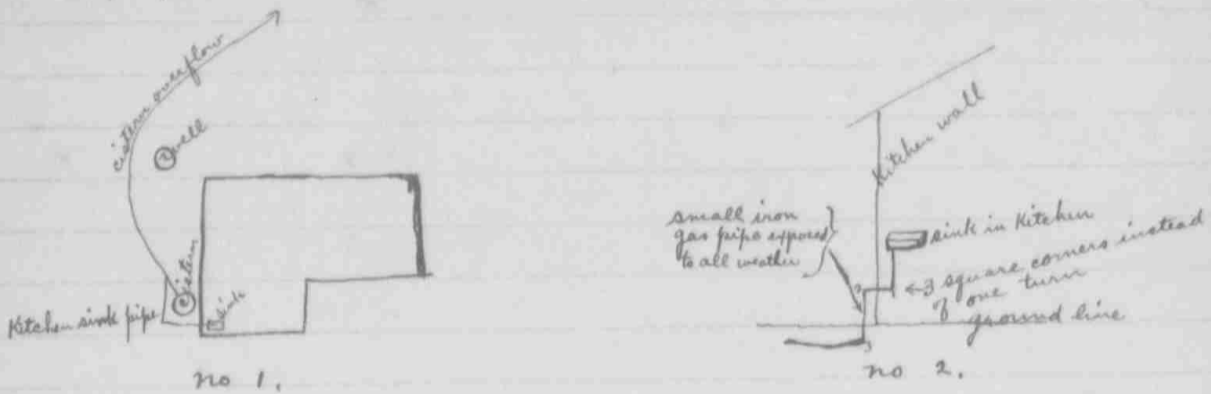
The pump in the water well was repaired by the Inspector's son-in-law, but needed other repair before he got his derrick away.

The stable floor had a hole through which my horse got a foot. This hole and other parts of the old floor which was worn thin were never touched. I have since had to repair the floor myself.

The specifications called for "The sink pipe from the kitchen to be long enough to overlap at least two feet with the waste pipe in the cistern."



These diagrams will explain themselves. I remonstrated at the time with the Inspector but in vain.

Diagram no 2. will show that this ~~was~~ sink pipe is worse than useless in frosty weather and liable to become clogged at any time.

From no 1 you will understand that something is wrong when I say that kitchen slops run back into the cistern. A fearful stench is lately coming into the kitchen from the sink pipe notwithstanding whole can of disinfectants and deodorizers and kettles of boiling water being poured down. We have discontinued the use of it altogether.

There never was a sink pipe before these repairs.

I think the cistern overflow pipe must have been wrongfully tampered with when connecting the sink pipe, for when it rains the water rises above the waste pipe and I presume soaks out into the ground as the cellar has, since the repairing, had as much as eight

inches of water, although it had hitherto been dry during the many years I have lived here. I had to gather vegetables, etc., out of the water in the cellar and put them on trestles. The water soaked away during the dry weather but it shows evidences of coming in again recently.

Supt. Mr. Smith when spoken to re these imperfections said he could do nothing as Inspector Jamieson had charge of the work.

Inspector Jamieson came in during January, 1913, apparently to have me say that the work was O.K. from the manner of his conversation. He, in presence of my wife and a clergyman who was our guest at the time, refused twice to inspect the work upon my asking him to look over the items with me. His only answers to my requests to inspect the work were "The contractors say they have done everything"

Inspector Jamieson is obviously the one in fault, but as he is only one wheel in the official machine of this Reserve he cannot but turn back or forward with the rest.

Clerk Hilton M. Hill was an important feature in militating against the execution of my written contract. He was well aware of the agreement for he witnessed the signatures.

Supt. Gordon J. Smith first allowed a great delay in beginning the work, then connived at the unfair specification to which I called his attention, and later neglected to attempt to rectify the matter.

I regret that I have been impelled to resort to what seems insubordination,

but, since the condition of my residence is both uncomfortable and unsanitary I appeal for redress,

P.S. This is but one of many grievances which I have been and am experiencing here, and if you deem it expedient or advantageous to have one from your Department look personally into this and other matters that will necessitate much correspondence I will be pleased to meet such an one.

Also, the brothers of Clerk Hilton M. Hill, who live here have vowed dire vengeance and physical harm to any one who should attempt to complain upon anyone within the "nest." It is but a matter of a few hours after information reaches the Indian Office, Brantford, until it is in the possession of dangerous people here. These five brothers of the clerk did the work of repairing my residence,

EVIDENCE.

John Clarke, sworn, examined by MR. HOLLINRAKE:

My name is John Clarke. I am a teacher, and also for the year Inspector of the schools on the Reserve. I have been on the Reserve 14 years. There is a dispute as to when I was appointed as Inspector; the re-appointment occurred in 1912. I live right in Ohsweken. Under the agreement, Exhibit 1) I am entitled to a house. The agreement says "The Six Nations School Boardreasonable repair". That was the agreement entered into I believe on the 23rd of March 1912. It was repaired in a way.. After keeping at them, finally there was a specification prepared of which this is a copy. (Exhibit 2). It was drawn up on the 16th of October 1912. In many respects the house was in very bad shape. I know of no reason why it was not attended to before except that a campaign of persecution has been conducted against me. They got the specifications out in October 1912. I cannot give you the date that they started to make the repairs, except by my word. It was somewhere about a month later. The work has never been completed. A perusal of the specifications will show that they are very unfair, and left a great loop-hole for the contractors. I cannot give any reason for it except that they have been persecuting me. I cannot see any other reason. I might say that Superintendent Smith was coming to my

2 an average of once a month during that time, and he walked
3 over the verandah floor where it was not safe. There was a

7 specifications were unfair I will read a part of the general
8 conditions, "contractors.....to be done if satisfied". I

12 item can be said to have been properly done. There was a charge
13 against me for damaging the house. I was told the charge was made

16 floors, and knocking off the plaster. The statement is not
17 true, for during all the time I have been on the Reserve I have
18 only had one dancing party, and that was in the kitchen. There
19 were a few friends in once last winter. At the time he made the
20 statement, it was only the one time after many years. I might
21 say that the representation was made at the time this was
22 discussed. That is all I have to say unless we take up the
23 different items, and show how badly the work was done. For
24 instance, the shingling; the house had never leaked until
25 it was repaired a year ago last month, and now it leaks down by
26 the chimney, evidently from the chimney being improperly flashed.

cellar was cemented, and my presumption is that the drain must

feature of all is the kitchen sink. In the first place it had no
trap, and it was partially fixed with a small iron gas pipe
which is exposed to severe weather, and it has three joins
in a distance of about 4 feet, and it runs into the over-flow,
and I don't know about it being laid on the level, but kitchen
slopes just run around the cistern, and come back in by the
over-flow pipe. I have complained about these matters.

won't say that he did not inspect it at all. A good many, in
fact all of the defects are there yet. The sink has not been
repaired. The pump which they repaired is little better; it
is not working right now.

Cross-examined by MR. HEYD:

Things are not satisfactory to me down there. I am under
a three-year agreement down there. I have asked Mr. Smith
to release me from my contract which he would not give, though
I don't like to pull up immediately. I cannot see any other
reason for their actions except personal spite. I do not
understand the situation in that frame of mind exactly. I think I
am perfectly fair and not prejudiced, notwithstanding the fact that
the people are doing all they can to inconvenience and trouble
me. The School Board was to do all necessary repairs to the

16 instructed me to get tenders. I advertised by posting up
17 notices/ all over the Reserve. I let all possible constructors
18 know about it. There is a list of those who tendered, and on
19 November 6th, 1912, they were opened. J. Thomas \$193.00,
20 A. E. Hill, \$215., R. Martin \$248/, Smith & Son \$377.75. The
21 Council accepted Thomas' tender of \$193.00. Thomas is a chief, #
22 and a good contractor, a good reliable man. He took the
23 job according to the specifications, except one, this part that
24 is scratched off. We had this fixed before the contract was let.
25 I altered the specifications a little bit by striking out some
26 on the last page. It was struck out because it had been done/
27 before the contract was let. His tender was for \$193.00 with
28 those two items struck out. He then went to work and first
29 got the necessary materials. He engaged men to do the work; they
30 were competent men. I think he finished the work according to
31 the specifications. I was there while the work was being done
32 most every day, and I saw it was being done according to
33 specifications. When the work was done it was according to
34 specifications, excepting a few changes. There was the waste
35 pipe; when we were first discussing the repairs we thought the
36 waste pipe from the sink would go from the cistern into the
37 overflow, right through the ~~overflow~~.

2 We discussed the matter, and I presume it was by Mr. Clark's
3 own knowledge then we changed it to go around this other way.

7 run around the cistern. I think we made a proper job, and it

20 I am the Inspector on the Indian Reserve. I have been
21 Inspector about 17 years, 16 or 17 years. I was a farmer before.

24 attention as inspector that there were certain repairs
25 required on this house, sometime I think prior to May 1912. I
26 do not know about the School Board entering into an agreement
27 with Mr. Clark to keep up all necessary repairs to his house
28 and barn. I did not know much about it until I got my
29 instructions from the Council. That is a certified copy that
30 the Council decided to do the work providing the cost did not

It is not asked for in Exhibit 3. It says in the specifications that the waste pipe should be long enough to overlap at least two feet, and that is right; it overlaps just the same; the only change is going around instead of through the eistern. Mr. Clark made no complaint when the work was being done on the dining room door. Afterwards when I went to complete my inspection Mr. Clark was so ugly I wanted to lick him. He did not treat me as a gentleman. He did not complain about this door; for it was at his request the dining room door was left, and the new door put between the kitchen and the pantry. I think I have given this work my best care so far as I can see.

MR. HOLLINRAKE: (Reads letter from Mr. G.J. Smith)

I do not know what those delays are. It was always better to report to the Council what I found to be the case.

To MR. HEYD: I never got notice of what the Council decided to do; it was quite a while after that I knew what they had done.

Mr. Thomas, sworn, examined by MR. HEYD:

I am a contractor. I tendered on these specifications. I agreed to do the work for something like \$195.00. I received the specifications from Mr. Jamieson, and figured on the work. I went to see Mr. ^{Albert} Raham Hill, he lives quite close by there, and he and I agreed to go the work in partnership, and another thing, I was afraid to go on because of the time of the year; it was rainy weather and stormy. Hill and I took the job together. When we got notice from the Department of their sanction, I went over there one day and fixed up the scaffold and got everything ready, and it was kind of rainy then and we did not know whether we dare go to work or not. We left everything ready to go on, but I live quite a ways from there so I went home. Hill and I started to work, I did not go back the next day; Albert Hill started the work then. When I got there again they had shingled one side of the roof and part of the other. The shingles were

 6 very much. I suppose it is all done that way right through, but
 7 I do not know. Hill did the work on the verandah floor; so far
 8 as I can see it is done properly. I don't think I saw the

CrossExamined by MR. HOLLINRAKE:

I did not work on that job very long. I put one day on the work, but I can't remember that I put two. My work was to bring all the materials there, then I left it to Hill. I was there once in a while; all the work I did was on the cellar. I left the whole thing to him. I do not know very much about the rest of it, outside of the cellar. Then I remember putting a door in the floor of the verandah. I do not remember of anything else. I did some work and brought the material there. I did some work in mixing the cement. I put the door on the verandah. I hardly think I did anything else. I do not know about the rest of the work to my own knowledge. Albert Hill put in a tender, but my tender was lower than his, but I turned the work over to him. He is a brother of Hilton Hill. I am one of the chiefs. Before we commenced the cellar ^{work} I went down. I did not see the drain there. I did not take any particular notice. I cannot say that I knew the drain was in the cellar.

To MR. MCGIBBON: I cannot just remember whether I saw the drain in the cellar. If I had thought the thing was there I might have taken more particular notice.

To MR. HOLLINRAKE: I was down the cellar when the work was being done. I was mixing the cement, and one of the hired men took it down; I mixed it outside. I went down before

2 they started but afterwards we dared not step on the soft cement.
3 I went down after the cement was hard. Before we commenced I
4 went down the cellar, then we were mixing outside, and had one
5 fellow who carried it down to Mr. Hill, and the work was
6 commenced. He laid it, and they completed it, and it got hard
7 and then I went down; I could see a little from the outside,
8 but I did not go down until it was hard. I tell you I left
9 everything to Mr. Hill.

10 To MR. MCGIBBON: I am a chief. We give contracts to
11 chiefs on the reserve. This is not my first contract from the
12 Council. I have been a chief for the last 20 years. I have had
13 a lot of jobs..

14 To MR. HOLLINRAKER: I always like to do a good job.

16 Albert Hill, sworn, examined by MR. HEYD:

17 I took the contract with the last witness to do this work, at
18 least I tendered along with others, and he got it, then he and I
19 went into partnership to do the work together. He got the
20 materials. I did the work according to specifications.
21 According to my memory we did the work shingling according to
22 specifications. It strikes me the shingles were $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches to
23 the weather. I think it was $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches. I would not be positive
24 whether it was 4 inches or $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches. We put the asbestos
25 underneath, and I think we did a good workmanlike job.
26 (Reads "joists in floors") That was partly done; when the floor
27 was taken up ~~there~~ it did not appear necessary to put in the
28 cedar posts. We found that the material there was suitable
29 and not decayed, and that we could use it. There was a new stick
30 of timber there, and we laid a new course of joists so there

1 in the trap door because Mr. Clark said it would be better to
 2 have no hinges to save people from tripping over it.
 3 "Kitchen doors" I did not know there was any call for a kitchen
 4 door. We put a new panel door in and repaired the dining room
 5 door. At Mr. Clark's request we put another door into the pantry,
 6 the door we had brought for the dining room, and we repaired the
 7 dining room door. So the repairs in the dining room door were
 8 extra, and we did that at his request. We fixed the glass in the
 9 dining room door. We placed new locks on the front door, and
 10 repaired those that were damaged. "Locks and knobs with two keys"
 11 We put new locks in the front door with two keys, and repaired
 12 the rest. We did what was necessary. So far as I knew the
 13 cement in the cellar was done in a proper manner. I do not know
 14 anything about covering up a drain; the drain is in a different
 15 part of the cellar. We put the floor in the front part, and
 16 there is no drain there. If the water subsequently get in it
 17 was through no fault of ours. In the first place father owned
 18 that house, and there was no drain in that part of the cellar.
 19 The drain in the ~~front~~ cellar is to carry off the water from
 20 the cellar out into the road. We were never near that; we
 21 had no repairs whatever to do in that part of the cellar. It
 22 is 15 or 16 feet from where we did the concrete work. We
 23 cemented the cistern. There was no brick that required taking
 24 down, and instead of putting down the brick top that was asked
 25 for we put a cement top. We did that in a good workmanlike manner.
 26 We did the sink pipe in the kitchen as they required us to do.
 27 When we looked into it, we found it would have to go over the
 28 cistern, and we went in another direction, which made it a good
 29 deal longer. It was done with Mr. Clark's knowledge and consent.
 30 We ran the pipe two feet ~~farther~~^{over} into the cistern. It would not
 31 be possible for the water to get into the cistern unless the
 32 old drain was closed up. We had nothing to do with the old
 33 drains. I don't remember whether we painted the sash in the
 windows. I think if there was any painting called for it was done.

18 No. 4 and No. 7 schools. He is one of the chiefs. He gets
19 quite of number of jobs from the Council/ and I have helped him
20 to build some of them. It strikes me the shingles are 4 1/2
21 inches to the weather. I would not believe that they are 6 inches
22 in some cases. They are not 6 inches. It sometimes happens
23 in finishing up a roof that you have to spread out a little. I
24 believe on a large contract it is an important thing to have
25 them 4 inches to the weather. If I get work to do I am
26 contracting all the time. I do not get a great deal of work. A
27 great deal depends upon the pitch of the roof whether the shingles
28 should be laid 4 inches to the weather. If it was a flat roof
29 they might not have shingles at all. As I said before the
30 shingles might be 5 inches to the weather up near the ridge, so
31 you could work out your courses properly.

32 The joists on the verandah floor are laid lengthwise.
33 I suppose the verandah would be about 30 feet. By the prammer

2 carried by your trimmer. They were 16 feet- joists. They are
3 on the trimmer. There is nothing underneath them on the centre
4 joists.courses. The old support is on the outside timber, which is
5 far better than putting it on cedar posts or anything else. It
6 was not required to put cedar posts in. "Joists for verandah
7 floor.....5 cedar posts" We did not do that but placed a
8 trimmer instead of it.

9 I do not know how large a light was of glass was in that
10 door. The door we originally brought for the dining room was put

Some weeks ago the Council gave a mortgage on this house to a man named Maracle for the purpose of raising money to assist in sending their delegate to England. Maracle claims the right to occupy the house and will not rent it. As this house is the property of the Six Nations and also purchased for a teachers residence, I submit that the Council had no right to make use of it for any other purpose and if it is not to be used for a teachers residence, it might be very properly used for the assistant doctor. I beg to recommend that the assistant doctor if he requires it be permitted to rent it at a reasonable rent.



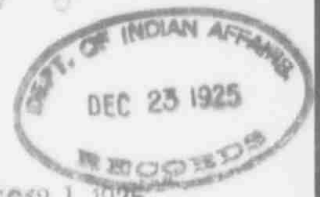



I suggest that this resolution be neither approved or refused until I have had an opportunity to interview this man and report further to the Department.
